

County sees 61.5 percent of voters hitting polls

FORT PIERCE -- More than half of St. Lucie County's 203,131 registered voters cast ballots in the Nov. 6 mid-term elections, of which three races still remain under a recount cloud as of press time Nov. 12.

The hotly contested races for Florida's governorship, its commissioner of agriculture and Democrat Bill Nelson's decades-old senate seat are grabbing

national headlines amid lawsuits from both Sen. Nelson and Florida's sitting Gov. Rick Scott, who's already claimed victory over the sitting senator and accused him and certain South Florida elections supervisors of fraud.

Sen. Nelson began the sparring contest the day after the election, accusing Gov. Scott of prematurely declaring victory with less than a 5 percent lead and demanding a recount. Irregardless of the senator's demands, Florida law requires a recount when

Indian River Villas rendition approved

Developer wins rezoning for smaller luxury condo complex at foot of Citrus Avenue Bridge

FORT PIERCE -- The backers of the redesigned Indian River Villas luxury condominium project won a needed rezoning Nov. 5 from Commercial zoning to Planned Development in order to incorporate garages abutting Indian River Drive.

City Planning Director Rebecca Grohall introduced the redesigned project, reminding the commissioners that they had previously approved a much larger project on the site about two years prior.

"The zoning of this parcel is currently C-1 and they're asking for consideration to the PD to mirror the approval that's been granted to the west side of that property," she said, referring to the developer's mixed-use Indian River Commerce development directly across Indian River Drive. "Currently what they're proposing is a three-story condo building, and there would be two of them, providing a total of

Celebrate with Stamm and FedEx Racing

Fort Pierce manufacturer celebrates its 50th anniversary with Famed #11 FedEx Toyota Camry.

FORT PIERCE -- Johnny Stamm is partnering with FedEx racing to celebrate his 50th year in local manufacturing and the public is invited to the party.

The famed #11 FedEx Toyota Camry racing car will be on display from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. Friday, Nov. 16 at the Stamm Manufacturing facility located at 4850 Orange Ave. in Fort Pierce near the intersection of Jenkins Road. You won't have any problem finding the place: Just look for the Stamm's famed Scissor Lifts out front and the crowd taking pictures around the car and the huge #11 FedEx Hauler that ferries the vehicle around the country to races and other events. Mr. Stamm is anxious to get the party started.

"It will be out in my front yard, and it's just like going to the races," he said. "You can buy hats, shirts and other things, and we're going to have pizza and cokes."

No stranger to racing and racecars, Mr. Stamm originally ran an automobile repair shop known as Johnny's Auto & Truck Repair in the 1960s and raced his own cars on the side before he turned 20.

"I had the track record at the old track off of Angle Road, back to 1963," he said with pride in his voice. "We had two tracks here -- racing was big back then in Fort Pierce."

By the end of that decade, he had noticed the need by utility companies for specialized work vehicles outfitted with lift-type apparatus and launched Stamm's Manufacturing on July 1, 1968. Within a year he had four employees and subsequently sold his first Scissor Lift to the City of Miami to work on traffic signals. Today he has 25 employees and has continued to improve on his original Scissor Lift design, as well as added a line aerial buckets, security towers and many other items. The employees also manufacture most of the truck bodies on-site that will incorporate the various lift devices.

"We buy basic bodies now and add modifications for the specific type of work," Mr. Stamm explained.

Today the company's products can be found in operation around the globe in a vast array of environments, ranging from utility companies to schools, municipalities and even Walt Disney World. Mr. Stamm made his first international sale to the country of Puerto Rico, outfitting more than 300 work vehicles there with lift devices after the country was devastated by Hurricane Hugo. In spite of its huge growth and expansion, Stamm Manufacturing remains faithful to its original Scissor Lift and the company founder said it remains one of the firm's most requested items. His employees manufacture up to 35 of them a year.

"The new style is still the most popular all over the USA," he said. "We sell from New York to California."

Now 73, Mr. Stamm said he does not plan on retirement anytime soon and is now actively expanding the security tower lift line of his homegrown company. The Fort Pierce company's towers can even be spotted in the parking areas around the Walt Disney World Ticket and Transportation Center that connects the Magic Kingdom with EPCOT Center.

"We are presently building them for malls, Disney World, police departments and now the military," he beamed.

Mr. Stamm admitted business obligations keep him from attending many races nowadays but said he occasionally makes it over to Bristol Tenn. or more locally to Daytona Beach or Homestead to watch a race. If you can get by on Nov. 16, you can share his enthusiasm over the #11 FedEx Toyota Camry, outfitted with a racing V8 engine and Direct Shift 8-speed electronically controlled automatic transmission that can also be shifted manually. Truck fanatics will enjoy viewing the #11 FedEx Race Transporter that brought it to Stamms, a high-tech 78-foot-long rig that weighs in at 80,000 pounds fully loaded.

How everything is connected

This week, I thought we would talk about how everything in the computer is connected. By connected I don't mean by wires and other mechanical means, but internally, through the computer's filing system.

Often I hear people say that a particular file (picture or text) "is in my word processor" or "it's in my email program." That implies that the file in question can be accessed only with that particular program. Not so.

Let me explain; most programs on your computer are capable of opening different types of files. For instance, word processors such as Microsoft Word or Works Word Processor are for working with text files, while photo editors, such as Paint Shop Pro and PhotoShop are just the thing for working with pictures.

The files themselves are not stored within the program, they are stored somewhere on the hard drive, available to any program capable of working with them. That means you can share files often times with many other programs. All you really need to

know is where on your hard drive the files really live.

This is an example of a typical file name complete with its path on the hard drive: "c:\users\owner\documents\filename.docx" The path tells how to get to a files location on the hard drive.

Let's take a closer look: The c:\ indicates what disk drive the file is stored on. Each disk drive on the computer has a letter assigned to it with a: and b: reserved for floppy drives (remember those?), your hard drive (c:), and your CD-Rom (typically d:), and so on. The drive letter is how we know what drive the file we are working with resides on.

The next part of our path, "users\", is the first folder or directory. Just like the manila folders you use in a file cabinet keep files

organized, directories on your computer organize your computer files. Each directory is separated by a back slash (\) and you can have directories within directories.

In our example, the "documents" folder is in the "owner" folder, which is in the "users" folder, which is on the "c:" drive.

The last part of our path is the actual file name.

A typical file name comes in two parts, the name, separated by a dot and the extension. The name is what we call the file when we saved it (a fairly important thing to note when saving). And the extension tells the computer what kind of file it is so it knows what kind of program can open it.

Once you know the path to a particular file, you can access it from most of your favorite programs.

For instance, say you got a picture e-mailed to you and you want to use that picture in a letter you are writing with your word processor.

The first step in getting the picture into your letter happens when you save the picture from e-mail. Make a note of the full path and file name when you save it and you can access it any time.

When you are ready to import your picture, use the insert menu (typical on most word processors) to load your picture. When the dialogue box comes up asking



what file you want to insert, you can type in the file's full path and filename or easier yet, just navigate to the file by double clicking. Start in the "my pc" window and double click the drive letter, each folder and end with the file name, if typing, separate your folders with back slashes and don't forget the extension after the dot. Then click OK. You should have your picture inserted into your letter.

As you can see, the path and file name is enormously important. So often I hear, "it's on my hard drive, but I don't know where" or "that file is in my word processor." If you pay attention to what name and folder the file is saved under when you save it, you'll never misplace another file.

12 residential units. This is a reduction from their previously approved site plan of 23 units.”

Commissioner Jeremiah Johnson, who admitted a previous commissioner had sat in his seat during the 2016 discussions, began to pepper the planning director with questions about a public kayak launch and controversial bulkhead connected to the project. Ms. Grohall deferred the technical aspects of those topics to the applicant or his representatives that evening.

“We could call the applicant up, and I think the engineer can answer that question,” she said. “The dock was previously approved on the site plan. It’s been approved by the Department of Environmental Protection and was also part of the previous approval for the Indian River Villas.”

William Stoddard, a representative of the developer with the Vero Beach-based land planning and engineering firm Schulke, Bittle & Stoddard, also attempted to tackle the complicated issue of the city’s Bulkhead Ordinance, saying it really came down to interpreting the language.

“There’s no legal description, and there’s no bearing and distance that refers to this bulkhead line,” he said. “That’s referring to the existing line of vegetation, and I interpret that to mean where the existing line of vegetation is. You survey it, you set 25 feet and that is your bulkhead line.”

Fort Pierce attorney Dennis Corrick addressed the Commission on behalf of Dr. Ronald Lyman, an Indian River Drive landowner opposed to the project approval and its related bulkhead. Mr. Corrick insisted that his law firm partner, former city attorney Robert Schwerer, had warned the Commission in 2016 not to make any decisions based on interpretations of the Bulkhead Ordinance.

“I think that’s the establishment of a line, it’s not the establishment of a method for determining the line, and in 1960 there was a vegetation line and the city has established a line that is already there,” he said in dispute of Mr. Stoddard’s interpretation. “Mr. Schwerer did raise the issue of the Bulkhead Ordinance and said it was something that needed to be investigated. It’s my understanding the Commission proceeded without doing that investigation. I believe that moving forward with this project or the prior project -- assuming it relies on the interpretation of the Bulkhead Ordinance -- leaves the city open to challenge this project.”

Dr. Lyman himself addressed the Commission, detailing what he saw as several flaws with the project, ranging from the bulkhead to the 28-slip marina and what he viewed as a lack of parking for the project in general.

“There’s not enough parking for these places... they’ve got two-car garages and four parking spaces, so people are not going to be able to come to visit,” he said. “This marina, by the way, won’t have any protection -- one good storm and it’s going to be in our lap. And a small HOA is not going to be able to handle the cost of taking care of all that damage, so it will be for us.”

One of the project developers, Fort Pierce businessman Rick Reed, disputed those allegations and emphasized that the developers and not the Indian River Villas Homeowners Association, would be perpetually responsible for the marina.

We will own the marina forever -- that marina belongs to us,” he said. “That marina will be held jointly by our commercial property on the other side. The reason why the marina was allowed to be 28 units instead of 12 units is it’s a commercial marina and it was approved by the state for that so that the pub-

lic would have access.”

Mr. Reed explained that he had convinced his fellow investors to downsize the size, scale and height of the original project to better fit in with the surrounding structures and landscapes, particularly when seeing it from the top of the Citrus Avenue Bridge. He insisted another Fort Pierce resident helped him to see the light on the previously approved “monolithic” structure.

“At 65 feet, when you come over Citrus Overpass, it blocks the view coming over the overpass of the river,” he said referring to the 23-unit building and emphasizing that the developers could still pull the permit and begin construction on that immediately. “Even though the property belongs to us and we go this approved, it always bothered me. Having been born and raised here, somehow even though it’s our property and I guess we do own the view, I was really bothered by that. We believe this is a better product, we believe this will sell and we believe it’s a good fit for that property.”

Some residents opposed to the project complained about the wall of garages facing Indian River Drive, which Mr. Reed explained had been incorporated to block the headlights of vehicles from shining into the upscale apartments at night. Ms. Grohall told the Commission the garage structures were also the reason the applicants had requested and needed the PD zoning instead of the commercial zoning presently on the property.

“The only part of the C-1 District they weren’t able to meet through their development was that front setback,” she said to the distance under 10 feet from Indian River Drive to the eaves of the garages. “That front setback under the C-1 should be at 25 feet, and they’re asking for consideration for their accessory structures, which are the garages, which don’t meet the setback.”

Members of the public expressed safety concerns with increased traffic at the roundabout located at the foot of the Citrus Avenue Bridge, a concern echoed by Mayor Linda Hudson.

“I think there are safety concerns for everybody involved, including the St. Andrews children and the kayakers and the people that live in the new thing and the people that are coming north on Indian River Drive,” she said.

In response, Ms. Grohall insisted that safety was always at the forefront of her department’s decision-making.

“We have discussed this a couple of times, most particularly not only when this was first approved, but also with the St. Andrews Episcopal, and we’ve talked about making improvements,” she said. “As the projects are coming online, we can improve safety through some signage, better pedestrian crossings and things like that.”

Shortly before the vote on the rezoning request, Commissioner Johnson signaled his opposition and couched it in environmental terms related to the bulkhead extension.

“We have very limited resources left along the Indian River Lagoon that deal with living shorelines,” he explained. “We’re faced with so many issues today environmentally that are just challenges. To the applicants, I like the project, but I’m challenged with the location and the conditions that we are changing. I’m challenged with this when we’re taking so much of the upland area -- the living shoreline area.”

For her part, Ms. Grohall once again reminded the Commission that the DEP had signed off on the project.

“I know one of the things DEP looks at is the impacts, and they deemed it to not have any significant impacts to the shoreline,” she said.

The Commission subsequently voted 4-1 to approve the rezoning request, with Commissioner Johnson dissenting.

the margin is less than 5 percent. As of Sunday Nov. 11, Gov. Scott's lead over Sen. Nelson had shrunk to less than 15,000 votes out of more than eight million cast, a margin of only 0.15 percent. St. Lucie County Supervisor of Elections Gertrude Walker said Nov. 11 she would begin the recount the following day at her offices in the Orange Blossom Business Center.

"The St. Lucie County Canvassing Board will meet at 7 a.m. on Monday, Nov. 12, 2018, to begin the logic and accuracy testing of the voting equipment to be used to conduct the recounts," she said. "The recount will begin at 8 a.m. and continue until all contest recounts are complete. The recount will be open to the public."

Florida's 67 counties will have until Thursday, Nov. 15 to submit their machine recounts, and if the margin remains the same in the senate race, it would also trigger a hand recount. The state's supervisors of elections would then have three days to personally inspect ballots with overvotes or undervotes. The more complicated scenario is not expected for the governor's race where Republican Ron DeSantis' 0.41-percent lead over Tallahassee Mayor Andrew would not meet the 0.25 percent threshold for a manual recount.

As far as Florida's race for commissioner of agriculture, Fort Lauderdale attorney and Democratic candidate Nicole "Nikki" Fried led Republican challenger Rep. Matt Caldwell by a mere 2,914 votes as of 8:20 p.m. Nov. 8 for the seat of outgoing Agriculture Commissioner Adam Putnam. That minute difference has also triggered a mandatory machine recount.

Unofficial St. Lucie County tallies for the contested senatorial race were 63,714 votes for Sen. Nelson and 59,519 votes cast for Mr. Scott. In the gubernatorial race, Mayor Gillum won 63,357 votes or 51 percent of the local votes, compared to the 47.5 percent or 58,914 cast for Mr. Desantis. Ms. Fried won 62,315 votes -- or 51 percent -- compared to 59,147 cast for Mr. Caldwell.

Florida's new attorney general is Republican Ashley Moody, who led Democrat Sean Shaw by more than 500,000 votes. Ms. Moody earned 61,340 votes locally compared to Mr. Shaw, who received 48 percent of the vote with 58,899 votes. Florida's Chief Financial Officer Jimmy Patronis held onto that title but only got 49.3 percent of the vote in St. Lucie County. His Democratic challenger Jeremy Ring received 60,937 of the total ballots cast locally, or 50.6 percent, during the election.

In the race for the District 18 seat of the U.S. House of Representatives, incumbent Brian Mast defeated Democratic challenger Lauren Baer with 54 percent of the vote statewide. Locally, 62,037 St. Lucie County residents cast votes for Ms. Baer, while Rep. Mast received 61,552 votes. For the District 25 seat of the Florida Senate, a slim majority of St. Lucie County voters -- 50.9 percent -- chose Democrat Robert Levy over former Republican state representative Gayle Harrell for the last two years of retiring Sen. Joe Negron's seat. Ms. Harrell claimed the victory, even though she only got 59,816 or 49.1 percent, of the local vote compared to his 62,010 votes.

Republicans also won the majority of local state representative races. Republican Toby Overdorf beat out Democrat Matt Theobald in the District 83 race with 52 percent of the District-wide 76,833 votes cast, although in St. Lucie County he won only 21,202 votes to the 24,286 cast for Mr. Theobald. In the race for the District 54 seat of the Florida House, Republican Erin Grall received 51,700 of the total 81,582 votes cast District-wide, while Democrat Nicole Haagenson earned 36.6 percent of the vote. Locally, Ms. Grall won 54.7 percent of the 8,322 votes cast, while Ms. Haagenson got 45 percent of the vote. In the District 55 race of the House, Republican Cary Pigman won 65.9 percent of the 55,926 District-wide votes against Democratic challenger Audrey Ascititto. More than 70 percent of St. Lucie County voters chose Mr. Pigman over Ms. Ascititto, who earned 583 of the 1,411 local votes. In the race for the District 84 seat in the House, Democratic candidate Delores Hogan Johnson earned 33,574 votes, or 51.3 percent, of the total

65,424 votes cast. Her challenger, Republican Mark Gotz, won 48.6 percent of the vote.

On a much more local level, Democratic challenger Sean Mitchell beat out incumbent Anthony Bonna for the District 2 St. Lucie County Commission seat, winning 51 percent of the 120,423 votes cast. In the District 4 County Commission race, incumbent Republican Frannie Hutchinson barely fended off a challenge from Democrat Helene Viviane Henderson, earning 50.9 and 49.1 votes respectively out of the 119,797 cast.

In the race for the 19th Judicial Circuit bench seat, Robert "Bob" Meadows beat challenger Nirlaine Smartt with 52.7 percent of the total 105,850 votes cast.

The Nov. 6 ballot also included several Community Development District elections. In the race for Seat 3 of the Lake Lucie CDD, Thomas Roksvold won 54 percent of the 180 votes cast, with challenger Patricia Veatch receiving 82 of the votes. Alice Schmitz won the Portofino Shores CDD race for Seat 4, earning 285 of the 470 votes cast. Her challenger Michael Luton won 39.8 percent of the vote. Deborah Pariseau won Seat 5 of the same CDD, receiving 54.6 percent of the total 474 votes cast. The other candidate, Fernando DiSisto, received 215 votes. George F. Hoge Jr. won the race for Seat 4 of the Tradition 4 CDD, earning 64 percent of the 679 total votes cast. His challenger Charles Schillaci won 242 of the votes.

The Tradition 6 CDD held three different races. In the race for Seat 1, Howard Rothman beat out two other candidates to earn 43.5 percent of the 790 votes cast. His challengers, Dennis Keane and Francis Smith, received 273 and 173 votes, respectively. For Seat 3, Frank Carapazza earned 61 percent of the 834 votes cast to 323 received by Mary Milmore; and for Seat 5, Thomas Battaglia earned nearly 70 percent of the 801 votes cast. His opponent Clifford Karr won 244 of those votes. In the race for Seat 2 of the St. Lucie West Services District, Wayne Smith received 66.7 percent of the 6,269 votes cast. His challenger, Viorel "Mr. Vio" Mocuta, earned 2,083 votes.

The host of amendments on the ballot during the 2018 mid-term elections included

one St. Lucie County specific issue, the half-cent infrastructure surtax, which successfully passed after its second try within the last two years. Of the 118,657 votes cast, 55.7 percent of voters approved the measure, compared to 52,456 votes against the additional sales tax.

The rest of the Florida amendment results were as follows: Amendment one for the additional \$25,000 homestead exemption failed, even though more than 60.3 percent of local voters had supported the amendment. Amendment two for a permanent 10 percent cap on annual tax increases for non-homesteaded property passed, with nearly 70 percent of St. Lucie County support from registered voters. The majority of Florida voters also backed Amendment 3, which took the right away from the State Legislature to decide on any new casinos opening in the state and put it into the hands of the voters themselves. Almost 72 percent of local voters supported that amendment. Amendment four passed, which allows former convicted felons to regain their voting rights, with the exception for those convicted of murder or sexual crimes. More than 65 percent of St. Lucie voters approved that amendment. Amendment number five requiring at least a two-thirds vote of the Florida Legislature to raise taxes -- instead of a simple majority -- handily passed, with more than 66 percent of St. Lucie voters backing it. Amendment six expanding the scope of crime victims' rights passed, backed by 64 percent of local voters. Amendment seven on the mandatory payment of death benefits to first responders who die in the line of duty and the payment of qualifying educational expenses of their survivors passed, with 68 percent of St. Lucie County voters supporting it. Amendment nine, which linked the unrelated prohibitions of offshore drilling in state-controlled waters and indoor vaping passed, with nearly 70 percent of local citizens backing the measure. Amendments nine through 13 also passed, backed by the majority of St. Lucie County voters as well.

The official results for the contested mid-term races in Florida were not available at press time.

Honor Flight: One day you won't want to miss

FORT PIERCE – Being a guardian on an Honor Flight is one day you will remember forever. If you live in Indian River Martin, Palm Beach, Okeechobee and St. Lucie counties, Southeast Florida Honor Flight wants you to fly with them as a veteran, a guardian or volunteer.

This all-volunteer organization makes it possible for World War II, Korean and Vietnam veterans to visit Washington D.C. memorials for a day. SEFL Honor Flight raises funds all year long for four flights a year; 2019 flight dates are April 13, May, 11, with September and October to be announced soon.

Guardians are required to attend a three-hour training and pay \$400 for the privilege of making sure the veteran has the time of his or her life on this special day.

The day starts at 3:45 a.m. in Stuart, where a busload of guardians, veterans and volunteers is escorted to Palm Beach International Airport. Along the bus route, many fire stations and citizens are up early to wave flags and cheer the vets on. Throughout the day, police and fire escorts are on hand at every stop, so the Honor Flight is not stopped by one traffic signal. Honor Flights visit Arlington National Cemetery, witness the Changing of the Guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, the Air Force Memorial, and lunch usually at the Arlington Knights of Columbus. The afternoon is for visiting the World War II, Korean and Vietnam War Memorials. Everywhere the



Honor Flight vets go, they are greeted with appreciation, cheers and hugs.

Honor Flights are well organized by volunteers who also travel with the veterans. Wheelchairs are provided for the veterans,

who may not need one ordinarily, but there's a great deal of walking, and guardians always encourage vets to use the chairs for veteran safety and comfort. There are medics, nurses, tour guides, and many other volunteers who are ready to loan and unload wheelchairs, and see that veterans safely exit and enter the buses.

On the flight home, veterans receive a surprise package of mail, from loved ones and school children thanking them for their service. The biggest surprise of all awaits veterans at PBLA, where a homecoming crowd is waiting to cheer, wave flags, shake hands and hug veterans and guardians.

A recent Oct. 13 homecoming was the biggest yet, and covered by WPTV, Channel 5.

Author, photographer and professor, Wendy Dwyer, who has been on numerous Honor Flights, says no two flights are the same because every veteran is different. "October 13th was Dr. Singh's 25th flight and that day made it more of a celebration for everyone." Shamsher Singh, M.D., a St. Lucie county dermatologist, is a tireless promoter and fund raiser for SEFL Honor Flight.

St. Lucie County's Property Appraiser, Michelle Franklin, was a first-time guardian October 13, and says, "It was truly an emotional day and one that will forever remain a cherished memory."

Rhonda Blakey, Director of development and Public Relations for St. Andrews Episcopal Academy, escorted her father, World WarII veteran Calvin Heathman. Blakey says, "This day was so emotional and mov-

Welcome to the world of turkey - gobble, gobble

What is all the fuss about eating turkey? OK, OK, it's high in protein and low in fat, a low-carb dieter's dream. It is also an inexpensive source of iron, zinc, phosphorus, potassium and B-vitamins.

Turkey does have a strange power, though. It has the ability to be a natural sedative. Turkey has an amino acid called tryptophan that helps the body produce the B-vitamin niacin, which in turn helps the body to produce serotonin that acts as a calming agent in the brain and plays a role in sleep. Now you know why everyone falls asleep after Thanksgiving dinners.

By the way, it was Abraham Lincoln who had Thanksgiving declared a federal holiday in 1864.

Turkey is a variety of the pheasant and recent fossil evidence shows turkeys have roamed the Americas for 10 million years. I

can't quite understand that dinosaurs didn't make it, but turkeys did.

The Aztecs are believed to be the first to domesticate the turkey. And Christopher Columbus brought turkeys back to Europe and, by the 1500s, turkeys were being raised domestically in Italy, France and England for royalty and the aristocracy.

Turkey with all the trimmings was the first meal eaten on the moon by astronauts Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin.

Now that you know what all the fuss is over turkeys, let's talk about the best part ...

eating turkey. Do you like it smoked, fried, braised, baked, boiled or stewed? What is best is really up to you, but here are a few tips that might help:

- Purchase at least one pound of uncooked turkey per person for dinner and leftovers. If your family members have big appetites figure on one and one half pounds per person.

- Fresh or frozen? Both are great choices. I prefer fresh, though. I think it is a little moister when cooked. Fresh turkey may only be kept in the refrigerator one to two days before cooking.

- Frozen turkey should be thawed in the refrigerator.

8 to 12 lbs. 1 to 2 days

12 to 16 lbs. 2 to 3 days

16 to 20 lbs. 3 to 4 days

20 to 24 lbs. 4 to 5 days

- Once the turkey is thawed, it may only

be refrigerated one to two days before cooking.

- It is best to cook stuffing outside the bird in a separate dish. The turkey will cook faster, and the breast will retain moisture better. If you decide to stuff the turkey, stuff it just prior to cooking. Dressing should cook to an internal temperature of 165 degrees.

- How much stuffing is enough? Usually one cup per pound of turkey.

- A thermometer is the best way to tell if a turkey is done. The dark meat must reach 165 degrees. Be careful not to touch bone when temping, as you will get an inaccurate reading. When reheating turkey the next day, it should be heated to 165 degrees.

- To store cooked turkey, it should be placed in a covered container, plastic food bag, or wax paper and aluminum foil for up to 7 days in the refrigerator or three months in the freezer.

- Season the cavity with your secret ingredients for best results. As for myself, I love garlic - hmmm, my father used to call it Greek perfume!

My all-time favorite sandwich is made from left-over turkey. Thank you for Thanksgiving!



Add color to your Thanksgiving with Mums

With the thoughts of Thanksgiving in our near future, fall Mums come to mind. Garden Mums come in many colors and styles. Garden Mums are a staple to the holiday season and represent the end of summer and the beginning of fall. Mums are actually fairly easy to grow and can withstand both low and high humidity situations. Mums can actually mimic the look of other flowers such as the smaller flower of a daisy (Daisy Mums) or the larger and fancier varieties that can almost look like roses. You can get Chrysanthemum plants in almost every color but blue.

Mums have been around for a long time and I am sure that many of you have helped your parents or grandparents display these colorful gems during the holidays. Most of the varieties that we use here in North America are simply known as Garden Mums with the botanical classification of *Dendranthema grandiflorum*. About 80 percent of all garden Mums are sold during

the fall and early winter. The reason that these colorful plants burst into bloom in fall is because the shorter days, cooler temperatures and longer nights all contribute to the triggering mechanism that causes these plants to burst into color. Since this winter is going to be an El Nino winter, the forecast is for a wet and cool winter season in Florida. This should be great weather for Mums and other winter flowers that love cooler temperatures!

Many people simply buy their Mums in the fall already in bloom from retailers. Others like to plant their own plants and watch them mature and bloom in their own gardens. If you decide to try planting your

own, do so in the spring so the root systems can have a chance to get well established to ensure a happy, healthy plant.

Mums should be planted in a location that will get only a half-day of sun or slightly less. This is especially true in the areas south of Vero Beach. The areas north of Vero Beach will probably have better results with growing Mums in your garden as the harsh effects of the sun are slightly lessened. You can ensure you will get more flowers in the fall if you pinch back the top inch or so of growth about every three weeks until about mid July. This process will help to promote heavy flowering in the fall. Please note you only do the above process if you plan on growing and maintaining your garden Mums on a year round basis.

Mums will grow in a variety of soils as long as it is well drained. Mums do not require a lot of fertilizer but will appreciate a light feeding about once a month with a water-soluble fertilizer such as Miracle Gro.

It will also help if you stake your plants, as this will help them to support themselves and keep the heavy Florida rains from knocking them over.

If you plan on only using your Mums as a potted decoration for the holidays, many of the same rules will apply. Keep the plant in a bright, well-lit area of the house and do not let the plant get too dry between watering cycles. Remember that potted plants will dry out much faster than plants that are placed in the ground. A/C will also have an impact on your plant's moisture level.

As you can see, having and taking care of Mums does not have to be difficult. Growing and viewing these plants can have so many rewards that any work involved in keeping them looking nice will be well worth it.




