

Five area resorts make 'Best in World' list

The Paradise Coast region that includes Naples, Marco Island and the Gulf Coast portion of the Everglades earned five spots on the annual "Best in the World" list of Top 150 U.S. Mainland Resorts compiled by Condé Nast Traveler magazine. Four of the local resorts were among the top 50 properties on the list.

At No. 12, La Playa Beach & Golf Resort was highest of the local resorts on the Top 150 list. The Ritz-Carlton, Naples, and The Ritz-Carlton Golf Resort were Nos. 30 and 31, respectively; the Marco Island Marriott Beach Resort was No. 41; and the Marco

Beach Ocean Resort was in the 130th spot.

"The Paradise Coast's resorts and hotels have for years set high standards for customer service satisfaction, which is reflected in this year's showing of five properties in our region on Condé Nast Traveler's Top 150 U.S. Mainland Resorts list," said Jack Wert, executive director for the Naples, Marco Island, Everglades CVB.

The "Best in the World" list comes from the magazine's annual Readers' Choice Awards survey, where this year more than 8 million votes were cast rating the cities, islands and resorts and hotels readers visited



Dink and Obe: A love story

I used to see Dink and Obe shambling up the road from Stick Town. That's what the nice folks called N---- Town. The road ran beside my grandfather's place, and they were a sight to see. Dink always wore a threadbare cotton dress, bleached to the bone by sun and sweat, and Obe had on overhauls and a straw hat bigger than a sombrero. They would see me cooling my young heels on my papa's front porch and call out, "Master William, you OK?" I would say yes and on they would continue, a yappy yellow mongrel called Lady always running circles about them and causing great commotion.

Dink and Obe were what was known at that time and at that place as "good nigras." On the night of my father's birth, Dink had braved an ice storm to bring Dr. Belcher to my grandfather's house. She had boiled sheets, held my grandmother's hand and secured enough whiskey to see the entire household through the ordeal. Later, she would shepherd my dad to adulthood.

As for Obe, well, he did whatever needed done. Two things he never feared: hard work and expressing tender feelings. When I broke my leg as

a child, Obe scooped me into his arms and told me never to be afraid of pain. Then he sang a song called "Moonlight on the Ganges." He swept me away to a place I never thought I would see, and one that he never had seen.

"Young Master William, remember this: Pain doesn't last, love does."

That's what Obe taught me.

I loved Dink and Obe. And then, just a few months back, I learned the truth.

It was so frightfully frigid the night they lynched the entire Barber family that they had to put heated rocks into the bed of the white people who were responsible. This I know because my father received one of those warm bricks on the night of Jan. 14, 1914. He was just shy of 7 years old.

My father told me the story. He was a Huckleberry Finn — into everything. He was awakened about 2 a.m. by a rabble. Men marched down the streets with lanterns and torches. My dad threw on his clothes, sneaked out a window and ran to see what was happening. He couldn't miss something this big.

About halfway to the street, a strong hand grabbed him and said, "Get your ass back in the house!" My grandfather. "This is a

lynching, and we want no part."

My dad said let us at least see what's happening.

My grandfather said, "Get your ass back in the house. NOW!"

It was indeed a lynching. Four people in all. The worst such incident in all of Southern history. An entire black family strung from a tree. A father, a son and two daughters. Their offense? They had had the effrontery to set upon the police chief who suspected them of bootlegging whiskey.

Through either ignorance of masochism, the mob brought one rope. They lynched the family one member at a time. To ensure maximum cruelty, they did the children first, so the father witnessed the death of his young ones.

After each hanging, they put at least

100 rounds of bullets into the corpse. Don't believe me? Look up the historical accounts.

All I knew of that cold January night was that someone had been lynched. Now, I come to find that the young woman who sought a doc-

tor on my father's behalf and that the old couple I loved so much for the kindness they showed me — Dink and Obe — were direct kin of the people who died.

My family had nothing to do with the lynching of those people. We did not participate, but we also refused to tell state investigators who we knew to be involved.

Dink and Obe. I can see them now. I can hear their cheery voices, even as they hauled themselves from their hovel in Nigger Town. It was hot, they were tired, and they liked to think of themselves other than niggers.


"Master William," they would say. "You doing fine?" It was a different time and a different place.

The last time I saw Dink and Obe was around Christmas 1970. My dad always visited their shotgun house with gifts — a pint of corn whiskey for Obe and some cash for Dink. As Obe and my Dad chatted, Dink showed me — with great pride — a photograph of herself and a reed-thin man.

"That was my daddy," she said. "He was a saint."

When I think of all that has transpired, racially, through these years, I think of Dink and Obe.

Dink was nurse, midwife and savior. Obe was simply a hard-working, loving man. They deserved better, but they never complained. Not once. Not ever. I miss them, and I love them. ■



It might have been Mitt Romney's most revealing moment in all the Republican debates. Badgered by Texas Gov. Rick Perry, who was continually interrupting him, Romney appealed to CNN moderator Anderson Cooper to reassert the rules of the debate: "Anderson?"

That one-word complaint could stand for all of Romney's straight-arrow-ness. It is a virtue and a curse. "Scandal" and "Romney" are two words you expect never to have to see in a sentence together. He's every bit as upstanding as you would expect from a former Mormon bishop, a father of five and grandfather of 16.

Romney is a familiar type. We've all known the guy who sits in the front of the classroom and raises his hand to answer every question. We might admire him, or envy him, but we probably don't like him.

It is almost impossible to exaggerate the technical proficiency Romney has

exhibited during the debates. There is no question for which he doesn't have a ready, sometimes sophisticated answer. Whenever challenged — especially by Perry — he almost always bests his opponent. He's like a boxer with a couple of extra inches on his reach compared with everyone else. Even when another candidate is talking, he's perfected a look of patient, benign attentiveness.

What's missing, as usual with Romney, is a sense of warmth and heartfelt conviction. When Bill Clinton was confronted by someone with a sympathetic story, his reflex was to go in for a hug. Romney's reflex is to go in for a crisp explanation of whatever is his relevant policy position, delivered smoothly and cogently, if distantly. It's as if he sees people as inputs into his hard drive from which he reliably downloads the most appropriate intellectual output.

Romney talks of how he loves data, and his ability to master it is one of his foremost strengths. Data doesn't move people, though. The difference between Herman Cain, who has generated spontaneous excitement, and Mitt Romney is captured in their economic plans. Cain's depends on three simple

numbers, 999, that have captured the imagination of a slice of the Republican electorate. In what he admits is almost a self-parody, Romney has a 59-point plan that hasn't made an impression on anyone. Cain's fearlessly bold plan is badly flawed and would almost certainly blow up in a general election. Romney's plan is carefully crafted for maximum survivability.

Romney has a likability and trust gap. It's one reason he's been near the top of the field all year yet has never opened up the kind of lead traditionally associated with front-runners. If Republican voters conclude there's no one else in the field who is plausible as president or a general-election candidate, Romney will win, but it will be an act of calculation rather than passion. A former management consultant who couldn't rabble-rouse if he wanted to, Romney would be a most unusual vessel for a party overflowing with populist enthusiasms.

Romney can impress, but he doesn't naturally inspire or connect. That leaves an opening for others, even as he executes nearly flawlessly. ■

Globalizing dissent, from Tahrir Square to Liberty Plaza**amyGOODMAN**

The winds of change are blowing across the globe. What triggers such change, and when it will strike, is something that no one can predict.

Last Jan. 18, a courageous young woman in Egypt took a dangerous step. Asmaa Mahfouz was 25 years old, part of the April 6 Youth Movement, with thousands of young people engaging online in debate on the future of their country. They formed in 2008 to demonstrate solidarity with workers in the industrial city of Mahalla, Egypt. Then, in December 2010, a young man in Tunisia, Mohamed Bouazizi, set himself on fire to protest the frustration of a generation. His death sparked the uprising in Tunisia that toppled the long-reigning dictator President Zine El Abidine Ben Ali.

Similar acts of protest spread to Egypt, where at least four men attempted self-immolation. One, Ahmed Hashem el-Sayed of Alexandria, died. Asmaa Mahfouz was outraged and posted a video online, staring directly into the camera, her head covered, but not her face. She identified herself and called for people to join her on Jan. 25 in Tahrir Square. She said (translated from Arabic): "I'm making this video to give you one simple message: We want to go down to Tahrir Square on January 25th. If we still have honor and want to live in dignity on this land, we have to go down on January 25th. We'll go down and demand our rights, our fundamental human rights. ... I won't even talk about any political rights. We just want our human rights and nothing else. This entire government

is corrupt — a corrupt president and a corrupt security force. These self-immolators were not afraid of death but were afraid of security forces. Can you imagine that?"

Nine months later, Asmaa Mahfouz was giving a teach-in at Occupy Wall Street. Standing on steps above the crowd Monday night, she had a huge smile on her face as she looked out on a sea of faces. After she finished, I asked her what gave her strength. She answered with characteristic humility, speaking English: "I can't believe it when I saw a million people join in the Tahrir Square. I'm not more brave, because I saw my colleagues, Egyptian, were going towards the policemen, when they just pushing us, and they died for all of us. So they are the one who are really brave and really strong. ... I saw people, really, died in front of me, because they were protecting me and protecting others. So, they were the most brave, bravest men."

I asked how it felt to be in the United States, which had for so long supported the Mubarak regime in Egypt. She replied: "While they giving money and power and support to Mubarak regime, our people, Egyptian people, can success against all of this, against the U.S. power. So, the power to the people, not for the U.S. bullets or bombs or money or anything. The power to the people. So that I am here to be in solidarity and support the Wall Street Occupy protesters, to say them 'the power to the people,' and to keep it on and on, and they will success in the end."

The Egyptian revolution has not been without consequences for her. Last August, she was arrested by the Egyptian military. As my colleague Sharif Abdel Kouddous reported from Cairo, Asmaa sent two controversial tweets that prompted the arrest by

the Supreme Council of the Armed Forces, the military government that has ruled Egypt since Mubarak's fall.

Her arrest provoked a worldwide response, with groups ranging from the Muslim Brotherhood to Amnesty International condemning it. She was released, but, as Sharif noted at the time, Asmaa was only one of 12,000 civilians arrested since the revolution.

The arrests are happening here in the U.S. now, at many of the protest sites across the country. As Asmaa was preparing to head back to Egypt, hundreds of riot police descended on Occupy Oakland, firing beanbag rounds and tear gas. The University of New Mexico is threatening to evict the encampment there, which is called "(Un)occupy Albuquerque" to highlight that the land there is occupied native land.

Asmaa Mahfouz is running for a seat in the Egyptian Parliament, and maybe someday, she says, the presidency. When I asked her what she had to say to President Barack Obama, who had given his speech to the Muslim world in Cairo, she replied: "You promised the people that you are the change and 'yes, we can.' So we are here from the Wall Street Occupy, and we are saying the same word: 'yes, we can.' We can make the freedom, and we can get our freedom, even if it's from you." ■

PROFILES IN PARADISE

Young NASCAR driver spreads safe-driving message

I must admit that I know next to nothing about motor sports and car racing, but the story of Michael Cenzi caught my attention, and I wanted to know more. I had Michael on my show, and I was impressed with his focus, discipline, accomplishments and his desire to contribute to the community.

Michael's family lives in Naples, and they've always been avid NASCAR fans. Michael asked his Dad if he could get in to go-kart racing at the age of 6. Now, at 18, he's a racing veteran.

Michael Cenzi Racing was established in 1999 when Michael began competing on area go-kart tracks. In 2002, he started competing in World Karting Association division- and national-sanctioned races.

He earned the moniker of the "Naples Speedster" in 2005, when he began competing in the FasTruck Kids Series. In 2007, he advanced to the pro division and began racing against drivers two and three times his age. In the Short Track Racing Series (STARS), he claimed his first truck win, earned four pole positions, finished second in points and won "Rookie of the Year."

Michael continued racing, and since March of this year, he's been racing a Super Late Model at Punta Gorda Speedway, Orlando and New Smyrna. In January of this year, he graduated from the Racel01 program, a scholarship program founded

and instructed by Tony Blanchard that works with the youth of motorsports in an effort to build better drivers.

All of this takes time and money. I asked Michael about this, and he says his family has been completely supportive. While he has sponsors, he adds, his family — especially in the early going — has made many sacrifices to help him succeed. In fact, Michael's grandfather "Poppy" bought Michael his first go-kart.

His mother Denine says he's "a great kid," and the whole family is engaged in his racing. But Michael had to earn the privilege of racing through the years by following the family rules and doing well in school. Since the age of 6, Michael has missed only one race due to discipline (that's all it took!).

While pursuing his career in racing, Michael has not ignored his education. He graduated from Palmetto Ridge High School and is attending classes in engineering at Edison State College.

One of his close friends was in a serious car accident that was caused in part by texting while driving. Now Michael uses his public persona in racing to help educate his peers on the importance of not texting while driving.

In May 2007, he launched his "Stay Alive, Don't Text and Drive" campaign. AAA got wind of the program and in June of this year, AAA, The Auto Club South Traffic Safety Foundation and Michael announced their partnership for a new public service campaign: "Stay Focused — Don't Text and Drive." It's aimed at raising awareness about the dangers of distracted driving. Distracted driving behaviors include texting,

chatting on the cell phone, eating, grooming and even chatting with passengers while driving.

Along with all of his other activities, Michael delivers his message to schools through out Florida. He says teens are especially vulnerable to distracted driving because social networking sites like Facebook and Twitter are primary ways they stay in touch with their friends.

As tempting as it is to send and receive messages to and from friends while driving, Michael points out that distracted drivers take their eyes off the road five out of every six seconds. At 55 mph, a distracted driver goes the distance of a football field, including the end zones, without looking at the road, he adds.

"I enjoy keeping up with my friends, but when I'm driving, the call or text can wait. It's not worth my life," he stresses. "People die because they think they can multi-task while driving. But driving requires your hands, eyes and mind working together in order for you and others to be safe on the road."

I'm an avid bicyclist, and I thoroughly support this education campaign against distracted driving. I've had some near misses on the roadways because motorists are texting or talking on the phone.

increasingly, women are discovering the pleasures and delights of the esoteric world of automobiles.

Consider Ms. Traxler, for example. She drives a 1929 Ford Model A open roadster that's powered by a Corvette engine. If that isn't enough, the interior of this roadster, according to Ms. Traxler's husband, Trout Scanlan (an auto enthusiast of great renown), "is premium vinyl in ostrich with angel wings across the seat back and along with trim done in dark brown crocodile. The wheels and matching steering wheel are by California Customs and are billet aluminum. Paint is bronze over copper."

Now that's a car!

Perhaps the only drawback to Ms. Traxler's ride is that since it's an open roadster, she can operate it only in good weather, for there is no top.

Still, she drives it and displays it with a pride that any male could understand.

"I'm just tickled to drive it," she says. "You can't believe the smiles I get from people when they see it. Children and adults will see me driving it and give me a big thumbs up."

Ms. Traxler describes the car as "petite," which means that it's not comfortable for her husband, who is definitely not petite.

"(Trout) won't ride in it," she says. "It's just too uncomfortable for him, but it's perfect for me. I think he's only ridden in it once."

Ms. Traxler doesn't consider herself to be an expert automotive mechanic, but she does concede that years ago, when she drove a VW Bug, she could, on her own, change the fuel pump and "file the points with an emery board."

As one might imagine, a Corvette engine in a Model A Ford can produce quite a kick, and Ms. Traxler says she has, on occasion, had something of a lead foot. But I try to keep (the tendency to indulge in speedy driving) in check," she says with a laugh.

More than just a Jag

Collier County Judge Janeice Martin is another car lover.

Judge Martin's fondness probably is genetic. Her father, who is a retired judge, always enjoyed mechanical tinkering, and she recalls helping him tune and service the family ski boat that was equipped with a large Ford engine.

"It would get up and go," she says of the boat.

Judge Martin's favorite car was a Mercedes SLK 350 roadster. Although she loved that automobile, when she decided to seek a judgeship, she doubted that she could maintain it on public servant's salary.

"Driving that car was like a vacation on wheels," she says — an expensive vacation. She says she was told that after the warranty expired, periodic maintenance would cost more than \$3,000 per visit.

Now the judge drives a 2004 Jaguar XJ8. "It is really a fun car," she says.

Aside from the physical pleasure of tooling about in the Jag, even more important to the judge is the emotional connection she has to the car.

The Jaguar belonged to her grandmother, who was also Janeice, and who purchased it at the age of 92. The judge says her grandmother seemed to care little about cars until she was widowed. Until then, her grandmother and grandfather purchased conservative vehicles and kept them for years. But after Judge Martin's grandfather died, her grandmother took a fancy to sportier models.

The elder Janeice drove the Jag until she was 96 years old, when she decided it would be prudent to quit driving. She died earlier this year at the age of 97.

"I'm hoping (the Jag) stays on the road for many years," says the judge. She recalls with fondness riding with her grandmother and seeing the joy the Jaguar brought her late in life.

"It is a wonderful car for many reasons," says Judge Martin.

But the real appeal of the Prowler is not power or speed, she says, but rather the artistry of its design. Some enthusiasts describe it as a "rolling work of contemporary art."

Mrs. Stallkamp has another reason to be enamored with the Prowler. Her husband was a Chrysler executive, and when they lived in Detroit he helped to bring the Prowler to life.

"His involvement is how I became acquainted with the Prowler," she says. "So I suppose I have an emotional attachment. But even if he had not been involved, I would still think this is a wonderful car. It is not a Bentley or a Rolls, but it is a wonderful car."

Mrs. Stallkamp claims no mechanical expertise, but she does note proudly that she is adroit at putting the top of her Prowler up and down. She hastens to add that she hasn't needed to be a mechanical genius.

"I've had the battery replaced once, and there was a minor issue with the radio," she says. "That's it. I don't believe you can ask any more than that of a car."

Men might think their passion for things automotive exceeds that of women, but even if that is the case, the gap seems to be closing.

Ms. Traxler was asked if she had ever thought about putting her superb Model A on the market. She says that she "doesn't get too many offers" from people seeking to buy the car, which is just fine and dandy with her because, "It's not for sale."

That's understandable; after all, how do you put a price tag on love? ■




tent with them."

Volunteer Guardians ad Litem help give voices to kids

Living within Collier County since Aug. 31 of this year are 411 children who have been removed from their parents' care for alleged abused, abandonment or neglect. Standing up for 308 of those children's human rights and their individual best interests are a group of valiant volunteers appointed by the juvenile court through the Guardian ad Litem program.

"It was a pretty rigorous process getting certified," says Donna Kordek, a Collier Guardian ad Litem who is representing her first family of children and also recruiting others for Voices for Kids, a United Way of Collier County partner agency.

"We were interviewed, had background checks done, were selected to do training, trained for 30 hours, observed court for two hours and had to write a practice court report, all before we were ever matched with children," says Ms. Kordek, who adds that each Guardian is as unique as each child they help.


"The volunteers come from different walks of life, but all have one thing in common — we're determined to make a difference in the life of a Collier County child."

Without Voices for Kids of Southwest Florida, she adds, many Collier County children wouldn't have a voice in their own futures.

Funding and recruiting

In 1974, the federal government enacted the Federal Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act, which provided financial assistance to the states for programs that prevented, identified and treated child abuse and neglect. However, it wasn't until 1980 that Florida saw the need to help its most vulnerable children by requiring a Guardian ad Litem be appointed in an abuse or neglect proceeding (Statute 39.822). Interestingly, while mandated, the program does not receive state funding for anything but technical support of volunteers.

Voices for Kids of Southwest Florida was created to fill the funding gaps as well as to initiate volunteer recruitment, training and retention, the key elements of success for this program. With help from a United Way of Collier County grant, the agency was able to secure a recruitment specialist who works tirelessly to build a Guardian ad Litem volunteer base for Collier County children who need an advocate.



"We're not looking for everyone to volunteer," Ms. Kordek stresses. "We need responsible adults over age 21. They have to be a Florida resident, and typically in charge of their own daily schedules. We definitely need more men to get involved. "We are also looking for volunteers who more closely match our children — 65 percent of whom are Caucasian, 17 percent of African descent and 11 percent Hispanic." Children relate bet-

ter and open up easier to a Guardian ad Litem who understands their culture and may mirror them, she explains.

No legal training is necessary — "only common sense and good judgment" and the desire to make a difference in children's lives are required.



Needle-phobic survives her first blood donation

Like most folks, I don't like needles. However, I have more reason to be squeamish than the average person. My bizarrely low blood pressure coupled with small, flat veins turns a simple cholesterol check into a multiple-poke ordeal involving both arms. When I got the blood test for my marriage license, I nearly kissed the floor.

I figured these factors made me the ideal crash test dummy to bleed for *Florida Weekly* readers' "infotainment." I thought more people would give if they knew exactly what would happen and that a wimp like me could survive donating blood. I was pleasantly surprised when the experience proved more comfortable than I ever imagined — and I got a nifty gift, too.

I was shocked to learn only 5 percent of the overall population (and less than that, 3 percent, in Collier County) gives blood, even less than turn out to vote. I guess folks dislike blood donation even more than they dislike politicians.

When I arrived at the Community Blood Center, the parking valets greeted me. Gotta love Naples.

Inside, a cheery woman asked to see my driver's license and handed me a pop quiz about my health and lifestyle. Fortunately, it was easier than the college algebra test I'd taken that morning. Even my aspirin usage was logged, I assume due to its blood-thinning effects. The questionnaire gave a very short list of the rare, and mostly minor, complications associated with blood donation.

Next stop was for a mini-physical. Donor specialist Michael Zmejkoski checked my temperature, pulse, blood pressure and weight to be sure I met

donor eligibility criteria. Then he pricked my finger to check a blood sample for my percentage of red blood cells. With my low blood pressure, I had trouble giving an adequate blood drop sample, a portend of my actual donation session.

Mr. Zmejkoski went over my health questionnaire, following up on items of potential concern, and double-checked my answer on aspirin usage. He gave me an information sheet about how to take care of myself once I went home, and then he escorted me to the donation room. It immediately struck me that

someone had thought through its design: very clean, but not oppressively sterile-looking; soft, calming colors; functional yet subtle lighting to keep the glare out of donors' eyes; donor stations with cushy recliners — everything intended for the donor to have the most pleasant experience possible.

There are seven donation stations, including ones for plasma and platelet donations.

NCH gets ready, gets set, goes green with recycling

This week a major new system-wide environmental and recycling effort gets underway here at NCH. With it, we are officially on our way to saying: "This is my *green* hospital."

Many of us already recycle at home. But imagine your home is a 681-bed (soon to be 715-bed) hospital system with more than 36,000 inpatients and 110,000 outpatients per year, 17 office locations and 3,750 colleagues. That's a huge recycling challenge.

But we're up to the task — along with our new partner, Stericycle, which will provide the education and follow-up in its Waste2Green4Healthcare program.

Our first year's goal: Recycling 1 million pounds of waste. That's a tough number to visualize, so consider the following:

■ For every 2,000 pounds of paper recycled, 17 trees are saved.

■ Recycling one aluminum can saves enough energy to run a TV or operate a computer for three hours.

■ Every glass bottle recycled saves enough energy to light a 100-watt light bulb for four hours.

What changes will you see at NCH?

Each nursing station, and all the medication rooms, pharmacies, kitchens, administration areas, staff lounges, medical offices and operating rooms will have either 23- or 44-gallon containers with green opaque bags to make collection easy.

As it turns out, most of what we throw away is recyclable. All of the packaging materials for any medical device such as a syringe or dressing can be collected in the recycle container. Certain areas within the hospital — the operating room, pharmacy and material management, for example — have huge recycling potential.

Under this program, our progress will be measured and shared on a proprietary web portal home screen, which has a quick snapshot of our system's waste along with a comparison to others in the health-care industry. We pride

ourselves on being a learning organization, so we can benchmark and share best practices as we all learn from one other.

A hospital must follow many OSHA guidelines, so we still expect to have 6 percent to 15 percent of our waste designated as "regulated medical waste," which requires special handling for contaminated or potentially infectious materials.

This new green program is one more example of NCH doing the right thing. It comes on the heels of our success in bending the health-care cost curve for our colleagues, which resulted in no increase in health-care insurance costs for NCH as compared to the average 9 percent increase for the rest of the nation.

Promoting, maintaining and restoring health involves more than just individual and physical well being. Our environment is precious, and our colleagues have wanted to "go green" for some time. Now we are on our way. ■

All were vacant. “Obviously we’d like to see these stations full,” R.N. Kathy Moore said with a sigh. She checked veins in both my arms and chose my right, a decision that later caused giggles as I attempted to write notes for my story left-handed. As she scrubbed my arm with antiseptic (and I do mean scrub, not just the quick swipe they give you for a vaccination), Ms. Moore told me that the blood center sees only five or six donors per day during the off-season. “It gets better when the snowbirds come back,” she said.

When she placed a blood pressure cuff on my arm and handed me a soft rubber ball, I figured I should stop watching. I focused elsewhere as she inserted the needle into my arm.

I was astonished because the procedure didn’t hurt as much as the blood work for my last physical (I swore that phlebotomist used a dull, antique whaling harpoon). Even more amazing was I felt nothing when Ms. Moore made some careful adjustments to the needle’s position. She asked me to tell her if she was hurting me, but it was fine.

I felt her tape the tube to my arm and place a square of gauze over the needle to protect the blood unit from possible contamination by particles in the air. I joked it was really to protect my delicate disposition from seeing the point of insertion. She told me to squeeze the rubber ball every 10 to 15 seconds to help the blood flow better in the vein.

Beep, beep, beep. Something kept making an annoying, high-pitched noise. Ms. Moore would fiddle with the tubes below me and occasionally adjust the needle, again with no discomfort. Beep, beep, beep. I asked what the beeping was about because it started to unnerve me, and she explained it was a low flow alarm. Beep, beep, beep.

I asked Ms. Moore why more people didn’t donate.

“It’s the needle; they say they don’t like needles,” she replied. Just short of a

pint, she said my bag was full enough to count as a unit. The average person can fill the bag in six to 10 minutes. My time? Eighteen minutes.

As she crimped off the tube, removed the tape from my arm and took off the blood pressure cuff, I braced for what I thought would be an unpleasant end to this otherwise surprisingly comfortable experience. She told me to hold my gauze in place, and then hold my arm above my head. That was when I realized the needle was already gone. I never felt it come out. I watched as she disposed of all supplies used for my donation.

Mr. Zmejkoski put a little round Band-Aid on my arm. Then he put a piece of gauze and stretchy wrap over it as a pressure dressing. I only had to wear the larger dressing for an hour. He had me sit up carefully and slowly. I experienced some lightheadedness, so he had me lie back down as he pushed a button that put the donation couch into a more reclined position, bringing my feet slightly above my head.

My next stop was the Blood Drop Cafe for refreshments. A selection of juices and sodas were offered, but the platter of cookies beckoned me (kudos to Costco for donating its best). I munched as I watched Mr. Zmejkoski wipe my donation couch with sterilizer.

The entire process took under an hour. Although I did experience one of the rare side effects, lightheadedness, this was not surprising given my low blood pressure. I experienced no other adverse effects. And as a thank-you, I got a ticket from Cruise Naples worth 30 bucks.

I didn’t die from giving blood, but plenty of people have died for the lack of blood. I’ll confidently go back when I receive my reminder post card in eight weeks. It would be great to see you there helping to save a life as well. ■



Cajole your cat

Lack of appetite isn't normal, even for 'finicky' felines

Eating problems in cats too often get dismissed, thrown under the general heading of, "What do you expect? Cats are finicky."

If your cat is simply off food for a day, there's no reason to worry. A simple upset stomach or a stressful change in her environment could be the culprit. And she might not be off food at all: If your cat has access to the outdoors, she may have eaten somewhere else — off a neighbor's porch or at an all-you-can-catch rodent buffet.

But a persistent lack of appetite needs to be taken seriously. You can outlast any dog in a food duel — sooner or later, a healthy but fussy dog will eat just about anything. A cat, however, can stop eating completely, a situation that may trigger hepatic lipidosis or fatty liver disease, a health emergency that can quickly turn fatal.

If you have a finicky cat, it's essential to work with your veterinarian and to know these tricks to get your cat eating:

■ **Fresh is best.**

Cats may be the original food snobs: In addition to having strong likes and dislikes, they often turn their noses up at food that has been sitting around too long. This can be especially true of canned food, which does get pretty unpleasant when left sitting out. Instead of leaving a day's worth (or more) of

food out, offer your cat small portions, fresh from the packaging. If she doesn't eat it after 30 minutes, try again in a couple of hours.

■ **Serve warm.**

Warming your cat's food amps up its flavor and aroma. A few seconds in the microwave will do the trick.

■ **Break out the good stuff.**

If the cat won't eat a regular meal, it may be a passing problem; but if the cat rejects a favorite treat, like a bit of roasted chicken, it's time to call your veterinarian. No one knows your cat better than you do, and if she suddenly rejects a food she has been willing to

beg for all her life, you'll know your cat has troubles worth taking seriously.

If lack of appetite is an ongoing concern with your cat and she's lost a half-pound or more, ask your veterinarian about the possibility of a medication to stimulate her appetite. Some antidepressant and anti-anxiety meds can help switch a cat's appetite from the "off" position back to "on."

And if that doesn't help, your veterinarian can work with you to get to the root of the problem, and treat the underlying condition that will return a normal appetite and help to restore your cat's good health. ■

These were not the perceptions of ordinary babies.



During the 2010-2011 fiscal year, the airport accommodated more than 84,000 takeoffs and landings. Specific suggestions to address Occupy Wall Street's broad complaints



Occupy Wall Street occupies our minds, news coverage and conversations.

For some, it is an unorganized effort with an amorphous agenda that has an ultimate socialist aim to redistribute rightfully earned wealth.

For the protestors or those in support, it is a last-ditch attempt to wrong serious flaws in a capitalist system that was intended to create financial opportunity for all but has become rigged to drive gains disproportionately to a select few.

No doubt, the protestors' disorganized approach is spreading like wildfire as the open agenda has allowed a potpourri of folks with disparate complaints to suddenly band together in solidarity. Once U.S. only, it has become international with crowds of up to 500,000 in major European cities.

A common goal of Occupy Wall Street protestors is to get some of the wealth of the U.S.' wealthiest 1 percent into the hands of the remaining 99 percent.

The wealthiest 1 percent can be defined a host of different ways; one demarcation is annual income of \$300,000 (or more), as of 2008 income data. The 1 percent includes all sorts of professions: Hollywood execs, doctors, Silicon Valley execs, publicly traded company senior management, top college presidents, all sorts of financial

services executives, etc.

Another way to break down the 1 percent is by quality of their labor: those who created wealth through tireless effort, countless years of sweat, years of academic training and attendant school debt burdens, personal risk-taking including personal guarantees of all corporate debt, commitment to professional excellence, and a desire to create employment opportunities for hard working U.S. citizens as opposed to those who have perverted the free market capitalist system so as to unfairly skew corporate profits to elite senior management.

The protestors' ire is often directed against any and all in the top 1 percent but, maybe, they are "throwing the baby out with the bath water." Anger and protest energy might be more appropriately directed against those who have perverted the U.S. capitalist system and not those hard working, risk-taking, entrepreneurs who embraced the capitalist system, persevered and created a pot of gold and thus entered the 1 percent.

My cry is not that some have succeeded so very well but, rather, that many of the one percent have taken disproportionately from the pot of corporate wealth; that much corporate wealth could have flowed down to the middle management and rank and file; that many of the casino risks taken in our financial institutions were never cards intended for playing.

Absolutely, their boards of directors offered top executives at many publicly traded companies "greedy-safe, fail-safe" plans. Plan A was to use taxpayer and share-

holder capital or government guarantees as the risk capital for taking sizeable casino bets, from which they expected to/actually did garner humongous personal gains; and/or to outsource as many U.S. service and manufacturing jobs as possible, thereby driving earnings higher, stock prices higher and option packages so much higher.

Was their skin in the game? No! Worse, their compensation packages provided that if Plan A failed, Plan B (astronomically high compensation termination packages) became operative. It was the old win-win routine.

Should we blame all the 1 percent for this? I think not. The CEOs... for sure, but they took sugar offered to them by their boards of directors that allowed these compensation plans. All the while, they were allowing flat lining of the salaries of the rank-and-file and outsourcing millions of jobs.

Enraged hearts often look to the easiest way to solve their problems. The seemingly easiest way to address these problems is to transfer wealth from the "haves" to the "have nots." But additional taxation on all the 1 percent would dis-incentivize many entrepreneurial risk takers who continue to help create new jobs in the U.S. These babes belong in incubators.

Here are some suggestions about fixing the structural problems in the capitalist system.

■ Boards need to end the CEO win-win compensation packages.

The highest echelons of senior management must have exposure to a public company's losses. Prior to the 1990s, many

of the investment firms with proprietary trading were partnerships; the senior partners were at risk and absolutely wanted to protect their retirement cash flow.

■ Superior compensation should go to those CEOs affirming a U.S. manufacturing/service labor market, not for affirming cheap labor out-sourcing.

■ The SEC could make every publicly traded company annually report growth in CEO compensation vis-à-vis the changes in wages of the rank and file workers and earnings growth. Charts often tell a story clearly.

The capitalist system is the best one around the world... just ask the Chinese who embrace much of it. But the U.S. capitalist system is currently structurally flawed.

Increased taxation of the one percent does nothing to solve the structural problems. And some of the solutions are within reach of those controlling pension fund investments. ■

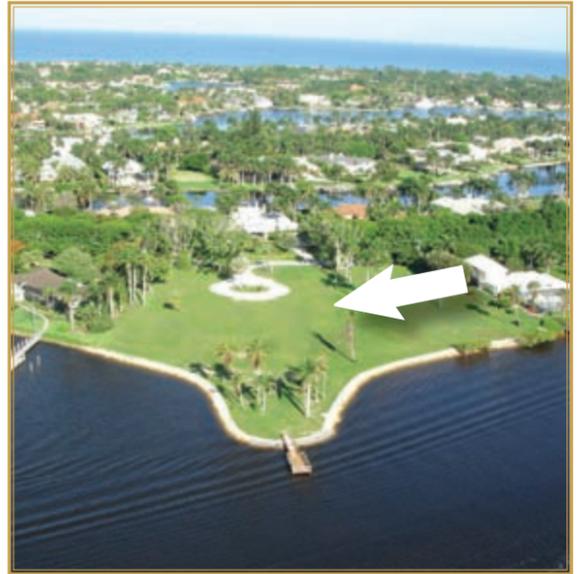



Think Twice, Goldbugs

It's easy to be tempted by gold, as it has soared in recent years, approaching \$1,900 per ounce before dropping back near \$1,600. (It was around \$300 a decade ago.) Given the volatility of stocks and bonds, many investors assume that gold is a smarter investment.

If you want to buy gold, you have several options. You might invest in gold stocks or gold mutual funds, but these can be rather volatile, too. You might buy into gold accounts at bullion banks, which require large minimum investments, or gold certificates and pool accounts, which don't. Gold coins or bars might be tempting, but you'll need a safe place to store them.

David Kathman of Morningstar.com has noted that "Returns aren't the point when you're investing in gold; diversification is. ... A small amount of gold alongside your stocks can be a stabilizer."

But not all glitters in the world of gold. In his seminal book "Stocks for the Long Run" (McGraw-Hill, \$35), finance professor Jeremy Siegel reveals what a dollar invested

in various things would have grown to, from 1802 to 2006 (yes, 204 years!): stocks, \$755,163; bonds, \$1,083; T-bills, \$301; and gold, \$1.95. (Amounts have been adjusted for inflation.)

So, through many wars and economic times even more troubling than those we face today, gold hasn't proved to be a great long-term investment. Though it surged near \$700 around 1980, it spent much of the 1990s between \$300 and \$400.

In Fortune magazine, David Rynecki noted: "Gold investors are notoriously bad forecasters. From 1985 to 1987, for example, a collapse in the dollar boosted gold 76 percent and had many metalheads predicting an extended rally. Instead, the price fell 15 percent the very next year."

He added: "Even bullish gold pros caution the average investor to put no more than 5 percent of a total portfolio into gold-related holdings and say it's safest to invest through funds."

My Dumbest Investment

A Sure-Fire Loss

I recently invested with a commodities firm that was promising great returns on precious metals. I let myself get talked into buying on margin (great sales talk) and then learned that the interest rate I was being charged was 7.5 percent, and that there was a 15 percent purchase commission, a \$200 charge to open an account, and a \$100-plus charge to deliver the commodity to me.

I lost more than 80 percent on a "sure-fire" deal. Metal went down a bit, but I lost a lot. I did learn what not to do if I want to do this type of investment again. For instance, it's much cheaper to buy directly from the bank or mint and hold in my own custody. Note: I'm still waiting for the very small cash balance to be returned to me. — C.B., Peterborough, Ontario

The Fool Responds: Ouch. Commodities can be dangerous. Be wary of anyone promising great returns. Be careful with buying on margin, too, where you borrow money with which to invest. If your investment heads south, you can end up owing much more than you invested. ■

Q How is inflation measured?
— W.R., Vail, Colo.

A Meet the U.S. Consumer Price Index. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, it's "a measure of the average change over time in the prices paid by urban consumers (87 percent of the U.S. population) for a market basket of consumer goods and services."

The "basket" includes items such as cereal, fuel, pet food, rent, postage, cigarettes, college tuition, medications and haircuts. The index shows that if you bought such items for \$100 in 1980, in 2011 they would have cost you \$275. Some folks like to study variations on the main CPI figure that include or exclude particularly volatile categories such as food and energy.

The CPI is used as an economic indicator and a means of adjusting dollar values, among other things. Learn much more at www.bls.gov/cpi/cpifaq.htm.

Q Why shouldn't I borrow against my credit card and invest in the stock market?

— A.B., Sioux City, Iowa

A Danger, Will Robinson! The U.S. stock market has, over many decades, averaged about 10 percent per year in returns. But that's an average that may not hold up in the near future. In some years, it loses money — such as 12 percent in 2001, 22 percent in 2002 and a whopping 37 percent in 2008. (Countering that, the S&P 500 soared 29 percent in 2003 and 27 percent in 2009.)

Meanwhile, credit cards have recently been charging an average interest rate of about 15 percent — and about 25 percent for those with bad credit. In the long run, you're likely to lose more than you gain if you try to make money in stocks while forfeiting money to credit card issuers. ■

FedEx: Still the Whole Package?

Shares of FedEx (NYSE: FDX) recently dropped to a nearly two-year low after the company slightly lowered its full-year earnings outlook because of the global slowdown.

The market may have overreacted, though. FedEx posted revenue of \$10.5 billion for the quarter, up 11 percent from a year ago. Earnings per share (EPS) rose 22 percent.

The sluggish global economy has been hurting FedEx and rival United Parcel Service. Even airlines are facing lower cargo shipments. As a result, FedEx has reduced its full-year EPS outlook.

FedEx is suffering from declining demand

and volume in the U.S. and Asia. Operating expenses grew by 11 percent over the last year, largely due to a 40 percent increase in fuel costs. So far, FedEx has managed to offset these problems by raising prices.

However, customers are shifting to slower, and cheaper, shipping options. Thus, daily average package volume fell 3 percent for FedEx Express, while rising 5 percent for FedEx Ground.

Though the slow-moving economy is not favorable to FedEx, it still has the potential to grow. This dividend-paying company is trading at a low price because of global economic uncertainty and is poised to do well when the economy recovers. (The Motley Fool owns shares of FedEx and United Parcel Service, and its newsletter services have recommended FedEx.) ■

matters of management, motivation and productivity. Many of Southwest Florida's business leaders have found their personal business bibles, books written decades ago or just last year by authors as diverse as Tom Peters, Ayn Rand and even Florida lawmakers. They say they've used others' ideas and influence to improve profit margins, create a better work environment and refocus on customer service.

Here's what's on their bookshelves or Kindles:

- Michael V. Reagen**, president and CEO of the Greater Naples Chamber of Commerce, counts two among his made-a-difference books: David McClelland's "Human Motivation" and "The Man who Fed the World," written by Naples resident Leon Hesser. Mr. Reagen says McClelland's book, published in 1987, and his subsequent volumes "share research on how motive systems affect behavior. They have helped me think about myself and try to make sense of why folks do what they do." Mr. Hesser's biography about Norman Borlaug has more personal meaning for Mr. Reagen, who worked with the Nobel Peace Prize Laureate to keep the World Food Prize in America. "Dr. Borlaug was truly a 'secular saint' whose work continues to really advance the lives of millions," says Mr. Reagen.

- Charles Idelson**, president and chief executive officer of Investors' Security Trust in Fort Myers, continues to refer to Tom Peters' "In Search of Excellence," considered one of the most famous business books. "It was

written in the 1980s, but for me, it's been a great book," he says. "It's the bible of customer service and empowering people to do the right thing. I try to continually remind my staff of why we're in business by asking them: 'How do you want to be treated when you go into a place of business.'"

And Mr. Idelson is reminded of Mr. Peters' principles of customer service whenever he's a consumer. There are stores he says he'll never return to because of the way he was treated. "We can all talk about good service, but unfortunately, most people remember the bad service."

He's also learned a valuable customer service lesson from


an employee at Home Depot. "I asked him to point me in the direction of shelves," Mr. Idelson recalls. "He told me, 'Sorry, I can't do that, but I will take you.' I got back to my office and told my employees we don't need to point people in a direction. When someone comes up to your desk, you get off your chair, introduce yourself to them and take them to the office. That's powerful."

"Customer service and our philosophy is what separates our company from the guy down the street. We're old-fashioned. We still answer the telephone."

- Carol Conway**, owner and president of Cape Coral-based CRS Technology Consultants, which provides technical computer and phone


support and service to small businesses in Southwest Florida, credits a work of fiction as her inspiration. "My (business) bible is 'Atlas Shrugged' by Ayn Rand," she says. "It's a must-read for serious entrepreneurs and capitalists. Its focus is on accountability, productivity, quality and excellence."

- Gail Markham** and her partners at Markham Norton Mosteller Wright & Co. in Fort Myers have been reading two books the last few months. "They



have really impacted our firm," she says. "Delivering Happiness" by Tony Hsieh, another customer service-based book, forced the company to review its policies.

"We've always focused on outstanding customer service and this book caused us to review what we are doing and how we can continue to improve," says Ms. Markham. "When your clients are used to being wowed, it can be a challenge to continue moving up that bar. We were so impressed by this book that we decided to create our own culture book. All of our team members responded to three questions:






'How would you describe the culture at MNMW?' How is MNMW different from other companies?' 'What do you like about working at MNMW?'

Ms. Markham says "Tribal Leadership," a book about building a thriving organization by Dave Logan, John King and Helee Fischer-Wright, has also led to introspection. The firm's leaders are reexamining their leadership abilities, "where we would like to be and how

we will get there," she says. "The next logical step is evaluating how we develop leaders within our organization. We found this to be so on point that the partners will be conducting a retreat in November where we will evaluate ourselves and set goals for the future."

"Both of these books are outstanding, and we highly recommend them to help you continue growing, both as an individual and an organization," says Ms. Markham. ■


With this production, Mark Danni, founding artistic director of TheatreZone, marks his musical, direct-



'To Keep Your Balance'

The Greene County bus schedule is more like a suggestion. Maybe the bus would show up at half past the hour, but more likely it would show up within 10 minutes on either side of the printed time. I hedged my bets and walked out of my house at 9, which under ordinary conditions, would have put me at the bus stop roughly nine minutes later. My kids' future depended on me catching that bus.

In my "borrowed" black suit and pumps — my purse and portfolio strapped into a metal basket behind the bicycle seat, I coast down High Avenue. It had taken me a half dozen wardrobe changes to get out the door. The long flowing skirt and suede jacket seemed too Bohemian; the red wrap-waist dress — Jonathon's favorite — too seductive. My neighbor Angela told me I should use every advantage, but a nursing mother has no business wearing low-cut, jersey knit to a job interview. The sales person at Nordstrom's assured me the wide-legged pants and crepe jacket, nipped at the waist, struck a perfect balance of professional and chic, with an appropriate hint of sexy. My last job was almost seven years ago as an art designer at a small ad agency in Chicago. I'd quit working when Jonathon and I were married to pursue my painting, but when Michael was born, I'd happily traded in my acrylics for Crayolas.

I stood in front of the antique cheval mirror, tied a scarf around my neck and tucked the price tag inside. The suit would have to be returned. It wasn't until I walked out my front door and nearly broke my neck tottering down the front steps in my neighbor's high heels that I realized I'd need an alternative means of transportation to the bus stop. I'm a Birkenstock and bare foot kind of gal.

Just last week, I'd sold Jonathon's 1994 Mustang Cobra — the last purchase he'd managed to squeeze in as a bachelor before we were married six years ago. The next day, as if Jonathon were seeking revenge from the afterlife, the transmission went out on my Suburu Forester. Dave Szymanski was fixing it for me. Poor Dave, I'd practically become his second wife. When Jonathon was killed, I got 50 husbands. His brothers at the Rocksborough police force were taking care of me now. They'd finished the kitchen renovation, replaced a leaky toilet and dug a new sewer line. They would probably offer to pay my mortgage, but I'm too ashamed to tell anyone there are three of them, a mountain of credit card debt and a timeshare.

I found the bike in the junkyard we call a garage, wedged between a wheelbarrow and a twin box spring. Mine had two flat tires and Jonathon's was hanging upside down from the ceiling in a completely inaccessible corner. I wrestled the bike free, maneuvered it

out the side door, strapped my purse and portfolio in the basket and jumped on. Now, coasting down the hill into town, I try to remember where this bike came from. It must have been among the piles of garage rubble the previous owners so thoughtfully left behind when we bought the house. Actually, it's not a bad bike, a hybrid Schwinn with a much more generous seat than I'm used to on my touring bike, and the basket is certainly handy right now. It fits me perfectly, which is something since I'm nearly 6 feet tall, and the tires are hard, as if the bike were waiting for me. Maybe the universe is telling me it's going to be OK, that I'll get the job, pay off the mortgages, and keep the house. I don't want this job. I hate the thought of leaving Michael and Emma in daycare while I trudge off to the city to design cereal boxes and dog food ads. I've half considered phone sex as a career alternative. The hours are perfect for a single mom. I imagine my mother-in-law Evelyn's horrified reaction if she were to find out. It might be worth selling my dignity for that. There's not much I'm qualified to do but wipe bottoms, change diapers and cut food into tiny pieces. Maybe they'd hire me at the old folks home down the street.

I'm lucky to have this interview. I've sent out over a hundred resumes, and not one single call. I'm sure my mother-in-law, with all her country club cronies, could have made a few connections, but I can't have her know how bad things are. Part of me wouldn't mind telling her what a mess her perfect son strapped me with, but I'd never betray my husband that way. That and I won't give her the leverage. She'd be all too happy to "help."


As I round the corner onto Main Street, I hear the rumble of a diesel engine as the Route 9 bus into Port Authority passes me, a blur of silver and whining gears. I'm four blocks from the stop. "Wait!" I yell, peddling like mad. "Hold the bus!" The last passenger glances my direction before she disappears inside the bus. The door hisses closed and the bus pulls away. I jump off the bike and run, waving my arms overhead. "Wait!" I scream. The bus slows, and I yell again as it rounds the corner and rumbles out of sight.

I pick up the bike. It's 24 miles into the city. The next bus is in an hour. A cab would cost a week of groceries. I walk the bike back toward town.

A minivan pulls over. The passenger window goes down and a woman with a blonde perky ponytail leans across the front seat. "Do you need a ride?" Her pretty face is all worry and concern. Good Lord, of all people. It's the second-to-last person I want to see, next to my mother-in-law.

I shake my head. "I'm fine," I say biting my trembling lip. "Really. I'm fine." ■

then and there knew he wanted to become a stand-up comedian. Someday, he vowed, he'd perform on David Letterman's show.

But he went to college, joined the Navy, got an office job. Before he knew it, years had passed.

"For too many years, I did a lot of stable things, all these things expected of me," he says. "It was much easier to go that route."

A native Chicagoan, he relocated to California for his job. And away from the influence of scoffers and naysayers, he tried performing stand-up for the first time.

He confesses he wasn't that good initially, but in two years' time, he'd made enough progress that he quit his day job to pursue comedy fulltime.

"I was living that part of the dream," he says. "I thought I was good enough to be on Letterman, and I knew eventually it would happen. I was waiting for it to happen: Someday they'll hear about me, and I'll audition. I was confident that someday that would happen."

"That's how comedy works, like every other job. You work hard, people notice. That's how I got into every club, that's how I got every gig."

Wake-up call

But then, in January 2005, he was diagnosed with inoperable cancer. It had originated in his intestines and spread to his liver, where he had a dozen tumors. The tumors couldn't be removed, and chemo and radiation would not work.

The doctors gave him the worst-case scenario: He could die in five years.

He was 34 when it hit him with brand-new clarity that his time on earth was finite.

After working through the disbelief and the anger, he realized: "There's a chance you might not be around someday. I need to make (being on Letterman) happen, rather than wait for it to happen."

"That's when I decided to start chasing it, rather than wait for it to come to me," he says.

Somehow, he had to speed up the process, and get his name in front of the show's booker.

As he jokes in the movie, "I'm not a household name... not even in my own house."

'Book Steve'

He started a website, www.dyingtodoletterman.com, and directed people to the site at his gigs. "There was no Facebook, Twitter or YouTube in 2005," he explains.

If people liked his comedy, there was a "click here" button that sent an e-mail to Mr. Letterman, saying "Book Steve."

And he got two of his friends, husband-and-wife team Biagio Messina and Joke Fincioen, involved in making a doc-



umentary about his quest.

Mr. Marzan and his wife, Diane, agreed to let them film the good and the bad. One of two things would happen, he says: "I was either going to die, or I'd be on Letterman."

The result: "Dying to Do Letterman," an 80-minute documentary about Mr.

Mazan's quest to be on "The Late Show With David Letterman."

The film is one of the full-length features that will be screened at the third annual Naples International Film Festival, happening Thursday through Sunday, Nov. 3-6. "Dying to Do Letterman" will play at the Silverspot Cinemas at 8:15 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 5, and at 1:45 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 6. The filmmakers will discuss the film after each screening and answer questions.

And Mr. Mazan will perform at the festival's closing ceremonies Sunday night in the Daniels Pavilion at the Philharmonic Center for the Arts.

A funny cancer story

He knows it's easy for people to get the wrong idea about the film.

"You say 'documentary' and 'cancer,' and most people say, 'I'm busy that night,'" he says.

But "Dying to do Letterman" is inspirational and funny, not depressing. "We wanted to take some of the power away from cancer and make it about chasing your dream," he says.

The movie, he adds, has "taken on a life of its own."

People write to him on his website, telling him how his story inspired them to chase their own dreams.

He recalls that when the filmmakers showed the trailer to some friends, one of the viewers declared, "OK, I'm buying a drum kit."

"She always wanted to play the drums," Mr. Mazan explains. "It was always in the back of her head that she was going to do that, but she never made any plans. That was her Someday. 'Someday

I'm going to do this."

Even his wife had a wake-up call. When he received the diagnosis, they'd been dating for less than a year. She insisted they get married. And, seeing her husband chase his dream, she fulfilled her own. She quit her day job and opened a yoga and dance studio.

Living vs. routine

It's easy to fall into a routine, Mr. Mazan says.

"You can skate by pretty easily in life by routine," he says. "I'll get by, I'll just do enough. How many people are putting all their effort into doing what they really want? When you get a wake-up call or see someone else get a wake-up call, it reminds you that life is pretty easy, but truly living — living with a purpose and chasing your dreams — is hard."

It's easy to do the things you need to do rather than the things you want to do, he adds, but it turns out that the things you want to do are really the things you need to do.

Letterman's producer initially told Mr. Mazan it was impossible for him to appear on the show.

"They were taking it almost as a 'Make-A-Wish' thing," he says. "They weren't considering I was a professional stand-up comedian. They thought I wanted to be on the show because I had cancer. But I just wanted them to look at me quicker, because I didn't know if I had enough time to go through the normal channels."

Though disappointed, Mr. Mazan became even more determined to get on the show.

He started sending them DVDs to prove how good he was, that his mission "wasn't a 'put me on because I have cancer' thing. I just continued on with the quest."

It doesn't spoil the movie to know that Mr. Mazan eventually does get on "The Late Show With David Letterman."

"It was amazing," he says. "It's something now — if I have a down day or I'm not feeling good, I have that memory of being on stage at The Ed Sullivan Theatre."

"Very few things in life live up to what you've built them up to be, but it really exceeded everything I could imagine, every part of it."

Oddly, he didn't feel nervous at all. He says he felt that he had the thoughts and good wishes of all his friends and the people who believed in him. "I felt they were all with me. It was like being carried out there, like there was nothing that could go wrong."

"It was so much fun," he says. "A beautiful theater. Hearing Paul Shaffer and the people in the band and the audience laughing. When you get the band to laugh, you think, 'It's going well.'"

And when he finished, Mr. Letterman came over and shook his hand and said, "Very funny."

The show put him up in a hotel around the corner from the theater.

"Funny little coincidence," he says. "It was named Dream Hotel."

Now that he's fulfilled his dream of being on the show, "I plan to be on again," he says.

He also has a new dream. He wants the film to be seen by a million people.

His book about his journey, "Dying to do Letterman: Turning Someday into Today," was published in mid-October by HCI Publishing (which also publishes the "Chicken Soup for the Soul" series of books).

"It was the journey as much as the destination," Mr. Mazan says. "The movie is about the journey, all the places that life takes you once you say to yourself, 'What am I dying to do? 'What am I living for?' The things that open up for you, once you do."

As Mr. Mazan says in his movie:

"If you're not chasing your dream, you're not living anyways." ■

The rumor's true: 'Rumors' provides multiple laughs

It was raining.
Traffic was crawling.
My to-do list was longer than my days, and my days were already too long.
Frankly, my mood was as foul as the weather.
Not exactly the best frame of mind in which to see a comedy — or maybe the ideal frame of mind in which to see one, because I obviously needed it.
It was opening night of the 14th season at Florida Repertory Theatre. I took my seat and prepared to watch Neil Simon's "Rumors," a farce.

Then I laughed.
I laughed again.
Soon I was roaring. And the rest of the audience was, too.
Every so often, a part of a line would be drowned out by laughter. Some of the characters were so funny they didn't even get to finish their line before people started laughing.
The producers of the original Broadway show claimed "Rumors" has 6,000 laughs.
Unfortunately, I can't verify that.
I was too busy laughing to keep count.

The show begins mid-action. A couple, Chris (Michelle Damato) and Ken (Brad DePlanche) have arrived at their friends' anniversary party, when they hear gunshots. They break into the house, only to find their host bleeding from what appears to be a self-inflicted gunshot wound. His wife is nowhere to be found, and the help is missing, too. It's all very curious, and the two are in a panic.

Chris and Ken want to keep the incident quiet, because the host is not only their friend, but the deputy mayor of New York. Besides, they don't even know what's happened. But they plot to keep the other dinner guests in the dark when they arrive.

Of course, despite their promise to each other, neither can wait to give their friends the low-down.

The two-story house is elegant with understated gray walls (set design by Jim Hunter). The owners are obviously

wealthy; the décor is on the bland side and doesn't show any personality. There's a couch and some chairs for the guests to flop into or hide behind, and a staircase leading to the second floor that gives some of the characters quite a workout as they run up and down throughout the show. And, as farces require, there are a number of doors (six, in this case), most of which get their own a good workout as they're flung open and slammed shut, over and over.

Thanks to Roberta Malcolm's costuming, the men look sharp in their tuxes and the women lovely in their gowns. These people are definitely the upper crust, driving BMWs, attending charity events (and buying a new dress for each fundraiser they attend.)

Mr. Simon introduces us to his characters couple-by-couple, as they arrive at the house. (Even the police officers who show up — Mark Chambers and Julianne Avolio — are a unit.)

While "Rumors" isn't a deep or multi-layered play — it exists purely to entertain and make us laugh — it's very revealing when it comes to married couples. They bicker and fight, throwing lines at each other like prizefighters in a ring. They have mini-power struggles. They drop little comments that drip with sarcasm.

All their little spats and disagreements rang so true that I truly believed each couple had been long married.

Claire (Carrie Lund) and Lenny (David Breitbarth) are the second couple to arrive. They've heard rumors about the hosts. Lenny's heard that the hostess is having an affair, while Claire's heard it's the husband who's cheating.

What is rumor? What is true?
You're never quite sure with this play.

The third set of couples to arrive is Ernie (David S. Howard) and Cookie (Viki Boyle). She's a TV cooking personality and he's an analyst. The two have two of the best lines in the play (his in act one, hers in act two), which unfortunately can't be printed. And Mr. Howard gets laughs just by how he says "Hello" when he answers the phone.

Glenn (Peter Thomasson), who's running for state senate, and Cassie (Jackie Schram) round out this quartet of couples.

Mr. Thomasson, with his silver hair and spray-on tan, preens before the mirror and, dripping with insincerity, is the perfect representation of a slimy politician. His wife, on the other hand, is haughty, and when she gets angry with him, decides to flirt with someone else's husband.

Director Robert Cacioppo has cast well — every actor in this ensemble is truly funny and adept at comedy, physical and spoken. Ms. Lund is particularly droll; she gets off many dry lines

throughout the night. Mr. DePlanche and Mr. Breitbarth are also comedic pros; I especially loved a scene where they were both holding the phone and wrestling with it while arguing.

And Ms. Damato had the audience in stitches, especially when she'd had too much to drink.

Mr. Cacioppo also worked his actors' physical differences into the show, to great humorous effect. Ms. Schram, who's tall and slender, must tower well over 6 feet in her stilettos. Ms. Damato, on the other hand, is petite. The Mutt-and-Jeff effect is very funny.

I saw another production of this play earlier this year and didn't laugh quite as much. This ensemble understands the nuances of the dialogue, and things that weren't funny in the earlier production are now. With just a gesture, or one word or an expression, they have the audience helplessly laughing.

Mr. Simon wrote "Rumors" with all the comedic ammunition he had at hand. There's physical humor, slapstick, one-liners, situational humor, set-ups and recurring jokes.

And this ensemble knows how to do justice to it all.

Mr. Simon has some terrific lines in this play — take, for example: "They were as close as freshly laid wallpaper." It's not only a great image, but his choice of the word "laid" also adds to the sexual innuendo of the comment. There's also: "I want us to be the way we were before we became the way we are."

"Rumors" opens at a fairly frantic pace and grows only more manic as the action continues. It's brilliant and wonderful, sheer lunacy that wildly veers from disaster to disaster, growing more absurd by the minute.

If you're in desperate need of some levity, "Rumors" is definitely the play to see. ■





'Puss In Boots'

Is it worth \$10? No

"Puss in Boots" takes arguably the best part of the last two "Shrek" movies, stretches it as thin as can be and leaves us hating cats.

Well, maybe not hating cats. But this movie plays like one of Puss' tired, well-worn boots — it feels used and recycled, with a few good kicks but really on its last leg.

An origin story that doesn't directly connect to the "Shrek" movies (why would it when the prospect of making more prequels and tie-ins beckons?), "Puss" follows the title character on a quest for golden eggs. To find them, he must locate a giant beanstalk, climb it and track down the Golden Goose, from whom the eggs emanate.

In the way are Jack (Billy Bob Thornton) and Jill (Amy Sedaris), Puss' old friend and bad egg Humpty Dumpty (Zach Galifianakis) as well as a cat named Kitty Softpaws (Salma Hayek). We also meet Puss as an orphan kitten (he's very cute), see how he got his name and achieved his tough-guy persona in spite of his diminutive stature and watch him execute a number of stunts that no real cat would ever consider doing.

Antonio Banderas continues to thrive as Puss, and the match between Puss' animation and Mr. Banderas' voice is still a great fit; when Puss calls himself a "bad kitty" and shows what a cad of a cat he is with the ladies, it's fun to believe it. That said, Mr. Banderas doesn't have much help: The script and Chris Miller's directing do no favors to Ms. Hayek, Mr. Thornton and the rest of the ensemble, and the story sputters instead of thrusting forward.


The Puss/Humpty Dumpty back-story



should have come at the beginning rather than the middle, and dance fights between Puss and Kitty are just silly. Worse, the flat, forced jokes serve no one well, including Mr. Galifianakis, who finds a way to turn Humpty Dumpty into Alan from "The Hangover." How he does this is hard to explain but fairly obvious after you see the movie — which I'm not recommending you do.

The 3D certainly isn't worth the extra money, but the animation is crisp, solid and professional. One thing the filmmakers do well is add little cat-isms throughout, thereby allowing cat owners to take special delight in some of the humor. You have to be made of stone to not find romping felines cute, and jokes about catnip, "cat people," purring, birds and more succeed in bringing a smile. All of this is well and good, but a movie needs to be more than cute to be appealing.

One thing that made the first "Shrek" so effective was its ability to tell jokes that appealed equally to children and adults. In "Puss in Boots" there's a reference to "Fight Club" that isn't funny for children or adults. In other words, it's clear that everything about this franchise has run its course. Sorry Puss, but your nine lives are up. ■



Football toys date back to the early days of the NFL

Q: I have a desk with a mark on the back that reads "Sheboygan Novelty Co. Combination Ladies Desk, No 17." I'd like to know something about this company and the age of the desk.

A: Sheboygan Novelty Co. was founded in 1890 in Sheboygan, Wis., and remained in business until the 1930s. The company made furniture, including bookcases, buffets, cellarettes, china cabinets, dining sets, ladies' desks and cabinets for music, player-piano rolls and phonographs. Your combination bookcase-desk probably was made in about 1900.

Q: I have a medal with a picture of a turtle carrying a box on its back and the words "Executive Experiment, 1837, Fiscal Agent" on one side. On the other side, there's a horse or donkey with the words "I follow in the steps of my illustrious predecessor." Can you tell me who made it and if it has any value?

A: You have a "Hard Times Token," one of hundreds of different nongovernmental currency tokens made from 1834 until about 1844. In 1836, President Andrew Jackson issued an executive order, the Specie Circular or Coinage Act, requiring payment in gold or silver coins when buying government land. It was meant to eliminate land speculation, but instead caused inflation, the hoarding of coins and the Panic of 1837. To help sales during that time, tokens that could be used as unofficial currency were made by merchants

During football season, fans shop for T-shirts, banners, nodding heads, glasses and other souvenirs of the game. Through the years, many football toys also have been made. A 1930s iron mechanical place-kicker toy actually could kick a tiny football. This toy has been attributed to the Hubley Manufacturing Co. of Lancaster, Pa., but we found the toy's 1934 U.S. patent (No. 1,954,838). It was granted to Charles Woolsey and Henry Bowman of Minneapolis, who assigned it to the Hinsdale Manufacturing Co. of Chicago.

The invention was a game, not just the place-kicking figure. There was a fiberboard backboard that represented a football field. It had football-shaped holes that were targets for the football kicked by the iron mechanical man. The kicker could be moved into different positions. The idea was to get the toy man to kick his miniature ball through one of the backboard's holes for a goal. Few of the backboards have survived, so collectors often think the football player merely kicked the celluloid or tin ball into the air. Some information about the game is still unknown. Did Hinsdale manufacture it? Or did it sell its rights to Hubley? And is its value changed by knowing it's part of a



and other private companies. The tokens pictured various designs, advertising and political themes. They usually were made of copper and were about the size of the large penny of that era. The Coinage Act went into effect when President Martin Van Buren, Jackson's successor, was in office. The words on your token were used by Van Buren in his inaugural address. The animal is a jackass. The turtle on the other side is carrying a safe. Value of your token: less than \$25.



Q: I have a pair of vase-line glass candleholders that are 9 inches tall. They are each on a six-sided double stand. They have an off-white cross with a figure of Jesus in gold. Also in gold are the letters "I.N.R.I." They have been in my family a long time. Someone told me they are more than 100 years old, but I know they were a wedding gift to my parents in 1916. I would appreciate any comment you may have about them.

A: Pressed-glass crucifix candleholders were a popular religious item in the early 1900s, and were made by several different companies in various sizes and colors, including clear glass, milk glass, amber, blue, green, marigold, opal, purple and vaseline glass. Cambridge Glass Co. offered crucifix candlesticks in its 1903 catalog. McKee Glass Co. also made crucifix candlesticks in the early 1900s. The letters "I.N.R.I." stand for the Latin words

that translate to "Jesus the Nazarene, King of the Jews." A shipment of crucifix candlesticks was found in the wreckage of a steam-powered ocean liner that sank off the coast of Nantucket after colliding with another ocean liner in 1909. An ordinary pressed glass crucifix candlestick sells for \$10 to \$20. If the gold decoration on your pair is original, they would be worth more.

Q: I have a teepee teapot, probably purchased in the early- to mid-1950s by my parents during a trip to Canada. The spout is an Indian chief with headdress, and the handle is designed as a totem pole. The pot has a moose and leaves on it. The bottom says Cliff, Newport Pottery of England, Greetings from Canada." Any information about it?

A: Clarice Cliff (1899-1972) was a designer who worked at several English potteries, including Newport Pottery. She's best known for her brightly colored Art Deco designs. Your Teepee teapot was designed in 1939 by Betty Sylvester, an apprentice at the pottery, but it was not produced until 1947. "Kovels' Antiques & Collectibles Price Guide" lists the teapot at \$450.

Tip: Baking soda and vinegar or lemon juice can be used to remove rust. ■







► **Pagelli's Italiano**, Coconut Point, 8017 Plaza Del Lago, Estero; 226-4242 Italian classics are served with a twist in a sprawling setting that evokes an outdoor plaza with textured plaster and lots of metal work. Inspired by the Pagelli family's Sicilian roots, the menu covers a lot of territory, including hearth-baked pizza, grilled meats and seafood as well as the usual Italian pastas and baked dishes. A warning about the "small plates": The crunchy prosciutto-arugula flatbread and rustic sausage-roasted potato plate we had were ample enough to serve as entrees — and both were delicious. Entrees were equally well conceived and executed. The veal and sea scallop rosemary with capellini was a most unexpected pairing; meat and seafood were cooked perfectly, and the rosemary added depth to the tomato sauce. A steak and shrimp combo was also well done, though the peppercorn sauce paired with the beef didn't bring much to the plate.

► **Shula's Steak House**, Hilton Naples, 5111 Tamiami Trail, Naples; 430-4999

You don't have to love football to enjoy a meal at Shula's, but Miami Dolphins fans get an added bonus of dining amidst a host of memorabilia from the legendary undefeated team of 1972. Oh yes, and the cuts of beef are listed on a Don Shula-signed football delivered to the table. Beyond that, the place has the feel of a well-appointed men's club with service to match. Although steak is the star here, seafood lovers aren't ignored, with offerings such as crab cakes and lobster bisque. I enjoyed a salad of beefsteak tomatoes and tangy gorgonzola and, as with most items here, it could have been a meal in itself. Both a prime rib and a 24-ounce Porterhouse steak were properly cooked and seasoned just enough to enhance the meats' natural flavor. Grilled asparagus and lobster mashed potatoes were well-done (a la carte) side dishes. Lava cake with vanilla ice cream was just the right finish to an indulgent meal. Full bar.

► **USS Nemo Undersea Cuisine**, 3745 N. Tamiami Trail, Naples; 261-6366

Chef Nicolas Mercier's artful way with seafood and just about everything else is impressive. Seafood dominates the menu, but there are a handful of meat dishes and an adventurous kids' menu as well. I loved the 26-item sake menu from which we sampled Wakatake and Hakutsuruda, both of which went well with appetizers of goat cheese and tuna tartare and an imaginative seaweed and seafood trilogy (three kinds

of seaweed, salmon, sea bass and lobster). Miso-broiled sea bass and diver scallops with roasted red pepper and vanilla sauce were expertly prepared and presented. The trinity of profiteroles, which included Japanese plum, adzuki and ginger ice creams, was delightful. Somewhat less successful was the service, which was good until dessert, when the server had to also attend to outdoor tables. Tables are tightly grouped, adding a taste of reality to the submarine theme.

Figs' border-hopping menu should keep diners coming back

SAM TADROS ALREADY HAD SUCCESSFUL RESTAURANTS under his belt before he opened Figs Grille last month in Bonita Springs. The chef behind the popular Sam-Bucco Bistro in North Naples, he also was the original owner of La Fontanella in Bonita, which he sold some years ago.

Mr. Tadros' latest project ventures beyond Italy to explore the cuisines of Turkey, Spain, Morocco, Lebanon and France. It's a worthy and welcome concept, considering how inadequately some of the regions are represented on the Southwest Florida restaurant scene. The multinational approach also encourages repeat business, because diners can border hop each time they return. Not in the mood for Turkish kebobs this time? Try a classic French duck confit.

Such diversity can be a bit daunting on the first visit. With a party of just two, we barely scratched the surface of the menu. But considering how well conceived and well executed those few dishes were, it won't be long before we return to sample more of Figs' Mediterranean pleasures.

Despite being so new, the restaurant already appears to have garnered good word of mouth, probably due to Mr. Tadros' fine reputation in the area. The dining room was steadily busy on a weeknight, and most seasonal residents haven't even returned yet. The restaurant's traffic could be a needed boon to Bonita Commons, a sparsely occupied plaza across U.S. 41 from Bonita Bay.

When you cross the threshold of Figs, it's easy to forget that you're in a commercial strip center. Middle Eastern tapestries adorn the walls in the garnet and gold dining room. Ceiling lamps evoke Morocco, and ethnic music plays softly in the background, but the effect is understated. Prepare for a magic carpet ride, the décor seems to whisper (rather than scream).

Mr. Tadros' warm presence was felt throughout the restaurant, as he spread

hospitality and ensured that dishes were representing him well.

Clearly, he has a well-trained kitchen staff because we found very little to quibble with at our table. Service lagged a bit at times, as when we were ready to begin ordering, but we weren't in a hurry so it wasn't particularly troubling.

Figs offers a full bar as well as a decent wine list. I sipped a glass of Ruta 22 Malbec from Argentina (\$8), a lovely violet-hued wine with a note of cassis. While awaiting appetizers, we enjoyed a basket of focaccia and pita breads along with sundried-tomato tapenade — a Sam-Bucco signature touch.

Whichever country you decide to visit for your main course, your meal should begin with mezze, a sampler platter of spreads and vegetables served with pita bread. The half-order (\$9.25) is a perfect appetizer for two people, as it awakens the palate with a cornucopia of flavors but leaves you anticipating more good things to come. The plate included lush, well-seasoned renditions of hummus and moutabel (baba ganoush) as well as nice-

ly charred grilled eggplant and cacik, a tangy and refreshing salad of cucumber, yogurt and mint. Stacked in the middle of the plate were lightly pickled haricot vert, slender carrots and cucumber planks.

Not a mezze morsel went to waste.

The same was true with the breaded and fried goat cheese (\$9.95), which was served on a bed of arugula with dried figs and a drizzle of port wine-lingonberry reduction. The concentrated sweetness of the figs was a good complement to the tangy cheese, peppery greens and tart sauce.

Entrees arrived soon after we cleaned our appetizer plates. Again, narrowing down the choices was no easy task. The duck "two ways" (grilled and confit) beckoned, as did moussaka and sautéed calamari with chorizo and white beans.

Kebobs, available in several variations, were a given. Our server recommended the Adana kebobs (\$19.50) as a representative Turkish dish (Adana is the country's fifth largest city). These were a mixture of minced lamb and beef formed into long rolls, skewered and grilled. The meat was so well blended it was impossible to separate the two flavors, which is saying a lot, because lamb has such a distinctive

essence; it was spiked with "Sam's special seasoning," which offered hints of cumin, coriander and other Mediterranean spices. The kebobs were accompanied by nicely grilled red onion and tomato and served with a flaky short-grained rice.

From the "entrée specialties" we chose "terra maris" (\$26.95), which we inferred means something like "turf and surf" — filet mignon medallions and shrimp, in this case. Both were equally well cooked, the succulent beef having a slight crust but deep-red, juicy interior, the shrimp grilled to the ideal point of being just barely cooked through (an enviable state I always seem to overshoot when grilling at home). The steak was topped with sweet, caramelized onions as well as port wine sauce and fig chutney. Too much? Perhaps, but I wouldn't have wanted to surrender any of it. Even the potato ratatouille with peas and crumbled Roquefort seemed indispensable.

When it comes to dessert, I tend to prefer fruity or creamy after a heavy meal. Fortunately, my dining companion feels the opposite way, so I was able to enjoy a couple of spoonfuls of her divinely fudgy chocolate marquisse. Still, I preferred my lemon semifreddo, a sort of half-frozen mousse/ice cream served in a pool of creme anglaise. To each his own.

Figs Grille covers a lot of culinary territory — and it does so very well. ■
