### Navigation and Stick Charts

In order to navigate in the open ocean, sailors from the Marshall Islands used observation of the only two things visible – sky and water. An apprentice would spend years memorizing the night sky, ocean features and other signs like cloud shape and flight patterns of birds. The stick charts were a teaching tool but are not maps in the western sense. The knowledge contained in a stick chart would be meaningless without the guidance of its maker. The information would be committed to memory. Stick charts were not taken out to sea as tools.

# POST OFFICE

## Questions about the post office answered here

The post office here at U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll is a confounding place. There are rules and regulations from both the U.S. Postal Service and the Military Postal Service that most residents don't even know about, let alone understand completely. This can lead to frustrations and questions when it comes to receiving and sending mail. Following are some clarifications to some common questions residents have voiced about the post office.

Where is my package? It is sometimes upsetting when you receive a package in one week, but then another takes one month or longer. There are several factors to explain "lost packages." The biggest reason packages get lost or take a long time to arrive is an incorrect address. APO and FPO have similar zip codes which can cause confusion (i.e. China Lake is 93555). To avoid delay, make sure the zip codes are written clearly. It doesn't take much for a 4 to look like a 9 or a 0 to look like a 6. Also remember that Roi-Namur has a different zip code and Consolidated Mail Route number than Kwajalein. Their zip code is 96557 and their CMR number is 702. Ensuring you input the CMR when entering your address can help keep things routed in the right direction. The

USAKA post office does not control the time it takes for a package to be delivered, nor can they answer for the military or U.S. Postal Services. Gina Heidle, KRS Postal Manager, recommends requesting a "Delivery of Confirmation." This service only costs \$.75 for priority and \$.85 for Space Available/Parcel Post. While insurance provides an accountable article number, that number is only of use to the USPS for reimbursement; the mailer cannot track their packages with that number.

If you're concerned about getting letter mail and packages out in a timely manner, here are a few tips. For Kwajalein residents, packages and letter mail need to be brought to the post office by Monday closing time to make it onto the Tuesday plane. Letter mail

placed in the drop box on Tuesday will go out on the Thursday plane. For Roi-Namur residents, you must get your packages and mail to the post office by 2 p.m. the day before a plane arrives; this gives enough time to get the mail to Kwajalein and be included with all the other outgoing mail. Note that on every second Thursday of the month, there is no ATI flight; there is, however, a C-17 on that Saturday. Any mail brought to the post office after Monday will go out on that Saturday flight.

Do you get aggravated that your post office box door gets stuck or is hard to open? The extreme climate here at Kwajalein is not very nice to the metal doors at the post office, especially Oceanside. You have a few options here. The best thing you can do is to check your box every day or as often as possible. This helps to keep the mechanism working properly. You can also physically change your address so you can be relocated to a box closer to the front of the building. As a reminder, at no time is a postal employee authorized to remove mail from your box and give it to you; they can temporarily pop the door open from the back for you to access your mail. Postal clerk Dennis Joji works hard to keep the boxes working properly and replaces them when materials are available, but it's a tough job to keep up with the salty conditions here. If your box becomes too much of a headache, e-mail Postal Manager Heidle for a solution.

On the subject of checking your box every day, don't forget to fill out a vacation slip when you go off island. You may retrieve a leave/vacation slip from any window and all the clerks will be more than happy to assist you. The post office needs something in writing to hold mail for more than 30 days. When you fill out a vacation slip they start a special tray. Without the special tray your box will fill up quickly and they will be unable to slot first class mail. This slows down the entire process of sorting mail.

Look for mail updates on the whiteboard by the pick-up window. Messages about delayed or cancelled planes will be displayed there. They will also announce if

an extra plane arrived and brought mail. This board also informs you whether or not all the mail for the day was sorted; usually, packages are not completely sorted until close to the end of the day.

Do you have issues with websites that do not offer shipping to APO or PO Boxes? Some residents have thought of a clever work-around for this issue; however, you won't be able to get away with it for much longer. If your PO Box is 1234 and you live on Ocean Road, sometimes residents will address their packages to "1234 Ocean Road" instead of putting a PO Box number. While this has worked in the past, it will not in the future. Beginning in October, MPS has directed the USAKA post office to "return to sender" for packages that arrive with a street address. Companies usually will not ship to APO or a PO Box is because the package may contain materials such as alcohol or batteries that could ruin other mail. However, your best option in this situation is to call the company and see if they will make an exception if the materials truly are not hazardous.

There have been recent changes to who is allowed privileges at the USAKA post office. As a clarification, if a non-US dependent spouse was previously denied military post office privileges because he or she entered into their own contract, that member may be grandfathered into having their MPO privileges reinstated as long as they arrived on Kwajalein or Roi as a command-sponsored dependent. For any questions on this subject, contact Heidle.

Are you getting ready to PCS and have a lot of packages to mail out? Make an appointment. You will get one-on-one service that will not only speed up the mailing of your packages, but will not tie up the line for other customers. Depending on size, it takes about one hour to address and ready 10 boxes for mailing.

# The Names of Kwajalein

*Kwaj and Roi-Namur air fields named for heroes of Operation Flintlock*

The airport on Roi-Namur is named for Medal of Honor recipient Lt. Col. Aquilla Dyess. He was born Jan. 11, 1909, in Andersonville, Ga. He graduated from Clemson College, Clemson, S.C., in 1932 with a Bachelor of Science degree in architecture.

On the last day of the invasion on Namur, in what would be the final hours of the invasion, Dyess was killed by a burst of enemy machine gun fire while standing on the parapet of an anti-tank trench directing a group of infantry in a flanking attack against the last Japanese position in the northern part of Namur Island. In this final assault, Dyess posted himself between the opposing lines and, exposed to fire from heavy automatic weapons, led his troops in the advance. Wherever the attack was slowed by heavier enemy fire, he quickly appeared and placed himself at the head of his men and inspired them to push forward.

Dyess was the highest ranking officer killed in the battles at Kwajalein Atoll. After the battle, some of the men hung a sign unofficially naming the airport Dyess Field. The field was officially named in 1967. For his actions in the battle, Dyess was awarded the Medal of Honor posthumously for "conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his life."

Dyess was initially buried in the 4th Marine Division Cemetery on Roi-Namur Island, then later, in 1948, he was reinterred in Westover Memorial Park Cemetery, Augusta, Ga.

The Kwajalein Air Terminal, formally titled Bucholz Army Air Field, was named for Pfc. Fred H. Bucholz, a member of C. F 3rd Platoon, who was killed in the last three hours of the Battle of Kwajalein.

He and his sergeant were attempting to clear out Japanese soldiers who were holed up in shelters near what is now quarters 222 and 224. Both men


had thrown captured explosives into one of the shelters. Thinking the explosion killed the holdouts, they stood surveying the damage. From another shelter, a Japanese rifleman fired from a roof opening, striking Bucholz in the back and killing him instantly. About an hour before, Bucholz had rescued his wounded lieutenant, earning him a posthumous award of the Distinguished Service Cross for extraordinary heroism in the battle.

The citation stated, "For extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy while serving with the 32nd Infantry Regiment, 7th Infantry Division, in action against enemy forces on 4 February 1944. Private First Class Bucholz's intrepid actions, personal bravery and zealous devotion to duty at the cost of his life, exemplify the highest traditions of the military forces of the United States and reflect great credit upon himself, the 7th Infantry Division, and the United States Army."

The Kwajalein air field was dedicated on May 30, 1967, during the Memorial Day celebration on Kwajalein. The ceremony drew one of the largest crowds ever, with more than 2,000 in attendance. A permanent marker designating the field as Bucholz Army Air Field was unveiled during the ceremony. The marker included the bronze plaque designed by Neil Phelps-Munson, the *Hourglass* editor, while the base, which

included a photo of Bucholz, was designed by Gene Stevens of Global Engineering. The monument still stands today, albeit sans the photo of Bucholz.

Bucholz is buried at the National Memorial of the Pacific in Honolulu, Hawaii.

A plaque stands in front of the highly visible, brightly painted wall that reads, "In Honor of the military men and women and their families who have lived and worked on Kwajalein Atoll, 1944 to present." Beverly Vencill, a longtime Kwajalein resident and wife of Vietnam veteran Jim Vencill, decided the long, nondescript wall could serve as a noticeable "symbol of gratitude that would celebrate military personnel and let them know we do appreciate them." Flowers were chosen to adorn the expanse because Vencill felt flowers were an island theme, a symbol of welcoming and 'aloha spirit' that she wanted to portray. With help from residents and various contractors, the wall and plaque were dedicated on Feb. 26, 2007.



# E-Talk

## Time Takes Its Toll

Most of us see reminders of Kwajalein's past every single day. As we travel around the atoll, there are fragments of Kwajalein's past all around us. The most obvious of these are the World War II era buildings which can be found on Ebeye, Bigej, Gagan, Ennylabegan, Kwajalein and Roi-Namur.

As we know, most these buildings are not in good condition and can be dangerous. Kwajalein residents often comment on how rapid the deterioration seems to them.

Some of the buildings actually suffered damage during the battle and have been unstable since 1944. Other buildings have deteriorated since World War II, slowly crumbling in response to the inevitable forces of time, salt, vegetation, corrosion and erosion.

Every year, KRS conducts an assessment of the condition of every World War II structure eligible for the RMI National Register of Historic Places. Each building is visited, assessed for changes in condition and photographed. Existing deterioration conditions are tracked, new evidence of deterioration are noted, and, when possible, Work Requests are submitted to remove conditions threatening the building's preservation.
