TREASURE COAST – If your home has suffered flood damage, here are some steps to help you stay safe.

Hopefully you have flood insurance. If you don't, some or all of your damage will not be covered by insurance.

Check for and document damage

Check for structural damage and other hazards before re-entering your home. Contact the appropriate professionals immediately if you suspect damage to water, gas, electric, and sewer lines. Throw away food that has come in contact with floodwaters. Boil water until authorities declare the water supply safe

Food Bank receives boost

TREASURE COAST – The Treasure Coast Food Bank has seen the influx of a pair of women who are here to boost the efforts of the organization. The two women – Meg Buckley of St. Louis, Mo., who holds a Masters of Public Health degree from St. Louis University, and Paige Shortsleeves, a graduate of Colby College in Waterville, Maine, who holds a double major in Biology and Sociology – are part of a group of 16 people who earned their positions through the National Congressional Hunger Center.

That organization send people throughout the country to work on similar hunger-fighting projects via the Emerson National Hunger Fellowship Program.

Treasure Coast Food Bank was one of only 11 organizations nationwide to be selected for the fellowship, and the two arrived in the middle of last week, oddly enough just in time to deal with preparations for Hurricane Irma. Neither had ever experienced a hurricane before, and they were able to jump right in and help TCFB prepare.

"We got a welcome party, we just met everyone, and so far my impression is that it's a really

great organization and I can say with confidence that I am excited to be working here and there are a lot of intelligent, hard-working people I am going to learn a lot from, professionally," said Ms. Buckley.

"It's interesting to watch them ramping up for the hurricane, because in Maine we have snow and we don't have hurricanes," Ms. Shortsleeves said. "In watching this organization, I think of all the things you have to go into with your food provider because you can't go anywhere; you can't leave because people are depending on you.

FORT PIERCE – Sebastian Suarez, a senior at Lincoln Park Academy in Fort Pierce, earned the Congressional Award Gold Medal. 

Nonprofit helps families spay and neuter pets

TREASURE COAST – A new Florida nonprofit organization has popped up that works to spay and neuter animals for low-income families in the quad-county area. Operation S.O.S. – standing for Sterilization Outreach Services – is operated by Dr. Julie Kittams and her staff. Formed in late 2016 and fully functional in the spring of 2017, the organization has performed over 650 spay or neuter surgeries for dogs and cats in just a handful of months.

Based in the Treasure Coast, Operation S.O.S. sponsors a team of a Florida-licensed veterinarian and two veterinary technicians that travels in a 35-foot mobile surgical clinic to pre-designated locations in Martin, St. Lucie, Indian River and Okeechobee counties. The group offers its spay/neuter services to income-qualified residents in an effort to help them keep their pets from breeding.

In order to receive the services, pet owners must meet qualifications that cover a broad spectrum: Medicare or Medicaid, Social Security, disability, veteran status, taxes showing income below national poverty level, WIC, school lunch, food stamps, Student ID, food stamps, House of Hope client. Pet owners must show proof of meeting these qualifications.

The cost for surgery is \$100 for dogs and \$50 for cats, and these services can range up to \$300 or more for other veterinarians. The price also includes a rabies vaccination/certificate and 24-hour PetWatch microchip.

Pet qualifications include that the animal is between 2 to 80 pounds in weight, be between 8 weeks and 10 years of age, males must have both testicles descended and dogs must be presented on leash. Cats can be in a carrier or a pillow case


Dr. Kittams has worked in the many facets of veterinarian care including private practice, emergency care, shelter medicine and community outreach. She has also worked in low income areas of Alaska and New Mexico, and in 2003 spent two months in Thailand to help sterilize stray dogs with a team of vets from around the globe.

“I think that’s where – in her heart – she got the desire to work against overpopulation and start Operation S.O.S.” said Board of Directors Vice President Scott Coccoli. “During her 20 years in the profession she has helped pet owners with varying incomes, but really seems to gravitate to people who are in need. So, the organization targets the low-income residents to give them a hand.”

In addition, her knowledge in animal care and welfare – of what works and what is not effective practices – comes from her time in Portland, Oregon just prior to moving to the Treasure Coast. Portland animal care organizations have been able to join forces and work together, use technology to track data and areas in need of services and officials have passed ordinances that help animals and communities. Operation S.O.S. has already started work here on the Treasure Coast to mirror Portland’s model, for example being one of the three contracted veterinarian service providers for the City of Fort

Pierce’s new Trap, Neuter, Vaccinate and Release feral/community cat ordinance.

Operation S.O.S. makes the spay/neuter process easy for pet owners needing services. Owners go onto the website, select a date and location from the event schedule then make an on-line appointment. On the day of their appointment, owners arrive at the location by 8:30 a.m. to register and check-in their animal, then return later in

the day to take their pet home. “Super easy” Mr. Coccoli said.

“So watching them figure out how best to serve the people has been really cool to see.”

Once the issues with the hurricane are dealt with, they’ll be assessing hunger among children and seniors of color along the Treasure Coast who experience food-insecurity at disproportionately higher rates and then helping to implement appropriate Treasure Coast Food Bank programs to address it.

“It’s an honor that we were selected to work with the Emerson Hunger Fellowship program,” said Judith Cruz, President and CEO of Treasure Coast Food Bank through a press release. “We know that there are pockets of deep poverty and hunger among children and seniors, especially in minority communities on the Treasure Coast. The hunger fellows will help us implement our programs to reach these under-served populations.”

Ms. Shortsleeves, who had volunteered and interned with social service agencies for several years, experienced poverty firsthand when her father was diagnosed with a chronic illness.

“I am from a rural place, and we deal with the same issues: Where access is hard, especially when you’re spread out over many counties and getting places is difficult,” she said. “I particularly look forward to working with the senior residents who live in Fort Pierce, and that comes with mobility issues of how you get to a food site.

“I think it takes being creative to find ways to get people to those places, and having lived in a place where you don’t have

that ability there are some ideas I can come up with through my lived-experience.”

Ms. Buckley worked for two summers on the Appalachia Service Project, and studied in Nicaragua, but became committed to social justice because of experiences in her hometown, including the shooting of Michael Brown, an unarmed black teen, by a police officer in Ferguson, Missouri.

“I felt like I had a lot to learn and grow professionally and then I came across this opportunity,” she said. “I have an interest in policy and a background on working on hunger-related issues and I was really drawn to this fellowship because it pairs the lived and field experience with the policy-level experience.

“I know this is going to be a great experience and we’re going to learn a lot.”

Working at Treasure Coast Food Bank, each will seek partnerships over the next six months in the four counties of Indian River, St. Lucie, Martin and Okeechobee to distribute food to underserved areas.

“One of our goals is to find the right partners within these communities,” said TCFB Chief Strategy and Advocacy Officer Krista Garofalo in the press release. “More than the right place, we want true partnerships focused on how we can work together to serve the population. The Hunger Fellows will be learning a lot about the community through certain partners, and working alongside them to figure out the best fit for programs that provide a solution.”

Government warns of storm charity scammers

TREASURE COAST – Nothing opens donation wallets faster than a bad natural disaster. Criminals know this, so every storm is immediately followed by scammers taking advantage of the kindness of strangers.

The IRS and the U.S. Justice Department both issued warnings last week, urging people to be aware of fake charity scams following storms, and to understand how to distinguish the reputable from the fake.

Some criminals impersonate legitimate charities, others set up completely fake charities. Fraudulent schemes involve contacts by telephone, social media, email, and in-person solicitations.

The IRS is focused on providing information to help donors protect themselves and identify legitimate charitable efforts. The Justice Department is working with numerous state and local agencies to go after the bad actors.

Recent storms have “brought and will continue to bring unprecedented human and financial loss to our communities, and victims of this event have already suffered staggering devastation,” said Acting U.S. Attorney Abe Martinez on Aug. 31.

Mr. Martinez announced the formation of a working group to fight hurricane-related illegal activity.

“The last thing that victims of this damage need is to be victimized again,” said Mr. Martinez. “Under the lessons learned from Hurricane Katrina, we bring a comprehensive law enforcement focus to combat any criminal activity” arising from storms and rebuilding efforts. The working group will involve all levels of law enforcement.

The IRS warned that “Criminals often send emails that steer recipients to bogus websites that appear to be affiliated with legitimate charitable causes. These sites frequently mimic the sites of, or use names similar to, legitimate charities, or claim to be affiliated with legitimate charities in order to persuade people to send money or

provide personal financial information that can be used to steal identities or financial resources.”

The IRS especially warned to be wary of charities that have a very similar name to another well-known organization. A common scam is to change one word in a legitimate charity’s name, or change the order of the words, so it sounds like something you already trust.

“As we have witnessed, the best of the American spirit shines through with neighbors and strangers helping one another,” said Mark Dawson, Special Agent in Charge of Immigration and Customs Enforcement’s Homeland Security Investigations. “Sadly, at the same time, these situations also bring out those that would try to prey upon those who are willing to give of themselves to help out. Rest assured that HSI will, in coordination with our fellow law enforcement partners, bring its investigative resources to bear to stop those that would seek to take advantage of this situation for their personal and illegal gain.”

The IRS warning also reminded people to never give out personal financial information or Social Security numbers to anyone who solicits a contribution, and to never give or send cash.

FBI Special Agent in Charge Perry K. Turner of the FBI added “The FBI is dedicated to investigating and preventing this type of fraud, especially when it involves preying on individuals during times of great need.”

The IRS website has a search tool to help determine if a charity is legitimate. Search charities here: www.irs.gov/charities-non-profits/exempt-organizations-select-check.

More information about tax scams and schemes may be found at IRS.gov by searching the keywords “scams and schemes.”

Taxpayers suspecting fraud by email should visit IRS.gov and search “Report Phishing.” The law enforcement working group has set up a Disaster Fraud Hotline, 1-866-720-5721, staffed by a live operator 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

to drink.

Take photos of any water in the house and damaged personal property. Make a list of all damaged property, including age and value if possible. If necessary, place these items outside the home. Your adjuster will need evidence of the damage and damaged items (e.g., cut swatches from carpeting) to prepare your repair estimate.

File your Flood Insurance Claim

Have flood and homeowner’s insurance policy numbers and documents, a list of damaged or lost items, along with photos of damaged property ready to file your flood insurance claim.

Call the insurance agent who handles

your flood insurance to file a claim. Have the following information with you when

you place your call: the name of your insurance company (your agent may write policies for more than one company); your policy number; and a telephone number/email address where you can be reached.

Provide your list of damaged or lost items. If possible, supply receipts for those lost items to the adjuster. Officials may require disposal of damaged items. If so, keep a swatch or other sample of the items for the adjuster.

Clean-up

Ensure you take the proper steps to clean up flood damage.

Prevent mold and remove wet contents immediately. Wet carpeting, furniture, bedding, and any other items holding moisture or water inside the building can develop mold within 24 to 48 hours.

If an item has been wet for less than 48 hours, help control mold growth by cleaning with a phenolic or pine-oil cleaner

(non-ammonia detergent, soap or commercial cleaner) and disinfecting with a 10 percent bleach solution (1-1/2 cups of

bleach in a gallon of water). Items should then be completely dried and monitored for several days for any fungal growth and odors. If any mold develops, throw the item away.

Thoroughly dry out the building’s interior. Portable dehumidifiers are useful, and rental costs may be covered under your flood policy. An air conditioner can also be used to start the drying-out process.

If the walls are damaged, take photographs of the baseboard. Then remove the baseboard. Knock small holes at floor level in the drywall, between the wall studs. This will permit moisture trapped behind the drywall to seep out and start drying.

Have your furnace checked for damage. Your water heater may work, but if the floodwater covered part or the entire tank, the insulation between the walls may be damaged. Obtain an estimate to replace the damaged furnace and water heater.

Contact your local building inspections, planning, or county clerk’s office to get more information on local building requirements before repairing your building.

Do not approach wild animals who take refuge in your home. Wild animals often seek refuge from floodwaters on upper levels of homes and have been known to remain after water recedes.

The benefits of Adblock

The problem with the internet ads just seems to be getting worse. I just finished up on a call with a lady who needed to download a program for work but instead ended up with some adware that completely took over her whole system. Her home page had changed, there were other browser windows opening with webpages she had never even visited and at least 2 different programs opening that said she had driver and performance problems.

I was connected to her machine for over an hour cleaning and removing all the adware that had installed. There were 17 different programs and "browser helpers" that had hijacked her attempt to download a simple program for work and there wasn't a lot that my caller could have done differently - she didn't have a chance.

I wrote in an earlier column how important it is to learn to recognize and ignore internet ads but I will admit, sometimes it can be hard to tell the difference between an ad and the link (or button) you're supposed to click next. What happened to my caller is all too common - she's an intelligent computer user who thinks through what she's doing and was following a set of steps that were to the point and accurate. So what happened? How did her machine get so worked over if she was being careful and watching her step?

When I was cleaning her machine I had a chance to look at and go over the steps she was following. Pretty standard steps really - there was an address to go to first to register and then download the program. The download link on the website linked to "download.com," a popular software repository that many publishers use to distribute their software. And here is where things get tricky.

The link did indeed bring us to the correct download page but not without confusion. There was a banner ad along the top with the same background and colors as the legitimate portion of the page with a big green "Start Download" button and another similar button off to the side. I moved my eyes down an inch or so and saw the legitimate "Download Now" button (also in green) but I could clearly see that by that

time it was too late. How is the casual user supposed to be able to tell which of the 3 buttons is the real one? Like I said, she didn't have a chance.

A closer examination revealed the counterfeit buttons were a part of an ad for a registry cleaner of some sort. Clicking either of the 2 "Start Download" buttons would result in it installing not the program she was trying to install but some sort of system optimization program along with who knows what else. No wonder so many people are getting their systems hijacked! Luckily there is an answer to this

dilemma. Yes it is still a very good idea to learn to recognize ads but there is a tool out there that can cut down on the number of ads you are subjected to. Fire up your web browser and go to www.adblockplus.org and take a look at Adblock Plus. It's free (an open source project) and blocks most (but unfortunately not all) internet ads including the ones found on download.com or speedtest.net.

With Internet Explorer, click the "Install for Internet Explorer" button and then the "Run" option that appears at the bottom of the page. Follow the steps clicking "Install" and "Enable" when prompted. The steps are similar for Firefox and Chrome and there are no counterfeit ads here waiting to hijack your click. Once installed Adblock Plus will be represented as a little red stop sign icon to the right of your browser's status bar or address bar. From that little stop sign icon

you can pause Adblock and see just how many ads the program blocks on whatever page you're looking at.

Again, Adblock Plus doesn't work for every ad. I've noticed that when I go to Yahoo's portal page I still see ads even with Adblock running, but just about everywhere else is ad free.

If it's too late and you've already had a download hijacked and now you have all sorts of crazy toolbars and things installed, don't panic! Start by going to your computer's control panel and to the add/remove programs app. You should be able to sort the programs by date and you can then remove them one by one. Sometimes that's the only option.



Preparing for a hurricane takes a lot of work

As I write this, we are directly in Irma's path. While June 1 marks the beginning of Hurricane Season, August and September are the most active months.

Over the next few days we will be treated to weather people proclaiming that the sky is about to fall and the world is going to end. I fear they may be right this time. I understand that hurricanes are a serious threat and should be treated with respect. I hope all of you treat this with the appropriate respect and make sure to protect yourself and loved ones above all else.

In addition to all of the things we do to ready our property for Hurricane Season, golf courses also must be prepared should they find themselves in the path of Mother Nature.

Consider how long it takes you to get your home and property ready and imagine what it takes to ready a golf course for a storm. With your average golf course taking up about 150 acres of land, there has to be a lot involved in preparing for an event such as a hurricane.

I spoke to a few course superintendents and got a mind-numbing idea of the scope of such a task. While most of us throw up our hurricane shutters, bring in the garbage cans, purchase supplies and map our venture to high ground, there is much work to do at the golf course to prepare for the worst.

A golf course presents a myriad of objects for a storm to blow around and destroy. There are flags, ball washers, water

coolers, trash cans, signs, and lots of trees, any of which can become deadly projectiles in hurricane-force winds.

At Hammock Creek Golf Club in Palm City, there has been a plan in place for well over a decade. It's been put into motion before and hopefully won't have to be again. But should the need arise, the club is ready.

Some preparation begins well before summer arrives. Trees that have shed limbs or died over the winter are removed. Areas with debris and other potential flying objects are kept tidy.

When a storm is threatening all of the flags, ball washers, rakes, signs, etc. will be brought in and stored in the cart barn, maintenance building or the clubhouse. The equipment will be gassed up and the fuel tanks on-site will be topped off. The golf carts will be put on to charge so that they have full power when they are needed after the storm.

One item that I didn't think of was the rope and stakes that are usually put out to direct golf cart traffic. Having these flying through the air to be wrapped around who-knows-what is not a pleasant thought. There are also portable toilets on some courses that need to be brought in. While these will come in handy should water and

sewers not be flowing in the days after a storm, they become a large missile when winds reach high speeds.

At the PGA Country Club in St. Lucie West, the staff will sink all of the pool furniture in the pool itself. Wind-screens and nets will be removed from the tennis courts.

In addition to all the wind damage that comes with a hurricane, you also have a tremendous amount of rain, which means flooding. Golf courses are designed to drain well and have ponds and lakes to store water. One hopes that they can handle the extra.

Once the storm has passed, the courses' staff will survey the damage. Chain saws will be cranked up to remove felled trees and other debris. Insurance companies will be contacted, but everyone realizes that the course comes second to people's homes. Getting the course back up and running will be secondary to helping out those in need. A golf course considers itself to be part of the community and almost any



course would lend a hand to its neighbors who need help with cleanup or damage.

I was hoping that this season I wouldn't have to trade my driver and putter for a hammer and nails. Looks like my carpenter skills will soon come in handy. I hope and pray that we are lucky and fortunate. I also wish that our good luck doesn't mean that others have to suffer. When it comes to hurricanes, remember that your safety and that of your family is worth far more than anything else in this world. The rest is just stuff. Good luck everyone.

PORT ST LUCIE – How do you know if your loved one is addicted to drugs or alcohol? Unfortunately, it is a question that more families face as the Opioid Crisis is increasing the number of substance abuse cases in The United States. According to the Commission on Combating Drug Addiction and the Opioid Crisis, “In 2015, 27 million people reported current use of illegal drugs or abuse of prescription drugs. Despite this self-reporting, only 10 percent of the nearly 21 million citizens with a substance use disorder (SUD) receive any type of specialty treatment according to the most recent National Survey on Drug Use and Health.”

Some of the most common signs of addiction include: frequently missing school or work, lack of energy and motivation, being secretive about where he or she goes, drastic changes in relationships with family and friends, and insomnia.

Lyle Fried, a board certified addictions professional, internationally certified alcohol & drug counselor, and co-founder of The Shores Treatment and Recovery – www.the-shoresrecovery.com – says there are some infrequently discussed signs of addiction to keep in mind usually involve extreme behavior, including:

Spending money, such as excessive spending of or a desperate need for money is a drastic action. The addict may quickly spend all their money or do anything to get more.

Deflection, such as the typical addict has an uncanny ability to sense they may have to answer questions about themselves, so they will change the discussion.

Perpetual victim, meaning no matter the extent of what happens to the addict, whether dropping a fork or losing a job, he or she will blame others and describe how this was an action against them. Even if someone admits they have an addiction, they will still play the victim role.

Obsession, as in an addicted person may spend more and more time and energy focusing on ways of getting hold of their substance, and in some cases how to use it. That obsession may cross over into everyday behaviors.

Sudden changes in appetite, and Dr. Fried says to keep an eye on whether your loved one spends extend amounts of time without any interest in eating or continuously eats, especially foods they used to not be interested in. Unexplained weight loss or gain is a related sign.

Also, sleep patterns - similar to the food above, addicts have a tendency of extreme sleep patterns. Either sleeping too much/staying in bed (also a sign of depression) or sleeping very little or not at all.

Fried reminds you to follow your gut. No one wants to believe their loved one is an addict. You have to believe your instincts if you feel it may be the case. Spending more time with the person facing the challenges and dangers of addiction may be the only way to confirm your instincts so you can help jumpstart their road to recovery.

The John L. Hennessy Award, established in 1956, is an annual honor presented to the best food service programs in the U.S. Air Force in single and multiple facility categories. Hercules Dining Facility staff at Little Rock Air Force Base in Arkansas won the 2017 U.S. Air Force Hennessy Award against five major command-nominated

bases this year.

The Air force uses a 21-day menu for meals worldwide that recycles. The foods range from Asian bourbon beef to salmon with garlic basil sauce. Try this Air Force recipe ... it is good and easy to make.

VEAL OR CHICKEN PICCATA

Serves 6

Ingredients

- 1-1/2 pounds veal cutlets or 1-1/2 pounds boneless skinless chicken breasts, pounded very thin
- 3 large eggs
- 1/2-cup milk
- 2 cups Italian seasoned breadcrumbs
- 2 teaspoons fresh lemon zest, finely grated
- 2 tablespoons sweet unsalted butter, to taste
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- salt, to taste
- black pepper, to taste
- lemon, zest one lemon (add lemon juice to finished dish)

Directions

Whisk together eggs and milk in a small bowl and set aside.

Mix bread crumbs and lemon zest together in a shallow bowl.

Heat a large skillet over medium heat with butter and olive oil.

While heating skillet, dip veal (or chicken) pieces into egg mixture, then coat with crumbs mixture.

Pan fry in melted butter and oil until cooked through, just a few minutes per side (time will vary based on how thinly you have pounded your cutlets) until cooked through and no longer pink inside, but still juicy.

Season with salt and pepper to taste.

Sprinkle with a bit of fresh lemon juice to taste and serve immediately.




