

**The Weather Bulletin**

### El Niño at Kwajalein

In El Niño, the sea surface temperature in the Pacific Ocean near the equator is at least 0.5 C warmer than normal. An "El Niño Watch" from the NOAA Climate Prediction Center is now in effect. This means sea surface temperatures have become warmer than usual and an El Niño is likely to occur by September 2012. The last El Niño was from June 2009 to May 2010. This El Niño "modoki" had little effect on us. A previous El Niño from June 2004 to February 2005 spawned Tropical Storm Talas which tracked within radar range of Kwajalein. The strongest El Niño since 1944 was from April 1997 to May 1998. Typhoon Paka tracked within radar range of Kwajalein during it. Our last four tropical cyclones (Roy 1988, Zelda 1991, Paka 1997, and Talas 2004) occurred during El Niño conditions. Due to El Niño, at Kwajalein, expect higher than normal rain September through November, followed by a drier than normal dry season in 2013.

# Guide to island athletics facilities, programs

*Attention TDY workers: read about how to stay involved, active*

With budget cuts and staffing changes, it can sometimes be difficult to figure out who runs what department and more importantly, who to contact if you have questions. One department with recent changes is Community Activities. Most know Kim Yarnes as the Community Activities Manager. However, a large portion of CA programs are run by someone else – Mandie Morris. She is the recreation and programs manager and is in charge of the athletics program, wellness program, bowling, Corlett Recreation Center, Community Activities Center, Adult Recreation Center, Ivey Gym, gear locker and oversees pools and beaches. Morris first worked at Kwajalein as the pools and beaches coordinator from 2005-08. She returned at the end of 2009 for her current role. She has a Bachelor of Science in health, physical education and recreation from Tennessee Wesleyan College. She played tennis and cheerleading during her undergrad and has been lifeguarding since she was 15. Morris went on to attain a master's degree in recreation administration from Middle Tennessee State University. She did her master's research on the economic impact of parks and recreation.

### Athletics

There are five adult recreation leagues offered throughout the year. Kwajalein Jr./Sr. High School teams also play in these leagues. Outdoor soccer season begins Tuesday and will run through October. Indoor volleyball will start up in November and continue through the end of the year. Basketball, water polo and softball are also offered. Morris runs the athletics program, scheduling games and maintaining stats throughout

the season. For each sport there is a night supervisor from Community Activities. This is often Morris, Labtak Langrus or Linber Anej.

### Wellness Program

Morris recently took over the wellness program. She will rev the program back up with ongoing quarterly activities. "What we're going to try to do is offer some kind of ongoing wellness activity every quarter, whether that is exercise classes or stretching classes, where people can try out something new and figure out which kind of group exercise they prefer," Morris said. She will schedule another triathlon challenge and is looking at doing a wellness fair in the spring. "It's hopefully something that will kick off every quarter and that isn't necessarily a one-time event, but something that you can participate in through the entire quarter." She wants to keep the program diverse and hopefully involve all island residents, not just those who already work out or eat healthy. "The idea is to try to reach people ... and get them moving, excited or educate them about nutrition choices or healthy lifestyles." She plans to involve the hospital staff to include information on nutrition and general health. Her hope is that residents can try something new every quarter and find out what suits them best for a healthy lifestyle.

### Ivey Gym

The gym installed new equipment earlier this year and is open 24/7. As part of the Wellness Program, Morris will have pamphlets available around the gym containing information on workouts and how to use the machines. To use the gym without supervision, you must be at least 15 years old. Ages 12-14 are only allowed in the gym with adult supervision. Anyone under age 12 is not allowed in the gym. E-mail Mor-

ris for the cipher lock code. Expect increased usage with TDY workers on-island over the next few months.

### Corlett Recreation Center/ Community Activities Center

The CRC and CAC are open from 4-9 p.m., Tuesday through Saturday, and 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Monday. The CRC is available for reservations; you are only allowed to reserve rooms during open business hours. It is free to reserve and great for birthday parties, meetings for clubs and exercise classes. Food and drinks are only allowed in Room 1. Call the CRC, not the CA office, for reservations.

### Bowling

Hours for Kwaj Lanes changed on Sept. 1. You can now bowl from 4-9 p.m. on Saturdays. The center will open earlier so families can bring their kids after school, but will stay

open late enough for adults and regular bowlers in the evening. You can also hold private parties at the bowling center. Simply call the CA office to discuss the date and time at least two weeks in advance. A \$45 non-refundable deposit is required; it will go toward your bowling fees on the day of your party. The bowling center recently underwent a major makeover. With Quality of Life Fund support, there is new seating, balls and shoes. Adult leagues are offered in the fall and spring. Thompson Tarwoj is the man to see at the bowling center – he handles operations

on Saturdays, during private events and the adult leagues.

**Adult Recreation Center**

The ARC houses pool tables, ping pong tables, shuffleboard, air hockey, foosball, darts and TVs. There is also a computer room and Wi-Fi available. There is a soundproof band room and kitchen; you can check out a key for these rooms from the CA office during their open business hours. There is a Wednesday night movie every week at 7:30 p.m. Check the TV and Entertainment Guide or the Coconut Wire for movie listings. To use the ARC, you must be 19 years old, have a K-badge or be a military ID holder. To gain access, e-mail Morris for the cipher lock code. The ARC is open for use from 9 a.m. to midnight. Expect increased usage with TDY workers on-island over the next few months.

**Pools and Beaches**

While Morris oversees pools and beaches, it is run by Mark Houseman. There is a new pavilion reservation hotline. Call 52945 to check if a beach pavilion has been reserved. Reservations will be listed throughout the week and weekend. To make a reservation, call the CA office. There are several programs offered throughout the year including Learn to Swim for kids, lifeguarding classes, water safety and the elementary swim program. The Kwajalein Swim Team also coordinates with pools and beaches for their fall and spring seasons. For the fall, the Family Pool is open every day after school, 11 a.m.

to 6 p.m. on Sundays and noon to 6 p.m. on Mondays. The pool is closed on Thursdays for cleaning. The Adult Pool is open 24/7, except Wednesdays when it is closed for cleaning. You must use the buddy system and be at least 18 years old. Emon Beach lifeguard hours are 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. on weekends and holidays. All other beaches enforce the buddy system.

**Gear Locker**

Equipment for various sports is available for check-out through the CA office. There are no gear locker hours of operation. If you require equipment, contact Morris to set up a time for pick-up.

The CA office is open 8 a.m. to noon, Tuesday through Saturday. Even though the office is closed in the afternoons, you can still reach Morris by e-mail during normal business hours. Staffing shortages have many departments in a pinch when it comes to office coverage; the CA office is definitely feeling it. Be courteous and come into the office during open hours of operation. Coming up to the office and knocking on the door after hours is not the best way to reach a CA manager. E-mail is the best solution for after-hours communication.

Communication is important to the Community Activities department and to Morris. If you have ideas or comments for any of these facilities or programs, you will get the best results by calling the CA office at 53331 or e-mailing Morris directly about it for a solution.



### Missile Defense Agency MDA Integrated Flight Tests at USAKA/RTS

The Missile Defense Agency has completed the MDA Integrated Flight Tests at U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll/Ronald Reagan Ballistic Missile Defense Test Site Environmental Assessment. The EA analyzes the potential environmental consequences that could result from performing integrated flight tests at USAKA/RTS, Wake Island and in the Pacific broad ocean area needed to demonstrate integrated Ballistic Missile Defense System effectiveness against short range ballistic missile targets, medium range ballistic missile targets and air-breathing targets in an operationally realistic flight test. Interceptor missiles proposed for use in the tests would be the Aegis Standard Missile, Terminal High Altitude Area Defense missile and Patriot missile. Previously planned and on-going activities at the alternative sites would continue.

Public comments on the EA and Draft Finding of No Significant Impact were accepted through Aug. 20. No comments were received that required revision to the EA. Based on the analysis, the MDA has determined that proposed activities are not expected to result in significant impacts to the environment and an Environmental Impact Statement is not required.
