

More boat trailer parking in Hernando Beach?

COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR LEONARD SOSSAMON

1. Request to Use Impact Fees to Acquire and Develop Property Located on Shoal Line Boulevard for Additional Boat Trailer Parking at Hernando Beach Boat Ramp to Accommodate Population Growth.

County Attorney Garth Coller explained that the item being considered by the board on this date is "Has there been sufficient growth in Hernando County, both in terms of local users and outside users to require additional parking in that area?"

The commission voted 5-0 to agree that the area's growth meets the dual rational nexus test, and that additional parking is needed.

The dual rational nexus test is defined in Florida case law as:

The local government must demonstrate a reasonable connection, or rational nexus, between:

 the need for additional capital facilities and the growth in population generated by the subdivision; and • the expenditures of the funds collected and the benefits accruing to the subdivision – Hollywood, Inc. v. Bro-ward County, 431 So.2d 606 (Fla. 4th DCA 1983)

A 5-0 consensus was reached for the next step, to instruct staff to prepare a 180-day feasibility study contract, stipulating that the land will be studied to find if it meets the the county's needs. If, after the 180 day period, it is determined that the area will not be sufficient, the county has no other responsibility for the land.

County Aquatics Director Keith Kolasa displayed an aerial map of the area in question, to illustrate the property being considered

for the additional boat trailer parking. The southernmost property is an acute-triangle shaped plat, with Shoal Line Boulevard and Petit Lane bordering the equal sides of the triangle. Directly north, with Shoal Line Boulevard providing the only road access, is the adjacent parcel, both of which total 4.03 acres

Additional roadways are also planned for the area. Commissioner Wayne Dukes reported that this expansion has been planned for six years, "it's been planned multiple times, and there were no funds, because in the beginning, the legal office said we couldn't use the impact fees. Things have changed." Dukes described trying to navigate Calienta Street while it is lined with boat trailers as "dangerous," and approves of the additional trailer parking. The commissioners discussed the possibility of also constructing roadways, one which would connect Calienta Street to Shoal Line Boulevard, which would eliminate the currently difficult left-turn, particularly while towing a trailer.

INFORMATION PROVIDED IN THE AGENDA PACKET

Hernando County currently has a grand total of 135 boat trailer parking spaces at the various parking facilities on the County's Gulf Coast. County records demonstrate boat registrations have increased from 9,513 in 2008 to 9,937 in 2017, an increase of 424 vessels or an increase of 4.5%. During the same time frame, the countywide population has grown by 10.3% from 164,908 to 181,878>. Also, during this same period of 2008 to 2017, the County has not added any new boat trailer parking facilities/spaces at any of the locations on the County's Gulf Coast. There have been numerous complaints made by citizens

at various BOCC meetings pursuant to the lack of adequate parking facilities and spaces for boat trailer parking at the County's parks and boat ramps on the Gulf Coast. The need for additional boat trailer parking facilities/space is indeed the result of both population growth and boat registration growth in Hernando County. The addition of 4.03 acres of boat trailer parking at the

intersection of Shoal Line Boulevard, Petit Lane and Calienta Street will accrue definite benefits to the properties

upon which the Parks and Recreation Impact Fees were imposed. Staff is of the opinion that due to the County's pop-ulation growth and growth in boat registrations, it is

sufficient to meet the "dual rational nexus test" for use of the County's Parks and Recreation Impact Fees to acquire the 4.03 acres of property identified above and the

subsequent development of such for additional boat trailer parking.

The financial impact of this action will be \$475,000. The funds for this acquisition are available in the County's Parks and Recreation Impact Fees Budget Reserve - Capital Improvement for Park Districts 1, 2, 3, and 4.

Also included in the packet were citizen email correspondence indicating their opposition to the property acquisition for additional parking.

M. Marino of Hernando Beach writes, "The boat ramp and channels are already at maximum capacity and congested. Adding more parking does not alleviate that problem, it just worsens it.

REPUBLIC SERVICES MUNICIPAL SALES MANAGER MARY KASSABAUM

Presentation by Republic Services Regarding Garbage **Collection Services**

Kassabaum presented an update regarding the new changes in Republic Services, primarily in the southeastern portion of the county, where residents will or have received trash bins on wheels to be used with automated collection vehicles. Each household will receive a 95-gallon bin, with the exception of some Homeowners Associations (HOAs), which have opted for 65-gallon bins. Resident-owned trash cans can be used for yard waste (only) if desired.

According to Kassabaum. first notifications in the form of postcards were sent to the public in September 2018. Additionally, phone calls were made and 23 communities with HOAs were contacted By the end of January, each address for which collection is mandatory will receive a mailing describing days when solid waste, yard waste and recycling will be collected.

Additionally, an informational tri-fold brochure will be attached to each trash bin or 'cart" delivered.

Republic has participated in several events for public out-reach, including National Night Out on October 6, 2018, The Seafood Festival on November 3, 2018, Turf Talk! Workshop at Hernando County Utilities on November 9, 2018 and Resident's Night Out on November

HOA, who said that half of the community is comprised of families, and the other half are retirees. The decision was made by the HOA to have 65-gallon bins delivered initial-After 90 days, a household Iv. may opt to have a 95-gallon bin delivered.

Other HOAs that have opted for the smaller 65-gallon cans are; Brookridge, Glen Lakes, High Point, Preston Hollow, Seven Hills, Timber Pines and Wellington.

Commissioner Wayne Dukes asked if it would be possible to have resident's old trash cans collected by Republic for recycling, however Deputy County Administrator Jeff Rogers reported that a specific collection project would cost more than the revenue generated on the recycled cans. It was decided that anyone wishing for their old cans to be picked up for recycling can schedule a bulk pick-up with Republic. Each household is entitled to four bulk pickups per vear.

Taking the trash away will be 16 new automated side-load trucks (14 full-time, and two spares) and 12 rear-load trucks with cart-tippers - the robotic arm that will lift the large cans into the trucks. Seven other designated trucks will collect recyclables. This is actually resulting in a reduction of vehicles from 32 to 26 16 drivers will be trained on the new

Kassabaum report that Republic is currently hiring drivers at \$15.00 per hour.

In the mandatory areas, residents will see an additional property tax assessment of \$172.00. Non-mandatory areas will be billed quarterly by Republic directly, at \$13.49 per month.

There will be no changes in materials to be recycled; cans and plastics in one recycle container, paper and cardboard in the other. Glass is still not recycled curbside.

David Philipsen, a Weeki Wachee resident raised concerns about bin placement and storage, and asked if he could opt-out of using the new bins. BOCC Chairman Steve Champion answered that if a resident lives in the mandatory zone, there is no way to optout of the service. Champion reassured Philipsen that if bin placement was a problem, the driver would correct the placement, and not just refuse to pick up

Commissioner John Allocco expressed concern with the reimbursement amount stated for debris removal. Cecilia Patella was present to address the question, and stated the amount of \$5,198.99 is not the total amount of reimbursement expected. Patella stated that the expected amount is approximately \$3,172,000. According to Patella, there can be multiple applications submitted to the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) which pertain to the same project. Commissioner John Mitten

asked if the FEMA grants required local matches, to which Patella answered, "They do not require a local match, they are a percentage of the expense (paid by the county) ... it could be a little as 75% or as much as 100%

SMITH, ROBERT DARELL YOB: 1986 CHARGES: AGG BATTERY (x2), AGG CHILD ABUSE Arrested at: 20 N MAIN ST, BROOKSVILLE, FL, 34601 Arrest Summary: On 1-16-19, I responded to the Hernando County Sheriff's Office located at 18900 Cortez Blvd in reference to an hit and run which was reclassified to an aggravated battery and an aggravated child abuse. Upon my arrival, I made contact with the two victims who are both victims of the aggravated battery with a motor vehicle. Both victims advised they were leaving the courthouse after filing a domestic violence injunction against Robert Smith, the defendant, due to previous violence between one of the victims and Robert. As they were driving southbound on S. Main St. Both victims advised the defendant pulled out and struck them on the left rear tire rear panel of the truck they were driving in. At this point both victims advised the defendant then chased them through the City of Brooksville until they arrived at the Sheriff's office. I spoke to both victims separately and both stories corroborated one another.

Contact was made with the defendant at the courthouse, who was attempting to get civil paperwork filed against one of the victims. The defendant did admit to crashing Into the vehicle and advised he didn't mean to. The defendant advised he was also just trying to get to the courthouse. I asked the defendant if he had gotten out and checked if the victims were okay and the defendant advised he didn't and seemed not to care. While at the courthouse, the defendant did have [REDACTED]. When I asked the defendant where [REDACTED] was during the incident, he advised [REDACT-ED] was at a friend's house, but could not provide the name of his friend. Shortly after, the defendant admitted that [REDACTED] was in the car with him when he hit the victim's vehicle.

I did observe the victim's vehicle to have red paint transfer on the left rear rim and the left side panel of the truck, which was consistent with their statements.

This is domestic in nature due to one of the victims and the defendant being spouses, and the defendant being-It should be noted, while en route to the

ing, "I messed up. I shouldn't have done it. I guess this is what happens when you're In love." It was determined that the defendant struck the vehicle on purpose In an effort to cause harm to the victims. The defendant is being charged with two accounts of aggravated battery with a deadly weapon and one account of aggravated child abuse. The defendant was given a felony court date of 2-6-19 at 0900 hours, In Courtroom "D." Due to this being domestic In nature, there is a no bond status. The aggravated battery was unwanted by both victims and the aggravated child abuse was also against the child's will.

Arrest Summary: On January 18, 2019 at approximately 0630 hours, the victim stated that her husband, Frederick Ivan Thompson (hereafter,"the defendant'), pulled her hair, struck her with his closed fist several times in the back of the head and on the chin. This incident occurred in the master bedroom of their residence. The defendant then took her vehicle keys and her cell phone which were located in the master bedroom, denying her the ability to call 911. the victim walked out of the master bedroom and the defendant grabbed a butcher knife from

the kitchen. The victim feared for her life and locked herself Into the bathroom. With said knife In hand, the defendant shouted to the victim through the bathroom door that he would kill her and he would stab her 13-year old son, who also resides with them (but was not present during this Incident). While the victim was confined by threat In the bathroom, the defendant then broke the door to the bathroom. While still holding the knife, the defendant again threatened the victim. This was done against her will and fearing for her life, she pleaded with him to stop. The defendant then went back into the master bedroom bed and went back to sleep at approximately 0900 hours. The victim then left the house in her vehicle. The victim came Into the District 1 office to report the Incident at approximately 1130 hours on January 18th, however, she left before speaking to a Deputy but was observed to be injured by the front desk personnel. I made contact with the victim at her place of work, Oak Hill Hospital. There, I observed the abrasion on her chin. She did also have an audio recording from January 12, 2019 of an argument between the two parties which will later be investigated. The mark on the victim's chin is consistent with her statements. Upon investigation at the residence by Deputy J.N., the bathroom door was off the hinges with indentation marks on the

outside. The Deputy J.N. located the defendant at his home on Ederington Drive and he was taken into custody and transported to the Hernando County Jail. He was arrested for Domestic Aggravated Assault, False Imprisonment, Witness Tampering, and Domestic Battery. I conducted an interview with the defendant at the Hernando County Jail. Post-Miranda, the defendant stated that he did "lose his cool" but only that he broke the victim's watch and punched the bathroom door. He further stated that the victim was plotting against him because she discovered he was secretly having lunch with a female companion of his. The defendant is currently being held on no-bond per the bond statute.

Citizen's Input on Stratton Negotiation Action Item

Bruce La Borante said Stratton came to the position through a difficult circumstance and was willing to do his best. He believes that following the process and conducting a search for a superintendent is the way the school board should proceed for the sake of transparency.

Pam Everett stated she would like to see the interview process as the previous board directed. She felt Stratton was doing well but said he should also go through the interview process.

Steve Crognale was an assistant principal under Strat-ton. Crognale listed several of Stratton's qualities: fairness with staff, teachers and parents; follows district and school policies; outstanding work ethic; mentored Crognale with good feedback so that Crognale is a better administrator. Crognale stated that has continued even while Stratton has

been the interim superintendent. Christopher King offered his support of hiring Stratton as superintendent. He believes in promoting from within, indicating that Stratton has a commitment to both the commu-nity and the students. The recruitment cost involved in hiring someone who looks at Hernando County as a stepping stone is also a consideration. King said that hiring Stratton would maintain continuity of leadership. A 12 year veteran of the US Army, King's own leadership experience as an officer gives him a perspective on what makes a good leader. He said a good leader makes others feel "appreciated, supported, and trusted to accomplish the mission. With two school-aged children, King said he would like a superintendent who wants the best for students. He has seen these qualities in Stratton, he said. Stratton "connects with students, supports his teachers, (and to) consistently promote best practices." As a teacher, King has met with Stratton and believes that any decision he makes is for the best interest of the students. Thomas Kalament, Mildred Murrman, and Christopher

Clifford approached together in support of Stratton, but Kalament spoke for the group. Of all the excellent admin-istrators Kalament has worked under, he said Stratton is experienced in all aspects of education. As an assistant principal at Central High School, Kalament feels Stratton has built a positive, successful culture since working at the district office. Teachers appreciate Stratton taking time to visit classrooms in the district's schools. Kalament feels the Board could not find a candidate more qualified than Stratton.

Ray Pinder (and three others), principal of Fox Chapel Middle School, says teaching leadership is something they do daily using the resource, Seven Habits of Highly Effective Teens by Sean Covey. Pinder, whose K-12 years were spent in Hernando County, returned as a teacher. His transitions over his career were made easier because of the truet built with co-workers and with those in leadership the trust built with co-workers and with those in leadership over him. "How you treat one person gets discussed with others," he said. "By building trust with one you build trust with many." Pinder recalled a lesson from a training called "The Speed of Trust:" "When trust is high, speed is fast; when trust is low, speed is slow." Building trust with some-

one from outside the district will slow. Building trust will slow a some said, and recommended hiring Stratton as superintendent. Matt Goldrick gave three reasons the School Board should begin negotiations with Stratton: current role, tem-perament, and experience. Goldrick said he was impressed that Stratton has kept his promise to visit every classroom. His approachability and responsiveness to concerns from parents and staff have had an impact also. Goldrick referred to statements in Hernando Sun by Gregg Laskoski that refer to the confidence parents have in Stratton, the positive impact on the educators and administrators, and his calm demeanor in all situations and administrators, and assessment, Stratton scored well in "strength of stability, support and collaboration." These are qualities, and the experience that Stratton has, that Goldrick says are needed in Hernando County and can be used now rather than wait for an adjustment period with anyone new.

Jason Chase referred to the promise given by the previous board that there would be interviews. As a business owner, Chase said that multiple interviews are necessary when hiring for a key position. Chase sees the interview

process as a means of bringing unity to the community. Lisa Guerin stated that teachers sometimes feel they do not have a "voice" because of the administrator over them. Stratton is different, and after an encounter where they dis-agreed but were able to come to a solution which satisfied them both, Guerin said she felt that Stratton gave her a voice. He encouraged her to improve and to continue her education. She said Stratton will give teachers a voice. Lisa Masserio spoke in favor of the interview process.

She said that she agrees with the comments about Strat-ton's strengths but thinks a local search should be done, citing transparency, or completing the vetting process, as a primary reason. Masserio expressed concern that employ-ees might be unable to provide input or even ask questions of candidates, based on what she heard from the informal meeting. The previous superintendent's actions and directives are still having an impact. Masserio said that a search would help alleviate concerns.

Danielle Underwood said the previous board promised a process with a committee. She complimented Stratton for resolving issues that she and others have brought to his attention. Underwood said that there is no harm in an interview process and expressed confidence that Stratton had the best chance. "It's not about Mr. Stratton," she said. "It's about you, as a board, working for us, the taxpayers." The committee will provide transparency as there are other qualified persons in the school district the school board should consider. Don Abbene, who teaches at Central High School, shared a personal reason for supporting Stratton as superintendent. At a time when Abbene had to take time from work to focus on a personal matter and there was a paperwork processing delay, Stratton offered to help him by donating hours. That showed Abbene "servant leadership" in action. Combined with his vision for the district, Abbene said Stratton's commitment to helping others, his passion, and his leadership will benefit the community. Kevin Fitzgerald, who volunteered to teach at Moton Elementary last year, shared how his strong roots in the district and his combat experiences give him a perspec-tive on leadership. He praised Stratton as one of the best leaders he has worked for, citing Stratton's active listening, fairness and transparency. Actions back up Stratton's words and he trusts district staff, Fitzgerald said, inspiring them to do mean. Stratton's protections in variance providence to do more. Stratton's experiences in various positions at both school and district levels since 2005 give him an understanding of education in all aspects. Since funding is an issue, Fitzgerald asked why it was necessary to seel another candidate. Keeping Stratton will help the district continue to move forward and not lose momentum. Gregg Laskoski said a candidate search would be understandable under ordinary circumstances, but this is not an ordinary time. He referred to his article in the 12/28/18 issue of Hernando Sun. In the article Laskoski briefly ex-plained the case of Citizens for Strong Schools vs The Flor-ida State Board of Education, that approximately 500,000 of Florida's students are failing reading and the FDOE has a constitutional obligation to provide a quality education. One reason given is that there is no obligation, but it is an aspiration. Laskoski said the governor's appointed Education Commissioner has no educational background or experience. Since 1973, Hernando County has consistently received lower than average funds from the State, he said, and the mandate to harden the schools will not come with resources to meet the expenses. Population increases in the county will require new schools soon. Stratton understands all of this, Laskoski said. "Let's stick with the most valuable asset you already have rather than go through a process that is going to consume two things we don't have: time and money Patricia Greenwood said she has known Stratton for more than 10 years and agrees with the positive statements given but advocated for the interview process. She expressed concern that Dr. Romano's ideas and processes are too entrenched in the current leadership. Greenwood said she hopes the interview process will prompt a change at the district level. Patricia Cramer agrees with the supportive comments and said, "Teaching and learning, and building brighter futures is a hallmark of our district." She complimented Stratton for his dedication to those ideals but asked for the search process to select the best qualified candidate, whether that person is from inside the district or not, to lead the district into that brighter future. Toni-Ann Noyes, principal at Nature Coast Technical High School, said she has served under many different superintendents. Speaking directly to Stratton, Noyes we haven't seen in a long time." She spoke of the impact he had simply by asking what he could do for the school secretarial staff. "You have made such a difference to our schools," she said, and expressed that as staff, they feel they can speak without fear of repercussions. "We want to continue to grow as a district." A search may yield a well-qualified individual but building trust will take years. Noyes said Stratton has experience as a teacher, principal, and administrator at the district level, and hiring someone else would be a mistake.

Invocation and Pledge of Allegiance

Board member Gus Guadagnino led the invocation. Students from Eastside Elementary led the audience in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Addendum Items

Board attorney Dennis Alfonso explained that he will assist Duval with the contract negotiation. The process will not be public (as in the entire board meeting with Stratton), but that he will share general information with each board member and receive input on terms they would like to include that he will share with Duval. Once the negotiation has reached the point where the contract is ready for approval, it will be placed on the agenda for a vote.

Citizen Input (General Topics)

Withholding pay Mark Cochrane recently transferred from Polk County Schools to Hernan-do County Schools in the transpor-tation department. He suggested the option of having some pay withheld through the school year so the transportation employees could be paid through the summer. Cochrane said this might help reduce turnover. The option could be voluntary.

Stratton said the district will con-tact him with the reasons why the transportation department is not on a 12-month salary program.

Teacher Recruitment and Retention

Charity Simpson was concerned by comments at the last board meeting regarding teacher retention. With her own budget, Simpson said she must make choices and focus on what is essential. District essentials include teachers, paraprofessionals and administrators. She asked for the district to stop spending money on outside trainings as the district already has teachers who are excellent mentors and leaders. Because trust is built,

learning is more likely to occur. To address the teacher shortage, Simpson said that the State's policies should be changed. District mandates and additional tasks are also causing issues for teachers in the classroom. Teachers leave the profession for various reasons, she said, and lack of respect is as much a problem as lack of adequate pay. Simpson rec-ommended surveying teachers and having the district act on items it can control by reviewing policies "that are driving teachers away."

driving teachers away." Stratton suggested that Simpson meet with Hernando Classroom Teacher's Association president, Vince La Borante. A committee is being formed to discuss teacher recruitment and retention. He said they need to know why teachers leave. Solution-oriented ideas are welcome, he said, so they can reduce the vacancies.

Vince La Borante spoke about teacher recruitment and retention problems, especially since there are still 30-40 open instructional positions. He referred to the "Best and Brightest," which La Borante says causes disharmony. (The \$6,000 Florida Best and

Brightest Scholarship Program is described in F.S. 1012.731: "...it is the intent of the Legislature to designate teachers who have achieved high academic standards during their own education as Florida's best and brightest teacher scholars.")

Patricia Greenwood told Guadag-nino "students are the reason most of us get up in the mornings." The positive comments about Stratton, she said, were mainly from adminis-trators, not teachers. For them, things have not changed much, she said, as that will require a change in the district's mindset. Greenwood compli-mented Stratton for being "hands on" at a school when he visited.

General Counsel

Alfonso shared the time of the closed workshop session, as well as the attendees.

School Board Comments

Gus Guadagnino - From February - April, the Hernando County Education Foundation (HCEF) will have its annual campaign to raise \$100.000. The community event in April will feature the "Battle of the Bands" competition. He listed available scholarships. Details are at www.hernandoeducationfoundation.org under the scholarships tab. Teacher of the Year will be announced 01/18/19. Tools 4 Schools information is on the website. A new license plate to support education is available.

Jimmy Lodato thanked those in the audience who attended and spoke. Though different viewpoints were represented, Lodato recommended coming together and being united. He assured them that the board would hold Stratton accountable. He spoke to La Borante about the concerns raised about Tallahassee. "I'm sad about the way that you (educators) have been treated," he said. "But we're going to make it bet-ter." Lodato said Stratton has already been responsive. Lodato offered to be available to anyone who calls him with concerns

Kay Hatch believes that they all share the same goal. The next task is to decide how to proceed so the they can meet the best interests of students, teachers and community. Linda Prescott visited Winter

Wonderland events at several schools. She thanked them for the time and effort involved in the preparation. Though Prescott cast the only "no" vote, she congratulated Stratton and looks forward to working with him.

Ryan Bradley thanked staff and community members for their support of students. She said she takes her position as student representative seriously and thanked the teachers for putting students first. Susan Duval said she was en-

couraged by the number of people who come to speak at school board meetings. There is no need to fear retribution and teachers and staff

should feel free to express concerns, complaints, or compliments. "Just be civil," she requested. "This has to be an open dialogue. This has to be free. This has to be from the heart because you are all passionate about what you do."

Duval encouraged more partici-pation. "You need to make us think about what we are doing and how we

are doing things." John Stratton complimented Cen-tral High School's Jennifer Dodson for being the first Bay News 9 "A+ Teacher". Dodson was nominated by a student for this honor.

Stratton announced that all school social worker positions have been filled. With mental health an important aspect in education, having 12 social workers in the district will help meet those needs Deltona Elementary's Winter Wonderland display impressed Stratton. He said he was "blown away" by the amount of writing and also enjoyed the fake snow. Addressing the decision to negotiate a contract with him, Stratton said he was humbled by those who came to make comments, both for and against the negotiation. He promised to do his best for everyone involved teachers, students, and parents. Stratton encouraged teachers to approach their principals, as some already have. "We are listening," he said of the school board and district staff. "Things don't happen overnight...but the discussion should be there. He said the board can speak to any of the district staff without clearing it with Stratton first. As professionals, Stratton trusts that they are doing their jobs. He said he looks forward to receiving feedback.

La Borante addressed Guadagnino, saying that colleges are seeing 40% fewer students enroll in edu-cation programs. The University of West Florida closed the School of Education because of the decline in enrollment, he said. "Power and money have replaced historical best classroom practices. and in doing so have systematically declined and (made) schools less productive," he said. La Borante shared stressors teachers experience

He commended Stratton for the decision to revise the mentoring program and to create a committee to discuss ways to increase retention and recruitment.

A 'no-go' for airport self-fueling facility construction contract

2. Award of Contract No. 18-CG0117/BH to GLF Construction Corporation for Aircraft Self Fueling Facility Project at Brooksville-Tampa Bay Regional Airport and Associated Budget Resolution (Cost: \$1,255,770.00)

In July 2017, the county commission approved the funding for the design of a self service fueling station at the Brooksville-Tampa Bay Regional Airport. For facility design, \$19,000 was approved with \$15,202 coming from an FDOT

grant. Hernando County's match was \$3,800. Both Allocco and Holcomb voted against funding the design.

American Aviation, a Fixed Base Operator (FBO) at the airport, provides hangar, maintenance, repair, upgrade and fueling services (but does not provide self service fueling for after hours use). They have been serving the airport for 37 years.

Ón Dec. 18, 2018, the board voted 3-2 against approval of this contract for the construction of the self fueling station. BOCC Chairman Steve Champion and Commissioner Wayne Dukes were the members in favor.

Wunderle explained that the associated Budget Resolution to fund construction is in the form of a \$500,000 Letter of Credit.

Commissioner John Mitten began the discussion by noticing that the original estimate was \$843,000, which Wunderle explained was the starting estimate, before upgrades were added into the final cost.

Airport Manager Kevin Daugherty explained that various funding through grants is expected, as well as county's portion, and he does not expect to use any lines of credit.

Commissioner John Allocco said,"With the \$697,000 FDOT grant, the county's requesting another \$300,000. So after our \$1-million investment in grants, the estimated profit margin is 0.09, less than 1% profit margin ... This is

just outrageous. If everything works out well, we break even after a \$1-mil-lion investment." Allocco added, "We cut the price of AB Gas, which in turn will just make the FBO (Fixed Base Operator) that's there now drop his, and then maybe we don't even break even."

"This is the government stepping in and subsidizing hobby airplanes," Allocco said, noting that the fuel station is intended for non-commercial pilots and planes.

Champion disagreed, saying, "This isn't about profit, this is about bringing people to the airport ... economic development, right?'

City of Brooksville and Hernando County. 'The Main Street Program has brought a positive impact to many cities in Florida and across the USA.'

The town forums presented by Randy L. Wilson, President of Community Design Solutions, and Andy Kalback, landscape architect from Kalback Design provided a vision on possibilities to enhance, enlarge, and dramatically improve Historic Downtown Brooksville.

On Monday, Jan. 14, 2019, at Andrew Jackson Post 99 in Brooksville, Randy Wilson and Andy Kalback discussed 'what can be done and where we need to go.' Wilson sought suggestions from attendees on what they would like to do and on how to make Historic Downtown Brooksville a vibrant place. An outpouring of ideas from a full house of local merchants, residents, private and public sector offices and spectators included; adding color to storefronts, maintaining Brooksville's history, parks with flowers and landscaping, shade for places to sit, ice cream parlor, recreational activ-

ities to excite children, historical & decorative murals, sculptures, bringing back two way street traffic, additional parking, a bike path, a trolley extending beyond Historic Downtown Brooksville, a dog park, a Whole Foods Market, creating apartments and so on. The Q & A also sought references to other places folks have been that were desirable and vibrant.

A culmination of ideas and suggestions discussed were developed into design solutions. Wilson and Kalback presented schematics, site plans, streetscapes, and graphics on Wednesday, Jan. 16 at GFWC Historic Brooksville Women's Club. Unveiled were landscaping designs for sidewalks and crosswalks, paving streets, extending the pavement onto the sidewalk activating foot traffic, expanding the sidewalk with hedges creating outdoor seating, storefront facade enhancements and rehab, art work for the Water Tower, street games and much more.

Corner intersections were a big enhancement concept, to slow down traffic as you enter Historic Downtown Brooksville. The slower pace encourages folks to park, enter a cafe, have an ice cream, walk the streets and explore the shops, restaurants and galleries, or simply sit in a beautifully landscaped open area and enjoy the environment.

The consensus was to make a walking town, with ongoing pedestrian traffic to enrich and maximize what we already have, a historic community with century old oak trees cascading with Spanish moss, a town with a vibrant past and an ever growing present.

As per Ryan A. Malloy, 'It all starts somewhere, by showing up in the masses we know you care about this city of ours, and want it to flourish.'

Robert K. Higgs joined by abutting property owner, Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), has submitted a petition to vacate that portion of Ricebird Avenue lying East of Carolina Dove Road. The .37acre portion of right of way is bordered by Mr. Higgs' parcel, the Suncoast Parkway and Parkway drainage retention area. Mr. Higgs is seeking the vacation to acquire the additional lands to add to his prop erty in order to build a future replacement residence on the parcel. Mr. Higgs will work with the FDOT to acquire the portion of the lands they receive if the vacation is approved. All affected utilities and County departments have indicated no objection to the request.

The petitioner's request was approved 5-0.

2. Ordinance Amending Reclaimed Water Use Program in Accordance With Reclaimed Water Master Plan Update

The commission voted 5-0 to amend the ordinance.

Hernando County Utilities Department (HCUD) has contracted with the engineering firm Greenman-Pedersen, Inc. (GPI) to produce a Reclaimed Water Master Plan. Fifty percent of the cost of the project is funded by the Southwest Florida Water Management District (SWFWMD) and fifty percent by HCUD. Multiple alternate uses for reclaimed water were evaluated during development of this Master Plan. The Weeki Wachee Basin Management Action Plan (BMAP) requirement that all reclaimed water discharged in the area meet advanced wastewater treatment (AWT) for nitrogen. Therefore, the most beneficial use of this product has been determined to be as aquifer recharge. The attached Reclaimed Water Master Plan gives all options that were evaluated as well as conclusions and recommendations.

This ordinance is the finalization of the matters discussed in a workshop in June of 2018. Of main focus was the environment, the water supply and keeping water and sewer rates low. Onderdonk said, "We're trying to avoid costly capital improvement projects stretching out into millions of dollars for reclaim pipes and pumps ... I think it would be more beneficial to use Aquifer Recharge Basins (ARBs) at our water reclamation facilities to recharge the aquifer there as opposed to spending millions of dollars in infrastructure and thousands of dollars in annual operating costs.

He explained that using reclaimed water for residential use only counts as a 50% water quality credit as defined in the BMAP because water is lost in evaporation and transport to the treatment plants. When using aquifer recharge basins at the reclamation facilities results in a credit close to 100%. Onderdonk said, "So not only are you saving money, you're doing what's best for the environment. Onderdonk asked the board to amend the ordinance. The current ordinance requires that developers put in reclaimed water distribution systems, without thresholds for size of the subdivision, no service areas for future use, and no thresholds for availability. It would result in developers putting in reclaimed water distribution systems with no ability to connect to them, and only be a wasted expense. Commissioner Wayne Dukes asked Onderdonk about the facility on Commercial Way / Highway 19, which Onderdonk stated will be up and running by summer 2019. Dukes asked if there was a plan to "reach out to Glen Lakes to get them something for their golf course?" Onderdonk replied that there is already an agreement with Timber Pines for 1.7 million gallons per day, and there will not be enough capacity to serve Glen Lakes as well.

In May 2017, the Board of County Commissioners approved LSF Health Systems to be the lead applicant for the Criminal Justice, Mental Health, and Substance Abuse Reinvestment Grant. "On behalf of the county, we went after a planning grant," Ramirez said, The primary goal of that grant was to assess plans for initiatives that increase public safety, avert increased spending on the criminal justice system and improve accessibility and effectiveness of treatment for services to youth.

The Department of Children and Families (DCF) awarded this \$100,000 grant, and Ramirez reported that she had complete financial and status reports.

Ramirez presented the findings of the year-long study.

45% of middle- and highschool students reported feeling depressed in the last year. 26% reported "Life is not worth it.

- 24% believe they are a failure.

- 39% reported believing they're "no good.'

The self-reported study included public, private and homeschool students.

FLEET OPERATIONS IANAGER KEVIN BROWNING

Approval of Revised Vehicle and Equipment Replacement Strategy Associated With Fleet Replacement Program

Browning urged the board to move forward with vehicle replacements, reporting that Fleet is repairing more vehicles than performing preventative maintenance. "Everything coming in the door has something broke [sic], and that just drives everybody's cost up."

Agenda packet explanation:

"Fleet requests a seven to ten-year line of credit on an as needed basis, not to exceed a maximum of \$6,300,000 to supplement the purchase of attached vehicle list. The line of credit would be reimbursed over a seven to ten-year period at approximately 2.5% interest through the Fleet Replacement program.

"Staff has prepared a budget

either based on the redevelopment fund, which is a dedicated tax fund for Kass Circle. But otherwise, we can be talking to you about other options as well for the financing of those improvements. That will be part of the dialog that we will be

bringing to you in February. Pianta said, "At this time, you have not adopted a tax increment finance district. You cannot do that until you review and approve the plan, so it's a two-step process." Pianta went on to say that he loss of revenue to the General fund is a concern, so in February, he and Miller will also have financial projections available to present.

BOCC Chairman Steve Champion adjourned the meeting.

PUBLIC SAFETY DIRECTOR/FIRE CHIEF SCOTT HECHLER

Update Regarding FY 2017-18 Accomplishments of Hernando County Fire Rescue Hazardous Materials Response Team

Frank D. Francesco acquaint-ed the board with the Hernando County Hazardous Materials (Hazmat) Response Team, which are housed at Station 3 on Spring Hill Drive and Station 7 at Mondon Hill Road. Fifty specially trained technicians receive 1600 hours of initial training, finish a competency task book, and complete a state test to certify. Following that,

training is monthly. Hazmat participates with various regional and state organizations, including the Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC), State Emergency Response Commission (SERC)

Training Task Force (meets quarterly with monthly conference calls), Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI) and the Regional Domestic Security Task Force

(RDSTF). The team has received various grants for training and equipment, including an Electrostatic Decontamination system, which quickly decontaminates equipment following exposure Francesco also reported obtain ing a device which can identify unknown solids and liquids, meaning exposed individuals can be treated faster.

Among others, Hernan-do's Hazmat team works with Oak Hill Hospital to train and exercise decontamination, the National Guard to train and exercise on emergency response, Duke Energy to assist with evaluating operations during an exercise, and Withlacoochee Electric for electrical training. There are many more that didn't make the list.

The team averages about one call per month, mostly for natural gas and propane leaks. Francesco said, "Fortunately, we haven't had too many calls for really bad chemicals, but ... we have an interstate, we have US 19, we have the (Suncoast) parkway, and a lot of chemicals go up and down those high-ways. So we train not just for the everyday response, but we train for the bad actor following a transportation accident."

County Attorney Garth Coller reminded Francesco and the board that there are two railroads that run through the county as well.

stuffers and they are on the menu of legal game to harvest during the small game season. The rules and regulations governing the hunting on this property can be found online at www.

MyFWC.com, however, I can give you the highlights. No centerfire rifles; you can hunt them with a rifle, but it has to be either a small caliber rimfire, or a muzzleloading rifle. You must have a valid hunting license and WMA and can hunt them from one half of an hour prior to legal sunrise until half of an hour beyond legal sunset. No hunting at night or with the aid of dogs or bait piles.

Basically, you have two choices to hunt them; still hunting from a stand or blind, or stalking them as they leave the dense cover to feed. Both are productive, although I highly favor a still hunt. I use food based scent attractants, unless specifically hunting a trophy boar, in which case I rely heavily on a bottle of sow in heat.

Whichever scent I utilize, I employ it on a drag rag, spreading the scent around the hunting area, freshening it up from time to time until I reach my stand site, then I hang that rag on a limb twenty yards into a cleared shooting lane and wait for them to arrive.

As I'd mentioned, the Citrus WMA has a good number of hogs, but they're not found throughout. They're fairy concentrated in the south end of the property, South of CR480 with rooting visible along the roadside in many places.



I am still finding plenty of fresh sign around the water holes and beneath the oaks, with the majority of the trails coming to and from thickets in low lying areas. Pay close attention to your scent control regimen and plan your stand location according to the wind patterns allowing your scent attractants to blow into those thick tangles where the hogs are likely laying up for the day.

Once he's feeling hungry again, Mister Pork E. Pig will come seeking his invitation to ride home with you for dinner.

Big Data Correlations

'Big Data' is a term for the large amounts of data that is collected and then sorted through. Sometimes the results can be very intrusive. An excellent example is the purchasing history data that Target used to determine if someone would be interested in baby products, since they were most likely pregnant. A father was upset when Target started sending his teenage daughter baby products. He complained to Target that they were sending his daughter baby products and they she was only a teenager. It turned out that she was pregnant and Target's big data algorithm knew before he did.

For the successes of big data algorithms there are a number of failures. In 2011, Google Flu debuted- it was supposed to be able to determine where there were cases of the flu by what people were searching for 'flu' on Google. It then used this information to predict flu outbreaks. It turned out that its predictions were not accurate.

There have been many attempts to use big data to play the stock market. Usually, although the data works well on historic patterns, it fails to predict future behavior. Big data has been used on company traits to try to determine which company will be the next Google or Amazon. Big data is used to analyze consumer buying habits to determine which companies to invest in.

Other characteristics from the big data have been identified to determine investments that will be lucrative. In general, these big data algorithms have not been wildly successful.

been misdiagnosed. Men can only pass it on to their daughters, but women can pass it on to either sons or daughters. Left undiagnosed or untreated men generally live to only age nineteen, women to age thirty-four.

At this point, because her heart is only functioning at 5 perent, Dawn's case is critical and she will need a heart transplant as soon as possible. She has had numerous obstacles to overcome just to get on the list for a transplant. Doctors tested her to make sure she was in good enough health to survive the transplant and that she had no other health issues. The transplant list is on a first come, first serve basis, so there are other people ahead of her.

The main obstacle, however, was financial. The transplant alone will cost between \$1.2 million and \$1.4 million. Steven's health insurance will cover only 70 percent of that. Next they had to prove that they could afford the anti-rejection medications that will cost approximately \$22,000 per year. The only way they could show they were able to afford those expenses was that Steven has a 401K through work. However, if he takes the money out he will not only pay a penalty but will be barred from making any contributions to the 401K for a year.

Expenses have been mounting since the boys, now seven and ten years old, were diagnosed and increased drastically when they found out that Dawn also had the disease. Both Dawn and the boys have been hospitalized numerous times. Once, both the boys were in the hospital at the same time. Dawn has already received a pacemaker. Currently, they have to pay \$150 a week just for the medication that is pumped through the special intravenous device to her heart that is in place twenty-four hours a day, not to mention the other medications she takes.

In order to defray Dawn's medical costs, her mother set up a Go Fund Me account. On her Facebook Page, Dawn's mother stated, "This is Dawn's life we are talking about. I have never had to beg for help before but I have to now. The boys need their mommy, I need my daughter, and Steven needs his wife." To contribute go to the following URL: https:// www.gofundme.com/6ie19bs. Another fundraiser is being spearhead by Shirley Lowe, a friend and co-worker of Steven's. The Dybiec's long ordeal began when their youngest son, Gabriel, started having stomach issues. The doctors thought it was celiac disease. Both boys had also been experiencing severe pains in their legs.

"They would wake up screaming with pain in their legs in the middle of the night. I would massage their legs. People kept telling me it was nothing, but my "mom gut" kept kicking in, telling me that something was wrong," Dawn remarks.

Then all of a sudden, Steven was admitted to the hospital because his heart rate was elevated.

He had a heart rate of 298 beats per minute. The doctors said if someone middle aged or older had that heart rate they would have died. They put him in a tub of ice water to bring the heart rate down. It shocks your body and re-sets your heart. They had to perform heart surgery at All-Children's Hospital in St. Petersburg.

Within two weeks doctors found out both boys had a problem. They decided to use genetics to figure out what exactly the condition was. It took six months to get the results back because they had to test each strand of DNA. The tests were very expensive. This was when they found out that Dawn also had the disease and she had to have a pacemaker implanted in March of 2016. Dawn states, "My oldest son gets very emotional. He's afraid I'm going to die. He told me the other day, 'I don't want you to have the surgery. I want the doctors to fix the Danon another way. I don't want you to die.' He's afraid I might die from the surgery. He's very stressed out about it."

There is no known cure, so the transplant will not cure the disease, but it will prolong life.

Although Dawn's husband does not have the disease, he has to deal with the stress of seeing his wife and children suffer.

He works fifty to sixty hours a week as a manager at

a building supply company and has to take over duties that Dawn used to handle.

"I just push myself through it. I have to work [to support my family], be strong for everybody and take care of the family."

Dawn finds her own way of coping.

"I go numb. I try not to think about it because once I think about it... It's scary. I know I have to be strong because I have to show the boys that it'll be okay. It will be worth it in the end because they'll still have me. I have faith.

It's in God's hands."



Both boys will need a transplant when they hit puberty. Although Steven is only ten years old, he's physically mature for his age and puberty could kick in a lot sooner than normal. This means he would need a heart transplant very soon.

Danon disease has affected their lives in many ways. Neither of the boys can play sports or do normal things that other kids do. They can't play with their friends or run around the block. They need therapy three times per week plus counseling and regular doctors visits. With her voice cracking,

Allocco answered, "No, it was about competing with an FBO that's there. We had another FBO and nobody wanted to invest there."

Daugherty said that he was surprised to find that the airport did not have a self-fueling option when he came onboard in 2013. "It was very clear to me why a private business did not put it in, because of cost. So, we're trying to move this forward and give our pilots the opportunity for self-fueling." Daugherty added, "It certainly wouldn't break our hearts (if a private entity wanted to run it) to put it out to bid."

Mitten stated his position has not changed from last year's. "It's the taxpayers subsidizing a lower cost at the expense of the private business person. I don't know if that's public service in the best interest of commerce."

Champion interjected at this point, and said, "The FBO is subsidized by the government. He doesn't pay taxes."

Mitten continued, "You wouldn't want a business in the same industry that you're in stuck beside you, and having a subsidized price." Since approval of the resolution involves a line of credit, Mitten said, "To borrow money to subsidize it- is compounding it.' Dukes reported, "Before the last FBO came in (that failed), I had numerous people who owned small airplanes tell me 'We never buy gas in Hernando County. Even if we have to land before we get here, we don't buy gas in the county. Champion said, "I don't know if the public knows that the FBOs are subsidized by the state. They get all kinds of benefits, so it's not like a private business like (Allocco) and I have. There are no subsidies for me at all ... But the FBO pays zero property taxes, zero millage ... he pays like \$2,800 total per year. We got all the engineering done, we got the grants, and all we've got to do is approve it to get it done, and put us with other airports with self-fueling."

Master Gardener Class begins February 2019

What is a Master Gardener? What do they do? Is the program for everyone? Master Gardener program goals are to provide instruction and science-based information to individuals who will, in turn, volunteer in the community to share that knowledge with the public. Florida's Master Gardener program is part of the Extension Service of the University of Florida's Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences (IFAS).

To be considered for the Hernando County Master Gardener program, attend the orientation program from 6 to 7:30 PM, February 12, 2019. Tickets are available through Eventbrite: https://www. eventbrite.com/e/ufifas-extension-master-gar-

dener-orientation-tickets-53308346700. Then submit a completed application form with background information and references and the tuition fee of \$140 which covers the cost of books and University of Florida Press instructional materials. This is an eleven-week on-line course about horticultural practices in Florida. Many topics are covered including, but not limited to irrigation, fertilization, pest and disease identification, pesticides, insecticides, plant propagation, turf grasses, invasive plant species, forestry and Florida's ecosystem. The class meets for hands-on activities each Tuesday evening beginning on February 24 for ten weeks, with a final exam in early

May. It is important to attend every class.

If your objective is to learn how to care for your own garden, but not to share or teach; then this program is not for you. For your own edification, attend UF/ IFAS Extension and Florida-friendly Landscaping classes in our community.

During the first year in the program, a Master Gardener trainee must commit to 75 hours of volunteer activities and 10 hours of continuing education in extension approved classes. After the first year the volunteer requirement is 50 hours/year. Continuing education remains constant at 10 hours/year. It is a big commitment, but it is easy to earn those required hours. Master Gardeners



They staff information desks at garden centers and the extension service office, volunteer at the Master Gardener nursery, and offer advice for gardening programs in the community. They monitor and care for plants in the atrium at the Government Center in Brooksville. Ellie Schiller Homosassa Springs Wildlife State Park and The Friends of Homosassa Springs Wildlife Park will hold their first Enrichment Day on Monday, Feb. 18, 2019 beginning at 10:00 A.M. at the park located in Homosassa, Florida.

When a visitor walks around the park, he or she may see cardboard boxes, paper bags, newspaper, balls, various toys, shoes, papier mache, or other items in the habitats for each of the animals. This "mess" is part of the enrichment program for each of the resident park wildlife. Visitors will also see signs on habitats that state "Please excuse any mess as we introduce items into habitats to enhance and encourage natural behaviors" where enrichment is obvious.

"Enrichment is as good for animal's mental health as it is for their physical health," said Wildlife Care Supervisor Tricia Fowler. The fact is that when animals are put in captivity, no matter how beautiful and natural the environment, their opportunity to use their senses and behave as they would in the wild are limited. This can lead to stress and boredom for the animals. To address this, "enrichment activities" have been designed for most of the animals in the park. These activities are geared to safely stimulate the natural behaviors of the animals, to allow them to exercise control or choice over the environment and to enhance their psychological and physiological well-being. Enrichment Day on February 18 will give visitors the opportunity to better understand enrichment and view enrichment in action.

Rpresentatives from the Enrichment Team will be stationed at various places in the park to illustrate some of the enrichment items that are used by the team. There is no extra charge for Enrichment Day activities, however regular admission to the State Park applies.

Thursday evening, Jan. 17, 2019, the Science department at Fox Chapel Middle School held a Parent Involvement Science Night.

The purpose was to get parents to participate in their children's education, show the students practical applications of what they learned in their classes and to have fun.

Once the team finished the challenge they were to answer a true/false question and have a group picture taken to show that they completed the challenge. The activities centered on biology and physical science.

Once the teams finished all eight challenges they were to come back to the media center to check in with one of the science teachers. The first three teams to finish would win first, second and third place awards.



such as budgeting, prioritizing needs (shelter, food, transportation, etc.) versus wants (jewelry, electronics), tracking



Financial Life Skills and Education for youth are at crisis levels. Many of these youth have never had proper guidance on establishing legitimate banking/ financial management practices for their life. This challenge is magnified by those youth who are receiving a special diploma through the school system, as most of them are struggling with educational efforts, as well as development of life skills.

Project Looking Ahead is a program for the motivated student who has received a Special Diploma and is between the ages of 18 - 22. The program is designed to help the student transition from high school to work and independence. Independence is the final goal of the program allowing the student to be goal oriented and motivated to take the necessary steps to be a successful citizen.

Hernando County Extension Agent Scott Taylor, in partnership with the Project Looking Ahead team, has developed a comprehensive program for this audience that covers financial literacy, goal setting, marketing yourself, and skills for interviewing. To reach this audience, Hernando County FCS developed the 'Looking A.H.E.A.D. for our Future' program. This six part (12 hour) program was designed to provide financial life skills to the Project Looking Ahead students. This program covers financial life skills

expenses, and how to become self-sufficient. The program communicates the importance of an emergency fund, long term saving strategies, and how to read salary statements (gross income vs net income, taxes, etc.). Other topics include effective credit use, thinking about retirement, the importance of insurance and estate planning, and lastly, how to market themselves for that successful career.

Of the youth who have completed this program, 73% stated they want to begin a savings program, and 83% said they feel better about their ability to "make ends meet" when they become independent. Several students have realized how economical learning to cook and eating at home is, as compared to always eating out or 'hitting the drive-thru.' Another result, although not measurable, is that many of the youth want to speak with their parent/ guardian about opening up "mainstream" bank accounts or to at least become "bankable".

With the myriad of challenges facing at-risk youth, this type of program provides beneficial, possibly life-altering information on Money Management and Financial coaching in a structured format that they can use.


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



Traditional Realist Absurd: powerless people cannot be prejudiced

Almost all progressive political leaders have echoed the same mantra about prejudice.

Home Ownership Without a Mortgage

Mainstream thinking says that you should get the best education possible, to get a job that pays well enough to buy everything that you want or need. But suppose that education does not result in a job that is good enough for you to qualify for a mortgage, or stable enough for you to keep up the payments if you did? Or maybe, like my wife and I, you just don't want to be constantly worried about making payments on a high debt load.

Our solution was to live way below our means until we had saved enough, at ages 33 and 29 in 1980, to buy a piece of property and put a mobile home on it. At that point, we were already totally out of debt with no rent or mortgage payments, so we quickly saved enough for construction materials to build our own house. We had no homebuilding experience, but learned what we needed to know from books. Now, you can go online to learn what you need to know, with video tutorials to boot. Cord-woodmasonry.com is a great place to start. The author's first book on earth-sheltered housing was our inspiration to build.

So how do you live below your means? When my wife and I married in 1971, we started out in an old \$3,000 mobile home in a park, and only bought older cars for cash so that we had no car payments. I also maintained and repaired those cars myself, and still do. Your savings will increase with the number of do-it-yourself projects you are willing and able to perform.

Nowadays, the biggest obstacle to building an affordable, energy-efficient, owner-built home is government. There are way too many unnecessary and costly fees, codes, regulations and prohibited procedures that also stifle innovation. When we built, I was allowed to draw my own house plans and have them approved by the building department. I was allowed to saw my own and lumber with a portable sawmill for the 10" x 10" post-and-beam design and other framework. I also was allowed to install my own septic system. Those savings resulted in a cost of only \$10,000, in 1987 dollars, for purchased materials to build the house.

Another advantage comes when your owner-built home needs maintenance or repairs. No need to search for contractors, because they all live in your house! And, like your construction costs, your maintenance and repair purchases will only be for materials.

Wow. I had mentioned only once to my youngest grandkids, Spud and Rex, while driving them to school during the last week before vacation, that I'd like a Ping Pong Table—and there it was! I'll have to mention many more things to them. The gift was in cardboard, though, four big pieces of painted plywood with lots of hardware. Little by little over the next week I put it together on the floor of my garage. I'm 754 months old now, and I no longer have the exercise of Exwork to keep me in shape, so it was an exhausting task to assemble the table. Recently I've seen reported on TV a new ailment, the Selfie Wrist. Well, boohoo to that. Is it worse than the classic Tennis Elbow? Or the more prevalent Writer's Cramp,

which I've had, and the related Carpal Tunnel Syndrome from typing, which I have not developed for some reason. How about Golfer Shoulders, or the more modern Netflix Binger Eyes? There's an ailment at Exwork I insisted was real but no one believed me: Dirt-loader Spinal Column. That's a vague ache that runs from just behind the skull to the tail bone, the coccyx (KOK-siks). (I had to use that word simply because I looked it up. What a strange name.)

At home, I suffer from what I call Listener's Ear, which I developed from years of my wife telling me all about her crappy day, which she usually does while standing to my right when I'm in my recliner. A day later, my good friend from Exwork, Senor Cargador, helped me turn the thing upright onto its legs and rollers, and the next afternoon I got to play a practice game with my grandson, Rex. I was slow at it, not having played for twenty-three years, and I still felt the heat of Ping Pong Table Knee in my right leg from working all those screws and nuts and bolts. But my muscles started remembering, and I got in some good shots. I look forward to high-dewpoint sweaty games in the garage with friends and family in the coming months. Weef?


