I met this little boy during La Salida weekend, in San Antonio, Texas, years ago. It's a weekend to show kids they have options; there is a way out. They can say no to drugs, joining gangs and dropping out of school.

the rappelling tower and the slide for life. Apparently, bouncing down a 60-foot tower on a rope, and sliding across a 50-foot-wide ravine on another rope instills self-confidence...hence, the courage for the kids to "just say no."

All the kids had just finished a big lunch in the camp mess hall, and we were on our way to the obstacle course. Two little guys were sitting and talking near the tailgate of our luxurious Army deuce-and-a-half truck. I heard this little boy whisper to his friend, "I can't wait 'til tomorrow morning."

"Because we get to ride on the fire truck?" his friend asked.

"No...we get to eat breakfast."

How do I even begin to fix something that broken...when eating breakfast is a novelty...a treat...to a child?

While on Kwajalein in 2000, missionaries Paul and Michelle passed out 340 Marshallese-language Bibles to outer island communities from their ship, the *Sea Rogue*. The bibles were translated by Alice Buck and Fr. Hacker and purchased by the Chapel. While preparing to leave Lib, after distributing bibles there, the Moseley's were contacted by USAKA/KMR officials on behalf of Iroij Michael Kabua, traditional leader of the Marshallese Cultural Center, with a request to bring back wood from the jon tree to help rebuild five traditional structures at the Center that were flattened in a violent storm. Lib island residents were given word of the need on Kwajalein and 10 trees were cut and the trunks loaded onto the *Sea Rogue*. After a rough voyage lasting more than 24 hours, the ship arrived on Kwajalein and the logs were transported to the Marshallese Cultural Center. The posts remain today and will be used in rebuilding the structures in celebration of the upcoming Manit Day.

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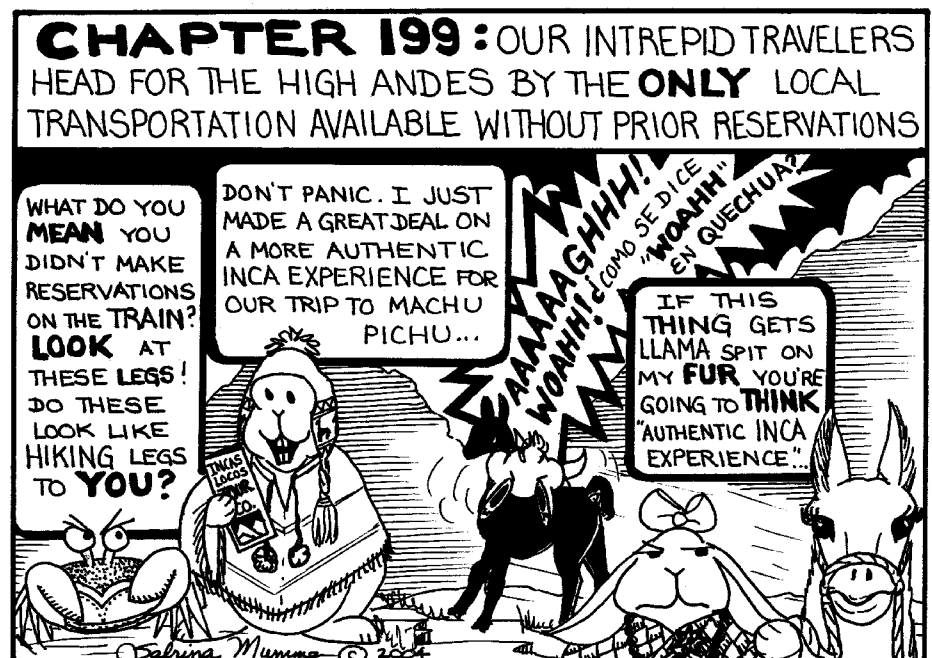

Vehicle discounts and stateside delivery offered

Reacquiring personal means of transportation on return to the states just got a whole lot easier.

A new KRS initiative gives residents the opportunity to purchase vehicles from the Armed Forces Exchange at the military rate for use in CONUS. Anyone working on Kwajalein or Roi-Namur automatically qualifies.

Exchange representative, Larry Thompson, will be on Kwajalein from Sept. 16-27, with a stop on Roi-Namur Sept. 21. This is the first of what will be quarterly visits to offer savings on vehicles.

"This is an overstock service that automobile companies give to military personnel. Because we're

on a base, we're getting that same opportunity," Joe Marshall, deputy program manager for Community Services, said. "Our goal is to continuously provide vehicle purchasing services to residents of Kwaj either as they PCS or for family members in CONUS."

Vehicles in a variety of makes and models are available through the Exchange from Chrysler, GM, and Ford, as well as motorcycles from Harley and Buell.

Discounts on motorcycles offered range from \$300 to as much as \$1,500.

According to Marshall, aside from the discount, the advantage of buying a motorcycle from the Exchange is that both wait time and dealership markup are eliminated.

The Exchange offers vehicle financing or residents may obtain their own. Shipment is arranged anywhere in the continental United States direct from the factory to the dealership designated by the buyer.

"It's another product we sell in which some of the proceeds go to the Rec Fund," Marshall explained.

A similar service was offered on Kwajalein approximately six years ago.

During his stay on Kwajalein, Thompson will be available to meet with residents in Building 735, Room 108 during normal business hours. Call 50533 or 58455 to schedule an appointment. Kwajalein sees new August rainfall record

The first seven months of 2004 passed on a rather dry note by Kwajalein standards. By the end of July, Kwajalein was 11.19 inches below normal for yearly precipitation. Of course, sunbathers and outdoor enthusiasts weren't complaining too much, but the workers at the water plant were beginning to feel Mother Nature's pinch. With the exception of February, each month from January to July had seen below-normal precipitation. The trend even continued into the first week of August. By the end of the day of Aug. 7, the rainfall deficit at Kwajalein peaked at 11.82 inches. However, the weather pattern changed drastically over the next few weeks. By the time August was over, the mounting rainfall deficit would become a rainfall surplus as Kwajalein finished the month with an astounding 23.61 inches of precipitation. Not only did this erase the deficit and leave us with a two-inch rainfall surplus for the year, it broke the old August record of 23.38 inches set in 1997. In fact, more rainfall fell during the month of August than was recorded in the first five months of 2004 combined. August 2004 also qualified as the fifth wettest month since 1945, when we started keeping records. The single wettest month on record was December 1950, when Kwajalein received 30.38 inches of rain.

So, what happened to bring us all of this rainfall?

As is often the case here in the tropical Pacific, it was a combination of several factors. The first factor was the presence of above-normal water temperatures over the central Pacific. In a bulletin issued just a few days ago, the U.S. Climate Prediction Center officially classified the summer months of 2004 as a "warm episode," also known as El Nino. This means that widespread ocean temperatures of at least 0.5°C above normal were observed over the three-month period. They forecast this "warm episode" to continue into 2005. The second factor was the development of a series of strong disturbances. It all started on Aug. 8 as the first strong tropical disturbances moved through the Marshall Islands, dumping 0.85 inches on Kwajalein that day.

The third, and probably most important component of our wet August was the development of a persistent monsoon trough. A monsoon trough is an axis, or trough, of low surface pressure that causes widespread westerly winds and also serves as a focus for convection. This phenomenon is usually found well to the west of Kwajalein but normally makes a few short-lived appearances over the

Marshall Islands during the summer and fall. This August, it wore out its welcome. It took up residence over the Marshall Islands around the eighth and remained in the vicinity for the rest of the month. We received more than one inch of rainfall on six of the next 13 days, and more than two inches on the 23rd. On Aug. 18, the

monsoon trough crossed the Kwajalein Atoll and pushed just to the east of the Marshalls, where it would remain as a relatively constant feature for about the next two weeks. Disturbances will often form along the monsoon trough and then move to the west. Some of these will eventually become tropical storms and typhoons, which is what happened recently. With the monsoon trough stalled to our east, the disturbances that formed along the trough passed through the Kwajalein Atoll and surrounding atolls as they made their way to the west. So, a nearly incessant train of disturbances crossed the atoll bringing us copious amounts of rain.

Given all that happened last month, we were actually a little lucky. The most rigorous disturbances that formed along the monsoon trough all passed far enough to the north of Kwajalein that we were spared the heaviest rainfall and the strongest winds. The worst conditions were experienced in the atolls to the north, namely Rongrik westward to Enewetak. Two of these disturbances developed into tropical depressions while they were still in the Marshalls, eventually becoming super typhoons once they had reached the Philippine Sea. The first was Chaba, which was declared a tropical depression on Aug. 19

when it was about 325 miles northwest of Kwajalein. The second was Songda, which became a tropical depression on Aug. 29 when it was only about 130 miles northwest of Kwajalein. Because the centers of these disturbances passed to the north, the counter-clockwise rotation of winds around the disturbances caused the Kwajalein Atoll to get buffeted by westerly winds. Wind speeds were the strongest on the afternoon of the 27th when we recorded sustained winds of 29 mph with gusts

to 36 mph. Westerly winds driving across the lagoon caused choppy conditions in the eastern side of the lagoon, resulting in some damage to boats and docks at both Kwajalein and Ebeye. Conditions have changed again recently. The monsoon trough, perhaps the singular greatest cause for the prodigious rainfall last month, has again taken up residency in its normal location in the far western Pacific. In the early part of September a low-level ridge, or area of

sinking air, moved into the central Marshalls to replace the exiting monsoon trough. As a result, the weather through the first week of September could be classified as a little benign. Normally, this is our wettest month. Rainfall for the month of September averages 11.82 inches. Even if we end up having a "normal" September, it will be a lot drier than last month.

Bike rodeo to highlight safety and regulations

Biking to work or school can be fun and relaxing, but without safety in mind, it can also be dangerous.

The KPD will offer a Bike Safety Rodeo, Oct. 4 from 9-11 a.m. on 7th Street next to building 704.

USAKA Regulation 190-5 states bikes must be operated in a safe manner and that riders must observe and obey all traffic signs and markings in the same manner required of motor vehicle operators.

KPD Chief Dennis Johnson said, at some locations, specific bicycle signs provide traffic control directions.

The event will provide an opportunity for KPD officers to teach bike safety skills. The officers will also be conducting safety inspections, taking kids one-on-one

through a bicycle skills course and teaching basic signaling and rules of the road.

Bike safety skills the officers will be concentrating on are balancing, riding in a straight line, figure eight, left turn and right turn signals, stop and yield signals and weaving in and out of cones.

The officers will also conduct a safety inspection of chain tension, tire pressure and wear, handlebars and seat positions, brakes, helmets, reflectors and lights.

There will be prizes for every child who completes the skills course along with a free raffle for one or more new bikes, and burgers and hotdogs for everyone.

According to Johnson, the primary focus is to educate island youth about bike safety and regulations on Kwajalein, but it will also serve as a relaxed avenue to meet with the public.

Top ten biking violations

Failing to Stop or Yield: Riders must slow down, look for traffic and proceed with caution when emerging from a yield intersection, alley or fire lane. Bicyclists must yield the right-of-way to pedestrians, motor vehicles and other bikes at all stop and yield signs. In addition, riders must move to the side of the road and stop for any emergency vehicle approaching with sirens and/or flashing lights. Riders must stop at intersections marked with stop signs.

Impeding Traffic: Bicyclists may not stop in a traffic lane or impede the flow of traffic other than to yield to other vehicles, bikes, or pedestrians at a stop or yield intersection. Don't "hang out" in the middle of the roadway.

Lane Usage: Like any other vehicle, bicyclists can only ride on the right side of the road and no more than two abreast when no other motor vehicle traffic is present. When other vehicles are passing, bikes must be ridden in single-file only.

Bike Maintenance: Properly inflated tires, brake and chain adjustment, and regular lubrication and corrosion control are of particular importance.

Clinging: Bicyclists may not cling to other bikes or motor vehicles.

Passengers: Carrying passengers on bikes is prohibited except when transporting a child in an infant pouch or properly attached child safety seat. Transporting a child in a basket or in the rider's arms is not permitted and is extremely dangerous. Riding on the handlebars is also very unsafe and prohibited.

Speeding: Bicyclists must operate at speeds that are reasonable for the existing conditions. Speed is a critical factor in many riding accidents.

Safety Equipment: Lights are required when riding south of 9th Street and along the entire unpaved Perimeter Road. However, all riders are strongly encouraged to use lights and reflectors at all times when riding at night. Bicyclists riding at night without lights and reflectors are extremely difficult to see. Children and new riders are also encouraged to wear a properly fitting bike helmet.

Signals: Bicyclists must use hand and arm signals when turning or stopping. To signal a left turn, position the left arm straight out from the shoulder horizontal to the ground. Right turns are signaled by again extending the left arm horizontally from the shoulder while at the same time bending the elbow at a ninety-degree angle so that the forearm and hand are pointed straight up.

Riding while Intoxicated: Bicyclists may not ride while intoxicated. So long as they call before an accident occurs, KPD officers will provide a ride home for residents who may have had too much to drink. However, those who endanger themselves and others by riding under the influence can be arrested and charged accordingly. It is also against regulations to ride with an open container, such as a bottle, can, cup or glass of alcohol.

Additional bicycle safety information is printed in the Kwajalein telephone book.

Navy names new ships in remembrance of 9/11

United States Department of Defense

Secretary of the Navy Gordon England named the eighth and ninth ships of the San Antonio-class of Amphibious Transport Dock ships as Arlington and Somerset.

The future USS Arlington and USS Somerset will join USS New York as living tributes to those who suffered in the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001, and to the nation.

Arlington was chosen to honor the city and county in northern Virginia, and especially, the 184 victims, aboard American Airlines Flight 77, and on the ground, who died during the Sept. 11 attack on the Pentagon.

Somerset honors the county in Pennsylvania where United Airlines Flight 93 crashed after courageous passengers stormed the cockpit in an attempt to regain control from the terrorists onboard. Their actions prevented the airplane from reaching its destination and inflicting further casualties and damage. The heroic sacrifice of these 40 passengers and crew rallied and inspired the nation.

In naming these ships, England noted the impact these vessels will have on the terrorist infrastructure that led to their naming. "USS Arlington and USS Somerset will help America project power to the far

reaches of the earth and will support the cause of freedom as we engage in the current war on terrorism," England said. "The courage and heroism of the people aboard those flights, and in the Pentagon, will never be forgotten by the American people, and as these ships engage in combating terrorism, they will leave a legacy that will never be forgotten by those wishing to do harm to this country."

Two previous vessels have been named Arlington. The first was a steel-hulled C1B type cargo ship operating during World War II. The second USS Arlington was a 14,500-ton major communications relay ship, originally commissioned in July 1946, which saw heavy use during the Vietnam War, including helping with communications during a June 1969 conference between U.S. President Nixon and Republic of Vietnam President Thieu.

Two previous Navy ships have carried the Somerset name as well. The first Somerset, a wooden-hulled, side-wheel ferryboat, performed blockade duty and made reconnaissance expeditions for the Union, until she was sold at public auction on July 12, 1865.

The Navy acquired the second Somerset, a wooden motorboat built in 1917, on April 10, 1918, under free lease from the Conservation Com-

mission of Maryland. Designated Id. No. 2162, Somerset served on section patrol duty in the Chesapeake Bay area during World War I. After the armistice was signed, she was returned to her owner on Nov. 26, 1918. The 684-foot-long amphibious transport dock ships will be built by Northrop Grumman Ship Systems in New Orleans and will each carry a Navy crew of 363 and 699 Marines. The ships will be used to transport and land Marines, their equipment, and supplies by embarked air cushions or conventional landing craft or amphibious vehicles, augmented by helicopters or vertical take off and landing aircraft in amphibious assault, special operations, or expeditionary warfare missions.

The ships will also incorporate the latest quality of life standards for the embarked sailors and Marines, including the sit-up berth, ship services mall, a fitness center and learning resource center and electronic classroom with the flexibility to accommodate male and female sailors and Marines as part of the crew and embarked troops. The design team also incorporated hundreds of suggestions and recommendations from more than 1,000 sailors and Marines in the design for ownership process to ensure that these ships will meet their needs throughout the first half of the 21st century.

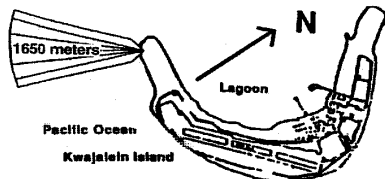

Range operation scheduled for tomorrow

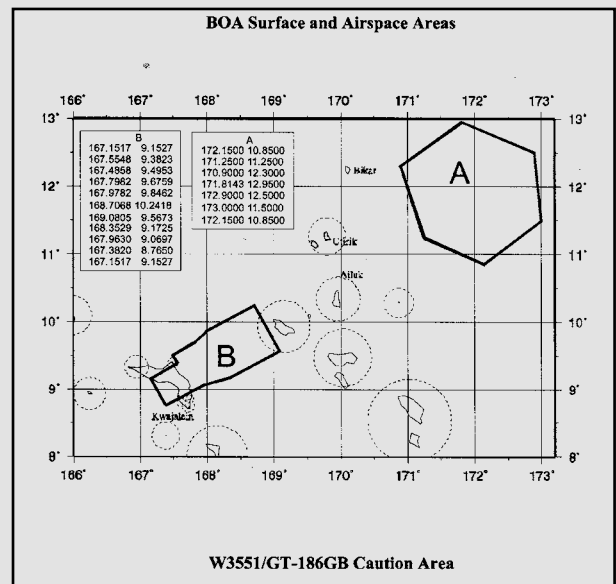
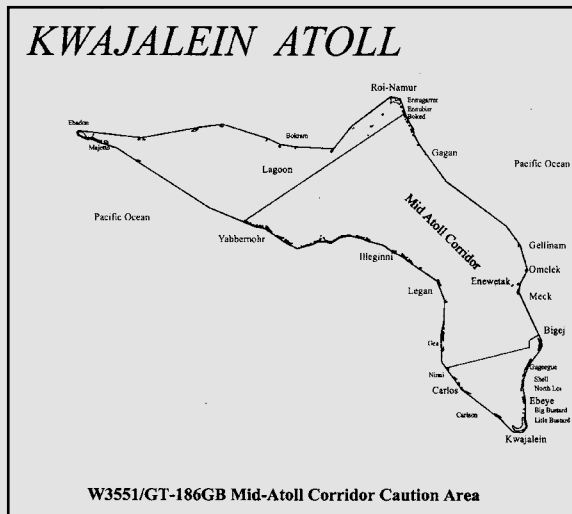
A range operation is scheduled for Wednesday, Sept. 15. Caution times are 7:01 p.m. through 3:01 a.m., Thursday, Sept. 16. In conjunction with this operation, a caution area will exist within the Kwajalein Atoll. The caution area is bounded on the north by Boked Island on the east reef and Yabbernohr Island on the west reef. On the south, the area is bounded by a line drawn north of Bigej Island on the east reef to a point at latitude 08 54.2N, longitude 167 45.8E, then to a point at latitude 08 52.8N, longitude 167 45.8E, and then to a point north of the high tide mark on Ninni Island on the west reef. Bigej Island, including the inner reef, is specifically excluded and is not part of the mid-atoll corridor. Illeginni is designated as an evacuation island. All other mid-atoll corridor islands are designated as sheltered islands. Additional areas specified outside the mid-atoll are designated as caution areas. See maps.

In order to ensure clearance of non-mission support personnel from the mid-atoll corridor by the window opening time, KPD island clearance procedures will begin at approximately 7:30 a.m., Sunday, Sept. 12, and continue until evacuation has been accomplished. Egress of all air and seacraft will be required when requested by authorized clearance personnel. Subsequent to lagoon clearance, the hazard area will be in effect until mission completion.

In the event of a mission slip, the caution times and areas will be in effect for the following days:

- 7:01 p.m., Thursday, Sept. 16 through 3:01 a.m., Friday, Sept. 17
- 7:01 p.m., Friday, Sept. 17 through 3:01 a.m., Saturday, Sept. 18.
