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ROI COMMUNITY BIDS FARWELL TO FRIEND



Bryan Stigler 1999-2017

The Roi community, USAG-KA Command staff, KRS leaders and Kwajalein friends gathered Friday, Jan. 13, at the Trade Winds Theater to celebrate the life of late Roi resident Bryan Stigler.

A proud native of Louisiana, Stigler passed away Nov. 13, 2016, leaving the small island community in mourning. Stigler had worked at the Roi-Namur Power Plant for close to 10 years, making scores of close friends along the way, both at the plant and elsewhere in the small island community.

Some of Stigler's family members made the long trek from the United States to the northern tip of Kwajalein Atoll to attend the memorial ceremony. Stigler's daughter Kaleb "Birdie" Stigler, also from Louisiana, told personal anecdotes of her father's antics as a professional prankster and loving father.

Members of Stigler's Roi rat family echoed his daughter's sentiments, some telling hilarious stories of a man who loved to laugh just as much as he loved to cook, feed his neighbors and scare the wits out of them with rubber masks.

During his 58 years of life, Stigler touched the lives many people. Some of their stories, told during the memorial ceremony, are printed below.

Kaleb "Birdie" Stigler—"You all, obviously, know my dad. He raised me to be just like him, and anyone who's had a conversation with me—Jerry knows—knows that I'm the miniature Bryan. ... My dad was more than my dad. He was my teacher. He showed me things across

the world. He taught me to be more humble. We experienced life anywhere, from having to eat tomatoes for dinner because we were so broke and couldn't get anything else, to traveling the world, going to see Thailand, the Philippines, to doing things together through time."

Stigler continued: "I remember being a little girl. We grew up in southern

Louisiana. We had seven acres of land in the middle of nowhere. ... We had this country house, and my brother was... sitting in the bedroom. It was nighttime. It was an old wooden house, and his bed was right by the window. And my dad, as everyone knows, likes to prank people and scare the crap out of them. So, he thought it would be funny—me being

three or four—to go out and go by the window [and scare us]. ... He goes out the front door, and he doesn't know that I'm behind him. So, before he's able to sneak up to the window, I got to sneak up to him and [scare him] in the middle of the dark in the country. And the man about pooped his pants."

She concluded: "The man taught me a lot of things. I lost my best friend. ... And as I saw this theater fill up tonight, it humbles me even more to know that's the man who raised me. The same man that all of you came here to celebrate.

Thank you all very much."

Scott Maddox—explaining an eye-catching "Cheetah Speed" certificate Stigler earned for acting quickly during an emergency at the Roi-Namur Power Plant: "He was on duty one night, and there was an engine fire. And he went off with cheetah speed and got the proper fire extinguisher and put it out before the fire department even got there. And that's how he got that award. ... I never really got to hang out with Bryan too much. He was mid-shift, and I was day

shift. We'd meet each other, passing in the morning and say, 'Hey,' and that was about it. I'd party with him every once in a while on the back porch, a famous place. I'll miss him; he was fun."

Dan Gunter—"I knew him sort of in two capacities. I guess, first and foremost, he was the maintenance officer for the Roi-Namur Dolphins Scuba Club for ... Does anyone know how long? ... He was the only reason our air compressor is still

SMDC COMMANDER BRIEFS KWAJALEIN COMMUNITY

Lt. Gen. James Dickinson, the newly appointed commanding general of the U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command, made his first visit to the Reagan Test Site on U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll this week. It was an opportunity for the former U.S. Strategic Command chief of staff to get a ground tour of RTS facilities on Kwajalein Atoll, receive briefings on RTS orbital tracking and anti-ballistic missile missions and meet the men and women who make RTS and USAG-KA tick.

During a speaking event Wednesday, Jan. 18, Dickinson made it a point to emphasize that his first work trip out of Redstone Arsenal after assuming command should be Kwajalein Atoll.

“It’s very, very important what happens out here,” Dickinson told a crowd of island residents and off-island visitors at the Kwajalein High School Multi-Purpose Room. “Important enough that ... this is my first trip. I wanted to come here first and then continue onward to Fort Greely, Alaska.”

It’s there in the subarctic that Soldiers of the 49th Missile Defense Battalion man some of the deployed anti-intercontinental ballistic missile interceptors that form the backbone of the Missile Defense Agency’s Ground-Based Midcourse Defense system. As the senior commander of both Fort Greely and RTS—which plays a major role in all GMD flight tests—Dickinson’s eagerness to put eyes on the Kwajalein Atoll element of the sweeping system was apparent.

The general led a viewing of the SMDC’s new command mission video, designed to provide an engaging five-minute overview of the agency’s current capabilities and emerging technology testing programs, and he said he was happy to see how often RTS sensors, facilities and personnel are featured in the

video package. Everything from Kiernan Re-entry Measurement Site radars to the Kwajalein Mission Control Center make an appearance. It’s a reflection, Dickinson said, of the strategic importance of the test site and the hard work of the people who operate it.

“The mantra is that the sun never sets on SMDC/ARSTART,” Dickinson said. “That’s because we have Soldiers across 11 time zones and 22 different locations around the world. You are one of them.”

Dickinson also took a moment to reflect on not only the camaraderie of the people behind the Kwajalein Atoll mission, but also the quality of life available to those who live and work here.

“Coming out here, my impression is this is a great team,” he said. “Particularly with the seamless between the operations piece, the garrison piece, the testing piece and having families and programs here on the island to support all that. ... You can come out here and spend an indefinite period of time ... and have all of these creature comforts that you have [in such a remote place.]”

Dickinson ended his address to the Kwajalein community with an optimistic message, reflecting on mission and garrison funding and the recent transition of responsibilities for base oversight from the SMDC to the Installation Management Command.

“I’m your advocate, one of the advocates for the quality of life and mission support out here ... And, again, it’s a very important job,” Dickinson said. “I think you’re on a great path with funding and some of the [transitions] that have occurred over the past year or so. So, I’m optimistic about your future, in terms of the strategic plan.”



SOW WELCOME AT MEMORIAL GARDENS

Helping hands are welcome at the Kwajalein Memorial Gardens. Built on the site for the Hydroponic Gardens in 1973, the lush space once served as a popular gathering place for parties and plant lovers. Today, areas of the site have been adopted by some Kwaj growers. James and Eleanor Talich, Cynthia Pavia and Barry Grinter are frequent visitors. But remaining overgrown plots offer other residents a chance to get their green on.

The garden contains different species of palm trees, indigenous flowering plants and medicinal plants. Shade from overhead trees makes the garden an ideal place to escape the heat of the day on the weekends.

The area comes equipped with a toolshed and potting supplies for the site. In the early spring of 2016 Pavia and Grinter began to maintain a corner of the grounds that includes a small pond and shaded footpath. A fierce believer in organic and healthy foods, Pavia cultivates medicinal plants and several species of decorative and practical plants.




"It would be great if people would come adopt a space here to keep up," said Pavia, eyeing a large cactus surrounded by flowering weeds. "Like a beach cleanup."

If you don't have a green thumb, the garden still needs help with one important task: moving fallen fronds and coconuts to collection locations at the edges of the grounds.

"The coconut crabs eat the inside, leave the husk, and that fills with rainwater. Then you've got a bigger mosquito problem," said Pavia.

Space is available to cultivate a wide variety of plants, but all non-native species must be kept in pots or planters. Newcomers and visitors are advised that established garden plots should not be disturbed. For safety and security, it is not OK to eat produce from established garden plots, or to remove equipment and tools from the garden. The best thing new growers and visitors can do is to respect the adopted spaces. This will ensure that the garden continues to be a free zone for everyone to enjoy the outdoors and try new agricultural techniques.

"Really, I experiment," said Pavia. "I order in the seeds and try to find out what works. There's a lot of hard work happening down here to keep this place nice for everyone. The most important thing people can do is to visit often to enjoy this place."



"It seemed like a logical thing to happen on a beach," says Dana Carlson.

After spending three summer seasons in Antarctica, a seaside getaway seemed like the ideal place for the new clubs supervisor to thaw out. Her idea helped Kwaj residents find their "five O'clock somewhere" at Emon Beach, Jan. 16, during the second Beach Bar event.

The cash-only Beach Bar invites beachgoers to queue up at noon to enjoy frozen drinks and cocktails made by Ocean View Club bartenders Peter Janer and Liz Burns.

Popular items can range from frozen stawberry daiquiris to mimosas. Last Monday, it was an imperial bloody mary, made with a house blend of pepper infused vodka and the works.

running to this day, and I'm sure very soon here we will miss him a whole lot more. Because none of us have any idea how to do anything that he did, and it's only [with difficulty] that we try to replicate what we saw [him do]."

Gunter continued, quoting a line from the movie "Secondhand Lions:" "'A man's body may grow old, but inside his spirit can still be as young and as restless as ever.' He had more spirit than one man, and I don't believe I've met anyone that that was more true of."

Chris Bennis—"Anyone who knew Bryan ... knew that he liked to tell stories and jokes. For me, every time I'd see him, he'd have a new story or something to say. And the majority of the time what he said would offend half of me, and the other half of me would think it was as funny as hell. ... So, even if I didn't agree with what he said, I still had to laugh at it. And I think that was true with probably the majority of the people here. The thing about Bryan is he didn't really care what you thought about him, and I love that. I mean, you've got to admire that. He didn't live his life, trying to get gratitude and worrying about what other people think of him. He lived his life how he wanted to live his life, and that's something that's admirable. But it's hard to do."

Bennis continued: "Bryan liked to play practical jokes a lot. So, if you ever went to the power plant you [would] find a little rubber rat hanging out somewhere that's going to scare the hell out of you. Or he'll put a little rubber snake under your chair or some other rubber items that he may have had. But that's the way he was, and he always tried to see the lighter side of things and make people smile. And I think that was his goal, that when he saw you he was getting a smile out of you. And that's great, you know, to live your life on a daily basis to try and make people happy. That's a wonderful thing, and I think we're all going to miss it."

Mark Swain—"One time [Bryan] says, 'Yeah, when my time comes, I want to come sliding into those pearly gates, all twisted up, covered in crap [and say], Hey, Peter, get out here! Let's do it again! If there's a way, he'll find it.'"

Rey Baldado—"He was a brother, a good friend of mine. ... He was the type of guy that would be friends with anybody. ... I loved that guy very much."

Jim Friedenstab—"When I first came out here 4.5 years ago, I had never had lobster. Bryan gave me lobster, and that was a very touching gesture for me. Because, you know, people don't do that. On the flip side of that, I don't know if it was Halloween or not, and Morris was the lead mechanic then, and Bryan liked to get masks. Rubber masks. ... And so Morris went to go into his office and turned on the light, and here's Bryan sitting there with his mask in his chair. And I thought Morris was going to have a heart attack. There were two sides to Bryan: a little angel and a little devil. Rest in peace, brother."

Jerry Wilkins—"I loved hearing his 'You want to buy a pencil' story, and he loved telling it. I'm going to miss him."

DJ Castle—"One time, Bryan was in the hospital for some reason on Kwaj, and he had come back after getting stitches or ... something like that. He came back to Roi, and JoDanna and I ran into him in the hallway and asked him how his stay was on Kwaj. And he said, 'Oh, it was pretty good. I was trying to get one of them cute nurses to give me a sponge bath.' And JoDanna said, 'We could have sent Jon in.' And that's the only time Bryan didn't have a comeback."

Laura Pasquarella-Swain—"We all know that Bryan does not want us teary-eyed and crying. ... He wants us to celebrate and remember him for the crazy,

wacky guy he was. ... He was a wonderful human being. There wasn't a thing he wouldn't do for any one of us on this island."

Pasquarella-Swain continued: "A bunch of us were down at the beach one day. ... And Bryan shows up at the beach. And I'm like, 'Oh my God, Bryan, you haven't come over to the beach in forever.' And he's like, 'Yeah, yeah, yeah. I need to get a little sun. I need to get out of the room, move off the back porch.' So he's got a towel wrapped around him, and he makes his way to the water, and he was pretty pasty white. You know, the guy did work at nighttime. So he didn't see a whole lot of daylight. And he does one of these little flirt-y, joke-y things and wiggles his butt, whips that towel off, and there he is standing there in a banana thong. And I thought I was going to die right then and there. ... And if I remember correctly, I think his daughter sent him several pairs of them, and I thought, 'Wow, that's an interesting father-daughter relationship.' And here comes Bryan down in the water, with this thong on. And those of us that were at the beach that day, we had to be laughing for a good 5-10 minutes, crying, crying so hard. ... We did get pictures of that; however, we decided we wouldn't put them in our little slideshow tonight. But anyone who'd like to see them, let me know."



WEEKLY WEATHER OUTLOOK

RTS WEATHER STATION STAFF

WEATHER TRENDS: Dry trade winds are in place with sustained speeds of 15-18 knots. We are expecting wind speeds to continually climb, raising possible need for small craft advisory going into Saturday. Wind speeds are expected to decrease going into Sunday and Monday, reaching below-advisory levels.

It has been comfortable outside. For instance, relative humidity was 60-70 percent Wednesday and Thursday. The humidity should remain at current levels through the weekend. However, we did receive almost four inches of rainfall Monday before going into this dry spell.

CAUTION-OUTLOOK: Indicators aren't showing any disruptions in the current weather for next 10 days. With La Niña winding down, expect near-average weather going into February, mostly windy and dry. Average rainfall in February is only 3.3 inches for the month. Time for us weather folks to sit back and do some copy-paste forecasting: "dry to isolated showers and breezey."
