

There were 56 golfers playing in the one-day tournament, competing in three categories: Alternate Shot, Better Ball and Singles.


• **Roi Town Hall Meeting:** Col. Stevenson Reed, U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll commander and John Pickler, Kwajalein Range Services president brought an entourage of their support staff to Roi Namur Jan. 19 for the first all hands meeting of the year. Reed spoke about the transformation process and how it will affect the USAKA communities. He spoke in generalities and explained he didn't want to brief it until he has specifics.

• **New ambassador:** Dr. Clyde Bishop, U.S. ambassador to the Republic of the Marshall Islands, visited Kwajalein for the first time Jan. 20. Bishop arrived in the Marshalls in December. On his, and America's, role in this country, "We are required to provide defense and security," he said.

• **Doctor earns certification:** Dr. John Janikowski of Kwajalein Hospital earned a specialty certification in tropical medicine and travel health. Janikowski took the examination in Atlanta on Nov. 11.

• **New Paint Shop:** A new 20,000 square foot Paint and Prep shop opened Jan. 23. The facility is used for maintenance on vehicles.

• **Start Smart Soccer:** Child and Youth Services, through the Start Smart Program, introduced soccer to tots in January.

February

• **New school superintendent:** Allan Robinson, who goes by Al, was hired as superintendent of Kwajalein schools. Robinson has been either a principal or superintendent in schools since 1986. He had been the superintendent of schools at the Sultan School District since 2000.

• **Emon Beach renovation:** Much of the Emon Beach area was off-limits from early February through the beginning of April. This recreational area received a facelift that was more than skin deep.

• **Kwajalein Atoll Memorial Day:** On Feb. 9 the residents of the Kwajalein Atoll celebrate Memorial Day in remembrance of those who lost their lives in the World War II battle. The

community of Ebeye marked the day with songs, a traditional Jobwa dance and speeches by local and national leaders. Dr. Clyde Bishop, U.S. ambassador to the Republic of the Marshall Islands, also spoke.

• **Dollars for Darfur:** The Kwajalein High School National Honor Society students raised \$2,645 for Dollars for Darfur with a variety show on Feb. 17. High schools across the United States competed against each other to see who could raise the most money for Darfuri refugees and the Save Darfur Coalition. The KHS variety

show fundraiser put Kwajalein in the number two spot beating out the current number two high school by \$45.

• **Fishing tournament:** The Wahoo-Mahi Bonanza Fishing Tournament, held Feb. 19, was most definitely appropriately named as anglers participating in the tournament weighed in a total of 3,514.7 pounds of fish. Teams brought cooler after cooler up to the tournament weigh in station bursting full of Wahoo and Mahi-Mahi. Thirteen boats, eleven from Kwajalein and two from Roi-Namur, participated in the tournament sponsored by the Kwajalein Atoll International Sportfishing Club.

• **Police training:** Seventy-two officers, some who were asleep in bed having just finished a shift as well as Kwajalein Atoll Local Government and Republic of the Marshall Islands National police responded to the surprise exercise Feb. 22. They were given police batons or riot shields and a quick, step-by-step training session by the KPD Security Response Team that began the minute officers answered the recall.

At this exercise the Security Response Team showed the officers how to assemble in a tight formation, how to maneuver as a cohesive unit closer to an agitated group, how to use the police batons and riot shields in a way that would minimize violence all the while protecting themselves. Police officers were instructed to hold their ground and respond loudly when provoked.

• **Trailer removal:** Many neighborhoods on Kwajalein have changed. Trailers have been removed by Kwajalein Range Services Public Works. The removal began at the beginning of 2007. "The trailers that were and are still being removed, are trailers that have been on the disposal list for some time," explained Ken Bailey of the housing office.


The move is paced by budget and funding since removal costs are incurred for each unit including disconnection of utilities, actual move and relocation and site cleanup.

• **Photo exhibit:** More than 300 photographs were exhibited at the Kwajalein Photography Contest on March 4 and 5, in the Davye Davis Multi-Purpose Room. The 12 most popular photos in each category were to be considered by the calendar committee for possible selection and placement in the 2009 Kwaj calendar.

• **Kaleidoscope of Music:** The 7th Annual Kaleidoscope of Music showcased community talent on March 8 and 9 and raised approximately \$4,000 to

support the Yokwe Yuk Women's Club Scholarship Fund. With performances from classic piano recitals to locally written duets, the audiences on both nights had a chance to see some of their co-workers in a different light.

• **Ivey Gym gets new equipment:** Thirteen new pieces of fitness equipment were installed at Ivey Gym March 9-11. The fitness equipment is valued at \$60,000. "With the base closures in Korea, we were able to obtain the fitness equipment at no cost through our Pacific Morale, Welfare, and Recreation regional representative at Ft. Shafter in Hawaii," said Torrey Landers, Kwajalein Range Services Recreation Programs manager.

• **Girl Scouts donate books to Ebeye:** Kwajalein Girl Scouts donated children's books and videos to the Ebeye Public Library in honor of the worldwide Girls Scout event World Thinking Day.

• **Vandalism damage:** A string of vandalism incidents at the skate park by island youth was being investigated by the Kwajalein Police Department. KPD suspects elementary school-age children of marking up concrete flooring and skate ramps with graffiti that includes the names of the culprits

and explicit language. The vandalism at the skate park was in the form of graffiti and will cost \$4,000 to repair.

• **Building bridges:** All 140 students in science classes in grades 7-12 participated in the bridge construction project for this year's science competition on March 16. The Davye Davis Multi-Purpose Room was filled as students, parents and teachers milled around, waiting for the results of stress and strength tests on the balsa wood bridges. In the end, junior Rachel Stepchew, 17, built the strongest bridge. "The students had one week to build the bridges. Many of the students worked an extra hour before school and an hour after school every day of the week to complete their bridges on time," Brian Brewster, science teacher, said.

• **Canvasback mission of mercy:** Twenty-three healthcare providers from across the United States volunteered their vacation time and their extensive talents to give medical support to people in the Marshall Islands. They are members of the Canvasback Missions. They arrived on Kwajalein March 17 and treated dozens of patients at the Leroy Kitland Memorial Health Center on Ebeye. "We could not have done this without the help of USAKA," Jacque Spence, who founded the charitable organization with her husband in 1981, said of the support they received from the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll.

• **Joint committee meeting:** The Republic of the Marshall Islands and United States of America annual joint committee meeting was held on Ebeye March 30. The meeting is mandated by the Compact of Free Association Agreement between the two countries. "The JCM is an important meeting," U.S. Ambassador Clyde Bishop said. "We can discuss our shared goals and challenges. We [the United States] are committed to defending the Marshall Islands as if it were a part of the United States," the ambassador continued.

APRIL

• **KRI Dewaruci visit:** Mid-morning on April 5 a ship of a different type motored up to Echo Pier. The KRI Dewaruci, a barquentine tall ship from Indonesia, was in port through April 9. Crewed by Indonesian naval officers and cadets, the ship will participate in an international celebration of sail training and sea education around the Newport and Fort Adams, R.I., waterfronts, June 27-July 1. The KRI Dewaruci is a Class A tall ship owned and operated by the Indonesian Navy.

• **Roi Town Hall meeting:** Lt. Col. Justin Hirniak, U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Reagan Test Site commander and John Pickler, Kwajalein Range Services president, held an all-hands meeting on Roi-Namur April 11. Hirniak and Pickler both praised the community on Roi-Namur for its efforts in working and living safely.

Pickler said a team from KRS had been sequestered for the better part of two months working on a transition plan in response to the customer's [USAKA] request. "We submitted a plan on March 12. It has been briefed to SMDC [Space and Missile Defense Command] leaders. We have had no feedback. We'll let you know when we have some answers," he said. In the meantime, he urged employees not to make decisions based on what they may have heard about the content of the report, because it does not represent any decisions about the future of USAKA/RTS programs.

• Who's afraid

of sharks?: Students from Kwajalein High School studied the habits of the nurse sharks that gather in the water near the Kwajalein Small Boat Marina. "The Marine Science students, seniors all, actually started this with a request," said Eric Nelson, teacher. "One of them asked if they could swim in the Small Boat Marina with the sharks. Working with ES&H [Kwajalein Range Services Environmental, Safety and Health], and after doing some research on shark attacks in general, and nurse sharks specifically, we decided that allowing the students in the water with nurse sharks was justifiable in context of a greater question; what causes the nurse sharks to congregate in that area anyway?"

• **Rusty Family Triathlon:** "The 2007 Rusty Family swim-bike-run mini-triathlon held May 14 saw heavier than expected participation with 138 total contestants," said race director Bob Sholar. Rusty Family is a 'mini' competition, but in name only. "The mini is only mini compared to RustMan distances," Sholar said. "Rusty Family is daunting for the youngest participants: 500-yard swim, 10-mile bike and two-mile run."

Ninety-two contestants made up parts of the 30 teams of mostly two or three persons, according to Sholar. "There were several 'family mēlange' teams of four. The remaining 46 were 'solo' contestants, doing all three legs on their own," he said. "There have been as many as 44 teams in past years, but the 46 solos this year were a peak since the 1980s."

"The overall winner was high school senior Michael Taylor, finishing in 54:20," Sholar said. "First for the girls was ninth-grader Julianne Kirchner in 56:10. An incredible, most-improved performance was turned in by Julianne's little brother, Graham. Though only a seventh grader, Graham finished in 56:34, just 24 seconds behind Julianne."

• **Steve Howell departs:** Community residents and School

Advisory Council members packed the George Seitz Elementary School Music Room to say "Yokwe Yuk" to High School Principal Steve Howell at the final, public SAC meeting of the 2006-07 school year, held May 16. Howell was recognized with a special presentation for his nine years of service as the Junior/Senior Kwajalein High School Principal and, in particular, for his service as acting superintendent over this past school year.

• **Gagan tower removed:** The Kwajalein Atoll skyline was altered a bit when the last of three Radio Corporation of America cone antennas were removed from the Gagan Tower.

"The RCA Cones on the 200-foot Gagan Tower have been a landmark for the Kwajalein aviators and marine department personnel for over 20 years," said Jim Walter, U. S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Safety and Occupational Health manager. "All communications between Roi, Kwaj and the other islands would have been lost if one of the cones had landed on the building," said Walter.

• **Memorial Day:** Memorial Day is a day of heartbreak for families and friends of service members who died in wars, past and present. While families across our nation mourned the loss of their loved ones, many Kwajalein families attended the Memorial Day ceremony in the Island Memorial Chapel to remember and pay tribute to the those same men and women who died defending their country.

Honoring and never taking for granted the price of that profound sacrifice was the focus of U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Commander Col. Stevenson Reed's remarks during the ceremony. Reed spoke of 400 graves located in Section 60, a new area, of Arlington National Cemetery where men and women who served in Iraq and

• **Beach blast:** Gray skies at the front end of the Memorial Day Beach Blast festivities didn't keep beach goers from finding their way to Emon Beach, especially families waiting to move from Kwajalein the minute the school year came to a close.

Blast activities year after year, it's been the idea of enjoying Emon Beach one last time.

"We have 11 days left; we're trying to enjoy the sun and sand as much as possible," said Amy Vannoy, explaining why they headed to the beach this Memorial Day before their permanent change of station move to Alabama. "We're going to be a little landlocked there." The Vannoy family wasn't the only family to take advantage of all the activities the Kwajalein Range Services Communities Activities planned for the Beach Blast. What started as a trickle of residents setting up beach chairs and umbrellas grew to a steady stream of beach goers by 3 p.m. and a very crowded lagoon.

• **Child and Youth Services World Series:** Community members had a chance to see the best-of-the best young hopefuls strut their stuff May 26 when the Child and Youth Services Baseball and Softball program ended for the season with its self-proclaimed World Series. Teams from the fourth through sixth grades met head-to-head for the title with junior boys Green Goblins defeating the Kwaj Yankees, 4-2 and the junior girls Blue Team defeating the Green Team 20-9. The baseball season ran seven weeks with 79 games played in all divisions. There were 191 participants; 101 Kwajalein players and 90 from the Republic of Marshall Islands.

June

• **High school graduation:** Twenty-three students graduated from Kwajalein High School June 1. More than \$73,000 in scholarships was awarded to more than half of the students. All but three members of the graduating class planned on attending college in the fall. One other enlisted in the U.S. Navy and the final two planned on working to earn money to attend college later.

• **Small Boat Marina adds new vessels:** Two new recreational motor boats are in the water at the Small Boat Marina and ready for rental. The Twin Vee boats replaced two vessels that had exceeded their life expectancy explained Paul McGrew, Small Boat Marina supervisor.

• **Quality of Life committee:** The Quality of Life Funding committee spent more than \$740,000 on community enhancement projects since Kwajalein Range Services became the contractor.

Some of the QOL projects were inexpensive, while some of were big-ticket items. The mobile kitchen trailer was purchased by QOL funds for \$215,000. It is used to support dining options away from fixed-facilities.

- Installation of underground irrigation for Roi-Namur golf course

- Adult and family pool repair
- Re-skin Enniburr school annex

• **Army's 232nd birthday:** Soldiers, dressed in formal attire, were joined by their families and other community members June 16 in celebrating the 232nd birthday of the U.S. Army.

The first Army Ball in three years was held at the Davye Davis Multi-purpose room and included a bit of tradition, a variety of music, dancing, eating and even a birthday cake.

Brig. Gen. John E. Seward, 94th Army Air and Missile Defense Command commander was guest speaker.

• **AAFES Town Hall:** An Army and Air Force Exchange Services team met with mem-

bers of the Kwajalein community on June 18. The team was on island at the request of Col. Stevenson Reed, U.S. Army Kwajalein

Atoll commander. According to a statement made by Reed in the May Kwajalein town hall, AAFES is coming to USAKA to staff and manage the retail services, as well as a convenience food restaurant at the current Three Palms location and a grill at the Dock Security Checkpoint.

• **Open sea rescue:** On June 22 an early morning call from the Republic of the Marshall

Islands Police on Ebeye initiated a flurry of activity that resulted in the rescue of the boat *Li-Jako*. The boat was approximately 20 miles south of Kwajalein.

"The boat was dead in the water, they were taking water over the sides," explained Alan Taylor of the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Host Nation Office. "There were 38 people on board. All of the women and children were sick." They were no where near land.

Standard policy for a stranded, in distress, or lost vessel is that the RMI government deploys the RMI patrol boat Lomor or contacts the U.S. Embassy in Majuro. A representative from the U.S. Embassy notifies the U.S. Coast Guard and a search and rescue is initiated.

• **Polynesian Night:** The mobile kitchen was used June 29 to support the American Forces Entertainment Polynesian Revue performance at Emon Beach. The kitchen can be used to support a variety of events, everything from private parties to a fill-in for the Café Pacific.



Schexnayder was guest speaker at the ceremony which was held in the Island Memorial Chapel. He welcomed Buhl and advised him, "Your job is to leave this place better than you found it. Simple. And when you leave set the condition for the future," he said, insisting that Buhl must require those who follow him to do the same. "We're committed to helping this place survive, because I think it is important," he continued.

• **Schexnayder all hands meeting:**

Michael C. Schexnayder, deputy to the commander for Research, Development and Acquisition at the U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command, spoke with members of the Kwajalein community in a all-hands-format meeting July 24. "The primary purpose I have today is to tell you a few things about money that may or may not have been said, in a way to try and reduce some of the anxiety that I know that you feel out here," he said. "The second is

to tell you that I am firmly committed to everybody acting as a team out here. In Army speak, we have a multi-compo organization. Said plainly, you military, civilians and contractors that work together to make this place work."

August

• **Marshallese earns Mate II certification:** Amon Mioba is now the second Marshallese person to be certified as a Marshallese Mate II. "This certification allows Marshallese to fill in as mates on the tugs and landing craft in Kwajalein Atoll waters. Amon is only the second Marshallese employee to complete this training. The program has been in place since 2000," explained Mioba's supervisor, Michael Turner, captain of the tug Mystic.

September

• **Police Bike Rodeo:** The Kwajalein Police Department holds a bike rodeo once a year introducing or reinforcing biking safety issues to young people under 12. This year's rodeo was held Sept. 15 with 48 participants.

"Safety is the most important lesson to be learned at the rodeo," said Sgt. Joshua MacDonald, rodeo coordinator. "The rodeo is designed to make sure all children on Kwajalein Island know the correct hand signals and the importance of being aware of their surroundings while operating a bicycle. Often times,

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I've seen young children fail to look before they enter a street from a side road. This is very dangerous and could potentially be fatal." There are approximately 150 cyclists under 12 on Kwajalein.

• **Power reduction plan:** A series of power reduction initiatives are being implemented by U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll in order to help reduce the cost of operations on Kwajalein.

The first initiative on the list calls for a plan to reduce the number of trailers by 88 during the coming fiscal year. Of that number, many are already vacant, according to Fred McNickle, Kwajalein Range Services Public Works manager. "This initiative has a two-fold objective. It eliminates dozens of obsolete and energy-inefficient trailer units and it better utilizes the existing bachelor quarters spaces, many of which are currently vacant," he said.




The trailers on Kwajalein are old and energy inefficient. The power reduction plan calls for the removal of 88 trailers.

• **Kwajalympics:**

The Kwajalympics team building day, held at Emon Beach on Kwajalein and near the pool on Roi-Namur, on Sept. 22, was filled with interesting twists to take the competitive edge out of traditional sporting events. Kwajalympics had been an employee-only, week-long sporting and fun, but highly competitive, activity. This year things changed. Col. Stevenson Reed, U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll commander, decided he wanted to include all of the USAKA community in what he described as an organization day.

"At the end of the day you will have seen great competition and its great fun and a chance to get to know someone who is new," Reed said in the opening ceremony.

"If you see someone who is new to the island, shake their hand and tell them, 'hey, I'm glad to have you here as part of the team.'"

October

• **KRI Dewaruci returns:** Mid-morning on Oct. 2, the KRI Dewaruci, a barquentine tall ship from Indonesian, docked at Echo Pier.

Crewed by Indonesian Naval officers and cadets, the ship was on its return voyage after participating in an international celebration of sail training and sea education around the Newport and Fort Adams, Rhode Island waterfronts June 27 - July 1. Cadets performed a parade for the community while on Kwajalein.

• **Manit Day:** Manit is the Marshallese word for culture or tradition. On Oct. 8, members of the Kwajalein community had the opportunity to spend the day learning about many of the things that are unique to the Marshallese culture thanks to the Manit Day presentation provided by Marshallese subject matter experts. Manit Day is a national holiday in the Marshall Islands. "It's a

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holiday that celebrates traditional Marshallese culture,” Cris Lindborg, director of the Marshallese Culture Center and coordinator for the Manit Day celebrations said.

There were displays and hands-on demonstrations at Monday’s event, including weaving, rope making, fire starting, husking coconuts, traditional fishing and use of plants in traditional healing.

• **Television and radio changes:**

Due to a budget reduction and consequent staffing decrease, the Kwajalein affiliate of the American Forces Network changed. Beginning Oct. 23 the morning radio show with Rich Feagler, was reduced to three, two-hour programs weekly; the Window on the Atoll, become a twice monthly program; and there was a significant reduction in Roller support.

• **Roi All Hands meeting:** An ‘all-hands’ meeting was held Oct. 20 on Roi-Namur. Col. Stevenson Reed, U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll commander, Lt.Col. Harold Buhl, USAKA Reagan Test Site Range commander and Dave Norwood, Kwajalein Range Services president spoke to the group and answered questions.

Reed described upcoming changes relating to a decreased budget for USAKA. “You have to adjust,” he said about the transformation facing this community. “In the year 2009-2010 we have a 20 million dollar deficit [in the budget] that we have to get through.” He added that it will be that long before the budget is stabilized and USAKA can get back into the black. “That’s the reason why the changes are coming. We are trying our best to mitigate as many changes as we can.”

• **Yokwe Yuk Club faces closure:** One initiative on the power reduction plan list called for ‘consolidation of functions and shutdown of targeted facilities.’ A specific example cited was the closure of the Yokwe Yuk Club. The Club closed on Oct. 31.

“I think the best thing about the event is the camaraderie. Kids get to go nuts for about 20 minutes and shave cream their friends, the lifeguards and the adults who volunteer,” Amanda Morris, Kwajalein Range Services Pools and Beaches supervisor said.

Morris and her team, mostly volunteers, manage the mayhem.

This year the department bought about 300 cans of shaving

Others included the Shaving Cream Social and a Monster Mash at the Vets’ Hall, the final party at the Yokwe Yuk Club, a Halloween bowling night, and the Kwajalein Scuba Club’s underwater pumpkin carving contests and trick or treating in family housing.

• **Lights out:** The U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll/Reagan Test Site regulation covering housing management, part of Reg. 210-50 directed the community to turn off exterior lights after midnight. No Christmas or New Years exterior electrical consuming decorations will be allowed prior to Dec. 1 or after Jan. 3 of each year.

• **Commander updates community on transition:** Col. Stevenson Reed, U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll commander, addressed the community via a Kwajalein American Forces Network television programs Nov. 29-Dec. 1.

In the address, the colonel outlined the transition plan for USAKA over the next four years.

He identified the transition plan as a systematic approach to transform and expand mission capabilities at the projected funding levels, adding that the transformation will be accomplished by the installation of a fiber optics cable system not later than fiscal year 10. The fiber optics will enable Reagan Test Site Distributed Operations and Huntsville-centric operations, reducing the on-island footprint.

Reed explained how RDO will enhance the capabilities and operations for USAKA's customers enticing more customers to use the range, ensuring an increase in customer dollars supplementing the budget, even if the POM dollars decrease.

The implementation of RDO is planned to begin in FY 08. "Our initial focus will be to stand up a Space Operations Prototype in Huntsville to shadow the space operations conducted on Kwajalein," Reed said. "As this capability matures over the next two - three years, the mission responsibility will shift to our Huntsville facilities."

Grace Sherwood Library loosing paid staff: Beginning in January the Grace Sherwood library will be de-staffed. Kwajalein Range Services announced that a private club or organization, staffed by volunteers could pledge to keep the library open. KRS is looking at options to keep the doors from closing.

Holiday celebration: At a little after 5 p.m. on Dec. 1, Santa stepped jauntily from the aircraft, forgoing his typical transport of sleigh and tiny reindeer. Lt. Col. Harold Buhl, with a grin from ear to ear, greeted the purveyor of candy and goodwill. The U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Reagan Test Site commander looked as if he was as excited to meet Santa as any of the hundreds of children waiting behind the fence at the airport.

Santa came forward, tossing candy over the tall fence and shaking hands and personally greeting many of his young admirers. Then it was up onto the Santa Mobile for a quick parade to downtown Kwajalein.

This year's parade traveled a different route to support the new tree-lighting ceremony location. The children and adults who surrounded and trailed the Santa Mobile didn't seem to mind. Santa and his helpers tossed candy and kept the energy level high on the short parade.

The tree lighting ceremony was held at the entrance to downtown, on the grass north of Macy's. The new location was a result of the power reduction plan that closed the Yokwe Yuk club, traditionally used for this event.

• **Kwajalein/Roi Town Hall**

meetings: Representatives from the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll held two town halls on Dec. 4 and 5. Both meetings had the same format. They began with a slide presentation restating the information provided by Col. Stevenson Reed, USAKA commander, in his television broadcast the previous week.

A USAKA lieutenant colonel acted as spokesman for both meetings and was backed by a panel of subject matter experts from both USAKA and Kwajalein Range Services.

"There are two main reasons why we are transforming. Number one: We have got to become an organization that is more customer-friendly. We have to take the range to the customer. It costs a lot just to get here. And that's what RDO is going to do," the lieutenant colonel said. "Reason number two: We've got to accomplish our mission with the resources that the 'big Army' has given us. Those resources are finite. Because we are a country at war, those resources continue to shrink."


