FPUA updating security

Board gets results on security assessment and amends contract to include writing bid for surveillance equipment

FORT PIERCE – The Fort Pierce Utility Authority voted unanimously April 16 to amend its \$107,900 Security Assessment Services Contract by an additional \$37,300 for assistance in writing a bid for video surveillance equipment after hearing the results of its security assessment by the Burns & McDonnell Engineering Company.

Director of Electric and Gas Systems Paul Jakubczak told Board members his staff decided in 2018 to have the Kansas City-based consultant conduct an assessment to ensure the utility lined up with current security regulations of the Department of Environmental Protection, the Department of Homeland Security, the North American Electric Reliability Corporation and others.

"Last year we decided to do a security assessment and checkup for Fort Pierce Utilities Authority to makes sure we're in compliance with the latest standards and provide the best, safest place to work for our employees while protecting the assets of our customer/owners," he said. "It was a very comprehensive survey we worked on with our staff and these experts. We did physical inspections of all FPUA's locations, and we did a comparison with the aforementioned standards to make sure that we were compliant."

Burns & McDonnell completed the final version of its assessment report in February after meeting with all department heads and conducting site reviews of all FPUA facilities. During those visits, they examined the utility's intrusion detection sys-

Owner gets code violation reprieve

Code Enforcement Board recommends owner of unpermitted carport seek waiver from Adjustment Board

FORT PIERCE – The St. Lucie County Code Enforcement Board gave a homeowner here a 90-day reprieve from sanctions on his unpermitted carport so he can attempt to seek a waiver from the Board of Adjustment of the 25-foot setback requirement.

Code Enforcement Officer Mirlande Moise presented the case to Board members May 1, saying she first noticed the unapproved structure last fall.

"I am submitting one photo dated Oct. 25, 2018, which shows the carport, one photo dated April 19, 2019 and one photo dated April 29, 2019," she said. "On my first inspection, I found the property located at 4751 San Diego Ave. in violation of Section 11.05.01 to obtain a permit for the carport. I issued a letter and gave a compliance date of Nov. 8, 2018. After getting no compliance, a certified notice to appear for the May 1, 2019 Code Enforcement Board was issued. I have had contact with the owner, who cannot get a permit because the carport does not meet setbacks."

The property owner, Ulysses Neal Sr., told the Board he erected the carport adjacent to the front door of his home to protect his disabled wife from the elements as she entered and exited their vehicle. Mr. Neal was accompanied by a couple of friends who spoke on his behalf, including Charlie Frank Matthews, the deputy secretary of the Fort Pierce Utilities Authority. Mr. Matthews

tems, lighting, fencing standards, video surveillance systems and City of Fort Pierce requirements, among others. The utility has already begun implementing some of the consultant's recommended changes.

"Some of the recommendations were fixing the barbed wire, redoing our video surveil-lance system, standardizing our cardkey assess system, tree and vegetation management around our properties and standardizing a locking policy through FPUA facilities," Mr. Jakubczak explained. "We've completed some of the upgrades to the cardkey system out at the Energy Services Center. We're also deploying this at the admin offices on Boston and 6th; we're working on upgrading some of our fencing and repairing our barbed wire; and we're also looking at the possibility of obtaining some variances from the city in some of the FPRA areas they restrict the use

of barbed wire."

In order to tackle the big-ticket item, an upgrade to the FPUA video surveillance system, Mr. Jakubczak requested the Board increase the overall Burns & McDonald contract to \$145,200 to cover the cost of the consultant's help in writing a competitive bid request for the system.

They would work with FPUA staff and develop a scope for a RFP [request for proposal]," he said. "They'll develop the RFP using industry standards and the previously mentioned security analysis that they just completed. They're going to help review all the responses and make a recommendation to us of what they believe is the best fit for FPUA. They're also going to provide implementation support for that, so they're going to make sure that the selected vendor does what they say they're going to do."

Board Member Daniel DeIulio, however, wanted assurances that FPUA was getting the best deal on the consulting job as well.

"As an alternative to basically do not approve to go out to bid, would there be any

advantage to going out to bid for something like this?" he asked.

Mr. Jakubczak explained that Burns & McDonald had already conducted the site visits under its current contract and that simply amending it would most likely be less expensive than any potential consulting contracts arising from a new bidding process.

"Burns & McDonald did all the walk-throughs of all the facilities with all the FPUA personnel, so all that would have to be reproduced again," he said, referring to any potential new consultant. "One of the things that was mentioned in the first meeting was to think like you're a criminal and find locations that are not adequately safe for our employees and our equipment, and they did that through their process and procedures. So, we could go out [to bid], but I believe the cost is going to be more expensive than the amendment."

Board Member Linda Hudson wanted to ensure any security upgrades would include safeguards to the city's potable water system from potential terrorist threats.

"Is there security in here for intrusion into

the water system for somebody who wanted to do something really terrible to our water system or something like that?" she asked.

"What we're looking at on some of those is maybe intrusion detection on doors, so when a door opens up, it automatically alerts the control room," Mr. Jakubczak replied. "We're looking at something similar to that in the substations. So, any location that is specified as an inherent risk is one of those where we'll look at what the best remedy is to protect it."

Ms. Hudson then affirmed that the new security measures would benefit the general public as well as the FPUA.

"The security is also a security for our customers, as well as our employees and our assets," she said.

"That is correct," Mr. Jakubczak concurred. Mayor Hudson subsequently made the motion to approve the budget transfer request for \$37,300 and approve the first amendment to the Security Assessment Services Contract, which was seconded by Board Member Glynda Cavalcanti and passed unanimous.

Hepatitis A vaccines encouraged

ST. LUCIE COUNTY - The Health Department in St. Lucie County is urging good handwashing and vaccination to stop the spread of Hepatitis A in the community. Several Florida counties are experiencing increases in Hepatitis A among drug users, homeless persons, men who have sex with men, and other persons who have contact with infected persons. Since January 2018 there have been more than 1,500 confirmed cases of Hepatitis A statewide. The Florida Department of Health considers a community "high risk" with five or more cases of active transmission within the last 50 days within a high- risk group. To date, the Health Department has confirmed seven cases of Hepatitis A in St. Lucie County.

Vaccination is the best way to prevent Hepatitis A. The Hepatitis A vaccine is available at many health care provider's offices, pharmacies, and the County Health Departments. The Florida Department of Health in St Lucie



County (DOH-St. Lucie) is offering the Hepatitis A vaccine free of charge for uninsured or underinsured adults (ages 19 and older) by calling: 772-462-3800 for an appointment Monday – Friday, 8:30am – 4:30 pm at 5150 NW Milner Drive Port St Lucie. DOH-St. Lucie is also partnering and hosting several outreach events. For more information on specific dates and locations, please call 772-

The Department of Health continues to work collectively within our community and in doing so:

· We have distributed information to health care providers about the hepatitis A outbreak and about the importance of vaccinating patients at high risk.

We are working closely with community stakeholders to facilitate, educate and vaccinate persons at high risk for hepatitis A, who don't have a medical home.

·We are working in concert with the St. Lucie County jail's, Wexford Health Services offering Hepatitis A vaccinations to inmates on a voluntary basis. All inmates entering the jail are offered screening for contagious diseases. Each inmate is provided education on different communicable diseases such as blood borne pathogens, Hepatitis A, STDs and other ailments. As part of the history and physical exam that occurs within the first 10 days of incarceration, they are offered the Hepatitis A vaccination along with other voluntary testing or vaccinations contractually

agreed upon with the health department. The services are offered, but the inmate has a right to refuse medical care.

General Information:

Hepatitis A is a vaccine-preventable liver disease. Hepatitis A is transmitted from person to person by ingesting the virus from objects, food, or drinks contaminated by small, undetected amounts of stool from an infected person. Hepatitis A can also spread from close personal contact with an infected person such as through sex or caring for someone who is ill. Most people who get hepatitis A feel sick for several weeks, but they usually recover completely and do not have lasting liver damage. In rare cases, hepatitis A can cause liver failure and death; this is more common in people older than 50 and in people with other liver diseases. Anyone experiencing symptoms of Hepatitis A should contact their healthcare provider for evaluation

Beware of new computer scams

t seems like just when you think you've got things figured out, the scammers go and change the rules!

An alarming trend lately in computer scams is the growing practice of actual 800 support numbers connecting you to people overseas intent on scamming you out of your money rather than to qualified support people who even work for the company that you are calling.

What I mean is I am seeing a lot more instances of people having problem with a product or service and then calling the 800 # for that company that is listed on their website or on their bill or whatever but instead of getting somebody that works for that company, they get someone who immediately start steering the caller into the old "Oh, your computer has been hacked and is infected with malware...." Speech.

No, it hasn't been hacked, no it isn't infected with malware and no, you don't work for XYZ company! If a call ever goes in this direction, hang up or you are about to get scammed.

One on my callers was relating to me an incident where he was having a problem

getting his video streaming device to connect to his WiFi. Now this is one of those little things that plug into your TV – it had nothing to do with his computer whatsoever but that seemed to be lost on the guy on the other end of the phone who immediately began insisting that his computer was hacked and loaded with malware and they would need to clean it before that could continue.

It used to be a pretty good rule of thumb that if you made the call, you were safe. For instance, if you get an email "from the bank" telling you your account has a problem, you call the bank yourself – you don't deal with it over email. Calling them yourself carries a good faith assumption that the number you are calling is actually going to get you to the company you are trying to call rather than scammers. It makes it feel safer to disclose private non

public information. When a big company puts an 800 support number on their website that leads to one of these scammers it makes it that much easier to fall prey. Another trend that has been making the rounds on the internet is the "tainted link" that brings you to a fake blue screen error with a bunch of technical mumbo jumbo and an 800 number to call. The page tries to tell you your machine has suffered from a critical error or some such but the big giveaway is the 800 number – no legitimate

Windows or Blue Screen Error ever ever ever displays a phone number!
If one day you are surfing the web, maybe checking email and suddenly your browser

checking email and suddenly your browser shows an alarming error message, you can't click out of it, you can't close it and there is a phone number to call to get it fixed, don't fall for it! If you do they will attempt to separate you from as much money as they can talk you out of.

"But what's a guy to do? You can't click out, you can't close it, the message says bad things will happen if you turn it off, so how do you get out of it when your machine gets stuck like this?"

Well first, remember the message itself is

a scam. That means you can't trust anything in the message so it's unlikely anything bad will happen if you reboot. Rebooting will shut everything down and reset everything (essentially) and that should break you out of that loop but it doesn't have to be that sloppy. You can use the task manager to "kill" the stuck window can that should break you out of the loop and allow you to regain control of the machine. To launch task manager, "right click" on the task bar at the bottom of your Windows desktop and then left click "Start Task Manager" in the little pop up window. Then, in Task Manager, find the browser window in the list of running applications, highlight it and click the "End Task" button. You can usually find the right item in the list of running applications because it will have the offending web page's name listed next to your browser's icon. Once you end the task you should see the browser window finally close and you can now reboot gracefully - with a normal shut down and

testified to Mr. Neal's positive influence on the neighborhood and said he'd also taken photographs of the carport since he believed it didn't actually violate the code because it's not permanently attached to the dwelling.

"Mr. Neal came to Fort Pierce and St. Lucie County in 1961," he said. "He's developed not only nice beautiful properties but raised a family. He's a great contributor to the community, a taxpayer and works with the youth of the community. He's probably the greatest guy in the neighborhood."

Before another friend could speak on his behalf, St. Lucie County NAACP President

George Collins, Code Enforcement Board Chairman Ralph Fogg reminded them that the discussion at hand was not an affront to Mr. Neal's character.

"This is just a situation where there's a code violation," the chairman said. "I understand what you're saying Mr. Matthews and all of that, but this is not against him; this is against an item that's on his property."

Mr. Collins emphasized that Mr. Neal had inadvertently overstepped his bounds in trying to protect his wife but believed the

latter deserved a waiver of the setback requirement.

"I understand that it is about the code violation, and I know that laws are put in place to enhance the community," he said. "My thing is, there was a reason they made that 25-foot setback during the time they made it... [but] you're talking about removing his shed, and it's only 10 feet out. So what we'd like to say is that he has a well-kept property, he's friendly and a helpful neighbor -- and I know it's not about character – but the property is not interfering with anything at the present time, so we're asking if you will possibly consider a waiver."

When Mr. Matthews continued to insist the structure didn't violate the setbacks because it wasn't permanently attached, Chairman Fogg reminded the group that there was another basis for the Code Enforcement violation.

"Actually, we're looking for a permit -that's the reason you're here," the latter said. "Evidently the permit was not obtained at the time that you put it up."

"I applied for a permit, but they denied me on account of I was over the boundary," Mr. Neal explained.

Mr. Matthews said the homeowner attempted to rectify the situation after the

fact but was unsuccessful.

"It was after the [violation] notice," he emphasized.

Chairman Fogg then reminded the group that the volunteer Code Enforcement Board operated primarily in an advisory capacity to the County Commission.

"We can't necessarily change the permitting rules as a Board," he explained. "We're here to advise and listen."

Board Member Ken Waters then suggested Mr. Neal might have another route to rectifying his current situation.

"I think your issue is less with this Code Board, [because] as I understand it, we're only allowed to make decisions based on law," he said. "We have no ability to make the law. There may be another path where you go to the lawmakers -- which is the Commission -- and I'd be willing as a Board member to grant you time to try and get a variance some way through commissioners to make this happen. I have a great deal of compassion where you are and am willing to give time for you to accomplish that if it were possible."

Assistant County Attorney Katherine Barbieri then clarified exactly what the next step should be. "For setback variances, there is a procedure in place, and it's the Board of Adjustment," she said. "I don't believe he's

filed an application for that, so he could file an application."

"Given this, maybe that's the path to success for you to be able to make this happen," Mr. Waters continued. "I'd be willing to grant a period of time."

Board Member Randy Murdock then offered his backing to that next move but also emphasized the potential cost to the Fort Pierce homeowner.

"I'd be willing to support Mr. Waters," he said. "I think he [Mr. Neal] does have a path through the Board of Adjustment and then a permit, and that's going to take time. And it may get more expensive than he wants to pay, but it would give him an opportunity to go that way. I would be with Mr. Waters in support of a continuation."

Chairman Fogg then encouraged Mr. Neal and his friends in their pursuit of the carport waiver.

"You've got some information from us and hopefully that would help you out," he said. "So, if we give you some time, you can go to the variance board and they can possibly handle that for you."

The Code Enforcement Board subsequently voted unanimously to table the discussion until its Aug. 7 meeting to provide Mr. Neal at least 90 days to seek his waiver.


VERO BEACH -- Professional wrestling returns to Vero Beach May 18 at noon with a new card of fan favorites from IGNITE Wrestling.

Great collegiate golf this weekend

It's not every day that a collegiate national championship is contested right in your back yard. Usually we have to travel great distances to watch teams square off in football or basketball for the right to claim the title of college's "National Champion".

This weekend, May 9 through 12, the PGA of America is hosting the 33nd PGA WORKS Collegiate Championship at its PGA Golf Club in Port St. Lucie. This year marks the 22nd straight year that the PGA Village will host this championship. In all __ colleges and universities will participate in the Championship.

Thirty-three years ago, following the Jackson State University Tournament in 1986, Coach Eddie Payton of Jackson (Miss.) State University joined with Dr. John Saunder; the late Dr. Herschel Cochrane, former president of the National Negro Golf Association; Rose Elder, of the Sports Management Institute of Washington D.C.; and William (Bill) Dickey, president of the National Minority Junior Golf Association and the 1999 PGA Distinguished Service Award winner, to form the National Minority College Golf Championship.

The first Championship was contested on May 17-19, 1987, at the Highland Park Golf Course in Cleveland, under the direction of the newly formed National Minority College Golf Scholarship Fund (NMCGSF). The Championship was conceived to focus national attention on the crisis of minority college golf, to stimulate the development of golf programs at the intercollegiate level and to create a 36-hole national Championship for America's finest minority college golfers.

In 2006, the PGA of America was granted full operation and management of the Championship for the first time in its history, along with a name change to the PGA Minority Collegiate Golf Championship.

"The PGA Minority Collegiate Golf Championship is a key part of our Association's strategy to bring more people of color into the business of golf," said Joe Steranka, then PGA of America chief executive officer. "The PGA of America is excited to host this premier golf competition among minority college athletes."

The 54-hole stroke play competition will be contested on The PGA Golf Club's Wannamaker and Ryder Courses and consists of a field of nearly 135 men and women student-athletes from 26 schools, representing nearly a dozen countries.



The five-person team competition is open to universities and colleges that provide education to a predominately minority student body. Predominately minority serving institutions that are classified as Historically Black Colleges and Universities, Traditional Black Colleges, Traditional Hispanic Colleges and Universities and Tribal Colleges are eligible to participate. All defending Champions receive an automatic entry. The individual division is comprised of male and female students who are African-American, Hispanic-America, Native or Alaskan American, or Asian or Pacific American.

This year the championship sees a name change to the PGA WORKS Collegiate Championship. PGA WORKS is the umbrella brand for all workforce diversification programs that are part of the PGA of America's commitment to diversity and inclusion, one of the foundational principles the PGA America's Long-Term Strategic Plan. PGA WORKS is an intentional effort to evolve the demographic composition of the golf industry's workforce through a variety of programmatic efforts, including leadership development, fellowships, internships, scholarships, the PGA WORKS Career Expo and PGA WORKS Collegiate Championship. PGA WORKS programs are designed to appeal to, attract and retain diverse talent who are prepared to ascend into key employment positions across all lines of business within the golf industry and specifically the PGA of America.

"As the tapestry of our country has evolved, so has our definition of inclusion, and with that we are repositioning the PGA Minority Collegiate Championship and changing the name of the event to the PGA WORKS Collegiate Championship," said Lortiz "Scooter" Clark, Manager, PGA WORKS Collegiate Championship.

Clark adds, "We are of a firm belief that this is the most culturally significant championship in collegiate golf. It is of great importance to the PGA of America, as it aligns with the ideals of diversity and inclusion and allows us to connect with hundreds of student athletes from diverse backgrounds, most of whom will continue to play golf throughout their lives."

Florida is well represented in the Championship as Bethune-Cookman College (Daytona) has seen its men's and women's teams combine for 27 victories. The women will be looking to defend their title from last year and capture their eighth straight championship. The men are also hoping to defend and hoist the winning trophy for the sixth time in the last seven years. The men Wildcats were dominant last year. The men

crushed the field, winning by 57 strokes. The women held their own with a mere 27-shot victory.

Poisonous plants to be aware of

i everybody and welcome! I f you look around your yard and neighborhood, you will find ornamental plants of almost every size, shape and color. What you don't know about some of these common plants can be deadly. Some parts of the ornamental plants or flowers in your yard may contain deadly poison. The most susceptible to being harmed by these plants are children and pets. One of the most toxic and common poisonous plants is the Oleander. The Oleander plant contains a deadly heart stimulant that resembles the prescription drug digitalis. If a child eats a single leaf or two from this plant it could be deadly. There have been several instances where people have died from eating meats that were roasted from a wood fire that contained Oleander twigs or branches.

Dieffenbachia, which is a common tropical that many of us have in our homes, is also a highly toxic plant. All parts of this plant are poisonous. If eaten, the plant can cause intense burning and irritation of your mouth. The plant can be deadly if enough swelling occurs to block your airway. You should always wash your hands after handling this or any of the listed poisonous plants.

Another surprising plant is the Azalea.

All parts of the Azalea plant can be toxic if ingested. The symptoms include nausea and vomiting along with difficulty in breathing and possibly coma. The end result can be fatal. Even the berries of Jasmine plants can be toxic. They can cause digestive problems along with nervous system disorders.

The foliage from oak trees can be toxic but the effects are gradual. If foliage is ingested, it can slowly affect your kidneys. You need to ingest a substantial amount for severe poisoning to occur. Lantana, which is commonly used by many as a colorful ground cover, is another specimen that is toxic if ingested. Acute poisoning can cause hemorrhagic diarrhea and rapid heart rate.

Although this list includes some of the most common plant varieties, there are many more that could be added to this list including Milkweed, Narcissus, Daffodil, poison Oak, Puslane and Snow on the Mountain. Bear in mind that just because some of your favorite plants can be toxic if ingested, common sense and keeping these plants out of the reach of small children and pets can totally avoid tragedy.

We have talked a lot about common and seemingly innocent plants that can be toxic but here is one

plant that many people
think is deadly poisonous but in reality,
it is harmless. The
plant I am referring
to is the Poinsettia.
The Poinsettia plant
is one of the most
widely produced
plants in the country.
During the holidays,
almost every household

has at least one Poinsettia adorning their décor. Fear not as today's commercially distributed varieties are not poisonous. There are some people, however, that may get a mild allergic reaction to the milky sap if it comes in contact with their skin. The affected areas can be washed with soap and water to remove the sap if irritation develops. Poinsettia plants are not a serious risk for animals although it is always best to keep any plant out of the reach of pets if they like to chew plants.

Finally, there are also several common houseplants that can be toxic to animals and children. Probably the most common is the Philodendron. The toxic part is the leaves. If ingested, it can cause burning of the lips and mouth and can also cause contact dermatitis if the plant juice contacts the skin. Similar symptoms can occur with Pothos, Golden Pothos and Devil's Ivy.

rants a little easier. Of course, this does not work in my house -- my wife would rather have me cook for her. I don't blame her. I can cook anything she wants, anyway she likes it.

We really have a great relationship. I do all the cooking and food shopping, and she has a full time job, but takes care of all the painting, plumbing, household finances, children, doctor appointments, car repairs, organizing trips and, most of all, she is my buffer at dinner parties or meetings. She is the center of attention and I don't have to make idle conversations.

Oh, did I forget to mention she also is a nice person with a kind and giving heart. We really enjoy each other's company and it doesn't matter what we do, as long as it's together. Does all this sound familiar?

Yes, Moms are special and their intense love for family is legendary, but their ability to nurture goes beyond words. From a scratched knee to a broken heart, a word from mom seems to heal all.

So what can we do on Mother's Day to honor her? Flower, candy and dinner - it's not enough. Nothing is enough! We can start by honoring her every day. Make a breakfast on Saturday morning sometimes or just say thank you when she does the laundry, or tell her how nice the meal was she cooked and stop taking the everyday



things she does for granted and let her know how much you appreciate it. You will be surprised how much she will love it.

On Mother's Day, do something personal like a hand-written note, a scrapbook of family photos, a special dinner with wine and do it yourself from your heart. That will be something she deserves and will remember forever. So, what should you cook? I will give you a couple good ideas. you decide.

Steak Au Poive

Ingredients

2 tenderloin steaks, 6 to 8 ounces each and no more than 1 1/2 inches thick

Kosher salt

- 1 tablespoons whole peppercorns
- 1 tablespoon unsalted butter
- 1 teaspoon olive oil
- 1 teaspoon prepared mustard
- 1/3 cup beef stock
- 1/3 cup brandy or bourbon
- 1 cup heavy cream

Directions

Remove the steaks from the refrigerator for at least 30 minutes and up to 1 hour prior to cooking. Sprinkle all sides with salt.

Coarsely crush the peppercorns with a mortar and pestle, the bottom of a cast iron skillet, or using a mallet and pie pan. Spread the peppercorns evenly onto a plate. Press the fillets, on both sides, into the pepper until it coats the surface. Set aside.

In a medium skillet over medium heat, melt the butter and olive oil. As soon as the butter and oil begin to turn golden and smoke, gently place the steaks in the pan. For medium-rare, cook for 4 minutes on each side. Once done, remove the steaks cover with a plate and set aside.

Add brandy to the pan and carefully ignite the alcohol with a long match. Gently shake pan until the flames die. Return the pan to medium heat and add the cream, mustard, stock, bring the mixture to a boil and whisk until the sauce coats the back of a spoon, approximately 5 to 6 minutes. Season to taste with salt and add the steaks back to the pan, spoon the sauce over, and serve.

Chocolate Mousse

1 quart heavy or whipping cream

14 ounces bittersweet chocolate, melted in the microwave for 20 -30 seconds

Directions

Whip the cream to soft peaks and add about 1/3 of the melted chocolate. Fold gently with a rubber spatula. Mix the remaining chocolate into the whipped cream. Mix only until combined as you will deflate the cream if you over mix. Place the mousse into decorative serving cups. Top with a cherry.
