Machine catches fire at GenPac

Four homes saved from one of two wildfires

SEBRING — In addition to homes and a car fire on Monday, Highlands County firefighters also battled wildfires, then put out an industrial fire Tuesday morning at GenPac.

Public Safety Director and Highlands County Fire Rescue Chief Marc Bashoor said the industrial fire was

helped, in part, by staff at GenPac who attacked a burning grinder with carbon-dioxide (CO2) fire extinguishers.

In addition, Florida Forest Service Public Information Officer Melissa Yunas reported that joint efforts between Forest Service crews and county fire crews saved four homes in the Venus area, as well as put out a wildfire in Avon Park

Lakes.

Burning grinder

At about 3:45 a.m. Tuesday, fire crews from DeSoto City stations 18 and 19, with Lorida Volunteer Station 24, Highlands County Emergency Medical Services and Battalion 1 went to a reported structure fire at the GenPac manufacturing facility in the Sebring

Three chosen for 2019 Kids Tag Art

Decision out of 49 finalists, 1,000 participants

SEBRING — Out of 49 finalists and almost 1,000 participants, local officials Monday announced their top three Choice Awards for this year's Kids Tag Art.

They also congratulated the 49 finalists at a ceremony Monday evening at Circle Theatre, a facility run by Champion for Children Foundation, a Kids Tag Art partner.

Each year, the program invites fifth-graders from all local public and private schools to submit a license-plate design of what Florida means to them. The winning tags are then made available for sale through local county tax collector officers.

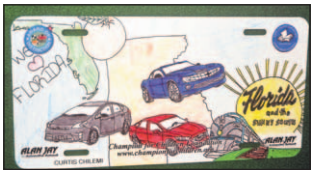
Highlands County started the program in the 2011-12 school year, to raise funds for cash-strapped art programs in the county's elementary schools.

Fifth-grade students design specialty license plates as a classroom project. Parents can then purchase a plastic screen-printed version of that artwork in the form of a vehicle tag that can affix to their front bumper.

Highlands County's top recipients this year were:

Curtis Chilemi of Lake Country Elementary School — Alan Jay Choice Award, chosen by Alan Jay Wildstein.

Ashleigh Norcross of Sun 'n Lake Elementary School — Champion for Children Choice Award, chosen by Champion for Children Executive Director Carissa Marine.

SunTrust considers public comments; Final protocol March 29

SEBRING — The Sebring Strong Survivor Fund steering committee held a public meeting at the Highlands County Board of County Commission meeting hall Monday evening. The purpose of the meeting was to get comments and the public's input on the draft protocol to disburse funds to the victims and survivors of the Jan. 23 shootings at SunTrust Bank, 1901 U.S. 27 South, in Sebring.

Dr. Anne Kerr, chair of the steering committee, began the meeting by asking the audience to observe a moment of silence as she read the names of the five victims: Debra Cook, Marisol Lopez, Jessica Montague, Ana Pison-Williams and Cynthia Watson.

The steering committee was formed just days after the Jan. 23 incident.

"In consultation with SunTrust Foundation, NCF [National Compassion Fund] will form the steering committee that includes local community, civic and business leaders to ensure that the voices of the victims' families are heard, as they are integral to the distribution process. Experts with experience in mass crime victim compensation and the needs of crime victims will also be asked to serve in a volunteer capacity. The fund and committee are entirely transparent, and the committee will inform the public of its deliberations in the distribution of funds," a Jan. 28 press release stated.

SunTrust officials turned to Fifth Third Bank in Cincinnati, where a similar shooting took place. They recommended National Compassion Fund because of the plans they have in place for these tragedies.

Kerr said she wanted to serve as the chair because she is a wife and mother and can empathize with the grief the community is going through.

"Financial contributions have come in to the Sebring Strong Survivors Fund," Kerr said. "The role of this committee will be to make sure that those funds are distributed to the protocol that will be finalized in the coming weeks and 100 percent of

those funds will be contributed to the families of the victims."

As of Monday's meeting, Kerr said there had been \$400,000 raised by companies, individuals, civic organizations and churches. She was unsure if the total included the \$14,000 raised at Sunday's Sebring Strong 5K race. She said money is still coming in.

NCF will be responsible for developing the final protocol and distribution of the funds. The organization was created to deal with tragedies and it has dealt with 10 mass tragedies in five years.

The draft protocol has two categories applicants can file under. Category One is for applicants on behalf of the deceased. Category Two is for applicants who were present during the shooting.

National Director of National Compassion Fund Jeffery Dion explained the differences in the categories. Category One will be for the immediate families of the victims. There can only be one person per family to apply.

Dion said the people in Category One will have the highest pay out and it will be the same for each person. Category Two will have different pay outs and will be less. All payouts will be given by the severity of injury. The deadline to apply will be April 23.

"The important thing to remember is that these funds that were donated are a gift," Dion said. "It is a charitable

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Power transmission line across downtown sparks council discussion

AVON PARK — The electrical transmission lines that will be servicing the new Nucor micromill under construction just north of the Highlands/Polk county line will be running across Avon Park's Main Street.

While Duke Energy informed the city and affected residents last year about the need for easements for the power poles, the height of the poles was not communicated, according to the City Council.

At Monday's City Council meeting, Councilwoman Maria Sutherland said she had a discussion with a city resident and was informed that there would be 80-foot to 100-foot power poles in the city.

In the City Council packet of June 11, 2018 there was an item concerning the sale of two easements from the City to Duke Energy for \$15,000 for

each easement, she said.

The contract had been reviewed by the city manager at the time and approved by the city attorney and the council approved it, spending about 140 seconds on the issue, Sutherland said. But, the height of the power poles was not stated anywhere on the contract provided by Duke Energy.

A couple of residents sold easements to Duke Energy for power poles, she said. Sutherland said they showed her their contract from Duke Energy, which didn't mention the height of the poles.

"There will be at least two residents who are going to be very unpleasantly surprised when they wake up and they have this 100-foot pole sitting in their front yard," Sutherland said.

"We are not trying to stop progress; we are not trying to stop development; I just want to get a handle on how our

franchise fee agreement works to where it appears that you can wake up one day and have these poles in your town and not know anything about it," she said.

She doesn't want this to happen again. The City should have a say what goes in its historic area of downtown and what crosses over its streets, Sutherland said.

Duke Energy Community Relations Manager Jerry Miller said there were meetings with the city manager in June 2018 and the agenda packet moved forward with no requests to come and make a presentation to the City Council.

Many times transmission lines go through cities, but he agrees this is unique because it is a line for industrial use, he said.

Deputy Mayor Jim Barnard asked if the existing lines could be used?

Miller said the engineering

could not use the existing lines. The fact that it is going across Main Street is not ideal.

City Attorney Gerald Buhr asked if there was any consideration on what the poles will look like?

Miller replied the best example would be a little further east on State Road 64 by the Catholic church [Our Lady of Grace] where there is a transmission line, which was built about six years ago. Those are 120-foot poles with about 10 feet in the ground.

Sutherland said, "I know it will move forward without our consent. I feel we got screwed."

Barnard said he agreed with Sutherland.

City Manager David Flowers said the line will cross Main Street along the old CSX train tracks east of the Avon Park Community Center. There won't be any power poles on Main Street.

Airport Industrial Park.

As it turned out, it was just a grinder, used to break down and recycle plastic for use in the plant potting containers the company manufactures.

"Something in the process of that either jammed or melted up in the grinder," Bashoor said.

Plant workers used CO2 extinguishers to knock down the fire, Bashoor said, and evacuated the building before the fire department arrived.

Firefighters overhauled the machine and worked to get smoke out of the building.

The fire extinguishers helped, he said.

"We don't encourage people to fight the fires, but we are fortunate that those who are trained used CO2 extinguishers on it," Bashoor said. "That material is very volatile and has chemicals that go along with the process to do what they do."

It could have escalated and set off the overhead sprinklers, Bashoor said, but the fire extinguishers kept the fire cool and

prevented heat from building up and doing that.

"From what I saw in the photos, it should not have set off the sprinklers," said Bashoor, who was not on scene at the time. "It takes a lot of heat to set off the sprinkler heads."

There were no injuries, but estimated damage/loss to the machine was \$14,000.

Two wildfires

On Monday, from midday through early afternoon, Florida Forest Service and Highlands County Fire Service fought two separate two-acre fires on opposite ends of the county.

Yunas said thick vegetation made the fires more intense, but with only light winds, each fire stayed small and proved easier to suppress and contain.

The Crocus Wildfire near North Nantucket Road in Avon Park Lakes was first reported at 12:08 p.m. Fire crews had it contained by 1:23 p.m.

It's now under investigation, Yunas said.

The Moss Wildfire in Venus was reported at 1:35 p.m. and contained less than an hour later at

2:24 p.m.

It is also under investigation.

At that fire, Highlands County and Forest Service fire crews saved four homes, but had a camper, a fifth wheel and a mobile home get damaged.

Yunas credited quick response from both the Forest Service and Highlands County Fire Rescue for getting the "Moss Road Wildfire" under control.

At the Moss Wildfire, the Forest Service had two firefighting tractor plows (bulldozers) and a fire engine.

Highlands County Fire Rescue had two engines, two water tenders, three brush trucks and two battalion chiefs, Yunas said.

'Be Firewise'

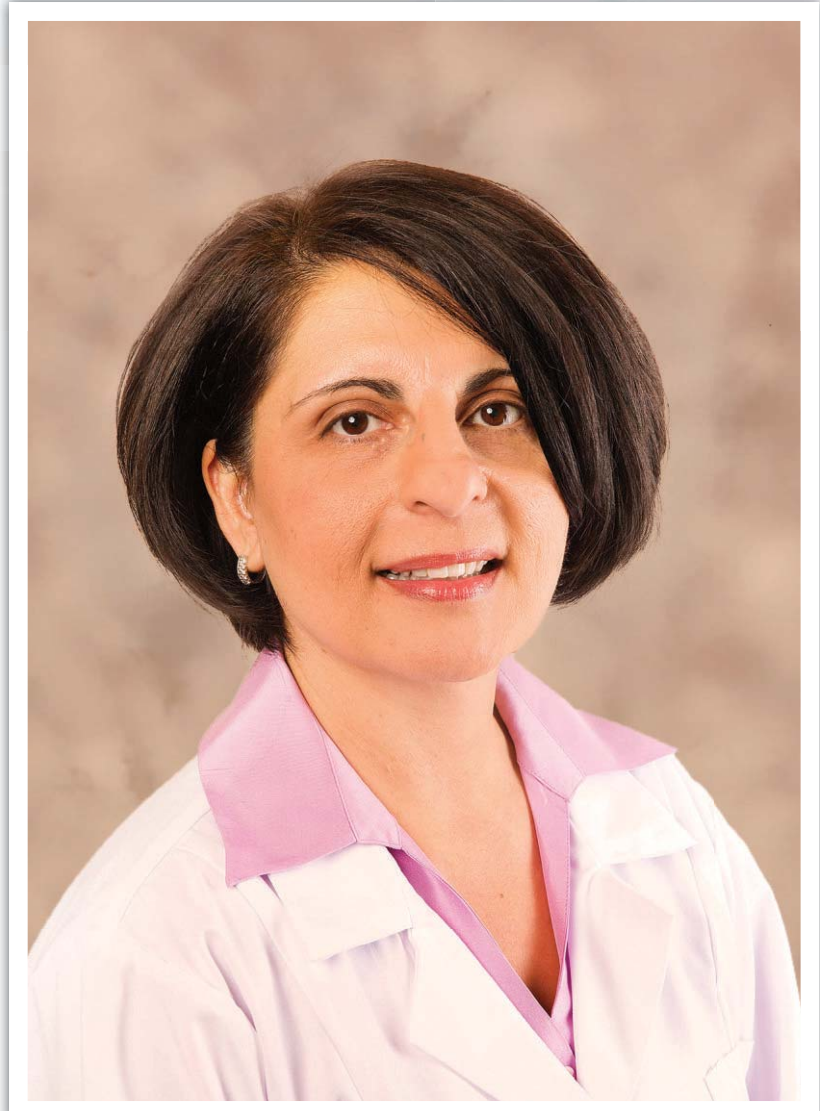
"Even small fires can damage or destroy people's property," Forest Service Area Supervisor Joe deBree said. "If you live near nature, take the time to create a 30-foot fuel break around the structure away from the adjacent wildlands."

He said a well-maintained and watered yard free of leaves and twigs can serve as a fire break.

It will also assist firefighters by giving them space to quickly access the home and mount a defense around it, or in the case of the house catching fire, how to attack the fire in it.

According to the Forest Service website, the Fire Danger Index forecast for the Highlands County area was moderate.

Death toll from Parkland tragedy continues to grow

The recent news of the suicides by student survivors of last year's Parkland high school shootings is stunning and disturbing. This is a tragedy that is lingering, and growing.

Last weekend, police in Coral Springs, Fla., responded to what they called an apparent suicide of a 16-year-old boy who attended Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland. Just one week before, a 19-year-old girl, Sydney Aiello, took her own life. Aiello, who graduated from Stoneman Douglas last year, had been diagnosed with post-traumatic stress disorder, according to her mother, Cara Aiello. According to a local CBS news station, Sydney Aiello had been struggling with feelings of guilt over the death of her best friend, Meadow Pollack, one of the 17 people killed at Parkland on Feb. 14, 2018. Apparently, the feelings became psychologically overpowering.

Suicide claims the lives of nearly 45,000 people a year in the United States, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Of the total in 2016, 6,159 were individuals under the age of 24. Suicide is the second-leading cause of death in that age group, the second-leading cause of death for college-age youth and youth age 12-18.

The Parent Resource Program of the Jason Foundation says there are more than 3,000 suicide attempts per day nationally and, in four of five instances of attempted suicide, there have been warning signs.

What are those?

Obviously, if a person — young or old, for that matter — says something like, "I'm going to kill myself," or, "I hate my life." Suicide threats are not always verbal, but verbal statements always should be taken seriously. Always.

In addition, experts say, adults should not be shy about asking children whether they have had suicidal thoughts. Ask. It won't hurt; it may well help. Among the non-verbal warning signs commonly mentioned for young people are changes in personality, increased irritability and withdrawal from healthy relationships. But adults shouldn't assume that, just because a youngster has not verbally expressed warning phrases they are not considering it.

Experts also continually reinforce the reality that suicide is preventable with therapy or, in some instances, with medication that treats depression. But timely intervention is critical. That's why all involved in suicide prevention are careful to publicize the key resource of the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline number, 800-273-8255.

That number, again, is 800-273-8255.

In the cases over the past two weeks it has become painfully obvious that the trauma of Parkland continues for those who were the closest. Local officials have mobilized with community meetings, and the Brevard County school superintendent has tried to reach every parent through text or email. (Unfortunately, it's spring break week, so children are out of school.)

In addition, state Emergency Management Director Jared Moskowitz, a former state representative from Parkland, has called for additional aid and resources from the Legislature. Gov. Ron DeSantis is monitoring the news and may add the weight of his office to that initiative, which is promising. Of course, it is entirely appropriate, perhaps necessary that youngsters traumatized by this horror get the aid they need to cope with the fallout.

Life is precious. Suicide is preventable. And self-destructive impulses must be recognized and addressed by caring adults and trained professionals.

Wildstein sheepishly said he didn't realize his choice happened to be the son of one of his employees. He just liked the way that tag celebrated cars, which is something Wildstein enjoys, as the owner of several local dealerships.

Zwyer said he chose a design that encompassed the whole state, with icons of several different aspects of Florida: streams, sails and even a rocket.

"The criteria is we just like the tag," Zwyer said. "Something catches our eye. It's meaningful to us."

Those tags are now for sale through Zwyer's office, for any proud parent or arts booster to put on their car(s). Zwyer said Monday

night that in the eight years since Highlands County schools started participating in the program, it has raised \$85,000 for local arts programs.

contribution. Crime victims have a legal right to recover money from the Florida Crime Victim Compensation Program, from restitution in a criminal case. If they file a civil lawsuit, they have a legal entitlement that way. This is completely separate; it's a gift."

The gift will be sent by check or direct deposit. The money should be available within two weeks. Because this is considered a gift, it will not affect Crime Victim Compensation benefits that may have been paid out for the same loss.

Shannon Sapp is a former coworker, or "team mate" of most of the women who worked at the SunTrust bank where the shooting happened. She voiced her concerns for the branch manager, a friend of hers. Sapp said her friend called the employees her family and said they were with her through the best and worst times in her life.

"As a member of the community and one of the thousands of donors to the Sebring Strong Fund, it is our understanding that the money would be going to the victims (families) of the deceased five," Sapp said.

She still feels that way but sees a need to include another category or tier to help the branch manager also. The Category Two has only two people in it: an employee that escaped and a witness.

"[She] lost 80 percent of her staff that day," Sapp said. "Many say that she is lucky to still have her life and she is. She knows that. But her life is forever scarred by the events of that whole day."

Sapp asked the panel to imagine taking the day off from work one day and having a phone call that said 80 percent of their staff were killed and the work home would be closed, never to open again and the survivor's guilt her friend is experiencing.

Another former co-worker, Joan Aguilar,

expressed her concern about the branch manager not fitting in the current draft protocol. She tearfully recounted what the women and male employees meant to each other. She implored the steering committee to add a tier for the branch manager.

Another person spoke who was a customer of SunTrust and agreed that something should be done to help the branch manager. Only three people spoke out of the seven who were in attendance at the Monday meeting.

The steering committee said they would take it into consideration. Kerr thanked the women who spoke and promised the audience they would discuss the ideas in a meeting on Tuesday.

Kerr also said the final protocol would be posted online by Friday, March 29. The draft protocol and subsequent final protocol and applications can be found at nationalcompas-sionfund.org.

No other public meetings are planned at this time. April 29 is the closing date for donations.

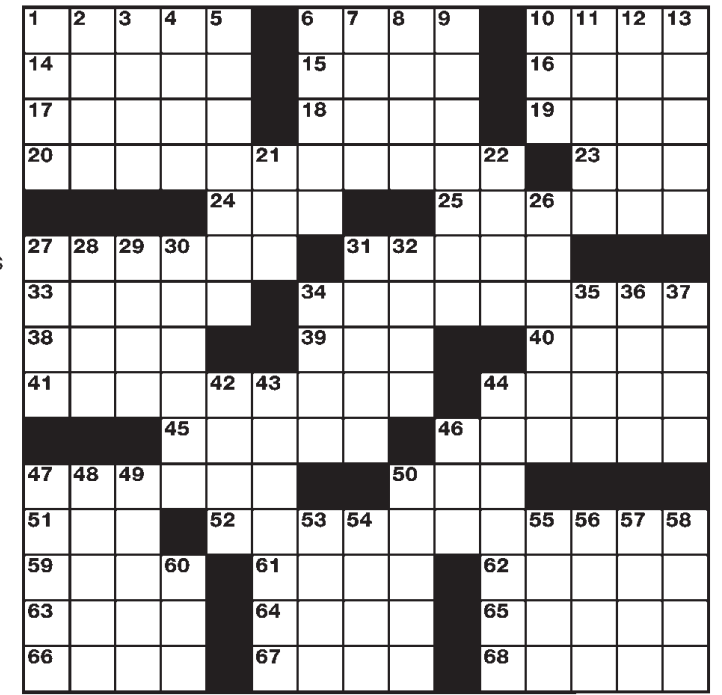

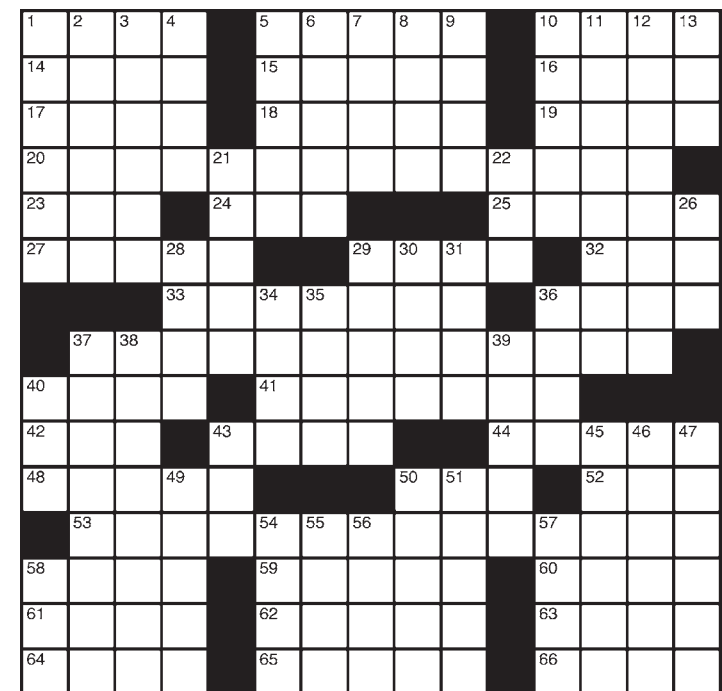

Eversley breaks barriers in racing

She is an official with IMSA's Logistics Department

DAYTONA BEACH – Ask Jamie Eversley what her favorite moment is on any given IMSA race day and she will paint a picture.

"My favorite thing about race day is the smell after the whole field takes the green," Eversley said. "It's just this perfect blend of rubber, hot asphalt and burnt fuel and that

smell is so engrained in my memory. That's one of my favorite moments of the entire event. That moment right there and being on pit lane getting to see that pack and that beautiful two-by-two formation come across the line, and then watching them scramble."

Eversley has been a Truck Driver and Pit Lane Official with IMSA's Logistics Department for

three years, one of the few women to break barriers on the competition side of sports car racing.

But Eversley was meant for this, growing up on a horse ranch with a family that had "gasoline in their veins" and living less than an hour from Michelin Raceway Road Atlanta. Her father was a longtime road racing car chief and her brother, Ryan, currently competes in the

IMSA MICHELIN Pilot Challenge.

Eversley started young, changing her first engine before she was 10 years old and working for the family's team not long after. In her teenage years, she worked for Panoz Racing just up the road in Atlanta before serving in the Marine Corps for three years fresh out of

Tough fishing until the weekend

The Freshwater Fishing Forecast for the last five days of March gives anglers the arrival of the last quarter moon phase on Thursday and a mild cold front passing through the state today. It should also be noted that the effect-rate of the moon on fish and wildlife will be at the lowest rate of its twenty-eight day cycle over the next five days.

Since the moon's effect on fish will be almost non-existent, the solar periods will act as the trigger for fish to begin to feed. Water temperatures will also play a part in that fish will feed heaviest when water temperatures are at the daily high, which will be in the upper

sixty and perhaps seventy degree mark.

Fish have been feeding every four to five days due to the current water temperature. And this has also been the weather system timing — 4-5 day weather changes — which has produced above-average atmospheric pressure upward change, which

in turn, causes the 'fish adjustment activity'.

If you don't fish on the day when fish adjustment is at the highest rate, every 4-5 days, you'll probably not catch very many fish, if any at all.

High winds will challenge anglers today and Thursday, but Friday and the weekend will produce ideal fishing winds out of the southeast. And water temperatures should enter the ideal temperature range of 72-82 degree by Sunday and perhaps Saturday during the sunset period.

Best Fishing Days: Saturday and Sunday and perhaps this morning early, will be the better days to fish.

Major Fishing Period:

Today the moon is underfoot at 7:27 p.m. and the sunset at 7:41 p.m. and will produce a feed intensity rating of 3 from 6-8:30 p.m. I expect this period to remain consistent until next week when the new moon phase starts to change fish feeding migrations to the morning hours. So fishing during the warmest water period and the setting sun will remain consistent and the best odds for some action.

Minor Fishing Period:

Today the moon-set occurs at 12:23 p.m. and solar noon at 1:30 p.m. and will produce a feed intensity rating of 2-3 from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. I

also expect fish to cue on the solar noon period instead of the moon, so fishing from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. daily will provide the better odds

high school, ultimately climbing to the rank of Sergeant.

Returning to civilian life in Georgia, though, it was clear the racing industry was calling her name.

"The smell of octane just pulled me back in," Eversley describes.

Following her first year as a full-time truck driver for Magnus Racing in 2015, Jamie held the same role with Freedom Autosport in 2016, a fitting connection given the team's military background.

Not only did the team's transporter – which Eversley described as "a rolling monument" – have bolded names of every United States soldier lost in combat since 9/11, but one of the team's race car drivers was Liam Dwyer, a fellow Marine who lost his leg and suffered other life-threatening injuries after stepping on an explosive in Afghanistan in 2011.

"It didn't blend in, let's just put it that way,"

Eversley said of the transporter. "That bright green camo covered with names and a giant eagle, globe and anchor on the side, it was a spectacle. You throw Liam Dwyer into that and it's a party. It was a real privilege getting to work with Liam and the whole group of guys. That year was a lot of fun."

But it's not always been easy being a female in the racing industry.

"When you think about mechanics, pit lane crews, truck drivers, there aren't many women," she said. "Ford Chip Ganassi's GTLM team had a female car chief who was also a tire changer. I loved seeing that because, except when I was on a pit crew, I don't remember there being any other women over the wall with me."

That realization has motivated Eversley to encourage and support other women in the IMSA paddock, no matter what role they're in.

"If I see a female face in the paddock that I don't know, I add it to my to-do list that I need to meet her because there

aren't that many of us," said Eversley. "When you can make those kinds of connections and have each other's backs, having that kind of network and getting to know each other is something I've always enjoyed connecting on."

But Eversley's influence within the paddock reaches further than she initially thought. She has learned that wearing an IMSA Official firesuit makes a quick first impression on female fans, particularly the younger generation.

"I have younger girls all the time pull me aside and they're like 'How did you get into this?'" said Eversley. "It's like the lightbulb just went off in their head. I remember the day the lightbulb went off in my head that said, 'Wait a second, I can do that too. This isn't the NFL, I can do that too.' I love seeing that moment in young girls because you can see it in their eyes. It's like this spark gets lit and they just realized this isn't just a boys' sport. 'I can do that if I want to.'"

1. Gaining momentum

Ryan Blaney has scored three consecutive top-five finishes in his No. 12 Team Penske Ford. His teammates Brad Keselowski and Joey Logano have scored wins this season. "We're right there," Blaney said. "We just need a little bit more. It's so hard to win these races. You've got to do everything perfect ... you eventually try to put one of these things here together and try to figure out how to break through and get it done."

2. Bowyer's speedometer

Clint Bowyer was an early favorite to win at Martinsville. Instead, he took himself out of the running with two costly pit-road speeding penalties. He fought back twice to score a seventh-place finish. "I guess we need to get our stuff together on being on

the same page with that pit road speed," Bowyer said. "It's such an important thing and such a big part of this style of racing, where track position is everything."

3. Lone Star stat

If you look at the past 10 years of racing at Texas Motor Speedway, from 2009 through 2018, you will find five former winners, including three former champions, who have retired from big-league racing. The list includes Jeff Gordon, Matt Kenseth, Tony Stewart, Greg Biffle and Carl Edwards, who abruptly left NASCAR following the 2016 season. All were replaced by 20-something drivers.

3. Jimmie, what?

Jimmie Johnson, who has scored nine wins at Martinsville during his career, was never a factor Sunday. The seven-time Cup Series

Learning about landscaping

If you are a gardener and you have lived anywhere else, you realize pretty quickly that Florida is different. The weather, the bugs and a whole lot of other gardening issues add to the difficulty. The key to these differences from other places is Florida's unique environment.

Learning to work within Florida's specialize ecosystems takes special measures. We often look at gardening from the perspective of how it affects our outcomes and not how our cultural practices affect our environment. We can now combine those

two goals and protect the environment while we keep a beautiful yard.

In Florida we call it Florida-Friendly Landscaping. Part of the University of Florida's Yards and Neighborhoods program, it was developed to address environmentally safe methods to landscape and maintain your yard. In 1981 the State of Colorado developed Xeriscaping based mostly on using drought resistant plants and conserving water. Xeriscaping soon became associated with cactus like plants and rocks and sometimes misrepresented as Zeroscape which sounded like xeriscape. The need to separate Florida's specialized issues from the term Xeriscaping brought about the development of Florida-Friendly landscaping.

Florida-Friendly Landscaping is based on nine principles; most of which deals with protecting water. Although it may seem that Florida has a lot of water, it's mainly water quality that gives us concern. You've probably heard of the water problems to the south in Lake Okeechobee and other coastal tributaries. Most of these problems involve algae blooms which come from nutrient overloads. These nutrient come from a lot of sources and Florida-Friendly Landscaping is designed to minimize these impacts while you create a beautiful yard.

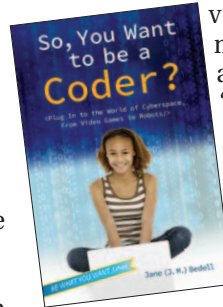
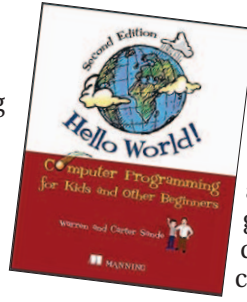

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Trump border emergency survives

Democratic-controlled House has fallen short in its effort to override President Donald Trump's first veto

WASHINGTON — The Democratic-led House failed Tuesday to override President Donald Trump's first veto, salvaging his effort to steer billions of extra dollars to erecting border barriers and delivering a victory to the White House in a constitutional and political clash that's raged for months.

Lawmakers voted 248-181 to overturn Trump's veto, but that fell 38 votes shy of the required two-thirds margin. Just days after Attorney General William Barr announced that special counsel Robert Mueller had found Trump didn't scheme with Russia to help his 2016 election, Tuesday's vote bolstered Trump's drive to build a wall along the boundary with Mexico, a hallmark of his 2016

presidential campaign and a priority of his presidency.

"Thank you to the House Republicans for sticking together and the BIG WIN today on the Border," Trump tweeted. "Today's vote simply reaffirms Congressional Democrats are the party of Open Borders, Drugs and Crime!"

While clearly a defeat for Democrats, the vote afforded them a chance to reemphasize policy differences with Trump and change the subject from collusion allegations that have lost political clout. Underscoring that, House Speaker Nancy Pelosi placed her name atop a House Democratic fundraising email referencing the failed veto override, writing, "I know grassroots Democrats won't let Trump's enablers get away with this."

Prosecutors drop criminal case against Smollett

Authorities said they still believe 'Empire' actor lied about being the target of a racist, anti-gay attack

CHICAGO — Prosecutors on Tuesday dropped all charges against Jussie Smollett, an astonishing reversal that the "Empire" actor called vindication, but that the Chicago mayor angrily dismissed as a "whitewash" of allegations that Smollett lied about being the target of a racist, anti-gay attack.

Authorities said they still believe Smollett concocted the attack, and they offered little explanation for the decision to abandon the case barely five weeks after charges were filed. In return for the dismissal, Smollett agreed to do community service and to forfeit the \$10,000 he paid to get out of jail.

The mayor and police chief blasted the move and stood by the investigation that concluded Smollett staged a hoax. Mayor Rahm Emanuel lashed out at Smollett, saying he had dragged the city's reputation "through the mud" in a quest to advance his career. At one point he asked, "Is there no decency in this man?"

Smollett's attorneys said his record was "wiped clean" of the 16

Pence calls for landing astronauts on moon in 5 years

Currently, earliest possible landing on the moon by NASA isn't until 2028

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Vice President Mike Pence on Tuesday called for landing astronauts on the moon within five years, an accelerated pace that would aim to put Americans on the lunar south pole.

Pence said NASA needs to achieve that goal "by any means necessary." Speaking at a meeting of the National Space Council in Huntsville, Alabama, he said NASA rockets and lunar landers will be replaced by private craft, if required.

"It's time to redouble our effort," he said. "It can happen, but it will not happen unless we increase the pace."

Now, the earliest possible landing on the moon by NASA isn't until 2028, Pence said. He acknowledged talent — and money — will be

Professional dominatrix tells lawmakers: Don't hurt consensual sex work

State Legislature considers bills addressing human trafficking

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — A professional dominatrix urged Florida lawmakers Tuesday not to hurt consensual sex workers as the Legislature considers bills addressing human trafficking.

"I am your neighbor, I am your co-worker, I am the person in the grocery store. I am also a consensual sex worker," said Grace Taylor of Pinellas County, who said she began

work as a dominatrix about 20 years ago so she could afford to send her sons to Philmont Boy Scout Ranch. "And as such, I am your first line of defense in helping you find those who have been trafficked."

She and fellow sex-worker Kristen Cain told the House Criminal Justice Committee there's a difference between people who choose to work in the sex industry and those forced into the trade. They testified before the committee approved two bills aimed at

addressing the problem of human trafficking — an issue that's gained more attention after New England Patriots owner Robert Kraft was charged with paying for sex as part of a Florida investigation into massage parlor prostitution.

"Sex work does not equate to human trafficking. Conflating the two is dangerous for both victims of human trafficking and sex workers," Cain said. "Listen to sex workers. We are here to help you."

A bill sponsored by

Republican Rep. Heather Fitzhagen would create a statewide council to focus on human trafficking and require massage parlor employees and hotel front desk and housekeeping staff be trained to recognize signs of human trafficking. A second bill sponsored by Republican Rep. Toby Overdorf would create a mandatory 10-day jail sentence for anyone convicted of soliciting a prostitute and an additional 30-day sentence if the person solicited is a human trafficking victim.

Both bills were approved.

Overdorf mentioned the investigation that snared Kraft and about 300 other men in arguing for his bill. He said he hopes his bill will reduce demand for paid sex.

"Mr. Kraft's unfortunate choices certainly have raised the awareness of what human trafficking is in the state of Florida and how prevalent it is throughout our entire society," Overdorf said after the meeting. "It's a scourge that's really affecting the state of Florida."

But Christine Hanavan of the

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Spain: FBI offered data stolen in North Korean Embassy raid

MADRID — Spain has issued at least two international arrest warrants for members of a self-proclaimed human rights group who allegedly led a mysterious raid at the North Korean Embassy in Madrid last month and offered the FBI stolen data from the break-in.

A National Court judge who lifted a secrecy order in the case Tuesday said an investigation of the Feb. 22 attack uncovered evidence that “a criminal organization” shackled and gagged embassy staff members before escaping with computers, hard drives and documents.

The intruders also urged North Korea’s only accredited diplomat in Spain, business envoy So Yun Sok, to defect, Judge Jose de la Mata said in a written report on the Spanish investigation. So refused to do so and was gagged, according to the report.

The assailants identified themselves as “members of an association or movement of human rights for the liberation of North Korea.”

That group is the Cheollima Civil Defense, according to a U.S. official who spoke on condition of anonymity to discuss details of the incident. The shadowy activists have the self-declared mission of helping defectors from North Korea.

De la Mata identified citizens of Mexico, the United States and South Korea as the main suspects being investigated on charges that include of causing injuries, making threats and burglary. He named Adrian Hong Chang, a Mexican citizen living in the United States, as the break-in’s leader.

Hong Chang flew to the U.S. on Feb. 23, got in touch with the FBI and offered to share material and videos with federal investigators, according to the court report. The document did not say what type of information the items contained or whether the FBI accepted the offer.

The FBI said in a statement that its standard practice is to neither confirm nor deny the existence of investigations. The agency added that “the FBI enjoys a strong working relationship with our Spanish law enforcement partners.”

An official with Spain’s National Police who wasn’t authorized to be named in media reports confirmed to The Associated Press that arrest warrants were issued for Hong Chang and one other suspect. No one had been charged as of Tuesday.

The assailants purchased knives and handgun mock-ups when they visited Madrid in early February and used them during the attack, according to the investigation document.

While in Madrid, Hong Chang also applied for a new passport at the Mexican Embassy, the investigation found, and used the name “Oswaldo Trump” to register in the Uber ride-hailing app.

The North Korean Embassy hasn’t pressed charges in Spain, and officials in Pyongyang haven’t officially commented on the attack.

Spanish police learned about the break-in after the wife of an embassy employee escaped by jumping from a window. When officers went to check on the situation, Hong Chang allegedly greeted them at the door and pretended to be a diplomatic official, the investigation found.

He sent the officers away with assurances everything was fine, paving the way for the invading group to make a getaway in the embassy’s cars.

A police investigator with knowledge of the case told the AP that “this attack, whatever it is, would have gone unnoticed if it wasn’t for the woman who escaped.”

The timing of the incident, which happened less than a week before a high-stakes U.S.-North Korea summit on denuclearization derailed in Hanoi on Feb. 28, led to speculation the incursion was carried out to obtain data related to North Korea’s former ambassador to Spain.

Kim Hyok Chol, who was expelled from Spain in September 2017 following Pyongyang’s sixth nuclear test and its missile launches over neighboring Japan, has become North Korea’s top nuclear negotiator with the U.S.

Asked if Washington had any connection to the embassy break-in, U.S. State Department spokesman Robert Palladino answered, “The United States government had nothing to do with this.”

Palladino said that “regarding the specifics of what’s going on, the Spanish authorities are investigating. The investigation is still underway. For any details on their investigation, I would have to refer you to Spanish authorities.”

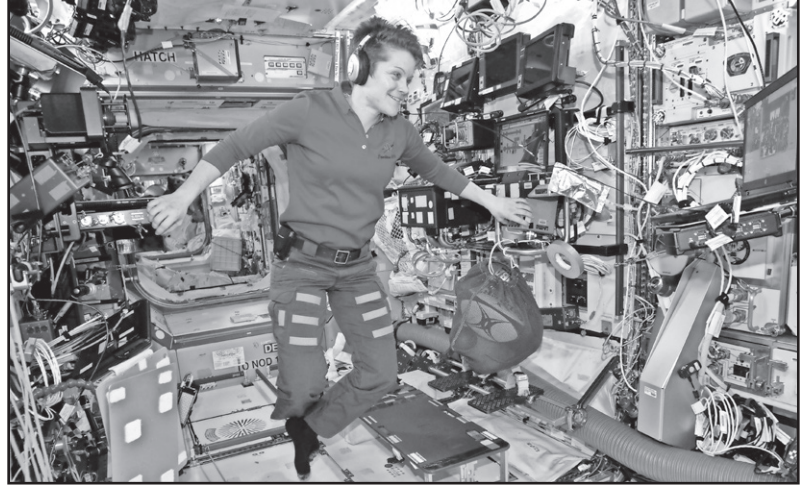
The South Korean Embassy in Madrid said it had no knowledge of the events and couldn’t offer further comment.

Others identified as part of the assailants’ group were Sam Ryu, from the U.S., and Woo Ran Lee, a South Korean citizen. Their whereabouts and their hometowns weren’t immediately known. None of the suspects were thought to be still in Spain, the judge wrote.

Spanish authorities tried to keep information about the attack from becoming public until Spain’s El Confidencial news site revealed some details on Feb. 27.

No medium sized suits caused problem

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — NASA has nixed the first all-female spacewalk over a spacesuit sizing issue.

Astronaut Anne McClain was supposed to float out of the International Space Station this Friday with newly arrived Christina Koch, to replace old batteries. But McClain pulled herself from the lineup because there’s not enough time to get two medium suits ready for them. Koch will go out with a male crewmate, Nick Hague.

NASA spokeswoman Brandi Dean said Tuesday that McClain trained before flight in both medium and large spacesuits. She wore a medium when

she went out on her first spacewalk last Friday and was supposed to switch to a large this week. But after last week’s spacewalk, she decided that a large would be too big.

It would have taken 12 hours to get another medium spacesuit ready and potentially compromised safety, according to Dean. These spacewalks are months late, and with cargo deliveries coming up, NASA wants to keep everything on track.

In 54 years of spacewalking, women have only gone outside with men. That’s because men have always outnumbered women in space.

McClain, Koch and Hague are part of NASA’s Astronaut Class of 2013, the only time there have

been the same number of women accepted as men. NASA chose four women and four men that year.

Koch and Hague will continue the battery-swapping work that McClain and Hague began last Friday outside the space station. Old nickel-hydrogen batteries in the solar power grid are being replaced with new, powerful lithium-ion batteries.

McClain will get another shot at spacewalking April 8 when she ventures outside with Canadian astronaut David Saint-Jacques. There are six U.S. spacesuit tops on the station — or hard upper torsos, as NASA calls them — with two considered spares. Both Hague and Saint-Jacques take large.

Southwest 737 Max makes emergency landing in Orlando

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — A Southwest Airlines Boeing 737 Max made a safe emergency landing Tuesday in Orlando, Florida, after experiencing an engine problem, the Federal Aviation Administration said.

The crew declared an emergency after taking off from Orlando International Airport around 2:50 p.m., and returned to the airport safely. No passengers were on board, and the aircraft was being ferried to Victorville, California, where Southwest is storing the airplanes.

The 737 Max was grounded in the U.S. March 13 after a deadly crash involving a Max in Ethiopia on March 10. It was the second fatal crash involving the airplane. U.S. airlines are allowed to shuttle the

planes but cannot carry passengers.

The FAA says it’s investigating but the emergency was not related to anti-stall software that is suspected as a cause of the two fatal crashes including one last year involving a plane from Indonesia.

Fennell says the airport’s other two runways remained open, and normal operations weren’t affected.

Southwest said the plane’s pilots reported a “performance issue” with an engine shortly after taking off for the California airport, where it was flying to be in short-term storage. The Max 8 jet was to be moved to Southwest’s Orlando maintenance facility to be checked, a company statement said.

Miami Beach police chase ends with woman dead, officer hurt

MIAMI BEACH (AP) — Authorities say a woman died in a crash that occurred as a Miami Beach police officer chased a stolen car.

Miami Beach spokesman Ernesto Rodriguez tells news outlets the patrol vehicle sheared the hood off the woman’s car late Monday. The woman wasn’t involved in the chase.

Rodriguez says the officer remains in stable condition with a head injury.

The incident began around 11 p.m. when a blue BMW was stolen while the owner was inside a store. Rodriguez says the officer spotted the stolen car a short time later. The driver didn’t stop and a chase started.

Rodriguez says the chase ended two blocks away when the officer crashed into the woman’s car. Other officers followed the BMW and the driver later rammed into two patrol vehicles and fled on foot.

Endangered Florida panther dies after being hit by car

IMMOKALEE (AP) — An endangered Florida panther has died after being struck by a vehicle.

It’s the fifth fatal collision this year, out of seven total panther deaths.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission says the remains of a 7-month-old male panther were found Sunday in Collier County, northwest of Immokalee.

Florida panthers once roamed the entire Southeast, but now their habitat mostly is confined to a small region of Florida along the Gulf of Mexico. Up to 230 Florida panthers remain in the wild.

Senate OKs bill for armed Florida teachers

TALLAHASSEE — Florida teachers who volunteer could be permitted to carry guns in classrooms so long as they undergo firearms training and a mental health evaluation under legislation approved Tuesday by a state Senate committee.

The Senate Infrastructure and Security Committee voted 5-3 for a broad school safety bill containing the armed teacher provision. Teachers would only be eligible for the so-called guardian program if their local school board approves and they meet the other criteria.

The bill is a reaction to the

February 2018 massacre that killed 17 people at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland. It also contains expanded student mental health services and sections regarding physical hardening of school campuses, but arming teachers is the most controversial provision.

The main sponsor, Republican Sen. Manny Diaz of Hialeah Gardens, said the Stoneman Douglas shooter might have been stopped with less loss of life if a trained teacher had been carrying a gun.

Like its House counterpart, the bill would require more than 100 hours of firearms training for teachers who seek to join the guardian program.

None would be required to take part and it would be up to local school boards to decide to whether to approve it. So far, 25 Florida school districts have guardian programs, put current law prohibits teachers whose sole focus is the classroom from joining.

“It remains optional. No teacher is obligated to do this. No district is obligated to do this,” Diaz said.

Opponents, including Democrats, many teacher groups and parent organizations, raised numerous objections centering on whether teachers should be transformed into essentially law enforcement personnel. They also worry about lost

weapons, how police would know an armed teacher isn’t an assailant in a chaotic mass shooting and whether a teacher might mistakenly shoot a child or fellow staff member.

The Republican-led committee voted down amendments to remove the armed teacher provision and another amendment that would have allowed parents to opt their children out of classrooms with gun-toting teachers.

The Senate and House versions are moving through committees and eventually will be set for a floor vote. A final compromise would have to be worked out before a final bill is ready to send to Republican Gov. Ron DeSantis.

Bills bans 2 of 3 forms of oil, gas fracking in Florida

TALLAHASSEE — Two forms of fracking for oil and natural gas exploration would be banned in Florida under a bill that cleared state House and Senate committees Tuesday, leaving in place a third technique opponents say would still threaten water supplies and the state’s fragile environment.

The House Appropriations subcommittee on agriculture and natural resources voted 10-2 for the bill, which would permit a rock-dissolving

technique called matrix acidizing but ban two other common forms of fracking. Later Tuesday, the Senate Innovation, Industry and Technology Committee voted 6-4 for a similar bill. Environmental groups call that a loophole, putting underground aquifers at risk of contamination from potentially dangerous chemicals. The petroleum industry also opposes the bill because it would halt use of other fracking techniques.

But legislators who voted in favor called the measure a major step forward in curbing

the practice in Florida.

The Senate version also leaves in place the matrix acidizing fracking procedure.

Only New York, Vermont and Maryland have enacted total bans on fracking, which uses high-pressure liquids to create cracks in underground rock, allowing pockets of oil and gas to flow freely.

Nationwide, fracking has been credited with dramatically increasing U.S. oil and natural gas production, with about two-thirds of the nation’s active wells using fracking techniques. Yet critics have long been concerned about

environmental issues, including a sharp increase of earthquakes in Oklahoma, possible water and air contamination and use of deep ground injection to dispose of waste.

In Florida, environmental groups say the state’s porous limestone rock makes fracking an even greater threat, particularly since most of the state’s drinking water comes from underground aquifers.

There have recently been five small earthquakes along the Florida-Alabama border where some oil and gas production takes place. Experts are unsure of the cause.

necessary to pull it off earlier. Pence warned that if NASA can't put astronauts on the moon by 2024, "we need to change the organization, not the mission." The space agency must transform into a leaner, more accountable and more agile organization, and must adopt an "all-hands-on-deck approach," he said. NASA Administrator Jim Bridenstine assured Pence that NASA will do everything possible to meet the deadline. Some outside experts were skeptical of the new timeline. "I will be astonished if this happens," said Jonathan McDowell of the Harvard-Smithsonian Center for Astrophysics in Cambridge, Massachusetts, noting that a lunar lander still needs to be designed, built and tested. "That is a hard challenge on a

five year time scale even without political budget infighting," he wrote in an email. This summer marks the 50th anniversary of the first manned moon landing. Since Apollo astronauts last walked on the moon in 1972, no country has made a serious attempt to send humans back to the lunar surface. For decades, NASA has flip-flopped between the moon and Mars, a victim of changing presidential administrations. More recently, President Barack Obama targeted Mars as astronauts' next big destination, while President Donald Trump has favored the moon. In order to get astronauts on the moon by 2024, Bridenstine said the space agency's new megarocket will be needed, but its development and pace will need to be faster. Two weeks ago, he said NASA was considering using private rockets instead to launch its new Orion capsule around the moon without a crew on a test flight next year.

Banks, technology companies power a rebound for US stocks

Stocks finished broadly higher on Wall Street Tuesday, erasing the market's modest losses from a day earlier. Financial, technology and health care stocks accounted for much of the rally. Banks got a boost from rising bond yields, which let them charge higher rates on loans. Energy companies led the S&P 500 higher as the price of U.S. crude oil moved briefly above \$60 a barrel. Oil hasn't closed above \$60 a barrel since November. Homebuilders slumped on new data showing the pace of newly started residential construction projects fell sharply last month. Even after losing some of its early strength, the broad upward

turn in stocks marked a reversal for the market, which started the week on a downbeat note after racking up losses last week. On Tuesday the yield on the benchmark 10-year Treasury note edged up to 2.42 percent from 2.41 percent late Monday. However, it's still below the yield on the three-month Treasury bill, which may see as a warning sign of a possible recession. The S&P 500 index gained 20.10 points, or 0.7 percent, to 2,818.46. The Dow Jones Industrial Average rose 140.90 points, or 0.6 percent, to 25,657.73. It briefly climbed 279 points. The Nasdaq composite added 53.98 points, or 0.7 percent, to 7,691.52. The Russell 2000 index of smaller company stocks picked up 15.30 points, or 1 percent, to 1,528.17.

Sex Worker Outreach Project told the committee that laws aimed at punishing men who seek out prostitutes don't work. "Criminalization is the root cause of trafficking. Prohibition did not end drinking and it can't end sex work. What it can do is make it more dangerous," said Hanavan, who isn't a sex worker but advocates for them. "Sex workers should be your best resource for fighting violence and exploitation in the sex industry. We need to stop

going after men who pay for sex and go after the men who think they can just take it." But despite the offers to help, Fitzenhagen said she wasn't interested. "In case it was lost on you, a consensual sex worker, a.k.a. a prostitute, is committing a crime," Fitzenhagen told the committee. "It is not my intent to work with them moving forward." After the meeting, Taylor said she isn't a prostitute, but rather dresses up to create a fantasy for her clients. "Professional dominatrix is not illegal," Taylor said.

Just 14 Republicans joined all voting Democrats in Tuesday's futile effort to void Trump's declaration of a national emergency at the Southwest border. By invoking that power, Trump has said he will shift \$3.6 billion from military construction to erecting barriers along that boundary. Congress has voted to provide less than \$1.4 billion for border barriers, leaving Democrats and some Republicans fuming that Trump

is abusing his powers by ignoring Congress' constitutional control over spending. Despite his veto remaining intact, Trump may not be able to spend the money for barriers quickly because of lawsuits by Democratic state attorneys general and others that could take years to resolve. Trump insisted during his campaign that Mexico, not taxpayers, would pay for the wall. To keep the issue alive into the 2020 campaign season, House Democrats may force fresh votes on the emergency declaration in six months, as the law allows.

felony counts related to making a false report that he was assaulted by two men. The actor insisted that he had "been truthful and consistent on every single level since day one." "I would not be my

mother's son if I was capable of one drop of what I was being accused of," he told reporters after a court hearing. He thanked the state of Illinois "for attempting to do what's right." In a statement, a spokeswoman for the Cook County prosecutors' office said the dismissal

came "after reviewing all of the facts and circumstances of the case." Tandra Simonton called it "a just disposition and appropriate resolution" but also said it not an exoneration. In some dropped cases, prosecutors will insist that the defendant accept at least a measure of responsibility. Outside

court, neither Smollett nor his legal team appeared to concede anything about his original report in January. Defense attorney Patricia Brown Holmes said Smollett was "attacked by two people he was unable to identify" and "was a victim who was vilified and made to appear as a perpetrator." Authorities alleged that Smollett, who is black and gay, knew the men and arranged for them to pretend to attack him. Emanuel, who is in his final weeks in office after two terms, said the hoax could endanger other gay people who report hate crimes.

Activity is essential for those who suffer 'a little arthritis'

DEAR DR. ROACH: I'm a 67-year-old black female who's been diagnosed with "a little arthritis" in my right hip. Now retired from a desk job, I unfortunately still am not getting enough exercise. My issue is that after sitting for a length of time, I'm in excruciating pain and can't stand up at all. Once I straighten up and get moving, the pain subsides. I've been told "you're getting old," but I'm not old! I'm about 30 pounds overweight. Also, when I stand for any length of time, my lower back aches. Would taking a morning walk and a yoga class alleviate this problem? I'm so embarrassed when I get out of my car or get up from the dinner table. — S.H.

ANSWER: There are many types of arthritis, and the answer to your question varies a bit depending on type. I think you probably have the most common form, osteoarthritis, so I'm going to answer you assuming that's the case.

Stiffness in the morning, quickly relieved by exercise, is a hallmark of osteoarthritis. It's common, treatable and not something to be embarrassed about.

Exercise is an effective treatment for osteoarthritis. It can be difficult to get started, but the more people exercise, the more they are able to do. Walking and yoga both are excellent ideas, but the best exercise is the one you will want to keep doing.

Osteoarthritis affects a fair number of 67-year-olds, but it's

important to remember that it's not your age that is causing the pain: It's the arthritis. Although we know of no treatments that can reverse the course of osteoarthritis, medications (including a few supplements), exercise and physical therapy all can ease symptoms and improve function. Losing weight takes stress off the joints and is recommended, but is not easy.

Finally, severe arthritis can be treated surgically, with a joint replacement. That's not a procedure to take lightly or have done too early.

DEAR DR. ROACH: In a recent column, you mentioned that your smartwatch warns you every hour to stand up. Is this a good idea? What else is it good for? — D.K.

ANSWER: The evidence that standing periodically has health benefits is fair. One study showed that when people did light intensity activity (such as walking)

for two minutes a day instead of sitting, premature death rates were reduced. Prolonged sitting is associated with heart disease, diabetes and overall cancer rates. The evidence isn't definitive, but it's suggestive enough that I do get up and walk around (when I can) when my watch reminds me that I've been sitting for a long time.

It's not 100 percent clear that exercise trackers like pedometers and more advanced devices, such as a smartwatch, increase activity for everyone. It clearly does motivate me. I think it's a personal decision that needs to be made based on whether you need more exercise (nearly everyone would benefit) and whether it would be motivating.

I will say that, for many people, the social aspects of it do get some people to exercise more than they would have otherwise. Some devices let you see your friends' activity and engage in friendly competition and support.

Husband has a child during separation with his wife

DEAR ABBY: My husband and I separated last year and reconciled several months later. When we decided to get back together, he broke it off with his girlfriend. A month later she contacted him to inform him that she's pregnant with his child. She's due in a few months.

My husband and I disagree about how things should be handled when the child arrives. She says I'm not allowed to come to the hospital with him and meet the baby. I say that going without me is absurd, and any child that belongs to my husband is a part of my life. Where should I draw the line with my husband? — Worried Wife in The South

DEAR WORRIED WIFE: Forgive me if this seems cynical, but is your husband ABSOLUTELY SURE that the baby is his? If he participates in raising him/her, then you are right, his child WILL become a part of your life. If he decides to do no more than write support checks, the impact on you will be much less.

If a paternity test hasn't proved he's the father of the baby, he should discuss this with a lawyer to insist there be one.

DEAR ABBY: When I was 19, I lost custody of my three children to the state. They were adopted out, and I have had no contact since. Over the years I tried to find them without success. Recently, I found their names and addresses using ancestry.com to search their birth records. My son, the oldest, is 18 now, but his sisters are only 15 and 16.

I want to write a letter to the adoptive mother, let her know my side of the story and offer to open a line of communication for her and the kids. Would that be selfish?

I'm now in my 30s and much wiser. — Heartbroken in Florida

DEAR HEARTBROKEN: The best way to accomplish what you have in mind would be to write to the mother and allow her to decide what to do with the information you give her.

Yarbrough excels in spring training finale

Rays close out with a 9-3 victory over the Detroit Tigers

ST. PETERSBURG — Ryan Yarbrough pitched four innings in his final spring training appearance, helping the Tampa Bay Rays close out their exhibition schedule with a 9-3 victory over the Detroit Tigers on Tuesday.

The 27-year-old left-hander led major league rookies with 16 victories last season, including a 14-4 record with a 3.72 ERA in 32 appearances out of the bullpen, where he thrived in a role of following “openers” who usually got the first three to six outs of a game.

Yarbrough was sidelined a portion of spring training by groin tightness, but said he feels he's where he needs to be heading into the regular season after allowing one run and five hits during a 58-pitch outing Tuesday at Tropicana Field.

“The feel has been there all spring, but I missed a little bit of time and then it's been about getting the innings up and getting ready for that first time out,” Yarbrough said. “I set myself up to be able to do that today where I got the four innings in, and now I can go five innings next time.”

Nate Lowe, Michael Perez and Carl Chester homered for the Rays, who also got big hits early from Kevin Kiermaier, Avisail Garcia and Tommy Pham while building a 4-0 lead against Tigers starter Matt Moore.

Moore, who walked one and struck out three over three innings, yielded three runs in the first and a RBI triple to Pham in the second.

“I'd obviously have liked to have had a better first inning,” Moore said. “But to be able to kind of calm it down in the second and third, I think, was the adjustment I was looking for.”

Yarbrough finished 16-6 with a 3.91 ERA over 38 appearances, including six starts last season. With the Rays entering 2019 with a three-man rotation of AL Cy Young winner Blake Snell, Charlie Morton

Lightning signs Jon Cooper to multiyear contract extension

Cooper is the franchise's winningest coach

TAMPA — Stanley Cup or not, Jon Cooper isn't going anywhere. The Lightning signed Cooper to a multi-year extension on Tuesday.

Cooper celebrated his 300th win and 500th game on Thursday in Carolina. He's the winningest coach in Lightning history and the longest-tenured in the NHL at six years and a day.

“I am very pleased to announce Jon's extension today,” Julien BriseBois said in a statement from the

Gerald McCoy's future with the Bucs seems very much in doubt

Coach Bruce Arians says he needs ‘to evaluate him’ and McCoy is ‘not as disruptive’ as he was four years ago

TAMPA — Bucs defensive tackle Gerald McCoy still is being evaluated by coach Bruce Arians, who said Tuesday that film study he has done on the six-time Pro Bowl player indicates he's not as disruptive as his \$13 million salary may require.

“Probably a better question for (general manager) Jason (Licht) because the financial is a big part of it,” Arians said when asked if McCoy would be with the Bucs in 2019. “I got to evaluate him. I mean, guys when they age, it's different.”

When asked what the film study has shown him about McCoy, Arians said. “He's not as disruptive as he was four years ago. But he's still pretty disruptive. He's still a good player.”

The Bucs are last in the NFL with only about \$2 million in salary cap space, which is not enough to sign their draft class.

McCoy, 31, had been working out in San Diego

UCF coach Johnny Dawkins refuses to blame refs for Duke loss

ORLANDO — As of Tuesday morning, Central Florida basketball coach Johnny Dawkins still couldn't bear to watch the tape of the heartbreaking, oh-so-close loss to top-seeded Duke in the second round of the NCAA Tournament, but he still refused to blame the defeat on some questionable officiating non-calls at the end of the game.

Many UCF fans and neutral observers

thought there were two or three non-calls that went Duke's way at the end of the game that could have been the difference in UCF winning and losing — specifically when Duke phenom Zion Williamson missed a free-throw attempt with 14 seconds left as UCF's Aubrey Dawkins attempted to box out Blue Devils freshman RJ Barrett. Replays show that Barrett pushed Dawkins in the back before retrieving the offensive rebound and scoring on the game-winning layup.

When asked about the play after the game, Aubrey Dawkins said, “I thought I got pushed in the back a little bit, but I don't know. It happened so fast, but I could have sworn I got pushed in the back. Refs make calls sometimes and they miss calls; that's life. Unfortunately for us they didn't see anything, but a great play by him (Barrett) to mind the presence of him to pursue the ball.”

Said Johnny Dawkins on our Open Mike radio show Tuesday morning: “You know me, we're

a no-excuse program. No excuses. We had our opportunities. ... That play doesn't decide the game for us. We had opportunities, we just did not make enough plays down the stretch. It had nothing to do with a play like that. To beat a team of that caliber; I always use boxing analogies with our team: I always tell our guys, you're not going to out-point the champs; you have to knock champions out. We were close. I thought we had them on the ropes, but we just couldn't knock them out.

“They showed who they were. They showed their character. Look, they have a once-in-a-generation player in Zion Williamson. Some of the plays he made put them in that position. Give them credit. He made plays, quite frankly, that I haven't seen a college basketball player make in a long time.”

Here are some other tidbits from the Dawkins interview Tuesday: — On how agonizingly close his son Aubrey's last-second tip came from going in and giving UCF a victory for the

ages: “Literally I just watched that play over again about five minutes before calling in to your show. I hadn't wanted to see it and I haven't watched any of the game, but I got curious about what happened on that last play. We got the look we wanted. We got B.J. (Taylor) where we wanted him on the floor — to his sweet spot — and got the shot he loves. Aubrey came in and made a great play and tip at the end. And it hung on the rim

Venice bats explode for 15 runs in mercy-rule win

Indians open up IMG National Classic in the winner's bracket, play again today

Exhibiting a powerful offensive performance, the Venice Indians' opening game in the IMG National Classic on Tuesday afternoon couldn't have gone much better.

"I always focus on the right-center gap and hitting the inside of the ball," said Corn, explaining his game-ending hit. "I was looking fastball.

With a man on third, I really just wanted to drive it up the middle and get the run home."

After Corn's first-inning knock, two more walks led to an RBI when Jack Curcio was hit by a pitch. Rockymore then cleared the loaded bags with a triple. Sam Ottman, hitting ninth, became the sixth Venice hitter to reach base on a free pass (four walks, two hit-by-pitch.) Guscette, drove in

The left-hander isn't ruling out a relief appearance during the season's opening weekend

MESA, Ariz. — David Price is set to be the No. 5 starter in the Boston Red Sox rotation, but the left-hander isn't ruling out a relief appearance during the season's opening weekend.

Price pitched four innings Tuesday in Boston's final exhibition game, a 16-7 loss to the Chicago Cubs, then said he's interested in pitching an inning or two during a season-opening series at Seattle that begins Thursday.

The 33-year-old Price was slowed this spring because of a norovirus, and Tuesday was his first game since March 12. Boston decided to slot Chris Sale, Nathan Eovaldi, Eduardo Rodriguez and Rick Porcello ahead of him in the rotation, with an eye

on potentially getting Price some work during one of the first two regular season games.

"I don't know if he wants a tune-up, but we could do a cool thing in game one or two in Seattle just to get his feet wet," manager Alex Cora said.

"It's just another rep," Price said. "It's just getting out there in a real game, one that counts. You can kind of do things a little differently than in spring training. To get out there in a real game, it makes everything a little more natural."

Last year, Price totaled 12 innings in three spring games, then went 16-7 with a 3.58 ERA over 30 starts. Despite the virus, Price said he feels better physically than a year ago.

"I didn't get as many reps as I got last year in spring training but

physically I feel it's one of the strongest I've felt heading into opening day," he said.

Price retired the first two batters in the Chicago fourth before Kyle Schwarber homered. Mark Zagunis tripled and scored on Addison Russell's double before Price was pulled.

"He was good," Cora said of Price. "Good stuff, good velocity, good location. He got his work in and now we go."

D-backs outfielder Souza out for season with knee injury

Former Ray will require season-ending surgery to repair multiple tears

PHOENIX — Arizona Diamondbacks outfielder Steven Souza Jr. will require season-ending knee surgery to repair multiple tears in his left knee after being injured Monday night.

Souza slipped on home plate and his left leg jammed into the ground during an exhibition against the Chicago White Sox. The Diamondbacks said Tuesday he has a torn ACL, a torn lateral collateral ligament, a partial tear of his left posterior cruciate

ligament, and a tear of his posterior lateral capsule.

"A really unfortunate situation for us and for him," manager Torey Lovullo said. "We hurt for him right now."

Souza, the expected starter in right field, will have the surgery when the tissue settles down, Lovullo said.

It is the second straight spring in which Souza has been injured. He tore his right pectoral muscle last year and missed about eight weeks of the regular season.

Souza hit .220 with five homers and 29 RBIs

in 72 games with the Diamondbacks last season and was being counted on to add offense to a team that lost free agents Paul Goldschmidt and A.J. Pollock to free agency.

Souza hit .239 with 30 homers, 78 RBIs and 16 stolen bases for Tampa Bay in 2017 before being acquired by Arizona in a three-team trade that sent Brandon Drury to the Yankees and four minor leaguers to the Rays.

Free agent acquisition Adam Jones will take over in right field and Ketel Marte will spend most of

his time in center field, Lovullo said, with David Peralta remaining in in left field. Jarrod Dyson is the primary outfield reserve.

"We have some depth," Lovullo said. "Some guys are going to get some opportunities to step in and get a number of at-bats."

Infielder Ildemaro Vargas was added to the roster after being optioned to Triple-A Reno earlier in the week. Outfielder Socrates Brito, who could have filled the gap, was placed on waivers earlier in the week.

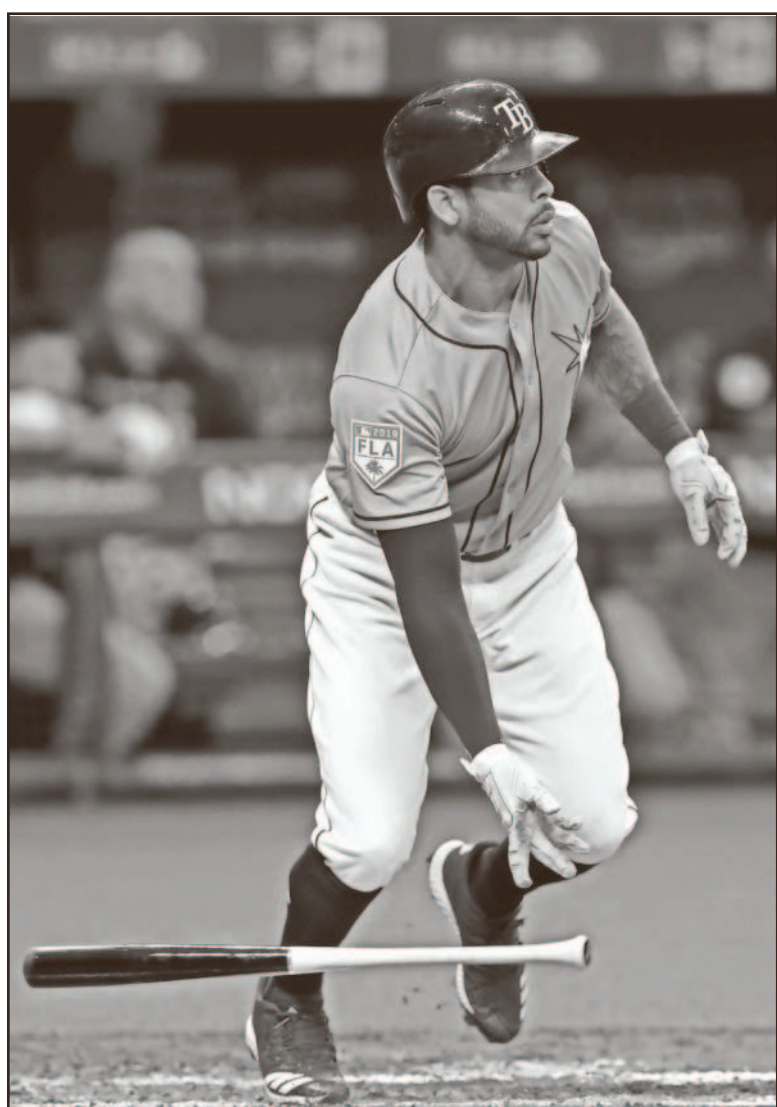

with trainer Todd Durkin. The Bucs offseason workout program begins April 1 and they will have a voluntary minicamp just prior to the NFL draft later next month.

McCoy had only six sacks last season but led the Bucs with 21 quarterback hits. However, none of McCoy's \$13 million salary for 2019 is guaranteed, meaning by trading or releasing him, the team would have no dead money absorbed on their salary cap.

"Usually they're at the age when they get paid the most and the production don't match," Arians said. "So we've got to find that out."

"It's very hard because we can't get in pads, but you can still see it. And you still see his enthusiasm for the game. If he still has all that I'm fine. As a coach, I coach who I got. If guys don't show up, don't ask me about them because I talk about the guys that show up. Hopefully we'll see how that goes."

When asked if McCoy's status still is up in the air, Arians said, "Everybody's is. It's a what-have-you-done-for-me-lately business. It's hard. It's cold. That's it. What are you going to do for me now? We've got to find that out."

The Bucs don't have many options with McCoy. They can attempt to trade him sometime during or after the draft, but teams may not want to take on his salary. They can release him, adding \$13 million to their salary cap. Or McCoy could retire, something he has shown no intention of doing.

and hung on the rim; and you're thinking it's going in; and it just rolls out. I don't know how it didn't go. But that's the nature of the sport. It's about inches and we just missed it by a few inches."

— On whether Aubrey has decided to come back for his senior season: "We have not sat down and discussed that at all. Right now, we're still recovering from a

hard-fought battle. I'm sure at some point in time over the next few weeks we'll sit down and try to figure out where he is, but now is not the time."

— On his emotional post-game speech in which he told his sobbing players, "We've always said it's going to end one of two ways when you invest like we've invested. It's going to end celebrating or it's going to end crying. It's going to end in tears. We end in tears. That's because we

invested so much in each other." Asked how hard it was for him to keep his composure in that heart-wrenching moment, Coach Dawkins replied: "It was difficult. I had even extra emotions because that was my mentor and my coach and my friend. (Duke coach Mike Krzyzewski). Like I said in the speech, that's what happens when you invest in each other throughout a season like that; when everybody makes sacrifices to get to that point. You

don't get there without sacrificing and everyone sacrificed. That's why I think you saw the overall outpouring of emotions."

— On whether he's privately broken down into tears in two days since the game: "I've had a few tough moments and you're to relive this for a while, but the thing I've learned from these experiences is that it passes and you'll remember fondly all the things that you did to get there and the amazing moments you shared

with your team. It's difficult right now; it's difficult for all of us; but our guys will get stronger from this experience and so will I."

— On the long, emotional embrace he shared with Coach K after the game: "I know there was a lot of excitement around the game, but for me and I that was a no-win situation for both of us. You could tell how difficult it was for him and for me. It's just tough. Even reliving it now is tough."

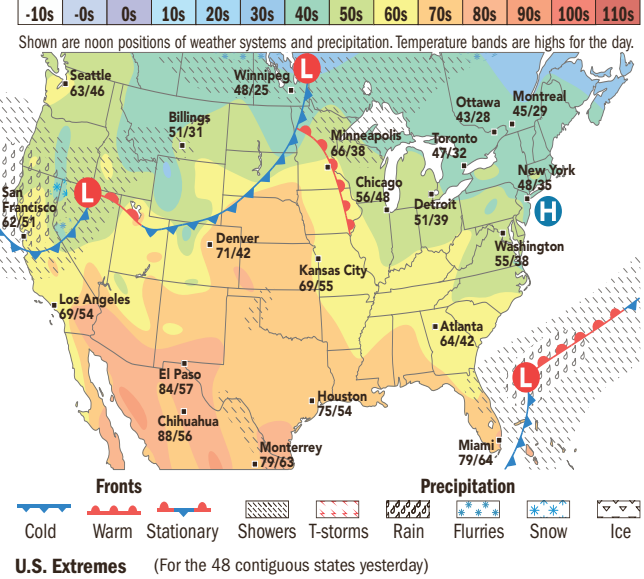

Conor McGregor announces retirement on social media

Superstar UFC fighter brings remarkable fighting career to abrupt end

LOS ANGELES — UFC superstar Conor McGregor announced his retirement on social media Monday night, abruptly ending his remarkable fighting career.

belts in two divisions simultaneously. His only fight in 2017 was a loss to boxer Floyd Mayweather in the richest fight in boxing history.

hours before he announced his retirement, McGregor appeared on "The Tonight Show Starring Jimmy Fallon" in New York and claimed he was negotiating for a probable fight in July at UFC 239 in Las Vegas.

McGregor has quit his sport before. He announced his retirement on Twitter in April 2016 during a dispute with the UFC about the promotion of his next proposed bout.

to occupy his time. In April 2018, McGregor was charged with assault and criminal mischief after he attacked a bus carrying UFC fighters outside Barclays Arena in Brooklyn.

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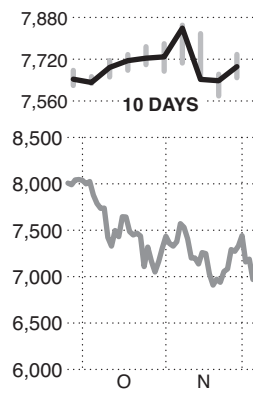
