to know the Portuguese people and culture.



display will feature two Portuguese Air Force F-16 Fighting Falcon aircraft, one P-3 Orion, a Puma helicopter and a Casa 212-100 Aviocar, while the U.S. Air Force will present a C-130 Hercules, a C-5 Galaxy, a KC-135 Stratotanker, two F-16 Fighting Falcons and a C-21.

The aircraft's static display will also include two civilian aircraft, one from SATA-Air Azores and a small private aircraft.

Forwarding a bad e-mail makes you just as guilty

E-mail makes communication global and easy. The Air Force takes advantage of the internet's instant accessibility and provides free access in order to accomplish the mission. Yet fingertip correspondence is too often used for unofficial business and even inappropriate chatter.

A recent e-mail caught the attention of wing leadership at several bases. The e-mail originated within the company grade officer group at a state-side base, but was then forwarded and forwarded to thousands of people, most of whom added comments along the way. The initial inappropriate banter escalated into descriptive insults, sexually explicit remarks, and racial comments. Several people who made comments were punished and others who simply forwarded the e-mail chain were rebuked.

"When you get an inappropriate e-mail, the best policy is just to delete it," said Capt. Tony Spratley, 65th Air Base Wing legal office. "Even though you didn't originate the e-mail, you become just as guilty if you forward it on."

The Air Force has detailed regulations regarding electronic messaging. Air Force Instruction 33-129 says messages are prohibited if they adversely reflect on the Department of Defense or the Air Force such as chain letters or unofficial soliciting.

Even more specifically, it is illegal to store, process, display, send, or otherwise transmit offensive or obscene language or material. Offensive material includes, but is not limited to, "hate literature" such as racist literature, materials or symbols; sexually harassing materials, pornography and other sexually explicit materials.

Unofficial uses that exceed the authorized purposes may result in adverse ad-

ministrative or disciplinary action.

There have been several cases of inappropriate computer usage here at Lajes with punishments ranging from letters of reprimand to Article 15's.

Arguments have been made regarding first amendment rights and the expression of free speech. Captain Spratley explains that there are restrictions for members of the military. "The Supreme Court has held that the military can place limitations on speech so that the commander can maintain good order and discipline."

For military members, failure to observe AFIs constitute a violation of Article 92 of the Uniform Code of Military Justice. Civilian employees who fail to observe the same provisions are subject to administrative disciplinary action.

Article 92 is failure to obey an order or regulation and holds a maximum punishment of a dishonorable discharge, forfeiture of all pay and allowances and up to two years confinement.

Sending inappropriate e-mail may also be punishable under Article 134, service-discrediting behavior. "If you send a sexually explicit e-mail to someone off base, you're making the Air Force look bad," said the captain. "People don't realize that they're sending this stuff using computer resources and internet services which are all paid for by taxpayer dollars.

"They're breaking the law," he said. "They don't know it, but they are."

Article 134 describes 'indecent' language of that which is grossly offensive

to modesty, decency, or propriety or shocks the moral sense, because of its vulgar, filthy, or disgusting nature, or its tendency to incite lustful thought.

Air Force instructions are very specific. AFI 33-119 makes it clear that one cannot cause congestion on the network by such things as the propagation of chain

letters, junk e-mail, and broadcasting inappropriate messages to groups or individuals.

Many may remember a prohibition on e-mailing pictures shortly after the events of 9/11 to prevent congestion on the network.

In addition, users are not allowed

to access commercial web mail accounts and instant messaging services like Yahoo, AOL, or MSN mail accounts.

And most importantly, it is forbidden to send harassing, intimidating, abusive, or offensive material to, or about, others.

Although jokes and humorous messages are often a tension reliever at work, "when sent via government e-mail, they lose their humor and become inappropriate," said Col. Danny Leonard, 65th Air Base Wing vice commander.

All government communications systems are subject to monitoring. Members of the Air Force or civilian employees may use a government-provided messaging system for official or authorized use only. Any other use is prohibited.

"When you're using government e-mail, you're representing the Air Force in some way, shape or form," said the colonel. "Be careful with e-mail."

Career Job Reservations

A CJR is a reservation for continued service in the Air Force within a specific Air Force Specialty Code.

The Air Force Personnel Center uses the CJR to balance manning in a particular AFSC. Some AFSCs do not have enough CJRs for the amount of first term-Airmen projected to reenlist. These AFSCs are considered "constraint." Members in a "constraint" AFSC will be placed on a waiting list and will have to compete for those CJRs

based on monthly quotas using a rank order process. The purpose of constraint AFSCs is to help balance Air Force requirements between non-stressed and stressed career fields. It is highly encouraged that all members in a "constraint" AFSC, at a minimum, consider looking into retraining possibilities. This is to prevent premature separation if the member does not receive a CJR and has planned on making the Air Force a career. Ask Ed: Instructions for traffic tickets

Question: What procedures do the U.S. citizens stationed at Lajes Field need to follow when issued traffic citations both on and off base?

Answer: American nationals assigned to Lajes who commit a traffic violation off base such as speeding, talking on the cell phone without using a headset device while driving, illegal parking, etc., will receive a traffic citation notification from the local Portuguese Security Police via the U.S. Security Forces Squadron staff translator, Ms. São Santos.

Ms. Santos will in turn notify the

American driver to come to the 65th SFS and sign the traffic citation. The violator will have 20 duty days to pay the fine at one of the Portuguese post offices off-base.

In the case of a speeding citation, the vehicle's owner will also be asked to go to the 65th SFS and identify the driver shown in the speeding ticket's photo. If the driver cannot be positively identified, the vehicle's owner will always be responsible and penalized by the traffic violation even if he/she was not driving the vehicle at the time.

If the traffic violation occurs on base, the citation will be sent to a staff translator at the joint Portuguese/U.S. Security Defense Coordination Center to be translated. The transgressor will

then be asked to go the SDCC and sign a document acknowledging he/she was informed of the contents of the violation and the number of points issued to him/her.

The accumulation of eight points during one year period will result in the revocation of driving privileges on base for one month.

Individuals who are issued traffic citations and don't agree with them may refute those through their organization's chain of command in a letter addressed to the 65th Security Forces' administration.

Portuguese man-of-war

Native jellyfish poses threat

One type of jellyfish found in the waters off Terceira has a name native to this region.

The Portuguese man-of-war got its name because it looks like a Portuguese battleship with a sail.

The species of jellyfish can be harmful to people who come in contact with it as one Lajes member recently found out.

Four-year old Donovan, son of Staff Sgt. Joseph Range, 65th Communications Squadron, was stung by a Portuguese man-of-war May 26 at Praia Beach.

"This is the first time we have seen a jellyfish or MOW," Sergeant Range said. "Last year we went to the beach all the time and never saw one."

The man-of-war's body consists of a gas-filled float, like a bladder, which may be 3 to 12 inches long and extend as much as 6 inches above the water. They are primarily translucent with pink, blue or purple hues.

The MOW is made up of four individual types of polyps with tentacles of up to 165 feet in length.

"Broken or dead tentacles may still provide a harmful sting," explained Staff Sgt. Brian Wray, 65th Medical Operations Squadron, public health NCOIC.

Sergeant Range was wor-

ried when his son was stung.

"I've heard bad things about the Portuguese man-of-war," he said.

"I wouldn't wish this on anyone," Sergeant Range added. "The Portuguese man-of-war sting is supposed to be the most painful out of 2000 species of jellyfish."

Some of the mild symptoms associated with a Portuguese man-of-war sting include itching, stinging, burning, redness, rash, long welt lines and aching pain which can last from minutes to hours, according to public health officials here.

In some instances, the symptoms can be more severe, including anaphylactic shock, joint pain, blisters, small white lesions, altered levels of consciousness, respiratory distress and cardiac arrest.

The Portuguese man-of-war is often confused with a jellyfish and may lead to improper treatment of stings, because the poison is different.

The first step in treating a sting is to leave the water immediately. The next is to remove the man of war to prevent firing of more capsules.

Some of the medical advice was conflicting, including the use of fresh water or vinegar, but one thing all sources had in common to treat a MOW sting is to rinse the sting with salt water.

Ice or heat packs can be used to help with the pain as well.

Precautions to take when

coming in contact with the Portuguese man-of-war include not touching it with bare hands, not rubbing the area with wet sand or a towel, or not using alcohol, or vinegar, according to Sergeant Wray.

The most common result of contact with the Portuguese man-of-war is the whiplike, red wavy, stringy welts on the skin from contact with the blue tentacle. The lesions can last for minutes to hours.

Portuguese man-of-wars are not always obvious in the water.

Additionally, tentacles may break away in the surf and inflict stings just as potent as those from attached tentacles.

To prevent being stung, do not touch these animals with bare skin and do not enter the



water if they are present.

Donovan said he would go back to the beach, but he doesn't plan on going in the water anymore.
