

## Arcadia man killed in Sebring

### Shooting occurred Tuesday night

SEBRING — Calvin Lamont Brown Jr., 29, of Arcadia, was shot at about 10:55 p.m. Tuesday near the intersection of Martin Luther King Boulevard and Lemon Avenue. Brown was pronounced dead in an ambulance en route to Highlands Regional Medical Center.

Sebring Police Department Cmdr. Curtis Hart said Brown was possibly visiting a girlfriend in the area. "Calvin was found on the sidewalk on MLK Boulevard," Hart said. "He had multiple gunshot wounds."

Hart did not want to give any details out about the suspect(s) while police are still investigating the incident.

Brown also uses the street name 'Lil Man, according to arrest reports in the DeSoto Clerk of County Courts. Brown

## End could be in sight for Visit Florida

TALLAHASSEE — Florida's tourism-marketing agency is closer to having its doors closed this fall as a Senate budget proposal Tuesday matched the House's stance to eliminate Visit Florida.

Sen. Travis Hutson, a St. Augustine Republican who oversees tourism and economic-development funding, said there is no reason to push for additional money until the House takes up a Senate-approved bill (SB 178) that would extend the life of Visit Florida beyond Oct. 1.

"If Visit Florida is going to sunset, there is no reason to agree any further than that," said Hutson, who chairs the Transportation, Tourism, and Economic Development Appropriations Subcommittee.

And so far, the House isn't rushing to take up the Senate bill. Under state law,

## A look at some of Sebring's fast food establishments

*Editor's note: This is the second in a series of stories looking at restaurant inspections. We have broken it down into two categories: fast food restaurants and sit down restaurants. We will write a story for each local municipality for each category. This story takes a look at fast food restaurants in Sebring. Because there are so many fast food restaurants in Sebring, there will be a second story appearing in a future edition to cover the remaining facilities.*

SEBRING — Thousands of us rush to the local drive-thru for lunch or grab take out food on the way home from work because we just don't feel like cooking. Besides the cost of the food, you're paying for convenience.

Could you be paying with your health? Perhaps, if cleanliness and food safety standards are not adhered to. The Department of Business and Professional Regulation performs yearly inspections of restaurants before issuing an operational license.

The DBPR inspections are done throughout the year and may have widely varying dates. The most current inspection information is being used in this article.

The inspections have different levels of violations based on the potential health threat to customers: high priority, intermediate and basic violations. This article will detail restaurants that have high priority violation(s). Those establishments without any violations will be noted as well.

Burger King at 2205 U.S.27 in Sebring met inspection standards on March 29, 2019. No violations were noted.

Dairy Queen, located at 2255 U.S. 27 North, was inspected on Dec. 5, 2018 and was cited with six violations: one high priority, three intermediate and two basic violations.

The high priority violation

concerned food safety. The inspector said food was "held at greater than 41 degrees Fahrenheit; cheese 51 degrees cold holding." Moving the cheese to the bottom of the cooler corrected the problem.

The three intermediate violations were accumulation of black/green "mold-like" substance inside the ice bin in the drive-thru area; encrusted material on a can opener blade and no current certified food service manager on duty where more than four people

were working with food.

The basic violations were an employee's beverage container was on a food prep table near clean utensils. The matter was corrected by moving the cup. Another violation was not having a hand washing sign at a hand sink near the ice machine.

Warnings were given with all the violations. The report states a follow-up inspection was required, but there is

## Citizens voice opposition to gun shows near school

SEBRING — Nine citizens spoke of their opposition to gun shows being held close to Sebring High School at Tuesday's meeting of the School Board of Highlands County.

Some held signs with one stating "School Kids, Not Guns" with a thumbs down next to a picture of an assault rifle.

They identified themselves as being part of the Indivisible movement, which at the national level purports to "realize progressive policies, protect democracy, and defeat the Trump agenda."

But, the local group was not about politics at the School Board meeting. Its sole focus was asking the School Board to sign a resolution in opposition to gun shows being held at the Highlands County

Fairgrounds, which is across the street from Sebring High School.

James Reid, who was the first to speak, handed out a recent study on school firearm violence prevention by two Ball State University professors.

He pointed out a statement from the study under "Primary Prevention" that stated, "The ideal method for eliminating school firearm violence by youths is to prevent them from ever gaining access to firearms. Unfortunately, studies have found an alarming rate of firearms accessible to youths."

"What they are saying in essence is blanketing a community with guns is about the worst thing that you can do if you wish to keep your children safe," Reid said. "This is why we are here tonight, my group, the Indivisible, is to talk about the

fact that the [Sebring] Firemen's Association is bringing groups from all over to sell weapons of death."

The sales are taking place 20 feet from Sebring High School, meanwhile the School Board is earnestly spending hundreds of thousands of dollars in an effort to keep weapons out of schools, he said.

Patricia Myers said they can't control having the gun shows across from the high school, but they can control the messages sent by the community and perceptions that are created.

"As a community we need to ensure that our children are protected from violence in schools, yet what message are we sending when we hold gun shows across from the high school in light of the unprecedented gun violence we have all

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# Candlelight vigil for McCray

LAKE PLACID — Friends, family and co-workers of Markie McCray, along with residents, will gather at 8 p.m. Friday on Vision Street in Highway Park. The 20-year-old was shot during an Easter Sunday celebration and died on Monday.

McCray will be remembered during the vigil by those he was close to and those who have been touched by his killing. Kateta James considered

the young man a friend, and she will soon be grandmother to McCray's son who will be born in July. James said the candlelight vigil is open to the public.

It is hoped that the vigil will bring some healing and closure to the family for the loss of their son.

Evelyn Colon is on the Highway Park Neighborhood Council. She said the neighborhood council is gathering pastors, commissioners, law enforcement officials and others for a meeting

to be held from noon to 2 p.m. on June 8. The location will be determined soon.

The meeting's purpose is to talk about problems and concerns in the Highway Park subdivision. Colon says the panel and the community will determine how best to curb the violence in the neighborhood and put a stop to the senseless violence like the acts that caused McCray's death.

# DeSantis breaks with House on advanced nurses

TALLAHASSEE — Gov. Ron DeSantis, who has been supportive of many health care proposals pushed by House Speaker Jose Oliva, said Tuesday he doesn't back one of the Republican leader's top priorities: allowing advanced nurses to practice independently from physicians.

Following an AARP town-hall meeting on the rising costs of prescription drugs, DeSantis said he would have to be "convinced" about allowing advanced practice registered nurses and physician assistants to work independently from physicians. The House passed such a measure (HB 821) last week.

"My general view is that if you go to medical school and you go through all that training to become a doctor, be a doctor," DeSantis said when asked whether he supports the legislation.

"My mom's a nurse, so I have great regard for nurses," he added. "But it's a different thing. And so, I would have to really be convinced that kind of expanding scope of practice would be good."

Oliva could not immediately be reached for comment. But House bill sponsor Cary Pigman, R-Avon Park, said last week the measure would help enhance access to quality care.

"This bill removes the barriers to providers practicing to the full extent of their education

weeks has agreed to move closer to the House of Representatives on several high-profile health care bills, including bills dealing with the issues of telehealth and "certificate of need" regulations.

The about-face by the Senate on those issues has led to questions about what senators might do on scope-of-practice issues. Expanding the roles of advanced nurses and physician assistants has long been opposed by physician groups.

Florida Medical Association lobbyist Jeff Scott said his organization had not spoken with DeSantis about the issue this session. But hearing that the governor opposes the legislation was good news, he said.

"Certainly, that makes us feel better than if he had come out in support of it," said Scott, whose organization is made up of physicians across the state.

and training," said Pigman, a physician who is chairman of the House Health Market Reform Subcommittee.

The break on the "scope of practice" issue is notable since DeSantis has previously praised Oliva's view that health-care costs can be contained by changing the state's regulatory framework. The House has also backed DeSantis' plan to allow the importation of drugs from Canada.

Oliva has dedicated a big part of his time as House speaker to passing legislation that would disrupt the health-care system, taking aim at changing laws and regulations surrounding hospitals and other health providers. Oliva also has taken aim at how the state — and individual consumers — pay for health services.

To that end, a top priority for Oliva has been expanding the roles of advanced practice registered nurses and physician assistants by allowing them to practice independently from physicians.

The Senate has been unwilling to move similar legislation during the session that is scheduled to end May 3.

## Strengthen 'Do Not Call' protections

Here's public policy all Americans can agree to — be they Republican, Democrat; tall, short; man, woman; conservative, progressive; rich, poor; Trumpite, Sandernista.

Washington has to do something to stop robocalls.

Put an exclamation point on that: Make it stop! God grant you infinite patience you if you were unfortunate enough to do something like going online to price out a personal policy through the health insurance marketplace. We know someone who did that months ago.

Not long after came robo-solicitation phone calls from God only knows where. Repeatedly. Often. Months after the inquiry. Months after actually buying an insurance policy.

In the months since, this person stopped answering calls from unfamiliar numbers. If the number was unfamiliar, it was assumed to be a robocalls. This has become a new form of harassment that limits our freedom to use a personal communications device.

It's just wrong, and it needs to be stopped.

Sixteen years ago, Congress established the National Do Not Call Registry to comply with the Telephone Consumer Protection Act of 1991. It worked reasonably well for land lines. More than 230 million people have registered on the Do Not Call list.

Cellphones, however, are a different matter. Technology has out-paced the ability of government and voice service providers to locate and stop violators. So, stronger steps are needed.

Recently, Rep. Vern Buchanan, R-Longboat Key, a member of the House Ways and Means Committee, endorsed a bill from Rep. David Kustoff of Tennessee called the Telephone Robocall Abuse Criminal Enforcement and Deterrence Act, or the Traced Act.

The act would require caller identification through new authentication technology and insist that cell service providers verify incoming calls. It would allow the FCC to fine violators as much as \$10,000. It would also lengthen the time authorities can investigate and charge violators from one year to three years.

In a press release, Buchanan's office noted that robocalls increased by 46 percent last year, to a total of nearly 48 billion in the United States. Many of the illegal calls hide or disguise the caller's identity and location. These are known as "spoofing." Buchanan's office noted the 941 area call received more than 44 million scam robocalls in 2018. Ridiculous.

It may not cure all, but this bill could help deter some of the robo-harassment. The Traced Act is sponsored in the Senate by Sen. John Thune, D-South Dakota, who noted that current fines were considered by violators to be simply "the cost of doing business."

The federal government has to make this practice cost-prohibitive. Cell companies also need to employ the latest technological tools to fight and stop this.

It may be too much to expect this will stop robocalls cold. But the Traced Act would be a solid step, and steps must be taken as soon as possible so that we can end the ongoing incoming harassment.

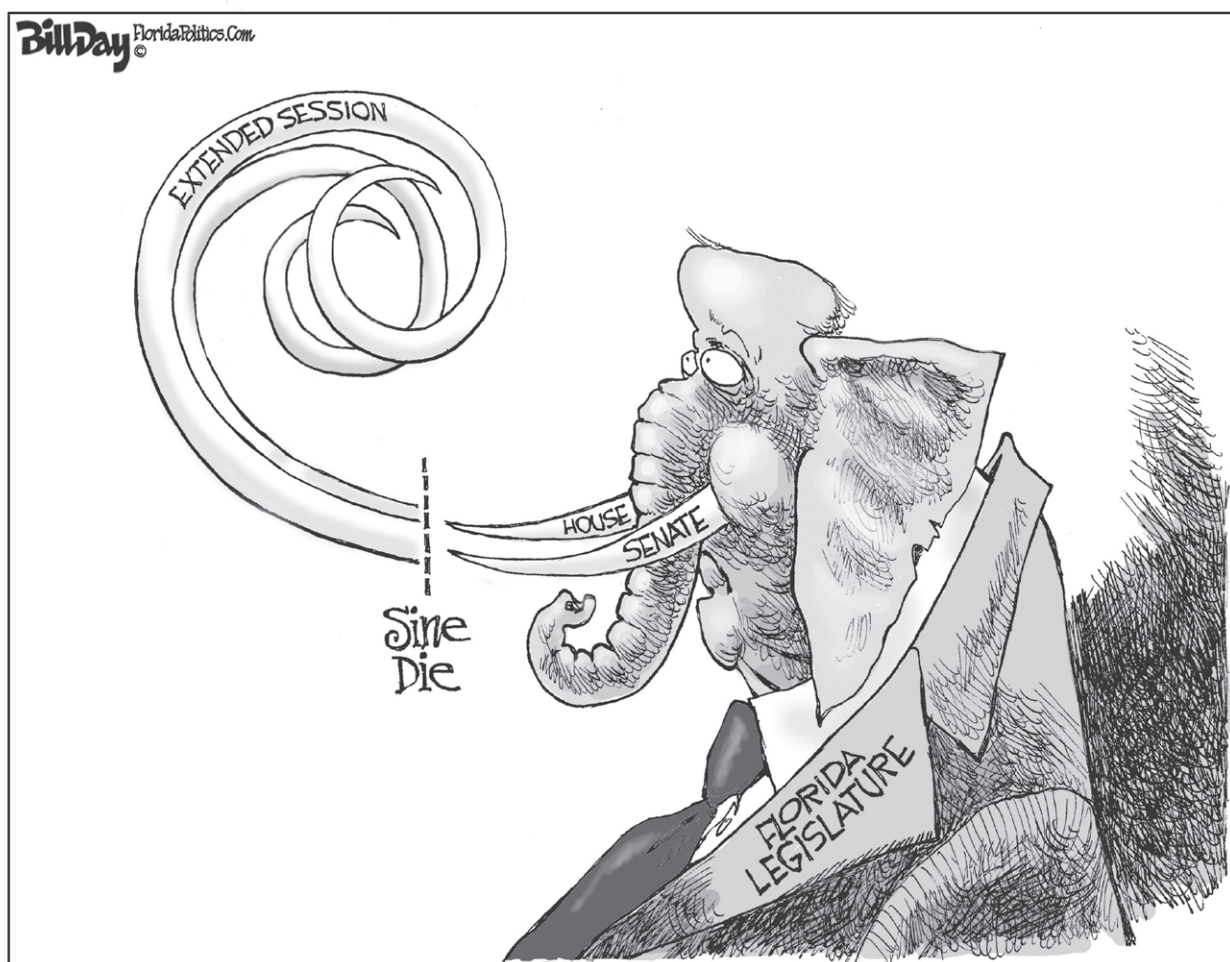

seen in our schools in the state and in the nation," she said.

Karin Emery said she is also upset about the location of the gun shows.

She does not support full gun control or the taking away of guns as this is a very "pro gun area," but she believes in supporting background checks and checking the mental history of those seeking to purchase guns.

Emery told the School Board it has an opportunity to make a statement that guns are not to be sold near schools.

After Emery spoke, School Board Chairman Bill Brantley said that was the last of the petitions (to speak at the meeting) and then he asked if there were any comments from

the board.

no record of that being done yet.

The McDonald's at 3115 U.S. 27 would have done very well except for one item that earned them a high priority violation. The restaurant was cited for having raw animal food stored over ready-to-eat food in the reach-in freezer and not all products were commercially packaged. The inspector reported raw frozen steak over frozen hash browns and frozen fries.

At Captain D's Seafood Kitchen at 3400 U.S. 27 South, the inspector wrote two high priority,

one intermediate and three basic violations.

One of the high priority violations, which could potentially get someone sick, is "cooked meats and poultry being hot held less than 135 degrees Fahrenheit or higher. Cooked crab holding at 107 degrees." The manager threw the contents away to correct the problems.

The other high priority violation was an employee who did not wash their hands before changing gloves to work with food. The employee was instructed on proper precautions and that took care of the violation.

A cutting board that

was stained was at a prep station, which was considered an intermediate violation.

The three basic violations were the storage of canned food on the ground near a walk-in freezer; single service articles improperly stored; and food not covered in the cooler.

Visit Florida is authorized to continue operating through Sept. 30. Without legislation such as the Senate bill, the agency will go away.

House Speaker Jose Oliva, R-Miami Lakes, said late Tuesday that he wouldn't "discount completely" the House taking up the bill, which was never heard in a House committee. But he also didn't raise the prospects that the bill would be heard with a little more than a week remaining in the 60-day legislative session.

"At this point, it's going to be a little more difficult because we never took up that bill," Oliva said.

House leaders have attacked past spending by Visit Florida, and Oliva on Tuesday night dismissed concerns that Florida's tourism figures would be impacted without the agency's promotional efforts.

"I would point those people to the world before Visit Florida ever existed. I would point to fluctuations in the funding of Visit Florida

and how they in no way correlate to the fluctuations in our tourism," Oliva said. "And I would also point out to them, what we found in the last couple of years is that a great deal of that money was not even being used to promote Florida. So, whatever amount of money was being used to promote Florida, was not having a direct correlation on tourism."

House members have continued to focus on spending by Visit Florida. The agency was particularly in the crosshairs of lawmakers in 2017 because of spending that included a \$11.6 million deal to sponsor a cooking show hosted by celebrity chef Emeril Lagasse, a \$2.875 million contract with an auto-racing team known as Visit Florida Racing, and a \$1 million promotion contract with Miami rapper Pitbull.

Oliva added that the economy, along with Florida's weather and attractions, have a bigger impact on the state's tourism numbers than the marketing efforts of Visit Florida.

"In a trillion-dollar economy, a few million dollars put towards advertising a few different places cannot possibly have a direct correlation with tourism," Oliva said.

"There's a whole series of factors. Visit Florida is probably least among them," he concluded.

The agency has reported eight years of record tourism numbers, topped by 126.1 million visitors in 2018. In the same time, the agency's share of state funding has grown from \$35 million in 2011, when the state counted 87.3 million visitors, to \$76 million in the current year.

Proponents of Visit Florida point to its ability to counter negative national media when areas are impacted by disasters such as hurricanes and last summer's red tide outbreak.

Unless something changes in upcoming budget negotiations, Hutson said Visit Florida would get \$17 million in the 2019-2020 fiscal year, enough to cover its expenses until Oct. 1.

The Senate had earlier proposed \$50 million for the agency, \$26 million less than requested by Gov. Ron DeSantis. That would allow operations to continue beyond Oct. 1.

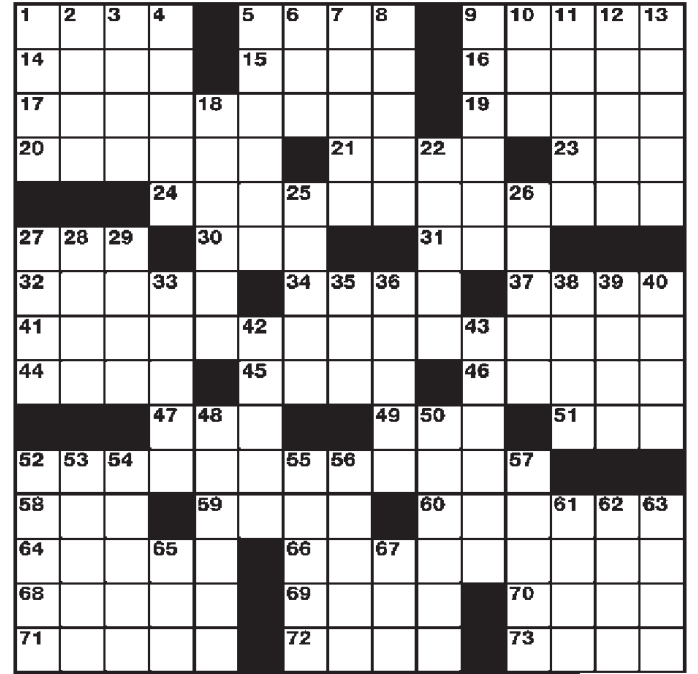
The Senate-approved bill would allow the Florida Tourism Industry Marketing Corporation, better known as Visit Florida, to continue operating until Oct. 1, 2027.

After two endurance races totaling 36 hours of competition, followed by a 100-minute sprint race, the IMSA WeatherTech SportsCar Championship heads into its "regular season" with the Acura Sports Car Challenge at Mid-Ohio. The race on Sunday, May 5, is the first of six two-hour and 40-minute races on the 12-race WeatherTech Championship calendar.

The race features a 36-car entry list across four WeatherTech Championship classes, DPI with 11 entries, GTLM with eight, GTD with 15 and LMP2 with two. The GTD and LMP2 classes return to action after sitting out last month's BUBBA burger Sports Car Grand Prix at Long Beach.

NBCSN will have live television coverage of the race beginning at 1:30 p.m. Live IMSA Radio coverage is available on IMSA.com, RadioLeMans.com and via SiriusXM Radio. Tickets are available now at MidOhio.com.

American sports car racing. It uses the same points system and sporting regulations as the GTD classes uses throughout the standard WeatherTech Championship season.

## How not to overcook meat

You've decided what to make for dinner. You've shopped, chopped, cooked, cleaned, and placed a gorgeous meal on the table. You take your first bite and start chewing and chewing and chewing it's tough, it's dry, it's over cooked. Don't worry, we've all been there!

Cooking meat can be tricky. You want to cook it long enough so that it's safe to consume, but not so long that it becomes tough and unappetizing. Sometimes there is a very fine line between the two. Even worse, overcooking some types of meat can create carcinogens. Lucky for you, the Dinner Diva is here to save the day. Here are a few tips to help you avoid overcooking meat.

When grilling meat, be sure to grill slowly over low heat. This will help reduce charring, which poses a cancer risk. If you do end up with black areas on your grilled meat, scrape them off before serving. Marinating meat before cooking can help avoid overcooking as well.

A digital probe thermometer is an excellent tool to help you discern the level of doneness when cooking meat. You insert the probe end of the thermometer into the meat and the readout end rests outside of your oven. This enables you to check the meat's internal temperature without opening the oven door and letting heat escape. Some can even be programmed to beep once a particular temperature is reached. - Beef Roast: 145° F with a three-minute rest time
- Ground Beef: 160° F
- Pork Roast: 145° F with a three-minute rest time
- Ham: 145° F with a three-minute rest time
- Lamb: 145° F with a three-minute rest time
- Veal Chops: 145° F with a three-minute rest time
- Whole Chicken or Turkey: 165° F

## Food expired? Don't toss it just yet

Do you freeze foods well before the expiration date? Check the milk to make sure it will last the week? Throw out items the moment they pass over the stamped deadline? If so, you may be doing so unnecessarily and even contributing to the vast food waste problem across the world.

The Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations says approximately one-third of the food produced in the world for human consumption every year, which amounts to 1.3 billion tons, gets lost or wasted. The organization says consumers in rich countries waste almost as much food as the entire net food production of sub-Saharan Africa.

It is important to note that the dates on various food and beverage items may mean different things, and not all of them are strict "expiration dates" requiring foods to be discarded. The United States Department of

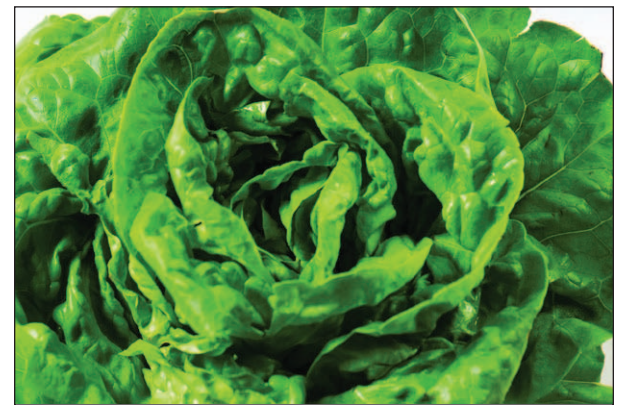
Before tossing food into the trash, keep in mind that many items deemed "expired" may be safe to eat.

Agriculture states that food expiration dates are protecting food quality, not food safety. In fact, U.S. regulations do not require that expiration dates be put on meat, poultry, eggs, dairy, cans, and boxed foods. Baby formula is the only product that requires an expiration date on its packaging.

Rather, dates featured on foods are typically "sell-by" and "use-by" dates. The sell-by date refers to how long the store has to display the product. It is important

to note that this date is essentially a guide for the retailer, so the store knows when to pull the item off the shelf. Furthermore, pulling the food is not mandatory in all states.

The use-by date or best-by date is an arbitrary date by which the manufacturer thinks the product will start to fall below its peak quality, states Business Insider. Prior to the use-by date, items will have the most flavor and

## Avoiding foodborne poisoning

Numerous foodborne illness outbreaks of salmonella and E. coli have occurred across the United States and Canada in 2018. And such outbreaks are not limited to North America. In May, more than 40 cases of hepatitis A were reported in six European Union countries, according to the European Center for Disease Prevention and Control.

When two or more people get the same illness from the same food or drink source, the event is called a foodborne disease outbreak,

according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. While infection from salmonella strains and escherichia coli are some of the most notable contagions, other illnesses can occur as well, as evidenced by the EU hepatitis outbreak. Listeria and cyclospora are some other known foodborne illness pathogens. Through the first half of 2018, warnings and recalls have been issued by the CDC for shell eggs, romaine lettuce, dried coconut, chicken salad, kratom, raw sprouts, and frozen



# Give your mayo-heavy American potato salad a French twist

American-style potato salad, thickly dressed with mayonnaise and sweet pickle relish, is archetypal picnic fare and will always have a place on summer tables. But we've cooked (and eaten) piles of it over the years, and these days we yearn for something lighter and fresher to serve with grilled fish, chicken, and even meat.

In our mind, French potato salad is just the ticket. Having little in common with its American counterpart, French potato salad is served warm or at room temperature and is composed of sliced potatoes glistening with olive oil, white wine vinegar, and plenty of fresh herbs.

We expected quick success with this seemingly simple recipe — how hard could it be to boil a few potatoes and toss them in vinaigrette? We sliced the hot potatoes, dressed them while they were still warm (warm potatoes are more absorbent than cool ones), and then served them up to our tasters.

The salad looked mangled, as the warm potatoes consistently broke apart upon slicing. We had chosen not to peel the potatoes for the sake of convenience and beauty, but the potato skins inevitably tore, leaving unsightly streaks.

And the salad didn't taste much better than it looked. Despite an assertively seasoned vinaigrette, the potatoes

themselves were uniformly bland. Another irksome point was that it was hard to tell when the potatoes were done. Unevenly sized potatoes made it difficult to avoid some over- or undercooked potatoes in the finished dish. This wasn't going to be as easy as we thought.

### French Potato Salad with Dijon

Servings: 4-6

Start to finish: 30 minutes

2 pounds small red potatoes, unpeeled, sliced 1/4 inch thick (Use small red potatoes measuring 1 to 2 inches in diameter)

2 tablespoons salt

1 garlic clove, peeled and threaded on skewer

1/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil

1 1/2 tablespoons

white wine vinegar or Champagne vinegar

2 teaspoons Dijon mustard

1/2 teaspoon pepper

1 small shallot, minced

1 tablespoon minced fresh chervil (If fresh chervil isn't available, substitute an additional 1/2 tablespoon of minced parsley and an additional 1/2 teaspoon of tarragon)

1 tablespoon minced fresh parsley

1 tablespoon minced fresh chives

1 teaspoon minced fresh tarragon

Place potatoes in large saucepan, add water to cover by 1 inch, and bring to boil over high heat. Add salt, reduce heat to simmer, and cook until potatoes are tender and paring knife can be

slipped in and out of potatoes with little resistance, about 6 minutes.

While potatoes are cooking, lower skewered garlic into simmering water and blanch for 45 seconds. Run garlic under cold running water, then remove from skewer and mince.

Reserve 1/4 cup cooking water, then drain potatoes and arrange in tight single layer in rimmed baking sheet. Whisk oil, minced 7/8garlic, vinegar, mustard, pepper, and reserved potato cooking water together in bowl, then drizzle over potatoes. Let potatoes sit until flavors meld, about 10 minutes. (Potatoes can be refrigerated for up to 8 hours; return to room temperature before

serving.)

Transfer potatoes to large bowl. Combine shallot and herbs in small bowl, then sprinkle over potatoes and gently toss to coat using rubber spatula. Serve.

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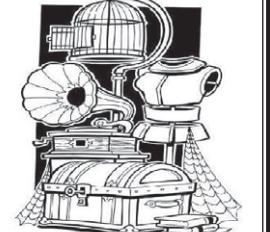
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**Chickpeas make a great veggie burger**

**By AMERICA'S TEST KITCHEN**  
Buttery, nutty chickpeas make a great foundation for a satisfying veggie burger. A touch of curry powder adds a hint of warm spice. Panko are crispy Japanese-style bread crumbs — they help hold the patties together. Process the chickpea mixture just until there are some finely chopped chickpeas (to help the patties hold together) and some larger pieces (for a satisfying texture). Do not overprocess the mixture or the burgers will have a mushy texture. To keep the patties from falling apart, wait until they are well browned on the first side before attempting to flip them.

Follow this recipe with your kids.  
**Crispy Veggie Burgers**  
Servings: 2  
Prep Time: 10 minutes  
Cook Time: 20 minutes  
Prepare Ingredients:  
1 (15-ounce) can

- chickpeas
- 1 large egg
- 2 tablespoons plain Greek yogurt, plus extra for serving
- 2 teaspoons plus 2 teaspoons extra-virgin olive oil, measured separately
- 1/2 teaspoon curry powder
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- Pinch pepper
- 1/3 cup panko bread crumbs
- 3 scallions, sliced thin
- 4 leaves lettuce
- 4 hamburger buns
- Gather Cooking Equipment:
- Colander
- Can opener
- 3/4-cup dry measuring cup
- Medium bowl
- Whisk
- Food processor
- Rubber spatula
- Ruler
- 10-inch nonstick skillet
- Spatula
- Start cooking!
- Set colander in sink.
- Open can of chickpeas and pour into colander.
- Rinse chickpeas with cold water and shake colander to drain well. Measure out

3/4 cup chickpeas; reserve remaining chickpeas for another use.

In medium bowl, whisk egg, yogurt, 2 teaspoons oil, curry powder, salt, and pepper until well combined.

Place 3/4 cup chickpeas, panko, and scallions in food processor. Lock lid in place. Hold down pulse button for 1 second, then release. Repeat until ingredients are roughly chopped with some large pieces remaining, 5 to 8 pulses.

Remove lid and carefully remove food processor blade (ask an adult for help). Transfer chickpea mixture to bowl with egg mixture. Use rubber spatula to gently stir ingredients until just combined.

Use your hands to divide chickpea mixture into 2 lightly packed balls. Gently flatten each ball into circle that measures 4 inches across.

Add remaining 2 teaspoons oil to 10-inch nonstick skillet and swirl skillet to coat evenly with oil. Place patties in skillet and cook over medium heat until well browned on first side, 4 to 6 minutes. Use spatula to gently flip patties (ask an adult for help). Cook until well browned on second side, 4 to 5 minutes. Turn off heat.

Put 1 lettuce leaf inside each bun. Use spatula to slide burgers into buns. Serve with more yogurt (for dipping or spreading inside buns) if you like.

**Home brewing essentials**

Perhaps due to the craft beer boom, which has seen professional brewers experiment with new styles and ingredients, many people have discovered a passion for beer they never knew they had, ultimately motivating them to try to make their own beer at home. The AHA notes that the following are the basics that novice home brewers will need to get started.

**Fermenter:** Fermenters hold the wort as it ferments into beer.

**Airlock and bung:** The airlock inserts into the top of the fermenter, allowing carbon dioxide to escape without letting contaminants in. Some fermenters will require a bung to secure the airlock.

**Brew pot:** Sometimes called the "kettle," the brew pot is where the boiling process takes place. The size of the batch will dictate the size of the brew pot, but the larger the batch, the larger brew pot brewers will need.

**Heat source:** The pre-boil volume needs to be heated up, and a kitchen stove might suffice as a heat source for small batches. But the AHA notes that, as batch size grows, a more powerful heat source might be necessary to ensure timeliness of the heating process.

**Siphon/tubing:** Siphon/tubing makes it easy and less messy to move hot wort and the finished

product around. It's possible to lift and pour the hot wort and finished product, but that increases the risk of spillage. The AHA notes that auto-siphons are an option some home brewers might want to consider.

**Cleaner:** Home brewing materials need to be cleaned thoroughly after each batch. The AHA recommends avoiding scented products, as scents can linger, potentially affecting the flavor and aroma of the finished product.

**Sanitizers:** Sanitizers prevent microorganisms from adversely affecting brewing equipment. Brewers can create their own sanitizer by adding one ounce of bleach per gallon of water, or they can purchase sanitizers at brew shops.

**Hydrometer:** The AHA notes that hydrometers, which measure the gravity and sugar density in water, are not technically necessary to brew beer at home. However, hydrometers allow for close monitoring of fermentation and let home brewers calculate specifications like alcohol content.

These are the essentials necessary to begin a home brewing operation. More information about products necessary for home brewing, including mashing equipment and the bottling process, is available at [www.homebrewersassociation.org](http://www.homebrewersassociation.org).

pepper, to taste

**Grilled Pizza:**

1/2 cup part-skim ricotta cheese

Heat grill to medium heat (350-400 F).

To make Arugula Pesto: In food processor, combine arugula, garlic, lemon juice, red pepper flakes and Parmesan. Pulse until combined then, with food processor on, drizzle in olive oil until pesto forms, scraping down sides as needed. Taste and season with salt and pepper, to taste.

To make Grilled Pizza: Flour pizza dough lightly and stretch or roll to about 1/2-inch thickness (14-16-inch diameter). Sprinkle remaining flour on large rimless baking sheet, pizza peel or pizza stone. Transfer dough to baking surface.

Clean grill grate and grease with oil-soaked paper towel and tongs. Slide dough off baking surface onto grill. Cover and cook until dough is bubbling on top and golden brown on bottom, 2-3 minutes.

Carefully flip dough over using peel or tongs. Remove crust from grill to add toppings. Spread Arugula Pesto over dough. Top with ricotta, ham, corn kernels, onion and Parmesan. Return pizza to grill, cover and cook until toppings are heated through and bottom of crust is crispy, 5-7 minutes.

Remove from grill, slice and serve.

for dinner. How many times have you cut into your turkey to find it is not done, so you put it back in the oven only to remove it later and its turkey leather? With a thermometer you can avoid that and with so many varieties on the market you are sure to find one that works for you. Place the food thermometer in the thickest

part of the food. It should not touch bone, fat, or gristle. Start checking the temperature toward the end of cooking, but before you expect it to be done. Be sure to clean your food thermometer with hot soapy water before and after each use.

texture or quality. This does not mean that the item becomes any less safe after the date.

The "pack" or "born on" date refers to when the product was packaged. It may be used for beer, which can go bad from sunlight after just a few months, or other perishable foods.

A report from the Natural Resource Defense Council and Harvard Law School's Food Law and Policy Clinic says more than 90 percent of Americans throw out food prematurely, and 40%

of the U.S. food supply goes uneaten every year because of food dating.

So how does one avoid getting sick but conserve food resources? By following these guidelines.

Eggs can be consumed three to five weeks after purchase.

Many nonperishable boxed or canned foods can still be enjoyed well beyond the stamped date with no noticeable changes in quality.

Soft cheeses and dairy products generally can last one week past the sell-by date and still be palatable.

Poultry or seafood should be frozen or cooked within a day or

two of its sell-by stamp. Ground meats should be used within two days of purchase because bacteria on the surface of the meat can be mixed throughout the meat during grinding.

Highly acidic canned foods will last a little more than a year, while low-acid foods are usually good for up to five years, say the nutrition experts at Texas A&M University.

Any foods that smell bad, have visible mold growth or seem to have a strange texture should be avoided, even if the date suggests they are fine. Use common sense when determining which foods are safe to eat.

shredded coconut due to illness outbreaks.

The ramifications of food illnesses are significant. The Food and Drug Administration and the CDC reported that 121 people in 25 states became ill in April 2018 from eating romaine lettuce grown in the region of Yuma, Arizona. Forty-six of those individuals were hospitalized, including 10 who developed a type of kidney failure. One person in California died from the sickness.

Increased reporting about foodborne illness outbreaks begs the question as to whether or not more can be done to reduce the spread of these harmful pathogens.

Contamination can occur in various places as food makes its way to dinner tables. Long-term prevention of foodborne illness outbreaks involves the cooperation of many people in the production chain all the way to the consumer, according to the CDC.

Production and harvesting needs to be safe and clean, with efforts to keep food products free of animal waste and sewage contamination.

Inspection of processing plants can help ensure sanitary practices are in place.

Pasteurization, irradiation, canning, and other steps can kill pathogens during food processing.

People who package or prepare foods must properly wash their hands and clean

facilities where food is handled.

Food service workers should not go to work when they are ill.

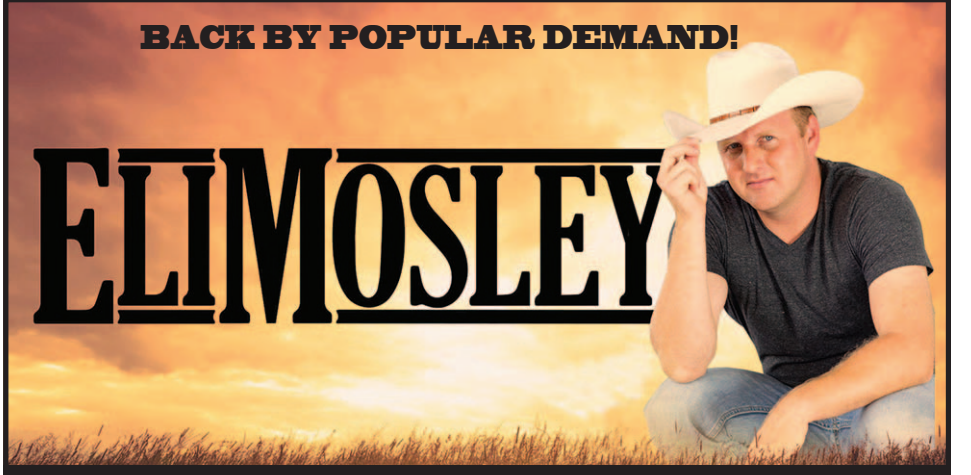
Foods need to be kept at proper temperatures during transport and when on display at stores.

Consumers should be aware of expiration dates and employ proper food handling and cooking measures. These include thoroughly washing produce, and cooking poultry, meats and other foods to the recommended temperatures.

People who experience food poisoning should report each instance to the local or state health department. Identifying symptoms and location can help health officials track illnesses and look for similar exposures.

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## Parkland shooter entitled to inheritance

### Public defender asks to withdraw from case

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. — The Broward County public defender's office has asked to withdraw from confessed Parkland shooter Nikolas Cruz's death penalty case, court records show.

The teen is entitled to half of a nearly \$865,000 life insurance policy as of April 23, the court filing shows.

Gordon Weekes, assistant public defender, said, "We have to withdraw."

The move will throw the criminal case off track. The judge had hoped to begin trial in January.

Weekes said the public defender's office just got new information that Cruz and his

brother are to share in the life insurance policy, presumably for their mother, who died unexpectedly of a flu-like illness in November 2017.

The court will have to determine who his new counsel will be, Weekes said.

The public defender's office is appointed in cases in which people are indigent. Someone with \$400,000 is not indigent.

"I'm sure it will require some time for counsel to get up to speed, but I want to be 100% clear — this delay should not be attributed to the defense or to Nikolas Cruz. He was unaware of this money. We were unaware of this," Weekes said.

It's unclear when or how Cruz, 20, who is locked up in the Broward jail, will get the money.

Weekes said the public defender's office is prohibited from helping him.

Cruz had previously said he wanted any money he was due to go to the victims, Weekes noted.

Weekes said his office will share certain material with the new defense attorney, but it will be up to the new lawyers to determine their strategy for Cruz's defense.

Cruz has pleaded not guilty to the murders of 17 students and staff at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High on Valentine's Day 2018.

Cruz had offered to plead guilty to the crimes if the state attorney's office would take the death penalty off the table and instead agree to life in prison without the possibility of parole.

Prosecutors have declined to do that.

Weekes said there are over 1 million documents in the case and 4 million pieces of paper, in addition to other digital evidence that needs to be put together and transferred to a new lawyer.

It's unclear who Cruz could hire to represent him in a death penalty case for a mere \$400,000.

"The problem becomes how is he going to facilitate retaining counsel," Weekes said. "He has no family members here and he has no outside individuals to help him in that. We cannot help him to identify new counsel or make decisions on what to do with his monies. We're informing the court, we believe he's no longer indigent and as a result we cannot continue our representation."

## Motorist who hit people held on 8 counts attempted murder

### Army veteran appeared to deliberately drive car into people

SUNNYVALE, Calif. — A California man who authorities said drove his car through a crosswalk in a quiet Silicon Valley suburb, hitting seven people and injuring eight, is being held in jail on eight counts of attempted murder.

Sunnyvale Department of Public Safety Chief Phan Ngo said Wednesday that four people remain hospitalized with major injuries, including a 13-year-old Sunnyvale resident who is in critical condition. Six people were taken to area hospitals.

Ngo said there is no evidence linking Isaiah Joel Peoples, a 34-year-old Army veteran, to known terrorist organizations but that the crash appeared deliberate. Peoples was arrested after Tuesday's crash.

"Peoples did not slow down prior to the collision and appeared to accelerate as he moved into the crosswalk," he said, adding they do not have a motive.

The youngest victim was a 9-year-old boy who was treated and released with minor injuries. A 15-year-old boy was treated and released by paramedics. The 13-year-old is a girl, Sunnyvale Department of Public Safety Capt. Jim Choi has said.

Peoples' mother, Leevell Peoples of Sacramento, California, said Wednesday that she couldn't imagine any situation in which her mild-mannered son would deliberately crash into innocent people, other than something related to the PTSD she said he experienced after serving as an Army sharpshooter in Iraq.

"Unless the car malfunctioned, he would not have done that. He's like the perfect, model citizen," she said.

## Boy Scouts could be hit with more sex abuse claims

### Lawyers recruiting clients for new wave of lawsuits

NEW YORK — The lawyers' ads on the internet aggressively seeking clients to file sexual abuse lawsuits give a taste of what lies ahead this year for the Boy Scouts of America: potentially the most fateful chapter in its 109-year history.

Sexual abuse settlements have already strained the Boy Scouts' finances to the point where the organization is exploring "all available options," including Chapter 11 bankruptcy. But now the financial threats have intensified.

The reason: States have been moving in recent months to adjust their statute-of-limitations laws so that victims of long-ago sexual abuse can sue for damages. New York state has passed a law that will allow such lawsuits starting

in August. A similar bill in New Jersey has reached the governor's desk. Bills also are pending in Pennsylvania and California.

In New York and elsewhere, lawyers are hard at work recruiting clients to sue the Boy Scouts, alleging they were molested as youths by scoutmasters or other volunteers.

Plaintiffs' lawyers "recognize that this is a very unique and lucrative opportunity," said attorney Karen Bitar of the Seyfarth Shaw law firm. She formerly handled sex-crime cases as a prosecutor in Brooklyn before going into private practice defending institutions accused of employing alleged sex abusers.

Attorney Tim Kosnoff, a veteran of major sexual abuse lawsuits against the Roman Catholic Church, said Tuesday that he and his team have signed up 186

clients from dozens of states in just the past few weeks who want to be part of litigation against the Boy Scouts. Kosnoff said 166 of them identified alleged abusers who have not been named in any of the Boy Scout files made public in past years.

Boy Scouts spokeswoman Effie Delimarkos said the organization continues to evaluate its financial situation, and she defended its current abuse-prevention policies. The organization serves more than 2.2 million youths.

A bankruptcy by the Boy Scouts could be unprecedented in its complexity, potentially involving plaintiffs in virtually every state, according to several lawyers. It would be national in scope, unlike the various Catholic Church bankruptcy cases in the U.S., which

### Florida House passes bill allowing ex-felon voting rights

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Legislation to restore voting rights to convicted felons except murderers and felony sex offenders has passed the Florida House.

The Republican-dominated House voted 71-45 Wednesday for the bill that would implement a constitutional amendment approved by voters last November. The main issue is whether legislation is needed at all, and whether the bill sets up unnecessary hurdles for ex-felons such as requiring that all fines and restitution be paid.

Republican Rep. Jamie Grant of Tampa, the main sponsor, said completion of a sentence includes probation and any financial obligations ordered by a judge. Opponents said those requirements would bar many former felons and violate the spirit of the constitutional amendment.

The bill now goes to the Senate where a similar measure is pending.

### Florida passes bill aimed at cutting post-hurricane lawsuits

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — A bill aimed at reducing property insurance-related lawsuits that spiked after recent hurricanes is going to Florida Republican Gov. Ron DeSantis.

The Senate passed the bill Wednesday on a 25-14 vote. It makes changes to a law that allows policy holders to sign over their insurance benefits to contractors.

Bill supporters say contractors swooped into areas hit after Hurricane Michael last year and Hurricane Irma in 2017 and convinced homeowners to sign assignment of benefits agreements with the promise that they'd work with the insurance company to get payment for repairs. But supporters say the number of lawsuits related to the assignment of benefits has jumped from just a few hundred a decade ago to more than 18,000 last year.

### Florida lawmakers begin final talks on state budget

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Florida lawmakers have begun their final round of negotiations on a roughly \$90 billion state budget for the fiscal year that begins July 1.

A House-Senate conference committee held its first meeting Tuesday on the only bill the Legislature must pass during the 60-day session that is scheduled to end May 3.

The top two negotiators, Republican Sen. Rob Bradley and GOP Rep. Travis Cummings, say general agreement has been reached for total spending levels in areas ranging from education to health care to transportation. But numerous details on exactly where the money goes still must be worked out.

Subcommittees will meet to iron out those details over the next few days, with items on which agreement is elusive moving up to Bradley and Cummings by Thursday.

### Florida House passes GOP immigration 'sanctuary' ban bill

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — The Florida House passed a high-profile Republican bill Wednesday requiring local law enforcement agencies to cooperate with federal immigration authorities and banning so-called "sanctuary city" policies that shield immigrants who are arrested.

After hours of debate over two days, the GOP-led House voted 69-47 largely along party lines for the measure, sending it over to the Senate where a similar bill is pending.

Florida doesn't currently have any formal "sanctuary cities" like those in other states. The bill sponsored by GOP Rep. Cord Byrd of Jacksonville Beach would ban those policies and require local authorities to honor detainer requests from U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement that can lead to a person's deportation.

In addition to mandating cooperation with federal

authorities, the bill would permit local officials who allow sanctuary city policies to be suspended or removed from office, and permit fines up to \$5,000 a day for violations.

Similar legislation passed the House last year, but the Senate version did not get a floor vote. This year the measure appears to have enough momentum for final passage in both chambers.

### Florida House sends firefighter cancer aid bill to governor

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — The Florida House has sent Gov. Ron DeSantis a bill providing new benefits to firefighters who are diagnosed with cancer.

The bill unanimously passed Wednesday would provide firefighters with benefits including full cost of treatment, a \$25,000 payout, disability pay and death benefits for beneficiaries. The Senate passed it Tuesday.

The bill would treat cancer and cancer deaths like on-the-job injuries and deaths. It is a top priority for Chief Financial Officer Jimmy Patronis, the state's fire marshal.

The bill failed for years. Republican Sen. Anitere Flores said some version of it has been filed since 2003. It almost died this year because the House wasn't going to take it up, but last week Speaker Jose Oliva acknowledged pressure to pass it and allowed it to be considered.

### DeSantis signs death warrant for serial killer

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis has signed a death warrant for serial killer Bobby Joe Long.

The warrant signed late Tuesday sets Long's execution for May 23 at Florida State Prison. It was the first death warrant DeSantis signed since becoming governor in January.

Long has been on death row nearly 34 years. The 65-year-old received the death penalty for the May 1984 death of 22-year-old Michelle Denise Simms, a former beauty contestant from California. He was arrested later that year in the

kidnapping of a 17-year-old girl who managed to convince him to let her go. She gave police information that led to his arrest.

He eventually pleaded guilty to killing eight other women in the Tampa area and claimed to have raped 40 women in three states.

### Twist of fate: Officer helps catch teen who assaulted him

SARASOTA, Fla. (AP) — Authorities say a shooting reunited a Florida police officer and a teenager who had previously assaulted him.

Sarasota Police say two teens, ages 16 and 15, were arrested for trying to rob another teen Tuesday when they accidentally fired a gun and wounded a third teen. Police spokeswoman Genevieve Judge said the unidentified officer helped the 15-year-old victim who had been shot in the arm and also helped detain the suspect.

The Sarasota Herald-Tribune reports the teen was involved in assaulting the officer in an off-duty incident in February.

The victim was taken to the hospital by helicopter and is expected to survive. The two teens were charged with robbery and additional charges may be coming.

### Judge mistakenly frees inmate headed to federal prison

MELBOURNE, Fla. (AP) — Authorities say a man who was sentenced to 23 years in federal prison for armed carjacking is back in custody after being accidentally released from prison.

Brevard County Sheriff's spokesman Tod Goodyear tells the Orlando Sentinel that 29-year-old Cedrick Gant turned himself over to U.S. Marshals in Orlando on Monday afternoon. He was sentenced in February after pleading guilty to carjacking.

Records show Gant was transferred from the Lake County Jail to the Brevard County Jail last week to face sentencing on a violation of probation charge in a separate

case. A judge credited him for time served and released him.

### Deputy fired for kicking inmate in trouble for feeding bird

CLEARWATER, Fla. (AP) — A Florida deputy has been fired and charged with battery after a video allegedly shows him kicking an inmate who was doing push-ups as punishment.

Pinellas County Sheriff Bob Gualtieri says 31-year-old inmate Mario Christo got in trouble for feeding a bird a cookie during trash duty and was ordered to do push-ups. The sheriff said Deputy James Moran cursed and ordered the inmate to "drop" and do 50 push-ups. The video shows Christo doing more than 20 before he is kicked in the side by Deputy Moran.

The incident happened in January. The sheriff called the deputy's behavior "outside the bounds," saying "we don't treat people this way."

The Orlando Sentinel reports Christos was serving a sentence for disorderly conduct. He made the complaint after being released this month.

Moran was terminated and charged Tuesday with battery.

### Landslide win for lesbian former police chief as Tampa mayor

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — Tampa's openly gay former police chief has been elected mayor in a landslide victory.

Voters elected 59-year-old Jane Castor in a runoff against 76-year-old retired banker and philanthropist David Stratz.

Castor said her victory with more than 73% of the 53,144 votes cast on Tuesday sends "a resounding message that Tampa is a positive community."

Castor is Tampa's first openly gay mayor-elect. She had come within 2 percentage points of winning the March 5 general election.

## Kim arrives by train in Russia for his Putin summit

VLADIVOSTOK, Russia (AP) — North Korea's Kim Jong Un and Russian President Vladimir Putin have high hopes for their first one-on-one meeting Thursday in far-eastern Russia, which comes amid deadlocked global diplomacy over the North Korean leader's nuclear program.

Kim is looking for a win after his failed second summit with U.S. President Donald Trump, and Putin for a chance to raise Moscow's clout in the region and gain more leverage with Washington.

Kim arrived Wednesday aboard an armored train and told Russia's state-owned Rossiya-24 he was hoping for a "successful and useful" visit and would like to discuss with Putin the "settlement of the situation in the Korean Peninsula" as well as bilateral ties with Russia.

It was Kim's first visit to Russia as North Korean leader; his late father, Kim Jong Il, visited Russia in 2011. The North Korean leader evoked his father's "great love for Russia" and said that he intends to strengthen ties between the two countries.

"I have heard a lot about your country and have long dreamt of visiting it," Kim was quoted as saying at his first stop, Russia's Khasan train station, near the border with North Korea. "It's been seven years since I took the helm, and I've only just managed to visit."

He then traveled on to the Russian Pacific port city of Vladivostok, the site of the summit, where he was greeted by a military orchestra as he stepped out

of his khaki-green armored train. Dressed in a black coat and clutching a black fedora, he then got into his personal limousine, which travels with him, and drove away.

Putin's foreign affairs adviser, Yuri Ushakov, told Russian media the Putin-Kim summit would focus on North Korea's nuclear program, noting that Russia will seek to "consolidate the positive trends" stemming from Trump's meetings with Kim.

In February, Kim's second summit with Trump in Hanoi ended without any agreement because of disputes over U.S.-led sanctions. There have since been no publicly known high-level contacts between the U.S. and North Korea, although both sides say they are still open to a third summit.

Kim wants the U.S. to ease the sanctions to reciprocate for some partial disarmament steps he took last year. But the U.S. maintains the sanctions will stay in place until North Korea makes more significant

denuclearization moves.

Some experts say Kim could try to bolster his country's ties with Russia and China. Others say it's not clear how big of a role Russia can play in efforts to restart the nuclear negotiations. Still, the summit could allow Putin to try to increase his influence in regional politics and the standoff over North Korea's nuclear program.

"Kim wants to show that he's cooperating with Russia too, rather than looking to only the U.S. and China. But I think it's not easy for Russia and China to provide North Korea with practical assistance that leads to the inflow of dollars," said Chon Hyun-joon, a former senior researcher at the Korea Institute for National Unification in Seoul.

North Korea has increasingly expressed frustration at the deadlocked negotiations. Last week, North Korea tested a new weapon and demanded that U.S. Secretary of State Mike Pompeo be removed from the nuclear talks.

## In Mexico, migrants turn to 'The Beast' after highway raids

IXTEPEC, Mexico (AP) — The train known as "The Beast" is once again rumbling through the night loaded with people headed toward the U.S. border after a raid on a migrant caravan threatened to end the practice of massive highway marches through Mexico.

A long freight train loaded with about 300 to 400 migrants pulled out of the southern city of Ixtepec on Tuesday. They sat atop rattling boxcars and clung precariously to ladders alongside the clanking couplings. Most were young men, along with a few dozen women and children. Mothers clambered up the railings clutching their infants.

The train known in Spanish as "La Bestia," which runs from the southern border state of Chiapas into neighboring Oaxaca and north into Gulf coast state Veracruz, carried migrants north for decades, despite its notorious dangers: People

died or lost limbs falling from the train. Mexican authorities started raiding the trains to pull migrants off in mid-2014 and the number of Central Americans aboard the train fell to a smattering.

But about a week ago, a longtime migrant rights activist, the Rev. Alejandro Solalinde, noticed a change: Large numbers of migrants started getting off the train in Ixtepec, the Oaxaca town where his Brothers on the Road shelter is located.

Many had waited weeks for Mexican visas that never materialized, and simply decided to head north without papers. Others were part of a 3,000-person migrant caravan that was broken up in a raid Monday by federal police and immigration agents on a highway east of Ixtepec.

With dozens of police and immigration checkpoints dotting the highways, many migrants now view the train as a

safer, albeit still risky, way to reach the U.S. border.

"They're riding the train again, that's a fact," said Solalinde, who shelter now houses about 300 train-riding migrants. "It's going to go back to the way it was, the (Mexican) government doesn't want them to be seen. If the migrants move quietly like a stream of little ants, they'll allow them to, but they are not going to allow them to move through Mexico publicly or massively" as they did with the large caravans that began in October. In fact, Solalinde predicts "they're not going to allow caravans anymore."

In Florida's raid, federal police and agents detained 371 people, wrestling men, women and children into patrol trucks and vans off, presumably to begin deportation proceedings. Many other migrants abandoned the road and fled into the surrounding countryside.



# Trump threatens more troops to border after Mexico incident

## Mexican soldiers confronted U.S. personnel

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump renewed his threat Wednesday to send more troops to the U.S.-Mexico border following an incident in which Mexican soldiers confronted U.S. personnel. Mexico blamed the incident on confusion, and said it was not looking for confrontation with the U.S.

In morning tweets, Trump said, “Mexico’s Soldiers recently pulled guns on our National Guard Soldiers,” claiming, without evidence, that it was done “probably as a diversionary tactic for drug smugglers on the Border.”

“Better not happen again!” he added. “We are now sending ARMED SOLDIERS to the Border. Mexico is not doing nearly enough in apprehending & returning!”

Trump last year dispatched U.S. troops to the border to assist border personnel in response to several caravans of Central American migrants traveling through Mexico in hopes of reaching the U.S. Many are already armed.

Earlier this month, two U.S. soldiers in a remote area of Texas were confronted by Mexican soldiers who thought the Americans had crossed into Mexico.

The Mexican troops reportedly removed a weapon from one of the American soldiers. U.S. Northern Command, which manages military support for Customs and Border Protection, said the Americans were in a CBP vehicle in a remote area of U.S. territory south of the border wall but north of the actual border.

“After a brief discussion between the soldiers from the two nations, the Mexican military members departed the area,” Northern Command said in a statement about the encounter.

Mexican President Andrés Manuel López Obrador promised to investigate the incident at a Wednesday news conference.

“We are not going to fight with the government of the United States,” he said. “The most important thing is that we want a relationship of mutual respect and cooperation for development.”

Mexico’s foreign relations department characterized the incident as “routine” confusion in an area where the line separating the two countries is unclear.

While not every U.S. service member deployed to the border is armed, many — including those performing the “mobile surveillance camera” mission, like the two confronted by the Mexican soldiers — are armed for self-protection.

# US stock indexes finish slightly lower a day after record

U.S. stocks closed slightly lower Wednesday as the market gave back some of its gains a day after the S&P 500 and Nasdaq hit record highs.

Energy stocks led the modest slide as crude oil prices fell after a three-day rally. Communications companies also helped pull the market lower, offsetting gains in real estate and other sectors. Bond prices rose as traders took a more defensive approach.

Stocks wavered between small gains and losses through much of the day as investors continued to wade through a steady flow of corporate earnings. Analysts have been expecting a contraction in first-quarter corporate profits, but the results so far have been mostly solid.

That trend continued Wednesday with strong reports from e-commerce company eBay, industrial giant Caterpillar and health insurer Anthem.

“The pace of earnings beats is at a very nice level, certainly exceeding diminished expectations,” said Eric Wiegand, senior portfolio manager for Private Wealth Management at U.S. Bank. “The strength of the dollar has been, perhaps, a little bit of a weight on markets today.”

The S&P 500 index fell 6.43 points, or 0.2%, to 2,927.25. The benchmark index closed at a record high on Tuesday. The Dow Jones Industrial Average dropped 59.34 points, or 0.2%, to 26,597.05. The Nasdaq composite lost 18.81 points, or 0.2%, to 8,102.01. The index was also coming off a record high close.

Small-company stocks fared better than the rest of the market. The Russell 2000 index picked up 3.04 points, or 0.2%, to 1,588.13.

Despite the overall decline in the major indexes, slightly more stocks rose than fell on the New York Stock Exchange. Major European stock indexes finished mostly lower.

Bond prices rose. The yield on the 10 year Treasury note fell to 2.52% from 2.57% late Tuesday.

The U.S. stock market mounted a strong recovery this year after finishing 2018 in a steep slump fueled by fears of recession, an escalating trade war between the U.S. and China, and concern the Federal Reserve was moving too aggressively to raise interest rates.

Those worries have been mostly quelled this year amid greater confidence in the economy and reassurances that the Fed is unlikely to raise interest rates this year.

# Illinois boy found buried in grave; parents charged with murder

## 5-year-old who lived amid dog feces discovered buried wrapped in plastic

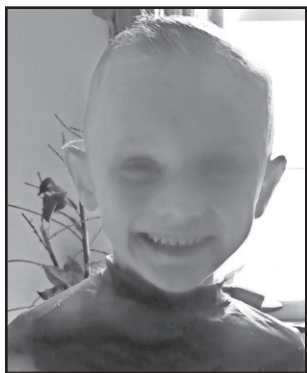
CRYSTAL LAKE, Ill. (AP) — Authorities searching for a missing 5-year-old Illinois boy who had lived in deplorable conditions dug up his body Wednesday and charged his parents with murder, sadly declaring that the youngster would “no longer have to suffer.”

The body, believed to be that of Andrew “AJ” Freund, was covered in plastic and buried in a shallow grave in a rural area of Woodstock in McHenry County, Crystal Lake police Chief James Black said.

Black said investigators went to the site after they interviewed the boy’s parents overnight and presented them with cellphone evidence. Woodstock is about 50 miles northwest of Chicago and a few miles from the family’s home in Crystal Lake.

“This is not the outcome that we want to talk about ... but it is the unfortunate result,” said Jeffrey Sallet, who runs the FBI in northern Illinois.

The parents, Andrew Freund Sr. and JoAnn Cunningham, each face charges of first-degree murder and other crimes. An email seeking comment was sent to Cunningham’s lawyer. It wasn’t immediately known

if Freund has a lawyer.

The couple reported AJ missing last Thursday, telling officers they had last seen him at bedtime the previous night. Freund told a dispatcher that they’d checked “closets, the basement, the garage, everywhere,” but investigators quickly knocked down the possibility of a kidnapping.

Speaking to reporters, Black had a message for AJ’s relatives: “It is my hope that you may have some solace in knowing that AJ is no longer suffering and his killers have been brought to justice.”

Crystal Lake police had visited the house over the years, according to records released by the department. One report described the home as littered with dog feces and urine, including a child’s bedroom where the “smell of feces was overwhelming.” Another report said the house was “cluttered, dirty and in disrepair,” and sometimes without electricity.

# Boeing’s troubled jet is costing \$1B to fix so far

## That doesn’t cover costs associated with accidents

Boeing is already estimating a \$1 billion increase in costs related to its troubled 737 Max and has pulled its forecast of 2019 earnings because of uncertainty surrounding the jetliner, which remains grounded after two crashes that killed 346 people.

The \$1 billion figure is a conservative starting point. It covers increased production costs over the next few years but does not include the company’s spending to fix software implicated in the crashes, additional pilot training, payments to airlines for grounded jets, or compensation for families of the dead passengers.

The estimate was disclosed Wednesday in a presentation for investors as Boeing released first-quarter financial results, which missed Wall Street expectations.

While lacking many details, the disclosures gave the clearest picture yet of the financial damage that the accidents are causing to the aerospace giant.

Boeing CEO Dennis Muilenburg repeated that the company is making progress on updating key

flight-control software in the Max with the goal of convincing regulators to let the plane fly again.

Chicago-based Boeing Co. said its previously issued full-year guidance didn’t account for 737 Max impacts. It plans to issue new guidance at a future date.

The company also said it is suspending stock buybacks. Boeing spent \$2.3 billion in the first quarter to buy its own stock, which is designed to make remaining shares more valuable.

Investors and consumers have been scrutinizing Boeing since Max jets crashed in October and March. The accidents have damaged the company’s reputation for safety, caused the worldwide grounding of about 370 Max jets, and raised questions about the U.S. government’s approval of the plane in 2017.

In January, Boeing projected full-year adjusted earnings of about \$20 a share. After the company’s announcement that it was cutting production of the Max, however, analysts had dropped their forecast all the way to \$16.40 on average, according to FactSet.

On a conference call, Muilenburg defended the company after an analyst asked how Boeing got in

this spot. The CEO disputed the notion that Boeing engineers and federal regulators may not have fully understood how pilots would interact with new anti-stall software called MCAS.

“There was no surprise or gap or unknown here, or something that somehow slipped through a certification process,” Muilenburg said.

“We also know there are areas where we can improve,” he added, explaining why Boeing is now upgrading MCAS with changes that will limit the software’s ability to automatically force the plane’s nose down powerfully in some circumstances.

Executives gave no update on a timetable for regulatory approval of the software fix and pilot-training program. The company has completed test flights, and the next crucial step is a certification flight with Federal Aviation Administration representatives on board.

Preliminary reports indicate that faulty sensor readings triggered MCAS and pushed the nose down in both the Oct. 29 crash of a Lion Air jet off the coast of Indonesia and the March 10 crash of an Ethiopian Airlines Max.

# Former Chris Christie deputy chief Bridget Kelly gets 13 months in prison for Bridgegate scheme

NEWARK, N.J. — The woman who wrote the infamous “time for some traffic problems in Fort Lee” email that launched the so-called Bridgegate revenge scheme must serve 13 months in prison, a judge ordered Wednesday.

Bridget Anne Kelly, a former deputy chief of staff to New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie, was sentenced by U.S. District Judge Susan D. Wigenton, who presided over the 2016 trial in which Kelly was found guilty of conspiracy, wire fraud and civil rights violations. It was the second time Kelly was sentenced in federal court, and came after years of appeals.

Kelly could report to prison in July, but she is appealing her conviction to the U.S. Supreme Court in an effort to have her conviction overturned.

In brief remarks after the trial, Kelly said that while her legal fate is now in the hands of the nine Supreme Court justices, her moral fight will continue by telling “the truth” about her former boss, who she said “was powerful enough to approve this act” of closing two lanes to the bridge in Fort Lee. Prosecutors said the lane reductions were done to punish the town’s mayor for not endorsing Christie’s re-election.

“Mr. Christie, you are a bully and the days of you calling me a liar and destroying my life are over,”

Kelly said, reading from prepared remarks. “The truth will be heard — and for the former governor, the truth will be inescapable, regardless of lucrative television deals or even future campaigns. I plan to make sure of that.”

Christie was not charged or found to have had knowledge of the traffic scheme. A spokeswoman for Christie did not immediately respond to a message seeking a reaction to Kelly’s comments.

But Wigenton made it clear at sentencing that no matter how Kelly was described — as a “functionary” by Christie in his book or as a high-ranking official by prosecutors — she was convicted of crimes that warrant prison time.

“People spent hours, for days, trying to get to work, kids trying to get to school all because of this,” Wigenton said. Then, playing off the subtitle of Christie’s book, “Let Me Finish: Trump, the Kushners, Bannon, New Jersey and the Power of In-Your-Face Politics,” Wigenton said, “I guess that’s the power of in-your-face politics. It wasn’t acceptable then. It isn’t acceptable today.”

An appeals court threw out the civil rights violations against Kelly and her co-defendant, Bill Baroni, last November. Kelly had originally been sentenced by Wigenton to 18 months, but following the appellate ruling she cut five months off the sentence Wednesday.

Baroni gave up his appeals and

reported to prison earlier this month. The former deputy executive director of the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey was accused of working with Kelly and David Wildstein, then a top agency official, to realign traffic at the George Washington Bridge in 2013 as political payback against the Democratic mayor of Fort Lee, Mark Sokolich.

It was Kelly who wrote the “time for some traffic problems in Fort Lee” email that prosecutors said set the revenge plot in motion. But she and Baroni said during the 2016 trial that they were duped by Wildstein, who pleaded guilty and is currently writing about New Jersey politics while serving probation.

Michael Critchley, an attorney for Kelly, invoked Wildstein’s name several times during the re-sentencing, lumping him into a group he referred to as the “Boys of Bridgegate.” Those men, which included Christie, were able to walk away from the scandal with light or no punishment.

He referred to Wildstein returning to running a website about New Jersey politics, which he did before he was hired at the Port Authority, as a reason why Kelly should be treated with leniency.

“The fate of David Wildstein turned out fine. He’s living large,” Critchley said. Later, he added, “When you compare Bridget Kelly with the Boys of Bridgegate, the disparities are still great.”

# Woman killed when she falls into meat grinder at work

MUNCY, Pa. (AP) — Authorities say a woman was killed when she fell into a meat grinder at a processing plant in northern Pennsylvania.

It’s not clear what caused the accident at the Economy Locker Storage Company in Muncy.

The Lycoming County coroner’s office says 35-year-old Jill Greninger apparently fell around 11:30 a.m. Monday. Her body was found by a co-worker who heard strange noises coming from the commercial machine.

Authorities say Greninger may have been standing on a set of wheeled stairs prior to the fatal accident.

Company officials have not responded to media requests for comment.

The death is being investigated by the federal Occupational Safety and Health Administration.

# Advice to a 7-year-old interested in becoming a doctor

**DEAR DR. ROACH:** My 7-year-old grandson has a question: "How can I be a science doctor like you? Thank you, Colton Fancher from Florida" — C.F.

**DEAR COLTON:** Being a doctor is great — I wouldn't change it for any other job — but it isn't right for everyone. It's also a hard road that takes years of dedication.

The first part is the desire, and it sounds like you have that already.

You mention science, and science is the cornerstone of medical doctors' work. Clinical doctors like me (those who see patients) use science, but generally, we don't create science. Research doctors create science, and a few people have chosen to be both clinical doctors and scientists — but only a very, very few are good at both.

Still, learning your science is something you can start now. But that doesn't just mean working hard in science classes at school. I'd

suggest you get some books from your library about science and see what part of science you like. As you get older, you can participate in science clubs and fairs. Colleges, and eventually medical schools, like to see your interest in science. Participating outside of school is a powerful way of both showing your interest and helping you find out what you like.

All doctors have to be good communicators, so that means being a good writer and speaker. This

is also a skill that takes practice. My English teachers inspired a love in me for reading and writing that continues. One of my high school English teachers reads my column (Hi, Shannon!), a fact of which I am proud.

Clinician doctors in particular should be good with people. That means being a good listener, showing respect and taking the time to really getting to know people. One of the best parts of being a doctor is getting to know many people and hearing them talk honestly about parts of themselves that they don't usually talk much about.

Do you like sports? Because being a good member of a team is increasingly important for doctors. You want to excel, of course, but you want to help your teammates excel as well. The dean of the medical school I went to, Joseph Ceithaml, was well-known for admitting those students who participated in team sports.

Medical schools also want to see people who are well-rounded, and that means acquiring other skills and passions outside of school and science. Playing a musical instrument, making art of whatever kind you like, and finding other ways to express yourself creatively all are important in becoming a well-rounded person. Reading for fun can lead you into many different worlds and inspire passions, and you will learn a great deal about people from reading histories, biographies and novels.

You might wonder where you find the time for all of this. It takes dedication, but it also means you make the most out of every day. Find worthwhile things to do. Academics, sure, as well as the other things I mentioned, but also develop close friendships. Try new things. And don't waste too much time with things that you don't enjoy and won't help you achieve your goal.

# Teen loses motivation as peers progress by cheating

My concern is Brent routinely reports blatant and widespread cheating throughout the school.

# Ex-Florida gov candidate Gillum fined in ethics case

## Gillum allegedly accepted gift from a lobbyist

MIAMI (AP) — Former gubernatorial candidate Andrew Gillum agreed Wednesday to pay a \$5,000 fine to settle an ethics complaint that he violated civil law by accepting a gift from a lobbyist, and the state Ethics Commission agreed to drop four additional counts of violations, his attorney said.

The settlement, announced in Tallahassee just as Gillum was to go before an administrative hearing, ends a lengthy ethics investigation that factored heavily in the Democratic candidate's unsuccessful campaign for governor last year.

Republican then-candidate Ron DeSantis repeatedly criticized Gillum over the allegations, which involved the former Tallahassee mayor's travel to New York and Costa Rica and his alleged acceptance of a free ticket to the Broadway show "Hamilton." Gillum denied the accusations at the time.

Gillum attorney Barry Richard said Gillum agreed

to a count of accepting a lobbyist's gift worth more than \$100, and that it involved a free boat ride of about an hour and a half for a party of seven around Manhattan.

Gillum said in a statement Wednesday that he "never knowingly violated any ethics laws. Once I was made aware of one issue, I took responsibility."

Now a CNN commentator and a campaigner for voter registration, Gillum said he would get back to work.

"I'm eager to get back to the work of registering and re-engaging one million new Florida voters before 2020," he said.

# US eases effects of sanctions on Iran's elite guard force

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Trump administration on Wednesday granted important exemptions to new sanctions on Iran's Revolutionary Guard, watering down the effects of the measures while also eliminating an aspect that would have complicated U.S. foreign policy efforts.

Foreign governments and businesses that have dealings with the Revolutionary Guard and its affiliates will not be subject to a ban on U.S. travel under waivers outlined by Secretary of State Mike Pompeo in two notices published in the Federal Register.

That weakens the effect of the measures and will frustrate members of Congress backing tough measures against Iran who are already concerned that the Trump administration won't fully enforce sanctions on Iranian oil. But it lifts the threat that those who work with the U.S. in Iraq and Lebanon, where the Guard's subsidiaries are active, will face the

full weight of American penalties.

The waivers leave intact sanctions that apply directly to Iran's Revolutionary Guard and its proxies, the first agencies of a foreign government that have ever been designated a foreign terrorist organization by the United States. The designation, which took effect April 15, is part of a broader administration effort to increase pressure on Tehran.

Iranian Foreign Minister Mohammad Javad Zarif, speaking Wednesday in New York, said the administration is creating dangerous conditions with its campaign against Tehran. "Iranians are allergic to pressure," he said, adding that he believes the conflict can be resolved diplomatically.

Under U.S. immigration law, foreigners found to have provided designated foreign terrorist organizations with "material support" can be banned from the U.S.

# Nora Roberts sues Brazilian author, cites 'multi-plagiarism'

NEW YORK (AP) — Best-selling novelist Nora Roberts is suing a Brazilian writer for copyright infringement, alleging that Cristiane Serruya has committed "multi-plagiarism" on a "rare and scandalous" level.

In papers filed Wednesday morning in Rio de Janeiro, where Serruya lives, Roberts called Serruya's romance books "a literary patchwork, piecing together phrases whose form portrays emotions practically identical to those expressed in the plaintiff's books." Citing Brazilian law, Roberts is asking for damages at 3,000 times the value of the highest sale price for any Serruya

work mentioned in the lawsuit.

"If you plagiarize, I will come for you," Roberts told The Associated Press during a recent telephone interview. "If you take my work, you will pay for it and I will do my best to see you don't write again."

Roberts added that she would donate any damages from the lawsuit to a literacy program in Brazil.

In a telephone interview Wednesday with the AP, Serruya called herself a "fanatic" of Roberts' work. She denied copying her and said she had not received notification of any lawsuit. Serruya added that she often used ghost writers for parts of her books and "could not

guarantee that no part was copied" by them.

"My books are big. In a book of 120,000 words it's difficult to know how many supposedly came from a work of Nora Roberts," she said.

Serruya's novels, all apparently self-published, include the series "Shades of Trust," "Shades of Love" and "Ever More." The court papers cite six Serruya books for including lifted passages: "Royal Love," "Royal Affair," "Unbroken Love," "Hot Winter," "Forever More" and "From the Baroness's Diary." The lawsuit alleges Serruya copied passages from Roberts' "Unfinished Business," "River Ends" and

"Whiskey Beach," and includes examples of close similarities between their books. Roberts' suit alleges that Serruya has copied passages from dozens of other authors too.

Speaking to the AP, Roberts also criticized Amazon.com for not being more vigilant about the books sold on its site. Roberts and authors have complained that Amazon's Kindle Unlimited e-book subscription program, for which royalties are based on how many pages are read the first time the customer reads them, is an incentive for unscrupulous writers to quickly throw together material from other sources.

have unfolded diocese by diocese.

"A Boy Scout bankruptcy would be bigger in scale than any other sex abuse bankruptcy," said Seattle-based attorney Mike Pfau, whose firm is representing more than 300 victims in New York state.

Jeffrey Schwartz, a New York-based bankruptcy expert with the firm McKool Smith, said the Boy Scouts don't have a particularly large flow of cash and might be forced to sell off property in bankruptcy. The Boy Scouts have extensive land holdings, including camping and hiking terrain.

"They'll play for time," Schwartz said. "If their defense costs and settlement costs are greater than their membership fees, it could be a death spiral."

However, Dallas-based trial attorney Michelle Simpson Tuelgel, part of a team representing numerous sex abuse survivors, said bankruptcy might benefit the Boy Scouts and reduce any payouts to plaintiffs.

"It can be a tool that these institutions use to shield assets and avoid having to reveal some information," she said. "In many ways, it's a disservice to victims."

Illustrating the depth of its problems, the Boy Scouts filed lawsuits last year against six of its own insurers, saying they have improperly refused to cover some of the sex abuse liabilities incurred by the organization. The insurers say the coverage obligation is voided because the Boy Scouts failed to take

effective preventive measures such as warning parents that scouts might be abused. The suits are still pending.

The intensifying pressures on the Boy Scouts coincide with the mounting threats to its U.S. Catholic Church in regard to its own long-running sex abuse scandal. Catholic bishops will be meeting in Baltimore in June to discuss the next steps.

Both the church and the Boy Scouts are iconic, historically well-respected institutions now known as having been magnets for pedophiles trying to exploit the trust of boys and their parents.

"When you cloak people in badges of respect, you create the perfect opportunity for bad people to get access to children," said Chris Hurley, whose Chicago law firm is representing 11 former scouts in sex abuse trials scheduled on a monthly basis this year.

Another common denominator for the Catholic Church and Boy Scouts: Both kept voluminous secret files with names of suspected abusers, yet balked at sharing the information with the public.

Since the 1920s, the Boy Scouts have been compiling "ineligible files," which list adult volunteers considered to pose a risk of child molestation. About 5,000 of these files have been made public as a result of court action; others remain confidential.

Delimarkos said when any BSA volunteer is added to the database for suspected abuse, "they are reported to law enforcement, removed entirely from any Scouting program and prohibited from re-joining anywhere."

# Boy Scouts of America hits back at allegations of child sexual abuse cover-up

(TNS) — The Boy Scouts of America defended itself Wednesday against allegations that it has for years kept secret the names of abusers and the volume of abuse in its popular programs.

Despite the financial pressure of lawsuits from child sexual assault victims, leaders from the venerable youth organization said the rate of incidents of reported abuse in its organization is less than society as a whole.

And, the much-ballyhooed "perversion files" that lawyers claim lists more than 7,000 sexually abusive Boy Scout leaders across the country is really a database the organization has used for decades to weed out potential predators.

Chief Scout Executive Michael Surbaugh said its database has been "mischaracterized," and is actually a cutting-edge tool that has kept children safe.

"We steadfastly believe even one instance of abuse is too many," Surbaugh said in a conference call with news reporters. "We do not keep any reports of suspected abusers hidden from law enforcement."

A day earlier, a lawyer for alleged victims accused the scout group of covering up the scope of abuse in the organization.

Jeff Anderson, whose Manhattan law firm specializes in child sexual abuse cases, said the Boy Scouts have files on pedophiles within their ranks dating back to the 1940s. He said the records include the names of more than 12,000 victims.

Surbaugh acknowledged that looming lawsuits against the Boy Scouts have threatened the 109-year-old organization's financial stability.

Sexual abuse settlements have already strained the Boy Scouts' finances to the point where the organization is exploring "all available options," including Chapter 11 bankruptcy, he said.

And new laws, like New York's Child Victims Act, adjust statute-of-limitations timelines so that victims of long-ago sexual abuse can sue for damages. The law goes into effect in August.

## Snell has short stint in return from broken toe

Tampa Bay ace pulled in 4th inning after first start since suffering fracture April 14

ST. PETERSBURG — Blake Snell was frustrated with his performance, but at least his toe came through OK.

The Tampa Bay ace Blake Snell lasted one out into the fourth inning in his return from a broken right fourth toe as the Rays lost 10-2 to the Kansas City Royals on Wednesday.

"It's fine," Snell said of his toe. "Happy to get back out there. It was a game where I felt just different. I felt good but it was weird. I spiked some fastballs and I never do that."

The reigning AL Cy Young Award winner, who hurt the toe attempting to move a decorative display in his bathroom on April 14, allowed three runs, five hits and two walks and struck out three

during a 65-pitch outing.

"Probably the only good thing to come out of this game was that Blake got to 65 pitches, so he should be pretty close to full-go his next time," Rays manager Kevin Cash said. "From a health standpoint he was a 100-percent fine."

The left-hander (2-2) had given up one run and nine hits over 19 innings in three starts before the injury.

Adalberto Mondesi hit a three-run homer and drove in four runs, Billy Hamilton had two hits and two RBIs and Jakob Junis gave up one run and four hits in five innings for the Royals, who stopped a five-game losing streak.

Junis (2-2) bruised his right hand on Yandy Diaz's drive that resulted in an inning-ending double-play in the fifth.

His hand was swollen

but tests showed no fracture.

"Just a little nerve in there that's pinching," Junis said.

Snell, signed to a \$50 million, five year contract on March 21, said Tuesday that he still had some discomfort in the toe when he walks, but not when throwing off a mound.

The Rays decided that Snell was ready to return despite throwing just an 18-pitch bullpen session Saturday and eight pitches off a mound Monday.

Snell was replaced by Ryan Yarbrough with a runner on third and one out in the fourth.

"I knew they were a selective team but they were aggressive to start and then went back to selective," Snell said. "I threw a lot of good pitches that, they just almost looked like they knew what was coming."

## Arians sees six 'generational' players in draft

Tampa Bay expected to take defensive player with fifth pick tonight, unlikely to trade down

TAMPA — It comes down to math. Bucs coach Bruce Arians says there are six "generational" players in the NFL draft, and his team picks fifth overall. So, in summation, he says he's not inclined to trade down.

"There would have to be some hellacious picks," Arians said. "There's five guys on the board I love. You'd have to throw the bank and open the vault for (general manager) Jason (Licht) to move down. I'm not saying that we wouldn't. Just looking at the guys that are there, there's really six guys that are once-in-a-generation type players. I'm feeling great about this draft."

It's not hard to speculate which six players Arians considers "generational" talents. Most likely they include several defensive players: Ohio State defensive end Nick Bosa, Alabama defensive tackle Quinnen Williams, Kentucky edge rusher Josh Allen, Houston defensive lineman Ed Oliver, Louisiana State linebacker Devin White and perhaps either Michigan linebacker Devin Bush, Oklahoma quarterback Kyler Murray or Mississippi State edge rusher Montez Sweat.

"His tape is great," Arians said of Murray. "The only thing I will say is a negative is he's a one-year player. One-year players have scared me in the past. He is dynamic, and I wouldn't

want to chase him around."

The Bucs' biggest needs are on defense. With the team seemingly ready to move on from defensive tackle Gerald McCoy, defensive tackle would appear to be a big need. But the Bucs also lost middle linebacker Kwon Alexander to the 49ers in free agency. While the Bucs have no shortage of edge rushers with Jason Pierre-Paul, Carl Nassib, Shaq Barrett and Noah Spence, Arians said you need to draft the best available player regardless of position.

"No. Listen. You can't draft for need," Arians said. "If you draft for need, you get fired. You take the best player. If you've got two players, now you've got three of them. Just take the best player available. Now if you've

got four players right there together and one of them is a need? That's a home run."

Besides, Arians argues, it's too easy for teams to double-team the best pass rusher. "You need two because they can game-plan one guy," Arians said. "... You'd like to have two, and I think JPP is that type of guy. Vita (Vea) can be some pressure in the middle. We've got a couple of young guys who have the ability to play opposite and be disruptive. And I know our linebackers are going to be blitzing up the middle a lot and they're going to be chasing him out to them a lot of times. You want guys who can beat the tackles but also run them down when they get outside."

Arians said it has been easy working with Licht since they went through a draft together with the Arizona Cardinals.

"It's been very easy for both of us because we've done it together before," Arians said. "We were ready three weeks ago. We've been going over and over and over it. Jason and I have massaged that thing so many times it's got fingerprints all over it."

Of course, as the draft nears, Arians says, it's hard to believe anything they hear or read.

"I'm never convinced about anything about the draft," he said. "That's the best thing about it. Everybody lies so good. That's the best thing. You start telling the truth and it's, 'Oh he's lying. He's lying!'"

# Bruins, Blue Jackets clash in first playoff matchup

Boston holds home-ice advantage throughout Stanley Cup playoffs

BOSTON — The Boston Bruins have home-ice advantage through a potential trip to the Stanley Cup Final, and they have the Columbus Blue Jackets to thank for it.

They'll get a chance to show their gratitude in the TD Garden on Thursday night.

The Bruins host Columbus in Game 1 of the second round — the first postseason matchup between the Original Six franchise and the 2000 expansion team that has advanced in the playoffs for the first time in its history.

The Blue Jackets got there by ousting the Tampa Bay Lightning in four games, the first time a Presidents Trophy winner has been swept in the first round.

"I thought Tampa was lights out and solid," Boston coach Bruce Cassidy said after the Bruins beat Toronto 5-1 in Game 7 of the first-round series. "So, clearly, we've got our hands full."

With the Lightning and the Calgary Flames both going out in the first round, the Bruins have the best remaining record in the playoffs. They will open at home for Games 1 and 2 on Thursday and Saturday; more importantly, they will host a potential seventh game if the series lasts that long.

The home-ice advantage served them well in Game 7 against Toronto on Tuesday night.

"The fans were obviously very excited,

very loud, gave us, extra energy," defenseman Zdeno Chara said. "We were obviously feeding off that."

The Columbus fans also are getting the hang of this playoff thing. With a long gap since clinching their first-round win on April 16, they hosted a full scrimmage Monday and opened it to the public.

More than 5,500 people attended.

"They're playing really well and probably one of the hottest teams in the league right now after taking down Tampa," said Bruins forward Sean Kuraly, who grew up outside of Columbus and went to college at Miami of Ohio. "You can see from 5,000 fans at practice it's a heck of an atmosphere there, and they're playing really well."

Blue Jackets coach John Tortorella said the team used the scrimmage to try to stay sharp. But it's hard to focus on an opponent without knowing who it is, and they didn't find out for a week.

"We tried to do it the right way," he said. "I think once they know there's a team and there's a date, I think that helps the player. Now they know it. I don't know what to expect. I think we're prepared."

Despite having just one day to rest for the next series, the Bruins reported that everyone is healthy



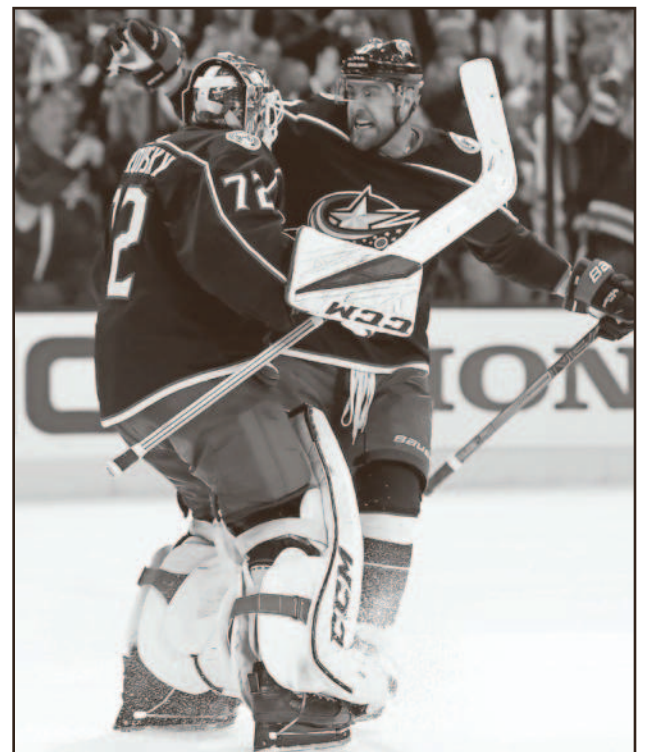

except Kevan Miller.

The defenseman "won't start the series," general manager Don Sweeney said Wednesday, because of a right knee injury that has kept him out since April 4. Miller played in 39 games this season while struggling with injuries, totaling seven assists.

"He's obviously had a setback from that injury, and we're probably week-to-week there in terms of evaluating," Sweeney said. "We missed Kevan. He's a big part of our hockey club. Other guys have stepped up."

Columbus has had some injury problems on defense, with Markus Nutivaara missing two games after the hit to the head that led to a one-game suspension against Tampa's Nikita Kucherov.

# Nets have tough choice on Russell

Point guard's breakout season doesn't guarantee return

NEW YORK — D'Angelo Russell was an All-Star and the Brooklyn Nets became a playoff team. Neither looked likely four months ago.

So it was a surprisingly successful season, though there's plenty for the Nets to build on — including a decision on whether Russell will have a role.

Nets players were proud of their accomplishments but realistic about the future Wednesday, a day after they were routed by Philadelphia in Game 5 of their return to the postseason.

Changes are necessary if the Nets want to contend with a team like Philadelphia. So players heading into free agency can't be certain of their futures in Brooklyn.

Not even Russell, the former No. 2 pick with the Lakers, who had a breakout season.

"Hell yeah, I definitely want to be here," he said. "But I also know it's a business too, so I'm not going to play that role like I don't know what could possibly happen."

Early in the season, Caris LeVert was the Nets' best player and Russell sometimes sat on the bench in the fourth quarter. But with the Nets at 8-18 in December and LeVert sidelined with a dislocated right foot, Russell began to find his form. Brooklyn surged, eventually finishing sixth in the East at 42-40 after missing the postseason the last three years.

Keep the young core of Russell, LeVert, Spencer Dinwiddie and Jarrett Allen, and the Nets can probably keep contending for spots toward the lower half of the

East. But they might not get much farther without adding one of the superstars who'll be available this summer in free agency.

"We're a young, talented group, but you've also got to bring in a really, really talented player or players," veteran forward DeMarre

Carroll said. Some of those potential game-changers, such as Kyrie Irving and Kemba Walker, play guard Russell's position. The point guard would be a restricted free agent, allowing the Nets to match any offer for him.

# Sharks rally after Pavelski's injury, major penalty

San Jose erased three-goal deficit in Game 7, pulled off double-overtime win in Game 6

SAN JOSE, Calif. — Joe Thornton gathered his teammates at the bench as a bloodied Joe Pavelski was taken off the ice after being knocked out on a hit and implored them to avenge their captain's injury by scoring three goals on the ensuing major penalty to erase a three-goal deficit.

The San Jose Sharks did Thornton one better and scored four, setting the stage for a remarkable comeback.

The Sharks erased a 3-1 series deficit, a three-goal hole in the third period and bounced back after allowing a tying goal in the final minute of regulation to beat the Vegas Golden Knights 5-4 in overtime in Game 7 of their first-round series Tuesday night.

"The leadership is the best I've ever been around," coach Peter DeBoer said. "Joe goes down. Joe Thornton immediately is talking to the guys, 'Let's get three goals here on this power play.' He actually said that and we got four. Very fortunate as a coach to be around people like that. You don't have to say a lot. They're driving the bus."

That leadership core that has been maligned over the years has led the Sharks into the second round against Colorado, with Game 1 in San Jose on Friday night.

To get there, the Sharks completed the first comeback from 3-1 down in a series in franchise history with help from 58 saves from Martin Jones and the first double-overtime short-handed goal ever by Tomas Hertl to win Game 6 on the road.

That pales in comparison to what the Sharks had to overcome Tuesday when they trailed 3-0 with 10:47 to play and Pavelski was lying on the ice after a cross-check from Cody Eakin and bump from Paul Stastny led to an awkward fall. The referees called a major penalty.

"It almost made you cry, because we love him so much," said Thornton, who held a towel to Pavelski's bleeding head as he helped him to the dressing room. "You never want to see a teammate get hurt like that. It was a tough break for him."

The Sharks rallied around their fallen leader to become the second team in playoff history to score four times on one major power play to take the lead.

It still didn't come easy as they allowed the tying goal to Jonathan Marchessault with 47 seconds to play in regulation before fourth-liner Barclay Goodrow provided the game-winner 18:19 into overtime, making San Jose just the second team ever to overcome a three-goal deficit in the third period to win a Game 7.

# Steelers extend Roethlisberger through 2021

PITTSBURGH — The Pittsburgh Steelers have reiterated repeatedly during an eventful offseason that quarterback Ben Roethlisberger remains the team's unquestioned leader. They have handed him a new deal to prove it.

The Steelers and the two-time Super Bowl winner agreed to terms on a contract extension Wednesday that will keep Roethlisberger in Pittsburgh through the 2021 season. Roethlisberger had been set to enter the final year of a contract he signed in 2015. Financial terms were not disclosed, but Roethlisberger figures to get a significant pay bump over the \$12 million he was due (with a \$23 million cap

hit) in 2019.

"It has always been a goal to play my entire career in Pittsburgh," Roethlisberger said in a statement. "This is home for me and my family, and we love this city. I am as excited to be a Steeler in Year 16 as I was when they drafted me. They will get my absolute best."

The deal gives Pittsburgh some stability going forward after the high-profile departures of wide receiver Antonio Brown and running back Le'Veon Bell.

Roethlisberger, who turned 36 last month, is coming off the finest statistical season of his 15-year career. His 5,129 yards passing led the NFL and his 34 touchdown passes broke his own franchise mark. Yet his once-solid relationship with Brown appeared to deteriorate during a late slide that

culminated in a 9-6-1 finish, a swoon that caused the Steelers to miss the playoffs for the first time since 2013.

Brown sat out a crucial Week 17 game against Cincinnati and in the aftermath lashed out on social media, blaming Roethlisberger for having an "owner mentality."

Roethlisberger flirted with retirement after the 2016 season but has found a renewed sense of energy in his mid-30s. Having an offensive line that has kept him upright has certainly helped. Roethlisberger has been sacked an average of 20½ times over the last four years — compared with an average of 42 times per season between 2006-13 — due in part to stellar play in front of him and an approach predicated on getting the ball out faster

while shying away from the "Ben being Ben" stuff that led to a mix of big plays and big mistakes earlier in his career.

The announcement of the extension came on the 15th anniversary of the Steelers making Roethlisberger the seventh overall pick in the 2004 draft. After taking over the starting job in Week 2 of the 2004 season following an injury to veteran Tommy Maddox, Roethlisberger has led the Steelers to three Super Bowls, along with seven AFC North titles and 10 total playoff berths.

Roethlisberger will lead an offense in the midst of a generational shift at other skill positions. JuJu Smith-Schuster replaces Brown as Pittsburgh's top receiver and the running back combination of James

Conner and Jaylen Samuels combined to put up numbers in 2018 similar to Bell's at his peak. There is stability, however, along the offensive line. Four of five starters return and there are plenty of potential in-house replacements for right tackle Marcus Gilbert, who was traded to Arizona in March.

Pittsburgh has toyed with finding Roethlisberger's eventual successor, drafting Josh Dobbs in the fourth round in 2017 and Mason Rudolph in the third round last year. Dobbs won the backup job last summer over Rudolph and veteran Landry Jones, who was cut on the eve of the 2018 season. Having them in place means the Steelers are likely to avoid drafting a quarterback with one of their 10 selections in the draft that starts Thursday.

# Nadal rallies at Barcelona Open

BARCELONA, Spain (AP) — Rafael Nadal recovered from a slow start to defeat Leonard Mayer 6-7 (7), 6-4, 6-2 and advance to the third round of the Barcelona Open on Wednesday.

The second-ranked Nadal was coming off defeat to Fabio Fognini in the semifinals of the Monte Carlo Open.

An 11-time champion in Barcelona, Nadal will next play fellow Spaniard David Ferrer. The 37-year-old Ferrer, who is playing in Barcelona for the last time, defeated 15th-seeded Lucas Pouille 6-3, 6-1 in his second-round match.

The top-seeded Nadal squandered three set

points in the first set, including two in the tie-breaker after exchanging breaks late in the set. He rebounded quickly by breaking Mayer's serve in the first game of the second set, then cruised to victory against the 63rd-ranked Argentine.

"It wasn't the best start. Not the best feelings out there this afternoon, but I found a way to keep going and to win the match. Today that's the main thing," Nadal said. "(Mayer) competes well against everybody but probably today (the problem) was not that he competed very well against me. I was not competing that well."

# Tampa Bay picks up Hargreaves' fifth-year option

Former Wharton High and Gators star has played only 10 games the last two seasons

TAMPA — Cornerback Vernon Hargreaves has one career interception and played in only 10 games in the past two seasons due to injuries.

But the former Wharton High and Florida Gators star apparently has shown enough promise to warrant the Bucs' decision Wednesday to pick up the fifth-year club option on Hargreaves' rookie contract worth \$9-million in 2020.

The 12th overall pick of the Bucs in the 2016 NFL draft, Hargreaves started

all 16 games as a rookie and got better in the second half of the season. He finished with 76 tackles, one forced fumble, nine passes defended and one interception but was the only cornerback in the NFL that year to allow more than 1,000-yards receiving.

A hamstring injury limited him to only nine games in 2017. Last year, he got off to a decent start in the season opener by forcing a fumble that was returned for a touchdown by Justin Evans in a 48-40 win at New Orleans in Week 1.

Unfortunately, Hargreaves suffered a season-ending shoulder injury in the game and was placed on injured reserve.

The \$9-million salary for 2020 is guaranteed only against injury. The team announced they were exercising the fifth-year option Wednesday night, just over a week before the May 3 deadline.

It's the third season in a row the Bucs have exercised the club option for the fifth year on one of its first-round draft picks. Receiver Mike Evans subsequently signed a

contract extension after the team did it in 2017. Last year, the Bucs picked up the \$20.9-million option on Jameis Winston's contract for 2019.

With Brent Grimes playing his last season with the Bucs in 2018, Hargreaves returns as the team's most experienced defensive back.

Second round picks Carlton Davis and M.J. Stewart started as rookies last season.

Having split time at cornerback and in the slot as a fifth defensive back, Hargreaves is expected to remain outside

this season, according to coach Bruce Arians.

Hargreaves underwent surgery on his left shoulder last Sept. 21.

"It actually made me better. I've seen a lot, done a lot and been through a lot of things," Hargreaves said at the start of off-season workouts.

"And the guys in the locker room, they look at me as a guy who has kind of been through it now, as that vet. Even though I haven't played in two years, they still look at me like I got those years under my belt. Just

because they've seen what I've been through. They've seen the behind the scenes and what everybody else is saying."

Arians has said he believes Hargreaves will thrive in the man-to-man scheme under new defensive coordinator Todd Bowles.

"I don't know why coach Arians feels that way about me, but I love it. He doesn't know me. He doesn't have to say anything about me. But I love it. That's the confidence that I need. That's that confidence we need as a secondary."

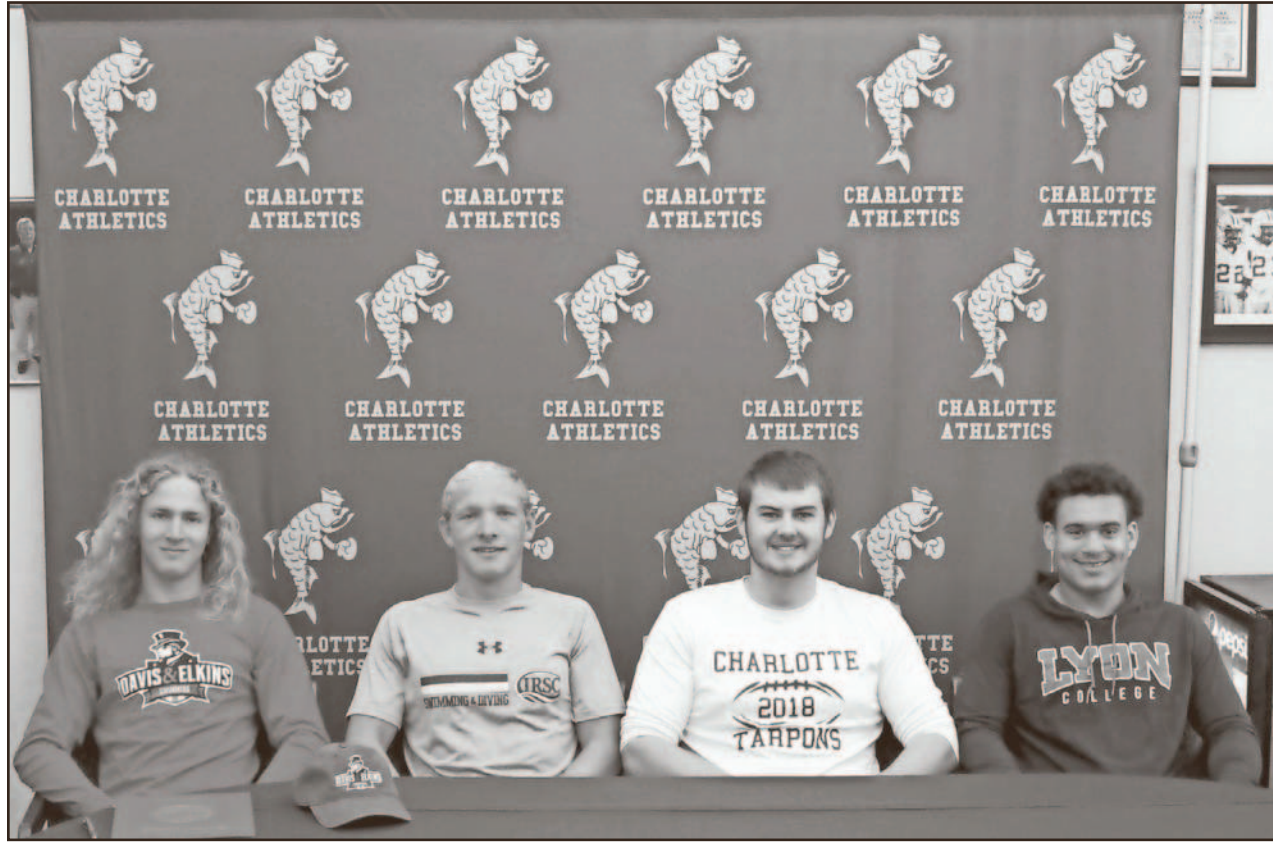

It's a sports program that continues to produce optimal results, with many of its athletes advancing to play at the collegiate level.

Four more Tarpons made their vision a reality Wednesday morning, by signing letters of intent to participate in their discipline and taking with them lessons learned while being part of the culture endemic to Charlotte High School.

Two of the athletes were stalwarts on the gridiron, the other two anchored the team in the swim lanes at South County Recreation Center.

Jayden Grant, Chase Watter, Dylan Hacker and Carl Eisen, four athletes who've distinguished themselves consistently for the Tarpon program, signed to compete, adding to the source of pride and winning environment that has become a significant part of the Charlotte High School culture.

Grant, who excelled in three sports at Charlotte, football, weightlifting and basketball, will be heading to Lyon College in Batesville, Ark.

Grant who was a powerful presence on both sides of the ball, as a running back and line-backer/defensive end, will be a part of the Scots football program this fall.

"It means a lot; I moved to Florida my freshman year of high

school, my cousin lived here and wanted me to be part of the team," said Grant. "I thought it would be a good experience for me."

Grant, who rushed for 604 yards his senior year, attributes much of his success to the coaching staff, who helped him to become the athlete that he is today.

"It's very satisfying, because if you look at it the right way, the way you were before and the way you are now, you're surprised at what you've become, and that you're actually going onto the next level, reaching the goal you've always dreamed of."

Chase Watter was part of an offensive line composed of seniors, that was a critical component in the Tarpons 9-3 record this past fall, one that saw them win the district and make the playoffs for the ninth time in the past 10 years. The other two signees were key variables in the Tarpons success within the pool, swimmers Dylan Hacker and Carl Eisen, like Grant and Watter will participate in their sport at the collegiate level.

Hacker, the FHSAA Class 3A state champion in the 100-yard breaststroke, has been swimming since the age of eight, and has worked closely year round with coaches Jeff Cain and Jim Lindberg. He will be swimming in the fall for Indian River State College in Ft. Pierce.

"It's pretty exciting to have signed as it's the next step to bigger things," said Hacker. "The coaches have played a large role, throughout all my years to get me to the point where I am now. I just hope to keep on building on that and get better. The school (Indian River) is mainly about swimming, so that's a good plus for me."

Carl Eisen, like Hacker, has been a cornerstone of the foundation for the Tarpons swimming program, and he'll be swimming collegiately this fall for Davis & Elkins College in Elkins, W.V.

"Each coach we've had has played a role in our development," said Eisen. "They've helped me to become the man I am. I'm very thankful I was able to swim for the Tarpons."

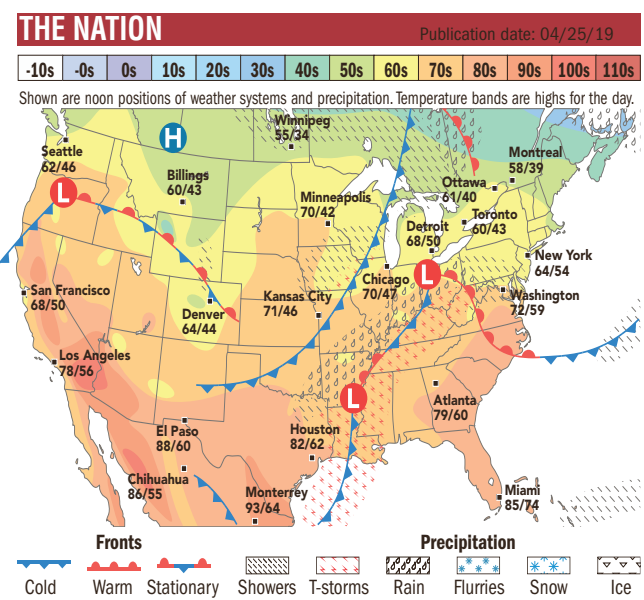

# Drivers test out debris deflectors as Indy 500 nears

New safety device part of efforts to reduce head injuries after 2015 death of Justin Wilson

INDIANAPOLIS — Will Power got his first real glimpse at IndyCar's new debris deflector Wednesday. He is still getting used to the small piece on the front of his race car.

The defending Indianapolis 500 champion and 2014 series champion was one of nearly two dozen drivers who spent Wednesday testing the safety device designed to reduce the risk of head injuries in the series that features open cockpits.

"You notice it," the Australian driver said during a rain delay at Indianapolis Motor Speedway. "But you really need to be in it at top speeds, following cars. Anything you can do to protect the head is a good thing."

Series officials have spent years trying to make racing safer, but Justin Wilson's death in August 2015 reignited the discussion about head safety in open-wheel racing. The popular English driver died from injuries sustained when he was hit in the head by flying debris from another car at Pocono.

IndyCar engineers worked on a so-called halo device, similar to the one adopted by Formula One in 2018,

but shelved it because it couldn't be fitted on the car and there were concerns about impeding drivers' sight lines. Scott Dixon and Josef Newgarden also worked with a clear windscreen last year, but IndyCar president Jay Frye said series officials did not get the desired results. That project continues.

For now, IndyCar has opted to go with a 3/4-inch-wide piece made out of titanium, bolted to the car just in front of the cockpit.

Engineers, Frye said, have been fine-tuning this piece since 2012 and it will make its race debut May 26 when the series holds its marquee event — the Indianapolis 500.

The deflector is expected to be used the rest of this season.

Will it work?

Dixon, the reigning series champion, reported no troubles after working with it on a simulator.

"If debris comes toward the driver, this will deflect it away," Frye said.

"But we wouldn't put it on the car if it was not vetted."

Still, questions remain. Debris could still go airborne or break into smaller, still dangerous pieces. Some might even fly into the stands or land back on the track.

"You do the tests, you

pass all the tests, there are a million different scenarios of what could possibly happen," Frye said.

"This we know gives us a much better likelihood of having a good outcome."

It's also not the final answer.

While F1 was the first major open-cockpit

series to add protective head protection to its cars, IndyCar engineers face a daunting task because their drivers compete at faster speeds on ovals and super-speedways in addition to the street and road courses used on international circuits.

IndyCar's showcase race has previously

served as a hatching ground for safety efforts. Rear-view mirrors, seat belts and SAFER barriers all debuted at the Indy 500.

Next month, the debris deflector will join the list. And sometime in the near future, the long-discussed windscreen seems likely, too, especially after

Frye acknowledged he expects to make another safety-related announcement in May.

Power and other drivers can't wait.

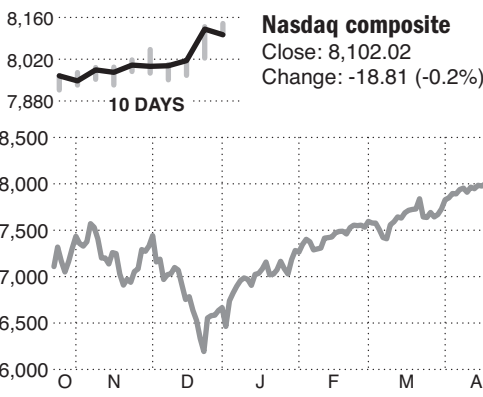
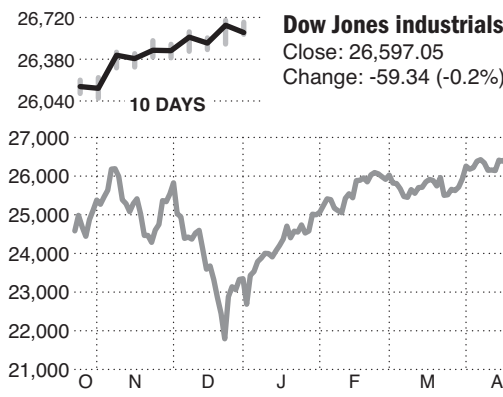
"The amount of stuff that goes flying now, it's really the luck of the draw," Power said.

"The windscreen really can't get her soon enough."

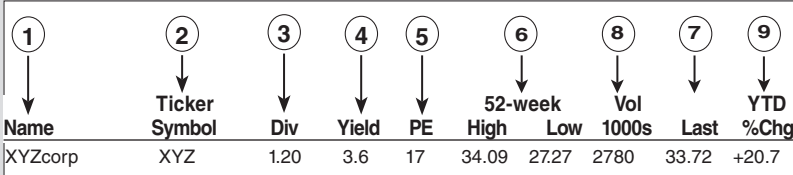

## How to read the stock tables



- 1 — Name of the stock.
- 2 — Ticker Symbol company trades under.
