

## State union rep seeks support for Senate budget

SEBRING — A state teachers union representative advised The School Board of Highlands County to make a concerted effort to support the Senate budget, which will boost funding that can help in attracting and retaining quality teachers.

At Tuesday's School Board meeting, Florida Education Association (state teachers union) area representative Jim Demchak said the Senate's proposed

substitute teachers for two, three or four years in a row. It is a major concern. The House school budget is much

budget provides a 10% increase in per-student funding, which will make a real difference in the funding for Highlands County.

The state will be short 10,000 teachers for the next school year, he said. Nobody is tracking how many students have had

lower than the Senate's, Demchak said. Last year there was a great difference between the House and Senate budgets, and the House budget won and only provided an increase of 47 cents per student.

"If the house wins over again this year, you are going to be looking at trouble raising salaries to attract quality teachers or keeping teachers," he said.

Charlotte County has already settled their teachers union contract for next year with a starting teacher's salary of \$45,000, Demchak said.

"You are not going to lose people from here to Charlotte County, but for somebody coming into Florida who has a choice of which county they should go to, a \$6,000 swing is a major thing," he said, referring to the higher starting salary in Charlotte compared to Highlands.

Sen. Ben Albritton, R-Wauchula, may be a swing vote for the district, Demchak said. He recommended contacting Albritton, by email, text or

## Deadline near for citrus insurance

### Growers without might not get help

SEBRING — Reimbursements for citrus trees, damaged by Hurricane Irma, will require growers to jump through another hoop this month.

Current applicants, or those who intend on applying for the Florida Citrus Recovery Block Grant Program will need to purchase federal crop insurance for the 2020 growing season — next year's season — before April 15.

If they don't, they won't qualify for the grant.

That deadline holds true even if they haven't received funds yet from the grant, according to information on the grant program.

That's the gist of information provided this month to local growers by the Highlands County Citrus Growers Association about the program.

Growers will have to purchase tree and/

### Drug Free Highlands expanding, rebranding to reflect bigger role

SEBRING — Drug Free Highlands may get a new name soon, to go with its expanded role.

"We consider ourselves a prevention hub," Aisha Alayande said on Thursday, shortly before the monthly Greater Sebring Chamber of Commerce networking luncheon, where Alayande spoke about Drug Free Highlands and plans to rebrand the nonprofit group.

She said the organization, its board and the community will revisit the organization's mission statement in May, perhaps to come up with a new name.

"We're moving to where our community needs us to be," Alayande said.

Her hope is for Drug Free Highlands to solidify its role as a prevention hub, helping to organize efforts that deal with substance abuse directly, as well as attack the root causes of abuse,

from as early as prenatal care. "People do not just come out of the womb wanting to abuse substances," Alayande said.

She said a poison called "Adverse

Childhood Experiences" does this: Trauma experienced at a young age that shapes a child's perceptions, sense of safety and mental well-being.

## Probation violation lands fake contractor back in jail

SEBRING — A violation of probation has landed Eugene Lonnie Johnson Jr., 44, of Sebring, back in the Highlands County Jail without bond.

Sheriff's deputies arrested Johnson on Monday; he is facing charges of impersonating a contractor during a state

whom she knew, in October

of emergency, and withholding support from a child or spouse.

Arrest records show that after Hurricane Irma caused damage to Sondra Trent's house, she sought out Johnson,

2017. She knew he was in construction and assumed he was a licensed contractor, according to authorities. The victim received funds from her insurance company for repairs. Johnson began the work on her Sebring home.

After about two weeks Trent found out Johnson was not a licensed contractor. Johnson brought licensed contractor,

Junior Malcom, of Ironshore Construction in to finish the job, reports state. Malcolm gave Trent a written estimate for the future work.

The arrest report said Trent advised she had already paid Johnson in cash and had him sign in her financial ledger as proof she paid him. Johnson bought materials for her with cash and she had the receipts

to prove it.

Trent gave the men notice by certified mail that they had 90 days to finish the work and be done. Trent told investigators the men wanted more money before finishing the job.

The investigation continued and on Feb. 25, 2018, Trent showed authorities around

## Sad, but not surprising

Congress has landed on one of those rare ideas that commands support from both Democrats and Republicans. Unfortunately, it's a bad one.

On Tuesday, the House approved legislation misleadingly titled the Taxpayer First Act that includes a provision prohibiting the Internal Revenue Service from developing a free online system that most American households could use to file their taxes. The Senate is considering a similar piece of bipartisan legislation.

This makes no sense. Congress should be making it easier for Americans to file their taxes. Instead of barring the I.R.S. from making April a little less miserable, why isn't Congress requiring the I.R.S. to create a free tax filing website?

Better yet, the United States could emulate the roughly three dozen countries, including Chile, Japan and Britain, where most taxpayers do not need to fill out tax returns. In some of those countries, the accuracy of tax withholding is sufficient to obviate the annual filing process. In others, the government sends out completed forms to most taxpayers. In Estonia, filing taxes can be done in less than three minutes.

The federal government collects enough information about most American households to mail out a completed tax form that people would simply need to verify, sign and return. President Ronald Reagan proposed a version of just such a system. In 1998, Congress passed a law instructing the I.R.S. to develop such a system by 2008. President Barack Obama endorsed the concept during the 2008 presidential campaign. It still hasn't happened.

The explanation is sad but not surprising. The most vocal opponent of simplicity is Intuit, the maker of TurboTax, which has spent millions of dollars lobbying against efforts to reduce demand for its services. The company draws support from conservatives worried that making it easier to file taxes would make it easier to raise taxes.

Intuit and its allies, including proponents of the legislation, say that it's cheaper and better for the government to let private companies run the system. But companies have little incentive to advertise the availability of free filing or to make the system easy to use. Indeed, they have every reason to steer people away from the free products. That is how they make money.

As a result, the government is saving taxpayer money at the expense of those taxpayers.

Members of Congress pay lip service to ideas like filing taxes on a postcard, but they continue to perpetuate the current system of mass April immiseration by preventing the most obvious and effective way to simplify tax collection.

#### Washington was not a Republican

While difficult to stomach, I can generally abide the alternative lens in which certain readers choose to view the current president. What I can not abide is blatantly incorrect information.

This can easily be verified at the Washington Library at Mount Vernon ([mount-vernion.org/library/digitalhistory/digital-encyclopedia/article/cherry-tree-myth/](http://mount-vernion.org/library/digitalhistory/digital-encyclopedia/article/cherry-tree-myth/)). phone call, to ask the legislator to support the Senate budget because the 10% increase would make a big difference in Highlands County.

There is a statewide petition with 40,000-plus signatures seeking the full 10% increase in funding for each student, he said.

"I ask you to get on board, get on Sen.

Albritton and let's make this a grassroots coalition of all the stakeholders for our kids," Demchak said.

The subject of teacher recruitment and retention came up during the discussion on the proposed new director of safety and security.

School Board Vice Chair Donna Howerton said she is "struggling" with Deputy Superintendent Andrew Lethbridge overseeing the Human Resources

Department while doing his duties as deputy superintendent.

There should be a review at the manager position in Human Resources and adding monies there to help in recruitment and retention, she said.

"My granddaughter is going through her third teacher in one subject this year," Howerton said. "We are struggling in our recruitment and retention."

or fruit insurance for either two or four years at a time, according to information from the program, and they have to pay premiums for at least 60 percent coverage.

Growers can get covered for:

- Part 1 covers 20% loss or more, if they have tree insurance.

- Part 2 covers 40% loss or more, if they have crop (fruit) insurance.

It took until April 2018 for the U.S. Department of Agriculture to announce it would start implementing a federal aid program to help Florida growers and other farmers hurt in the 2017 hurricanes and wildfires.

Ray Royce, executive director of the Citrus Growers Association, has described it as a combined aid effort for hurricane-hit areas of Florida, Texas, and Puerto Rico, as well as wildfire-hit areas of California and other disaster-hit states.

The program would provide up to \$2.36 billion in disaster payments from the federal government and also had a \$340 million block grant program available to help Florida citrus farmers hurt by Irma.

Irma dropped trees and fruit all over Southwest Florida and ruined the first good crop growers expected to have in years. Statewide damage was 421,000 acres of citrus fruit and trees — \$760 million worth — according to the Florida Department of Agriculture and

Consumer Services.

The block grant program would help growers all over the state plant new trees, rehabilitate groves, replace irrigation or other equipment and make up for losses in the 2018-2020 growing seasons.

There are still some eligibility requirements, though. All applicants must show that they are still producing citrus and harvesting at the time of application.

For example, those growers who had damaged groves, but who pushed them out, left them fallow or sold the groves, can't show that they are still producing in those groves and cannot count those groves as eligible for grant payments, according to a list of frequently asked questions about the grant.

A producer might still be eligible after pushing over a grove if he or she is staying in business and replanted in the same county.

Producers with groves in several counties can apply through one USDA Farm Service Agency office, just as long as they use separate applications for each county.

They also have to have owned a grove at the time it was damaged. If they bought an Irma-damaged grove, they're not eligible.

Tree age also matters. Trees in existence at the time of Irma are eligible under Part 1, as long as all the mature fruit-bearing trees had a 20% loss or more.

Trees ages 3-5 may be eligible for Part 2, if they had 40% loss or more.

The program also

covers repairs for such things as citrus grove screens, to manage citrus greening by controlling/preventing infection by the Asian citrus psyllid, the insect that carries the bacteria that causes citrus greening.

The same is true for labor costs incurred by producers to clean up or repair groves, as long as that labor was documented via an invoice to the producer.

In general, the information sheet states, receipts and other proof of purchase is needed to make any request for reimbursement.

Meanwhile, Florida citrus is making slow gains in production.

The News Service of Florida has reported estimated citrus production, according to the USDA, fell about 0.6% in the latest monthly forecast, while the amount of grapefruit being produced fell by 9% from March to April.

The Florida Department of Citrus describes this latest forecast as a "slight" change.

Shannon Shepp, the department's executive director, said in a prepared statement, that "it's still a great year, but we are anxious for better."

The forecast is for 76.5 million 90-pound boxes of oranges, and 4.9 million boxes of grapefruit.

Projections of specialty citrus such as tangelos and tangerines, at 1.2 million boxes in October, now stand at 950,000 boxes — same as March.

her home and showed them the work that was done and the work that remained. The detective took pictures for evidence. He noted on the report there were many unfinished repairs.

Supplies were left in the home and Johnson had allegedly deserted the job. The investigator took pictures of receipts. The victim's son also gave a sworn statement that supported his mother's.

The son said Johnson told his mother Malcolm was needed on the job as he only had a certain type of license and Malcolm had a general contractor's license.

Johnson allegedly told the victim that he pays Malcolm to use his license. Malcolm began calling and texting the woman demanding more money, the arrest report states. The victim told Malcolm she had already paid Johnson and she was not going to shell out any more money.

Malcolm sent Trent's insurance company an invoice for the work. The insurance company paid the bill but it was made out to Trent and not Malcolm. Trent used the new check to buy supplies for the repairs so her two sons could try to do the repairs.

The investigator notated many of the repairs scheduled needed to have permits pulled on them.

The investigator said he went to the Highlands County Building Department where he found out the last permit for the victim's home was pulled over a decade earlier, in 2003.

The Division of Business and Professional Regulation was consulted and the investigator found out Johnson did not have a license but Malcolm did and his business was also registered.

On June 25, 2018, a detective set up a photograph line up where she picked out Malcolm and Johnson. Detectives tried multiple times to contact the suspects by phone and in person with no luck.

Finally, on Aug. 8, 2018, Malcolm denied letting Johnson use his

license and he would drive where he resided in Broward County to come to Highlands County to make a statement. Malcolm said Johnson never worked for him and he was only trying to help Trent out.

On Sept. 6, 2018, contact was made with Johnson by phone. The entire conversation is redacted from the arrest report.

The report says as of Sept. 18, 2018, there was a warrant affidavit for Malcolm's arrest.

Johnson has many court cases in the Highlands County Clerk of Courts website going back to 1993; the charges range from traffic violations and drug charges to domestic abuse.

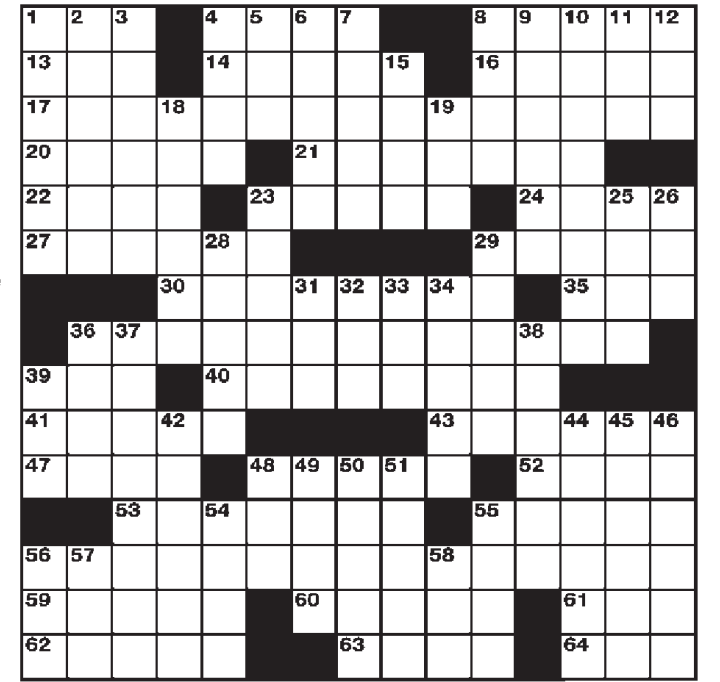

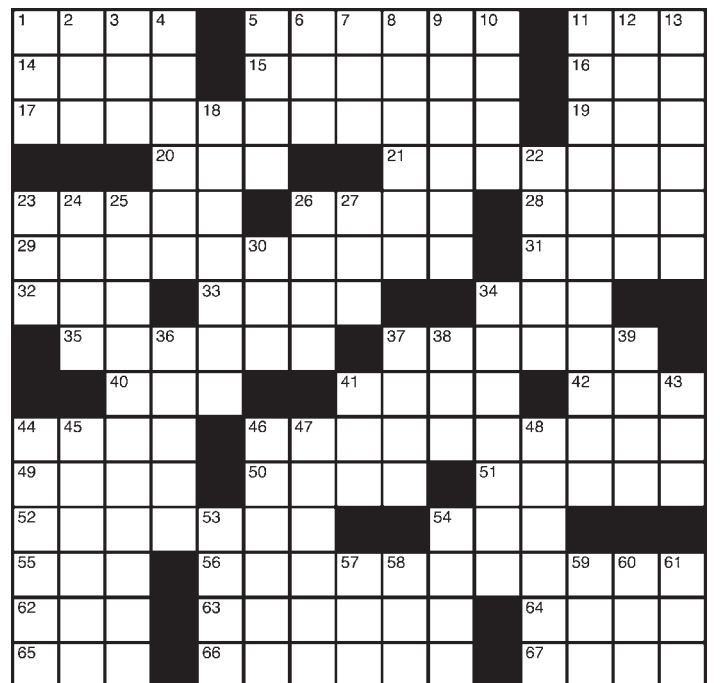

During Thursday's presentation, Alayande cued up a TedTalk video on YouTube.com by Nadine Burke Harris, a pediatrician who explains in the video that repeated stress of abuse, neglect and struggling parents, with mental health and/or substance abuse, can have tangible effects on a child's brain development.

Those who've experienced high levels of trauma are at triple the risk for heart disease and lung cancer, Harris explains, pleading with the audience and with pediatric medicine to work to prevent and treat trauma.

Chamber members were unable to see the entire video, however. A glitch with either a laptop or internet bandwidth stopped it and stuck it in a buffer mode.

Undaunted, but apologetic, Alayande continued to explain how Drug Free Highlands wants to coordinate community partners to combat this problem and others.

With her on Thursday, Alayande had Lindsey Kelly, Healthy Start care coordinator for Drug Free Highlands, who works out of the organization's offices at 223 Pomegranate Ave. in Sebring, on the block behind the Nancesowee Hotel.

She also had representatives from iMAD, a program with the Heartland Rural Health Network that stands for "I make a difference." The program teaches middle school students that they can make a difference in their lives through informed choices.

**Drug Free Highlands is undergoing an expansion, said Executive Director Aisha Alayande, here at Thursday's Sebring Area Chamber of Commerce monthly networking lunch. The organization will go through rebranding and revise its mission statement to reflect how it has expanded from drug abuse prevention to treating the root causes of substance abuse.**

Highlands Coalition met Wednesday morning and discussed several ways to coordinate efforts. Courtney Green, director of Adult Education and Technical Dual Enrollment at South Florida State College, spoke with the group about attracting more students to finish their high school diplomas, or learn English, in an effort to make members of the community more employable and reduce financial stress on local families.

Alayande said she also met with the Sebring Ministerial Association at noon Wednesday, where she and local pastors talked about ways to "minister to ministers" who are doing their best to counsel people in the aftermath of the SunTrust bank shooting in January, followed shortly after that by the suicide of a deputy sheriff.

Alayande said Rev. William J. Trucano, chaplain with the Highlands County Sheriff's Office, talked about training for a faith leaders workshop each year that would give insights into

understanding suicide and offer means of prevention, intervention and support to survivors.

There is also training on how to counsel people who need emotional and spiritual care in the aftermath of a disaster, Alayande said, whether that's a hurricane or a shooting.

With a strategic response to a crisis, she said, ministers and other trained personnel could provide spiritual and psychological first aid for both youth and adults.

They have planned a workshop on this subject, Alayande said, for 9 a.m. Wednesday, May 8 at the Jack Stroup Civic Center in Sebring.

Alayande said Drug Free Highlands is also looking at ways to reach out to the LGBTQ community and any other sub-communities who have felt marginalized before now.

On May 10, for example, she said Drug Free Highlands will have personnel from the Polk County Health Department to do "rapid testing" for HIV.

"I am pretty excited about signing this scholarship," said Dylan Branch. "I have been waiting

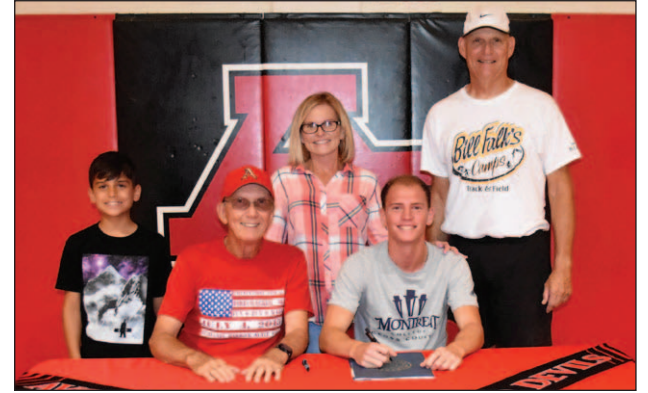

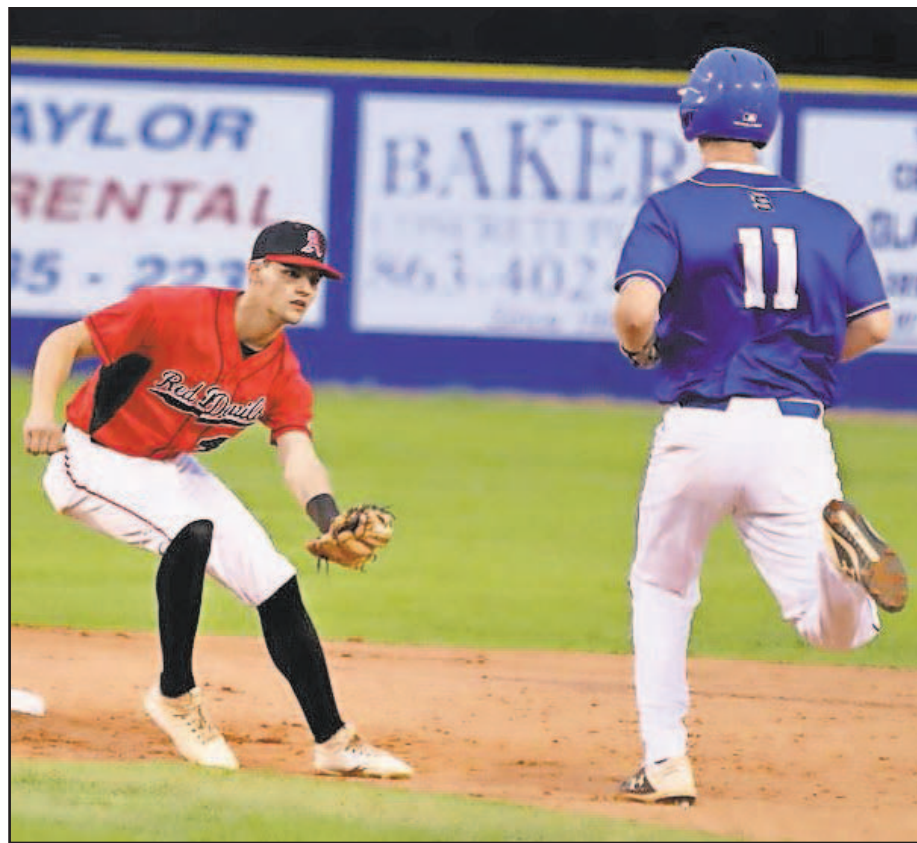

As the years went on, the program grew and became a part of a larger initiative as a partnership was formed with EAA Chapter 1240, The School Board of Highlands County, Sebring Regional Airport, and Career Source Heartland to promote youth aviation education.

Each partner had an individual agenda, but all had a common goal. The School Board wanted to expand the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) programs, EAA Chapter 1240 wanted to involve more youth and families in aviation activities, Career Source Heartland wanted to help develop workplace skills in our youth, and the Sebring Regional Airport wanted to encourage more of the community to come out and see developing activity at the airport.

The growing partnership was recognized as a "best practice" bringing a community together to promote youth aviation education. It led to resources to build the EAA Chapter 1240 Aviation Development Center (ADC), flight training scholarship support, and the adoption of the Aircraft Owners and Pilot Association High School Aviation Education Curriculum. We have come a long way from those first classes at Lake Placid High School.

The program is now taking another big step forward pending School Board approval. The Ray Foundation of Naples, Florida has provided a matching grant to expand the ADC and bring the School District Aviation / Aerospace classes to the ADC next school year in August. There will be two classes, Aviation / Aerospace I and II. Each class will also have a

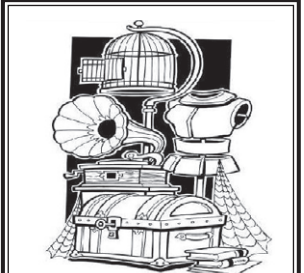

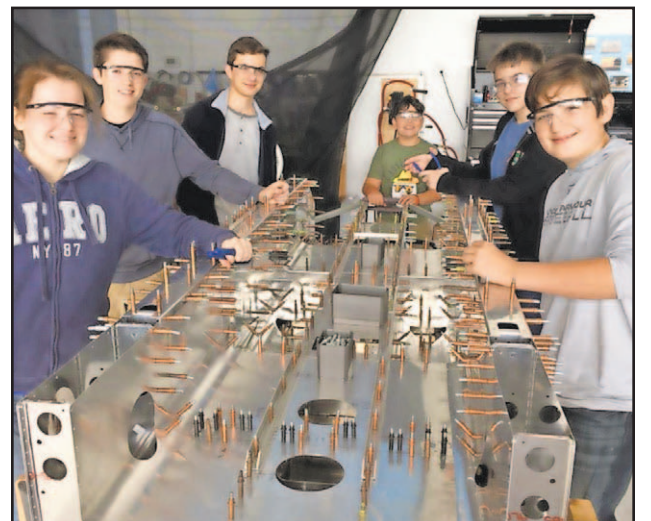
assignments on their Chromebooks.

Why make the effort to move the classes to the airport? The simple answer is the "it is where the action is". You can teach aviation concepts in a classroom anywhere, but to be able to be involved in building an aircraft, fly in one, and see and hear the operations of an airport adds a dimension like no other. It is immersion. There are other resources at the airport the students will explore. There are aircraft manufacturing, airframe and powerplant repair, propeller manufacturing, general airport operations, and Tecnam, the worlds largest manufacturer of piston powered aircraft, has their North American headquarters here at the

airport.

Looking back through the years, many of our students began their Aviation and Aerospace careers with our classes. Many, even though they did not directly go into aviation careers, found the technology and work skill development of the classes extremely helpful as they found their career path. Aviation and Aerospace are targeted industries in our area and there are significant shortages in the labor pool. We are creating "Options and Opportunities" for our youth through Aviation and Aerospace Education.

candidates shared their research on diverse topics, such as how differing student views on morality affect how they relate to environmental issues or how lessons that build empathy are being used in Africa to reduce human-animal conflicts with elephants. Her students also gave other presentations throughout the day. For example, Natalie Cooper and Gabby Salavar (former National Geographic Young Explorer) presented together on photography and education,

say-ing, "Today, almost everyone has a camera in their pocket. How can we harness this technology to engage audiences in environmental learning?"

The location of the LEEF event pointed to the importance of partnerships between school districts and natural areas. Silver River Museum and Environmental Education Center is located within the Silver Springs State Park, but is run by Marion County Public Schools. This was particularly relevant Angell, who felt it reaffirmed Archbold's relationship with the Highlands County School District, saying, "Our elementary

school students benefit from a district-wide relationship with Archbold Biological Station, which supplies free field trips to all the schools as well as a pre-visit curriculum."

Reflecting on the conference and its theme, Angell says, "The beautiful thing about environmental education is that it is grounded, literally grounded, in the Earth and its ecosystems. At Archbold, as elsewhere, we will continue to explore the use of new technologies and ideas, but we will always be rooted in nature and our cultural heritage. It is the best of both worlds. We can teach

our students how to appreciate the woods in their backyard, while also connecting them to worldwide issues through technology."

Archbold Biological Station's mission is "to build and share the scientific knowledge needed to protect the life, lands, and waters of the heart of Florida." It is located 8 miles south of Lake Placid at 123 Main Drive, Venus, FL 33960. The entrance is 1.8 miles south of SR 70 on Old SR 8 (CR17).

## Assange hauled from embassy WikiLeaks founder faces extradition to US

LONDON — British police on Thursday hauled a bearded and shouting Julian Assange from the Ecuadorian Embassy where he was holed up for nearly seven years, and the U.S. charged the WikiLeaks founder with conspiring with former Army intelligence analyst Chelsea Manning to get their hands on government secrets.

Police arrested Assange after the South American nation revoked the political asylum that had protected him in the embassy, and he was brought before a British court — the first step in an extradition battle that he has vowed to fight.

Ecuador's President Lenin Moreno said he decided to evict the 47-year-old Assange from the embassy after "repeated violations to international conventions and daily-life protocols," and he later lashed out at him during a speech in Quito, calling the Australian native a "spoiled brat"

who treated his hosts with disrespect.

In Washington, the U.S. Justice Department accused Assange of conspiring with Manning to break into a classified government computer at the Pentagon. The charge was announced after Assange was taken into custody.

Assange took refuge in the embassy in 2012 after he was released on bail in Britain while facing extradition to Sweden on sexual assault allegations that have since been dropped. He refused to leave the embassy, fearing arrest and extradition to the U.S. for publishing classified military and diplomatic cables through WikiLeaks.

Manning, who served several years in prison for leaking troves of classified documents before her sentence was commuted by then-President Barack Obama, is again in custody in Alexandria, Virginia, for refusing to testify before a grand jury investigating

## Space: The final (genetic) frontier

### Unique study of twin astronauts is helping scientists uncover how the body responds to long space travel

From his eyes to his immune system, astronaut Scott Kelly's body sometimes reacted strangely to nearly a year in orbit, at least compared to his Earth-bound identical twin — but newly published research shows nothing that would cancel even longer space treks, like

to Mars.

The good news: Kelly largely bounced back after returning home, say scientists who released final results from NASA's "twins study," a never-before opportunity to track the biological consequences of spaceflight in genetic doubles.

It marks "the dawn of human genomics in space," said Dr. Andrew

Feinberg of Johns Hopkins University. He led one of 10 teams of researchers that scrutinized the twins' health down to the molecular level before, during and after Kelly's 340-day stay at the International Space Station.

More importantly, the study "represents more than one small step for mankind" by pointing out potential risks of

longer-duration spaceflight that need study in more astronauts, said Markus Lobrich of Germany's Darmstadt University and Penny Jeggo of the University of Sussex, who weren't involved in the work.

The findings were published in the journal Science.

## Ex-Obama White House counsel charged with lying in lobbying probe

WASHINGTON — Former Obama White House counsel Greg Craig was indicted Thursday on charges of making false statements and concealing information in a federal foreign lobbying investigation that intersected with the Russia probe.

Craig, 74, was charged in a two-count indictment that accuses him of willfully concealing material facts from the Justice Department about work he performed for the Ukrainian government. The indictment, announced by the U.S. attorney for the District of Columbia, came a day after Craig's lawyers said he expected to be charged in the probe spun off from special counsel Robert Mueller's investigation.

In a statement, his attorneys, William Taylor and William Murphy, said, "Mr. Craig is not guilty of any charge and the government's stubborn insistence on prosecuting Mr. Craig is a misguided abuse of prosecutorial discretion." The lawyers said the Justice Department's national security division pushed to indict Craig despite federal

# Prosecutors paint Avenatti as con man, he says claim 'bogus'

LOS ANGELES — Federal prosecutors painted a picture of attorney Michael Avenatti on Thursday as a scheming operator who stole millions of dollars from clients, cheated on his taxes, lied to investigators and tried to hide money from debtors in bankruptcy proceedings.

A 36-count indictment returned late Wednesday in U.S. District Court in Santa Ana, California, offered the most damning and detailed account to date of Avenatti's apparent fall from grace a year after he seized the spotlight while crusading for porn actress Stormy Daniels in her legal battles against President Donald Trump.

Avenatti embezzled settlement funds and

proceeds from other matters he handled from five clients and doled out small portions of what they were due to "lull" them into thinking they were getting what they were owed, prosecutors said.

"Money generated from one set of crimes was used to further other crimes," U.S. Attorney Nick Hanna

told reporters. "Typically in the form of payments designed to string along victims so as to prevent Mr. Avenatti's financial house of cards from collapsing."

Avenatti denied the charges on Twitter, saying he had made powerful enemies and would plead not guilty and fight the case.

"I look forward to the entire truth being known as opposed to a one-sided version meant to sideline me," he tweeted.

The new charges do not include a New York extortion case alleging Avenatti demanded millions to stay quiet about claims he planned to reveal about Nike paying high school players.

Avenatti, 48, was arrested March 25 in New York on the Nike charge and federal prosecutors at the time announced he also faced single counts of wire and bank fraud in Southern California, where he lives and practices law.

The 61-page Southern California indictment details charges that carry a potential prison sentence of 335 years, prosecutors said. Even if convicted of all counts, such a term is highly unlikely.

### Stocks struggle to a mixed finish after early rally sputters

The major U.S. stock indexes closed unevenly Thursday after an early rally gave way to a mostly sideways day of trading on Wall Street.

Losses in health care stocks mostly offset gains in industrial companies, banks and elsewhere in the market. Insurers UnitedHealth Group and Anthem led the sector's slide. Technology stocks also fell.

The listless day of trading came as investors looked ahead to Friday, when major banks, including Wells Fargo and JPMorgan Chase, are due to report their first-quarter results.

The S&P 500 index eked out a tiny gain, adding 0.11 points, or less than 0.1 percent, to 2,888.32.

The Dow Jones Industrial Average fell 14.11 points, or 0.1 percent, to 26,143.05. The Nasdaq composite slid 16.88 points, or 0.2 percent, to 7,947.36.

### Senators on Trump Space Force plan: Not so fast

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Trump administration's proposal for creating a Space Force as a new military service drew bipartisan skepticism in the Senate on Thursday, with several lawmakers questioning the need for expanding the military bureaucracy.

Acting Defense Secretary Patrick Shanahan pitched the proposal as vital to maintaining what he called America's "margin of dominance" in space as potential adversaries like Russia and China develop the capability to challenge U.S. use of space.

Committee members agreed that the U.S. needs to innovate in space and move more quickly to improve defenses of U.S. satellites and other interests in space. But several members, both Republicans and Democrats, expressed skepticism about a Space Force, which is a high priority of President Donald Trump.

## Florida House passes bill on Canadian drug imports access

TALLAHASSEE — Floridians could eventually gain access to cheaper Canadian prescription drugs under legislation passed Thursday by the state House, a top priority of Republican Gov. Ron DeSantis.

The GOP-led House voted 93-22 on Thursday for the measure, which if finalized creates a prescription drug importation program that would have to be approved by the federal Food and Drug Administration. A similar bill is moving in the state Senate and the two versions must be reconciled to win final passage.

"The United States pays more for prescription drugs than anywhere else in the world," DeSantis said in a statement. "In Florida, we can change that by employing safe, common sense solutions such as importing FDA approved prescription drugs from Canada."

The chief sponsor, Republican Rep. Tom Leek of Daytona Beach, said the measure would give Floridians an opportunity to pay less for vital prescription drugs. U.S.

consumers pay some of the highest prescription drug prices in the world, as much as 30% to 190% more than other Western countries, according to a legislative staff analysis.

The U.S. spends about \$333 billion annually on prescription drugs, or about \$10,739 per person, according to the analysis.

"We have an opportunity today to give Floridians a fighting chance," Leek said. "I hope you can support them."

Leek said imported drugs would have to meet strict FDA standards and has noted that 80 percent of drug ingredients used in the U.S. are foreign-made now. The House bill goes further than the Senate version in opening the door to potentially importing drugs from other countries besides Canada.

Opponents warn of risky counterfeit, contaminated, or ineffective drugs and that the program could prove costly to oversee and regulate. A number of medical groups and the pharmaceutical industry are among the leading opponents.

Democratic Rep. Al Jacquet of Tallahassee urged lawmakers to

slow down.

"The concept of making sure medication is cheaper is a good one. We have to tailor it in a way that is responsible. We're not ready for this yet," he said. "It's not the time to be going this big, or this far."

There are also questions about whether Canada would permit its lower-cost drugs to be sold in the U.S. in the first place and how much a new regulatory framework for foreign drugs might cost Florida taxpayers.

The bill would actually create two programs: one for state-funded entities such as Medicaid and the prison system and another in which the imported drugs would be sold directly to consumers through pharmacies. The second program faces more federal government hurdles in order to become law.

But supporters such as Republican Rep. Ralph Massullo of Beverly Hills, who is a physician, said the proposal is a chance worth taking.

"Why wouldn't we do it?" he said. "This is a good start and I'm hoping other states will follow our lead."

## Florida bill expanding armed teacher program goes to Senate

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Florida senators agree a school safety bill has a lot of good provisions but are divided on one issue: expanding a program that allows teachers to carry guns.

The Senate Appropriations Committee narrowly approved a bill to make several changes to a

school safety law enacted after 17 people were fatally shot at a Parkland high school. It now goes to the full Senate.

Senators opposing the bill praised many aspects of it, including enhanced threat assessment requirements. But making all teachers eligible for a voluntary program to carry guns was a sticking

point for several committee members.

School districts would have to approve arming teachers, and teachers would have to undergo training and psychiatric evaluation. Current law only allows teachers to participate in the program if they have a role outside the classroom, such as an athletic coach.

### Authorities hope Disney band helps catch burglar

WINTER PARK (AP) — Authorities in Florida are hoping Buzz Lightyear can help catch a burglar.

The Winter Park Police Department on Thursday posted a video showing a man who they say stole a Walt Disney World MagicBand during a residential burglary. MagicBands are all-in-one wristbands that allow users to enter theme parks, open their hotel room doors and charge food and merchandise at the theme park resort.

They also track where a person has been at Disney World. Images in a police video show the suspect firing a toy

weapon at the Buzz Lightyear's Space Ranger Spin ride at Disney World.

On the agency's Twitter account, Winter Park detectives ask the public to call them if they recognize the man whose face was captured by cameras at the ride.

### Judge holds deputy in contempt over inmate's shoes

FORT LAUDERDALE (AP) — Officials say a dispute over a defendant's shoes led to a judge ordering a detention sergeant to be handcuffed and briefly charged with contempt of court.

The Miami Herald reports Broward Circuit Judge Michael Usan called murder case

defendant Richard Walker to testify Wednesday in his courtroom.

The sergeant told the judge Walker's shoes, which his lawyer had brought for the court appearance, weren't checked and approved by sheriff's officials.

Usan insisted that Walker testify. The sergeant resisted, citing security rules. The judge said the sergeant was in contempt and ordered another deputy to handcuff her.

Broward Sheriff Gregory Tony says the deputy was following procedure and that properly vetting an inmate's attire is not done in a courtroom.

The matter was resolved when Tony spoke to the chief judge.

## Sudan's military overthrows president amid bloody protests

CAIRO — Sudan's military overthrew President Omar al-Bashir on Thursday after months of bloody protests over his repressive 30-year rule. But pro-democracy demonstrators vowed to keep up their campaign in the streets after the military said it would govern the country for the next two years.

Al-Bashir's fall came a week after Algeria's long-ruling, military-backed president, Abdelaziz Bouteflika, was driven from power. Together, the developments echoed the Arab Spring uprisings eight years ago that brought down autocrats across the Mideast.

The announcement of the arrest and removal of the 75-year-old al-Bashir was made by a veteran insider in his government, Defense Minister Awad Mohammed Ibn Ouf, who is under U.S. sanctions for links to atrocities in Sudan's Darfur conflict.

Ibn Ouf said a military council that will be formed by the army, intelligence agencies and security apparatus will rule for two years, after which "free and fair

elections" will take place.

He also announced that the military had suspended the constitution, dissolved the government, declared a state of emergency for three months, closed the country's borders and airspace and imposed a curfew starting Thursday night.

Protesters who were initially jubilant over word of the coup reacted by saying they will not end their nearly week-long sit-in outside the military's headquarters in central Khartoum until a civilian transition government

is formed.

Well after nightfall, tens of thousands beat drums, sang and chanted slogans against the armed forces and Ibn Ouf.

"The first one fell, the second will, too!" they shouted. And: "They removed a thief and brought in a thief!"

"What is happening in Sudan is that the old system is being rebuilt in new clothes," said one activist, Mohammed Hisham. "I'm 30 years old and my whole life we have suffered from lack of freedom and continuous threats."

## UK's May says politicians have duty to complete Brexit

LONDON — Granted a Brexit reprieve by the European Union, British Prime Minister Theresa May urged lawmakers Thursday to pause, reflect on the need for compromise — and then fulfill their "national duty" to approve a divorce deal and take Britain out of the EU.

But there is little sign the U.K.'s divided and exhausted lawmakers will heed the EU's plea not to waste the six months of extra time granted to Britain at an emergency summit in Brussels.

Updating the House of Commons hours after the 27 other EU leaders agreed to postpone Brexit until Oct. 31, May said she knew the country was "intensely frustrated" by the impasse.

"I never wanted to seek this extension," May said. She urged members of Parliament to take stock and "reflect" over a 10-day Easter break that starts Friday.

"We need to resolve this, so that we can leave the European

Union with a deal as soon as possible," she said. "This is our national duty as elected members of this House."

Consensus, however, was in short supply.

Opposition Labour Party leader Jeremy Corbyn, with whom May hopes to strike a compromise accord, called the Brexit delay "another milestone in the government's mishandling of the entire Brexit process."

"The prime minister stuck rigidly to a flawed plan and now the clock has run down, leaving Britain in limbo," Corbyn said.

And there was little solace for May on her own side of the House of Commons, as pro-Brexit lawmakers from her Conservative Party accused her of capitulating to Brussels.

Brexit Conservative legislator Peter Bone said May had once vowed that she would not keep the U.K. in the EU past June 30.

"So I expect her to say when she's leaving in the next few days and then the announcement of a Conservative leadership contest," he said.



# 'I know nothing' — Trump changes his tune on WikiLeaks

WASHINGTON — It was a far cry from "I love WikiLeaks!"

President Donald Trump declared on Thursday that "I know nothing about WikiLeaks" after its disheveled founder Julian Assange was hauled out of the Ecuadorian Embassy in London to face charges, a stark contrast to how candidate Trump showered praise on Assange's hacking organization night after night during the final weeks of the 2016 presidential campaign.

Asked about Thursday's arrest, Trump said at the White House, "It's not my thing. I know there is something having to do with Julian Assange. I've been seeing what's happened with Assange and that will be a determination, I would imagine, mostly by the attorney general, who's doing an excellent job. So, he'll be making a determination. I know nothing really about him."

"It's not my deal in life."

But WikiLeaks was Trump's deal in 2016 as

he welcomed the political boost his campaign got and cheered on the release of Clinton campaign emails.

On the same October day that the "Access Hollywood" tape emerged, revealing that Trump had bragged in 2005 about groping women, WikiLeaks began releasing damaging emails from Hillary Clinton's campaign manager, John Podesta. Trump and his allies, facing a tough battle in the campaign's final month, seized on the illegal dumps and weaponized them.

"WikiLeaks, I love WikiLeaks," Trump said in Pennsylvania.

"This WikiLeaks is like a treasure trove," Trump said in Michigan.

"Boy, I love reading WikiLeaks," Trump said in Ohio.

All told, Trump extolled WikiLeaks more than 100 times, and a poster of Assange hung backstage at the Republican's debate war room. At no point from a rally stage did Trump express any misgivings about how WikiLeaks obtained the emails from the Clinton campaign or about the accusations of stealing sensitive U.S. government information, which led to the charges against Assange on Thursday.

# Going beyond Barr, Trump claims 'illegal spying' on campaign

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump seemed gratified Thursday that his attorney general has endorsed a key talking point of the president's supporters: that there was spying on Trump's 2016 campaign. But Trump went a step beyond Attorney General William Barr, accusing the government of committing an illegal, unprecedented act.

The president's comments came a day after Barr testified at a congressional hearing that he believes "spying did occur" on the campaign, suggesting the origins of the Russia investigation that shadowed Trump's presidency for nearly two years may have been mishandled.

Barr provided no details about what "spying" may have taken place but appeared to be alluding to a surveillance warrant the FBI obtained on a former Trump associate. He later said during the hearing that he wasn't sure there had been improper surveillance and wants to ensure all proper procedures were followed.

"I think what he said was absolutely true. There was absolutely spying into my campaign," Trump said Thursday. "I'll go a step further. It was my opinion it was illegal spying, unprecedented spying, and something that should never be allowed to happen in our country again."

During Wednesday's hearing before a Senate appropriations subcommittee, Barr said he was "not saying improper surveillance occurred" and was looking into the matter.

Barr may have been referring to a surveillance warrant the FBI obtained in the fall of 2016 to monitor the communications of former Trump campaign aide Carter Page, who has not been charged with any wrongdoing. The warrant was obtained after Page had left the campaign and was renewed several times. Critics of the Russia investigation have seized on the fact that the warrant application cited Democratic-funded opposition research, done by a former British spy, into the Trump campaign's ties to Russia.

WikiLeaks. Manning's legal team said the indictment against Assange showed prosecutors didn't need her testimony and called for her to be released, saying her continued detention would be "purely punitive."

Over the years, Assange used Ecuador's embassy as a platform to keep his name before the public, frequently making appearances on its tiny balcony, posing for pictures and reading statements. Even his cat became famous.

But his presence was an embarrassment to U.K. authorities, who for years kept a police presence around the clock outside the embassy, costing taxpayers millions in police overtime. Such surveillance was removed in 2015, but the embassy

remained a focal point for his activities.

Video posted online by Ruptly, a news service of Russia Today, showed several men in suits pulling a handcuffed Assange out of the embassy and loading him into a police van while uniformed British police formed a passageway. Assange, who shouted and gestured as he was removed, sported a full beard and slicked-back gray hair.

He later appeared in Westminster Magistrates' Court, where District Judge Michael Snow wasted no time in finding him guilty of breaching his bail conditions, flatly rejecting his assertion that he had not had a fair hearing and a reasonable excuse for not appearing.

"Mr. Assange's behavior is that of a narcissist who cannot get beyond his own selfish interests," Snow said. "He hasn't come close to establishing

'reasonable excuse.'"

Assange waved to the packed public gallery as he was taken to the cells. His next appearance was set for May 2 via prison video-link in relation to the extradition case.

Assange's attorney, Jennifer Robinson, said he will fight any extradition to the U.S.

"This sets a dangerous precedent for all journalist and media organizations in Europe and around the world," she said. "This precedent means that any journalist can be extradited for prosecution in the United States for having published truthful information about the United States."

Assange has been under U.S. Justice Department scrutiny for years for WikiLeaks' role in publishing government secrets. He was an important figure in special counsel Robert Mueller's Russia probe as

investigators examined how WikiLeaks obtained emails that were stolen from Hillary Clinton's presidential campaign and Democratic groups.

WikiLeaks quickly drew attention to U.S. interest in Assange and said that Ecuador had illegally terminated Assange's political asylum "in violation of international law." "Powerful actors, including CIA, are engaged in a sophisticated effort to de-humanise, de-legitimize and imprison him," the group said in a tweet over a photo of Assange's smiling face.

But Ecuadorian officials suggested that Assange's own behavior was to blame.

Interior Minister Maria Paula Romo said Assange's mental and physical health worsened while he was holed up, and he began to act aggressively toward his hosts, including smearing

feces on the walls of the embassy.

In a fiery speech in Ecuador, Moreno called him an ungrateful and "miserable hacker" who treated embassy officials poorly.

"When you're given shelter, cared for and provided food, you don't denounce the owner of the house," Moreno said to applause at an event outside Quito.

"From now on we'll be more careful in giving asylum to people who are really worth it and not miserable hackers whose only goal is to destabilize governments," he added. "We are tolerant, calm people, but we're not stupid."

Other Ecuadorian officials in Quito accused supporters of WikiLeaks and two Russian hackers of trying to destabilize the country as the standoff with Assange intensified recently.

### Key findings

NASA already knew some of the toll of space travel, such as bone loss that requires exercise to counter. This time, NASA-funded scientists looked for a gamut of physiologic and genomic changes that Scott Kelly experienced in space, comparing them to his DNA double on the ground, former astronaut Mark Kelly. Some results had been reported in February.

Possibly the weirdest finding had to do with something called telomeres, the protective ends of chromosomes. Those tips gradually shorten as we get older, and are thought to be

linked to age-related diseases including some cancers.

But in space, Scott Kelly's telomeres got longer. "We were surprised," said Colorado State University telomere expert Susan Bailey. She can't explain it although it doesn't mean Kelly got younger. Back on Earth, his telomeres mostly returned to preflight average although he did have more short telomeres than before.

Next, Kelly's DNA wasn't mutated in space but the activity of many of his genes — how they switch on and off — did change, especially in the last half of the voyage, which ended in March 2016.

Immune system genes especially were affected, putting it "almost on high alert as a way to try and understand this new

environment," said study co-author Christopher Mason, a Weill Cornell Medicine geneticist in New York.

Again, most gene expression returned to normal back home, but some of the immune-related genes were hyperactive six months later.

Other findings:

- Some changes in the structure of Kelly's eye and thickening of his retina suggested that, like about 40 percent of astronauts, he experienced symptoms of "spaceflight-associated neuro-ocular syndrome." It may be caused by fluids shifting in the absence of gravity.

- He experienced some chromosomal instability that might reflect radiation exposure in space.

- A flu shot given in space worked as well as

one on Earth.

- Kelly aced cognitive tests in space but slowed down after his return, maybe as more things competed for his attention.

### Ultra long-distance testing

Researchers needed months' worth of blood, urine and fecal samples, along with cognitive and physical tests and ultrasound scans. That meant getting creative: Some blood samples required analysis so rapidly that Kelly would time collection so the blood could travel on Russian Soyuz capsules carrying other astronauts back to Earth.

That wouldn't be an option on a three-year trip to Mars. One of the study's technological advances: Portable

DNA-sequencing equipment that will let astronauts run some of their own genomic analyses on future missions, said Weill Cornell's Mason.

### What's next?

Studying one pair of twins can't prove risks of spaceflight, researchers cautioned. And longer missions, to the moon or Mars, will mean greater stress and radiation exposure.

Colorado State's Bailey plans to study 10 additional astronauts on year-long missions, using the twin findings as a road map.

"We need to get outside of low-Earth orbit and we need for the astronauts to spend longer periods of time to really evaluate some of these health effects," she said.

prosecutors in New York declining to bring charges, an assertion that couldn't immediately be verified. A spokesman for the U.S. attorney's office declined to comment.

Craig's indictment is part of a Justice Department crackdown on unregistered foreign

lobbying and consulting. Federal prosecutors in New York have been investigating two prominent Washington lobbying firms in a similar probe, and Justice Department officials in Washington have been increasingly willing to prosecute people who they believe intentionally conceal their lobbying work from the government.

The scrutiny of Craig stems from an investigation of former Trump campaign chairman Paul Manafort and his work on behalf of a pro-Russian political party in Ukraine. The charges come about three months after Craig's former law firm agreed to pay more than \$4.6 million and publicly acknowledge that it failed to register with the government for its work

for Ukraine.

The civil settlement with Skadden, Arps, Slate, Meagher & Flom LLP laid much of the blame for the firm's conduct on Craig, who was a senior partner.

Craig, who is set to appear in federal court Friday, is a prominent Washington attorney and was the first White House counsel to former President Barack Obama.

In private practice, his clients have included former North Carolina Sen. John Edwards and James Cartwright, the former vice chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, who was charged in a leaks investigation. He also led President Bill Clinton's White House legal team during his impeachment proceedings and defended Clinton during his Senate trial.

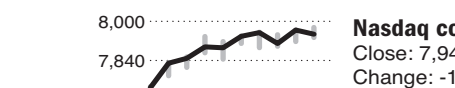

# Quest to get off PPIs leads reader to a different diagnosis

**DEAR DR. ROACH:** I read your recent article on proton pump inhibitors, and I wanted to chime in about my own quest to get off the medications. Over 20 years ago, I was diagnosed with a hiatal hernia and placed on a PPI because of heartburn symptoms. I followed all of the rules: nothing to eat for several hours before bed, avoid trigger foods and beverages, etc. Nothing helped except for the PPI.

Recent reports of too many risks from taking PPIs led me to a doctor who determined that I have achalasia, not a hiatal hernia. He sent me to a local, nationally known surgeon who explained that the muscle at the top of my stomach was not opening and closing properly, resulting in food being trapped in my esophagus. The end result is enlargement of the esophagus. Left untreated, the esophagus becomes so large that no food can be passed into the stomach and the esophagus would need to be removed.

Surgery was my only option, and that has been completed.

Three weeks after my surgery I am a new person. No more heartburn. The surgeon said achalasia is fairly rare but can have major consequences if left untreated. I wanted to share my story so people don't assume they have the run-of-the-mill heartburn and self-medicate. Find the cause to prevent major issues later in life. — K.L.

**ANSWER:** I appreciate your taking the time to write. Achalasia is a disease of the nerves of the esophagus, which prevents the muscles from performing the coordinated movement needed

to swallow. Achalasia is uncommon and diagnosed most often in young adulthood to middle age. Dysphagia, the sensation that food is not being swallowed properly, is more suspicious for achalasia than for GERD.

Achalasia may be treated with botulinum toxin injections, or may be done endoscopically or surgically. The most appropriate treatment depends on a person's exact circumstances.

I certainly agree that there are times to do a more thorough evaluation for the cause of heartburn. People with symptoms that don't get better with a PPI, those with vomiting, and those who don't want to take long-term PPIs should see an ear, nose and throat specialist. This is both to make sure of the diagnosis as well as to discuss other treatments for GERD.

**DEAR DR. ROACH:** I have thinning hair. I bought a laser cap, which I have been wearing for six minutes a day for three months. I have started to get headaches every morning. I stopped wearing

the cap, as I was concerned it was the cause of the headaches. Do you know if this laser cap has side effects? — M.K.

**ANSWER:** I tried to find evidence that laser hats are effective, but could find no research showing effectiveness, nor any reliable evidence on side effects. The device was cleared by the Food and Drug Administration as being "substantially equivalent" to a laser comb device, which was shown to have promise in promoting hair growth. One manufacturer of a low-level laser hat device claims there are no known side effects. Hearing this always concerns me, since even placebo medicines frequently cause side effects.

I think it is unlikely that the low-level light will damage your skin, and it is certainly not enough to penetrate so deep that it could cause damage to your skull or brain. An independent review of one laser light comb found no serious adverse effects, but about 1.3 percent of people using the laser comb noted scalp tenderness.

**Dear Heloise:** We travel with two young children who get bored if they don't have a few toys to play with. However, our car looks so messy, with toys



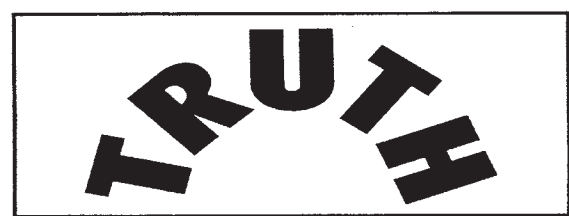

Koepka, a winner in two of the last three majors, ran off four straight birdies in the middle of the back nine by overpowering a soft course. DeChambeau came within inches of two hole-outs over the last three holes as he closed with four straight birdies.

They each had a 6-under 66, giving them a one-shot lead over the 49-year-old Mickelson, who provided his own brand of entertainment.

Mickelson began the back nine with shots into the pine trees and the water, only to follow with four birdies over the next five holes, including a tee shot on the par-3 16th that

## Cooper will need to do more if Tampa Bay is to advance

After loss to Columbus in first game of first round, pressure will be on coach to turn momentum around

BRANDON — He deserves to win the award for NHL coach of the year. He deserved the contract extension he received during this Lightning season of seasons. Coach Jon Cooper earned all that.

Now he has to earn it again.

The sky isn't falling. It has fallen, hard, on Tampa Bay's 62-win wonder boys and their wonder coach, a 1-0 hole after an epic Game 1 gag and fold.

And the coach has to figure it all out before Game 2 on Friday night.

That's the job. Cooper's reaction Thursday brimmed with neither mea cuplas nor a smidge of panic. He thoroughly downplayed

matching wits with his Columbus counterpart.

"The last time I looked, I wasn't taking the opening draw," Cooper said. "And I didn't see Torts out there, either. Coaches coach, players play. It's been like that for 120 years."

No, Cooper couldn't score for Nikita Kucherov and Steven Stamkos, who came up empty in Game 1, just like last playoffs, when Washington showed the Lightning the door. Same goes for Brayden Point.

No, Cooper couldn't keep Victor Hedman and Ryan McDonagh, the team's best defensemen, from making mistakes that led to Columbus goals or stop pucks for Andrei Vasilevskiy, who wasn't bad, but has to be better. Cooper couldn't chip pucks out or win

battles on the boards.

But he's the coach.

It's his job.

It's his job to get more out of his team, coach, coax, convince. He might have to juggle lines or matchups for Game 2, though that didn't seem to be the problem. Mostly he has to reboot his players' mindset. Toward that end, Cooper kept them off the ice Thursday. Decompression seemed to be a priority.

Cooper has always considered himself more of a "people manager" than an X's and O's guy. But he has won a hundred more NHL games he has lost and earlier this season found himself the longest-tenured coach in the league. That is not an accident. Cooper is good at what he does. And now he has

to be just a little better.

He lived Game 1 right along with his team.

Accentuate the positive, discount the negative. The Cooper way.

"We're Round 1, Game 2," he said. "The one thing about this group is they have rallied around each other and, as you've said, self-corrected themselves. Let's be honest. This wasn't a full 60 minutes. It was a little spurt that cost us. We'd have self-corrected that, we're probably not having this conversation right now, but we didn't. It's time to move on."

Last year, I began to wonder if then-Capitals coach Barry Trotz was schooling Cooper. But does that mean Trotz was schooled by

## Marner's 2 goals push Leafs past Bruins

BOSTON (AP) — Mitch Marner scored twice, the second on a short-handed penalty shot to give Toronto the lead for good, and the Maple Leafs beat the Boston Bruins 4-1 on Thursday night in the opener of their first-round playoff series.

It was Toronto's first postseason penalty shot in 20 years.

Frederik Andersen made 37 saves and William Nylander and John Tavares also scored for Toronto, which swiped the home-ice advantage in the best-of-seven series as it tries to advance through Boston for the first time in six tries.

Game 2 is Saturday night.

Tuukka Rask stopped 29 shots for Boston, and Patrice Bergeron scored a power-play goal midway through the first on a pass from Brad Marchand. But Marner tied it with about three minutes left in the period, sweeping in a rebound with such force he knocked himself off his skates.

Then, about three minutes into the second and Boston on a power play, the puck popped toward center ice and Marner had a clear path to the goal. When he was just outside the

crease, Jake DeBrusk was called for bringing him down from behind, and sending him crashing into Rask.

Marner lined up for the penalty shot, came at Rask from the left side and then slid over to the right faster than the goalie could follow. He flipped the puck into the open net to make it 2-1.

Nazem Kadri sent Nylander off on a breakaway to make it 3-1 with 95 seconds left in the period. Rask came up with a pair of saves in the final minute to keep things from getting out of control, stopping Tavares on a breakaway with 38 seconds left and then a 3-on-1 at the horn.

Boston pulled the goalie with 2:35 left, but Tavares scored off a center-ice faceoff with 79 seconds left.

## Capitals survive surge from Hurricanes

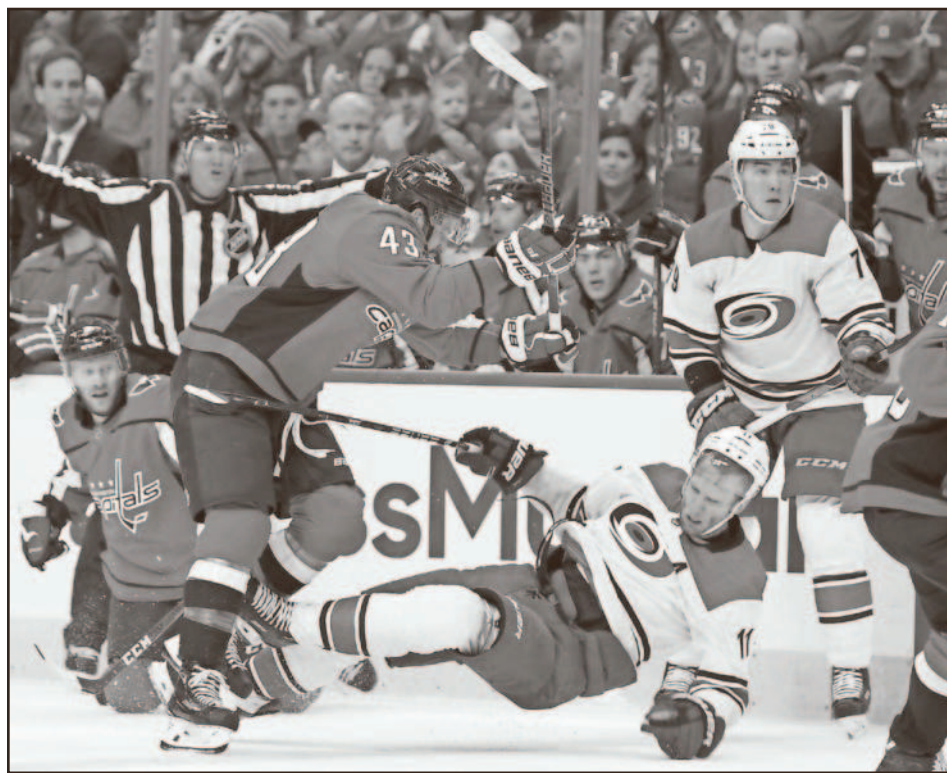

WASHINGTON — Nicklas Backstrom and Alex Ovechkin combined to score three goals on the first eight shots, and the defending Stanley Cup champion Washington Capitals survived a surge from Andrei Svechnikov and the Carolina Hurricanes to win Game 1 of their first-round series 4-2 on Thursday night.

Backstrom scored twice and Ovechkin scored on the power play to fire up a raucous sellout crowd in the first playoff game in Washington since celebrating the franchise's first title in June. It looked like the Capitals would roll toward a statement victory against an opponent lacking playoff experience, but the pesky Hurricanes turned up the heat.

Mrazek bounced back from a rough start to make four huge saves early in the third period, while Svechnikov scored twice in his playoff debut to put some fear into the Capitals, who were outshot 29-18 and outplayed for long stretches. Braden Holtby made 27 saves and the penalty kill came up big on two late Carolina power plays to allow Washington to take a 1-0 series lead.

Capitals players had plenty of recent lessons to know that a multi-goal lead isn't safe this time of year. They led Columbus 2-0 in each

of the first two games of last year's playoffs before losing 4-3 and 5-4, and watched the Presidents' Trophy-winning Tampa Bay Lightning blow a 3-0 lead to those same Blue Jackets and lose in Game 1 of that series Wednesday night.

It almost happened in this one. Well after the "Back-to-back!" chants faded into nervous silence, Mrazek rebounded from allowing a soft opening goal to Backstrom by stopping Nic Dowd and Carl Hagelin on breakaways and turned aside Brett Connolly and Lars Eller on rapid-fire chances early in the third before Svechnikov got the

Hurricanes on the board. Mrazek finished with 14 saves.

Thanks to the goals by Backstrom and Ovechkin and defenseman John Carlson tying an NHL playoff record with three assists in one period, the Capitals built a large enough lead to survive an onslaught from the Hurricanes. Eller sealed it with an empty-netter with 36.6 seconds left.

The Hurricanes were playing their first playoff game since 2009 after ending the league's longest drought. Carolina had 10 players making their playoff debuts, and its lineup had 342 games of playoff experience to Washington's 1,282.

NOTES: With his 62nd career playoff goal, Ovechkin tied Bobby Hull for 27th on the all-time list. ... Backstrom picked up his 100th career playoff point. ... ATLANTA (AP) — All-Star second baseman Ozzie Albies and the Atlanta Braves have agreed to a \$35 million, seven-year contract, a deal that includes a pair of team options that could make it worth \$45 million for nine seasons.

He gets \$1 million in each of the next two seasons, \$3 million in 2021, \$5 million in 2022 and \$7 million each in 2023, '24 and '25. Atlanta has a \$7 million option for 2026 with a \$4 million buyout, and if that is exercised, the Braves have a \$7 million option for 2027 with no buyout.

The 22-year-old is hitting .364 with one homer and two RBIs in 11 games this season after batting .261 with 40 doubles, 24 homers, 72 RBIs, 14 steals and 105 runs last year.

stopped inches from the cup.

Tiger Woods plodded his way to a 70. It was a solid start for Woods in his quest to end 11 years without a major, and he was atop the leaderboard briefly until a late bogey.

"I've shot this number and won four coats, so hopefully, I can do it again," said Woods, who slightly miscalculated. The last green jacket he won in 2005 began with a 74.

Rory McIlroy's bid for the last leg of the career Grand Slam began with a 73, which featured six bogeys.

More impressive than

the four straight birdies by DeChambeau was how he made them. After a two-putt birdie on the par-5 15th, his tee shot grazed the edge of the cup in the front left portion of the green. From the woods, he went just over the back of the 17th green and chipped in from 35 feet.

He didn't see until later how good his shot was into the 18th because he was in light rough short of the fairway bunker, unable to see the green but knowing it was good from the roar of the crowd. The ball ran true to the cup and smacked into the middle of the pin with enough force to knock it backward a few inches.

"I guess I should have pulled the flagstick," DeChambeau

said.

He is not the only player to putt with the flagstick in the cup — allowed under the new Rules of Golf — just the only one to apply science to the decision.

Koepka shot his 66 while playing in the last group of the day, and not seeing very good golf alongside him. Jordan Spieth had to rely on his short game to salvage a 75, matching his highest score at Augusta.

Koepka played bogey-free in his first time at the Masters in two years. He missed last year recovering from a wrist injury. Then he won a second straight U.S. Open, held off Woods to win the PGA Championship and has established himself as a major player.

end of last season.

Since Aug. 1, the Rays have the best record in the majors at 46-22.

Better than the Sox, the Astros, Dodgers, Yankees, Brewers, all of 'em.

Two points of clarity here before planning Lightning-style playoff parties ... (Too soon?)

One, obviously there is no true carryover from one season to the next, and, because they're the Rays, several faces, including a few from that young core, have changed. Plus several key veterans, including Tommy Pham at the July deadline, were brought in, by taking advantage of the financial flexibility. So it's not the same team.

Two, certainly that level of success is not sustainable, since it would put the Rays on pace for 110 wins, which even their own constantly whirling Uncle Charlie computer system doesn't spit out. The majors-leading (by a lot) team ERA of 1.98 will go up, the leagues-leading fielding percentage of .994 may go down, their plus 32 run differential may level off from the presently projected plus 399.

But the decision to let the kids play has, thus far, been the right one.

Look back to the 2018 All-Star break, and the Rays have the best record in the majors since then, too, at 51-28. Go back over their last 162 games, a full season, and they're 97-65, which ranks in the top six.

"Going back to last year you saw a lot of guys really

run with the opportunity they were given. Almost to a man, everyone that got a chance did something good with that chance, and that's continuing into this year," senior VP Chaim Bloom said.

"We have a ton of confidence in these guys. Obviously, we as a group need to continue to prove that as the season wears on. And we know there's going to be things thrown at us that we can't anticipate right now. But everything we've seen out of this group has just given us that much more confidence in what they can do."

The Rays have a lot of talent. Enough that ESPN may start talking about them rather than asking if you can name five of them. (Or, really getting crazy here, actually show one of their games nationally).

And MLB Network may rephrase asking when they'll be passed by the Red Sox to at least if.

That's between the young players they had who with the veteran purge were given clear paths to emerge, such as Jose Alvarado, Willy Adames, Diego Castillo, Brandon Lowe, Daniel Robertson, and more.

And the ones they brought in, including Tyler Glasnow and Austin Meadows (both in a trade that may end up among their best, up there with the one that got them Archer), Michael Perez, Jalen Beeks and, slightly older but unproven, Ji-Man Choi and Joey Wendle.

But ask around and you hear repeatedly that it's more than having good players.

"The cool part about it is how good we feel about our team in the clubhouse and with each other," Blake Snell, the best of their young players,

said. "The (win-loss) numbers are really cool, everything we're doing is really cool, but I think we just show up every day and we have so much fun enjoying the team that we have, enjoying the bond that we have. It's very special.

"I think it's a great mix. And that has a lot to do with it as well as just the talent, which is unbelievable. The talent along with the kind of guys we have is amazing."

Adames similarly sees the chemistry as an important part of the equation.

"Everybody is coming with some good, positive energy, they're coming here to give 100 percent," he said. "Everybody is hungry. I think that's the word for our team. The young guys are hungry to win. We want to be here. We don't want to go back (to the minors). We want to keep winning."

"We're betting on the young guys, and I think that was a good move."

Criticism of the massive roster overhaul, which drew accusations of tanking and suggestions by some (Hmm, wonder who?) the 2018 team could be their worst ever, was fair and reasonable.

"You've got to give it some time to see how it really plays out," manager Kevin Cash said. "And we're seeing some things play out."

For two months of last season and two weeks of this one, we have.

"As excited as we are, we have not really accomplished anything yet," Bloom said. "This is a great indicator and validates how enthusiastic we are about the group. Hopefully there is a lot more of this to come."

Coaches coach, players play.

But it falls on Cooper, one way or another, to pull something more out of his stars heading into Game 2. I don't know what buttons there are to push. But who knows his guys better than the head guy? It's just the kind of challenge Cooper might crave.

Here's his chance remind his players that while they were trying to out-skill Columbus, with their hearts thumping in their packed barn, they take too many chances and let Columbus back in.

Cooper bypassed the autopsy Thursday, pushing past what will be a catastrophic loss if the cats keep stroking in Game 2.

"Support your team and draw on some of the experiences in the past and move on," he said. "I don't think that was an issue at all. You've got to move on. This is it. Has anybody gone 16-0?"

# Why Gators think Burney can be a 'beast'

Florida defender emerged as linebacker at end of freshman season in Peach Bowl

GAINESVILLE — As Florida's 2018 season neared its end, the Gators kept raving about a freshman defender poised to break out.

Amari Burney. By the time the Peach Bowl ended with a thumping of Michigan, it was obvious why. The Calvary Christian product broke up a pass to help thwart one Wolverines drive and ended another with the first sack of his career, a third-down blitz from the secondary.

"It built my confidence coming into later in the season, just making a play like that on national TV, having everybody talk about it ..." Burney said.

Three and a half months later, the Gators are still talking up Burney, who will be one of the most interesting players to watch in Saturday's spring game.

"Amari's a beast," NFL-bound linebacker Vosean Joseph said.

Burney was a beast in high school, too.

He was a do-it-all talent who started at defensive line as a freshman before moving

back to linebacker and safety. On offense, he racked up 12 touchdowns and almost 1,000 receiving yards.

UF knew the four-star recruit was talented and had a chance to contribute immediately. The only question: Where?

The Gators first put Burney at special teams and defensive back, where he played most of his 12 games last season. He probably could have been the long-term replacement at STAR defensive back for Chauncey Gardner-Johnson, who left early for the draft.

But by the regular season finale of his true freshman season, UF was trying him at linebacker, where the 6-foot-2, 220-pound athlete is big enough to dole out hits and quick enough to fly around the field.

"He can do whatever, man," linebacker David Reese said. "He's probably one of our fastest guys on our team — like, the whole defense."

That speed allowed him to succeed in his limited linebacker action last year, when he focused on covering running backs or tight ends on passing downs.

The move became official when coaches told Burney to go with the linebackers at the start of offseason workouts.

That doesn't mean the move is permanent. Although Burney said he has spent all spring at the new position, defensive coordinator Todd Grantham said he could move around, if necessary.

"By him going (to linebacker), it allows us to get good speed on the field, work to get our best 11 players on the field," Grantham said.

For now, Burney is preparing to contribute at linebacker. He added a couple pounds and focused on bulking up his arms and legs to prepare for more contact with bigger bodies near the line of scrimmage.

He can still cover, too; at a recent practice, he slid outside to shadow a receiver and still goes against receiving tight ends. But he's learning new responsibilities, too, like what to do with a pulling guard and where he fits into the schemes in run-stopping.

"They're just teaching me the new plays, new position," Burney said. "I feel comfortable with it."

## Jags' Fournette arrested for driving with suspended license

JACKSONVILLE — Jacksonville Jaguars running back Leonard Fournette was arrested Thursday for driving with a suspended license and released a short time later.

Fournette paid a \$1,508 bond and was freed after spending less than 30 minutes in the Duval

County Jail, according to jail records.

His license was suspended last month after he failed to pay or protest a speeding ticket, court records show. Fournette was cited on Nov. 17, 2018, in nearby Neptune Beach for driving 37 mph in a 25 mph zone.

The Jaguars say in a statement that they "are aware of the situation involving Leonard

Fournette and are continuing to gather more information. No further comment will be provided at this time."

It's the latest issue for Fournette, the fourth overall pick in the 2017 draft who has missed 11 games in two seasons because of injuries and suspensions. Fournette ran for 439 yards and five touchdowns in eight games in 2018.

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Five-time NFL most valuable player and two-time Super Bowl champion quarterback Peyton Manning headlines the Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame's latest induction class.

The Hall of Fame announced its nine-member 2019 class Thursday.

The class also features George Taliaferro, a Tennessee native who became the first African-American

drafted by an NFL team. Taliaferro is being honored posthumously along with former major league catcher Bob Tillman.

Other inductees include longtime NFL assistant coach Kippy Brown, Duke football coach and former Tennessee offensive coordinator David Cutcliffe, Fox football analyst and former Tennessee safety Charles Davis, ESPN

broadcaster and former Lady Vols basketball player Kara Lawson, former Sewanee basketball player Kimberly Anne Valek and former San Francisco 49ers linebacker Patrick Willis.

The class will be inducted June 15. The Hall of Fame announced earlier that Tennessee Titans controlling owner Amy Adams Strunk will be honored as its 2019 Tennessean of the year.

## Tipsarevic advances to ATP Tour quarterfinal

HOUSTON (AP) — Former top-10 player Janko Tipsarevic reached his first ATP Tour quarterfinal in 2 1/2 years by beating No. 3-seeded Cameron Norrie 6-3, 6-4 on Thursday at the U.S. Men's Clay Court Championship.

The 34-year-old Tipsarevic returned to the tour this year after missing 16 months while having operations on his hamstrings.

He is ranked 372nd and entered the Houston tournament via a wild card. He is the lowest-ranked quarterfinalist

at the tournament since at least 1979, according to the ATP.

Tipsarevic hadn't won a tour-level match since 2017 until doing so at the Miami Open last month.

His most recent quarterfinal appearance came at Shenzhen, China, in October 2016.

Tipsarevic next will face No. 8 seed Sam Querrey, who eliminated Guillermo Garcia-Lopez 6-4, 6-3.

Querrey won 43 of 54 points on his serve and saved the lone break point he faced.

## Kuznetsova rallies by Bacsinszky at Lugano

LUGANO, Switzerland (AP) — Two-time Grand Slam champion Svetlana Kuznetsova rallied from a set and a service break down to beat Timea Bacsinszky 5-7, 6-3, 6-4 in the second round of the Samsung Open on Thursday.

Playing in her first tournament in more than six months, Kuznetsova, 33, passed her second two-hour test on Lugano's clay courts.

Kuznetsova, ranked No. 109, got the key break early in the third set against Bacsinszky, another

injury-hit former top-10 player now ranked No. 112.

Two more seeded players lost Thursday, leaving eighth-seeded Vera Lapko as the only one left in the quarterfinals.

Lapko won 6-2, 6-0 against Evgeniya Rodina, while third-seeded Viktoria Kuzmova was beaten 6-3, 3-6, 6-2 by Iga Swiatek, the Wimbledon junior champion.

Seventh-seeded Rebecca Peterson lost 1-6, 6-4, 7-6 (2) to Veronika Kudermetova

## Lomachenko goes Hollywood in bout with Crolla

Ukrainian gold medalist defends his two lightweight title belts against British underdog

LOS ANGELES — Vasyil Lomachenko left Ukraine and moved stateside several years ago because he dreamed of fighting for big money in the world's most popular boxing venues.

After headlining at Madison Square Garden, in Macau and in several spots around Las Vegas, Lomachenko is going Hollywood on Friday night.

Lomachenko (12-1, 9 KOs) risks his two

lightweight world titles at Staples Center in downtown Los Angeles when he takes on Britain's Anthony Crolla.

Crolla (34-6-3, 13 KOs) is a big underdog against the masterful Lomachenko, whose technique and athleticism have propelled him from two Olympic gold medals to the short list of the world's greatest pound-for-pound fighters.

Lomachenko trains outside Los Angeles, and he has already fought in the LA area twice. But he has never appeared in

this most prominent indoor arena, and the mere idea of headlining in such a cavernous venue would have been improbable just a few years ago.

"It's a very exciting place," Lomachenko said. "After my first (LA) fight at Microsoft Theater, I looked across the street and thought, 'Wow, maybe someday I can get into Staples Center.'"

Less than two years after that LA debut in the smaller Microsoft venue, Lomachenko has moved across the street for a title defense he is expected to

win with style — and not just because he's wearing an outlandish robe worth a reported \$200,000 into the ring.

Any opponent under 140 pounds would be an underdog against Lomachenko, but the lack of a theoretically worthy opponent doesn't interest the champion. Until a bona fide challenger to his dominance emerges at 130 or 135 pounds, he will keep racking up wins.

"I don't care," Lomachenko said with a smirk. "In my fights, I just want to show off my

skills. My opponent, whoever. I just want to enjoy it and to put on a good and interesting fight."

Lomachenko's next fight was supposed to be a title unification bout with Ghana's Richard Commey, who holds one of the two remaining lightweight belts that Lomachenko covets. But Commey emerged from his bout Feb. 2 with an injured hand, and Lomachenko elected to stay active by fighting his mandatory challenger for the WBA crown.

While Crolla is widely

respected for his toughness and resilience, Lomachenko sometimes seems to be competing in a different sport. His footwork alone inspires rhapsodic appreciation from veteran fight watchers, and his hand speed is similarly peerless.

"He's the best fighter in the sport, and I'm grateful for this chance," Crolla said. "Even the best fighter in boxing is beatable. Nobody is bigger than the game, so I go into this fight knowing I've got a chance and a strategy to beat him."

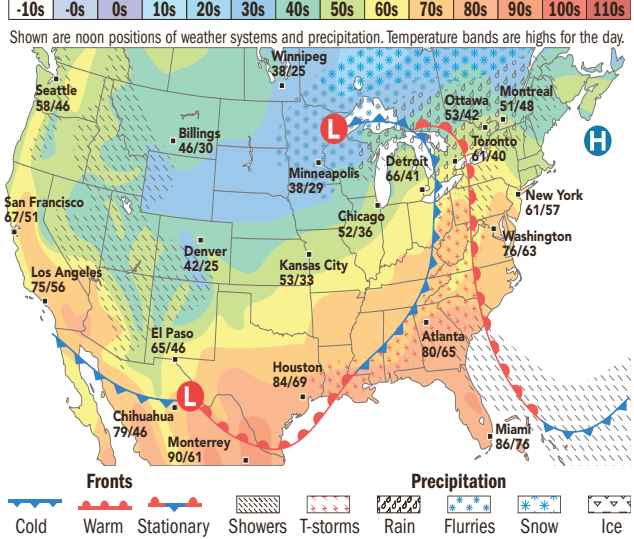

# Raikkonen closes in on 40, still racing in Formula One

As Chinese Grand Prix approaches, his name is still spread all around the record books

SHANGHAI — What's Kimi Raikkonen's secret to Formula One longevity? He started in F1 in 2001, won the season championship in 2007 and has driven for the sport's biggest names in Ferrari and McLaren. His name is spread all around the F1 record books. He'll be 40 before this season ends, and he's still at it. This season he's with Alfa Romeo, which is the old Sauber team renamed — the same Sauber he started with almost 20

decades ago. "I don't have any special thing that I try to motivate myself," he said Thursday, looking ahead to Sunday's Chinese Grand Prix. "It's become more of a hobby for me, maybe more than anything else. And probably that's why it's fun again." Ferrari dropped him after last season, going instead with 21-year-old Charles Leclerc of Monaco. Raikkonen has scored points in the first two races, finishing eighth in Australia and seventh in Bahrain. That's about as good as possible behind F1's three

dominant teams — Mercedes, Ferrari and Red Bull. "I always try to do the best that I can," he said. "Some days it goes a bit better than others. But that's how it goes. (Motivation) has never really been an issue." Raikkonen said he "didn't really have any goals" going into this season, and he said he'll know it's time to retire when his performance is "not what I expect from myself." F1 is billing the Chinese Grand Prix as its 1,000th race. This distinction requires some creative math. Officials list the first race as

the British Grand Prix on May 13, 1950, at Silverstone, the former World War II airfield in south England. The winner was Giuseppe Farina, driving for Alfa Romeo. One counting problem is the inclusion of the Indianapolis 500 on the F1 calendar between 1950 and 1960, though few F1 drivers ever competed there — and Indy ran by its own set of rules. Raikkonen has been around so long that Mexican driver Sergio Perez, 29, joked that he recalled getting interested in the sport by watching "Kimi back then at a very young age."

Raikkonen has won 21 times in F1 and might have won more had he not been away two seasons driving rally cars. The 1,000 mark prompted Haas driver Romain Grosjean to speculate about what car racing might look like 50 years from now — perhaps another 1,000 races down the road. "I've got no idea what the cars are going to be like in 40 or 50 years," he said. "The only thing I'll say: I hope there is still going to be a driver driving the car because that's where the emotions go. If it's just robots, it's not going to be much fun."

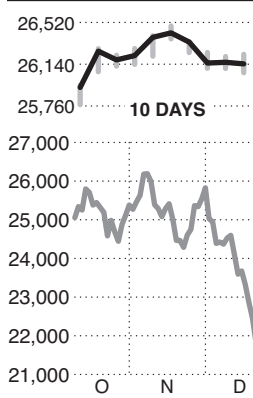

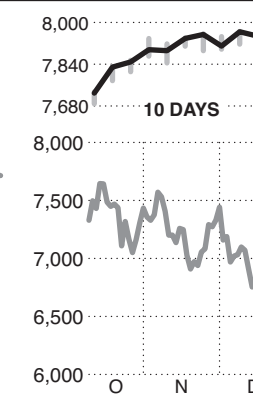
