



THE LIVES THEY LED





Action Jackson retires, but the pursuit of truth (and rare birds) continues

Action Jackson is the most vivid name for the man — and not an inaccurate one. He earned it a long time ago from colleagues and students awestruck by his willingness to plunge into difficult environments with 50 pounds of camera gear and an intrepid cheer that would have impressed a 19th-century African explorer. But that tag fails to suggest both the dignity and quality of his scholarship. It lacks

any hint of the significant opus of his books and research publications. And it ignores the intensely devoted teaching contributions that Professor Emeritus Jerome "Jerry" Jackson, soon to be 71, carries into his retirement from Florida Gulf Coast University. When he drew his formal duties to a close in December, he was given three


things: a foot-high mounted eagle (the FGCU mascot, celebrating his 15-year sojourn here, after 30 years at Mississippi State University), Internet access for life and an office — if space is available. One of the foremost ornithologists in the United States, Mr. Jackson's classrooms have ranged from the Arctic to the Amazon to academia. He's so popular with radio-land listeners from Sarasota to the Ten Thousand Islands that Rick Johnson, manager of

The great continuum




In a universe that observes no time, I find myself charmed by our inclination to mark time by calendars that begin on Jan. 1.

In reality, only physical laws and natural cycles exist. They begin and end with energy and mass, which cannot be destroyed according to the first law of thermodynamics and some other fancy thinking.

one hand, or any conditional excuse from me, on the other.



Pajama Boy: Peter Pan in Obamacare Land

Pajama Boy's place in Internet infamy was secured as soon as the insufferable man-child was tweeted out by Organizing for America.

He is the face of a Web ad that is the latest effort by the Obama team to leverage the holidays for conversation about Obamacare. "Wear pajamas," the ad reads. "Drink hot chocolate. Talk about getting health insurance. #GetTalking."

And, sure enough, Pajama Boy is wearing pajamas — a zip-up onesie in classic Lamar Alexander plaid — and drinking hot chocolate. He is in his 20s, sporting hipster glasses he could have bought at Warby Parker and an expression of self-satisfied ironic amusement.

Pajama Boy is about as threatening as Michael Cera and so nerdy he could guest-host on an unwatched MSNBC show. He is probably reading "The Bell Jar" and enjoyed a hearty Christmas meal of stuffed tofurkey. If he has anything to say about it, Obamacare enrollments will spike in the next few weeks in Williamsburg and Ann Arbor.

Perhaps the goal of OFA was to cre-

ate a readily mockable image to draw attention to its message, in which case Pajama Boy was a brilliantly successful troll. The right immediately Photo-shopped him into the Mandela funeral selfie and emblazoned his photo with derisive lines such as "Hey girl, I live with my parents" and "How did you know I went to Oberlin?"



But it's hard not to see Pajama Boy as an expression of the Obama vision, just like his forbear Julia, the Internet cartoon from the 2012 campaign. Pajama Boy is Julia's little brother. She progressed through life without any significant family or community connections. He is the picture of perpetual adolescence. Neither is a symbol of self-reliant, responsible adulthood.

Alexis de Tocqueville wrote long ago of the infantilizing tendency of all-encompassing government. "It would be like the authority of a parent," he wrote in a famous passage, "if, like that author-

ity, its object was to prepare men for manhood; but it seeks, on the contrary, to keep them in perpetual childhood." If you wanted to illustrate what Mr. Tocqueville was getting at in one meme, Pajama Boy would be good way to do it.

Pajama Boy's mom probably still tucks him in at night, and when she isn't there for him, Obamacare will be. A less nurturing reaction is, as New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie put it in a counter tweet, "Get out of your pajamas." There's a reason President Barack Obama is underwater by a 2-1 margin among men in the latest Quinnipiac poll.

For all the ridicule directed at Julia during last year's campaign, she got at something important: Single women do look to government as a cushion against their economic insecurities. Pajama Boy isn't so apt. He might be glad to pay more for his health insurance to include maternity benefits he doesn't need as a blow against gender stereotyping, but most young people will presumably consider Obamacare more rationally and realize it's a scheme to get them to subsidize insurance costs for older people.

Good luck, Pajama Boy, if you hope to talk them out of that. ■

Sand is the real Florida gold

Florida is one of the top tourist destinations in the world, with more than 90 million people visiting the Sunshine State in 2012.

It's a leading tourist destination in large part because of its beaches.

Florida has 825 miles of beaches, more than any other state. The beaches are glorious. And they are disappearing.

Erosion is a persistent problem, and miles of shoreline are lost every year. The problem is so acute on the east coast that sand to replenish the losses is no longer available from offshore dredging.

The problem in Southwest Florida is no less severe. Collier County is completing a \$9.5 million project to truck in quarry sand to bring its beaches to a 100-foot-width standard. That's just dealing with the worst of the erosion, little more than filling in the "hot spots" — not a full nourishment to baseline 2006 levels.

Why quarry sand? Because quotes from dredging companies, occupied with bigger projects elsewhere, promised costs that were unaffordable.

Why a bare-bones project? Because tourist tax dollars that pay for beach maintenance are limited by the 4 percent bed tax. There was simply not enough money to do more.

The sand-hauling project will end soon, but the problem will remain. Erosion will continue, and we'll replace the sand only to have it erode away again — an endless cycle.

Is there a better way? A number of civic and business groups think so. The struggle to save our beaches has drawn the attention of the Collier Citizens Council, the League of Women Voters of Collier County, the Greater Naples

Chamber of Commerce, the Collier County Presidents Council and Greater Naples Leadership. These groups have banded together to sponsor a public forum on beach maintenance — the first step toward meaningful planning.

There are lots of issues.

What should the criteria be for renourishing? Does an arbitrary six-year cycle, as now used, make sense? Or would staggered two-year projects be more practical?

Is there a way to lock in offshore dredging at reasonable cost? Some have suggested the county buy the equipment, perhaps in concert with nearby communities, and do the dredging itself. Others have suggested paying a retainer to a dredging company to ensure availability.

While the current sand-hauling project has been widely opposed, it remains a future option. How does it stack up with dredging from a cost-effectiveness standpoint?

Should hardening be more widely used? Rock jetties and groins are common elsewhere in the country and have been used to good purpose locally around Gordon Pass.

What about plantings? Bay Colony has effectively stabilized dunes in North Naples with shoreline plants.

There are more esoteric approaches. So-called passive dewatering makes use of drainage tubes in the sand to dissipate wave energy.

Whatever the approach, cost is critical. Many feel an extra percent in bed tax would bring in enough additional money to put beach maintenance on a sound financial footing.

These things and others will be discussed at the forum. All are encouraged to attend from 3-5 p.m. Thursday, Jan. 9, at North Naples United Methodist Church, 6000 Goodlette-Frank Road.

The following experts have been recruited from around the state and beyond to participate, with Jeff Lytle of the *Naples Daily News* serving as moderator:

■ Jim Beever, Southwest Florida Regional Planning Council, will frame the problem.

■ Chad Washburn, Naples Botanical Garden, will discuss the value of shoreline plantings.

■ Ken Christensen, president of EcoShore, is coming from Denmark to speak on passive dewatering, a technique used along the North Sea.

■ Ken Humiston of Humiston & Moore Engineering will discuss the pros and cons of shoreline hardening.

■ Gary McAlpin, head of Collier Coastal Zone Management, will outline the drivers of sand nourishment, including the relative costs of sand hauling and offshore dredging.

■ Local attorney Patrick Neale will discuss funding options and the possible benefits of an increased bed tax.

■ Tom Pierro of Coastal Planning & Engineering Inc. will discuss the vagaries of permitting.

■ Ray Judah of the Florida Coastal & Ocean Coalition will wrap up the session.



'Angels' on earth ensure that kids' needs are covered



With a small group of friends, Jackie started purchasing underwear and socks for students at Mike Davis Elementary School. In the process, they learned that many children also lacked basic school uniforms (polo shirts and shorts), and so those items were added to the group's shopping list.

Today, Angels Undercover supplies 10 Collier County elementary schools with clothing so kids can arrive at school ready to learn. This year, more than 3,600 children will receive clothing. The goal is to provide for the 20 schools in Collier County where 50 percent or more of the students are economically needy.

All of the funding for Angels Undercover has come from private donations, foundations and corporations. Angels Undercover employs no staff, which minimizes costs and allows them to provide aid directly where it is needed most.

The cost to provide one school with the clothing its children need is approximately \$5,000 per year.

Jackie was born and raised in Columbus, Ohio, where she lived until moving to Naples fulltime in 2000. She earned a BFA from the Ohio State University and worked as the director of advertising and public relations for Nationwide Insurance in Columbus before running one of her husband's companies.

While working at Nationwide, she had an opportunity to co-chair their United Way campaign two years in a row. That opportunity gave her the chance to explore the nonprofits in town and to see the many needs of a community.

It wasn't until several years after moving to Naples that she joined the board of directors of the David Lawrence Center, where she served from 2004-08. "It was a wonderful experience to watch the dedication of their staff working to help others in need on a daily basis," she says.

Angels Undercover distributed 10,000 uniforms at the start of this school year. With that accomplishment, Jackie says, "I knew I was exactly where I wanted to be and realizing my life's purpose."

Angels Undercover recently reached out to Youth Haven to form a partnership to provide clothing for the elementary age children who are brought to the emergency shelter. "Forming partnerships with our fellow nonprofits is high on our list of goals," she says.

A \$25 donation to Angels Undercover buys a child two uniform shirts, two pairs of shorts and packages of underwear and socks. Thanks to a partnership with Chico's FAS, Angels Undercover makes its own "private label" uniforms. The tag on each piece of clothing says it all: One side reads, "This garment was provided by Angels Undercover who believe in you!" The flip side: "A simple act of kindness can change a child's life."

life in the greater world during his 22 years.

"He just had a light about him," remembers his mother, Lee Ann Adams of Bonita Springs. "He was happy. He was funny and never felt sorry for himself. His self esteem was so high."

Dustin was diagnosed at age 3 with Hunter Syndrome, a serious, extremely rare and incurable genetic disorder that primarily affects males and that causes permanent, progressive damage that affects appearance, mental development, organ function and physical abilities.

Hunter Syndrome occurs when an essential enzyme needed to break down complex molecules is either missing or doesn't function properly, allowing those molecules to accumulate in harmful amounts in certain cells and tissues.

For Dustin, the condition meant diminished hearing, perpetually clinched hands and stunted physical development. His internal organs continued to grow, however, causing further health problems for a body that only reached a height of 3 feet, 7 inches by the time he was in high school.

But despite a doctor's prediction when he was diagnosed that Dustin would only live to the age of 10 or 11, he beat the odds and inspired others whose lives he touched before his death in October.

He and his family were determined his handicap would not bar his living a normal life.

Dustin graduated from Estero High School in 2009 without enrolling in ESE (Exceptional Student Education) classes, drove his own truck and worked at Bass Pro Shops in Gulf Coast Town Center and at the Beach Daisy boutique on Marco Island, manning the cash register at the women's resort wear store owned by his mother.

Fishing, playing poker and enjoying bonfires with friends were among his favorite pastimes. His mother says he began playing poker with neighboring farmers when he was 8 and the family lived in rural Estero.

"He just loved it," she says. "It was his favorite thing to do. He said that when he played, he felt normal because it was just him competing with other human being and they were all on the same level sitting down."

He regularly drove himself to Immokalee's Seminole Casino, where at age 18, he won the second poker tournament he entered.

Taking part in a blind study for an enzyme replacement therapy when he was 13 was a life-changing event for Dustin. The treatments included a

growth hormone that enabled him to grow 10 inches between the ages of 17 and 22, increasing room for his internal organs and improving his health.

Ms. Adams and many others gained much from observing Dustin's courage, enjoying his sense of humor and his appreciation for all that life has to offer.

"Just watching his courage and his attitude, I've become less materialistic about life ... you try to remember to do the little things — going camping, having game night — that's the stuff that's important," she says. "I didn't realize how much strength I had until I had Dustin." ■

RAISING A JOYFUL NOISE

William and Joyce Eriksen had an old-fashioned courtship of three years before tying the knot in 1961.

Their first meeting occurred when she was a special education teacher in the Glastonbury, Conn., school district and he was an instrumental music teacher and band director there.

"He was just fun," Mrs. Eriksen recalls in explaining her initial attraction to her future husband, with whom she had three children and now, five grandchildren. "He loved his music. That was his passion. I loved going to the concerts. He was just a fun person to be around. He was a spark, you know."

Integral to "Bill" Erikson's spark was his deep and abiding love affair with music, a passion that he spent a lifetime sharing with others.

Instrumental music teacher and band director were titles Mr. Erikson wore with pride during his 35 years with the Glastonbury school district. Outside the classroom, he was a music festival judge, clinician and guest conductor throughout New England, along with founder and conductor of the Glastonbury Town Band and The Hartford (Conn.) Pops Band.

The music didn't stop after Mr. Erikson's 1995 retirement, as he moved on to conduct both the Vineyard Haven (Mass.) Town Band and The Naples Concert Band, for which he played trombone and served as conductor for six years and assistant conductor for four years.

Keeping the tradition of the community band alive was a cause the Marco Island resident pursued with passionate dedication.


"His motto was to get those dusty instruments out of the attic, start practicing and audition for a spot in the town band as soon as possible," Mrs. Eriksen says. "Wherever Bill lived, he became involved in the community band at some level ... In spite of the fact that Bill never lived in River City, he was the consummate music man."

That drive led Mr. Erikson to found the Paradise Brass Quintet, where he played trombone with fellow members of The Naples Concert Band brass section. He also played locally with the Doc Peters Jazz Orchestra, the Music Makers Show Band and the Naples Orchestra and Chorus.

Harris Lanzel, Naples Concert Band music director and conductor, met Mr. Erikson in 2000. They forged a close friendship through their shared passion. Mr. Lanzel misses the camaraderie they shared and Mr. Erikson's musical expertise.

"Bill had a larger-than-life personality," says Mr. Lanzel. "He had a real zest for life. He liked to play practical jokes. He was a superb musician."

Mr. Erikson was 77 when he passed



CONFRONTING CANCER WITH A HOPEFUL SPIN

Cancer found one resolute opponent in "Disco" Dave Bierbrauer.

After being diagnosed with lung cancer in 2008, Mr. Bierbrauer battled Stage IV of the dreaded disease for more than five years, far exceeding normal survival rates for that type cancer.

The well-known, much-beloved golf pro and DJ met the challenge with a positive, never-give-up-hope attitude before finally succumbing to the disease in October. He was 58.

Mr. Bierbrauer moved to Marco Island in the mid-1980s from the St. Louis area and worked as an assistant golf pro at the Island Country Club. He also taught at the Hideaway Beach Club on Marco and Lely Resort in Naples.

He was also a popular DJ on the island who was known for his engaging personality and sense of humor.

"Dave was a people person, very outgoing, confident and quite the charmer — especially with the ladies," says his close friend Rick Hanscom of Marco, who knew Mr. Bierbrauer for 28 years. "He was very popular because he was out all the time at restaurants and bars, talking and laughing with people, not to mention he was the feature DJ at both of Marco's nightclubs (Septembers and Illusions)."

"I think what really attracted people to Dave was that he always had a smile and would always make you laugh with his silly antics."

While enduring grueling rounds of cancer therapy and multiple surgeries, Mr. Bierbrauer continued to be a familiar face around Marco. He would occasionally share his story through interviews with newspapers on the island, which also covered the benefit golf tournaments that were held to help defray his medical expenses.

"He never came across as a tough guy, but after watching him go through

numerous surgeries, countless rounds of radiation and chemotherapy, I realized he's probably the toughest, most determined person I've ever known," Mr. Hanscom says. "Through all of this, he always had hope, and managed to joke and maintain his silly personality."

Steve Reynolds was a morning DJ on WVOI in Naples/ Marco Island when he and Mr. Bierbrauer met about 10 years ago and began teaming up, DJ-ing at parties.

"We both enjoyed music and Dave loved to entertain people, so I would be the sound guy and he would charm the crowd," Mr. Reynolds says. "Also, we would talk for hours about bands and exchange trivia about them."

"Once he accepted you into his circle of friends, you were in for good." ■

Learning (formerly the Education Foundation of Collier County), which named him a Man of Distinction last year and has started an endowment fund in his memory to benefit its educational initiatives.

Ms. Fraser met Mr. Mohlke in 1982 when she was working on a freelance editing project for the Greater Naples Chamber of Commerce magazine. She needed to know how many public beach accesses there were in the city.

"I called the chamber and they told me to contact their walking computer, Chuck Mohlke," she recalls.

Mr. Mohlke's response to her request — a stack of papers addressing everything anyone could want to know about Naples beach accesses — far exceeded her expectations.

That led to the two teaming up on subsequent writing projects and eventually starting their own market research company, Fraser and Mohlke Associates, in 1985.

"People at the newspaper used to say they knew his number by heart," says Ms. Fraser. "If somebody needed to know something, he knew it. He just could remember things. He never needed a Rolodex because he remembered people's numbers. We had a lot of fun working together."

Elaine Vaccaro and her husband Gene worked side by side with Mr. Mohlke as members of the Collier Democratic Party for 24 years.


Mr. Mohlke was named the chairman emeritus of the Collier branch earlier this year.

"He was beloved by Republicans and Democrats," says Mrs. Vaccaro. "That was one of the greatest things about him."

She remembers him as a gentleman who respected people regardless of their political leanings and, much like Ms. Fraser recalls her friend and colleague, as someone possessing a prodigious memory for important information.

"He was always calm. He was always thoughtful," says Mrs. Vaccaro. "We all loved Chuck. We miss him. It (his passing away) happened suddenly. It was hard for us." ■

Alice Fraser, like so many others, knew that Chuck Mohlke was the person to call when she needed information or statistics relating to Naples and Collier County.

But Mr. Mohlke was known for so much more during his decades as a Collier resident: civic activist, government watchdog, Democratic Party stalwart and advocate for the underdog and the underprivileged. He was 79 when he died in July.

His activities were many, including helping found the Collier County Democratic Party in 1989 and serving as chair until 2008, serving on the county's Industrial Authority and belonging to the NAACP of Collier County and the Greater Naples Chamber of Commerce.

He was also a member of the Democratic National Committee for 12 years and served as a superdelegate at several Democratic conventions.

A cause that was especially near and dear to the Minneapolis-native's heart was Collier County's Champions For





First Book-Collier County has distributed more than 400,000 new books to disadvantaged children in the eight years since the nonprofit organization was founded here.

efforts with 20 local partner organizations have made it possible for FBCC to distribute books to so many children.

Each month during the school year, more than 6,500 children in Head Start pre-Ks and kindergarten, first and second grade classes in Title I schools receive a new book of their own — to take home, read and share with their families. Family reading time has become a tradition in homes where formerly, no books were to be found.

FBCC works in partnership with Backpacks for the Homeless, Boys & Girls Club of Collier County, Christ Child Society of Naples, Collier County Public Schools, the Community Foundation of Collier County, Dependency Court (through Collier County Circuit Judge Elizabeth Krier), Early Literacy and Learning Model, Friends of Foster Children, Fun Time Early Childhood Academy, Golisano Children’s Museum of Naples, Grace Place for Children & Families, Guadalupe Center of Immokalee, Gulfcoast Transportation Systems, Habitat for Humanity of Collier County, Immokalee Child Care Center, The Immokalee Foundation, Immokalee Housing & Family Services, NCH Healthcare System, Redlands Christian Migrant Association, the Ronald McDonald Care Mobile, The Shelter for Abused Women & Children and YMCA of the Palms.

In 2013, book distribution expanded to include the summer months.

“If you give a child a book, you can engage a mind, ignite an imagination and even improve a life,” says Joanne Wyss, co-founder and chair of FBCC. “Kids who read year-round can beat ‘summer slide’ and maintain their reading scores.”

FBCC buys first-quality new books at a fraction of the retail cost through the national organization’s First Book Marketplace. A donation of \$500 provides 10 books for every child in a classroom.

One hour a week can change a life forever


Each January, The Immokalee Foundation joins the nation in celebrating National Mentoring Month, which focuses attention on the need for mentors who can work with youth. Every child wants and deserves to have the guidance of a caring, compassionate adult and proper role model, one who chooses to devote his or her time to a young person and offer support and encouragement.

Just one hour per week can change the life of a child by helping him establish goals, improve his academic and life skills, develop self-confidence and build a solid foundation of values.

Since 2001, TIF has matched volunteer mentors with qualified seventh-, eighth- and ninth-grade students from Immokalee Middle School and Immokalee High School through its scholarship and mentoring program, Take Stock in Children, which makes it possible for at-risk students in the community to reach academic and personal success. Those students who successfully fulfill their required pledge to earn good grades, exhibit good behavior and meet weekly with a personal mentor are awarded a full college scholarship upon high school graduation.

Mentoring does work. At its most basic level, mentoring shows a young person that someone cares about him and will be there to help in any number of situations. Studies have shown that young people with mentors tend to stay in school, attend classes, get better grades and attend college.

Mentors can also help improve a young person's self-esteem and teach him how to relate to all kinds of people and situa-

tions. In fact, the number of ways mentoring can help a student are as varied as the people involved in each program.

TIF mentors meet with a student once per week throughout the school year, usually during the student's lunch period. To make it more convenient and cut down on travel time for mentors, they can also meet with the students after school, or the students can Skype with their mentors at TIF offices. The experience often benefits more than just the student.

Manny Tournon has been mentoring

TIF students for the past seven years and notes it's an experience like no other. "It can be hard to make the drive to Immokalee, but the time investment is something money can never buy. If we can get a kid from Immokalee out of the fields, we have succeeded; we've broken the cycle.

"If not for TSIC, many of these students would finish high school then go to work in the fields with their parents," he adds. "Instead, they are going to college. To know that you have a small part in making that happen is inspiring."

While it's important to work together on solutions and goals for the mentee's future, having the ability to listen and share is critical. In fact, just being that shoulder

or a sympathetic ear is sometimes enough to inspire and encourage a student who is desperately seeking direction from someone who has specific life experiences and is happy to freely share them.

Although the program currently has more than 80 community volunteers from Lee and Collier counties, more mentors are needed. Students raised in Immokalee face a bleak future with a low graduation rate and lack of opportunities, as evidenced by the 80 percent high school graduation rate. The good news is that since 2010, 100 percent of the students inducted into TIF's Take Stock in Children program graduated from high school and continued their post-secondary education. Much of this success can be attributed to the devotion of community mentors.

To participate, volunteers must complete a Take Stock in Children application, clear a background screening, attend orientation and take part in quarterly training.

Mr. Tournon encourages those considering mentoring to take on the challenge. "Just jump the fence. You'll never regret it." ■



NEWS OF THE WEIRD

Annals of science

America's foremost advocate for frontal lobotomies as "treatment" for mental disorder, the late Dr. Walter Freeman, performed an estimated 3,500 lobotomies during the 1940s and 1950s before opposition finally solidified against him, according to a December 2013 investigation by *The Wall Street Journal*. At the peak of his influence, he was so confident that he demonstrated the procedure to skeptics by hammering an icepick ("from his own kitchen," the Jour-

nal reported) into both eye sockets of an electrical-shocked patient and "toggling" the picks around the brain tissue, certain that he was severing "correctly." For years, Dr. Freeman (a neurologist untrained in surgery) marshaled positive feedback from enough patients and families for the procedure to survive criticism, and he spent his final years (until his death in 1972) securing patient testimonials to "prove" the validity of lobotomies.

Cultural diversity

■ Each Nov. 1 is a day (or two) of craziness in the isolated mountain village of Todos Santos Cuchumatanes, Guatemala, where Mayan tradition commands continuous horse races through town, jockeyed by increasingly drunk riders, until only a sober-enough winner remains. Collisions occur in the Race of the Souls, and occasionally someone dies, but the misfortune is met with a collective shrug and regarded as a spiritual offering for fertile crops during the coming year, according to an eyewitness this year reporting for Vice.com. Ironically, for the rest of the year, the village is largely alcohol-free except for that on hand to sell to tourists.

■ Since the 13th century, sheepherders in Spain have had the right (still honored) to use 78,000 miles of paths in the country for seasonal flock migrations — even some streets of Madrid,

including a crossing of Puerta del Sol, described as Madrid's Times Square. The shepherds pay a customary, token duty, which, according to an October Associated Press dispatch, the government proudly accepts, given the prominence of Spain's native Merino sheep breed in the world's wool market.

■ Postal worker Umakant Mishra, of Kanpur city in Uttar Pradesh, India, was freed by a criminal court in December — 29 years after he was charged when a money-order account turned up 92 cents short. Mr. Mishra was called to judicial hearings 348 times over the years, but it was not until recently that the government admitted it had no witnesses for the court to hear against him. A December BBC News dispatch reported, citing "official" figures, that more than 30 million cases are pending in Indian courts.

Latest religious messages

The evangelical educational organization Answers in Genesis, which has established a series of children's books and a creationist museum, announced recently that it would enter the bond market to fund its most ambitious project — a creationist amusement park centered around a "life-size" reconstruction of Noah's Ark, for which it estimates it will need at least \$73 million from investors. Issuing bonds might be seen as des-

perate since AiG has raised only \$13.6 million privately since proposing the Ark-park, but a Georgetown University finance professor, contacted by Slate.com, suggested that the bonds' terms place them in the high-risk "junk bond" category (perhaps better described as "faith-based," having virtually no resale value and without an independent bond rating).

Questionable judgments

■ Coughlan elementary school in Langley, British Columbia, announced to parents in November that henceforth it would not just prohibit abusive or unwanted physical contact among its kindergarteners, but all contact. Officials said they were responding to parents who objected to "rough play," but, said another parent, incredulous, "No tag, no hugging, no touching at all ... I am not going to tell my daughter she can't touch her friends at school. I am going to teach her boundaries."

■ In South Africa, with one of the high-

est incidences of rape in the world, one question on its recent nationwide high school standardized drama test asked students to direct (as if staging a play) the rape of a baby, given only certain props. South Africa's Education Department defended the question as assessing pupils' concept of "using metaphor" as a theatrical technique. The question was based on an award-winning play by anti-rape activist Lara Foot Newton (who, of course, wrote primarily for adults).

Cliches come to life

■ In criminal cases, DNA is usually a smoking gun for the prosecution — except, of course, if there is an "evil twin." In November a judge in Colorado Springs ruled that a suspect, Army Lt. Aaron Lucas, should have the opportunity to blame his brother Brian for a string of sexual assaults because the DNA might be Brian's. Brian has not been charged and denies any involvement, but Aaron said Brian was in two crime-scene states that Aaron was never in. Said a Denver defense lawyer, "The only time I have seen (the evil-twin

defense) was on 'Law and Order: SVU.'"

■ Four villagers in northeast Kenya, angry that cheetahs were killing their goats, lay in wait one night in November and then chased down and captured the cheetahs. Cheetahs are regarded as the fastest mammals on Earth, but they lack endurance; Kenyans are marathon prodigies. Indeed, the cheetahs were captured only when they ran out of gas after about four miles of pursuit by the Kenyans, and were handed over alive, and exhausted, to the Kenyan Wildlife Service. ■



WGCU, the public radio station based at the university, told him he could set up an office there, if he preferred.

His signature show, "Jerry Jackson, With the Wild Things," will continue indefinitely on WGCU. And his wife and fellow ornithologist, Bette Jackson, will continue to serve as chair of the Department of Biological Sciences at FGCU.

As for Action Jackson? "He'll continue to inspire others," says his son, Matthew Jackson, a graduate student in Environmental Engineering at Humboldt State University in Northern California. "His love for the environment and education define who he is."

His wife is less circumspect, perhaps. "He's kind of driven," she says.

"So he'll keep looking for the ivory-billed woodpecker, and for other things. He's always looking for one more thing."

Ruffling feathers

The American ivory-billed woodpecker was last seen clearly, and photographed, in Louisiana in the 1930s, before vanishing into what scientists call with chilling precision "the extinction vortex" — except for anecdotal sightings.

Then in 2004 one of the character-defining moments of Mr. Jackson's life as a scientist, and as a man, took place.

He had recently published his celebrated book, "In Search of the Ivory-Billed Woodpecker." In Cuba in 1986, on a trip he recounts in the book, he may have seen the haunting bird. "But I would never claim it because I could

provide no evidence," he says now.

Then a research team from Cornell University's renowned Laboratory of Ornithology claimed to have found a living ivory-billed woodpecker in the Big Woods of Arkansas.

The announcement, which came with a grainy videotape of a bird flying away through trees, created an almost instantaneous and worldwide excitement, on a par, say, with the first confirmed ascent of Mt. Everest in 1953.

An old friend of Mr. Jackson's from graduate school, James Tate, who had also worked at Cornell and been named to a cabinet position in Washington, was serving as science advisor to Secretary of the Interior Gale Norton. Mr. Tate had also helped Mr. Jackson gain a seat on the influential federal Committee for Invasive Species, which he held for six years.

When the supposed ivory-billed discovery became public, Mr. Tate stood before the world with Interior Secretary Norton as she made the announcement — an event Cornell researchers and government officials timed to coincide with the team's published findings in Science magazine.

Rediscovering a lost species that had so deeply and poignantly captured the American imagination was irresistible, to most.

"Everyone wanted it to happen, to be real. So did Jerry. The masses were very much aligned," recalls Mr. Jackson's wife, who watched as her husband revealed the kind of moral courage that sometimes fails to accompany physical courage.

Although some scientists raised doubts about the evidence, gently, only Mr. Jackson stepped firmly forward.

In a detailed analysis he published in The Auk, a prominent ornithologi-

cal journal, he described the Cornell research as "faith-based ornithology."

The position put him in near isolation, the way Galileo might have been isolated when he questioned the accounts of church fathers about the physical world.

He received calls from the head of the Cornell lab, John Fitzpatrick, telling him he would be responsible for the extinction of the ivory-billed woodpecker if he didn't withdraw his position, and from Mr. Tate, asking him to back down, he recalls.

But Mr. Jackson is a scientist first. "Truth is his compass for his whole life," acknowledges his wife.

Mr. Jackson puts the dispute in the context of history.

"The whole idea of the scientific method goes back to the 1600s, when people with power and money would make pronouncements about how things worked, whether they worked that way or not," he explains now.

Ultimately a new breed appeared — the skeptics. They relied on hope and empirical evidence, not faith.

"Hope is not truth," he concludes. "It's the fire that incites us to seek the truth."

Described as "The Godfather of all wild things" by one colleague (William Hammond, professor emeritus), and as a man who "straddles the border between science and the humanities" by another (Professor Win Everham), his extraordinary palette of talent becomes clear in the last lines of a poem both whimsical and precise that appeared in the July 2010 edition of the Canadian ornithological journal, *Picoides*.

He calls it "Shadow Flight," describing killdeers wheeling above a night baseball game.

"A crack of the bat. The ball flies high. For a moment the Killdeer shares his sky.

Ball and bird, bird and ball, 'Which is which?' the outfield call. The ball drops; the bird stops.


Home run! The fans cheer! The bird flies — a shadow flight and strident Killdeer! Killdeer! Killdeer!"

About such literary dalliances, Mr. Jackson says, "I've always loved words. But the scientist in me conflicts with the poet in me. I demand scientific accuracy."

Retiring a career, he will never retire that demand. ■

NIH and NFL tackle concussion research

THE UNIVERSITY OF FLORIDA

The National Institutes of Health has selected eight projects to receive support to answer some of the most fundamental problems on traumatic brain injury, including understanding long-term effects of repeated head injuries and improving diagnosis of concussions.

Funding is provided by the Sports and Health Research Program, a partnership among the NIH, the National Football League and the Foundation for the National Institutes of Health. In 2012, the NFL donated \$30 million to FNIH for research studies on injuries affecting athletes, with brain trauma being the primary area of focus.

Traumatic brain injury is a major public health problem that affects all age groups and is the leading cause of death in young adults. Recently, concern has been raised about the potential long-term effects of repeated concussion, particularly in those most at risk: young athletes and those engaged in professions associated with frequent head injury, including men and women in the military. Current tests cannot reliably identify concus-

sions, and there is no way to predict who will recover quickly, who will suffer long-term symptoms, and which few individuals will develop progressive brain degeneration, called chronic traumatic encephalopathy.

"We need to be able to predict which patterns of injury are rapidly reversible and which are not. This program will help researchers get closer to answer-

ing some of the important questions about concussion for our youth who play sports and their parents," said Story Landis, Ph.D., director of the National Institute of Neurological Disorders and Stroke, part of NIH.

Two \$6 million projects are large, cooperative agreements focused on defining the scope of long-term changes that occur in the brain years after a head injury or after multiple concussions. The cooperative awards form a partnership between NINDS, the Eunice Kennedy Shriver National Institute of Child Health and Human Development and multiple academic medical centers.

NIH also will fund six pilot projects totaling more than \$2 million that will last up to two years and are designed to provide support for the early stages of sports-related concussion projects. If the early results are encouraging, they may become the basis of more comprehensive projects.

The eight projects were selected by the NIH following a rigorous scientific review process.

The cooperative awards bring together two teams of independent scientists to study and compare the brains of donors who were at high or low risk for devel-

oping long-term effects of TBI. Ten neuropathologists from eight universities will coordinate to describe the chronic effects of head injury in tissue from hundreds of individuals in order to develop standards for diagnosis.

The project includes four teams that will correlate brain scans with changes in brain tissue, using a variety of techniques. This may open the possibility of using these advanced brain imaging techniques to diagnose chronic effects of TBI in living individuals. The investigators in the two projects will also help NIH develop a registry dedicated to enrolling individuals with a history of TBI who are interested in donating brain and spinal cord tissue for study after their death. The new NIH Neurobiobank will coordinate the tissue collection, data gathering and also distribute biospecimens, along with relevant information to enable other scientists to access this valuable tissue.

The NINDS is the nation's leading funder of research on the brain and nervous system. The NINDS mission is to reduce the burden of neurological disease — a burden borne by every age group.

A soothsayer reflects on his predictions for the year just ended

In my first column of 2013, I played soothsayer and made three general predictions about NCH and health care during the year to come. Looking back now, the year was a notable one in many respects for NCH.

■ **Prediction No. 1:** There will be a return to professionalism in health care — Here's what I wrote one year ago: "The definition of a 'professional' is one who puts the interests of the client ahead of his or her own. Appropriateness of care is as important as quality and safety."

The outcome with respect to professionalism in health care is still a bit mixed. The health care economy has grown beyond most everything else in our economy, partly for positive reasons

of doing more but also for less good reasons of adding fewer necessary diagnostic tests and treatments. Sadly, outside regulators are still needed to police those who place quarterly returns ahead of a patient's or community's long-term welfare. Professionalism is still front and center in the minds of caregivers who put the interest of the patient ahead of their own. The trend toward altruism is growing, and I believe it will be more pervasive in the coming year.

■ **Prediction No. 2:** We will continue to grow the market, not just "market share" — Last January, I wrote: "Southwest Florida has undergone cyclical booms and busts every five to 10 years during the 35 years I have had the pleasure of being a member of the community. Already our Mayo Clinic affiliation has attracted increasing numbers of patients from distant areas for diagnosis and care."

The NCH affiliation with Mayo continues to grow with new connections among the 20-plus other Mayo affiliates

and as we assimilate more of the Mayo knowledge, tradition and expertise. Our many Mayo collaborations have resulted in patients being helped, educational experiences completed and research projects initiated.

We have also formed a partnership with Florida Blue to provide better value for many of its insured patients who are also cared for by the NCH Physician Group.

■ **Prediction No. 3:** As we focus on outpatient preventive care, the health of our population will increase — I predicted that, "In line with adding value, we will continue to transform ourselves from a repair shop to a patient care model, where our goals are prevention of illness, avoidance of expensive hospitalization and improvement of the health of the population."

This prediction will see fruition as we embark on our decade-long journey to become a Blue Zone — one in which residents live longer, happier and healthier lives. Our goal is to decrease the need for inpatient hospitalization, grow

outpatient services and evolve more to home care and prevention.

In 2013, we added 20 physicians to the NCH Physician Group, most of who are primary care providers.

We are leading by example as we encourage our own employees and their relatives covered under our insurance to lead healthier lives. As a result, many individuals and groups of employees are enjoying better health. And we fully intend that this more promising path will continue.

So how do I grade myself as a soothsayer? Well, I think I was directionally correct but too optimistic in my hopes for time to completion. This health-care journey is a 26-mile marathon, not a 5K race.

We have made great strides, but there is still much to do. Next week, I'll take a crack at predictions for 2014. Meanwhile, happy new year to all. ■

Officials urge pregnant women to get flu vaccine

The Florida Department of Health in Collier County urges all health-care professionals to strongly encourage their pregnant patients to get a flu vaccination. While supplies last, the health department is waiving the vaccine fee for pregnant women.

Flu vaccines are available at the following Florida Department of Health sites in Collier County:

■ Naples: The Health Building, 3339 Tamiami Trail E., from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday-Friday; 252-6264 for information, 252-8212 for the flu hotline.

■ Immokalee: 419 North First St., from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday-Friday; 252-7300. Appointments are not necessary.

According to officials at the Florida Department of Health in Tallahassee, the state has received reports of severe influenza illness, including hospitalizations requiring ICU care, among pregnant women in recent weeks. None of the women experiencing severe complications had received the 2013-14 influenza vaccine.

The peak of flu season is usually in late January, so it is not too late to get vaccinated. Optimal immunity from the vaccine starts approximately two weeks after receiving a flu shot.

Vaccination is the best way to prevent getting or giving the flu. Many healthy individuals forego a flu shot knowing that if they do get the flu they will most likely survive it, even though they will be very sick for seven to 10 days.

What many people do not think about is they are infectious with the flu for approximately 24 hours before symptoms occur. During this time, it is very possible

to infect someone who might be more vulnerable to flu complications, including older adults, people with compromised immune systems or chronic disease, young children and, especially, pregnant women and infants. Health officials also remind everyone it is important to wash hands frequently and sneeze or cough into a sleeve rather than into the hands.

The partnership allows families to access specialized medical treatment by providing a place to live near the hospital at little or no cost. ■

PET TALES

Five ways to ring in a new year for your pet

Got your New Year's resolutions ready yet? Yeah, we don't either. A good place to start, though, is with your pet. Helping your cat or dog change his life for the better has benefits for both of you. A healthier, happier pet not only puts less pressure on your wallet, but also brings more smiles to your face multiple times a day. Here are some ideas to get you started.

■ **Brush those teeth.** Keeping your pet's pearly whites clean isn't just about improving his breath, although that is definitely a bonus. Brushing your pet's teeth several times a week (yes, cats, too) prevents the buildup of plaque and tartar, which trap bacteria and eventually cause periodontal disease. Brushing reduces the number of bacteria circulating through your pet's system and helps ensure that he keeps more of his teeth into old age. Dentures aren't an option for him, after all.

■ **Watch his weight.** Does your dog or cat look like a plump cocktail wiener on toothpicks? That's not normal or healthy. Use your eyes and hands to determine if Roxy or Snowball could stand to lose a few pounds.

Dr. Tony Buffington, a veterinarian, nutrition specialist and professor in the department of veterinary clinical sciences at Ohio State University's College of Veterinary Medicine in Columbus, says that when you look at a pet from

the side, you should see an abdomen that's tucked up, not hanging low. As you look down at him, you should see an hourglass figure, with the waist curving inward just before the hind legs. When you pet your dog or cat on the side or back, you should be able to feel the ribs or spinal bumps, but not see them.

■ **Measure your pet's food.** This is one of the easiest ways to help a dog or cat slim down. Instead of leaving food out all the time, give a set amount once or twice a day. Use the recommendation on the bag or can as a starting point, but recognize that individual animals have different metabolisms and may need more or less than the suggested

amount. Ask your veterinarian's advice about how much your pet should be eating, and don't be afraid to experiment.

■ **Start an exercise plan.** Getting off the couch and on the move is good for both of you. Take a brisk walk or play a rousing game of fetch. For cats, dangle or pull a fishing-pole toy for them to chase. Wriggle the pole a little so the object on the end of the string resembles a bug or other critter scurrying along the ground. Your dog may enjoy this kind of play, too, as long as you don't let him know he's chasing a cat toy.

Better yet, have your dog or cat "work" for his meals by hiding small amounts of food around the house (this works only if you have a single pet), placing food up high — on a washer or dryer, for instance — so cats have to make an effort to get to it, or placing kibble in puzzle toys that pets must manipulate to make the food come out. These are all good ways to exercise your furry predator's body and brain and make his day more interesting, especially if you're off at work and he has nothing else to do.

■ **Make time for him.** When your pet nudges your hand or bumps you with his head, don't just automatically hand him a treat. Instead, reward him with a scratch between the ears or a few minutes of play. You'll both be better for it. ■

Where the jobs are

Just released preliminary county unemployment rates show more local workers were back on the job in November than a year ago. Even more good news: Area businesses that don't rely on seasonal tourism expect to continue adding jobs well into 2014.

Unemployment dipped again in November, posting 1.9 percent declines in Charlotte and Lee counties since November 2012. Collier County's 5.3 percent unemployment, a year-over-year 2 percent drop that's below state and national averages, could even become the new post-economic recession norm.

"People want to see 3 percent like it

Hiring prospects look good for 2014

was before, but 5.8 is really good," says Jim Wall, communications director for the Southwest Florida Workforce Development Board. "In this economy, 5 and 4 percent is literally zero unemployment. There are always some people unemployed because they're changing jobs. For that 4 or 5 percent, there are jobs out there. The question is what those jobs are, the pay and if there's a career ladder."

The numbers are encouraging to local economic development offices and painted a rosier picture for the regional business climate in the dwindling days of 2013.

With unemployment rates of 6.2 and 6.3, respectively, Lee and Charlotte placed below the national average and at or just above state figures. Many business executives are feeling more optimistic about 2014, expect continued economic recovery and have plans to hire. Economic development directors predict a continued drop in unemployment with the addition of new jobs created by existing businesses and 2013 start-ups.

Big momentum

As Hertz Corp. ramps up to bring 700 jobs to its new Estero headquarters by 2015, Wisconsin-based Alta Resources has added more than 300 full-time equivalent

Plan ahead for a successful filing of last year's taxes



Many think that tax planning for 2013 is not a possibility since the new year has begun. But that is far from the truth. Much work needs to be done in 2014 for accurate filing for 2013. Also, there are several tax-saving strategies that can be implemented in 2014 that will apply to 2013.

Retirement accounts

If you haven't already funded your retirement account for 2013, do so by April 15. (A Keogh or a SEP or an individual 401(k) allow filing extensions to Oct. 15, 2014.) The deadline for contributions to a traditional IRA, deductible or not, and to a Roth IRA is April 15, 2014. (For purposes of getting investment dollars to work sooner than later, you should not wait until the last day to legally fund; rather consider making 2014's contribution as soon as possible in 2014.)

To qualify for the full annual IRA deduction in 2013, you must either: not be eligible to participate in a company retirement plan, or if you are eligible, you must have adjusted gross income of \$59,000 or less for singles, or \$95,000 or less for married couples filing jointly. If you are not eligible for a company plan but your spouse is, your traditional IRA contribution is fully deductible as long

as your combined gross income does not exceed \$178,000. For 2013, the maximum IRA contribution you can make is \$5,500 (\$6,500 if you are age 50 or older by the end of the year). For self-employed persons, the maximum annual addition to SEPs and Keoghs for 2013 is \$51,000.

Remember, Roth contributions are not deductible, but all withdrawals from a Roth can be tax-free in retirement while withdrawals from a traditional IRA are fully taxable in retirement. In order to contribute to a Roth, your income as a single or married must be under certain threshold levels. (The tax-free status for Roth withdrawals is under current tax law — as there have been rumblings that the tax-free aspect should be rescinded for the very wealthy — so be aware. Roths might not remain sacrosanct.)

For those newly self-employed who have not started a retirement plan, they can avail themselves of Keogh and SEP plans for which contributions made in 2014 could apply to 2013. But to get a real bang for the buck, the self-employed need to consider the individual 401(k), which allows a very large amount of money to be put into a retirement plan and offers even larger amounts to those who are older and are in a catch-up mode.

Estimated payments

Second, make sure to make your estimated payments. According to IRS rules, you must pay 100 percent of last year's tax liability or 90 percent of this year's tax or you will owe an underpayment

penalty. If your adjusted gross income for 2012 was more than \$150,000, you have to pay more than 110 percent of your 2012 tax liability to be protected from a 2013 underpayment penalty. If you make an estimated payment by Jan. 15, though, you can erase any penalty for the fourth quarter, but you still will owe a penalty for earlier quarters if you did not send in any estimated payments back then. (Check with an accountant about circumstances in which a windfall was received after Aug. 31, 2013.)

Gather your papers

Start to collect all the information that you will need to file your taxes. For some that means tabulating medical expenses, donations, sales tax paid on purchases throughout the year, etc.

Figure out the home office

Consider taking a home office deduction if it applies. It has merits, but the downside is that it is often an IRS review trigger. It is a decision that you should make with a tax accountant's counsel.

Account for the kids

Make sure you claim your child as a dependent and make sure that if you are divorced that only one parent is claiming the same child. There is a "personal exemption of \$3,900 for each dependent and the \$1,000 child tax credit for each child younger than 17. The \$1,000 child tax credit begins to phase out at \$110,000 for married couples filing jointly and at \$75,000 for heads of households. If there

is a newly born child, make sure you get him or her a Social Security number.

Consult with the pros

Consider getting professional help sooner rather than later. Also, if your tax liability is large and complex, consider consulting with several tax professionals. Personal experience is that tax professionals with exactly the same information will make differing recommendations as to how the tax is to be reported and during what period. This might suggest that some are wrong and others are right. However, it also suggests that the tax code is sufficiently complex, and within complexities there is sometimes room for differing interpretations or approaches. And for those still in the Christmas spirit of giving, consider making a gift of a tax professional's time to family members or others; it might set them on a better path for their financial security and retirement planning.

This is not meant to be an exhaustive list of tax planning tasks, but rather to put tax planning on your radar screen as early as possible in 2014 and offer suggestions for minimizing taxes for historical 2013 and prospective 2014.

You should consult with a tax expert as to specifics that apply to you and interpretations of an ever-changing and complex tax code. ■



jobs since it announced last spring it had tapped Fort Myers for a Florida-based call center in the former Gartner building. The company provides customer care, sales, e-business and fulfillment outsourcing services to global Fortune 100 clients, serving “as a transparent extension of our clients,” says Paul Makurat, managing director of the Fort Myers office. Some of those positions require licensed sales agents in health-care insurance.

Alta’s three main client fields include entertainment and retail, consumer packaged goods and health care. “We launched the Fort Myers site with health care and health insurance programs and expect more diversity in 2014,” Mr. Makurat says.

Since the company’s phone banks went live Oct. 1, its 63,275-square-foot facility had reached half capacity by late December, with the ground level prepared for 2014.

“We invested millions to get this building up and running so we’re ready,” Mr. Makurat says. “Our company is experiencing tremendous growth.”

Alta didn’t have to advertise last year’s openings; media buzz generated by press releases announcing the addition of 300 openings with above-industry wages generated “an amazing outpouring of local support and interest in the community,” says Mr. Makurat. “We had 700 people come through looking for jobs and I was personally very satisfied with the caliber, qualifications and character of the employees.”

Spanish- and French-speaking employees are especially in demand. Retention — turnover is often high in the call center industry — is “very good right now. We don’t yet have a full quarter in but we’re better than average for the industry,” says Mr. Makurat. “If I do my job right and clients get the results they need, there’s no reason this location won’t have 600 employees by the end of 2014 or early 2015.”

Gartner, meanwhile, hired more than 100 associates in 2013, pushing its Fort Myers workforce to 600, according to Andrew Spencer, a spokesman for the information technology research and advisory company.

“As a growing company, we expect to hire a similar number of associates in 2014,” Mr. Spencer wrote in an email, noting the firm will recruit for sales, client service and finance positions.

Mr. Spencer says the company pays above the local average wage for the positions and offers a comprehensive benefits package.

Gartner’s new Fort Myers building in Gateway was designed as a purpose-built facility offering a modern working envi-

ronment, onsite cafeteria and multipurpose gym.

Larger companies such as Chico’s and Hertz help the local economic picture, says Brent Barkway, business development director with Lee County’s economic development office. But so do the medium-size businesses that continue to increase staffing by two to three new employees. “That seems to be a trend across the board,” he says.

Helping Collier County’s numbers was the hiring of 300 employees by Naples-based Arthrex, which produces more than 7,500 medical and surgical implements for orthopedic surgery. Many of the new hires were for the company’s new, almost 200,000-square-foot, \$25 million manufacturing plant in Ave Maria, paying an average salary of \$60,000 and offering jobs ranging from entry level to senior engineers.

In Charlotte County, Cheney Brothers’ new 250,000-square-foot food distribution center has brought construction jobs to the Punta Gorda airport park since February, says Thomas Patton, director of the county’s economic development office. “Construction will continue, and then beginning in March, the company will hire several hundred employees,” he says. “We’ve also just announced APG Avionics building new aircraft at the airport, which has 10 employees right now and shows great growth potential in the coming year.”

Construction, Mr. Patton says, has also returned full force in light of a 50 percent increase in the county’s new housing permits. “We’ve seen a tremendous amount of growth in the home construction trades and are anticipating more growth in the coming year as the building boom continues to start ramping up in Southwest Florida. We’re moving along.”

Most of those new construction jobs pay between \$15 to \$18 an hour — higher for skilled workers and slightly less for basic laborers, he says. APG’s annual wages are more than \$36,000, but also vary by skill.

Florida added 183,000 jobs between November 2012 and 2013, according to preliminary figures released by the Department of Economic Opportunity. The state’s unemployment rate was “a

little bit better than forecasted,” Rebecca Rust, the department’s chief economist, told local economic development directors during a Dec. 20 teleconference. “We had 2.5 percent job growth; 3.0 is considered normal.”

Florida still lags behind its lowest unemployment — 3.3 percent from January through August 2006, which was the lowest in 30 years — although it has gained back more than half of the 923,000 jobs lost. “We’re down 437,000 still so we’re halfway there,” Ms. Rust says. The state’s unemployment rate peaked at 11.4 percent from December 2009 through the following March.

Construction, which lost more jobs than any other industry — 53 percent of its workers — continues a solid rebound.

The most recent quarterly survey of local executives by the Regional Economic Research Institute, a partnership between Florida Gulf Coast University’s Lutgert School of Business, the Horizon Council, county economic development offices and the Southwest Florida Regional Planning Council, shows businesses are optimistic the economy is improving and expect the uptick to continue through 2014.

Forty-five percent of the 84 executives responding to the survey indicated they’d increased employment during the last year; nine percent had reduced employment. More than half planned to hire in 2014.

Industry diversity needed

Many of the area’s new jobs in the latter part of 2013 were holiday- and tourism-related, paying \$9 to \$12 with no real job security once visitors leave in April.

“What we hear from employers is this season is going to be good,” says Mr. Wall. “This year employers were hiring sooner than they had in the past. A new trend we’re seeing this year because unemployment is dipping and the labor pool is shrinking is that if companies that hire seasonally find someone they like, they’re using season as screening for full-time employment.”

Ultimately, the key to continue job growth is landing the Hertz and Altas that bring full-time, year-round positions and finding a niche for a third year-round industry. Local and state incentives will continue to help lure new businesses, says Gary Jackson, Ph.D., an assistant professor of economics at FGCU.

Regional collaboration

Erasing county boundaries and working as a region to attract that key third industry is pivotal, according to local officials.

Mr. Jackson says the new WorkForce Now project, designed to foster partnerships between businesses and the counties’ schools, will help prevent brain drain — graduates going elsewhere to work. “We need to help students and parents understand the opportunities available in the area, create apprenticeships.”

Creating stronger bonds between education and business to fill in the gaps is apparently a move in the right direction: The renowned Aspen Institute recently announced a similar \$250 million program, of which the local RERI could eventually benefit.

“We have some prospects in the hopper, some we’re waiting for announcements,” says Bruce Register, director of the year-old Collier County Economic Development Office. “We’re getting ourselves in position to be more competitive in the long-run and now have a business plan, new incentives and partnerships at a regional level.”

Those partnerships include proven national private-public initiatives.

“We have prepared ourselves in 2014 to capture that enhanced demand at the national level,” Mr. Register says. “We’re very bullish about Collier County.”

“A regional effort is really important,” adds Mr. Barkway. “Companies don’t care about county boundaries. The regional effort is just getting started and we will work in collaboration as projects come along. Hertz was so important to Lee County. I think with all the attention it has gotten recently, it has led to us getting looks from some companies that may not otherwise have looked.” ■

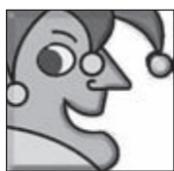

Your Stock's True Value Matters

"Value investing" is one of the most respected strategies around, employed by Warren Buffett and others. It involves buying securities for less than they're really worth and holding them as they appreciate.

In other words, it's all about finding bargains. Value investors are on the hunt for a dollar selling for 50 cents. Stocks that have fallen significantly naturally attract their attention, but they also need to keep in mind the need for a margin of safety.

It's easy to think that when a stock price gets very low, it surely can't go any lower. That's wrong, though, and can lead to a lot of financial pain. After all, until a stock price has reached zero, it can always go lower.

Understand that a stock's current price in the market and its intrinsic value are two different numbers. You'll rarely buy a stock at its bottom, but as long as you build in a satisfactory margin of safety, by buying at a price considerably lower than the stock's intrinsic value, then you'll likely do well. Intelligently assessing a company's intrinsic value is difficult, though,

so it's smart to aim for greater margins of safety to compensate for the uncertainty.

How do you maximize your margin of safety? For starters, avoid messy balance sheets. Leave companies with lots of debt to more sophisticated investors.

Next, look at well-known, established companies selling cheaply because of temporary problems. For example, when the housing market slumps, so do stocks of home-improvement retailers. A fast-growing company might see its stock drop if quarterly earnings are lower than expected due to its investing heavily in its future.

Once you find a great business selling at a good price with a satisfactory margin of safety, don't panic if the stock price drops after you buy. Fluctuations are normal and don't change the company's intrinsic value. Have patience and conviction in your analysis.

My Dumbest Investment

A Bad Play

One of my dumbest investments was buying a penny stock for fractions of a cent per share, investing \$600. It immediately plummeted to zero. It was a speculative play, and I ended up with a 100 percent loss.

— B.W., New Hope, Pa.

The Fool Responds: Lots of people lose lots of money on penny stocks. They get excited by the thought of owning thousands of shares for just hundreds of dollars. They don't realize, though, that while a stock that costs, say, 6 cents per share might seem insanely cheap, it can still fall to 3 cents per share or lower, and there's even a good chance that it will.

Penny stocks are often small, unproven companies with more promise than performance. They're sometimes touted by hypesters via "pump and dump" schemes, where the hypesters buy shares, talk the stock up, and then sell for a profit as the stock crashes. Stick with healthy, growing companies — ideally, profitable ones. Speculation is dangerous. Try not to think of investments as "plays," either, as it's your precious, hard-earned money you're trying to grow. ■


A First, understand that industries vary in their complexities, so some will be easier to understand (retailing, consumer products) than others (biotechnology, financial services). You'll learn the most by reading broadly. Read many full annual reports of companies in the industry, including the comprehensive 10-K reports that detail each company's successes, challenges and plans. Don't worry if you don't immediately understand it all — many concepts will sink in over time.

Your brokerage may have Wall Street analyst reports available for companies of interest, and you'll likely find articles at Fool.com and elsewhere on companies you're researching, too. If you're serious about maximizing your investing skill, consider learning more about accounting, as that will help you make sense of financial statements, which is critical. ■

Black Gold for Your Portfolio

Does one of the largest companies in the world belong in your portfolio? Consider ExxonMobil (NYSE: XOM), with a recent market value topping \$400 billion.

ExxonMobil hasn't been happy to see oil prices stagnate and even head lower recently. And it has not been ideally positioned, either, getting most of its production internationally while U.S. oil and gas production has skyrocketed.

Still, don't count this longtime powerhouse out. ExxonMobil has remained an integrated oil company, so its refineries will be able to take advantage of growing spreads between domestic and foreign crude prices. It has also been investing large sums in big development projects

that are likely to be productive for many years. It has become a bigger player in natural gas, but hasn't invested heavily in renewable energies.

In its third quarter, ExxonMobil's revenue dipped 2.4 percent from year-ago levels and earnings dropped 18 percent. But gains in oil and natural-gas production reversed falling production levels from earlier in the year. It returned \$5.8 billion to shareholders through a combination of share buybacks and dividend payments.

ExxonMobil recently yielded 2.6 percent, and it has been hiking its dividend by an annual average of 10 percent over the past five years. It offers great global diversification, too, with refineries in 32 nations. ■

Theatergoers — and classic movie buffs as well — will instantly recognize this pair as the stars of “Arsenic and Old Lace.” The sweet, murderous sisters hit the stage once more when Florida Repertory Theatre stages the classic Jan. 10-29 (previews Jan. 7-9).

“One of the things that’s funny about the play is that they really do commit these crimes out of a sense of civic duty,” says director Dennis Lee Delaney. “They see lonely old men who have no families and nothing to live for, and in their minds, they’re doing a service by very peacefully putting them out of their misery, having a religious service, burying them in the basement and solving all their earthly problems.

They’re doing this as one of their public services. They’re doing it out of compassion for these old men.”

Written by Joseph Kesselring in 1939, the play ran on Broadway for 1,444 performances from January 1941 through June 1944. Frank Capra made it into a movie starring Cary Grant in 1944.

“I’ve been an enormous fan of this play since a kid, seeing the Frank Capra movie version,” Mr. Delaney says. “Once I got into professional theater, I thought, ‘Boy, one day I’d like to direct this play.’ I’ve been thinking of it for 20 years.”

Then, this past summer, Mr. Delaney was offered the opportunity to do a summer stock production of the show for the Monomoy Theatre in Cape Cod, Mass. The theater is affiliated with Ohio University, where Mr. Delaney teaches in the MFA program.

A month after, Robert Cacioppo, producing artistic director at Florida Rep,

called him up and asked if he wanted to direct the show in Fort Myers.

“So after 20, 25 years of wanting to do it, I now get to direct it twice in six months,” Mr. Delaney says.

“Arsenic and Old Lace” is the perfect template for comic thrillers, he says, adding the comedy in this case is black comedy. “I love thrillers and I love comedies, and here I get the best of both worlds in one play.”

It’s the rare play that can combine scintillating comic characterization and goose-bump-inducing thrills, he adds. “In 1941, no one had ever really perfected that combination. Here we have a play that does it very, very well. It became the basis of a lot of other comic thrillers. It set the gold standard back in 1941.”

The playwright originally wrote “Arsenic and Old Lace” as a drama, but the original Broadway producers, Howard Lindsay and Russel Crouse, convinced him to rewrite it.

“They were famous play doctors,” Mr. Delaney says of the producers. “A little bit of legend is that they completely rewrote the play,” he adds. “Nobody really knows if Kesselring wrote a word of this play (as it appears now).”

Enjoying a revival

Where some productions of the play go wrong, the director feels, is by putting too much emphasis on the comedy.

“They miss the thriller part,” he says. “It’s easy to go over the top with the comedy of the show and go into Carol Burnett Land, sketch comedy characterization. I think that’s a mistake.”

Part of the play should feel like “a scary Halloween night,” he believes.

“Arsenic and Old Lace” interweaves the two genres of comedy and thriller throughout the course of the play, he says. “That’s what to me is original and successful about this play. That’s why I think we’re still doing it 75 years later.”

“Arsenic and Old Lace” has been experiencing a revival lately, with professional productions staged in Minneapolis, Dallas and Baltimore, among other cities.

The fact that it’s three acts long shouldn’t deter people, Mr. Delaney says. “It’s not that long a play. The second two acts are not as long as the first. It wraps up pretty quickly.

“Some plays from the ’30s and ’40s really are quite long and test the audience’s patience,” Mr. Delaney admits. “But this isn’t one of them.”

Like many plays, “Arsenic and Old Lace” works on different levels.

“It has levels of romance,” Mr. Delaney says, pointing out that the sisters’ nephew, Mortimer, proposes marriage to his girlfriend Elaine within the first 20 minutes of the play. But then, when he realizes how crazy his family is and

questions his own sanity, “He goes from kissing her and saying, ‘Will you marry me?’ ‘Let’s get married right now’ to, ‘Elaine, you have to go home. We can’t get married.’ So there’s kooky screwball romance in it as well.”

Then there are characters such as Teddy, who thinks he’s Teddy Roosevelt. But he’s also aware he’s living through the timeline of Mr. Roosevelt’s life and says things such as, “But we haven’t built the Panama Canal yet.”

A new ‘old chestnut’

The Florida Rep production is a totally new show from the one Mr. Delaney directed over the summer, he says. “It’s a different cast, a different theater, different designers. It’s not going to be the same. What’s fun is seeing what different actors bring to the rehearsal process ... They bring their own talents and insights into this production.”

For Florida Rep, Carrie Lund and Viki Boyle play sisters Martha and Abby. Company comedic favorite Mark Chambers plays Teddy. Michael Satow (Max in the theater’s “Lend Me a Tenor”) plays Mortimer, and Peter Thomasson plays Jonathan, a killer whose botched plastic surgery has left him looking like Boris Karloff, the horror film actor.

In what Mr. Delaney calls “an inspired piece of casting,” the original Broadway production of the play cast the real Boris Karloff in the role. “The joke of having the real Boris Karloff on stage bought the house down every night,” he says.

In fact, Mr. Karloff was so popular in the role that he was unable to be in the movie version, as he was still playing the role on Broadway.

“I think one of the things audiences will enjoy about this production is the music,” Mr. Delaney says. “I have a lot of really fun music I’m using to underscore scenes and segue between scenes. To me, the music is as important in a production like this as the set or the costume or the lights. It plays another character in the production to help underline tone. It underlines the mood of the play, underlines character ... It really helps deliver not just the comedy, but also the thriller aspect.”

Mr. Delaney is confident that audiences will warm to this old chestnut.

“I love the old plays,” he says.

“A great play is a great play. They bear repeating.” ■

'American Hustle'

Is it worth \$10? Yes

"American Hustle" is a great time at the movies.

Everything about it is fun: The con artist story, the characters, the late '70s makeup, hair, costumes and production design, the soundtrack, the brisk editing, the wonderful script and, best of all, the great performances.

It's hilarious, dramatic, suspenseful and sexy — and perfectly so in each regard. This is the kind of deliciously cinematic experience true movie lovers crave.

Christian Bale stars as con man Irving Rosenfeld, a seasoned pro who keeps a low profile and never gets too greedy. He's fine working on his own, but after meeting and falling for the sultry Sydney Prosser (Amy Adams), he's happy to make it a two-person operation.

All is fine until FBI agent Richie DiMaso (Bradley Cooper) arrests Sydney, which forces Irving and Sydney to work with Richie in sting operations.

Richie, it should be known, is an overzealous fool who has no idea what he's doing as a fake con man. One would suppose he'd listen to Irving in these situations, but Richie refuses to empower Irving in any way. On a small scale this is not a problem, but when Richie attempts to go after a New Jersey mayor (Jeremy Renner) and other bigwigs, various complications ensue. Through it all the omnipresent wild card is Irving's wife Rosalyn (Jennifer Lawrence), whom he met long before Sydney and is now stuck with her whether he likes it or not.

Co-written by Eric Singer and David O. Russell ("Three Kings"), the frequent twists and turns of the plot are expected and logical, all building to a smart, plausible finale that is wonderfully satisfying.

And it's funny, delivering humor early, often and unexpectedly. Two small examples: The time period of the late '70s finds Rosalyn unsure how to work the new invention called a microwave, and Louis C.K., as Richie's encumbered boss, tells an ice fishing story with an ending you'll want to hear over and over.

The film will likely earn Oscar nods for best picture, screenplay, director, production design, costume design and makeup, as well as for at least two of its performances. Mr. Bale, who won an Oscar for Mr. Russell's "The Fighter"

(2010), gained more than 40 pounds for the role and shaved the top of his head while growing out the sides, thereby allowing the comb-over to feel authentic. It's a lived-in performance that hits every note. Seductive and beautiful, Ms. Adams is utterly convincing in every scene, while Ms. Lawrence, fresh off her Oscar for "Silver Linings Playbook," is in line for supporting actress for her loose-cannon turn as the crazy but beautiful estranged wife.

As for Mr. Cooper, who's the least talented of the four but certainly holds his own, he refused to get a perm but did come in two hours early every day to curl his hair. The Academy loves him, so don't be surprised if his name pops up in a relatively weak supporting actor category on nomination day.



Mr. Russell, who also directs, keeps the camera moving and vibrant, and he isn't afraid to inject a bit of symbolism wherever needed: Note the opening shot of Irving in a mirror, suggesting a duplicity to him regarding which side of the law he's truly on. It's always a treat to watch him toe the line on both sides, all the while knowing he's going to do whatever's best for him, morality be damned. Irving's journey — and all the wit, humor and suspense therein — is an absolute delight to watch, as is all of "American Hustle." This is one of the best — if not the best — films of the year. ■

It was a year that didn't start well and had a disappointing summer, lowlighted by the mind-numbing blur that was the last 30 minutes of "Man of Steel." And yet, 2013 ended up being a pretty darn good year at the movies overall, thanks in large part to films that pushed barriers, dared to be different and "wowed" us at times when we expected anything but.

Here are my picks for the 10 best films of 2013.

■ No. 10: "Rush"

Movies are often an escapist entertainment, but that doesn't mean we don't want them to feel honest. One of the best things about Ron Howard's film was the bitter hatred that fueled Formula One drivers Niki Lauda (Daniel Bruhl) and James Hunt (Chris Hemsworth, aka Thor) during their 1976 season. Highlighted by an Oscar-worthy performance from Mr. Bruhl, Mr. Howard never sugarcoats the fact that these two guys want to beat one another more than they want to win for themselves. ■ No. 9: "Fruitvale Station"

in 2008. After multiple arrests in the years prior, Oscar vows to be a better father, son and boyfriend, but a late-night altercation with Bay Area police officers finds him unjustly killed. It's a sad story very well acted by Michael B. Jordan as Oscar, and I daresay it's still a socially relevant story as well. Available on home video Jan. 14.

■ No. 8: "Frozen"

Disney Animation ("Tangled") has done it again with this gorgeous musical. It's a simple story of innocent sister Anna chasing her cursed sister Elsa into the mountains after Elsa freezes their kingdom in ice. The songs, highlighted by Idina Menzel's rousing rendition of Elsa's "Let It Go," are all showstoppers, and the story is funny and sweet in all the right ways. In theaters now.

■ No 7: "Spring Breakers"

Coming-of-age stories tend to conclude with a teenager figuring out who he or she is and finishing the film with a bright, satisfying smile. Although it has those elements, "Spring Breakers" also dares to suggest that sometimes finding oneself leads to answers society won't like. Add to this various teenage debaucheries, graphic nudity and an Oscar-worthy James Franco as a rapper/

Writer/director Spike Jonze's ("Adaptation") latest meta-existential project stars Joaquin Phoenix as a loner named Theodore in a futuristic Los Angeles. His life takes an intriguing turn when he falls in love with his computer operating system (voiced by Scarlett Johansson) and believes they have a real relationship. Does he? One of the best things about the film is that prompts us to wonder what the future holds for relationships, what qualifies as a real relationship and whether a physical presence is needed for someone to be truly special to you. One of the smartest and most thoughtful films you'll see, it's in limited release now and expands nationwide Jan. 10.

■ No. 5: "The Spectacular Now"

Rarely do teen coming-of-age stories feel this authentic, genuine and true. Shailene Woodley's Aimee is pretty but doesn't know it, a high school outcast with a bright future. Miles Teller's Sut-

ton is the popular guy everyone likes, but is headed nowhere. They date, but reality hits and yields some surprising and not-so surprising revelations. Any movie that so faithfully and earnestly recalls the angst of teenage emotion is a must-see for me, and this film did it better than any in recent memory. Available on home video Jan. 14.

■ No. 4: "Star Trek Into Darkness"

I find it stunning how director J.J. Abrams is taking the original "Star Trek" canon and incorporating it into his new vision for the franchise. Yes, it was ridiculous to try to keep the identity of the villain a secret for so long, but the anticipation for the film itself was well worth the wait, as this was easily the best film of the summer. For the great visuals, action and story, J.J. Abrams, I salute you. Available on home video.

■ No. 3: "Gravity"

It might lack a deep emotional story, but this work of art is the most technically ambitious and beautifully ren-

dered film I've seen in a long, long time. With its breathtaking visuals of Sandra Bullock's and George Clooney's astronaut characters floating adrift in outer space, director Alfonso Cuarón has rightfully asserted himself as a legit Oscar contender. If you haven't seen this yet, you should do so ASAP — and in 3D on the biggest screen possible. Your eyes will thank you for it. In theaters now.

■ No. 2: "American Hustle"

You know those movies that are so much fun you want more of everything they have to offer? This is one of them. Starring Christian Bale, Amy Adams, Bradley Cooper and Jennifer Lawrence, director David O. Russell's ("Silver Linings Playbook") latest is a perfectly written, acted and directed period piece of the late '70s that oozes style and charisma. It's funny, suspenseful and charming — the type of story that movie lovers crave and don't get nearly enough

of. In theaters now.

■ No. 1: "12 Years A Slave"

The emotional impact of "12 Years A Slave" is unlike any I've felt since "Schindler's List" (1993). Slavery in the United States has never before been this exposed, this downright sickening in terms of the harsh brutality that many African-Americans endured. The story follows a free Northerner named Solomon Northup (Chiwetel Ejiofor) as he's kidnapped and sold into slavery. Director Steve McQueen gets great performances out of every member of his cast, and the result is a film that will leave you infuriated at the injustice that was once commonplace in the country we call home. Powerful, riveting and wonderfully acted, "12 Years A Slave" is in theaters now.

Honorable mentions

Here are some films that, while wonderful in their own way, just missed that special something to crack the Top 10:

The Muslim American experience was given a thought-provoking twist in "The Reluctant Fundamentalist"; the awkward insecurity of youth was wonderfully brought to bear in "The Way Way Back"; Hugh Jackman gave a strong dramatic performance in "Prisoners"; and Tom Hanks will likely earn his sixth Oscar nomination for "Captain Phillips."

Speaking of Oscar noms, expect to see Matthew McConaughey and Jared Leto on the list for their great turns in "Dallas Buyers Club."

Also, "The Best Man Holiday" perfectly mixed humor, pathos, holiday sentiment and the value of friendship; and Martin Scorsese's "The Wolf of Wall Street" is equal parts bawdy, ribald and absurd, all in a good way. ■

FLORIDA WRITERS

From Tampa to Siberia and back to solve a murder mystery



■ **"The Veiled Lagoon" by Henry Hoffman.** Martin Sisters Publishing. 214 pages. Trade paper \$15.95.

In Henry Hoffman's second "Adam Fraley Mystery" and his fifth novel overall, the case Adam investigates comes about in an unusual way.

A man named Charlton Quigley contacts him because is suspicious of the newspaper report about a young woman's accidental death. Quigley's acquaintance with the late Vickie Murin stems from the fact that she was the waitress at a coffee shop he frequented.

During their many conversations, Quigley had developed a sense of Vickie's character and circumstances that led him to mistrust the reported facts. He is willing to pay Adam, whose ad Quigley found at the back of his church's newsletter, to look into the matter.

Oh, by the way: Vickie's husband is a detective in the sheriff's office, a man who seems to have gotten over his loss a bit

too quickly. Since the novel begins with a scene describing the murder, that is not the mystery. Rather, as in the classic Columbo television series, the steps by which the criminal is brought to justice are the building blocks of suspense. The obligatory battle of wits between detective and perpetrator could loom larger in Mr. Hoffman's novel, but there is plenty to hold the reader's attention.

First and foremost is the introduction of a new character (let's hope as a series regular). Tamra, whom Adam hires as a secretary and assistant (officially "office manager"), is a real treat for the reader. Her "bright steely demeanor," her "discerning green eyes," her dark red hair and her abundance of the critical ingredient called "moxie" add a force to the novel that makes this reader miss her when reading scenes from which she is absent. Tamra's intelligence, eagerness to learn and desire for adventure all combine to make her a supercharged Della Street.

There are signs of possible romance in the office, though Adam is still dazzled somewhat by his college mentor, a woman who is at least as fascinating as Tamra.

A series of chapters set in Siberia introduce us to fascinating natural and cultural landscapes. Why does Henry Hoffman take us there? When Adam discovers that Detective Murin is a fairly recent immigrant from Russia who has a childhood sweetheart, Alina, living in a Siberian

town, he arranges a trip to deepen his understanding of his suspect's background. Murin seems interested in bringing this woman back into his life — a motive for murdering Vickie.


Adam breaks into Alina's home and finds a piece of potentially important evidence.

The competent guide whom Adam finds to assist him in Siberia is another fine character, but perhaps the two of them talk a bit too much about matters that take us far beyond the needs of the plot.

Getting Adam away from the novel's principal setting in the Tampa Bay area allows for scenes in which Tamra is left without her boss's guidance. These include scenes in which Murin attempts to romance her while simultaneously trying to find out what she's up to. The detective is leery of an attractive woman who shows up at his favorite haunt and works for a private investigator. Should he threaten or flatter? Is Tamra in danger?

It would seem so, as she feels a strong attraction for Murin — even though she realizes he is a dangerous man and possibly a murderer. She's caught up in the attraction while testing her own skills and powers.

How the evidentiary case against the well-regarded detective comes into focus is something, dear reader, you will have to find out for yourself. Find out, as well, how Adam Fraley happened to get stuck in a Siberian chimney and how he extricated himself.




More about the author

In the late '60s, just out of college, Mr. Hoffman was the wire editor for the *Emporia Gazette*, a Kansas newspaper that was purchased and brought to national prominence by William Allen White, a giant in the history of newspaper journalism and publishing. Mr. Hoffman also did some sports writing and other jobs at the paper.

He later switched to a career in library science and headed the Fort Myers-Lee County Public Library (the branch, not the system) from 1982 to 1998.

Mr. Hoffman's earlier titles are "Bound," "Drums along the Jacks Fork" and "Flaherty's Run." His first Adam Fraley novel, "Bridge to Oblivion," was awarded Gold Medal (first place) for Florida Fiction by the Florida Publishers Association. 

KOVEL: ANTIQUES

Search high and low for collectible weathervanes

BY TERRY KOVEL

If you can't afford a rooster or running deer weathervane, or any other 19th-century weathervane made by an important company, you might be able to find a homemade example. Most folk-art collectors consider all weathervanes, commercially made or homemade, to be folk art. Prices are highest for the most elaborate 3-D vanes by known makers. Homemade vanes often are cut from sheets of iron to look like silhouettes of deer, men, animals, birds, cars, trains, Indians, flags or occupational examples, such as a photographer with a camera or a sailor with a telescope. It is difficult to date a homemade weathervane. Collectors pay the highest auction prices for good design, unusual subjects, good paint and old patina. Bullet holes, missing paint and dents don't seem to lower the value if the cutout is unusual, perhaps a 1930s car or a large and artistic whale. Some homemade vanes sell for thousands of dollars, but others might turn up at your local yard sale or flea market. Whirligig weathervanes, often of wood, also are going up in price. Horses, roosters and eagles are the most popular shapes today and, unfortunately, often are the most reproduced. Always look in the backyard, in the garage and up at the roof when going to an estate or house sale. Buyers often overlook outdoor folk art.

Q: Years ago, I was given a very heavy glass vase. It's 6 inches high by 4½ inches wide and is made of black cased glass

within clear glass. The etched mark on the bottom is "Kosta 1556/046." I'm wondering what the vase is worth.

A: The Kosta glassworks factory in Sweden dates back to 1742. Its name is a combination of the last names of the two founders, Koskull and Stael. Kosta manufactured only window glass, glass for light fixtures and drinking glasses until the late 1890s, when it hired its own designers and started making art glass. Glass artist Vicke Lindstrand (1904-1983), who had previously worked at Orrefors, was Kosta's artistic director from 1950 to 1973. During Lindstrand's tenure, model

numbers starting with a "1" were "production vases" made in large quantities. The number 1556 on your vase probably is the model number. Kosta merged with Boda and Afors in 1976 and became Kosta Boda, so it's likely your vase was made before 1976. In 1989, Kosta Boda merged with Orrefors and was renamed Orrefors Kosta Boda. Then, in 2005, the company was sold to the New Wave Group, which closed the Orrefors factory and today uses only the Kosta Boda label. While your vase may not be rare or extremely valuable, it still is a good piece of Swedish art glass.

Q: Could you tell me the value of a set of dining-room furniture made by American of Martinsville? The walnut set, which was purchased new in 1942, includes a table, six chairs, sideboard, china cabinet and hutch.

A: American of Martinsville was founded in 1906 in Martinsville, Va. It made only bedroom sets until the 1920s, when it introduced dining-room sets. The most valuable American of Martinsville vintage dining room sets today are in the Danish Modern style, which didn't become popular in the United States until the 1950s. Still, if your set is in good shape, you could sell it locally (so shipping costs aren't involved) for several hundred dollars.

Q: We are looking for information about an item that's hanging on a wall in a restaurant in Doon, Iowa. It's a semi-circular piece of wood about 48 inches long. The ends are 24 inches apart. It's

marked "Louden's Patent, Oct. 30, 1895." It looks old. What is it and what was it used for?

A: It's a singletree, which also is often called a "whiffletree" or "whipple-tree." It was used to hitch the traces of a horse's harness to a plow or other implement. William Loudon (1841-1931) held several patents for improvements to farm equipment. He invented a hay carrier in 1867 and founded Loudon Manufacturing Works in Fairfield, Iowa, a year later to manufacture hay carriers and other farm equipment. From 1906 to 1939, the company, by then named Loudon Machinery Co., also designed barns. Loudon Machinery Co. was sold in 1956 and its farm equipment was not made after 1965. Singletrees don't show up for sale very often. When they do, they usually sell for under \$50.

Tip: Look carefully at a piece of cut glass before you buy it. Edges should not be ground down into the pattern, and pieces should have no chips or other damage. ■

Here's to drinking well, but frugally, in the New Year

So you promised yourself you would not overspend this holiday season, but somehow things didn't work out quite as you planned.

As a result, perhaps one of your New Year's resolutions is to rein in your spending. I certainly hope you aren't considering cutting out wine in the process because you think you have to spend too much money to enjoy good wine. It simply isn't necessary to pay a lot to find highly drinkable wines.

So, in an effort to help you exercise fiscal responsibility without sacrificing gustatory pleasure, here are some value-priced wines that deliver on taste.

■ **Borsao Tres Picos Garnacha 2010 (\$18):** This full-bodied Spanish red starts off with aromas of ripe berry fruit and spice, and shows raspberry and blackberry flavors with good tannins and minerals on the longish finish.

■ **Bouchard Finlayson Crocodile's Lair Kaaimansgat Chardonnay 2012 (\$20):** Refreshingly crisp and medium bodied with peach and tropical aromas and flavors, joined on the palate with apple and ending with a balanced clean finish.

■ **Charles Smith Kung Fu Girl Evergreen Vineyard Washington 2012 (\$13):** Don't let the price, label or name put you off, as this riesling wine made the Wine Spectator Top 100 Wines (no. 51) in 2013.

Light and fruity with just a hint of sweetness, balanced by healthy acidity. Citrus and white peach flavors, clean minerality and a balanced acid finish.

■ **Chateau Ste. Michelle Horse Heaven Vineyard Sauvignon Blanc 2012 (\$16):** Crisp and clean with good body and balance, this single-vineyard release opens with floral and fresh pear notes that persist through to the spicy, long finish. Another great value from Washington.

■ **Cline Ancient Vines Zinfandel 2012 (\$15):** Rich aromas of strawberry with spice and chocolate flavors. Good fruit and spice flavors end with a long finish. Distinct complexity comes from the older vines used in this wine.

■ **D'Arenberg Stump Jump McLaren Vale 2011 (\$14):** Dark fruits and plums merge with blueberry and spice on the palate in this grenache-shiraz-mourvedre blend from Australia. It's well balanced with a mineral and tannin structure and a nice finish.

■ **Fontana Candida Frascati 2012 (\$12):** A blend of malvasia and trebbiano grapes, this light wine opens with apple and floral notes, with soft fruity flavors of pear and citrus and a clean finish.

■ **Hugel Gentil Alsace 2011 (\$14):** Pale lemon in color and with peach, apricot and rose aroma and a refreshing flavor of mixed stone fruit and citrus, this blend of six grapes gives a soft mouth feel and smooth finish with a touch of fruit and spice at the end.

■ **Kendall Jackson Vintners Reserve Chardonnay 2012 (\$15):** This ubiquitous chardonnay continues to bring value and quality after 20 years on the market.

Tropical notes of papaya and mango mingle with aromas of honey and vanilla. A touch of toasted oak adds depth to the long finish.

■ **La Crema Chardonnay Sonoma Coast 2012 (\$17):** Bright gold color with orchard fruits and citrus on the nose, followed by lemon and spice in a buttery flavor. Rich tropical tones merge into a sustained fresh finish.

■ **Meiomi Pinot Noir 2011 (\$19):** Rich dark color with cherry and raspberry on the nose, merging with wild berry and spice on the palate and finishing with vanilla and spice on the long finish.

■ **Mulderbosch Cabernet Sauvignon Rose Coastal Region 2012 (\$13):** This value

wine from South Africa is a delicious rose made from cabernet sauvignon grapes aged in stainless steel. Fresh berry aromas and flavors mixed with floral notes with a bit of sweet fruit on the finish.

■ **Paul Blanck Riesling Classique Alsace 2012 (\$20):** This family-run winery has produced excellent wines ever since it was founded in 1610 and now uses screw caps exclusively in order to maintain freshness and fruit flavors. On the dry side, this light yellow wine has a floral and mineral aroma, followed in the mouth with pear, lemon and pineapple, and ending with a balanced mineral finish.

■ **Pine Ridge Chenin Blanc + Viognier California 2012 (\$12):** This interesting off-dry light white blend opens with floral and fruit notes of apple and honeydew that lead into crisp pear, pineapple and grapefruit flavors that continue onto the clean finish.

■ **Qupe Central Coast Syrah 2011 (\$20):** Dark red cherries and floral notes merge with plums in this medium-bodied red. Complex flavors from the multiple vineyards blend into a long smooth finish.

■ **Santa Rita Reserva Sauvignon Blanc 2011, Casablanca Valley, Chile (\$12):** This wine has a straw yellow color and distinct citrus and herbal aroma and flavors. Crisp acidity frames the clean finish.

■ **Seghesio Family Vineyards Zinfandel 2011 (\$20):** Black cherry and blackberry fruit aromas and flavors mix with wild berry and mineral on the palate, ending with a structured tannins on the finish. ■

When a restaurant includes the word steakhouse in its name, there are a couple of assumptions it's safe to make: One, it's going to be costly. And two, your steak will come with — well, steak.

That there are so many of them in the area is an indication that people don't mind dropping \$40-plus for a slab of meat then paying extra for potatoes, salads and anything else they order.

But there's at least one spot that breaks away from the herd.

Situated in front of the Ramada Inn on U.S. 41, Pate's specializes in steaks, prime rib and seafood — minus the tony atmosphere, valet parking and other accoutrements that beef up the bill.

While you won't find Black Angus beef or dry-aged prime ribs at these prices, Pate's definitely delivers value for the money. A particularly good value is the Wine and Dine special, served from 5 to 7 nightly, which includes a choice of 10 entrees accompanied by salad or soup and a choice of starch or vegetable medley plus a bottle of house wine (chardonnay, cabernet or white zin) for \$16.99 per person. We ordered from the regular menu, but because we happened to pick entrees that were on the Wine and Dine menu, our accommodating server not only charged us the lower prices (saving us \$11), but also gave us the bottle of wine, which we took home.

Pate's is a casual place, one in which you don't have to dress up to have a good meal and receive a warm welcome. There were plenty of patrons in jeans and other casual wear in both the dining room and at the well-populated bar.

The dining room might be cavernous were it not divided up by partial walls that create cozier spaces. The walls are a somewhat distressed mustard yellow and appear to have faded or cracked, revealing faux brick beneath. Subdued lighting gives the old-school setting a soothing feel.

As we arrived somewhat early, it was still happy hour, meaning that all beverages were half-price, making my Ketel One vodka martini (\$5.75) and my companion's glass of Peter Lehmann

sauvignon blanc (\$5.50) great bargains.

There aren't any culinary surprises on the Pate's menu. Just like the ambience, the menu is comfortable and comforting, a mix of familiar offerings with a whiff of New England to them, including Cape Cod clam chowder, Nantucket cod Provencal and baked Chatham haddock.

Besides steaks, Pate's also prides itself on its prime ribs and seafood. Appetizers lean heavily toward the latter. We tried crab cakes (\$7.99), which were described as lump crab, Maryland style, and the oysters Rockefeller (\$12.99).

The crab cake was disappointing; while the crab flavor was there, the crabmeat mashed up with breadcrumbs made for a gummy consistency. The zesty remoulade helped a little, but I'd skip this dish on a return visit.

The oysters, on the other hand, were

very good, if not strictly authentic — plump and tender topped with a generous amount of spinach, Béarnaise sauce and enough Pernod to be noticeable without overpowering.

Salads, which come with all entrees, contained a fresh and colorful mix of lettuces, red onion and carrots. Dressings — balsamic vinaigrette and blue cheese — were served on the side and were good.

As I mentioned previously, prime rib is a house specialty and comes in three cuts: 16 ounces for \$41, 12 ounces for \$32 and 8 ounces for \$23 (although the small cut is also available on the Wine and Dine menu for an economical \$16.99). I chose the smallest one, called the Prince cut, which proved to be plenty. The meat was well seasoned, moist and tender. A baked potato (other choices include garlic mashed potatoes, french fries or vegetable medley) was fine.

For my companion, who wanted something relatively uncomplicated, the baked Chatham haddock (\$21.95) was just right, prepared with a simple topping of breadcrumbs, butter, white wine and lemon. The fish was flaky, its delicate flavor enhanced by the seasonings. The garlic mashed potatoes he chose as a side dish had just a faint garlic flavor but were otherwise all right.

In keeping with its old-fashioned ways, Pate's offers tableside bananas Foster or cherries jubilee (\$12.99). We chose the classic banana dessert,

and it wasn't long before the manager wheeled the cart over to our table and whipped up the requisite mix of butter, brown sugar, rum and cinnamon, set it aflame, bathed the bananas and poured it all over vanilla ice cream. The very hot sauce quickly melted the ice cream, leaving us to conclude that the sauce should be allowed to cool a bit before being served. It was, nonetheless, a pleasant show, and a few spoonfuls of the sweet concoction were plenty after a large meal.

Our server was busy but attentive throughout our meal. Courses were served and cleared in a timely manner, without making us feel rushed. She checked to make sure everything was to our liking, and kept an eye on us without being intrusive.

Parties at nearby tables received similar treatment; from the conversations I overheard, it was apparent that several customers were regulars.

Plenty of restaurants around town offer a hipper atmosphere and more cutting-edge food. But for a casual, relaxing dinner that won't give you indigestion when the bill arrives, Pate's is a prime choice. ■
