Denny Lundberg Chief, Engineering Division

It's not very often that a position like that of the chief of the District's Engineering Division turns over, and when it does competition is stiff, interest is high, and after the pick is made you might be surprised to learn about the person behind the title.

After weeks of close scrutiny and intense review, Denny Lundberg, previously chief of both the Design Branch of the Engineering Division and the Special Office for Navigation Improvements Branch, was chosen for the job.

In July, Lundberg stepped into the shoes previously filled by Joseph Raoul who retired earlier this year.

Lundberg has more than 25 years experience with the Corps dating back to June 1979.

Through the years, Lundberg has held numerous job titles, but his time with the Corps started with the Rock Island District and remains with the District.

The Cloquet, Minn., native said he chose a career with the Corps because of the, "Opportunity it provides to work on many diverse big projects."



After More Than a Year ...

As always, there is much going on in the Rock Island District. While I have spent a great deal of time and effort on the Navigation Study, to include two weeks of public meetings and speaking before the U.S. House of Representatives' Mississippi River Caucus, let me bring you up to date on some other topics of interest.

Financial Update

While we continue to monitor our income and expenditures, I believe that our efforts to curb expenditures and generate additional income have made our Fiscal Year 04 financial situation more promising. We still may have to deal with situations caused by our inability to transfer money between appropriations (the "color of money" dilemma), but these should be relatively minor. What this may occasionally cause, however, is different levels of frugality amongst offices. As I have said before, my challenge is to balance our budget and maintain our ability to deliver products and services now and in the future. I appreciate all of your efforts to help us overcome our challenges this fiscal year. It is still too early to tell about FY05, although the House has passed our appropriations bill at a level greater than that proposed by the president's budget. Stay tuned for more information.

A-76 Competition

In June, I provided our Information Management employees an overview of the Corps of Engineers' IM/Information Technology competition and the A-76 process. Please note that this is a competition and that we are more than a year away from any decision on whether IM will be run by a contractor or by government employees and more than two years before any changes would take place. The Corps has put together a top-notch team, aided by a contractor with a great record of winning these competitions, with the intent of winning this fair and open competition.

Strategic Planning

In FY04, the Executive Steering Board made significant progress towards its three strategic goals. Three strategy teams completed their charters and implemented significant improvements in the District. Strategy Team 2.1 created our new District Scorecard, which now serves as a central storage site for performance metrics and is available to all District employees. Strategy Team 2.3 created two new processes: a District Decision-Making Process and a District Meeting Process; all employees should now be using these tools. Strategy Team 3.1 updated and mapped a new District staffing plan process. This new process will assist us in creating an efficient and effective staffing plan over the next several years. These significant improvements bring the District closer to achieving our vision of being the premier public engineering organization!

Henderson County Drainage District

On May 26, the U.S. Court of Federal Claims issued a significant decision in favor of the United States and the Rock Island District in the Henderson County Drainage District No.3. Case. In this suit, 11 plaintiffs sought \$442,294,680 in damages resulting from the operation of the nine-foot navigation channels on the Mississippi River and Illinois Waterway. This case was extremely important to the Corps both from a fiscal standpoint and as a matter of legal precedent. Corps personnel, and a distinguished group of private sector experts, successfully made the case for the government. This was an outstanding result and the product of a lot of hard work by a diverse team of District employees from Office of Counsel, Engineering Division and Operation Division, outside experts, and the Department of Justice.

Summer Safety Awareness

We are now in the full swing of summer, the river is back to nearly normal condi-



tions, and people are making up for lost recreational time on our waters – all while the summer temperatures reach their peaks. The best defense for keeping ourselves and our families safe this season (or anytime for that matter) is to think about what we're doing before we do it; consider the potential outcomes, and do not accept any unreasonable risks. If you're swimming, boating, or are anywhere around the water - know your limits and become familiar with your environment. Don't underestimate the power of the river's current or how quickly tragedy can strike during any water activity. Also, remember to make a conscious effort to stay hydrated; heat-related injuries can easily be prevented.

It's hard to believe that I have been at Rock Island for more than a year now. I have had a great time and am truly honored to be able to work with such a talented and dedicated group of people. I appreciate all the outstanding work you do. We provide a great service to the nation and should be proud. 🇺🇸

CORPS NEEDS YOUR HELP IN IRAQ, AFGANISTAN

The Corps of Engineers has proven to be an extremely valuable asset to the Global War on Terrorism, and numerous Rock Island District employees have volunteered and excelled while fulfilling rewarding duty in the Middle East.

While a steady number of Corps employees continue to volunteer for duty in support of the Corps' new Gulf Region Division and the Afghanistan Engineer District, the Corps recently established a recruiting initiative to ensure that employees are informed about the opportunities that are available and facilitate the hiring of Corps volunteers to deploy in support of GRD or AED.

This recruiting initiative has taken the form of two main efforts; one is a face-to-face forum where Headquarters employees are personally visiting select districts to present information, and the other is to provide Internet and print resources and continued open dialogue so employees know how the Corps is involved and how they can be a part of that involvement.

Currently, the Corps has approximately 500 military and civilian employees in Iraq and Afghanistan. There is a continuous need for volunteers with vital skills and experience in program management, contracting, administrative support, engineering, construction, budget and auditing, human resources and logistics. To date, approximately 2,000 Corps employees have deployed in support of The Global War on Terrorism.

The workload at GRD and AED is increasing steadily and is expected to remain at a high level for two or more years. This creates a need to increase the current size of their staff and to sustain those levels for the near future. The purpose of this initiative is to encourage personnel with the requisite skills to volunteer for service overseas to meet upcoming peak workload.

Why Volunteer?

Volunteering will give you the unique opportunity for a professional and personal challenge, adventure and

national service. Not to mention the opportunity to help make history, a lasting contribution, and experience a unique and distinctive culture overseas, while earning the benefits of increased compensation.

Keep in mind; employees who deploy from an existing Corps jobs will create opportunities to backfill positions they leave behind. Backfilling creates additional developmental opportunities and responsibilities for contributing offices. For more information, individuals should contact the local Civilian Personnel Advisory Center.

Methods for hiring

Employees may be placed in a temporary duty status for up to 179 days. Those who volunteer for this shorter tour may receive temporary, non-competitive promotions not to exceed 120 days.

All employees who are TDY in Iraq or Afghanistan are temporarily reassigned from their home stations. They are most often reassigned to the Transatlantic Programs Center. These employees receive the regular basic and locality pay.

For longer tours of duty, employees may require a temporary change of station (tours usually last six months to one year). Unlike TDY, employees who opt for a TCS do not receive locality pay for the period of time they are deployed. The Office of Personnel Management determines the basic pay for their position. Personnel electing this option will receive a relocation bonus of up to 10 percent of their base salary. Those who volunteer for a one-year TCS assignment will receive a relocation bonus not to exceed 25 percent of their base salary. A relocation bonus does not count against the annual limitation on premium pay.

Employees are entitled to additional compensation including danger pay, post differential, separate maintenance allowance, and premium pay.

All questions concerning the hiring procedures should be directed to the local CPAC.

Loves Park Project Completed, Dedicated

The end of the 12-year Loves Park Creek Flood Protection Project was highlighted Aug. 2 during its dedication ceremony, which brought many of the agencies and people together who made the project a reality for the City of Loves Park.

The project was a part of a joint effort between the City of Loves Park and the Rock Island District to protect industrial and residential areas from recurrent flooding.

The ribbon cutting at the dedication ceremony marked the official completion of the project and featured remarks by Congressman Don Manzullo; Mayor Darryl Lindberg, the mayor of Loves Park; Col. Duane Gapinski, district engineer, and officials from the City of Loves Park.

"Partnerships are vital to the completion of projects such as this one," said

Gapinski. "They prove to communities and taxpayers that we are making the most of our combined resources."

"I congratulate the City of Loves Park and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers for their hard work over the last several years to solve this problem," said Manzullo.

"Now that this project is completed, residents of Loves Park will no longer have to worry every time it rains. In addition, they will save a lot of money in flood insurance premiums that will no longer be necessary."

The project promises to keep homes and businesses dry even during the heaviest storms. More than 400 property owners along Loves Park Creek will be able to drop costly flood insurance, most likely within a year.

The private marketplace has added shops, restaurants and strip malls to Loves

Park's booming East Riverside Boulevard corridor, far from the Rock River. While the older commercial areas have not flooded for years, that stigma -- among other problems -- kept developers away. Now, at least one obstacle has been removed.

The Loves Park Creek Flood Protection Project consists of approximately 18,000 lineal-feet of improved channels and 236 acre-feet of storm water runoff flood storage in the Windsor Lake system.

The overall project cost including all planning, design, construction contracts, rights-of-way, and road and utility relocations was approximately \$30 million. The project was cost-shared between the federal government (75 percent) and the City of Loves Park (25 percent, which includes state funding).

The Tower Times Survey is complete and the results are available for anyone to see on the District's Intranet. The information gathered from the survey respondents has already impacted the content of the publication and will continue to be used to improve the Tower Times to meet the needs of District employees.

Overwhelmingly, survey respondents expressed that the publication should have more articles and information on field-site employees, and (if it saves money) the publication should only be available online, versus being printed and distributed to all employees and retirees.

The publication will strive to feature more articles and information about employees in the field. To make this happen, employees are highly encouraged to submit content for inclusion in the Tower Times. Anyone can submit information, and while receiving completed articles is great, an employee can also submit information in any form, and if possible please submit photos as well. Digital photos are the easiest to submit and the higher the resolution the better. Hard copy photos are fine as well and will be scanned in and returned to employees. To submit information to the publication e-mail the editor at mark.a.kane@usace.army.mil or by phone at 309-794-5730.

Making the Tower Times available as an online publication only is currently being explored. Cutting down the distribution doesn't affect the overall expense very much, as most of the expense is in print setup fees, etc. The St. Paul District has already made this decision and knowing that 61 percent of survey respondents are neutral or in agreement with making the Tower Times available strictly as an online publication, makes a 'Net-only publication a real possibility. The upcoming Fiscal Year 2005 budget, and other funding requirements, will also weigh heavily into the decision to turn the Tower Times into an online-only publication.

A majority of survey respondents also pointed out that they would like to see the return of award listings such as quality step-increases, performance awards, special-act awards, and on-the-spot cash awards. While this information might serve to publicly recognize our employees' accomplishments, the resources to retrieve the information on a consistent basis are no longer readily available to Public Affairs. Additionally, some

people do not want their name in association with an incentive-based award publicized in the Tower Times, which is seen outside the District. Those are the main reasons incentive-based awards are not automatically listed in the Tower Times. However, personal achievements such as Army civilian achievement medals, or other noteworthy job-related or community achievements, can be submitted for inclusion in the publication.

Some of the other information gathered through survey respondents' answers include: 84 percent read the Tower Times; 92 percent say they personally receive the Tower Times; 85 percent want the name of the publication to stay the same; 88 percent say they want a monthly or bi-monthly publication; 73 percent like the current "magazine" format; and almost 50 percent say they read most of the publication.

Due to these responses, the overall look and frequency of the publication will remain consistent with recent issues.

A combined 63 percent of respondents said they dislike the "Speaker's Bureau" and "Notes From The Mississippi" sections of the Tower Times, therefore both sections have been discontinued.

While more than 190 employees filled out the survey, many respondents took the extra step and provided comments in addition to the multiple choice answers.

A sampling of survey respondents' comments include: "There are a lot of neat things happening out at, and on our, locks and dams, have the sites share more of what they are doing ..." "It doesn't tell all that is accomplished in the field." "I hope this doesn't appear too biased, but there is more to the Rock Island District than just that Clock Tower. Without the maintenance, reservoirs and dams (we) wouldn't need that Clock Tower other than as a timepiece ..." "Make it available through Internet only, it is a waste of money to actually print these on the nice paper." "I used to read it until it went online. I do read the online version. You could save a lot of paper and money by not sending printed copies." "In the interest of saving paper, I would be just as happy to view it online, if that was the only way it was issued." "It is a very professional looking publication. Keep up the good work."

The District held an open house for the public onboard the Motor Vessel Mississippi to learn more about the Corps of Engineers' role on the river and to tour the Corps' largest towboat.

The open house took place Aug. 9, at Oneida Landing in Davenport, Iowa.

The public had the opportunity to see numerous displays focusing on the Corps' mission of providing for navigation, flood protection, environmental restoration, emergency response, and to operate facilities and lands for the public good.

The M/V Mississippi is one of the largest towboats ever built in the United States, it is 52-feet tall, and weighs 2,600 tons. The vessel is 241 feet long and holds 80,235 gallons of fuel. It visits the Upper Mississippi River once a year as a part of the Mississippi River Commission's annual Low-Water Inspection trip, held Aug. 16 through Aug. 27 this year.

The low-water trip featured seven public meetings in selected towns along the river, to allow Commission members the opportunity to meet with local residents and hear their concerns, ideas and issues.


