

Cyanobacteria bloom lessens in lake

The cyanobacteria bloom on Lake Okeechobee continues to be present in about 345 square miles of the Big O, but the density has decreased, according to the computer

imagery taken by the National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration on Oct. 25.

The image shows cyanobacteria (also known as "blue-green algae") in about 63 percent of Lake Okeechobee. About a dozen types of cyanobacteria are present in the

lake year-round; a few types are capable of producing toxins. The NOAA imagery does not indicate which types of cyanobacteria are present. The NOAA imagery does not indicate



if any toxins are present.

The colors in the image show the



density of the cyanobacteria. Areas in red are the highest density and the most likely area to see visible surface scum. However, the satellite can detect cyanobacteria in the water column, so the cyanobacteria can be present when it is not visible to boaters on the surface.

In addition to cyanobacteria, the lake's

ecosystem is also home to many types of algae. The casual observer cannot tell what type of cyanobacteria and/or algae are present by looking at what appears to be an algal bloom. Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) takes water samples to examine the cyanobacteria and/or algae under



a microscope and run tests to determine if toxins are present.

Cyanobacteria, although called "blue-

Cyanobacteria, although called "bluegreen algae," is not technically algae.
Cyanobacteria are photoautotrophic bacteria; they carry out photosynthesis and release oxygen. Cyanobacteria do not have a nucleus. Algae are simple plants; algae have a nucleus.

When an algae bloom is reported, FDEP takes water samples to test for toxins. In the past 30 days, there have been only four reports of algae on Lake Okeechobee, and water sampled from Lake Okeechobee has indicated no toxins or very low levels of toxins. The World Health Organization (WHO) considers anything under 10 micrograms per liter of the toxin microcystin safe

for recreational contact.

- A sample taken by FDEP near the center of the lake on Oct. 16 found mixed algae. Total microcystin was 0.29 micrograms per liter.
- A sample taken Oct. 8 on the lake near Moore Haven found mixed algae. No toxins were present.
- A sample taken Oct. 16 on the lake near Port Mayaca found mixed algae with microcystin levels at 0.31.
- A sample taken Oct. 17 on the lake near Clewiston found mixed algae. No toxins were present.

Signs destroyed



Forty years ago, Ruth Pickering was

6 years old when she was run over by a school bus. Her injuries were extensive crushed pelvis, torn liver and kidneys. Ruth required many blood transfusions over the several months that she was in the hospital recovering from her injuries. Ruth also had to learn how to walk again.

EAA reservoir plan has widespread support

The Water Resources Development Act of 2018 (WRDA) — which includes the Everglades Agricultural Area (EAA) reservoir — was approved by Congress and signed by President Trump. Plans to move forward with the EAA reservoir have received widespread support.

WRDA, which came from the House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee, passed the House of Representatives Sept. 13 with unanimous bipartisan support. A companion bill, which also had widespread bipartisan support in the Senate, was promoted by Florida Sens. Bill Nelson and Marco Rubio, and passed the Senate 99-1 on Oct. 10. President Donald Trump signed the WRDA on Oct. 23. WRDA authorizes \$147 billion in funding

for a wide range of projects.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers now awaits a funding appropriation to begin engineering work. Corps officials have estimated the EAA reservoir will take about three years for engineering and four years for construction. Work won't start until they receive the financing.

Following President Donald Trump's signing of the WRDA of 2018, Ardis Hammock, Florida Sugarcane Farmers spokeswoman and owner and operator of Frierson Farms Inc. in Moore Haven (proudly celebrating its 100th anniversary), released the following statement: "With President Trump's signature, the EAA reservoir can now continue to move forward.

"This reservoir provides all of the storage and treatment required to meet 100 percent of the increased flows to the Everglades set forth in the Comprehensive Everglades Restoration Plan (CERP). As an owner of a multi-generation sugarcane farm, I am grateful that the final configuration of the reservoir will use existing state-owned land and protect farmland and farming jobs in our Glades communities. We appreciate the Florida Legislature and Gov. Scott for strongly supporting our private property rights.

"Now, we must shift our focus north of Lake Okeechobee, where more than 95 percent of the lake's water and nutrients has originated over the last decade. By finally addressing the root cause of the lake's high water and nutrient levels, we can begin designing the projects that will make a significant difference in reducing the damaging lake discharges to our coastal estuaries."

The CEO of The Everglades Foundation, Eric Eikenberg, has issued the following

statement: "The Everglades Reservoir project is now the law of the land — almost two decades late. Let's get it built — in four years, not 10 or 15. Florida's estuaries, coastlines and America's Everglades are imperiled, and the people of Florida cannot afford to wait.

"If the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers can repair the Mosul Dam in Iraq in one year, this critical Florida reservoir should not take another decade.

"It now falls on Congress to appropriate the \$200 million annually that is needed to construct the reservoir and move other critical Everglades restoration projects forward quickly. Be assured, the people of Florida will be watching."

U.S. Army Corps of Engineers officials have estimated it will take approximately seven years for engineering and construction of the EAA reservoir.

Now in its 21st year, the AIAC is one of the top festivals in the Southeast. Celebrate Native American Heritage Month in the heart of the Big Cypress Seminole Reservation!

The event will feature an exciting array of arts, crafts, food, hands-on activities, musical performances, dance demonstrations and wildlife presentations. The Indian market, featuring 50 vendors, will showcase some of the finest native craftsmen, including prize-winning Seminole artisans.

Daily performances will include an opening ceremony by Seminole Tribal elder Bobby Henry and his team of dancers; Nakotah LaRance — six-time world championship hoop dancer; and Native Pride Dancers from Minnesota — an internationally known high-energy show featuring an innovative blend of modern and traditional Native American dance styles.

Wildlife shows will be provided by Billie Swamp Safari and alligator wrestling by Billy Walker, who has been wrestling alligators since the 1980s. Be sure to check out live demonstrations, including wood carving by Daniel Tommie, swamp cabbage cooking (with samples) by Billy Walker, Seminole food samples by Geraldine Osceola, and archery by Jake Osceola.

Modern Seminole musicians will light up the stage! Friday's musician R.C. North gives us a taste of alternative rock, and on Saturday hear the soulful tunes of Kowako Billie, followed later in the day by rappers Aye Five, featuring Carradine and DC. Saturday's lineup will additionally include a fashion show highlighting Seminole clothing throughout the years.

Our headliner for this year's AIAC will be John and Kenn Little, members of the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe, who will be presenting their documentary More Than a Word at 4:30 p.m. on Saturday. The film traces how the word "r*dskin" evolved from being a term of racist derision and slander to being embraced as the name of one of the NFL's most beloved franchises. It also draws on the voices of Native American activists and scholars to place this controversy within the wider context of Native American history and racial stereotyping, more generally. A panel discussion with the directors will follow.

The event will take place outdoors at the festival grounds across from the Ah-Tah-Thi-Ki Museum on the Big Cypress Seminole Reservation.

Admission is \$10 for adults; \$7.50 for

seniors and students (5-18 years, or with a college ID). Tribal members, children 4 years and under, and museum members get in free. Admission includes entrance to the event and the museum. Parking is ample and free.

Rashad Bailey developed as a suspect in the homicide death of Mr. Fuller. Bailey was currently in the county jail on unrelated charges. Detectives delivered a warrant for the following charges: robbery with a weapon; and homicide murder of a dangerous, depraved mind without premeditation.

An Oct. 17 PBSO news release stated

that at 11:07 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 16, deputies responded to a shooting in the 100 block of Southwest Sixth Avenue in South Bay.

Upon arrival, deputies found a male suffering from a gunshot wound. The victim was pronounced dead on the scene by responding county Fire Rescue officials.

Detectives from the Violent Crimes Division and crime scene investigators responded to the scene to investigate further.

No motive or suspect information was known at the time of the press release.

News from Buckhead Ridge

Glades County Commissioner Tim Stanley answered several community questions presented him. Attorney Steve Dobbs presented an update on the G. Harvey Estates development planned just south of Buckhead Ridge, announcing that it is ready to go before the Glades County Planning and Zoning Commission on Nov. 11. It then will go to the developers for designing and platting and come before the county commission in December for rezoning.

Mr. Dobbs said the first phase of development, which covers 90 parcels with lots 100 feet wide, will include septic tanks, but the second phase should be on sewers as they hope to build a sewer plant for the remaining development, which will be completed in four stages. Lots on the Rim Canal will probably be priced at \$100,000. The whole development is scheduled only for conventional homes. Work concern-

ing the access road has to be addressed between the South Florida Water Management District (which owns it), the state and the county.

AmVets Commander Joe Mansfield discussed the Wreaths Across America endeavor supported by the VFW, AmVets and the American Legion. "Wreaths" began in 1992 at Arlington National Cemetery. Area was famous for close encounters with Cryptid 'Skunk Apes'

During the 1970s, more than a dozen sightings of the elusive "Skunk Ape," the Everglades version of the Himalayan "Yeti" and Oregon's "Sasquatch" (Bigfoot), were reported in suburban Palm Beach County.

Why the legendary creature was observed in such large numbers during the decade of the 1970s is a mystery. However, not unlike the rash of reported UFO encounters in the 1960s, one Skunk Ape sighting tends to fuel the overactive imaginations of other observers. Another factor contributing to the upswing in Skunk Ape encounters was the widespread news coverage of the sightings by The Palm Beach Post, Miami Herald and especially in Lantana's National Enquirer and Weekly World News tabloids.

The decade also was a period of rapid population growth in Palm Beach County, with developers creating many communities west of Military Trail and in the thennew Village of Wellington. Loss of natural habitat confines wildlife to smaller green spaces and increases human contacts.

The Everglades Skunk Ape has many nicknames — Swamp Cabbage Man, Swampsquatch and the Florida Bigfoot. Eyewitnesses claim the creature measures 6 to 8 feet in height and weighs an estimated 500 pounds. It has a shaggy coat of fur ranging from rust color to dark brown.

Unlike Florida's black bears, the Skunk Ape walks upright on two legs. Observers say it could move rapidly when frightened or pursued. As its name implies, the Skunk Ape is best known for its rank odor. Eyewitnesses describe the stench as a cross between a skunk and aged road kill.

The Skunk Ape is classified as a "cryptid." A cryptid is "an animal where its existence or survival to the present day is disputed or unsubstantiated by the scientific community," according to the Oxford English Dictionary.

As such, the Skunk Ape joins the company of such cryptid celebrities as the Loch Ness Monster, the Florida Keys Devil Men and the recently observed Lake Worth Lagoon Muck Monster.

Eyewitnesses who have encountered a Skunk Ape disagree with the scientific experts. So do "crypto-zoologists" — alternative pseudoscientists and adventurers whose aim it is to prove the existence of entities from the folklore records and evidence reported about the Skunk Ape.

Strange encounters

In 1977, a bill was introduced in the Legislature that would have made it illegal to "take, possess, harm or molest anthropoids or humanoid animals." It failed to pass.

Reports of Skunk Ape sightings were so common statewide in the 1970s that even our Florida lawmakers took notice. Palm Beach County had more than its share of alleged close encounters with the Everglades creature. For example, in 1972 a Skunk Ape sighting was reported in the Meadowbrook subdivision of West Palm Beach. The same year, a Pahokee resident said he and his dog fled from a "hairy 8-foot monster" in western Palm Beach County.

In June 1974, farmer Buddy Sterrett reported a Skunk Ape picked up one his 110-pound hogs and attacked it. He said, "It had the smell that would make the hair on the back of your head stand up."

Thee months later, security guard Cary Kantor said he shot at a Skunk Ape in the Wellington construction site where he was posted. "It smelled like it had taken a bath in rotten eggs," he reported. In the autumn of 1974, a Greenacres family reported seeing strange footprints outside of their home left by the Skunk Ape. Two workers reported seeing a "7-foot-tall hairy creature" in 1977 as it was drinking from a lake at a suburban Delray Beach golf course. They notified the Palm Beach County Animal Control Division of their sighting. No report was filed.

In 1978, a Lantana resident said he spotted a creature at 5 a.m. in his back yard. He was alerted by the barking of his dogs. The same year, two Boca Raton youths reported to police "a creature resembling the notorious Skunk Ape" stalking in the woods by the Hillsboro Canal. The prestigious "Smithsonian" journal published a feature article in March 2014 entitled "On the Trail of Florida's Bigfoot." The story highlighted the "Skunk Ape Research Center," established in 1999 by Dave Shealy, an eyewitness and true believer in the Skunk Ape, near the tiny Everglades community of Ochopee.

His collection of artifacts includes alleged photographs of the Skunk Ape, which many cryptid critics believe look more like a fugitive orangutan than an Everglades monster. Whether fact or fiction, the legend lives on in Florida today.

Key Largo: Island paradise for Cryptids

Without question, the most famous and widely investigated Skunk Ape encounter was the monthlong ordeal experienced by the Charles Stoeckman family of Key Largo. Among those investigating the bizarre series of encounters were the Monroe County Sheriff's Office, the Florida Marine Patrol, a team from the Florida Technical Institute, photographers from the National Enquirer, and interested news media from Palm Beach County to Key West.

The island of Key Largo forms the southeastern tip of the so-called Bermuda Triangle, which may help explain preternatural sightings of the "Devil Men," seen floating over Florida Bay prior to electrical storms, or visions of the Virgin Mary in a grotto near the St. Justin Martyr Catholic Church.

One enthusiastic resident in 1978 even claimed to have discovered the lost city of Atlantis just offshore of Key Largo. However, upon close inspection at low tide, his "Atlantis" turned out to be an ancient reef consisting of fossilized brain coral.

Charles Stoeckman, his wife and three children lived in a home at mile marker 94.5 oceanside on Key Largo. On July 14, 1977, Stoeckman and his son saw what he said was an 8- or 9-foot-tall Skunk Ape while they were collecting rare bottles in the mangroves near his home.

"It had a huge head and shoulders," he later reported, "long fur all over, and he stank like a dirty wet dog. The noise he made was a high-pitched wailing."



Stoeckman cleared 30 feet of brush from around his home to discourage a return visit by the Skunk Ape. It didn't work. The Skunk Ape returned for several night visits. Mrs. Stoeckman and her children fled to Homestead after seeing the creature outside her window.

Responding to terrorized pleas for help were Monroe County Sheriff's Deputy Bill Haase and Sgt. Randall Chinn. Florida Marine Patrol Capt. Jack Gillen also inspected the Stoeckman property. No trace of the Skunk Ape was found.

Charles Stoeckman remained at his home for about a month, armed with a shotgun. He later joined his family in south Dade County. A short time after the Stoeckman encounter, four Tavernier residents formed a Skunk Ape posse. Armed with flashlights, lanterns, a camera and snake bite medication, they began what a local newspaper called a "Skunk Ape Safari." The posse met at Harry Harris Park in Tavernier and followed the shoreline north to the Dove Creek Estates.

As with all Skunk Ape adventures, the Everglades monster eluded its pursuers.

A sexual predator could be living in your neighborhood, and you might not even realize he or she is there. Everyone wants to believe that his own home and neighborhood is a safe place for children, and while no place can ever be completely free of all danger, there are ways to make them safer.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation has several suggestions to help with this:

- Have a family code word or phrase that only your family knows. Explain to your children that you will never send anyone to pick them up without supplying that person with the code word.
- · Never put your child's name on clothing or backpacks because this enables a predator to call the child by name and may help a predator to trick your child.
- Teach children it is OK not to speak to people if they
 - Teach children to stay away from strangers.
- Teach children that adults do not need their help. If an adult asks for help looking for a lost puppy, he is probably trying to trick them.
- Teach children not to search for you if they get lost in a public place. Tell them to ask someone who works there for help.
- Teach children to never leave the yard without permission and to always tell someone where they are going.
- Teach children that if someone is following them, they should run while yelling FIRE! FIRE! People are more likely to respond to the word "fire" than they are to the word "help."
 - Teach your children your address and phone number. In his book, "The Art of War," Sun Tzu wrote, "If you

BELLE GLADE — Palm Beach County Mayor Melissa McKinlay unveiled a sign renaming Sugar House Road in western Palm Beach County to George Wedgworth Way on Oct. 18. The renaming honors the Glades agricultural icon and founder of the Sugar Cane Growers Cooperative of Florida, George H. Wedgworth. The Wedgworth family, the board of the cooperative, and community leaders joined Mayor McKinlay at the ceremony.

"It's only fitting that the county pay homage to this great leader who passed away in November 2016 at the age of 88 by honoring his life's service to the betterment of Florida agriculture and the Glades community by renaming this road," Ms. McKinlay said. "He was a visionary who transformed an idea on notebook paper into Belle Glade's leading employer by unifying a group of Glades vegetable growers into the vertically integrated enterprise that the cooperative is today."

After earning his bachelor's degree in agricultural engineering from Michigan State University, Mr. Wedgworth returned to Belle Glade to help manage the family farming business. He recognized the

instability of the winter vegetable markets and began his journey to bring stability to Glades-area agriculture, which culminated in the formation of the Sugar Cane Growers Cooperative in 1960. The first crop was grown in 1962 on 22,000 acres of land. He was at the helm of the organization for 50 years and grew the business to continue to increase financial returns and stability to all 44 member-growers of the cooperative. Today, the cooperative harvests sugarcane grown on 72,000 acres of land and produces 3.2 million tons of sugarcane.

Through his forward thinking, Mr. Wedgworth partnered with Florida Crystals Corp. to become vertically integrated in 1998. By having sugar refining assets, he assured that the cooperative's production would have a secure place to be refined. This endeavor was a success, and today the refining company, ASR Group International, continues to expand across the globe and is the world's largest sugar refining company.

"I'm proud to say my father touched the lives of many people through his involvement in the community and his leadership and formation of many agricultural trade organizations," Dennis Wedgworth said.

"He was best known for bringing people together, building consensus and looking out for the greater good. He was the recipient of many awards and accolades for his contributions to agriculture, the sugar industry and the community."

The cooperative commends the county for fulfilling its request to make this important change to rename the road. "This will be a permanent testament to George's life's work and passion to the sugar industry and Glades community," said Cooperative Chairman John L. Hundley.







St. Mary parish denied shrine designation

PAHOKEE — "To those of you who had requested me to seek St. Mary in Pahokee designated as an official 'Shrine' to Our Lady of Bethlehem, unfortunately it has been rejected by the Diocese of Palm Beach."

So stated a post on the Facebook page of former St. Mary Catholic Church Pastor John Mericantante last Wednesday, Oct. 24, after he received a letter from the Rev. Brian G. King, episcopal secretary and director of liturgy for the Diocese of Palm Beach. The nearly century-old Pahokee parish is lovingly called "the Bethlehem of the Diocese of Palm Beach," says its website (stmarysofpahokee.com), because, for one thing, it is home to a 16th-century bejeweled Russian icon statue of Our Lady of Bethlehem that resides in a 6-year-old sanctuary largely financed through the gifts of well-to-do Catholics from outside the Glades region.

A bigger reason for devotions to this revered statue and the parish itself, though, is the faith of the flock who worship here and of those who gave to the fundraising campaign that the former pastor conducted for many years to get the modern sanctuary built. Many believe that numerous miracles have been associated with the Russian icon through the centuries and, especially, since it has been in Pahokee.

Dated Oct. 17, Rev. King's letter announced the decision on behalf of Bishop Gerald M. Barbarito, saying, "After carefully

reviewing the various canons (1230-1234), the bishop has decided not to establish St. Mary Catholic Church as a diocesan shrine." Because shrines are a "place of pilgrimage," it explained, the church would have to "offer multiple opportunities for daily Mass, confession, adoration/exposition and the practice of popular devotions that go far beyond what a parish church normally offers."

The bishop cited the facts that only one priest is assigned to St. Mary presently, the current pastor, the Rev. Juan Raúl Cárdenas,

and that he had not made the request. "It is not reasonable to place this burden on him," declared the letter.

Several of the Rev. Mericantante's former parishioners responded to his Facebook post, saying he had done his best and at least tried. "Yes, I did, but God and His Mother will always have the last word someday," Father John, who was pastor for two decades, replied.

During an interview back in the summer of 2017, Pastor Juan Cárdenas told about

some of the long, rich history of the icon and how it came to be in the possession of a Chicago pawnshop owned by a Jewish family and, finally, a gift to St. Mary Catholic Church.

"It's a relic," he said. "Since it was donated here, this community has been blessed. And really — really — I think that is a miracle from Our Lady of Bethlehem.

"You see, the icon, there are a lot of precious stones around it. And those precious stones, I heard, are thanksgiving, given in gratitude by someone who received a miracle from God through the Virgin Mary. So they wanted to give precious stones; they were rich people. And it ended up here, and since Father John was here, many people started coming and miracles started happening."

The largest one is this, Padre Juan explained, "The congregation believes that by the prayers offered through the Virgin of Bethlehem icon, another miracle happened when enough was raised to fulfill Father John's dream."

But, Pastor Cárdenas said, their blessings have not stopped in the five years since the former pastor retired after the new sanctuary was built.

"Since that, we sometimes are struggling with finances here to pay out some kind of bills, and I always say, 'God is going to provide.' And then someone sends a gift, saying, 'Father, this is for your parish.' And I say, 'Oh, this is what I was waiting for.' We've never been abandoned; she takes care of us," he said.



Man accused of running over 79-year-old woman

OKEECHOBEE – Late Saturday night, a 79-year-old woman was hit by a car and pinned against her own house. The driver of the car was allegedly trying to hit her grandson and hit her by mistake. Chester Eugene Woodall, 28, was arrested by Okeechobee County Sheriff's Office Detective Mark Margerum after OCSO received a call on Saturday night, Oct. 27, in reference to a disturbance. According to the report, dispatch advised a white male suspect driving a gold or silver car was armed with a bat. They further advised someone may have been run over.

While en route to the scene, Detective Margerum reported observing a Chevy Malibu matching the description with extensive front-end damage. Behind that vehicle was a truck with a driver attempting

to flag down Detective Margerum, pointing toward the Chevy Malibu. Detective Margerum reports turning his vehicle around to follow the Malibu. Detective Margerum conducted a traffic stop, and identified Mr. Woodall along with his fiancé Leah Clase, who was sitting in

the front passenger seat. The report states Mr. Woodall had blood around his mouth and an abrasion on his back, and Ms. Clase kept saying that Mr. Woodall had mental health issues. The Chevy Malibu appeared to have blood and flesh on the grill.

The couple in the truck that had flagged down Detective Margerum spoke only Spanish, but when Deputy José Garcia arrived, he was able to speak to them, and they advised him several people had been run over.

Leaving Mr. Woodall and Ms. Clase with Deputy Stephen Paladino, Detective Margerum and Deputy Garcia proceeded to the residence, where they reportedly found a chain link fence knocked down and a trail of blood leading onto the porch, into the front door and straight to an elderly woman lying on a couch. The report states the victim had a deep laceration on her right wrist, exposing part of her bone. She also had several deep lacerations below her right knee. There were several family members in the residence who reported seeing the suspect run over the victim. Detective Margerum reports being unable to speak with the victim due to her injuries and the language barrier.

The victim was airlifted to Lawnwood Hospital because of her injuries.

Because Mr. Woodall smelled strongly of alcohol, he was reportedly asked if he

would consent to a field sobriety test. He agreed to the test but was unable to complete it and was arrested and charged with DUI at that time.

Ms. Clase was asked how the damage to her car had happened, and according to the report, she said she did not know because she had blacked out. During her interview with Detective Margerum, Ms. Clase said Mr. Woodall went out there to have a fight. She said she believes he did it because he is on Lexapro and he should be on Prozac. The report states Ms. Clase admits seeing Mr. Woodall hit the victim and that when it happened she told him he just ruined both their lives.

The report concludes, Chester Eugene Woodall was criminally charged with aggravated battery with a weapon, a second-degree felony. He was also charged with criminal mischief over \$1,000, a third-degree felony. Bond will be set by the judge.

FHSAA announces changes to high school sports in 2019

The Florida High School Athletic Association (FHSAA) voted on and approved a new classification system and playoff structure for seven different sports that will take effect in the fall of 2019. The changes passed by a 12-3 vote by the FHSAA board of directors.

In the new classification system, the number of classes will be reduced from nine to seven and each classification will continue to be split into 16 districts with an even number of teams in each district.

FHSAA briefly considered using rankings to determine classification, but decided to stick with student enrollment to determine classification by sport after hearing feedback from many of its advisory boards.

Each district will have a postseason tournament, with the champion advancing to the regional playoffs. In a change, the regional playoffs will now be seeded by rankings from MaxPreps, a website that specializes in coverage of American high school sports. Under the current system, the district tournament champion and run-

ner-up advanced into the regional playoffs. Starting in 2019, the four district champions will be seeded No. 1-4, based on MaxPreps rankings. The other four regional spots will be at-large bids determined by MaxPreps rankings.

The sports that will be affected by these changes are baseball, boys and girls basketball, boys and girls soccer, softball and girls volleyball.

One of the biggest changes that will affect schools around Lake Okeechobee is that district teams will no longer be required to play each other during the regular season.

Clewiston High School Athletics Director Steven Barnes worries about what this will mean in the future when it comes time to schedule games.

"I think it can hurt us if no teams want to travel out here to play us," said Mr. Barnes of the changes to district play. "Not requiring district play is bad business for rural communities, in my opinion."

With many schools around Lake Okeechobee sometimes an hour or more away from other teams in their district, it's hard to see many of those teams wanting to make the trek out to Okeechobee or Moore Haven if they're no longer required to.

FHSAA Executive Director George Tomyn says the changes come after many meetings with school officials around the state of Florida.

"Today our board of directors passed what we think is a pretty neat classification process," said Mr. Tomyn. "I'm very proud of our staff that has worked long and hard hours on this. And I'm equally proud of all of our member schools who gave us productive and positive input."



J'quonne Banks

Clewiston High School senior cornerback and wide receiver J'quonne Banks is the week's Big Lake Athlete of the Week for not only his performance in the Tigers game against Dunbar on Oct. 26, but his high level of play all season for the Clewiston football program.

Banks had an interception, two pass breakups and three tackles against Dunbar and now has three back-to-back games with an interception, all coming in high-pressure moments during those

Clewiston head coach Brad Garret has been impressed with Banks' first year as a full-time starter.

"I've know Banks ever since he was in the eighth grade," said Garret. "His older brother was a great player here in Clewiston, so he kind of always had that shadow on him; I think that made him work extra hard for what he's got. This summer he really came in and just worked hard to put himself in the best position to have a successful senior year.'

Banks has five interceptions on the year. In pass coverage, he has the ability to match any receiver he lines up against and puts himself in great position to break up passes. He's also not afraid to come down in run support and punish opposing running backs who make it to the second level. As a receiver, his speed is his number one asset; he's also shown ability to avoid defenders once the ball is in his hands.

That speed will come in handy when the Tigers face the Okeechobee Brahmans on Nov. 2. The Brahmans have speedy wide receiver Jalen Pryor on their squad, who just had a 41-yard touchdown catch against Jensen Beach. If Banks can shut down Pryor, it'll make the Brahmans one-dimensional. If Banks also provides good run support, it'll make the Brahmans no-dimensional.

If you watch any tape on Banks, one thing becomes clear: He plays with a lot of confidence. Garret says that confidence started coming out in Banks when he put work in over the summer.

"Last year he was one of those guys who was afraid to mess up, and if he made a mistake it would bother him and eat him up," said Garret. "They say defensive backs can't look in the rearview mirror; you just have to move on. Starting this year he really did a good job of learning how to let things go and moving on to the next play. I think that's where a lot of that confidence comes from, and ever since he started playing like that, you see things just going his way this year."

Glades candidates discuss their goals for county

MOORE HAVEN — Four candidates are on the ballot for two Glades County commissioner positions in Tuesday's election.

Incumbent John Ahern faces challenger Jerri Lynn Schlueter for the Glades County Board seat of District 4; Jeff Barnes is running against Donna Storter Long for her District 2 seat.

County Board District 2

Jeff Barnes: A "no party affiliation" candidate, Mr. Barnes, 45, was born in Avon Park, moved to Glades County in 1995 and has lived in Ortona for the past 12 years. He works with the Glades County Youth Livestock organization and is president of the Glades County Hunting Club. "I'm just looking to get out and bring some new vision and a new set of eyes into the community and try to do whatever change we can for the betterment of the community," he said. Married with two children — one who graduated from high school last year and is attending welding school in Jacksonville and the other a sophomore at Moore Haven Junior-Senior High School — he has worked for Hawkins Chemical, a water treatment plant, for more than a decade and is manager of the LaBelle branch. Mr. Barnes, a first-time candidate, said of the biggest issues he's concerned about: "I think the county needs to have some moderate growth. You know, it's kind of going in the wrong direction. Times are changing and we're staying stuck in the past. I'd like to see it grow a little bit, maybe get some more stores and something for the people. I think

we need to keep our land on the tax base, and of course water quality is a big issue, so I'd like to see that improved as well."

Donna Storter Long: The incumbent Republican has been a county commissioner since 2006 and has achieved advanced commissioner status with the Florida Association of Counties continuing education program. She has supported many community projects to help the county, citing the Ortona Community Center, park and playground; the Ortona Cemetery pavilion; the Muse fire station, park and playground; the Washington Park Community Center; upgrading of boat ramps and reopening of the Buckhead Ridge Pearce Canal, among others. "Your concerns are my concerns," she tells voters in a mailer. "I respond when you call or contact me and do my best to resolve county-related matters. As senior member of the commission, my experience enables me to connect our past achievements with our future goals." She also represents Glades on various regional boards, including for library, planning, trauma care, juvenile justice and risk management.

John Ahern: The incumbent Republican is finishing his first term and is in his second year as chairman of the board after serving as vice chairman the previous year. Prior to that, he served for 28 years on the Moore Haven City Council, seven years as mayor and 18 years as financial officer. He owns and operates Ahern's LLC, a service center and convenience store/deli on U.S. 27; is a founding director and chairman of the Glades County Economic Development Council, a board member of the Glades Youth Livestock Show Inc. for 40 years and treasurer for 30-plus years, a firefighter for the Glades Volunteer Fire Department for 19 years, and a board member for two years and chairman for two years of the Glades Correctional Development Corp. Mr. Ahern says he enjoys strong working relationships with state and federal representatives as well as local school and city officials. "We need growth, and everything that we're trying to do is to promote growth. We've been working on the (Moore Haven) hotel. (The county sought proposals for redevelopment of the old Glades Inn site, for which planning

is in progress.) There are several things we need, but it's basically just everything we're doing is trying to grow so we can increase our tax base. Right now we're just not big enough to sustain a lot of businesses that we need, but we need more people and we need more of the amenities that they need, and that would change everything for us.'

Jerri Lynn Schlueter: A Democrat, Ms. Schlueter is a third-generation, lifetime resident of the county who has been married 24 years and has three daughters. Most recently, she worked for the City of Moore Haven in positions ranging from permit clerk up to public works director and FEMA-certified emergency preparedness manager. She was in charge of supervising code enforcement, utilities, waste collection and maintenance of city facilities. "I was the go-to person for all matters concerning municipal services, from overseeing day-to-day operations to fielding complaints." She is involved with Moore Haven Middle-High School Advisory Council, the county Youth Athletic Association, the Chalo Nitka Festival Committee and the county Economic Development Council. "I am seeking this position to serve you, the citizens, not for personal gain. My goals are to help promote and enhance the economic, academic and commercial growth of our great county, while ensuring protection of our wonderful natural resources. I've worked closely with county staff during my city employment and realize the inherent struggles and successes. I am well prepared to serve as one of the five commissioners to develop policies and oversee management thereof," she says in a mailer. "I give 100 percent to any task I take on."

Football around the lake

• The Glades Day Gators scored early and often in their game against the Southwest Florida Christian Kings on Oct. 26, winning 63-26 and increasing their record to 5-4. They are currently ranked second in FHSAA's Class 2A Region 4 power rankings, two spots over Moore Haven. They'll wrap up their regular season against a St. John Paul II Academy team that is winless on the year. Kickoff is at 7 p.m. on Nov. 2 at Glades Day High School.

• The Moore Haven Terriers will cap off another successful regular season for the program with a big match-up against the 7-2 LaBelle Cowboys on Nov. 2 at 7 p.m. at Moore Haven High School. The Terriers enter the game 7-1 after their 36-14 win over First Baptist Academy on Oct. 26.

• The Okeechobee Brahmans will host their rivals the Clewiston Tigers on Nov. 2 at Okeechobee High School, with kickoff at 7 p.m. Both teams come into the game on the heels of losing the previous week's game. Okeechobee finally broke its stretch of games without an offensive touchdown when quarterback Blaine Keathley hit Jalen Pryor on a 41-yard touchdown pass. But it wasn't enough for the Brahmans to top Jensen Beach as Okeechobee fell 42-7, dropping them to 0-9 this year. Clewiston lost their game against Dunbar 20-0 on Oct. 26, dropping them to 1-8. Although both teams have similar records, Clewiston was much more competitive in its games this season than Okeechobee, whose Brahmans weren't able to put up much resistance to many of the teams they faced this year.

Rivalries loom large in final weeks of high school football

As the final football games of the 2018 regular season approach and many teams vie for their spot in the playoffs, two games around Lake Okeechobee will be played that have no playoff implications whatsoever, yet they could not be more important to the four teams involved.

The Okeechobee Brahmans will take on the Clewiston Tigers on Nov. 2 in one of the longest-running rivalries in South Florida. The Pahokee Blue Devils will face the Glades Central Raiders in the legendary Muck Bowl on Nov. 2 as well.

Okeechobee and Clewiston have played each other 66 times since 1944, which is the second-most games between two teams in the area, behind only Vero Beach and Martin County. Historically, the rivalry has been one-sided, with Clewiston winning 51 of the 66 games. But beginning in 2007, the series became a bit more even, with Okeechobee winning five of the 11 games from 2007 to 2017.

Now, in 2018, with the Brahmans at 0-9 and the Tigers at 1-8, both teams find themselves out of the playoff hunt. Yet for a rivalry as old as Okeechobee and Clewiston, sometimes beating the other team in the final game of the year can mean more than all the other games combined.

Last year, in what would be Okeechobee head coach Chris Branham's last game, the Brahmans rallied to defeat Clewiston 20-16 in a thriller. The victory let the Brahmans end 2017 on a high note after what had been a somewhat tumultuous season.

After the win over Clewiston, Branham talked about the rivalry with the Tigers and his own experience with it as a player at Okeechobee High School.

"For me, growing up in Okeechobee, Clewiston was always the bully," explained Branham. "They were great every year, always had winning seasons. We've talked about the history of the rivalry to our kids.

Clewiston doesn't even look at us as their rival. They just see it as another game around the lake. When I was playing football here when I was younger, I remember old-timers coming up to me and saying, 'Are we going to beat Clewiston this year?' That was from guys who were in their 60s asking that same question. For us to win that game is a big thing: To be able to say that at the end of the day, no matter how the season looked, in the last game we stood firm and beat Clewiston."

Clewiston head coach Brad Garret says that he knows that no matter what either team's record is, when the Tigers play the Brahmans it's always a hard-fought game.

'These last two years, Okeechobee has had a really good football team and they've come down to Clewiston and won," said Garret. "They've been very well coached and their kids play hard, and I know they're going to be up for this game. I think our football team has been through a lot this year. We're a group that's still hungry. We aren't going to look past anybody. We know the situation they are in, and they know the situation we're in. We're looking to end this season on a good note, and these kids deserve it."

Similar to Branham in 2017, this will be Garret's last game as head coach of the Clewiston Tigers. Longtime Tigers coach Pete Walker will make a return to the sidelines to coach Clewiston for the 2019 season. Garret is well-liked by the players on the Clewiston team, and you have to imagine they'd like nothing more than to send him out on top with a big win over an Okeechobee team that has struggled so far this season.

Two teams that haven't struggled this season are the Pahokee Blue Devils and the Glades Central Raiders.

Both teams are in the mix for the playoffs this year and have squared off against some of the best teams in the state. But none of those other games will matter

as much to either team as the 2018 Muck Bowl.

Starting in the 1980s, the Muck Bowl rivalry can seem relatively new compared with Okeechobee and Clewiston's, which dates to the 1940s. But nothing comes close to the intensity found at the Muck Bowl. There have been four times where the loser of the Muck Bowl went on to win a state championship. If you were to ask the players on either team which would be more important, a state championship or a win in the Muck Bowl, it might be a toss-up.

The 2007 Muck Bowl, regarded by many to be the best game played in the rivalry, drew the attention of many in the national media, including Sports Illustrated, ESPN and NFL Films. Both teams entered that game at a perfect 9-0, both teams were defending state champions, and both teams had future NFL stars on their rosters, including Glades Central wide receiver Travis

Benjamin and Pahokee cornerback Janoris Jenkins. Pahokee would go on to win 34-24 that year.

Pahokee comes into the game with a 5-5 record this year, but don't let that mislead you on their talent level. The Blue Devils have had one of the toughest schedules in the state this year and have been competitive in all of their games. Pahokee has dropped the last two games, however losing 21-20 to Seminole Ridge and 35-14 to Cocoa.

Glades Central, on the other hand, comes in on a three-win streak to increase their record to 5-3, and you can bet the Raiders are ready to take down Pahokee after the Blue Devils won the past two Muck Bowls in 2016 and 2017.

Okeechobee will play Clewiston at 7 p.m. at Okeechobee High School on Nov. 2. Pahokee will face Glades Central at 5 p.m. at Pahokee High School on Nov. 2.

Mali Gardner: Ms. Gardner first ran

for the commission in 1999 and has served as mayor twice, from 2001 until 2010 and, presently, since 2016. She's a member of the Hendry County Tourism Development Council and a vice president of First Bank, where she has worked since 1979. Mayor Gardner has lived in Clewiston since her family fled the Communist regime in Cuba in 1961, and has served the community in several positions, including currently as co-chairwoman of the Hendry/Glades 2019 United Way Campaign. "Growing up in Clewiston afforded my family many opportunities in realizing the American Dream. I am grateful for this blessing, and it is what motivated me to run," she said. "I have ... not wavered in my commitment to the work of public service. During the recession and its aftermath, the goal has been to sustain the community's assets for the next generation. that we can agree that Clewiston's best days are ahead! There is continued work that must be done, and my public service experience has prepared me to help make the right decisions for Clewiston's future."

Kevin McCarthy: "I was born and raised in Clewiston, graduated from Clewiston High School, then attended Villanova University. I moved back to Clewiston in 1987 and have been an involved member of the community and a volunteer firefighter ever since. My wife of 30 years is a pediatric nurse practitioner who has worked at Forbes Family Care Center for over 15 years and has been very involved in youth programs within the community. My two children, Kristi Pena and Robby Mc-Carthy, are also Clewiston residents. They are both coaches with AYSO Soccer when they're not serving their community as a nurse practitioner and firefighter/paramedic, respectively. I believe that I should give

Among them, they all deal with many people day to day who either are retirees or urban refugees living here who love to fish on Lake Okeechobee or vacationers who live to visit it and do the same, supporting a wide variety of businesses around Lake Okeechobee's southern edges.

Mr. Iglesias and Ms. McMillan an-

nounced the formation of a new advocacy group called Anglers for Lake Okeechobee, or AFLO, recently.

They had a meet-the-founders get-to-gether Friday night, Oct. 19, and then were giving out some swag emblazoned with the logo promoting their organization and the idea behind it from a booth set up at the Roland Martin Marine Center Series Weigh-in on Saturday afternoon.

Mr. Iglesias and Ms. McMillan are joining forces to get other fishing enthusiasts, guides and regular anglers on the Big Lake signing on and throwing their weight behind AFLO's point.

Protect livestock from Florida panthers

Because of recent incidents of Florida panthers taking livestock and pets in Collier County, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) is advising residents in the area to take the necessary precautions to properly shelter animals such as goats, sheep, calves, pigs, donkeys and chickens.

The best way for people to protect small livestock is to keep them in a secure fenced enclosure with a roof, especially at night," said FWC panther team leader Darrell Land. "We encourage people who live in panther country to take the necessary steps to protect their animals from being taken by a panther or other predators such as bears, bobcats and coyotes."

Similar safety measures should be taken to protect pets like dogs and cats by keeping them indoors at night or in an outdoor panther-proof pen.

The FWC is investigating and monitoring depredations on multiple miniature horses. Biologists have documented that panthers have killed two miniature horses and a pony in recent weeks.

People who have problems or concerns about panthers should call the FWC's Wildlife Alert Hotline at 888-404-FWCC (3922) or #FWC or *FWC on a cellphone. To report a panther sighting to the FWC, go to MyFWC. com/PantherSightings.

Hendry sends FPL plan for solar plant to state

LABELLE — The Hendry County Board voted Oct. 23 to send on to state regulators Florida Power & Light Co.'s request for permission to build a solar energy facility on 623 agricultural acres along County Road 833, about 3 miles south of State Road 80.

FPL is requesting to amend the Hendry County Comprehensive Plan to allow the FPL Blue Heron Energy Center — a solar-only facility on the property that will be limited to total generation of 74.5 megawatts of electricity. Its application asks for a text amendment to add a subarea policy in accordance with the requirements outlined for the future land use map designation of Electrical Generating Facility. The action transmits FPL's petition to the state agencies for their review and comment through the expedited review process.

Any comments they provide will be considered and incorporated into the proposed comprehensive plan language, if appropriate, and presented to the county board later for adoption.

According to the economic impact statement provided by FPL: "The facility will provide direct and indirect economic benefits to the county, including benefits from increased local expenditures for goods and services during its construction and operation. Approximately 200 jobs will be generated during its six- to 10-month construction period. Use of local labor will be encouraged, where possible. Once the solar project is in service, it will pay taxes for the remainder of its economic life, which is expected to be more than the taxes currently paid on the land in its current use of citrus farming.'

No more than 70 percent of the site will be taken up by power generating facilities, and a minimum of 30 percent will be open space, either left in native vegetation or landscaped. Solar panels will be allowed to rise no more than 20 feet off the ground. Once the plant is built, it will be unmanned except for occasional maintenance and monitoring visits. Agricultural uses (although not citrus production) still will be allowed on parts of the property not in use for power generation, and an educational/

visitor center facility also may be built

For this development, FPL will reap the benefit of a property tax exemption the Florida Legislature enacted in 2017 for renewable energy source devices that are installed after Jan. 1, 2018; the company will not pay taxes on 80 percent of the assessed value of the power generating improvements made to the property.

The staff report pointed out, however, that there is no comparable tax break for three previously approved FPL power generating facilities in Hendry County: the Hendry Solary Energy Center and Hendry County Clean Energy Facility, both located on CR 833 south of CR 846; and the FPL Hammock Solar Energy Center, located off Sears Road.

Planning and Community Development Director Margaret Emblidge said, "We won't know how much the value will be until they've actually completed their construction."

Commissioner Michael Swindle said he wanted to make a statement: "I still have a bruised kidney over the beating we took from FPL on a large tract of land in the southern part of the county. I am super-excited that FPL is in this county. ... I want to see this project happen (and) more projects happen; but I want to see some tangible returns on investments that I still have a bruised kidney from the beating that we on this dais took for months to make this possible, rather than taking property that we are not going to see full benefit from and developing it and transforming it before the other property is developed."

Commissioner Karson Turner replied: "I can't speak for other commissioners, but I think you probably have a 5-0 vote of support on that, Commissioner Swindle. And I think it's a great time to ask for an update as it relates to the south county project on that piece down there because we were raked over the coals. And I think you've seen nothing but a unanimous vote of support when we conduct business with FPL and welcome (the company) with open arms."

While it was noted that construction is expected to begin within one to two years, an update on that progress was promised.

Sad stories in state hit a new low

As if headlines about smelly blue-green algae and deadly red tide in Florida waters weren't enough, then there were all the sickening pictures of multiple dead fish and other sea life, formerly destined to be caught by tourists for sport, hooked and grilled up for dinner, or which are protected for their rarity.

Then Hurricane Michael scoured the Forgotten Coast of the Panhandle clean beyond recognition in places, killing too many of our fellow Floridians while wiping out the homes of hundreds, probably thousands of people during its mercifully quick but ravaging tempest.

Now, a young woman who was just relaxing on an idle weekend afternoon in a Tampa park has been killed by one of Florida's fabulous icons — a big palm tree - that fell on her, Hillsborough County sheriff's deputies reported Sunday, Oct. 21. Twenty-year-old Isabel Melendez was rescued from a hammock at Egmont Key Park the day before and was taken to a hospital in St. Petersburg, where she later died of her injuries.



The river needs some flow from the lake during the dry season in order to prevent saltwater intrusion. While South Florida Water Management District officials have set the minimum flow at 400 cubic feet per second, Lee County officials have argued the minimum should be 700 cfs, and that 1,000 cfs would be optimum for the health of the estuaries.

Targeted lake low benefits Caloosahatchee River

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) Jacksonville District will maintain flows at current rates from Lake Okeechobee to the estuaries.

Starting Friday, Oct. 26, the corps implemented a seven-day average pulse release of 1.000 cfs as measured at the W.P. Franklin Lock and Dam (S-79), which will continue until further notice. This flow to the Caloosahatchee is the level requested by Lee County officials as necessary for the health of the estuaries. Without some flow from the lake during the dry season, the Caloosahatchee suffers from saltwater intrusion. The minimum flow at the Franklin Lock established by South Florida Water Management District is 400 cfs. Lee County officials have asked for a minimum of 700 cfs with an optimum level of 1,000 cfs.

No flows are currently planned at the St. Lucie Lock and Dam (\$\hat{S}-80). Additional runoff from rain in the Caloosahatchee and St. Lucie basins could occasionally result in flows that exceed one or both targets.

"We will maintain our current flows of 1,000 cubic feet per second to the Caloosahatchee and zero flows to the St. Lucie," said Lt. Col. Jennifer Reynolds, Jacksonville District deputy commander for South Florida. "We will accomplish this using the additional operational flexibility that was built into the 2008 Lake Okeechobee Regulation Schedule."

The goal of utilizing additional operational flexibility in the 2008 LORS is to help manage lake levels in advance of potential El Niño conditions. which has the potential to produce a wetter than normal dry season. Water managers will continue to monitor conditions and adjust flows accordingly.

"In this instance, we are using the flexibility to allow a slightly higher flow than what LORS guidance suggests," said Lt. Col. Reynolds. "This helps meet multiple project purposes. We are managing flood risk by creating storage for potential El Niño rains. We are also enhancing environmental conditions with this extra water to ensure the mix of saltwater and freshwater in the estuary is appropriate."

The corps will continue to apply operational flexibility as long as the total volume of water released with this option remains below 164,600 acre-feet. Lake Okeechobee is currently at 13.92 feet above sea level.

The previous three-week release schedule started Friday, Oct. 5, implementing seven-day pulse releases with an average target flow for the Caloosahatchee Estuary of 2,000 cubic feet per second (cfs) as measured at W.P. Franklin Lock & Dam (S-79) near Fort Myers, and 0 cfs for the St. Lucie Estuary as measured at St. Lucie Lock & Dam (S-80) near Stuart. Average target flows to the Caloosahatchee were gradually stepped down to 1,500 cfs on Oct. 12, and 1,000 cfs on Oct. 19, while the St. Lucie target remained at zero cfs.

have existed for a long time. I have grown tired of talking about the problems in the city and not being able to do anything about it. I am ready to do something. I do not want to settle for mediocrity. I do not want to maintain the status quo. I believe we, Clewiston, can do better."

Kristine Petersen: A teacher in Clewiston High School's Public Safety Academy and a resident of Hendry County for more than 30 years, Commissioner Petersen was appointed to her seat in April 2014, then won a four-year term in her first election that fall. She is a law enforcement professional who worked for the city for 13 years previously and also serves on the Chamber of Commerce board. Saying that she's a fair and impartial consensus-builder, Ms. Petersen stated: "I would like to remain on the City Commission, keeping a fresh, conservative perspective on city issues. I will continue to focus on maintaining and improving our

outdoor assets, enhancing family activities and providing the services, infrastructure and leadership to maintain and improve our quality of life, and to have the City of Clewiston be sensitive to its employees' welfare and concern. It is important that we continue to grow our small business community, the very backbone of our city: That will entail making sure our zoning is realigned, support services are in place for small business efforts and the relationship with the chamber is robust. The "Downtown" plan should be re-evaluated (and) aligned to current needs. We heard the community concerns about the paving and implemented a progressive plan to remedy the situation. We continue to improve fiscal health, infrastructure and our flow of communication. These issues are important to all of us and I would like the opportunity to keep working to make positive changes.

Jimmy Pittman: Born and raised in Clewiston, Mr. Pittman has been a volunteer firefighter for the city for 27 years and business owner in town with his wife, Paula, for 32 years. The couple has three children. He served on the commission from 1997 to 2014 and has also served as mayor. "Clewiston has been very good to Jimmy Pittman and his family," he said at the chamber forum.

Idea to cut phosphorus could win \$10 million

MIAMI — After more than two years of testing their technologies in laboratories and in the field, the four finalists in The George Barley Water Prize — a \$10 million incentive award to find a new technology capable of removing phosphorus from polluted fresh body waters — were announced yesterday at a formal ceremony in Toronto. The four finalists each received \$125,000 to support their continuing research and development.

Phosphorus is widely used in chemical fertilizers, and while essential for plant growth and human health, excess amounts in waterways nurtures the growth of algae that is killing fish and spoiling water quality worldwide. According to the World Resources Institute, more than 15,000 freshwater bodies in the United States alone are affected by phosphorus pollution.

The George Barley Water Prize finalists who will advance to phase 4 are:

- Clean Water Machine from the University of Idaho in Moscow, Idaho;
- Wetsus NAFRAD from Leeuwarden, the Netherlands;
- Green Water Solution, Inc. from Wellington, Fla.; and
- U.S. Geological survey Leetown Science Center from Kearneysville, W.V.

"These finalists represent our best hope for solving the algae crisis that is choking waterways worldwide," said Eric Eikenberg, CEO of The Everglades Foundation, which is hosting the competition with presenting sponsor The Scotts Miracle-Gro Foundation.

The George Barley Water Prize was launched in 2016, following a state of emergency in Florida that lasted for 242 days as a result of toxic algae blooms that devastated the state's waterways.

The competition attracted 104 international competitors, which were then narrowed down to nine competitors who tested their technologies under cold weather conditions in Toronto for a 90-day stretch in early 2018. The four remaining teams will now advance to the final phase of the competition, the "Grand Challenge," where they will test their technologies in warm water conditions at Lake Jesup, near Orlando. The Florida Department of Environmental Protection is contributing \$1 million towards the final phase.

"The four finalists will engage in 14 months of intensive field testing under moderate and warm weather conditions," Mr. Eikenberg said. "These final four teams will need to prove their technologies' ability to work in both freezing and warm temperatures. This will be their opportunity to showcase the global applicability of their solutions."

Modeled after the incentive prizes that encouraged Charles Lindbergh to make the first nonstop trans-Atlantic flight and that led to the invention of fire extinguishers and commercial hydraulic turbines, The George Barley Water Prize is a \$10 million award to the team that can develop a safe, effective and affordable method to remove phosphorus from waterways on a large scale. The prize is named after the late George Barley, one of the two founders of The Everglades Foundation, Eikenberg noted.

"It's clear that groundbreaking innovation is needed to solve for harmful algae blooms caused by excess phosphorus," said Jim King, President of The Scotts Miracle-Gro Foundation. "Stage 3 marked a turning point in the Barley Prize competition, bringing innovations into the real world for testing."

"I believe Clewiston is on the upswing, and it's a great place to be and a great place to live." Asked why he's running again, he said, "I love our small town and this community and, just as I did before, I desire to take part in making it even better. I want to create positive, sustainable growth and increase commerce to expand our tax base so that we can continue to improve our infrastructure and revitalize older parts of the community. I will provide vision and positive leadership while bringing accountability and transparency to our city. I am committed to finding ways to cut costs and decrease the debt of our city with innovative ideas and hard work."

Lance Ramer: A resident of Clewiston since 1987, Mr. Ramer said, "I quickly ingrained myself into the community by offering my time and energy in many civic, philanthropic and volunteer service organizations, many of which I am still actively involved in, 31 years later. I've raised three children as a single parent during this time and could not be any more proud of them. I have 24 years of leadership experience in public, private, nonprofit and governmental organizations that I will bring to the position of city commissioner. I believe that the City of Clewiston must develop a clear, cohesive and comprehensive vision in order to be successful." He also pledged to "provide 100 percent transparency on all issues; open communication; open-mindedness; a common-sense approach to problem-solving — proactive, not reactive; complete follow-through of tasks; and initiate SMART goals (Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Reasonable and Timely) as the foundation in which to build a better community for our residents and guests. I believe the best is yet to come for

the City of Clewiston and we need to begin our preparations now for its success, or we will find ourselves behind the progress trying to keep up," Mr. Ramer wrote.

Phillip Roland: Born in Clewiston, the city commissioner seeking re-election to a third term is a retiree, an Air Force veteran and served as a Hendry County commissioner from 1974 until '94. First elected when he was 33, Mr. Roland was board chairman for 13 years. He won a two-year city commission term in 2012 and was re-elected for a fouryear term in 2014. As to why he's running again at age 77, he explained: "It's just a thing of being involved. I tell everybody, I'm certainly concerned about the infrastructure of the city, and the roads, and that we've got to keep the infrastructure up. And, you know, I've been a 'lake person.' I'm the only lake person on the commission, and I don't know of another lake person that's ever been on the commission until I was elected. And it is our lifeblood for tourism. The city should absolutely do more to capitalize on it. We need to advertise, and the Tourism Development Council is backing some tournaments and stuff that we need to market ourselves on the lake. I have encouraged that since I've been on the commission, but it's been tough. When I took office, the city was basically broke, and I served four years as mayor, and actually we were getting our feet on the ground to be a solid city. We have continued to get more monies put in reserves the last two years, and we will continue. The city is on a good path financially now, and certainly there are people out there who say we're not, but the auditor said this year that we had gone over the hump, that we were in good shape."

and heated politics heard in the coastal markets.

Declared Mr. Iglesias: "You know, for the last couple of years, Lake Okeechobee has gotten beaten down with bad press, and everyone's complaining about the discharges, and no one focuses on where the water comes from. So we have to draw attention, and the reason I'm starting the organization is these fishermen post things on the internet in defense of what's going on on the east and west coasts. We're kind of all over the place, and we're looking to unify — and that's our basic, main mission is to slow the flow coming into Lake O."

He said they started a website following up on their launch of the #SlowtheFlow Facebook page as the summer began, and realized they needed to push it more.

"You guys (the *Lake Okeechobee News*) have done a really great job of putting out facts, and unfortunately, that's not what's getting out there. It's really disappointing what the media have been putting out there on the east and west coasts," Mr. Iglesias said.

"So in July we had a rally for Slow the Flow, and we took 26 people out from the east and west coasts. We had pontoon boats, airboats and bass boats out there, and every one of those people when they came off the lake were saying basically the same thing, that, oh, this isn't what they've seen on the news. Well, ironically, we took

three separate reporters out, from Link News, NBC2 and Fox4, and they all told their captain, 'This isn't what we've been reporting on the lake.'

"And then that evening, they posted the bad stuff, you know, and I know their producers just pushed it on them, but it's just crazy how we just can't get a fair shake."

Ms. McMillan said, "My family's been on the lake for many decades now dating back to being commercial fishermen, and we've just grown from there, doing tournaments. We've had tournaments that have been coming to the lake annually that aren't coming because of the bad publicity, which is all fake news." She was referring to the FLW series.

"We're not going to have that coming in January, and we feel like that's going to really hurt everybody, the tourism and everything," she added.

Mr. Iglesias said: "We will continue to educate people and explain to them that over 95 percent of the water that comes into Lake Okeechobee, comes from the north. So a big part of the solution to fix this problem has to be storage north of the lake, and we must use deep injection wells to store water and clean water, and ASR (aquifer storage and recovery) wells, and we just need a better focus to north of the lake."

Ms. McMillan feels strongly about their mission. "We still have many tournaments, every weekend, every month, year-round around the lake because it's a great fishery, but it is going to start affecting us if we don't do something now."

Young citrus trees may benefit from full irrigation

GAINESVILLE — Mature citrus trees affected by the bacterial disease Huanglongbing typically need about 25 percent less irrigation than their healthy counterparts — but that doesn't necessarily mean young trees with the disease will benefit from water deficits, according to a preliminary greenhouse study by researchers with the University of Florida Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences.

Experiments on 1-year-old orange trees showed similar responses to irrigation in healthy trees and those affected by Huanglongbing, also known as HLB or citrus greening disease. Diseased or not, the trees grew faster when they received daily irrigation that kept pace with losses from evapotranspiration, a measurement that combines two types of water loss — evaporation from soil, trunk, stem and leaf surfaces, and losses from transpiration, the process by which water vapor exits the tree through its leaf pores during the day.

This result suggests that young, HLB-affected trees benefit most from a "full ration" of water, a finding that surprised

researchers, said soil and water science expert Davie Kadyampakeni, an assistant professor with the UF/IFAS Citrus Research and Education Center in Lake Alfred.

"Over the past few years, there has been interest in the possibility that mature trees with HLB might benefit from temporary irrigation deficits, because when we impose those conditions it can force a tree to improve its water-use efficiency," Mr. Kadyampakeni said. "But our findings indicate that young trees with HLB grew faster when they received what growers would consider a full ration of water."

In recent years, UF/FAS researchers have determined that mature HLB-affected citrus trees require about 25 percent less water than their healthy counterparts, he said. The exact reasons are unclear, but reductions in leaf area and root function have been cited as possible causes. Because mature HLB-affected trees often continue to produce marketable fruit for years, one of the top priorities for UF/IFAS citrus experts is to find methods of supporting tree health throughout the early stages of the HLB disease process.

that the team may have uncovered an important new aspect of the disease process, and that growers might want to consider providing full irrigation to all young trees, regardless of their HLB status, he said.

"These findings are intriguing, but we're not ready to issue a recommendation

yet," Mr. Kadyampakeni said. "We need to follow up with field trials ... to assess the irrigation needs of young trees under typical industry conditions. You have to remember that this was a greenhouse study, and the vast majority of Florida citrus is grown outdoors."


