Amidst the sounds of “Ruffles and Flourishes” being played in the background by the 323rd Army Band “Fort Sam’s Own”, official party members walked down the center aisle surrounded by more than 300 guests to begin the Corpus Christi Army Depot (CCAD) change of command ceremony July 20, 2018. Col. Allan Lanceta relinquished command to Col. Gail Atkins after 24 months of serving as CCAD commander. Lanceta also retired after 27 years of military service during a retirement ceremony following the change of command. Atkins brings more than 20 years of aviation experience to CCAD. Her previous assignment was as the force support division chief, Joint Staff, J-8, at the Pentagon.



Army Leader Competency: Communication - Part II

CCAD is a business, therefore the need for face-to-face communication is necessary for efficiently completing its business process. Face-to-face or interpersonal communication happens in supervisor-employee, co-worker-to-co-worker, customer service and support information exchanges. With the recent implementation of the DoD Performance Management and Appraisal Program (DPMAP) and emphasis on supervisor-employee communication; throughout this series we will explore the process and provide recommendations for developing and improving the exchange of information. Supervisor-employee communication was once thought of as a process where the supervisor held the power when communicating. Subsequent studies of this two-person relationship and our very own experiences in talking with our supervisors show the employee has a vital role in this communication exchange. Per DODI 1400.25 DPMAP policy, supervisors are required to hold a minimum of three formal documented performance discussions during the appraisal cycle. At a minimum, two additional supervisor-employee interactions are recommended to review employee performance standards and provide feedback accordingly. OCI 120 Day LSS Green Belt Rotation Pilot

In April 2018 the Office of Continuous Improvement (OCI) initiated a 120-day trial period for select Green Belt candidates to join OCI and assist with Lean events, training, and coaching of Yellow Belt candidates. The goal of this action was to supplement OCI staff with Lean events and training while completing requirements for Lean Six Sigma (LSS) certification. With respective director approval Gloria Rodriguez and Steve Garza were selected and allowed to participate in the trial period. Rodriguez and Garza reported to OCI and immediately began leading several Lean events and Rapid Improvement Events addressing Complex Assembly Manufacturing Solution (CAMS) Operation 0040 in T55 Assembly, Work In Process Tracking in Supply Management and Planning, and mega-projects like improving process lead time for pre-authorization requests in Master Data Management. Both candidates completed requirements for certification as Department of Army LSS Green Belts and are awaiting certification approval from Army Materiel Command. Donation of USNS Corpus Christi Bay Model Evokes Historic Memories

In a touching ceremony, Suzie Wollek, widow of retired U.S. Army SFC Donald Wollek of Fort Hood, Texas, gifted a replica of the USNS Corpus Christi Bay to the Corpus Christi Army Depot (CCAD) to honor all who served on board the namesake ship. In 1965, the World War II ship the USS Albemarle (AV-5) was recommissioned as the USNS Corpus Christi Bay (T-ARVH-1) a floating maintenance depot for the Army. As an extension of CCAD, (then called Army Aeronautical Depot Maintenance Center (ARADMAC)), the ship brought nearly every depot maintenance and repair process to the shores of Vietnam. Damaged aircraft were repaired in eight days, 10 days quicker than sending them stateside.



The model was constructed as a gift, a task that took many years because there were no blueprints for an old scrapped ship. A display case was constructed with both Navy and Army seals etched in the glass in honor of Mr. Wollek's service, duty, and dedication. Together they traveled to numerous ship reunions across the Midwest with the model, including the 2016 reunion held in Corpus Christi. After CCAD received permission from the Secretary of the Army to accept the gift, Mrs. Wollek, a retired Department of the Army civilian employee and her family gathered for the ceremony and a VIP tour of CCAD. As Mrs. Wollek gazed at the model through teary eyes she said, "I wanted to make sure that the model would be taken care of and appreciated for many years. My husband loved this ship, the 2 1/2 years he spent aboard and his time here in Corpus Christi, so I knew CCAD is where she should be, so that everyone will know the history of the ship for generations to come, including my grandkids and everyone who works here too."

The model is currently on display in the Luce Lobby trophy area at CCAD HQ Bldg. 8, along with many other artifacts from the ship.

15Kth Aircraft: 500th Recap

Another milestone was reached at the Corpus Christi Army Depot with the rollout of the 15,000th aircraft. The aircraft was a UH-60 Black Hawk designed to provide infantry squad delivery anywhere on the battlefield - it is the Army's utility helicopter of choice. As the primary air platform used by commanders to initiate, sustain and conduct combat operations, it can deliver arms, troops and supplies at a moment's notice. This UH-60 Black Hawk also marked the 500th recap. Recapitalization, or "recap" for short, is part of the Army's effort to reduce platform sustainment costs and contain the expense of replacing aging helicopters with new ones. Overhauling and upgrading structural, engine, and airframe components provides the Army with an asset that is equal to or better than a new one. CCAD delivers the most modernized and advanced aircraft to the Army at a significant reduced cost to the taxpayer. At the ceremony to commemorate the milestone, CCAD leadership thanked all involved for their relentless pursuit to building a quality aircraft on schedule. With logistical support to ensure on-time availability of materials and on-time deliveries, artisans synchronize their efforts to improve readiness. Readiness ensures efficiency for Soldiers to win wars and return home safely. At CCAD it's one team with one mission. For the more than 3,300 civilian employees who support the CCAD mission it is a way of life.



Suicide: Check Yourself, Your Friends, & Your Kids

Bullying is the number one cause of adolescent suicides, leaving suicide the 2nd leading cause of death among adolescents. With school starting just weeks away make the time to talk your children. In a survey of high school students, the National Youth Violence Prevention Resource Center found that almost 1 in 5 teens had thoughts of suicide, and 1 in 6 teens made plans for suicide. More than 1 in 12 teens had attempted suicide in the last year, and as many as 8 out of 10 teens who commit suicide try to ask for help in some way before committing suicide (i.e. by seeing a doctor shortly before the suicide attempt).

Since 2007, suicide rates for adolescent boys and girls are steadily rising. According to the Centers for Disease Control, the suicide rate for girls ages 15 to 19 doubled from 2007 to 2015, reaching its highest point in 40 years. The suicide rate for boys ages 15 to 19 increased by 30 percent over the same time period.
