We're all haunted by our own ghosts now and then even if they're just the thoughts and impressions of people we knew, flickering across the silver screens of our imaginations. For some,



Come Nov. 9: Seven things to know



Let me run through the main points you should consider if you intend to carry on in relative peace-of-mind or piece-of-mind, either one, come Nov. 9.

FIRST: The sun will rise at 6:35 a.m. in Miami — but not in New York City. There, it will rise at 6:36 a.m., one minute later. The Yankees can sleep in.

In Columbus, Texas, meanwhile, the sun will rise at 6:46; in Columbus, Mo.; at 6:52, and in Columbus, Ohio at 7:11 a.m.

But in Columbus, Ga.?

No, ma'am. Even though Columbus, Ga., is 789.9 miles east of Columbus, Texas on Interstate 10, the sun intends to rise much later than it does in its namesake Texas town — 19 minutes later to be precise, at 7:05 a.m. along Broadway or First Avenue, downtown.

At nearby Fort Benning, of course, home of the Army's Infantry and Armor schools, Ranger School, Airborne School, How-To-Be-A-Real-Nice-Guy-or-Gal School and that kind of thing, the sun always rises at 4 a.m.

How can any of this be? How can the sun actually rise 19 minutes later almost 800 miles due east of Columbus, Texas?

The sun is going to be as confused — and either as dismayed or as overjoyed — as you and I will be on Nov. 9. Why should it rise any time other than it damn well pleases?

So that's the first thing to know: If the sun can do it, so can you. Just sleep in that day. Or go take a walk, or drink before noon, or run 12 miles, six for the Hillary and six for the Donald. Just break out and relax, maybe listen to that old Jason Isbell song, "Goddamn Lonely Love." That is, if your candidate lost.

If your candidate won, I recommend singing the entire "Hallelujah" chorus from Handel's "Messiah," by yourself, from the street outside your home, at sunrise.

You have my permission. Feel free to copy and paste this note below, or print or clip a hard copy and show it to the boss.

DEAR BOSS: HE/SHE HAS MY PERMISSION TO BEHAVE WITH THE REGULARITY OF THE SUN, ON NOV. 9 ONLY. DRIVE FAST AND TAKE CHANCES, BOSSY, OK? ESPECIALLY TODAY.

YOUR FRIEND IN CRIME AND PROFIT, HORATIO.

Or whomever — sign it "Roger" if you have to, followed by "Over and Out."

That's how you have to talk to bosses if you don't have a good one. I happen to have a good one, so I never talk to my boss that way, but I'm pretty sure I'm in the solid minority. Which many of you

will discover you are too, come Nov. 9. Don't worry about it — it just happens sometimes.

SECOND: The first rugged, four-wheel ATV was not built at the end of the 1960s, as the history of internal combustion would suggest.

No, sir. Instead, it was manufactured rapidly by geniuses over a 115-day period between May 25 and Sept. 17, 1787. They didn't call it names like Arctic Cat, Bobcat, Unison, Cobra, Cub Cadet, Holy Cow, J.F. Tap-dancing Christ, or anything else too fanciful.

On strip searches and press freedom in North Dakota

Monday, Oct. 17 was a cold, windy, autumnal day in North Dakota. We arrived outside the Morton County Courthouse in Mandan to produce a live broadcast of the “Democracy Now!” news hour.

Originally, the location was dictated by the schedule imposed upon us by the local authorities; one of us (Amy) had been charged with criminal trespass for our reporting on the Dakota Access Pipeline company’s violent attack on Native Americans who were attempting to block the destruction of sacred sites, including ancestral burial grounds, just north of the Standing Rock Sioux Reservation.

Pipeline guards unleashed pepper spray and dogs on the land and water defenders. “Democracy Now!” video showed one of the attack dogs with blood dripping from its nose and mouth. The video went viral, attracting more than 14 million views on Facebook alone. Five days later, North Dakota issued the arrest warrant.

When responding to an arrest warrant, one must surrender to the jail by about 8 a.m. if one hopes to see a judge that day and avoid a night in jail. So we planned to broadcast live from 7-8 a.m., then head to the jail promptly at 8 a.m. to get processed through the jail and fight the trespass charge in court.

To our surprise, as we landed in Bismarck on Friday, we learned that the prosecutor, Ladd Erickson, had dropped the trespass charge, but filed a new one: “riot.” We were stunned. In an email to both the prosecutor and our defense attorney, Tom Dickson, Judge John Grin-

steiner wrote, “The new complaints, affidavits, and summons are quite lengthy and I will review those for probable cause on Monday when I get back into the office.”

We were told by several lawyers familiar with North Dakota criminal law that judges almost never reject a prosecutor’s complaint. The arraignment was set for 1:30 p.m. local time, Monday.

We spent the weekend reporting on the controversial Dakota Access Pipeline, with the threat of the riot charge never far from our minds. The 1,100-mile-long, \$3.8 billion pipeline is designed to carry almost 500,000 barrels of crude oil from the fracking oil fields of North Dakota to Illinois, then onward to the Gulf of Mexico. That is why thousands of people have been at the resistance camps where the Dakota Access Pipeline is slated to cross under the Missouri River. If the pipeline leaks there, the freshwater supply for millions of people downstream will be polluted.

Morton County Sheriff Kyle Kirchmeier runs the jail in Mandan and is responsible for how people are processed there. As the protests have mounted during the past six months, Kirchmeier and the local prosecutors have been leveling more and more serious charges against the land and water protectors, with an increasing number of felony charges.

More than 140 people have been arrested so far. Those we spoke to told us a shocking detail: When getting booked at the jail, they were all strip searched, forced to “squat and cough” to demonstrate they had nothing hidden in their rectums, then were put in orange jumpsuits. The treatment was the same for Chairman of the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe Dave Archambault, to a pediatrician from the reservation, Dr. Sara Jumping Eagle, to actress Shailene Woodley, star of the films “Divergent” and “Snowden,” among others.

I asked Chairman Archambault if

strip searching was common for low-level misdemeanors. “I wouldn’t know, because that was the first time I ever got arrested,” he replied. Dr. Jumping Eagle remarked, “It made me think about my ancestors, and what they had gone through.”

Shailene Woodley told us, “Never did it cross my mind that while trying to protect clean water, trying to ensure a future where our children have access to an element essential for human survival, would I be strip searched. I was just shocked.”

As we prepared to enter the courthouse for the 1:30 p.m. arraignment on Monday, Oct. 17, 200 people rallied in support of a free press, demanding the charges be dropped. A row of close to 60 riot police were lined up in a needless display of force in front of a peaceful gathering, threatening to arrest anyone who stepped off the curb. Then word came from our lawyer: The judge had refused to sign off on the riot charge. The case was dismissed, and we marked an important victory for a free press.

The free press should now focus a fierce spotlight on the standoff at Standing Rock — a critical front in the global struggle to combat global warming and fight for climate justice. Indigenous people and their non-native allies are confronting corporate power, backed up by the state with an increasingly militarized police force. Attempts to criminalize nonviolent land and water defenders, humiliate them and arrest journalists should not pave the way for this pipeline. ■

Clinton’s insincere, arrogant campaign

The website PolitiFact jumped all over Rudy Giuliani earlier this year when he said, “Hillary Clinton is for open borders.”

It spent about 700 words sifting through the evidence, and ended up rating the former New York City mayor’s claim “false.” Now we know that PolitiFact blew its call because it lacked access to the most important datum — Hillary Clinton’s real view.

For that, it would have had to be present at one of her paid speeches at a major financial institution, in this case the Brazilian bank Banco Itau. In May 2013, Clinton told her audience at the bank, “My dream is a hemispheric common market, with open trade and open borders.” Ding, ding, ding — there’s the magic phrase, in Hillary’s own words.

The excerpt from Hillary’s speech comes courtesy of the massive WikiLeaks dump of pilfered emails — probably by Russian hackers — from the account of Clinton campaign chairman John Podesta. The hack is illuminating insofar as it illus-

trates how progressives think and talk in private — i.e., about how you’d expect.

The frank advocacy of open borders is now so radioactive that even the editorial page of *The Wall Street Journal* will no longer associate itself with it (once upon a time, the paper routinely called for an open-borders amendment to the U.S. Constitution). Talk of open borders has sequentially retreated behind closed doors.

A faux cosmopolitanism is a thread running through the WikiLeaks emails. If you think Clinton aides root for terrorist acts not to be committed by Muslims, lest political and policy complications ensue, you’re right.

Hillary aide Karen Finney sent John Podesta an email in December 2015 about the San Bernardino shooting. She wrote “damn,” and forwarded a tweet from MSNBC journalist Chris Hayes relating that one of the shooters was named Syed Farook. Podesta lamented that it wasn’t instead a journalist named Syed Farook reporting on a shooting by Chris Hayes, who has a much more convenient, Irish surname.

A certain highhandedness and bad faith pervades the entire Clinton campaign. Hillary Clinton was perfectly comfortable with the globe-trotting financiers throwing six-figure speaking fees at her, but

then had to turn around and shovel boob bait for Bubba at her party’s inflamed left-wing activists, who hate those very financiers and their views on trade, among many other things.

The Clinton campaign’s predicament was captured in microcosm by spokesman Brian Fallon. In September 2015, he worried about an op-ed attacking the Keystone Pipeline that, he notes, had already been extensively edited and re-edited. As secretary of state, Clinton had, reasonably enough, indicated she’d likely support the pipeline, and now she was coming out against it. Will her newly aggressive opposition, Fallon wondered, “be greeted cynically and perhaps as part of some manufactured attempt to project sincerity?”

Yeah, probably — like much of what she says and does. Such was Clinton’s manifest weakness in March 2016 that a friendly liberal columnist sent a worried email to John Podesta. “Right now,” the columnist warned, “I am petrified that Hillary is almost totally dependent on Republicans nominating Trump.” Sounds right. It always pays to be lucky, rather than good — or sincere. ■

straits — here where political and economic interests often seem to clash with the science that points to an expensive but effective water fix for the vast Everglades ecosystem — he might feel right at home. (For an in-depth look at Florida’s water problems and the solutions, see “The Fix,” *Florida Weekly*, Sept. 28.)

Mr. Edwards is a professor of civil engineering at Virginia Tech, where he teaches environmental engineering, applied aquatic chemistry and engineering ethics.

But as reputations go, that’s the least of it. Doing lab work on corrosion in buildings and “opportunistic premise-plumbing pathogens,” he’s become one of the most celebrated and coincidentally reviled academic activists in American science.

“I don’t feel I’ve had a choice,” he says.

He helped prove, for example, that people were being forced to drink lead-infused water from utility pipes in Washington, D.C., at the beginning of the last decade; he was one of *Time* magazine’s four most important “innovators” in international water issues and dubbed “The Plumbing Professor” in 2004; a paper on lead poisoning of children in Washington was named outstanding science paper by *Environmental Science and Technology*, a prestigious trade journal, in 2010; in 2013 he received a premier award for “courageously defending the public interest at great personal risk,” and this year *Fortune* and *Time* both named him one of the most influential people in the world, according to his biography.

Mr. Edwards was also a 2007 winner of a MacArthur Foundation Genius Grant (recipients get \$500,000 to do what they want in furthering science or art that might help humanity).

So what could be wrong with that picture?

A lot, according to his critics, who include both public officials and some academic colleagues. They didn’t like it when Mr. Edwards stepped back into the public fray in 2014, forcing federal, state and local officials in Michigan to acknowledge actions that poisoned and perhaps killed people drinking from lead-leeching pipes in Flint.

Those officials were also forced to admit they understood the problem long before they acted, an act Mr. Edwards calls “criminal,” and a conclusion drawn by the inspector general of the Environmental Protection Agency, reported Oct. 14 by *The New York Times*.

The EPA could have ordered state and local officials to quit supplying water passing from the Flint River through improperly treated pipes as early as June 2015, but instead waited until January of this year, the inspector general concluded.

Florida Weekly’s Sept. 28 issue featured an in-depth look at Florida’s water problems and their possible solutions.

The result in Michigan has been both dismay and huge and ongoing change; for Mr. Edwards, the consequences have been unexpected and disturbing.

“Maybe my academic career is over,” he says — in spite of his fame and his tenure as a professor at Virginia Tech. “For me to have to defend myself for exposing an environmental crime ... I am dumbfounded.”

Married and with two children, he admits he has paid a costly personal price for being a do-good activist. That’s a truth anybody who attends the play “Paragon Springs” at FSW is likely to discover during the talk-back after the 8 p.m. opening-night performance Thursday, Nov. 3, in the Black Box Theater on the college’s Fort Myers campus.

Based on the Henrik Ibsen play, “An Enemy of the People,” this 2010 work by Stephen Dietz — to be produced and directed by FSW theater professor Stuart Brown — describes what happens to a man who discovers the highly profitable tourist waters of a town are toxic and makes the information public.

Mr. Brown was born and raised near the Caloosahatchee River, has watched politics ignore science as the quality of the river declined with excessive water releases from Lake Okeechobee, he says, and decided to bring both the play and Mr. Edwards to the region.

“A discussion about what happens to scientists when their work gets challenged in the political arena is overdue,” he explains.

“The first wave of climate scientists was all but obliterated by personal attacks and political pressure and other dirty tricks,” he adds. “Science and politics have anti-thetical processes and yet, in today’s world, they seem ever more violently thrust into

the same space. Should we be doing anything to equip our science majors to confront the bewildering political challenges they may well face in the normal course of their careers?”

That’s the troubling but insistent question that art — a painting, a play, a book, a photograph — can raise even if others don’t, when politics and science clash, says Mr. Brown.

Mr. Edwards, an incarnate answer to the question, perhaps, appears to have stepped straight from the pages and stages of Ibsen and Dietz, and he knows it.

In his forward to a David L. Lewis book, “Science for Sale,” he quotes the Ibsen play:

“Mayor: The matter in question is not a purely scientific one; it is a complex affair; it has both a technical and an economic side ... As a subordinate official, you have no right to express any conviction at odds with that of your superiors.

“Dr. Stockman: What I am doing, I am doing in the name of truth and for the sake of my conscience.”

After Mr. Edwards had conducted the tests and in 2014 drawn his conclusions in Flint, once again federal, state and local officials, joined by some academic colleagues around the country, criticized him. They questioned his motives, they questioned his reputation, and they insisted first that he was wrong (he wasn’t, as subsequent events show) and second that as a scientist and academic, he should have stayed out of the fray and let others solve the problem.

Thus, so the argument goes, he might remain objective, and government grants

to universities and scientists might not be put at risk.

The chill Mr. Edwards feels from both colleagues and officialdom has not lifted, nor has his unequivocal criticism of both civil servant and academic scientists who pass by opportunities to right environmental wrongs, part of the code of engineers and planners all are sworn to, he says — a scientists’ version of the Hippocratic oath taken by doctors.

Their view, he argues, is based on a flawed model of proper behavior for good scientists.

“A pinnacle of scientific evolution upheld to my generation was Mr. Spock on ‘Star Trek’ — half human and without emotion, supposedly full of logic,” he explains.

“This is a very dangerous model. My life experiences have shown me that overemphasizing technical knowledge, even at the expense of being human, is very dangerous.”

Such danger suggests how important a so-called liberal education — looking into the temperaments, behaviors and experiences of others — might be, he argues.

“While I would not force a liberal education on anyone, we can try to better inspire students to seek one out on their own. I once thought that the humanities were for losers — I had to learn the hard way at age 40 (he is now 52) that was not the case. That to protect innocent kids and fulfill my professional obligations as an engineer, I had to learn about both the worst and best of humankind.”

When colleagues criticized him in the journal *Environmental Science and Tech-*

nology, he responded with comments that implied a massive hypocrisy on their parts.

They “teach our students that they must risk their untenured professional careers and risk their livelihood to ‘push back when faced with injustice,’” while at the same time arguing that this obligation does not apply to tenured academics because our funding is “too precious to lose.”

He then draws this conclusion and repeats it often when he speaks to reporters: “This is the very definition of cowardice.”

We are, he says, “the greatest generation of cowards,” often too comfortable in our secure lives to do the right thing.

“I think this is about the relationship between science and society, and the trustworthiness of our civil service. The environmental police we pay to protect us — what do we do when they turn into environmental criminals? There is no plan for environmental justice when environmental crimes are perpetrated by civil servants and engineers.”

The Sunshine State

For many, perhaps, Mr. Edwards describes conditions in Florida, as well as Washington D.C., or Flint.

When Gov. Scott arrived in Tallahassee he fired more than 200 regulators and officials in the state’s Department of Environmental Protection, and the South Florida Water Management District (among others) backed off regulations designed to protect water quality. The governor forbade state employees even to use the term “climate change” in describing what will happen in coastal Florida in the next few decades.

When state DEP lawyer Chris Byrd became vocal about climate change in 2013, he was fired, Ms. Wilkins says.

When University of Florida scien-

tists at the Water Institute produced a lengthy 2014 study pointing the way to restoration of the Everglades system from Orlando south, lobbyists and representatives of conflicting economic interests — those ranging from officials for sugar companies or corporate farm operations to environmental groups — seized on the report to show either why they should not have to be part of the fix, or why some groups should, says Wendy Graham, director of the UF Water Institute.

But she and Thomas Frazer, acting director of the Water Institute this year (Ms. Graham is on sabbatical), stuck to their science guns, no matter which politician or what group might have preferred otherwise.

“Our report said, ‘This is a big problem with hydrologic, legal, infrastructure complaints,’” Ms. Graham noted. “There is no silver bullet that will solve the problem. We’ll need (water) storage north, south, east and west of (Lake Okeechobee) and maybe more in the lake to make it work.”

“None of the projects taken one at a time can solve the problem. Individually they don’t show benefit across the system. It will take all the projects to achieve restoration goals for the estuaries, the lake and the Everglades.”

But politicians and lobbyists left the sci-

entists alone, too, says Mr. Frazer. Asked if anyone criticized him or the Water Institute for the findings or tried to sway what the study might report, he replied, “That’s an easy one to answer. The answer is ‘No.’”

Such experience in Florida has not been a given.

Brian LaPointe, a marine biologist and researcher at the Harbor Branch Oceanographic Institute, part of Florida Atlantic University, says for years nobody wanted to hear about his research into the pollution cause by septic tanks both on Florida’s west coast in the Caloosahatchee River and Charlotte Harbor, and on the east coast in the Indian River Lagoon.

“Finally,” he says, “they began to pay attention” when his studies of nitrogen levels resulting from human waste could not be ignored.

For Melanie Ulrich, a microbiologist and professor at FSW who with her husband also owns and operates a commercial fishing vessel seeking blue crabs in the Caloosahatchee River, public reaction to her discovery that blues crabs were dying suddenly in huge numbers in the lower reaches of the river earlier this year was surprisingly hostile.

As a crabber, she reports size and quantity of catches to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Commission. But as a scientist, she also began to study the locations of

the dead crabs, ultimately getting a grant to let her students participate and do the science.

“Crabs are pretty hardy, but we saw not just a decline in numbers, but death in the crab pots. They crawled in and in several days they were dead. We took pictures because it was kind of disheartening. There’s a major problem (in the lower Caloosahatchee south of I-75).”

She and her students are now studying the problem in greater depth, but it takes time. “You can’t assume that the ecosystem will balance it out, and it will be okay.”

And you can’t assume that people will embrace the science and its results. When her observations were reported in the daily newspaper, some people reacted with hostility, inviting the Ulrichs to pick up and go back to Maryland where they’d come from in 2012, she recalls.

“In 2014 there was still profit and reasonable crabbing in this,” she says. “But then we see a 58 percent reduction in blue crabs. There’s runoff from fertilizers, nitrate imbalances and so on, but from crab perspective, it’s probably the salinity.”

“The reality of the science is, you want to watch this over multiple years, but you don’t want to wait until you say, ‘We’ve looked at it for a decade — there’s a problem.’ So you have to act.”

You have to act.

Or you can remain a coward, in the view of Mr. Edwards, loyal to your appointments, your grants, your political masters.

But there are other ways to be courageous, suggests Ms. Wilkins.

“I believe Marc Edwards embodies a particular type of heroism that is necessary, but there are ways other people who may not have the sorts of advantages or positions of power that he had when he began this, can act.

“It takes leaders like Mr. Edwards, but additionally it takes consensus and movement in society,” she adds. “And people demonstrate courage or become activists in smaller ways: maybe they boycott a product, say sugar, or cast a ballot based on principle, or have an important conversation with a family member, or as a teacher simply pass to students a value that encourages them to question authority.”

Or they can discover a great play, find the hero who seems to walk out of its pages from the past into the present and future, and present both of them to any who still believe art, politics and science may be one for all and all for one — and not a rancorous collection of misfits. ■

The killer

Down in the Everglades on Oct. 24, 1910, the people of Chokoloskee came for Edgar J. Watson. Outside Ted Smallwood's General Store, after Mr. Watson's gun jammed, they pumped his body so full of bullets that the wall remained permanently stained with his blood. He was buried out on Rabbit Key and although later his family had the body exhumed and buried at Fort Myers Cemetery, some say Mr. Watson or whatever is left of his unfortunate soul has come home to the last place he knew.

People eventually came to know him as a cold-blooded killer, a South Carolina-born outlaw with Jesse James' gang who found refuge from the law in this tiny Everglades conclave. He became a sugar cane farmer, and Smallwood's General Store was the center of social activity and trade at the time.

"He would come in and get people to hire them to work on his sugar cane farm but on payday instead of paying them he just shot them," said Mallory McMillin, Ted Smallwood's great-grand-

daughter.

Many of the workers Mr. Watson killed were black, she said, so their deaths were not officially reported. Then other white locals started turning up dead. That's when they decided to come for him.

Seven years after Mr. Watson was killed, the general store at the farmhouse was closed. A new one was built close by on Chokoloskee Bay and exists to this day as a museum. Ms. McMillin, 28, works there now. Sometimes people in Chokoloskee ring the McMillians' doorbell at night to let them know they've seen people moving about in the store.

"I've been here my whole life," Ms. McMillin said. "Sometimes when I'm closing up and I get all the doors and stuff closed, I don't know, it feels kind of creepy, like there's someone standing behind me sometimes."

That may just be, she suggests, because the old building contains a life-size mannequin of her great-grandfather. Maybe Mr. Watson's spirit died along with him in 1910.

A ghost-hunting group from Naples, the Haunted Apparition Hunters, came out once to investigate. They posted a fairly freaky video on YouTube about that night. However, nothing was confirmed.

"I don't know what to think about that kind of stuff," Ms. McMillin said.

The bather

An old mansion on the river in downtown Fort Myers, The Burroughs Home was a point of high society where snowbirds Nelson and Adeline Burroughs entertained people like the Edison family. Their daughter Mona eventually left the estate to the city, even if a part of her never left at all.

It was a Monday in the early 1990s. The house was locked and closed for the day. A maintenance man contacted Gina Taylor, the property director at the time. Had she or someone been in the house? The upstairs bathtub faucet was running. She hadn't. No one had. No one generally did go in the house on Mondays.

"The spookiest part," Ms. Taylor recalled, "is that the motion detectors were on."

Ms. Taylor called the plumber. There

was no pressure in the line, she was told, that might have caused it to go on. This event continued on a number of other Mondays, with not only the bathtub, but the kitchen and bathroom sink faucets turned on as well.

It remains a mystery, but Ms. Taylor speculates that maybe it was Mona, taking her bath in private on the day the home was closed to the public.

Haunting tour

Ms. Taylor is now the owner and operator of True Tours, offering historical walking tours out of The Franklin Shops in downtown Fort Myers. One of their most popular is the Haunted Walking Tour, a 90-minute stroll including some of downtown's spookiest spots, from the Burroughs Home to Patio de Leon.

It runs every Wednesday and Saturday and this season the second and fourth Fridays of the month for \$14 per person. There are also special tours each evening through Oct. 31. The tours start at 8 p.m. at The Franklin Shops. To book a spot or for more information, call 945-0405 or visit www.truetours.net.

Giving up the ghost

Pam and her daughter Debbie, who died in a fire together many years ago, apparition experts say, were found this summer haunting a warehouse in an industrial park in Naples.

"One of the spirits (Pam) attached itself to me and came home with me and hung around with me for over a month until we finally had to go and put her back," said George Gibbons, 59.

Mr. Gibbons is a sales manager for a

beverage distribution company in Naples and lead investigator for the Haunted Apparition Hunters on the weekends. The group visited the warehouse a number of times at the request of the business owner, who preferred to remain anonymous.

Information including their names and cause of death was obtained with the help of an Ovilus 5, Mr. Gibbons said, a device designed to communicate with spirits. HAH couldn't confirm exactly when the mother and daughter died, where the fire took place, or their ages.

He believes Pam latched on to him because his own emotional troubles at the time related to his marriage left him vulnerable during the investigation. She sometimes appeared as a shadowy figure or large black mass.

"(She) pretty much made my life a living hell I would say. She was very jealous, a very jealous spirit, very jealous of other women coming and talking to me. Literally she would attack them," he said, by sucking up their energy and making them feel ill.

"I'm a married man and she attacked my wife. I also go to a place here in Naples, it's our local spirit shop. One of the gals here who was trying to help me with this, she attacked her like three times. Even when I went to a movie theater she attacked the lady who was selling the tickets."

Pam's attachment may have been related to her pent-up guilt, Mr. Gibbons said, and that he reminded Pam of her husband, Walter.

"They knew that they had passed away, they knew that it was a fire, but for some reason or another Pam was on a big guilt trip. She was blaming herself for what happened and blaming herself for her daughter's death."

One night Mr. Gibbons went back to the warehouse to try to free himself of her presence. He sat in the dark, alone.

"Basically I had to have a little heart to heart with her," he said. "I was able to send her and her daughter on her way, and after that nothing. I was free of her, everything was perfect. I felt like I had the weight of the world taken off my shoulders." ■

When floodwaters recede, bad used cars surface

With the recent flooding throughout the Southeast, many cars that experienced water damage will no doubt be cleaned up for resale to unsuspecting buyers. Some experts estimate that up to half of all vehicles damaged by flooding eventually return to market.

Florida ranks No. 3 as having waterlogged vehicles resold, according to a recent Carfax report.

After a vehicle has incurred flood damage, the insurance company might declare it a total loss. When that happens, the car should be sent to the junkyard; however, many go to auction as “salvage” or “flood” vehicles, after which they too often end up for sale in used car lots, classified ads or online.

After a thorough cleaning and replacement of the carpet and floor mats, these cars on the surface can look as good as new. But the hidden problems can

include mold and mildew, rusty wiring, computer malfunctions and airbags that don’t inflate, among others.

The Better Business Bureau offers these tips to help shoppers spot a flood-damaged vehicle:

■ **Sniff around.** A heavy aroma of cleaners and disinfectants is a sign that someone’s trying to mask a mold or odor problem.

■ **Take a close look.** Check for water stains, mildew and sand or silt under the carpet, floor mats, dashboard and in the wheel well where the spare is stored. Check dashboard gauges to make sure they are accurate, and look for signs of water. Test the lights, windshield wipers, turn signals, sound system and air conditioner — several times — to make sure they work.

Flex some wires under the dash to see if they bend or crack, since wet wires become brittle upon drying and can crack or fail at any time. Check the

interior of the trunk and glove compartment, and beneath the seats and dashboard for signs of mud, rust or water damage. Look for discolored, faded or stained upholstery and carpeting. Carpeting that has been replaced might fit too loosely or might not match the interior color. Check for a well-defined line, or “watermark.”

■ **Check the history.** Ask to see the title. Check the date and place of transfer to see if the car came from a flood-damaged area and if the title is stamped “flood damage” or “salvage.” Get a vehicle history report based on the VIN number.

A salvage title means an insurance company declared the car a total loss because of a serious accident or other problems. A flood title means the car has damage from sitting in water deep enough to fill the engine compartment. The title status is part of the vehicle’s history report.

Either way, do the inspection and see the records before you buy any used car. With salvage and flood titled cars, you need to be extra careful, as unscrupulous companies and individuals will attempt to mislead buyers by withholding information or intentionally hiding a car’s history through a process called “title washing.”

■ **Research the dealer.** Check the car dealer’s business profile at www.bbb.org to see if they have a history of complaints. Ask the dealer directly if the car has been damaged in a flood. Get your answers in writing and walk away if the seller is unwilling to provide clear evidence.

■ **Consult a trusted mechanic.** Before you buy any used car, you should get a pre-purchase inspection by a trusted mechanic. The extra cost could save you money in the long run if major problems are discovered. ■



BEHIND THE WHEEL

The return of the big daddy Caddy

The era of the large and luxurious Cadillac has returned. The company never really left the full-size sedan market, but the new CT6 represents a return to opulence that once allowed them to use the motto, "The Standard of the World."


There has been a bit of prestige lacking from Cadillac lately. The company has brought up the quality of its interior materials and motors (especially in the high-performance V-line.) But Cadillac has not offered a true wow factor in luxury for quite some time. That's a problem for a brand whose bedrock is prestige.

The CT6 feels like it has a touch of Fleetwood flair. From the 1920s through the '60s, Cadillacs with this name truly were for the upper echelons of society. These were special cars with special bodies, including in 1959 when Pininfarina of Italy hand-built the Fleetwoods. These were the cars reserved only for the fattest of fat cats, and made people take notice when the coachbuilt Cadillacs rolled through the center of town.

Today the CT6 returns that tradition with a bolder exterior styling than its siblings. It features Cadillac's signature tall headlights that flow into the fenders. But the long hood and stretched LED package gives this car a bit of a sinister smile that's seen even in the daytime. The same feeling is repeated throughout the bodylines. The CT6 has nearly a one-foot longer wheelbase than the other full-size sedan in its lineup, the XTS. While they are similar in overall size, the extra space between the wheels gives the CT6 more time to develop harder creases in its profile.

The interior is what really brings this sedan to iconic Fleetwood levels. Leather and wood cover nearly every surface and offer an individual feeling of luxury even for the back seat occupants. There are options for some very innovative features, such as a rear camera that will display in place of the mirror, a touchpad to go with the touchscreen infotainment, and a Bose stereo system with so many speakers that some are even in the headrests. There's even an available night vision camera that can see far beyond the headlights and displays it underneath the speedometer. This is the genuine wow factor that's been missing for decades.

There are not just features for the



driver. The rear seats offer an executive level of space, and in fact, an upgrade to the Platinum trim level would eliminate the need for a limousine. This package is the true top of Cadillac's pyramid. It comes with electronically adjusting rear seats with heat, cooling and massage features. Add in other luxuries such as a rear sunroof, power sunshades, dual flip up DVD screens, and an individual climate control for each of the four seating areas, and this is a true fat cat Caddy.

The CT6 is also a car that acknowledges Cadillac is no longer alone in the larger premium sedan world. In the last few decades, there have been many

European and Japanese competitors that have caught up and surpassed this American luxury standard. The CT6 looks to get back to the top by making available advanced driving features such as automatically adapting magnetic ride control and an array of turbocharged motors. The highest of this line is a 3.0-liter twin turbo V6 producing a healthy 404 hp. In total, the CT6 feels exceptionally sharp on the road without losing a luxury edge — falling between a BMW 7-Series and a Lexus LS.

The Cadillac XTS was never the right car to hit these kind of luxury high notes, but there is a very good reason for it to

continue to exist. The rear-wheel drive CT6 starts at \$54,490, which is about \$8,200 more than the front-wheel drive XTS (both have all-wheel drive available.) Plus, with every option boxed checked on the XTS, it won't get near the CT6 Platinum's \$88K+ starting price.

It's all part of a smart strategy. The CT6 offers impressive features for the money, but not everyone wants or needs to be the CEO of the neighborhood. So the XTS can keep full-size Cadillac luxury more affordable. But for those select few who remember the individual opulence of the Fleetwood era, modern luxury has finally arrived. ■

Pot for pets

As nine states next month ask voters to approve some form of legalization of marijuana, a “new customer base” for the product — pets — was highlighted in an October *New York Times* report. Dogs and cats are struck with maladies similar to those that humans report in cannabis success stories: seizures, inflammation, anxiety, arthritis

and other pain and subsequent social withdrawals. The “high”-producing THC element cannot be used because it is notoriously toxic to dogs, but other elements in the drug seem to work well not only for dogs and cats but, by anecdotal evidence, pigs, horses and domesticated wild animals.

Government in action

Kevin and Tammy Jones opened their guns-and-coffee store in an old bank building in Hamilton, Va., in August, but despite the controversies about the ease of gun acquisition in America, their Bullets and Beans shop has had a harder time pleasing government regulators over the coffee than over the firearms. Kevin told Washingtonian magazine that there were no problems in

getting gun-shop and firearms-instruction permits from state and federal agencies, but several local-government roadblocks delayed the coffee-sales permit: the property being zoned for “retail” but not food or drinks; permission to open certain businesses near residences; and a coffee shop’s need to have “parking.”

Latest religious messages

Oklahoma Gov. Mary Fallin declared Oct. 13 Oilfield Prayer Day to cap a statewide initiative of mass wishing for improved performance of the state’s energy industry, which has been in the doldrums recently with the worldwide

drop in oil prices. Though the initiative’s founders, and the associated Oil Patch Chaplains, were largely Baptist church leaders, the governor emphasized that all religions should be praying for a more prosperous industry.

Cultural diversity

■ In September, a court in Paris upheld France’s government ban on people smiling for their passport and identity photos. One official had challenged the required straightforward pose (“neutral,” “mouth closed”), lamenting that the French should be encouraged to smile to overcome the perpetual “national depression” that supposedly permeates the country’s psyche.

■ The baseball-like “pesapallo” might be Finland’s national game, reported *The New York Times* in September, despite its differences from the Ameri-

can pastime. The ball is pitched to the batter — but vertically, by a pitcher standing next to the batter — and the batter runs the bases after hitting it, though not counterclockwise but zig-zag style, to a base on the left, then one on the right, then back to the left. The game was invented in Finland in 1920 and has achieved minor notoriety, with teams from Germany, Switzerland, Sweden and Australia vying for a “world cup” that so far none has been able to wrest from Finland. (Reassuringly, however, “three strikes” is an out in Finland, too.)

New World order


■ Too much time on their hands: In an October profile of tech developer and startup savant Sam Altman, *The New Yorker* disclosed that “many people in Silicon Valley have become obsessed with the simulation hypothesis” — that “what we experience as reality” is just some dark force’s computer simulation (as in the movie “The Matrix”). “Two

tech billionaires,” the magazine reported, are “secretly engag(ing) scientists” to break us out of this alternative universe we might be trapped in. (One prominent member of the tech elite remarked at a Vox Media conference in June on how the “simulation hypothesis” seems to dominate all conversation whenever the elites gather.) ■

School nurses make the grade in Collier County

We have so many good things happening in our community that some of our most worthy programs occasionally slip under the radar. One such project is the school nurse program, which has been a collaboration of NCH and Collier County Public Schools for 20 years.

I recently visited with Principals Lynda Walcott of Calusa Park Elementary and Jessica Davis of Poinciana Elementary to learn more about this program that benefits 50 schools and 47,000 students. These two schools were suggested as representative of the elementary schools in western Collier County. I should mention that our county has a geographic area larger than the state of Delaware. That's a lot of ground to cover.

For many students, their primary exposure to vital health care is through contact with their school nurse. Establishing a positive and trusting relationship with a school nurse helps to encourage healthy behavior from an early age. It benefits the rest of a child's school career and life.

Studies indicate that healthier children record improved attendance, higher academic success and improved graduations rates, with reduced tardiness and fewer distractions associated with illness.

NCH has 45 caregivers working in Collier County schools; the team includes RNs, LPNs and school health assistants. We also have seven athletic trainers, one for each high school, helping with high school sports teams. Additionally, CCPS organizes vision and hearing checks for students and, with other partners, provides on-site vision exams and two pairs of glasses to students in need at 33 schools.

RNs Lisa Arnold at Calusa Park and Michelle Brice at Poinciana see an average of 30-50 students each day at their respective schools, managing everything from sprained ankles to complex chronic illnesses and disabilities.

Survey shows employers, CEOs can make significant impact on health in the workplace

The workplace might be a barrier to mental health and healthy lifestyle goals, with more than a quarter of employees (28 percent) experiencing stress as a result of work always, almost always or very often. This finding demonstrates that employers — and CEOs — have a clear and critical role in motivating employees to focus on their health and well-being, according to a national survey recently released from the American Heart Association CEO Roundtable.

The Nielsen survey found that 40 percent of employees say they want their employer to recognize the level of stress employees are under, followed by allowing for flexibility when they work (30 percent) or where they work (26 percent) in order to reduce or manage their workplace stress. Nearly half (48 percent) say occasionally unplugging or disconnecting from technology has a positive effect on their stress levels.

The AHA CEO Roundtable's 26 members represent some of the nation's largest

and most influential corporations and organizations. Under the scientific guidance of the AHA, the group serves as an incubator for new ideas to change the dynamic of health and engagement in the workplace through evidence-based approaches.

"The objective of the CEO Roundtable is to build a culture of health and wellness in the workplace," says roundtable co-chair Henry Kravis, the Co-CEO of KKR. "This latest study reinforces the substantial impact health and wellness programs can have on employee engagement and the responsibility of the CEO to lead by example."

The survey results point to key actions employers can take to improve health and well being at their organization. Additional highlights include:

■ Leadership is critical when it comes to addressing obstacles in the workplace that hinder employee health and well-being. Employees who reported knowing their CEO participates in company health programs are much more likely than those who say their CEO does not participate to participate

themselves, ultimately reporting better productivity, improved work quality and higher job satisfaction.

■ Understanding health priorities and variances by generation is key to the success of a workplace health program. For example, younger millennials are more likely than older millennials, Generation Xers and baby boomers to say that getting more sleep is in their top three health and lifestyle goals. Gen Xers and baby boomers, on the other hand, are more likely than younger and older millennials to list losing weight as a goal.

■ Sleep is essential to well-being and productivity at work.

On average, employees say they are getting close to the recommended amount of sleep per night at 6.7 hours, but only one in four say the quality of sleep they get is excellent or very good.

"The findings support some strategies that we have deployed within Nielsen," says Mitch Barns, CEO of Nielsen and an AHA CEO Roundtable member. "We have seen measurable improvements in innovative health programming that serves the specific needs of employees and that builds a supportive culture that promotes health and productivity." ■



Home alone

Separation anxiety: It's well-known among dogs, but cats suffer it, too.

When you come home from work, is it to find that your cat has peed on the bed, yowled so desolately all day that the neighbors inquire a little nervously about her well-being, or scratched to ribbons the chair that you just had reupholstered with that expensive fabric? Don't chalk it up to spite. Your cat may be suffering from a condition that almost no one associates with the feline species: separation anxiety.

Separation anxiety is more commonly associated with dogs, but despite their reputation for independence, cats can develop it as well, especially if they were orphaned as kittens or weaned too early. These cats may express their anxiety in destructive ways, such as scratching furniture.

Older cats can develop separation anxiety in the wake of a divorce or death in the family. They are often more attached to people than they are given credit for, and cats who lose owners this way may pace and cry in search of them.

Other signs of separation anxiety include depression, sulking, fighting with other cats, refusing to eat, not using the litter box, spraying urine on the owner's clothing and compulsive grooming behaviors, such as licking or pulling at hair until it comes out.

Why do cats do these things? It

makes them feel better. Take spraying urine on your bedding or clothing — please! Your belongings carry your scent, and applying her own scent to them makes your cat feel more secure, almost as if you're there. It's a compliment of sorts, even if it's one you'd rather not receive.

Are you doomed to life with a bald, angry cat who doesn't want you to leave the house? You might not be able to cure your cat's separation anxiety, but you can probably manage it successfully by enriching the environment and offering more playtime and attention.

To keep your cat's mind off your absence, make being home more interesting for him. Leave out a puzzle toy filled with a meal's worth of kibble. The time spent releasing the food from the toy is time not spent being destructive. And most cats tend to settle down after the first half-hour that you're gone.

Rotate favorite interactive toys so your cat doesn't have a chance to get bored. Put them out only when you're going to be away from home.

Give your cat some screen time — TV screen, that is. Turn on the TV to a nature channel or play a DVD made for cats. The sights and sounds of birds, fish, squirrels and other animals can help hold a cat's interest.

Offer a room with a view — and a gym. Install a window perch so your cat can watch the squirrels outside, and place a tall cat tree in an interesting

spot so he can get some exercise climbing up and down it.

Provide live entertainment in the form of a bird feeder set in front of the window or an aquarium placed where your cat can see it but not access it.

If possible, build an enclosure in your yard that your cat can access from indoors. A chance to laze in the sun and roll in the grass is relaxing for everyone, including cats.

Give your cat a favorite treat when you leave, not when you come home.

Spend a few minutes once or twice a day playing with or petting your cat. If your cat knows he'll get attention when you're home, he's less likely to be anxious when you're gone.

If all else fails, consult a veterinary behaviorist. She may prescribe an anti-anxiety medication that can help your cat stay calm. ■



Storage wars

National and local self-storage companies expand, vie for customers

George Carlin was on to something 20 years ago in his diatribe about “stuff.”

“That’s all you need in life, a little place for your stuff. That’s all your house is: a place to keep your stuff,” he famously observed. “If you didn’t have so much stuff, you wouldn’t need a house. You

could just walk around all the time. A house is just a pile of stuff with a cover on it.”

Today, Americans have even more stuff and not enough space, especially here in Southwest Florida where houses lack basements and people often arrive with all their stuff from a bigger home elsewhere. When the stuff doesn’t fit and they can’t bear to part with it — their children might want it one day (they usually don’t, by the way) — they turn to mini-storage, a place where they can hide their stuff in air-conditioned comfort and visit it 24/7 should they choose.

Nearly one of every 10 American

households rents a self- or mini-storage unit, said Steve Wilson, CEO and managing partner of Hide-Away Storage Services, which operates 14 buildings from St. Petersburg to Naples.

“People have too much stuff,” said Mr. Wilson who “stumbled” into the business in 1977. “Americans have too much junk and move a lot. Forty percent of self-stor-





age is generated by moving and people who need temporary storage. We move so much more than Europeans and there's a lot of things we don't want to get rid of."

With occupancy rates in the 90 percentile nationally, self-storage has become a rapidly growing business. Self-storage buildings, some with multiple stories, RV, boat and kayak storage, drive-in garages and climate-controlled units for wine collections and other items that tend to wilt in the Florida heat, are popping up everywhere.

The Lock Up Self Storage has four local locations, including its newest — the four-story 73,000-square-foot building that opened on Tamiami Trail in Bonita Springs in late 2013. The facility offers more than 600 climate-controlled interior and drive-up units, a separate building for vehicle storage and carpeted hallways. It even has Wi-Fi.

The industry is so strong — generating \$27.2 billion in revenue in 2014, according to the trade organization Self Storage Association — there's been a surge in construction nationally and locally. Investors are also taking notice.

Overall the industry consists of six major public corporations — some managed by real estate investment trusts. There are 4,500 large and mid-sized firms that own and operate more than one facility like Mr. Wilson's Hide-Away and more than 26,000 one-facility owner-operators.

According to the organization, self-storage has been the "fastest growing segment of the commercial real estate industry over the last 40 years and has been considered by Wall Street analysts to be 'recession resistant' based on its performance since the economic recession of September 2008."

The majority of customers, 30 percent, rent a unit for two or more years.

Deb Beauregard, who's owned Charlotte County Self Storage since 2010, said 60 percent of her clients have been with the family operated facility for more than a year. The Whidden Boulevard business recently expanded, opening an additional 16,000 square feet and 111 new storage units this month. It now has 380 plus units and 48,000 square feet.

Customers, she said, run the gamut: "Professionals like doctors, lawyers, dentists and real estate companies that need space to store their records to regular people who store Christmas decorations or even seasonal clothing."

The industry is powered by what's commonly referred to as the four Ds: death, dislocation, divorce and disaster. In Southwest Florida there's a fifth: downsizing. Many new residents move here with too much stuff; others simply need a place to put their stuff temporarily.

"The big thing that drives our business is change: People moving in or out of a house, snowbirds renting out places and

locking up valuables or moving, especially in Florida, where most houses don't have basements," said Diane Piegza, vice president of investor relations for Uncle Bob's Self Storage, the fifth largest self-storage company in the country. "The demand is pretty consistent. We typically do well in all kinds of economic environments. During downturns, people are still moving around or downsizing."

Uncle Bob's operates 87 facilities in Florida, eight of them in Southwest Florida. It doesn't build its facilities, instead purchasing existing businesses or working with developers willing to take on development risks, then buying the finished product.

The company's newest facility opened in 2014 between River Road and Tamiami Trail in North Fort Myers with the addition of a two-story building. It's what the

industry calls a second-generation facility with all the bells and whistles — drive-up and easy access and climate control. First generation self-storage is basic single story buildings with swing doors and sheet rock between units.

"Our demographic is everybody: College students going home for the summer, empty nesters who are downsizing and don't need all of their furniture but are keeping it for their children," Ms. Piegza said. "The beauty of the business is it's a really pretty wide net of consumers who need it. After the hurricanes in South Florida, contractors came in to rent units to store their supplies."

Mr. Wilson operates about 1.2 million square feet of storage space, is opening a new facility in Ruskin soon, has a site under contract in Cape Coral and is eyeing another in Lehigh. He said his facilities offer every imaginable amenity. There's even a chaplain available to counsel customers dealing with a loss or major life upheaval. His current locations operate in the high 80 percent occupancy but did see a pretty significant drop — 20 to 30 percent — during the recessionary years.

"I think it's a myth the industry does well in a recession or boom," he said. "There's so much building right now there's going to be more than enough storage to go around. We're in the midst of this incredible building boom and it's going to bust in a couple of years. We all know it's going to bust and we all hope we're the last one standing."

He notes that in Sarasota, four or five multi-story buildings have recently opened within a half mile of each other. He was recently approached for advice by a man who had purchased a former Winn-Dixie and wanted to convert it into self-storage. Never mind, said Mr. Wilson,

he didn't understand the demographics or note the site is half a mile from two Hide-away stores and new buildings owned by national companies.

"There's a mindset out there if you build storage you're going to be successful, like build it and they will come. Everyone's going hog wild. You have to know what you're doing. During the recession a lot of business owners lost their shirts and they're getting ready to lose their shirts again."

For customers, renting a unit comes with a buyer beware caveat. Some companies charge administrative fees, require tenant insurance and offer discounts for the first few months.

"Then they raise rates fairly high," Mr. Wilson said. "There are always arguments about this at conventions. Once someone has moved into a unit they don't want to go through the trouble of moving out. What looked like a good deal isn't."

Ms. Beauregard said Charlotte Self Storage keeps its rates low, doesn't charge administrative fees and doesn't require a deposit or insurance. "We don't raise prices regularly. Customers have the luxury of knowing their price is going to stay the same."

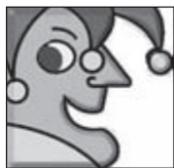
The business itself is one that Mr. Wilson said is not nearly as exciting as reality TV portrays. Only about 155,000 units are auctioned annually, average price: \$425.

Because privacy is part of the package, owners and managers have no idea what their customers are storing behind those closed doors.

Occasionally they get a rare peek inside. Ms. Piegza remembers leading a tour of investors around a facility in Buffalo. "We had a gentleman who rents a 10-by-10 unit for his model car collection. Medicare Advantage Plans

More than 57 million Americans are enrolled in Medicare, but only about 38 million are enrolled in "original Medicare" — which consists of Part A and Part B, respectively covering hospital and medical services. What are the remaining 18 million-plus signed up for? Well, many have opted for Medicare Advantage plans. Medicare enrollees get to choose original Medicare or Medicare Advantage plans and can change between them at least once a year, too, during the annual enrollment period.

Medicare Advantage plans, sometimes referred to as Part C, are offered by private insurance companies. They're regulated by the U.S. government, though, and are required to provide at least as much coverage as original Medicare — and they often offer significantly more coverage.

While original Medicare doesn't cover hearing, vision and/or dental care, many Medicare Advantage plans do — and they generally include prescription drug coverage, as well. Original Medicare will often have you footing 20 percent of many bills with no end in sight. A Medicare Advantage plan, meanwhile, might charge you a low

co-pay per doctor visit or service — and will also cap your out-of-pocket spending.

There are some downsides, of course. For example, while original Medicare lets you see any health care provider who accepts Medicare, Medicare Advantage plans will typically limit you to a network of doctors — though these networks are sometimes very large. Original Medicare won't cover you outside the U.S., but some Medicare Advantage plans do offer limited coverage abroad.

To help determine your best choice, make a list of the prescription drugs you take and the doctors you see. Also list the kinds of health care services you need and use, noting any upcoming surgeries or big-ticket expenses. When you review the plans you're considering, see which drugs they cover and which doctors are included — and how much you'll likely spend out of pocket with each option.

The Medicare website, at medicare.gov, offers a tool to help you compare and choose. Note the star ratings of your candidate plans and favor four- or five-star plans. ■

My Dumbest Investment

Rookie Errors

In the late 1990s, a friend used to show me his portfolio, and I thought I would like to have something to show him, as well. So I opened up a brokerage account and started putting \$500 a month into it.

Mistake No. 1 was buying ticker symbols, not businesses. I was buying whatever was popular (i.e., tech stocks), with little thought about what those companies actually did. Mistake No. 2 was using margin (i.e., investing with money borrowed from the brokerage). I always owed money and was paying interest. Mistake No. 3 was putting additional money that I needed in the next few years into stocks.

As you probably suspect, when the market crashed, I had to sell many of my stocks to cover my margin debts (because the lower the value of your account, the less you can borrow). Within about six months, my account's value went from around \$100,000 to \$3,000. At that point, I closed the account and vowed never to invest again. Later, I did a lot of reading and learning about investing — and I'm back at it, but much more sensibly.

The Fool Responds: Not knowing exactly what you're investing in, or why, or whether it's attractively priced is very dangerous. Margin, meanwhile, is appealing because it can amplify your gains — but it amplifies your losses, too. You should be enjoying better results now! ■

Putting Your Funds in Funds

Q What can I do if I want to invest in a particular mutual fund and my brokerage says it can't help me?

— F.M., Woodville, Michigan

A Brokerages vary in the funds they offer. Some offer hundreds, some relatively few. A brokerage may not offer a fund you want, or it may not be able to get you into it if the fund is closed to new investors. Funds will sometimes be closed if the managers believe they have more money than they can invest effectively. (That's a good thing. Lots of funds just keep taking money, even if they have to park much of it in less promising investments.)

Some funds will just do a "soft close," though. That means they won't accept new shareholders coming in from third parties such as brokerages, but they will let you invest directly through them, such as via their company's website.

It can be convenient to invest in funds through your brokerage, as you'll be able to move money between funds and fund companies more easily — though there will likely be a commission fee charged. But know that you can usually invest in an open fund directly, via the fund company itself.

Q Do I, a single person, need life insurance?

— S.W., Nags Head, North Carolina

A Not necessarily. Insurance is primarily protection against a financial loss, not an investment. (There are, after all, more effective ways to invest.) If anyone (such as a partner, children, or even your parents) is depending on your income or is tied to any of your debts, such as a mortgage, then buying life insurance is smart. But if no one will be financially hurt should your income stream disappear, consider parking your money elsewhere. ■

A Super Market

Shares of grocery giant Kroger (NYSE: KR) recently hit a 52-week low, making it even more attractive as an investment. Kroger has been facing challenges such as falling food prices and increased competition. That's especially tough in an industry known for narrow profit margins.

Still, Kroger is a top performer with a lot in its favor. For starters, its industry is defensive. During hard economic times, consumers will cut back on or delay spending on cars, appliances, vacations and other nonessential expenses. They'll keep spending on categories such as electricity, medicines and groceries, though.

Kroger's strength is reflected in the fact that its sales in stores open a year or

longer have been growing each quarter since 2004 — through economic downturns and upturns. Price cuts have hurt its profit margin, but it has more than made up for that through increased volume.

Kroger has also been boosting business in its 2,700-plus stores via a growing line of store-branded products that now generate about a quarter of its revenue. It has acquired some competitors, too, such as Harris Teeter and Roundy's.

Patient believers can enjoy Kroger's dividend, which recently yielded 1.6 percent. It has been growing by an annual average of 18 percent over the past five years and still has room to grow. You might want to add shares of Kroger to your shopping cart. ■





When the price is right, the property sells

NAPLES AREA BOARD OF REALTORS

The third quarter 2016 market report from the Naples Area Board of Realtors shows overall inventory increased 40 percent with little change



in median closed prices. The overall median closed price for homes on the market increased only 4 percent, from \$300,000 in the third quarter of 2015 to \$312,000 this year, driven predominately by a 9 percent increase in homes in the \$300,000 and below category.

NABOR tracks home listings and sales within Collier County (excluding Marco Island).

Rick Fioretti, NABOR president and a broker associate with Berkshire Hathaway Home Services Florida Realty, says an analysis of price behavior since December 2015 shows median closed prices "leveled out" in a natural reaction to the increase in inventory.

Cindy Carroll of the real estate appraisal and consultancy firm Carroll & Carroll Inc. agrees. "I think we're seeing the completion of a cycle that began in 2013," she says. "Prices have remained relatively stable for over a year, and now I'm noticing more competitive value-based pricing as the supply increases."

The report shows days on market decreased 12 percent in the \$2 million and above price category; overall, however, it shows a 10 percent increase in days on market. "Pricing is critical now more than ever," says Dominic Pallini of Vanderbilt Realty.

While both pending and closed sales decreased 14 percent quarter over quarter, inventory continued to rise in all areas during the third quarter of 2016. Overall, inventory rose 40 percent, to 5,044 homes this year from 3,606 homes in the third quarter of 2015.

Inventory in the condominium market increased 53 percent in the third quarter this year, up to 2,375 residences from 1,557 the same time last year. ■

The book of everything

NATHAN HILL WROTE A 620-PAGE NOVEL CALLED "The Nix."

What's it about? In a word: everything.

Maternal abandonment, estranged marriages, the confusion of adolescence, first love, the 1968 riots and protests, the Iraq War, Occupy Wall Street, bullies, mean girls, small towns and big cities, making choices, avoiding responsibility, video games, how music transports you and the way poetry can change your life.

Just for starters.

Mr. Hill once told a reporter that he'd stuffed the book with every good idea he had.

"It's funny; I never even thought about how to sum up the book, in jacket-copy

NIFF puts indie films in the spotlight this weekend

The eighth annual Naples International Film Festival takes place Thursday through Sunday, Oct. 27-30, with the red-carpet opening at Artis—Naples and screenings at Silverspot Cinema in Mercato.

Along with NIFF's traditional combination of narrative, documentary and short film programming, this year's festival will showcase more cause-related and award-winning films than any previous year.

Opening night festivities begin at 5:30 p.m. and include a 7 p.m. screening of "Alive and Kicking," a documentary about the culture of swing dancing. Director/



producer/writer and Academy Award-winning filmmaker Susan Glatzer will attend along with several dancers featured in the film. Immediately following the screening, the VIP party will commence on the Hayes Hall stage, complete with a playlist of swing favorites from yesterday and today.

The closing night gala includes an appearance by Colin Hay from Men at Work. Mr. Hay is the star of the closing night documentary, "Colin Hay: Waiting for My Real Life." 

Deeply moving memoir traces the arc from disaster to revival



■ **“White Man’s Disease” by Paul C. Thornton. Book-Broker Publishers. 244 pages. Trade paperback, \$19.95.**

Here is a surprising, inspirational memoir that is at once highly personal and broadly instructive. Paul Thornton, the oldest of six children, was raised in Brooklyn and on Long Island. At school he showed intelligence, though he sometimes bordered on being in trouble. His academic abilities were recognized, often resulting in special educational opportunities. He excelled in situations where expectations of Afro-Americans were unfortunately low.

Three years in the Army gave Paul some special skills and a strong work ethic. He was in a program that allowed him to graduate college upon finishing his term in the military. He was able to go on graduate school, and after earning a master’s degree was recruited by DuPont, where he steadily moved up

the corporate ladder. Home was now in Wilmington, Delaware, near DuPont headquarters.

Paul and his wife, Dorey, were on track for a grandly successful life together.

However, their ascent was threatened by an unexpected discovery: Paul had a brain tumor for which delicate, high-risk surgery offered the only possible remedy. In 1985, at the age of 29, the future did not look so bright at all.

Paul’s narration regarding the accumulation of information about his condition, the meetings with a series of physicians include the neurosurgeon who would operate and the long, difficult recovery, is vivid and emotionally powerful. The life-saving operation left him with only one good eye, severely reduced hearing and minimal control over his facial muscles. This is not to mention the long cranial scar. Brain surgery is not for sissies.

Over time, further surgeries and therapies mitigated these consequences of the tumor excision, but they did not disappear. Paul was not pleasant to look at, and he knew it. Not being able control his mouth and lips, he had trouble eating and had to drink with a straw. He

strove to maintain a positive attitude, but despair was as much a battle as his medical issues.

DuPont held on to his job for him, and he was able to make the adjustments that put him back on the track of gaining new and higher responsibilities. He

and Dorey had two daughters whom he loved dearly, but sometimes his workaholic ways created barriers.

Paul’s entrepreneurial streak led him to a successful ride in the video rental industry that took off in the 1980s. He rode it to its conclusion in the age of Netflix. Along the way, he became an educator. After his first marriage failed, he was able to find the right woman to enter married life once again. His ex-wife died while she was still fairly young; his second wife, Cheryl, became quite close to his daughters.

Paul Thornton, became an exemplary figure in his professional life and in his communities. (He received a doctorate in education from the University of Delaware in 2005, which opened more doors for him as a professor and academic administrator.) Many of the disabilities he labored to hide he was able

to “come out” about as he approached his senior years.

This outline of his memoir does not begin to capture the representation of pain, doubt, determination that he so vibrantly portrays. Nor does it capture his love for music and sports. Nor does it touch upon his thrill at becoming a grandfather.

There is a degree of detail in the author’s presentation of the surgery and its aftermath that is amazing in its clarity and force. That section is an education in itself, but the overall life story is a much more powerful education.

When Paul Thornton learned that his decease affected very few Afro-Americans, he dubbed his condition White Man’s Disease. The patient reader will discover how that title phrase resonates on many levels through this engaging record of an exemplary life, one still very much in process in Fort Myers, where the Thorntons reside.

“White Man’s Disease” would make a great gift to anyone you know who needs a good tonic to fight depression. It is the antidote to feeling sorry for one’s self. Beyond that, it’s just a plain good, well-told story. Find it at www.whitemansdisease.com and also at P.J. Boox in Fort Myers. ■

2017 Nick Linn Lecture Series bring best-selling authors to town

Four *New York Times* bestselling authors comprise the lineup for its 14th annual Nick Linn Lecture Series presented by Friends of the Library of Collier County.

The series begins Monday, Jan. 9, with Chris Bohjalian, author of 18 books, including "The Sleepwalker," a wrenching story about family secrets and enigmas that link husbands, wives and lovers.

The second lecture, Friday, Feb. 3, features Joy Fielding, author of "Someone is Watching," the story of a vanished child, a family in turmoil and a fateful phone call. The Canadian author's 25 novels are sold in 25 languages around the world.

Headlining the Friday, March 3, lecture is Georgia-born Karin Slaughter, whose 15 novels include the Grant County and Will Trent books. In her new novel, "The Kept Woman," protagonist Will Trent is plunged into a mystery that might just destroy him.





speak," he says. "It didn't even cross my mind. Privately (while writing it), I doubted it would ever get published."

The Naples resident didn't intend for "The Nix" to be about so many things, he says, but he did write it over the span of 10 years.

"And very slowly, I allowed the real world, the world as I was observing it, to creep into the book. And so, things like the recession, the housing crisis, the war in Iraq, presidential elections, I allowed them to come in. And when you allow whatever's happening in the world in, suddenly the novel will seem like it's about everything."

Agents and editors require books to be distilled down to an elevator pitch: one or two simple sentences that encapsulate what a book is about.

"My elevator pitch was really bad," Mr. Hill confesses. "It's not the nature of the book to be pitchable in that way. I love that about the book, even if it makes life difficult."

He now has various answers at the ready when people ask what his book is about.

One answer: "It's a family mystery about a mother who disappears and a son who tries to figure out why." Another: "It's a work of historical fiction that centers on the 1968 riots and protests in Chicago." And yet another answer: "It's a sort of dark comedy that satirizes contemporary society."

His answer, he explains, "depends on who's asking."

Mr. Hill, who used to teach creative writing at Florida Gulf Coast University, will teach a workshop and give a reading at the school's Sanibel Island Writers Conference taking place Nov. 3-6 at BIG ARTS. His reading, at 6 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 3, is free to the public. (He opens for Old 97s musician Rhett Miller.)

His workshop, for conference registrants only, is titled "X-Ray Writing."

"We're going to look at some narrative techniques to get close to a character," he says. "The thing I love about reading fiction is that it's the closest we can really come to being inside somebody else's brain ... Fiction is the best invention we've come up with to achieve pure empathy. That's what I'm teaching: how to get really, really close and intimate to a character in writing, so a reader can achieve that, being inside somebody else's head and knowing them from the inside out."

The Sanibel Island Writers Conference, now in its 11th year, is almost as jam-packed as Mr. Hill's filled-to-the-brim-and-overflowing novel.

This year's keynote speaker, Sue Monk Kidd, is the author of "The Secret Life of Bees" and more recently, "The Invention of Wings," both bestsellers. Other speakers (also teaching at the conference) include novelist/memoirist Joyce Maynard ("Under the Influence," "At Home in the World"), Presidential Inaugural Poet Richard Blanco ("The Prince of Los Cocuyos: A Miami Childhood") and Old 97s musician/solo artist, Rhett Miller.

The conference, with its 12-hour days, offers classes and workshops in fiction writing, nonfiction, memoir, poetry, screenwriting and ghostwriting.

Dreams deferred

When Mr. Hill graduated from graduate school, he moved to New York City.

"I imagined myself becoming the hot young writer in the city. That turned out to be laughably wrong," he says.

When he wrote, he was focusing on what it could do for his career.

"The writing was really, really bad," he says. "It didn't have any feeling or heart. I was doing it for all the wrong reasons."

After receiving rejection after rejection,

he stopped writing for a while. Unsure what he was going to do with his life, he became obsessed with playing "World of Warcraft." He floundered.

He moved to Naples in 2006 for the teaching job at FGCU.

"I thought: I missed my shot. I guess this isn't going to happen for me," he says about writing a bestseller.

Ironically, it was the best thing that could've happened to him.

"I felt the freedom to write something that was idiosyncratically me, instead of pleasing agents and editors," he says. "I dropped out of New York publishing and querying and quietly wrote this book."

The 10-year process was "like tending a

little garden," he says.

"It was just something I could tend to for my hour or two a day and enjoy and get some everyday delight out of. That's where the humor in the book comes in. That was my prerequisite for writing a scene: I had to get some sort of delight or joy out of writing it. If there were no guarantees (it'd be published), I might as well enjoy writing it."

It was the first thing he'd do after waking up.

If he produced five handwritten pages in a morning, he considered that a success.

The man who used to write short little stories let his writing expand and unwind. Entire paragraphs and pages take diversions and side trips. Mr. Hill calls it jumping down a rabbit hole.

His powers of observation are keen, and often humorous.

He describes one character as carrying "himself in an erect and stiff and regal manner — it's like he thinks of himself as an expensive and tightly wrapped birthday present. His thin shoes are severe and Italian-looking and have little ski jumps at the tips ... The knot in his necktie is as tight and hard as an acorn."

He describes workers at Disney World as "smiling like drunk children. Like gnomes on Ecstasy." And the "It's a Small World" ride as "a horror of narcotized puppets doing the same rote tasks over and over in what I'm sure Disney totally did not intend to be an accurate and prescient vision of third world labor." And the park's Main Street USA as "this charming little street that multi-nationals like Disney helped annihilate in the real world."

Then there are sentences like this one: "Every life has a moment like this that breaks you into brand new pieces."

Mr. Hill transforms much of his own life into his fictionalized world. One of his main characters, a professor at a university, struggles with a student who hands in a plagiarized paper and a classroom of students who haven't done the reading.

He also mines his childhood.

His protagonist, Samuel, devours the Choose Your Own Adventure series of books and writes his own version, "The Castle of No Return," for a school project. Mr. Hill did the same thing as a youngster.

"The Nix" also has a section that contains a more adult version of Choose Your Own Adventure books. "I liked the game aspect of them," he says. "I liked that it was a book but also a game at the same time."

As a child, he says, he assumed there was one perfect way to get through the story and would always try to find it.

"I was writing about this character Samuel, that he would feel the same way, that he screws it up, but that he would want life to resemble a Choose Your Own Adventure story. It is a fun little moment in the book. Everything changes, the tone, the point of view, to shake up the book a little bit. I wanted to show that in certain crucial ways he still hasn't grown up, he's still playing games."

Mr. Hill also includes a chapter that contains a 10-page sentence.

In his hands, these things come across as clever, not gimmicky.

Success

The Nix of the title refers to a Norwegian ghost who would appear to children in the form of a white horse. Barely believing their luck, the children climbed on the horse's back and, after trotting and galloping around, the horse galloped off a cliff and the children died.

Samuel's Norwegian grandfather says the moral of the story is: Don't trust things that are too good to be true. But Samuel's mother thinks the moral is: The things you love most will one day hurt you the worst. The Nix, she tells her son, used to appear as a horse, but nowadays it appears as a person. "Usually it's someone you think you love," she says. "... People can be a Nix for each other."

Mr. Hill likes the title not only because it's the name of something but because it's

in the know

also a verb, as in "to nix something."

"I like the word play," he says.

In the book, three generations — Samuel, his mother and her father — look back at certain choices they made. "It's a theme that keeps repeating: certain choices that we make," Mr. Hill says. "A small moment somewhere can really change your life. But also, if you obsess on that small moment, you're not going to recognize or appreciate the life you actually have. Regret can cloud what is actually going on in your life; you start living in the narrow confines of regret, or the past, and it becomes a shell beyond which you can't see. Living with this regret has become a major part of their lives."

Since its release in late August, "The Nix" has received accolades and recognition far beyond Mr. Hill's expectations. It was a *New York Times* bestseller and the Book of the Month selection for Barnes & Noble, Powell's, GQ, Vogue, People, Indie Next and vulture.com. Publishers Weekly, New York magazine, Harper's Bazaar, Entertainment Weekly, the Huffington Post and Strand Bookstore all selected it as Best of the Season.

"The Nix" will go down as one of the best debut books of the year," the Dallas Morning News wrote.

"Hill has so much talent to burn that he can pull off just about any style, imagine himself into any person and convincingly portray any place or time. 'The Nix'

is hugely entertaining and unfailingly smart, and the author seems incapable of writing a pedestrian sentence or spinning a boring story," wrote Teddy Wayne in a *New York Times* Book Review, calling "The Nix" "the love child of Thomas Pynchon and David Foster Wallace."

Mr. Hill's been compared to novelist John Irving, and Mr. Irving turned around and compared Mr. Hill to Charles Dickens.

The book will be published worldwide in more than 20 languages, including German, French, Italian, Greek, Finnish and Norwegian.

The overwhelming positive response "has been great, a dream come true," Mr. Hill says. "I think all this attention would've messed with my head if I was 25 years old, but I'm 40 and have gone through a lot of life. In a kind of everyday way, (life) hasn't changed too much."

He's intensely aware as he works on his second novel, he says, that "when I go to sit down and work with that blank page, that blank page does not care how much attention I've gotten."

Instead of writing about drugs, gore and violence, as he did when younger, he now writes about what he knows.

"Sometimes, the most dramatic moments come from the smallest things, the little worries, anxieties, the things in your day-to-day life that you're worried about," he says, "and I think those are the things that actually make for great fiction."

"The weird thing about fiction is that some of the most intimate stuff turns out to be the most universal." ■

Pitching an agent topic of panel

For writers, talking to literary agents is a mixed bag: You want win their approval, but the very thought can be daunting, if not terrifying.

"I'm very approachable; come over and say hi and tell me what you're working on," says JL Stermer of New Leaf Literary & Media. She's one of three agents participating on a panel at the Sanibel Island Writers Conference, joining Nicole Tourtelot and Christopher Schelling.

Ms. Stermer recognizes that agents often make writers nervous.

"We're busy, there's no way around that," she says, "but sometimes people misinterpret curttness and expediency with not-niceness."

Writers, she says, go through a lot of different emotions at once: "You're excited about your project, nervous about pitching it. You're feeling sensitive, and if you're not getting a warm, engaged reaction, it can be hard and it can be scary," she acknowledges.

"Sometimes I'm cold-calling people (when pitching writers' proposals), so I get it," she adds. "There's a misperception that agents are too busy for you, not interested, and maybe don't care, when the truth of the matter is, we're here to find clients. Agents are not as scary as you might think they are. They just have a lot on their plates."

She receives more than 100 queries a month, but says she gets most of her projects through referral or "me just being out and about ... My eyes are always open, and I always have busi-

ness cards with me. I'm interested in being with people, learning what they're excited about."

Being an agent, she adds, is not a 9-to-5 job. "I feel I'm always working."

She attends "a handful" of writing conferences every year and first attended the Sanibel Island Writers Conference two years ago. "It's good energy there," she says. "Everything runs so smoothly, and (conference director) Tom (DeMarchi) is amazing ... People come to work and have a good time. That vibe is right there from when you arrive."

Ms. Stermer, who specializes in non-fiction, is interested in books that are

part of the current zeitgeist, including: comedy, LGBTQ issues, social justice, memoirs, lifestyle, pop culture. And she looks for books to which she reacts emotionally.

"I need to feel," she says. "I need to laugh, cry, get angry, be curious." For every agent, she adds, choosing a book is a subjective thing, a matter of matching up the right writer with the right idea with an agent who's on the same wavelength and can sell the book. "If it's not for me, it's not for me," she says. "I don't want to waste my time or your time."

"It's a numbers game. It's totally like dating — I use that analogy all the time." ■

It was a dark and stormy night . . .

If you've never seen "The Rocky Horror Show" and have no idea what it's about, the sign in the lobby of the Sugden Community Theatre provides your first hint that this isn't your typical show.

"Ladies and gentlemen, please refrain from touching or manhandling the actors. Violations of this will result in immediate removal from the audience," it reads.

Then, right at the entrance to the theater, another sign: "This production is rated R for strong sexual content and contains fog, a strobe effect and a non-tobacco vapor cigarette."

Don't say you haven't been warned.

I attended on a Friday night, because they're "participatory nights," which means the audience interacts with the actors (minus touching and manhandling). It is, truly, the best way to experience "Rocky Horror," because as a show itself, it's not that remarkable.

It's a spoof of a grade B sci-fi movie mixed with some kink.

Just-engaged sweethearts Brad and Janet get a flat tire on their way home from a friend's wedding. Of course, it's nighttime and it's raining. They make their way to a nearby castle to use their phone, but the castle turns out to be the laboratory of a mad scientist who calls himself "a sweet transsexual from Transsexual, Transylvania." A la Dr. Frankenstein, he's bought a man to life ... only this is a muscle man, Rocky, and he's created him to be his own living sex toy. The doctor favors corsets, fishnet stockings and high heels, an outfit that was much more racy back in the mid-1970s when this show was first staged.

(Today the term "transvestite," of course, is considered pejorative, and only used by the ignorant and/or hostile.)

"Rocky Horror" started out in 1973 in London's West End. In 1975 it was made into a movie, "The Rocky Horror Picture Show" starring Tim Curry, Susan Sarandon, Barry Bostwick and Meat Loaf. It could have sunk into obscurity, but instead it became a cult favorite, with midnight showings and over-the-top audience participation.

I remember seeing the movie at midnight in the Village in New York. Everyone dressed as their favorite characters and re-enacted scenes in the aisles and on the stage itself, in front of the silver

screen. When someone onscreen said, "I propose a toast," scores of slices of toast sailed through the air. At a wedding scene, everyone threw rice.

Set responses are to be shouted at the actors. Whenever Brad's name is spoken, you're supposed to yell, "Asshole!" And at the mention of Janet's name, "Slut!"

Some of this happened at the Sugden on Friday night.

Some attendees dressed up. I saw a couple of pink boas, a gold sparkly top hat. One woman wore a French maid's outfit. No pointy party hats, though.

Director/choreographer Dawn Lebrecht Fornara has gone all out with this show and has done an excellent job. She has the Phantoms slink about in the lobby prior to the show, silent and skulking. They roam the theater itself, too, as theatergoers find their seats, pausing to glow at one patron and then another.

Costume designer Dot Auchmoody also outdid herself. While one Phantom looks like Billy Idol from outer space, others are more goth or like attendees at a leathermen convention.

Misha Ritter, one of the Phantoms, gives the pre-curtain talk. Dressed in black with silver studs and wielding a riding crop, she proceeds to bark directions to the audience like a dominatrix. Brash and definitely in control, she gave one of the more entertaining pre-show speeches I've seen. In fact, I wish she'd do them for other shows as well. Wouldn't that be great for "My Fair Lady," I couldn't help thinking.

However, my heart sank at some of the instructions she doled out. If you bring anything from home to throw, as most "Rocky Horror" devotees do, you'll be evicted if you throw it. That means no

rice, no toast, no water pistols (to recreate the rain scenes). You can only throw items from a \$5 bag you can purchase in the lobby. And if you do lob anything, you can't send it toward the stage, the actors or the orchestra pit. Which kind of takes the fun out of everything.

The only way you can throw something? Up and back. She had us repeat that a couple of times.

I felt sorry for the people in the rear of the theater who would wind up getting pelted with everything — until I realized that there was really nothing in the bag to throw.

The venue, probably nervous about patrons getting hit with projectiles and possible litigation, pretty much de-fanged the show in that regard.

But thank God the crowd was wonderfully raucous and rowdy.

Jim Corsica, stiff and somber, acts as the Narrator, reciting his lines dutifully. He plays off the audience at times, adlibbing with a straight face. (After a particularly thunderous shouting of "Slut!" when Janet's name was mentioned, he said, "Oh, I see you know her.")

Mark Vanagas plays Dr. Frank-N-Furter with manic glee. It's a role he was born for, portraying the mad doctor as if Bette Davis had a dominatrix outfit and a penis. He makes grand entrances; near the end, when he descends a staircase as if he were Dolly Levi, you practically expect the cast to burst out singing, "Hello, Dolly!"

Amy Hughes, as a perky and flirty usherette, opens the show with "Science Fiction." And Jesse Hughes and Jasmine Vizena as Brad and Janet are suitably square and naïve. Their harmonies in "Over at the Frankenstein Place" are particularly lovely.

Rocky (Michael Pineda) makes up in muscles what he might lack vocally, and during a lackluster "Hot Patootie" number, his gyrations on the side of the stage were more fun to watch than the lead singer.

Charles Fornara's band, heavy on horns (sax, trumpet, trombone), acquitted themselves admirably, playing the rock/pop music with zeal.

Ms. Fornara's choreography is especially fun and inventive. At one point, during "Damn It, Janet," the Phantoms spell out her name with their bodies. They also morph into a car, using their bodies as windshield wipers and doors that open and close.

The set (Sam Gonzalez and Mark Santos) is suitably creepy (coffin-shaped front door and inside window) and sexy (the levers of the doctor's machinery look like dildos.) It's an impressive, but unfortunately the upper tiers block sightlines and some action can only be seen from the center seats.

The Time Warp Dance was a highlight of the show, but not many in the audience participated.

It was a lively evening, even when (as always happens) things began to lag. It's all silliness, anyway, not meant to be taken seriously — though the affirmation "don't dream it, be it" is thrown in at the end.

The audience I saw it with contained a few die-hard fans who shouted out the responses. (And apparently they've evolved over the decades, because when the doctor motioned to someone to take off his bloodied gloves, someone shouted out, "Here, give these back to OJ Simpson!") That's the type of show it is. If this offends you, it's not for you.)

If you plan to see "Rocky Horror," I suggest going on a participatory Friday night, because the theater off-stage is as much fun as the theater on-stage. But remember, you won't be allowed to throw anything.

It's crude, rude and definitely juvenile. But not half as edgy as it was when it began.

What's that quote attributed to Yogi Berra? Nostalgia ain't what it used to be. ■







CONTRACT BRIDGE

Risky business

BY STEVE BECKER

There are hands where declarer might appear to be subjecting himself to an unnecessary risk during the play. Yet when these hands are later analyzed, it often can be demonstrated that the so-called risk was not really a risk at all, since it improved declarer's chances without exposing him to any greater jeopardy than he already faced.

Consider this deal where South was in four spades and the defense started by taking the first three club tricks. East then shifted to the heart queen, taken by South with the ace.

Declarer cashed the A-K of trumps and then abandoned further trump leads, leaving the jack outstanding. Next he played the A-K of diamonds and a third diamond to the queen. After West discarded a heart, South led his last diamond, ruffed it with dummy's last trump, ruffed a heart in his hand and scored the last two tricks with the Q-6 of spades.

It might seem that declarer was living dangerously when he began playing diamonds while a trump was still out, since one of the diamonds might have been ruffed. Nevertheless, South's line of play was absolutely correct.

If declarer had drawn a third round of trumps, he would have made the contract only if the opposing diamonds were divided 3-3, and he would have failed against the actual distribution. By playing as he did, though, declarer would not only make the contract if the diamonds were 3-3 — in which case he

would have drawn the last trump before cashing his fourth diamond — but also if the player with the greater diamond length held the missing jack of trumps, as in the actual case.

Of course, if the diamonds were divided unevenly and the player with the diamond shortness held the jack of trumps, South would have gone down one. But in that case, the contract could not be made regardless of what he did. ■

'Jack Reacher: Never Go Back'

Everything about "Jack Reacher: Never Go Back" is too easy. Ex-soldier turned vagabond do-gooder Jack (Tom Cruise) knocks out bad guys with two punches, sometimes even fewer. He gets himself and Major Susan Turner (Cobie Smulders) out of a military prison without much resistance. He pieces together clues in no time just by thinking about them. He forms an instant bond with Samantha (Danika Yarosh), who may or may not be his daughter. Heck, for a movie titled "Never Go Back," it sure is easy to get him back into military offices in Washington, D.C. — all it takes is the allure of dinner with Turner.


The point is, if everything feels like it's on cruise control (pun intended) and there's little in terms of hardship and adversity, then director Edward Zwick ("The Last Samurai") isn't giving the audience much to watch. This is a serviceable, average and unimpressive movie, the kind you bypass in theaters and catch on a random night at home when there's nothing else to watch.

The plot, lazy and predictable and twist-less as it is, is not a direct sequel to the far superior 2012 original. Turner and Reacher are framed for murder. Crooked military higher-ups believe the two know too much about black market dealings and need to be silenced. Tagging along as Turner and Reacher avoid authorities and beat up inept henchmen is 15-year-old Samantha, a teenage girl who acts just like a teenage girl. The problem is a teenage girl doesn't belong in this story. There's no need for her; her contributions are minimal, and all she does is give Reacher one more thing to worry about. It's not that Ms. Yarosh's performance is bad, it's that everything about her character is superfluous.

The script by Mr. Zwick, Richard Wenk and Marshall Herskovitz is so inert that the main bad guy (Patrick Heusinger) doesn't even have a name. Perhaps this is how Lee Child's novel on

which the movie is based also depicts the villain — I don't know. But I do know that a nameless enemy, though menacing, is less interesting, especially with no other personality quirks. Worse, the action is scant and mediocre. Car and foot chases strain for originality, and the fistfights are over quickly. Granted, the story does have some interesting moments, but they are too few.

The one thing the film gets right is the personality of Turner, who's essentially a female Reacher. Tough and disciplined, she can hold her own with the bad guys. At one point she and Reacher argue about who's going out to find information and who's going to stay




home with Samantha. Given how Tom Cruise-based the movie is (he's also a producer), kudos to him for sharing the spotlight with a female, and to Ms. Smulders for playing it convincingly.

If only that were enough to make "Jack Reacher: Never Go Back" worth seeing. It is not. But at least it's a redeeming virtue in a picture that's otherwise completely forgettable. ■

'Heart and Crown' chairs sit well with American furniture collectors

Several rare "Heart and Crown" side chairs were sold at a 2016 Skinner auction in Massachusetts. The high-back chair with molded bannisters, turned legs and a rush seat are part of an old tradition. Furniture makers in Connecticut created this style and used it from about 1740 to 1770. Almost all of the Heart and Crown chairs were painted black or dark brown and all had the rush seat. A chair 44¾ inches high and attributed to Andrew Durand of Milford, Conn., auctioned for \$9,000, three times the estimate.

Q: My aunt gave me a set of dishes that were a wedding present to her. She died about five years ago at the age of 90, so I think this set must be 70 to 75 years old. They are marked "Lifetime China Co., semi-vitreous, Alliance, Ohio, Jade Rose." They also are stamped "Nautilus, Made in U.S.A." What could I expect to get if I sold this set?

A: Your aunt's dishes aren't as old as you think. The name "Lifetime China Co." was used from 1953 to 1968 by a distributor associated with Cunningham and Pickett and Associated Companies in Alliance. It sold products made by other companies. These Jade Rose dishes were made by Homer Laughlin on the Nautilus shape. Dinnerware sets are hard to sell and some consignment

shops won't even take them. Plates sell online for as little as \$5. A platter could cost \$35.

Q: I'd like the name of a reputable person who possibly could review a card and signature by Laura I. Wilder and provide a Certificate of Authenticity.

A: The value of an autograph depends on the fame of the person and rarity. It is also determined by how it is written. If it's part of a handwritten letter, it's usually worth more than the same person's autograph on a card or scrap of paper. In 2014, a note on the back of a Christmas card written and signed by Laura Ingalls Wilder, the author of "Little House on the Prairie" books, sold at auction for \$1,875. Two of her books with her handwritten signature sold in one lot for over \$3,000 in 2012. She usually wrote out "Ingalls" and didn't use just an initial. If the autograph you have is just an initial, it may not be authentic. You can find places that authenticate autographs online, or you can contact an expert at an auction house that sells autographs.

Q: I have an Australian military spoon I believe to be from World War II. The Australian Army Rising Sun logo with the King's Crown stamped on the top of the handle dates it to pre-1953. On the back of the spoon, it reads "Made in Japan." What can you tell me

A: There are seven different versions of the Australian Rising Sun badge. The badge originally was designed for the Australian military that served in South Africa during the Second Boer War and was worn on a slouch hat. The first version, used beginning in February 1902, was based on an early design of the crown with swords and triangular bayonets around it. On the second version in April 1902, the swords and bayonets were replaced by rays of various lengths. The third version was used after April 1904. The words "Made in Japan" were used between 1921 and 1945, and again from 1952 to the present. The Australian military wouldn't have used something made in Japan during World War II, so the spoon probably was made before 1941.

Q: I heard the Princess Diana Beanie Baby is worth a lot of money. I have one of the purple bears with the heart-shaped swing tag that reads "Princess." It also has a poem commemorating Princess Diana. It's in perfect condition. What is it worth?

A: Ty Warner started making stuffed toys in 1991. The first Beanie Babies were made in 1993. The "Princess" Beanie Baby was introduced in October 1997, two months after Princess Diana was killed in a car crash. Profits from the sale were donated to the Diana, Princess of Wales Memorial Fund. Retail-

ers received shipments of the bears from Ty in limited quantities, driving up demand, and prices rose on the secondary market. There are slight differences in the tags and stuffing in different editions of the bear. Early editions were stuffed with polyvinyl chloride (PVC) pellets. The company began using polyethylene pellets in 1998. The tag on the bear's tush tells which stuffing was used. Most editions of this bear sell for \$10 to about \$30. Don't look to online sellers to establish value. Remember, a seller can ask whatever he wants, looking for a gullible buyer. Check listings that have sold after several bids to get a more realistic idea of the bear's value. Although you may see a "first-edition" Princess Beanie Baby advertised for sale online for as much as \$500,000, it won't sell for that. Most first-edition Princess Beanie Babies sell for less than \$50.

Tip: Don't put a decorative runner or vase on your wooden table if it is in sunlight. Eventually the finish will fade around the ornaments and leave a shadow of the items on the wood. ■







Can you can wine?

I recently received a few samples of wine that comes in a can. Upon reflection, I concluded that wine can reasonably be stored in any kind of nonreactive container, even a can.

In fact, I've seen wines that come in cute plastic individual wine tumblers with a stem and everything. So there's really no good reason, aside from tradition and maybe a bit of snobbishness, that wine can't be placed in a convenient, airtight can. It works for beer.

The issue, however, is not the preservation of the beverage, but the quality. These days, winemakers are appealing strongly to millennials by developing cutesy names and packages for all kinds of wine. In a previous column, I noted the new "Loco" wines from Spain that come wrapped in an adorable little straitjacket. A bit extreme, perhaps, but they do get attention.

The market for canned wine more than doubled in the past year and amounted to over \$6 million in sales. A drop in the wine bucket compared to the overall industry, but a fivefold increase over 2012.

As we know, cans are especially efficient at containing bubbly beverages, so

it's no surprise that most of the increase came from sparkling wines like mini-Champagnes, and easy drinking casual wines, such as rosé.

Recent consumer surveys stress the desirability of keeping the wine at the proper temperature and being able to take it just about anywhere. So there's quite a bit to be said for packaging wine this way. You can take it all kinds of places without having to lug heavy bottles or large ice chests. But the big question, of course, is this: Is the stuff any good?

The answer is a qualified yes. Most of us are not going to take a \$200 bottle to the beach or the parking lot outside the stadium, so the quality of most canned wines is in the middle range, which is OK. A few that I received are reviewed below, along with other new recommendations. Sample widely.

■ **Seven Daughters Moscato Veneto NV (\$14.99/4-pack cans)** - A slightly fizzy white with a light lemon color and tutti-frutti flavors on the palate. A bit sweet, with a sugar cane flavor on the finish. This would go well with spicy foods. WW 88.

■ **Seven Daughters Pinot Noir NV (\$14.99/4-pack cans)** - A bit richer-looking than some Pinots, offering flavors of wood, smoke and earth, which is not typical of New World wines. A nice surprise, and tastes a bit more expensive than it is. WW 90.

■ **Michael David Freakshow Lodi 2013 (\$20)** - Big, rich and inky in the glass, aromas of charred oak, bold black fruit flavors and a really interesting label design. WW 90.

■ **Côte Mas Blanc Méditerranée Languedoc 2015 (\$11)** - Interesting blend of Grenache Blanc, Vermentino, Chardonnay and Sauvignon Blanc, with flavors and aromas of hyacinth, melon and citrus. This would go well with cream sauce dishes. We drank the whole bottle. WW 91.

■ **Edmeades Zinfandel Mendocino 2013 (\$20)** - Rich black fruit and hints of cinnamon. Great with barbecue and sweet spicy sauces. WW 89.

■ **Château du Taillan Médoc 2012 (\$18)** - Traditional blend of Merlot, Cabernet Sauvignon and Cabernet Franc,

aged 12 months in oak. Red cherry on the nose, with pronounced vanilla on the palate and a slight bit of sweetness. WW 91.

Ask the Wine Whisperer

Q: I'd like to take a few bottles of my favorite wines on an upcoming trip, but of course, airlines won't allow them on board. What's the best way to ship my wine as checked baggage?

— Peter H., Bonita Springs

A: There are several ways to solve this problem. First is to buy a piece of luggage made especially for the purpose, such as a SkyCrate, which is what I use. It holds up to 12 regular-size bottles and is practically indestructible, but it's fairly large and mainly for professionals. If you order wine online, you can use the shipping box in which you receive your bottles. The styrofoam or "egg crate" inserts will protect them just fine. You can also tuck a few wine bottles in your regular luggage by sealing them in leakproof padded plastic sleeves like the Wine Skin, the VinniBag or the Travelon inflatable pouch. These are all available at most wine stores or online. ■

Big Hickory still reeling in seafood lovers with fruity favorites

I've been revisiting some old favorites in Bonita Springs lately, anticipating the onset of season — and the competition for parking spaces and restaurant tables that ushers in. Driving west on Bonita Beach Road last week, I noticed hot spots like Coconut Jack's Waterfront Grille and The Fish House already are packing in diners.

Big Hickory Seafood Grille is a little more off the beaten path, being tucked into an old bayside marina on a quiet stretch of Hickory Boulevard. The restaurant wasn't too busy when we arrived in the early evening of a weeknight, and the marine-themed dining room remained deserted. That's because diners eager to enjoy the first cool breezes after summer's stifling heat and humidity — as well as the expansive view of boats, mangrove islands and birds on the air and in the water — made a beeline for the open-air deck.

Marina restaurants in general are not often known as great dining destinations. Often they stick to basic, convenient fare such as fish sandwiches and burgers for boaters docking for a quick meal between fishing runs. Not so at Big Hickory Seafood Grille, which is a destination in itself. A casual setting with serious food, Big Hickory enjoys a reputation for award-winning dishes that play with local seafood and fruit. Think plantain-crusting grouper with banana-infused sauce and shrimp tacos drizzled with Key lime aioli.

The popularity of such signature items might explain why the menu has not changed much over the years. However, Big Hickory did have a "Lobtoberfest" promotion running this month to celebrate Maine lobster. Brown butter lobster sliders? (\$12.50) Yes, please. We started with those and the mussels and clams Chardonnay (\$18), along with 16-ounce drafts of Red Nook Ale (\$4.25). We thought maybe it was a misspelling of Red Hook, but our server insisted it was a Florida brew. We could not find it online.

The beer and wine selection is fairly limited. There are four whites and three red wines, offered in quarter-, half- and full-liter servings.

The three small rolls stuffed with chunks of warm lobster were simply dressed with brown butter vinaigrette,

a nice, slightly nutty alternative to the classic mayo-based lobster roll (which Big Hickory also has for \$21). There was a good amount of fresh-tasting meat in each roll, which was kind of surprising for the price. The mussels and clams, on the other hand, seemed a bit overpriced. The handful of Pine Island clams were puny and outnumbered by the mussels, which were a little more substantial in size. We liked the tasty broth so much that we sopped it up with bread. Chardonnay turned out to be a good pairing, complementing the butter, garlic, onion and cilantro in the broth.

Those appetizers were impressively quick to arrive, which was not true of the rest of the meal. The restaurant appeared to have ample servers on duty to handle the growing crowd, but service slowed noticeably.

Our entrees included house salads, which were mindfully composed. A mix of fresh red and green lettuces and chard

was topped with grape tomatoes, julienned carrots, sliced cucumbers and slivered red onion.

There are a half-dozen sandwiches, including shrimp po'boy, prime rib and crab cake on kaiser rolls or pretzel buns. For lighter appetites, an equal number of salads can be upgraded with fish, shrimp or chicken for an additional \$6 to \$9.

From the menu of signature items, we opted for the Mahi Coco Loco (\$29) and apple-mango grouper (\$32), both of which are old standbys.

The former was a 6-ounce fillet coated in shredded coconut and panko crumbs and topped with a pineapple and coconut rum beurre blanc sauce with chunks of fruit. That might sound like a lot of coconut, but the sweet flesh did not overwhelm the main attraction of the crisply crusted yet moist fish. Rice and steamed broccoli and cauliflower completed the plate nicely. This dish is still a winner.

The same sides came with the grouper,

an 8-ounce fillet drizzled with a passion fruit sauce and topped with apple-mango salsa. The salsa fruits were diced a little too finely to yield significant bursts of flavor, but the passion fruit certainly added a lot of tang to the plate. The pan-seared fish was perfectly moist and flaky.

We finished with a wedge of moist carrot cake (\$6.50) and good coconut cream pie with buttery crust (\$6.50).

Standing by tried-and-true dishes year after year might be considered resting on one's laurels. On the other hand, the folks behind Big Hickory have a formula that "ain't broke" — so why try to "fix" it? ■



ivate lobby, the sandy tones, natural woods, and lustrous surfaces will evoke a sense of being beachside. A high-backed shelter sofa upholstered in a bisque fabric will be set against faux-finished walls that display clear glass beads reminiscent of bubbles rising from the water.




Kalea Bay's first tower hits construction milestone

Clubhouse also under construction
