

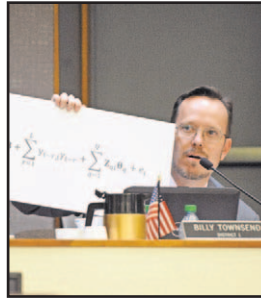

Will the county run out of money?

POLK COUNTY – Polk County Manager Jim Freeman used the 2018 Polk Vision State of the County speech, April 25 to publicize that the county may be running out of money.

At a county work session, April 10, the newspaper previously reported that commissioners and staff discussed a recent county financial audit that stated the county "savings account" has been dwindling since 2011. Freeman took over as county manager in 2010. The audit stated there is \$4.2M currently in the "savings account" but that all of this money is already spoken for in terms of future matching grants and other applications. The audit further stated that

if voters passed the Homestead Exemption expansion in November, that the county would lose \$6M in income from property taxes.

During the 2018 State of the County speech, Freeman said if the Homestead Exemption expansion is voted into the Florida Constitution this November, that the

WINTER HAVEN – On social security alone, Paula Sullivan lived on \$30 per week in food expenses prior to TGIF April 27, 2018.

After thanking God, one of the first things she did after winning the Publisher's Clearing House \$1M SuperPrize was take her best friend Sandra out for a nice buffet for salmon and some shrimp. Sullivan said she uses the PCH website like a habit; she showers, eats breakfast, plays the lotto, cleans the house and then around 1pm she plays some games online.

"It's like having a job at home that paid off," Sullivan said.

Last TGIF Sullivan was handed a \$25k check and will end up with around 350k out of 1M according to her attorney.

"That's 350k I didn't have before," she said. "It came at a time when I truly needed it. I went to church last night and didn't tell anybody. I just thanked the Lord for the favor. It's more than I could ever ask for."

May Happenings at the History Center

POLK COUNTY — Journey into Polk history this month at the Polk County History Center. The following programs and events are open to the public and free of charge:

- May's Family Program – Curators of Curiosity - All Month

- Learn about the history of the Mother's Day holiday, and create a special Mother's Day card in the children's gallery. The holiday is celebrated with cards, flowers, gifts, and more phone calls than any other day of the year. While there is a tradition of honoring mothers that has both Greco-Roman and Christian roots in Europe, Anna Jarvis began the celebration in the United States in 1908. Since 1914, the second Sunday in May has been officially designated as Mother's Day in the United States.

- May 15, 12:15 to 1 p.m. – Lunch and Learn – "Revolutionary Rogues: The Spanish American Adventurers Who Tried to Conquer Florida," by David Head.

- In the summer of 1817, a group of pirates

and privateers invaded Amelia Island, then a Spanish colony, in hopes of striking a blow for the Spanish American revolutions. The presentation will tell the stories of how these revolutionary rogues and their leaders planned to free Florida from Spanish rule, and how the United States intervened to stop them. David Head is an historian, author and lecturer of history at the University of Central Florida in Orlando. His first book, "Privateers of the Americas: Spanish American Privateering from the United States in the Early Republic," was published by the University of Georgia Press in 2015. He is also the editor of, "The Golden Age of Piracy: The Rise, Fall, and Enduring Popularity of Pirates," coming June 2018. He is currently writing a book on George Washington and the Continental Army at the end of the American Revolution.

- Book Club Recommended Reading is, "Privateers of the Americas: Spanish American Privateering from the United States in the Early Republic," by Dr. David Head.

- David Head looks at how Spanish American

privateering worked in the early 1800s, a practice that was sanctioned by, and conducted on behalf of, republics in Spanish America seeking independence from Spain. Learn how the U.S. government responded, how privateers evaded laws, and what prompted them to choose privateering as a line of work.

- May 19, 11 a.m. – Architectural Tour
Join us for an architectural tour of the History Center and learn about neoclassical architecture, the construction of the building and the stories behind the iconic Old Polk County Courthouse. The architectural tour is on the third Saturday of each month at 11 a.m.

- New Permanent Exhibit – "Imperial Polk's Services"

A new gallery has been transformed into a permanent exhibit exploring the roots of Polk County Government. "Imperial Polk's Services" details the formation of the county seat and the county commission, along with the origins of Polk's earliest functions: education, emergency services, law

enforcement, doctors and hospitals. After becoming an official county on Feb. 8, 1861, the first order of business was to elect commissioners and establish the location of the county seat - the administrative center for a county's local government. A fully restored circa 1890s doctor's buggy fills the center of the room. Other interesting artifacts include dedication plaques from the Polk County Stockade and Polk County Hospital, Sheriff John Logan's service revolver and an assortment of antique medical instruments, school supplies and equipment from local law enforcement and firefighters.

- May 24, 2:30 p.m. – The Polk County Historical Commission and Marker Committee will meet at the Polk County History Center. The meetings are open to the public.

The Polk County History Center is open 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday at 100 E. Main St. in Bartow. Visit www.polkhistorycenter.org or call (863) 534-4386 for more information on exhibits and programming. All programs and events are free and open to the public.

Rep. Dennis Ross to speak at Tiger Bay Club meeting

Congressman Dennis A. Ross, who announced earlier this month that he will not seek a fifth term in the United States House of Representatives, will speak at the May meeting of the Tiger Bay Club of Polk County.

Ross, one of a growing number of members of Congress who have announced that they will not run again, is senior deputy majority whip in the House.

After receiving his law degree from Cumberland School of Law at Samford University, Ross worked as an associate in the Holland and Knight law firm, then became in-house counsel for Walt Disney World.

He later opened his own law practice,

and was elected to the Florida House of Representatives, serving until 2008.

He will speak at the Tiger Bay meeting on Thursday, May 3, at the Bartow Civic Center. The meeting begins at 11:30 a.m.

Tiger Bay is a non-partisan political interest group that meets each month to hear speakers who hold positions of leadership in government, politics, commerce, and related fields.

Visitors are invited. The charge, which includes a buffet luncheon, is \$15 for members and \$25 for non-members.

Trading out principals for site coordinators

POLK COUNTY – Six county public schools are at risk of receiving their third or fourth consecutive D or F grade in July. For any that do, their administration will be transferred from the Polk County School Board to Educational Directions, LLC of Kentucky until their school grade is raised to a C or higher.

The six schools are Garner Elementary on Havendale Boulevard in Winter Haven, Bartow Middle, Lake Alfred Polytech Academy and Kathleen Middle, Lake Marion Creek Middle, and Griffin Elementary in Lakeland.

According to the contract, staff at all of these schools will remain employees of the school board regardless of what grade their school receives this summer. But based on paperwork associated with the contract, the name tag on the principal's office will change to site coordinator and the teachers may start getting called academic coaches.

PCSB Chief Academic Officer Dr. Michael Akes, compared the contract to outsourcing work for an electric contractor on a big construction job.

PCSB board members Billy Townsend and Hazel Summers expressed dissent with the state law, which provides three options to schools with consistently failing grades: close the school and move the kids to a better school, turn the school over permanently to a charter school operator or hire a outside contractor to try and help turn the school around.

Nothing in the contract describes what will happen if the contractor cannot turn the school around.

For the past year, Townsend has expressed passion in opposition to how schools are

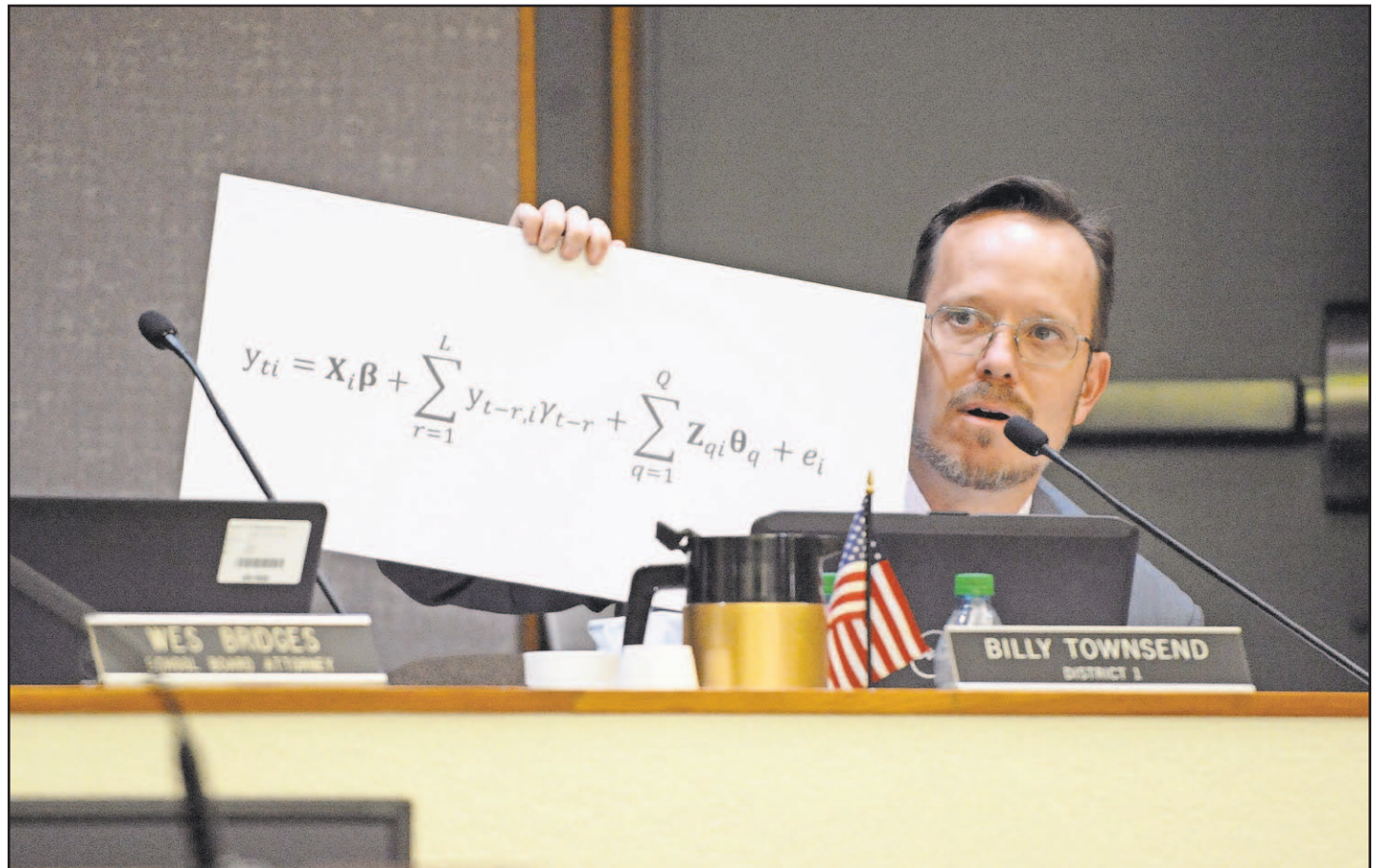

graded and how school boards are having to share funding with charter schools. In the end he voted to approve the contract as opposed to closing the schools or transferring them permanently.

Before voicing his vote, Townsend held up a placard with the VAM formula written on it, the formula used to measure the contribution of a teacher or a school to student learning growth according to the DoE website.

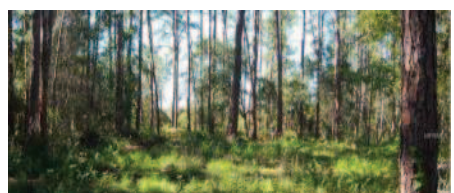

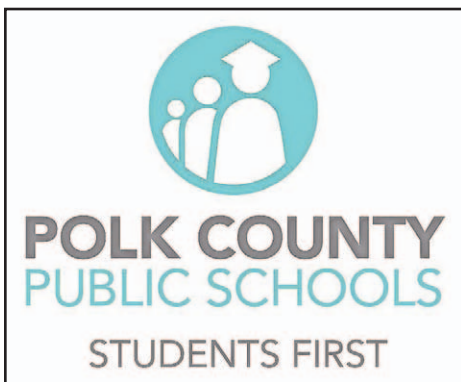

POLK COUNTY – A group of Auburndale High School students and their teacher, in partnership with area business leaders, were unanimously selected as designers of the new Polk County School Board logo April 24.

Students Conner Grove, Caitlynn McCahill, Ross Persichetti and Jaedyn Smith came up with a logo with the slogan “Students First” with help from teacher Emily Kauwell.

The new logo and tagline immediately replace the older “Knowledge is Power” seal. The new logo was built into the school board table and covered prior to the school board meeting. Before announcing the winning team, the cover was removed for those in attendance to see.

“We provided brains worthy of Polk County public schools,” AHS Senior Persichetti said from a podium to the board.

“From the very beginning we realized that our audience isn’t just teachers, isn’t just students, it isn’t the school board. It’s

absolutely everyone from a pre-schooler all the way to an adult, from every ethnicity, every culture, every language.”

county government will subsequently have an estimated \$11M budget deficit.

"That will just mean that the investments that we have been able to make in public safety and infrastructure will have to decline because we have to by law adopt a balanced budget," Freeman said. "We don't do deficit spending."

Freeman said if it comes to that, the deficit would not be a result of frivolous spending; the vast majority of county spending is on public safety. The Polk County Sheriff's Office benefits from this investment in terms of crime rates going down for many years in a row Freeman said.

The \$4.2M in "savings" is in quotations because Hurricane Irma cost the county around \$46M. FEMA and state government will reimburse most but not all of that amount. Freeman said the county has not received any of those state or federal dollars yet.

Both Freeman and Polk County Board of County Commissioners Chairman Todd Dantzler, who also spoke at the event, described the state of the county as good despite the possibility of an \$11M county deficit next year, seven years of spending more money than they took in and a hurricane that did much more damage than Hurricane Charley in 2004.

Both spoke at length about spending millions of taxpayer dollars trying to convince businesses leaders to choose Polk County to set up shop. Many say business leaders choose to move to Florida because there is no income tax, few unions and little government regulation, not because of tax incentives. For example, Dantzler proudly said he helped convince owners of a nationwide steel producer to pick Polk County, in part, with millions in local incentives. Seconds after saying this, he told the crowd that the corporation, Nucor, turned down \$90M in tax incentives offered by a community in North Carolina to move to the Frostproof area.

Nucor staff have gone on record as saying they chose Florida because they have recycling yards all over Central Florida but no steel mill to process all of the metal they want to turn into rebar. It's unknown how many recycling yards they have in the other community they said they wanted to build a mill.

Dantzler said since 2013, 4,887 new jobs have been created in the county and that 1,568 of these jobs were a product of tax incentives.

Freeman thanked the crowd for voting for a tourism tax in his first year as county manager in 2010. The county commission has used the relatively new tax to spend \$5.5M on the Lake Myrtle Sports Complex recently, \$14M for

upgrades to Joker Marchant Stadium in 2012, \$7M on the Lakeland Center upgrades, \$11M on the Winter Haven Chain of Lakes Field House project and they are currently considering an additional \$5M for a horse equestrian facility near Ft. Meade.

Freeman said since 2005 when a higher property tax and a new transportation tax were added, more than \$1B has been spent on local roads. Funding for the first phase of the Polk Parkway is now in place and the extension to SR60 should be complete within a decade. Freeman also said CR557 connecting Lake Alfred to I4 should be expanded to four lanes in the coming years.

Freeman also touched on what he called "explosive" growth in the northeast part of the county but avoided talking how he and his staff have chosen to manage that growth.

The newspaper has published repeated articles about how this area of the county is running out of water and how municipal governments are being asked to pay to fix that problem through the Polk Regional Water Cooperative.

Freeman said water was too complex an issue to talk about during his speech.

November won't just be important due to the Homestead Exemption vote. Voters will also be selecting replacements for County Commissioners Dantzler and Melony Bell, who are both reaching term limits. The two new commissioners and the three other commissioners not up for re-election will have to decide whether to raise taxes again or reduce public safety spending if the Homestead vote is approved.

Running for Bell's seat are Kathryn Gates-Skipper and Rick Wilson. Running for Dantzler's seat are Martha Santiago and Jim Guth. They are all Republicans.

Bell will be running for the Florida House now that she has termed out of the county commission. The house seat is being vacated by Ben Albritton who will be running for a geographically huge Florida Senate against Lake Wales resident Catherine Price. Melony Bell is facing fellow Bartow resident Jeff Mann for a Florida House seat representing Bartow and Ft. Meade. All of these politicians are Republicans as well.

The homestead exemption law in Florida is somewhat complicated, but generally

speaking, right now your primary home is exempt from taxes for the first \$25k and values between \$50k and 75k. A \$75k homeowner, for example, only pays taxes for the value of the home between \$25k and \$50k. If state residents vote to expand this in November, those with homes valued under \$75k will pay no property taxes other than those for public school.

Republican state legislators in Tallahassee put the vote on the ballot as a means of stopping local governments from using rising home values to generate additional local spending money. Many local government leaders have expressed opposition to this citing a law called home rule. The newspaper will explain this more as the election approaches.

You know, when Brian and I got married, we had all these dreams. Yes, stupid unrealistic dreams. I am saying this because we now laugh at how naïve we were to life. We thought it was that easy. We will buy a house, have four children, travel, have money, and be those over the top "my kids are perfect" parents. Wrong! Now, we look at each other at the end of the day and wonder how we have made it this far. Every night we go to bed and laugh about all the things that are not important to us anymore, especially our bank account. Not in a bad way, but in a "I need a glass of wine to get through this moment" kind of way.

Life is so unpredictable and not what you expect. In a million years, I would have never thought I would be a mother of a child with autism just trying to get from 8am-9pm. Then, at 9pm, coordinate the next day in a strategic way, as if I am going to trek up Mount Everest, when really it is just preparing Ava's backpack for the day. Anyone who knows me knows that I am a fly by the seat of my pants kind of person, so I am sure I am God's sitcom right now.

I believe being a full-time teacher has made me sane. I used to think, "there is no way I can work and be a mother of a child with autism who truly needs me." That is false. My work has been my saving grace. I work better under pressure anyways. Sometimes I think if I eliminated my work, what would my life be like? All I see is a big black hole of silence and emptiness. Also, I would drive my husband in a mental institution because I would have time to "think." Whenever I say to him, "You know I was thinking" his response to me is "Oh no, please don't think." In a

strange way, even though I feel stressed every day, work has helped with Ava. Weird, but it works.

I am so fortunate for our autism village. We have a so much support for Ava. I have never talked about the funny situations with autism that makes me say "Open up your best bottle of wine." I am so used to people saying, "No way." But yes, we have been in some funny, amusing situations that years ago I would have probably fainted. I have learned to live with it and always have a good pair of sunglasses, so I don't make eye contact with people.

Vacations — You say vacations, I say "Let's take my life and see how complicated and crazy I can be." No lie. Who takes food on a cruise ship? Me! You want to know why? What if Ava won't eat anything on the ship because food is sensory for her and she is "hangry" and we are in the middle of the ocean? Nobody wants "hangry" Ava. Yes, I have checked in turkey, cheese slices, goldfish, and Capri Suns in a cooler at a cruise terminal. The people look at me like, "You do know that there is a disgusting amount of food on this ship?" I just do my spiel, "I have a daughter with autism" Blah, Blah – mind your own business." Every time we have gone, I am glad I packed my special ops cooler of Ava food.

I knew my best friend would be my best friend forever when we went on vacation with our families. This was a friend "audition" for Janel. I knew we were friends, but could she really "hang" with us? You don't know our autism family until you have been on vacation with us. She passed with flying colors, meaning she did not check her family out of the hotel early

and block my number. Granted, we had only been on vacation with our immediate family members who are used to our vacation rituals but exposing our autism vacation rituals to friends was new to us.

Our best moment, where I knew we would be friends, was when we were swimming in the hotel pool with our families for the first time. Janel went to go get some food at the tiki bar for everyone. I oversaw our four children who were swimming in the hotel pool. Yes, our husbands were there but floating on rafts in the deep end and talking about golf as if they were in the adult only pool, basically relaxing. Ava saw a family sitting in a row in chairs eating Twizzlers. I saw her take notice of the Twizzlers. I felt like the moment was in slow motion. I know I have developed an autism mom superpower because I did foresee the future right when I saw the family bring their Twizzlers into the open air. She walked over to them, grabbed all the Twizzlers

out of their hands, and shoved them in her mouth.

They stared at her dumbfounded and had no idea what to say or think. Ava looked at them and said, "thank you." Then, Ava jumped into the pool as if nothing happened. Janel was waving me down from the line and laughing. I could not do anything because I was watching our babies swim. Well, I watched the family talk about what had happened. I sat and stared and wondered if I should go up to them and apologize. "Me" today would have probably pretended it didn't happen and just put my sunglasses on and drink a margarita, but I was still an autism rookie mom. I walked up and said, "I am so sorry. My daughter has autism and loves Twizzlers. I can buy you some more." They said, "No worries. She said thank you." They were very sweet. When Janel came back, I looked at her and we

laughed. I said, "Welcome to our world." That whole weekend was so relaxed and comfortable because I realized Janel did not care about our craziness. She accepted it and let it be. To this day, she still accepts my crazy. I hope she knows that her "audition" helped me open our family life to others and to know that it is okay to be who we are because at the end of the day, it doesn't matter what people think.

As you can see, this autism momma despises hotel pools. No, not for the germs or kids screaming and jumping in the water. I despise them because I run around in a bathing suit trying to protect all the foamy pool noodles. Ava loves to bite pool noodles because they are sensory to her and she likes the texture. I probably owe a handful of people in this world a pool noodle because Ava has taken a big bite off it. When we get to the hotel pool with other people, it is an out of body experience for me. I will walk around the pool and encourage people to hold onto their pool noodles. They look at me like I am crazy. Ava is very active. She just won't sit and play in the pool. She gets in and out. What's

funnier, is when a hotel pool has a spa. I pity the people in the spa when our family comes. Usually, we will get the spa all to ourselves after one minute. Let's just say when going to a hotel pool, there is no relaxing and sitting down watching my kids swim. I am a side show to people- running around, hiding noodles and pool toys, and apologizing for Ava doing cannonballs in the spa. Not to mention, there was a phase Ava went through where she would push anybody standing on the outside of the pool. The neighborhood kids love Ava and let her push them in to the pool for fun. That is how they interacted with her. I should have known when she pushed a grown man in the pool that would carry over to our vacation world. Oops.

I guess you could say, going on vacation for this autism family is comparable to the movie Rambo. Creeping around, going alternate routes, avoiding candy shops, chasing Ava all around the pool, hiding other families beach toys under towels (and I don't even know them), making sure the restaurants have yellow cheese or pizza, and packing for two nights like we are moving into the hotel is just a normal vacation for us.

Vacations are fun to think about, but when the day of departure comes, our family goes into some special ops active

duty roles for Ava. My husband is the muscle, meaning he diffuses situations if she is getting upset in public. I am the planner and strategist. I will find out every emergency exit, make friends with the lifeguards so they don't holler too much at us, and have a plan for entering and exiting the hotel without her seeing the ice cream shop. My youngest daughter is the peacekeeper and the look out for anything out of the norm when we are walking around somewhere new that could upset Ava or make her have a meltdown. She will walk ahead of us and warn us if there is anything that will upset her and that's where my emergency exit routes come in handy. It is a team effort. We have all learned our roles over the years. We have learned that our vacations are not the typical family vacations filled with excursions and relaxation. They have funny stories; humor and we always have something to talk about later. I guess it is character building. We have also learned what not to do with Ava from previous vacations. It is an art we have been perfecting over the years – How to vacation, autism style.

So, what if our fictitious dreams when we

got married never came true. It is about creating new dreams and accepting what life has given you. If it weren't for Ava, I might not know all the wonderful people she has brought into my life. Helping others see the beauty in her differences in this world is my new dream. Ava has helped me, as a teacher, look at students who need extra care when they are in my class and be sensitive to families who need to have that teacher who "get" their child. God's plan for me was different than the one I thought it would be when I was planning this glorious, pretend dream life. After autism hit our world, I realized life is what you make of it and there is not a rewind button. You can either be happy or be miserable. I chose happiness.

Autism was not going to be a curse for our family but an acceptance of a life that is beyond our control. I always say autism families have a free pass into heaven. I am just hoping there is an open bar.

FEMA tops \$1 billion for Florida Irma survivors

ORLANDO – Federal assistance to help individuals and families recover from Hurricane Irma now tops \$1 billion, seven months after the Sept. 10, 2017 disaster declaration.

The \$1 billion, approved through FEMA's Individuals and Households Program includes \$693.4 million in Housing Assistance—\$503.8 million to help pay rent for those whose homes were not habitable after the storm and another \$180.8 million for home repairs. Nearly \$307 million was approved for Other Needs Assistance, which helps with other losses and disaster expenses that can make it hard for people to get back on their feet, such as transportation to and clothes for work, childcare and disaster-related funeral expenses.

In addition to the \$1 billion for individuals and families, federal funding continues through the Small Business Administration and the National Flood Insurance Program. The SBA has approved about \$1.4 billion in low-interest disaster loans for homes and businesses. The NFIP has paid, to date, about \$893 million in 28,375 claims. Help continues through FEMA's Public Assistance Program, which

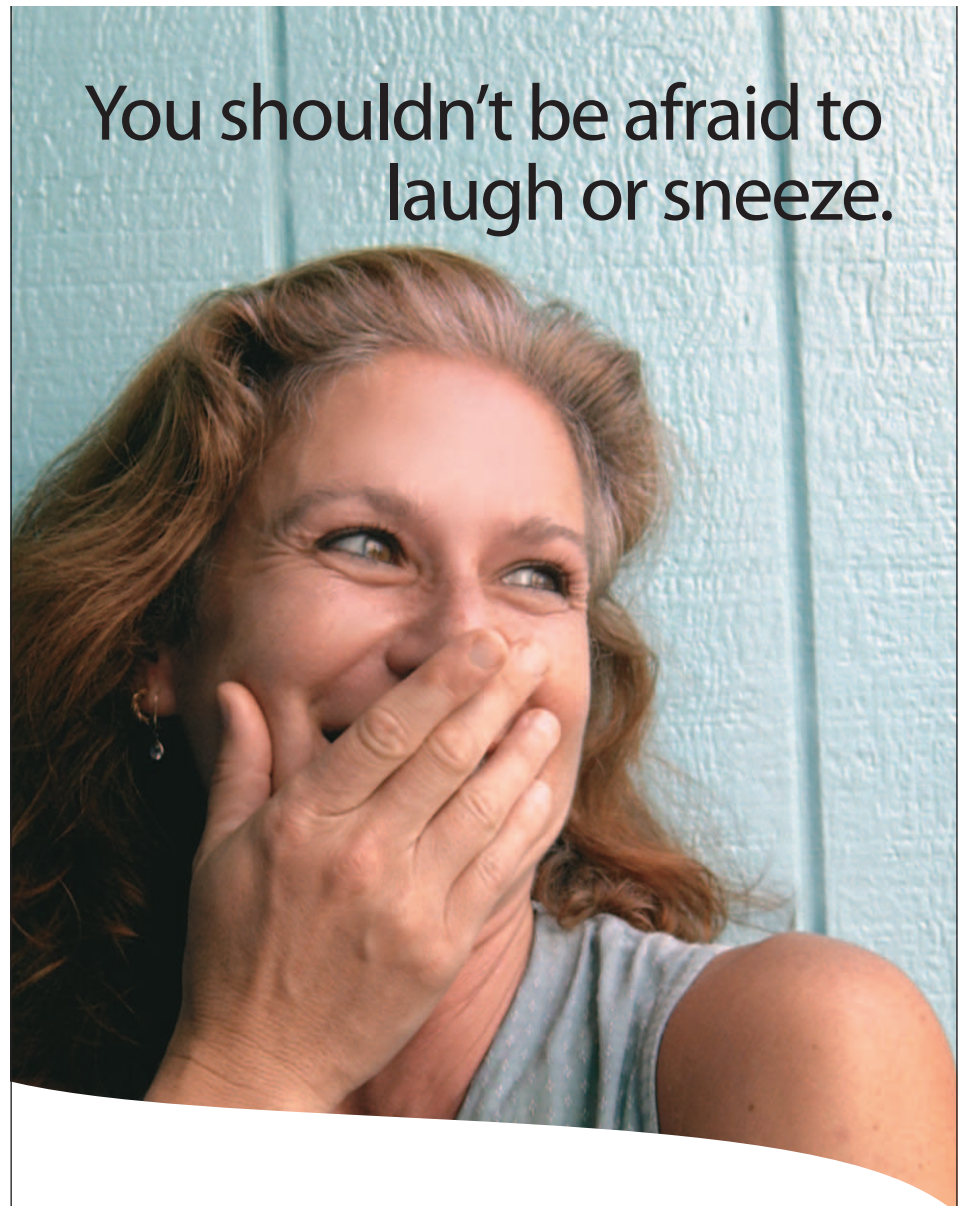
reimburses state and local governments and some Private Nonprofit organizations for storm-generated debris removal, the cost of preparing for and responding to the disaster, and the repair or replacement of eligible infrastructure including roads, bridges, buildings and utilities. To date, nearly \$40 million has been approved through the PA Program.

The disaster declaration made Florida eligible for Hazard Mitigation Assistance throughout the state. HMGP provides grants to states, and tribal and local governments to implement long-term hazard mitigation measures that reduce the loss of life and property due to natural disasters. The grants provide funding for mitigation measures to be implemented according to local and state priorities. This month, about \$2 million in HMGP funds was awarded to Pasco County to strengthen the Pasco County Wiregrass Sports Arena—awaiting construction in Wesley Chapel—above and beyond building codes to withstand winds up to 170 mph.

The federal share of Public Assistance and HMGP in Florida's Hurricane Irma recovery is not less than 75 percent of the eligible cost. The state determines how

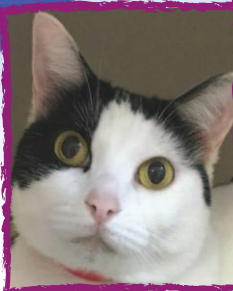

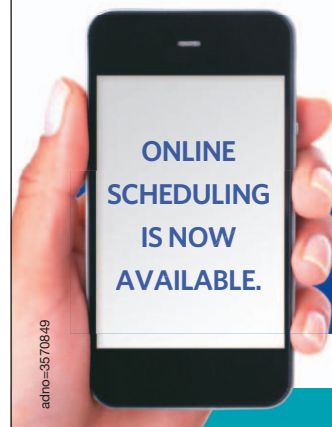

School board, PCSO create hybrid school safety plan

POLK COUNTY – The Polk County School Board voted unanimously to hire 90 people whose sole job would be to react in the event of deadly violence on campus and to plan accordingly. Job applications are already online.

The Marjory Stoneman Douglas Public Safety Act mandates that every zoned public school have an armed guard and authorized funding to pay for some additional School Resource Officers. The law authorized plenty of money to hire school staff such as teachers to go through the process of being able to carry a weapon on campus.

Early in the process of debating how to set Polk County School Board policy after the law passed, Superintendent Byrd said she opposed arming teachers and wanted only SRO staff to focus on security. Subsequently PCSO Sheriff Grady Judd spoke at a school board meeting, in part, to verify that there was not enough funding to put a SRO in every school and that there was ample funding to do background checks on and certify a school staff member to be armed guardians.

Superintendent Jacqueline Byrd, her staff, and staff with the Polk County Sheriff's Office came up with a hybrid plan to satisfy those who oppose arming teachers that also complies with the law. Together they came

up with a plan to hire people whose only job would be responding to deadly violence on campus and helping school staff plan for such.

From County Road (CR) 630 to east of Kissimmee River Bridge

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), District One, is holding a Public Hearing for the State Road (SR) 60 Project Development and Environment (PD&E) study from County Road (CR) 630 in Polk County to east of the Kissimmee River Bridge in Osceola County. All members of the public are invited to attend.

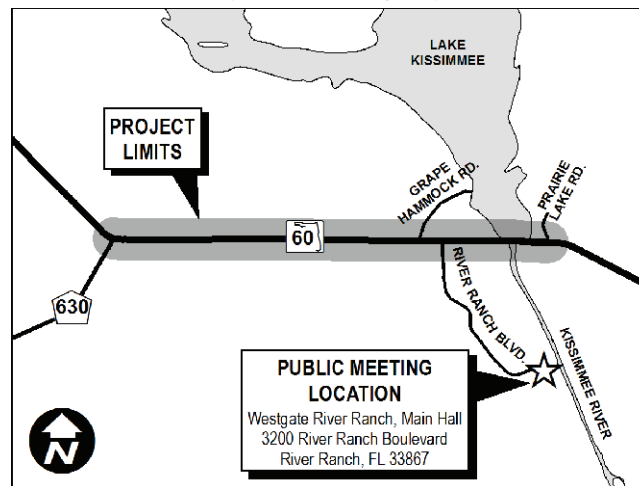
The hearing is Thursday, May 24, 2018, at Westgate River Ranch, Main Hall, 3200 River Ranch Boulevard, River Ranch, FL 33867. The hearing begins with an open house at 5 p.m. and follows with a formal presentation and public comment period at 6 p.m. People attending the hearing can review the project displays and speak one-on-one with project team members about the proposed widening of SR 60. Written statements or exhibits submitted at the hearing, emailed, or mailed and postmarked by June 4, 2018, will become part of the official hearing transcript. FDOT selected a recommended widening alternative that will construct two new travel lanes separated from the existing travel lanes by a 40-foot-wide grassed median. The median will improve safety by creating a buffer between eastbound and westbound traffic. The proposed improvements will require FDOT to acquire right-of-way, or property, for road widening and stormwater management areas. Existing access to properties along SR 60 will change due to the addition of median, a result of widening the road. The no-build alternative, where no improvements other than routine maintenance are made to SR 60 through 2040, will remain viable throughout the remainder of the study.

Project information and graphics showing the project's location and proposed improvements will be available for public viewing from May 3, 2018, to June 4, 2018, at two locations. One is the Lake Wales Public Library, 290 Cypress Garden Lane, Lake Wales, Florida. Please call the library at (863) 678-4004 for hours of operation. The other location is the FDOT District One Headquarters, 801 North Broadway Avenue, Bartow, Florida. FDOT sent notices to all property owners located within at least 300 feet on either side of the SR 60 project limits, as well as other interested parties. BENEATH THE CHINABERRY TREE

Winter Haven Hospital Evolves to Today's Medical Center

Continuing from last week's Winter Haven Hospital origins, in 1936, the Public Works Administration agreed to build a new hospital if all assets and operations were turned over to the city. About the same time, Dr. Simpson treated David B. Mills, a wealthy philanthropist who had been badly injured in an automobile accident. To show his gratitude Mills offered a generous gift of \$20,000 to build the hospital contingent upon matching contributions from the community. Mrs. George Aycrigg chaired the fund drive that raised \$22,472. Mills delivered his \$20,000 and an additional \$6,000 for equipment before the hospital opened.

In March 1937 a new charter was adopted and the city commission formally transferred the hospital assets and operations back to a board of directors. The name was changed to Winter Haven Hospital, Inc.

Following the fundraising the city approached the Frierson-Nichols American Legion regarding a tract of land they owned on Lake Martha. The city offered the post other land and the post donated the current location of the hospital to the city.

In 1938 the hospital medical staff organized formally with Dr. Simpson as its first Chairman.

New wings for the hospital were completed in 1947, 1953, and 1960. John A. Snively and Tom Swann were primary leaders of fund drives for several of these expansions resulting in various wings or buildings named in their honor.

In 1964 Tom Swann again led a \$600,000 fund drive to build an eight-story tower. The Hospital Auxiliary pledged \$100,000, medical staff pledges totaled \$105,000 and with a generous community, \$750,000 was raised.

In November, 1965, the hospital proceeded to build an eight-story addition. The \$3,760,000 building permit was the largest the city had ever issued. A federal grant obtained by Congressman James A. Haley helped amass the funds necessary. The building, dedicated in October, 1967, was named for Hospital Board President,

Tom B. Swann for his role in seeing the project through to completion. The entire project cost \$5.2 million.

When the tower was dedicated, a pool and garden fronting the main entrance was dedicated to the memory of Dr. Terrell Simpson for his role in organizing the city's first hospital in 1926.

The hospital has continued robust growth and is now among the largest employers in Polk County. Significant milestones include: The "Street" and "Arnold" buildings, Cancer Treatment Center, Regency Medical Center, "Gill Jones" Campus, Bostick Heart Center and has Joint Commission certification as a Stroke Center. In 2013 the hospital became a part of the BayCare Health System. A group of dedicated Winter Haven citizens continue to serve in an advisory capacity.

The medical center continues to expand with 2017 welcoming a new Emergency Department and expansion.

"She's really special, and this day is special," Johnson said, speaking before teammates, relative and supporters during a ceremony at the Lake Wales High School auditorium. "It's a new beginning and opportunity. It's going to take a lot of effort and more hard work, but we know you have what it takes."

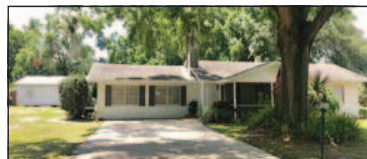

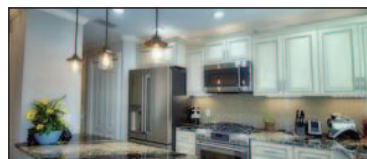

Security in today's world, and a question

It is hard to understand, in these days of security systems in many homes and hidden cameras in virtually every major store, that today's generation of seniors (as we are affectionately known) can remember when you didn't lock your doors.

It was more than just confidence that

nobody would walk into your home and take your possessions. It was a courtesy to those who lived nearby.

If a neighbor needed a cup of sugar for a recipe, it was a given that she (men didn't bake in those days) could go into your house and help herself. To find the door locked would be an insult.

I can well remember the day this paradigm of trust changed in our family. We returned home one day around the late 1940s to discover that someone had walked into our

unlocked home and stolen whatever loose change was in sight, along with what was in a coffee can that I had helpfully labeled with its contents.

We were more offended by this violation of trust by an unknown neighbor (though we thought we knew who it was) than we were by the loss of a few bucks. With some reluctance, we began locking our doors whenever all three members of the family were away.

That trust has been replaced by deadbolt

locks, burglar alarms with motion detectors that send an alert to a monitoring company, and other measures.

Today, when private delivery services compete with the Postal Service for delivery of purchases to our homes, there is still a degree of trust. Though mailboxes are vulnerable to crimes of opportunity, and "porch pirates" can steal packages left at front doors by UPS and FedEx, both of these practices survive in many communities.

A cogent argument can be made for the premise that this is less intrusive than entry to the home. But my friend Mary, who is, by most accounts, smarter than the average bear, raised this question: If you are not at home, what are the chances that your car will be parked in the driveway? As usual, I had no answer.

According to Judd, there's another Trump

Polk County Sheriff Grady Judd, one of the most media-savvy law enforcement executives in the state, possibly the nation, made a surprising observation about President Trump in a speech to the Bartow Rotary Club last week.

Judd was elected earlier this year as president of the Major County Sheriffs of America, an organization of sheriffs of counties with a population in excess of 500,000. He was one

of nine sheriffs from around the country to meet with Trump to discuss issues of importance to local law enforcement agencies.

Judd has a reputation for speaking his mind, whether he is offering praise or condemnation.

In addition to noting that Trump spent about twice as much time with the lawmen as had been scheduled, Judd said that the Donald Trump that he met in the White House bears little resemblance to the Donald Trump who begins almost every day with twitter-rants against the press, the Democratic Party, and anybody else he perceives as his opponents.

Judd said that in meeting with the sheriffs, the president was courteous, responsive, and (our word, not his) presidential.

That said, Judd acknowledged that the president's daily attacks and name-calling make Trump his own worst enemy.

Grady Judd is nobody's fool, and when he says that the nation's chief executive is capable of showing leadership worthy of the office he holds, we find that observation encouraging.

We recall that at the start of each of the two major party nominating conventions in 2016, leaders of each party said they were

on the verge on nominating the only candidate who could not win the election.

Indeed, we found little to admire in either Candidate Hillary Clinton or Candidate Donald Trump. Both parties, in our opinion, could have fielded far better candidates.

The president has never sought our counsel, and we do not expect that to change. But if he did, we could give him no better advice than to sit down one-on-one with Grady Judd and learn how to get his message across to the nation at large as smoothly as he did to some of the nation's top sheriffs.

May is Mental Health Month...a time to raise awareness about people who deal with mental health on a daily basis. We are working to fight the stigma of having a mental illness, and offer support for those living with it.

About one in five Americans have at least one form of mental illness, and many of them either have no access to treatment, do not seek treatment, or self-medicate. Most never reach a crisis where they need law enforcement intervention. But, untreated mental illness is one of the things that deputies at the Polk County Sheriff's Office deal with every day responding to calls

or working with inmates in jail.

For this reason, our deputies receive comprehensive Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) training so they are better able to understand mental illness and how to deal with any problems associated with it. Our goal is to keep someone in crisis from harming themselves or others, while getting them the help they need.

To minimize law enforcement involvement with those with a mental illness, we strongly advocate that they should receive treatment, have a good support system (e.g.: friends and family), and stay away from drugs and alcohol.

Please know, that if we are called regarding someone in crisis, we're not intending to take them to jail. We're

going to try to get that person to a hospital to get them the help they need, and we're going to follow-up afterwards, to help them access treatment. Punishment is not what they need, compassion is.

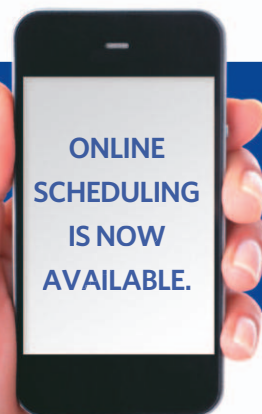

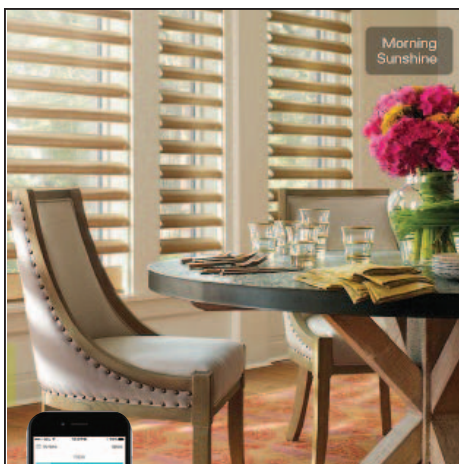

May Day protests focus on Trump's migrant record, elections

What about those questions for Trump? Will he answer?

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump is angrily protesting a leaked list of questions the Justice Department's special counsel wants to ask him, while at the same time contending the list shows anew there was no crime or collusion with the Russians by his presidential campaign. But the questions suggest otherwise: The areas investigators want to focus on clearly include collusion and obstruction of justice.

The questions, some 49 in all, were published by The New York Times, which said they were compiled by Trump's lawyers during negotiations with special counsel Robert Mueller's investigators over a possible interview with the president himself. The Times said it got the list from someone "outside Mr. Trump's legal team."

The leak was "so disgraceful," Trump tweeted on Tuesday. "No questions on Collusion," he said, "collusion that never existed." That's the idea that his presidential campaign collaborated with Russians who were trying to help him to the Oval Office. As for obstruction of the investigation after he took office, he scoffed, "It would be very hard to obstruct justice for a crime that never happened!"

There's still no word from the White House as to whether Trump will sit down to answer these questions or others for the investigation.

Some takeaways from the list:

OBSTRUCTION IS A KEY FOCUS

It has long been clear that Mueller is interested in whether Trump may have obstructed justice. The questions published by the Times show just how much of a focus it is.

Although Mueller's team has indicated to Trump's lawyers that he's not considered a "target" of the probe, investigators want

Protesters around the country focus on driving midterm turnout

NEW YORK — Immigrants say President Donald Trump's administration has become almost everything they feared, but while they rally across the United States on May Day, their focus is less on huge turnout Tuesday than on the first Tuesday in November.

People were marching and holding other demonstrations for labor and immigrant rights from New York to Georgia to California on International Workers' Day, amid similar actions worldwide.

"The Trump administration has made very clear that they've declared war on the immigrant community on all levels," said Javier Valdes, co-executive director of the advocacy group Make the Road New York.

Immigrant rights groups have joined in May Day

activities for more than a decade, initially to push back against harsh legislative proposals and later to clamor for reform and legal status for immigrants in the country illegally who were brought to the U.S. as children or overstayed their visas.

Now, they want to drive turnout in the midterm elections. Advocates hope voters target lawmakers who have pushed for measures that hurt immigrants and replace them with immigrant-friendly policymakers, said Angelica Salas, executive director of the Coalition for Humane Immigrant Rights in Los Angeles.

"Elections have consequences, and the consequences for our community have been dire, and if we do not change the balance of power, we question our ability to remain free in this country," she said.

Protesters still are taking

Iconic guitar maker Gibson seeks bankruptcy protection

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — The maker of the Gibson guitar, omnipresent for decades on the American music stage, is filing for bankruptcy protection after wrestling for years with debt.

A pre-negotiated reorganization plan filed Tuesday will allow Gibson Brands Inc. to continue

operations with \$135 million in financing from lenders.

Gibson guitars have been esteemed by generations of guitar legends. After Chuck Berry died, his beloved cherry-red Gibson guitar was bolted to the inside of his coffin lid. David Bowie favored the 1989 Gibson L4 when he fronted Tin Machine. Slash swears by them.

"It is one of the most widely

recognized brand names on planet Earth," said George Gruhn of Gruhn Guitars, a world-famous vintage instrument store.

Founded in 1894 and based in Nashville, Tennessee, Gibson has the top market share in premium electric guitars. It sells more than 170,000 guitars a year in more than 80 countries, including more than 40 percent

of all electric guitars that cost more than \$2,000, according to a bankruptcy filing.

The company has already sold off some noncore brands, acquisitions that contributed to its burdensome debt load. Gibson has begun the liquidation process for its debt-plagued, struggling international Gibson Innovations division, which sells headphones,

speakers, accessories and other electronics.

"The decision to re-focus on our core business, musical instruments, combined with the significant support from our noteholders, we believe will assure the company's long-term stability and financial health," Henry Juskiewicz, Gibson chairman and CEO, said in a news release.

US seeking 1 million for massive study of DNA, health habits

WASHINGTON — Wanted: A million people willing to share their DNA and 10 years of health habits, big and small, for science.

On Sunday, the U.S. government will open nationwide enrollment for an ambitious experiment: If they can build a large enough database comparing the genetics, lifestyles and environments of people from all walks of life, researchers hope to learn why some escape illness and others don't, and better customize ways to prevent and treat disease.

"A national adventure that is going to transform medical care," is how Dr. Francis Collins, director of the National Institutes of Health, describes his agency's All of Us Research Program.

Congress has authorized \$1.45 billion over 10 years for the project. It all hinges on whether enough people around the country will sign up, either online or through participating health centers.

There's already interest: More than 25,000 people got early entry to the project over the past year through an invitation-only pilot test run by participating universities and health providers.

WHY STUDY SO MANY?

Most of today's medical care is based on what happened to the average person in short studies of a few hundred or thousand patients with a specific health condition.

And most people who volunteer for those studies are white, leaving questions about the best care for people of different races.

"One-size-fits-all is far from an optimal strategy," Collins said Tuesday in announcing enrollment for All of Us.

Airstrikes kill 23 in IS-held territory in Syria

BEIRUT — Airstrikes killed at least 23 civilians on Tuesday in one of the last pockets of Islamic State-controlled territory in Syria, according to Syrian state media and an opposition-linked monitoring group, as U.S.-backed forces in the area announced they have resumed their campaign against the extremists.

The Britain-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights said it was not clear if the airstrikes in the Hassakeh province were carried out by the U.S.-led coalition or the Iraqi air force. It said the strikes killed 10 children, six women and seven elderly people. The state-run Syrian News Agency said 25 civilians were killed in the airstrikes south of the town of Shadadi, blaming the U.S.-led coalition. The strikes took

place in an area where the U.S.-backed and Kurdish-led Syrian Democratic Forces are battling IS.

In an email to The Associated Press, the U.S.-led coalition said initial reports suggest there were no coalition airstrikes in the area where the deadly airstrikes are said to have taken place. Lelwa Abdullah, an SDF spokeswoman in the adjacent Deir el-Zour province, said Tuesday the final phase of a large operation against IS in eastern Syria has begun. She said the SDF will "liberate those areas and secure the Syrian-Iraqi border and end the IS presence in eastern Syria once and for all."

The SDF had redeployed hundreds of its forces to western Syria after Turkish troops attacked the Kurdish-held Afrin enclave earlier this year, effectively putting operations against IS on hold.

Abdullah said IS attacks have increased in recent weeks in parts of eastern Syria near the border with Iraq as the extremist group seeks to regroup. She said the clearing operations will take place with the help of the U.S.-led coalition and Iraqi forces across the border.

The U.S. State Department said the days of IS controlling territory in Syria "are coming to an end," and that the renewed operations are intended to "liberate the final ISIS strongholds in Syria."

President Donald Trump has said he wants to pull out U.S. troops as soon as the extremists are defeated. But State Department spokeswoman Heather Nauert said the U.S. will "ensure that there is a strong and lasting footprint in Syria such that ISIS cannot return."

Elsewhere in Syria on Tuesday, more than three dozen Syrians held

for years by al-Qaida-linked insurgents in the country's northwest were released as part of a deal to hand over areas around Damascus to the government, state media reported.

State-run Al-Ikhbariya TV broadcast images of the released men, women, children, who arrived by bus at a government-controlled checkpoint in Aleppo province. Many were in tears, and they could be seen kissing and hugging Syrian soldiers. The captives had been held by the insurgents in northern Syria since 2015.

Insurgents have agreed to a series of evacuation deals for areas around the capital that have been besieged for years and subjected to heavy bombardment by government forces. The U.N. and rights groups have criticized the deals, saying they amount to forced displacement.

Thousands in Puerto Rico march to protest austerity measures

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico — Thousands of Puerto Ricans marched Tuesday to protest pension cuts, school closures and slow hurricane recovery efforts as anger grows across the U.S. territory over looming austerity measures.

The Labor Day protest attracted teachers, retirees and unionized workers from both the private and public sectors, as well as the mayor of the capital of San Juan, Carmen Yulín Cruz.

The protest remained peaceful until hundreds of young protesters, many with their faces covered, threw rocks and other objects as they clashed with police who fired tear gas and rubber bullets to disperse the crowd. Several people received head wounds and other injuries as clouds of white smoke billowed through the Hato Rey district, where many banks and financial institutions are located. Police said at least three people

were arrested. Concerns that the protest could grow violent led the island's biggest mall to close for the day, along with several banks, government agencies and schools.

The march comes as Puerto Rico tries to emerge from an 11-year recession and restructure a portion of its \$72 billion public debt load while recovering from Hurricane Maria. The storm caused an estimated \$100 billion-plus in damage, and some 30,000 power customers remain in the dark almost eight months since the storm hit.

Economists warn that the poverty rate on the island of 3.3 million people could increase from 45 percent to more than 60 percent. Meanwhile, a federal control board overseeing the island's finances approved several austerity measures in late April that Gov. Ricardo Rossello has refused to implement. These include a 10 percent cut to a public pension system facing nearly \$50 billion in liabilities.

Armenia's parliament rejects protest leader as new premier

YEREVAN, Armenia — Armenia's parliament rejected making the opposition lawmaker who led weeks of anti-government rallies the country's new prime minister Tuesday, prompting him to call for a nationwide strike in protest.

After a nine-hour session, the National Assembly of Armenia voted 55-45 against appointing Nikol Pashinian. He

was the only candidate nominated to replace long-time leader Serzh Sargsyan, who resigned as prime minister because of the protests.

Between 30,000 and 40,000 opposition supporters spent the day peacefully rallying outside the parliament building to support Pashinian. The vote's outcome upset many of them.

"They spat on us, but we're not going to tolerate this," bakery owner Samvel Rustamyan, 46, said while jeering and punching his

fists in the air. "This government just won't resign on its own will. It's tens of thousands of us, and we need them to go."

As Pashinian made his way through the crowd after the vote, his backers clapped and chanted his name until he reached the stage in Republic Square with his wife holding onto his arm.

Confetti flew over the square as if in celebration as Pashinian urged his supporters to strike and to block all major roads and access to the Yerevan

airport to protest the vote's outcome. The crowd's mood was jubilant despite the setback, as a light show lit up the rally and people shined flashlights from their cellphones.

"The peaceful revolution goes on. We're not going to let them steal our victory," a hoarse Pashinian said. "We are starting large-scale actions of civil disobedience tomorrow."

The Armenian Constitution dictates that parliament will convene next week for another vote.



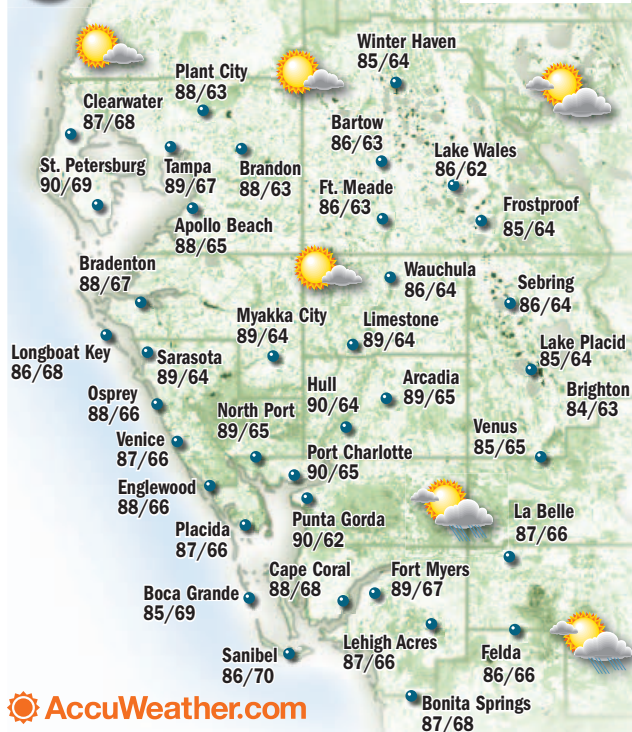

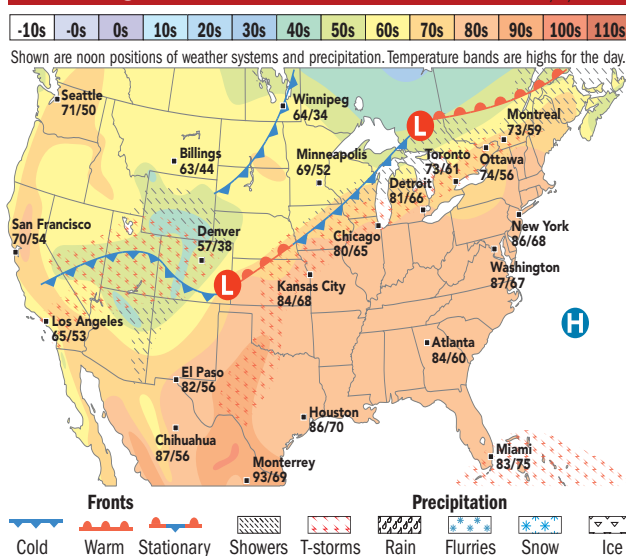

2 of Pruitt's top aides leave EPA amid ethics investigations

WASHINGTON — The two top officials in charge of security and toxic-waste cleanups at the Environmental Protection Agency have abruptly left their jobs, days after EPA administrator Scott Pruitt told lawmakers his subordinates were to blame for ethics problems that have imperiled his political future and prompted more than a dozen federal investigations.

In statements Tuesday, Pruitt praised the two men — Pasquale “Nino” Perrotta, the security chief, and Albert Kelly, who ran the EPA’s Superfund program — and gave no reason for their

unexpected departures.

Perrotta was expected to appear Wednesday for a transcribed interview by staffers of the House oversight committee, one of the congressional bodies and federal organizations probing reports of excessive spending by Pruitt and other issues at the agency. Committee aides said Perrotta’s resignation was not expected to derail his appearance.

EPA spokesman Jahan Wilcox said that the departures were unrelated to the ongoing federal investigations and that the agency was fully cooperating with the congressional probe, led by House oversight chairman Rep. Trey Gowdy, R-S.C.

Pruitt’s spending on

security and some of the security contracts with Perrotta are among the topics of the federal probes involving the EPA under

Pruitt, a former Oklahoma attorney general. Pruitt, an ardent advocate of minimizing regulation, has survived the kind of

scandals that have brought down several other Cabinet appointees of President Donald Trump’s.

At House hearings last week, Pruitt weathered six hours of scathing questions, criticism and a couple of calls from congressional Democrats to resign over the steady flow of news reports and announcements of new investigations allegations of ethical lapses at his agency. They include spending on Pruitt’s behalf for round-the-clock security guards, first-class plane tickets and a \$43,000 soundproof telephone booth.

Pruitt repeatedly deflected blame last week, describing subordinates as going too far in carrying

out their duties, in excesses that occurred without his knowledge.

In the case of the \$43,000 booth, for example, Pruitt acknowledged to lawmakers he had asked for a private and secure phone line when he arrived at the agency, but he said staffers took it upon themselves to spend tens of thousands of dollars on it. It was security officials, not Pruitt, who decided he should fly first class, he said.

Pruitt pledged last week to take care of the problems. “Ultimately, as the administrator of the EPA, the responsibility of identifying and making necessary changes rests with me and no one else,” Pruitt told lawmakers then.

Apple leads tech higher as stocks recover from an early loss

NEW YORK — U.S. stocks clawed back early losses Tuesday as Apple led a rally in technology companies. Smaller, more domestically-focused companies also climbed. The late push offset a slump in household goods makers and industrial companies.

Stocks fell in the early going as investors focused on trade tensions, a drop in construction, and weaker growth in manufacturing. Steel makers lost ground after the White House said it will delay its decision to impose tariffs on imports of steel and aluminum from the European Union, Canada and Mexico for 30 days. The Dow Jones industrial average fell as much as 354 points, then recovered much of that loss and closed down 64.

Amazon and other retailers rose, while banks and health care companies wiped out early losses to finish slightly higher. Randy Frederick, vice

president of trading and derivatives at Charles Schwab, said the that even though companies are reporting great first-quarter results, the market isn’t reacting very much. He thinks some people don’t want to invest because the market has gone through such huge swings over the last three months.

“It’s been the best earnings season we’ve had in 10 years,” he said. “People are starting to sit out. And part of the reason they’re sitting out is we’re having such high volatility.”

The S&P 500 index rose 6.75 points, or 0.3 percent, to 2,654.80. The Dow slipped 64.10 points, or 0.3 percent, to 24,099.05 as Boeing fell along with other industrial companies and McDonald’s gave back some of the previous day’s gain.

Technology companies surged, sending the Nasdaq composite up 64.44 points, or 0.9 percent, to 7,130.55. The Russell 2000 index of smaller-company stocks added 8.44 points, or 0.5 percent, to 1,550.33.

Love it or not, Facebook launches dating service

NEW YORK — Facebook doesn’t think hookups are meaningful and doesn’t want you to date your friends — but it’s known for a long time that its vast map of human connections could help people find long-term partners. At least that’s the takeaway from a new dating feature the social networking giant is launching because, well, why not?

After all, Facebook already lets you “poke” people, whatever that means, and lets you broadcast your relationship status. If you ever download all the data Facebook has on you, you’ll see it even keeps track of all the past partners you’ve listed on Facebook, even if this isn’t visible on your profile.

A dating tool has always seemed the next logical step, as Chris Cox, Facebook’s chief product officer, said Tuesday at Facebook’s F8 conference for app developers in San Jose, California. Fourteen years after Facebook’s launch, it’s finally coming.

CEO Mark Zuckerberg said the new dating feature is “not just for hookups” but to build “meaningful, long-term relationships.” That seems a direct swipe at Tinder, which is still best known for hooking people up with people they find attractive by showing their photo, age and first name. Shares of Match.com, which owns Tinder, tumbled on the news.

Of course, Tinder itself uses Facebook data to act as a digital matchmaker (as do many other dating apps), and Facebook’s

dating feature seems to borrow some ideas from one of the world’s most popular dating apps. Facebook’s feature will be opt-in, meaning you have to choose to use it. Like Tinder, it’ll use just your first name.

The Facebook dating profile you’ll create will be separate from your regular Facebook profile. It won’t suggest your friends as people you might want to date, even if your 500-plus “friends” include random acquaintances — or crushes. Your dating profile won’t show up on your

news feed or be visible to friends; it’s only for others using the dating service.

There were also some online rumblings that the dating feature might be open only to people who list themselves as “single” and not those who are “married” or “in a relationship,” ignoring the subset of people who are in non-monogamous relationships. But Facebook said this is not the case. After all, people often don’t keep their relationship status up to date, don’t use it in a serious way (in a complicated relationship with pizza, anyone?), or simply leave it blank.

After setting up a dating profile, you can browse events and groups based on location and interests. After you “unlock” an event you’re attending or considering going to, you can view the profiles of others who have also unlocked that event. Users can chat with each other through a private messaging feature that won’t be connected to Facebook’s other messaging services, Messenger or WhatsApp.

White House defends taking records from Trump's former doc

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump’s former bodyguard did nothing out of the ordinary when he took possession of the president’s medical records, the White House said Tuesday, despite the claim by Trump’s former doctor that the episode felt like a “raid.”

Harold Bornstein, Trump’s longtime

personal doctor, told NBC News that Keith Schiller, the president’s longtime bodyguard and former director of Oval Office operations, showed up at his office in February 2017 along with two other men to collect the records, leaving Bornstein feeling “raped, frightened and sad.”

But White House Press Secretary Sarah Huckabee Sanders disputed the doctor’s characterization of the episode.

“As is standard operating procedure for a new president, the White House Medical Unit took possession of the president’s medical records,” she told reporters at a White House briefing.

As for Bornstein’s description that it had had the feel of a raid, she said, “No, that is not my understanding.”

Bornstein told NBC that the incident took place two days after he’d

divulged that he had prescribed Trump Propecia, a drug to combat hair loss in men.

Bornstein said he wasn’t given a form authorizing him to release Trump’s records, but said Schiller, along with Trump Organization lawyer Alan Garten, had taken the originals and copies of Trump’s charts and lab reports, including records filed under pseudonyms the office used.

US: Vet implanted heroin in puppies for Colombia drug ring

A veterinarian pleaded not guilty on Tuesday to U.S. charges that he implanted liquid heroin in puppies to turn them into drug mules for a Colombian trafficking ring.

Andres Lopez Elorza appeared in federal court in Brooklyn after being extradited from Spain, where he was arrested in 2015 on a U.S. warrant. He was ordered held without bail.

Lopez Elorza, 38, who also goes by Lopez Elorz, became a fugitive in 2005 when authorities arrested about two dozen suspected traffickers in Colombia.

Before he fled, the defendant had “gained some notoriety” from accusations that he was part of a barbaric scheme that turned an undetermined number of puppies and dogs into “animal couriers” by stitching packets of liquid heroin into their bodies, Assistant U.S. Attorney Nathan Reilly told a magistrate judge on Tuesday.

It is believed that the dogs were sent on commercial flights to New York City, where the drugs were cut out of them, authorities said. Investigators believe the puppies would have died in the process, but it was unknown how many were involved.

Trump hails bravery of crew, passengers aboard damaged plane

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Donald Trump on Tuesday hailed the “tremendous bravery” of the crew and passengers aboard a damaged Southwest Airlines plane that was forced into an emergency landing in Philadelphia last month, saying, “Everybody’s talking about it.”

Trump also paid tribute to Jennifer Riordan, a 43-year-old Wells Fargo bank executive from Albuquerque, New Mexico, who died of injuries suffered after she was partially sucked out of a window that had been broken by shrapnel.

“Our hearts break for the family of the passenger who tragically lost their life,” the president said in the Oval Office, surrounded by the two pilots, three flight attendants and five passengers who assisted frightened passengers. “We send our prayers to Jennifer’s husband and their two beautiful young children. We ask God to hold this family close as they grieve the loss of a loving wife and mother.”

Trump added to the praise that

the pilot, Capt. Tammie Jo Shults, has earned for helping prevent a far worse outcome, saying she did an “incredible job.”

“Everybody’s talking about it. They’re still talking about it. They’ll be talking about it for a long time,” he told Shults, who was one of the first female Navy fighter pilots and flew training missions as an “enemy” pilot during Operation Desert Storm.

California sues over plan to scrap car emission standards

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — California and 16 other states sued the Trump administration Tuesday over its plan to scrap Obama-era auto-emissions standards that would require vehicles to get significantly higher gas mileage by 2025.

At issue is a move by Environmental Protection Agency administrator Scott Pruitt to roll back 2012 rules aimed at curbing greenhouse gas emissions. Under those rules, vehicles would have to get 36 miles of real-world driving per gallon, about 10 miles over the

existing standard.

The rules were set six years ago when California and the Obama administration agreed to a single nationwide fuel economy standard.

Texas suing to end ‘Dreamers’ program once and for all

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Texas and six other states are suing to end once and for all a program that would protect some young immigrants from deportation.

The lawsuit announced Tuesday comes a week after a federal judge in Washington ordered the Trump administration to resume the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program.

Immigrants under the Obama-era program are commonly referred to as “Dreamers.” Republican Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton had threatened legal action for the past year if the program didn’t come to a halt.

Joining Texas in the lawsuit are Alabama, Arkansas, Louisiana, Nebraska, South Carolina and West Virginia.

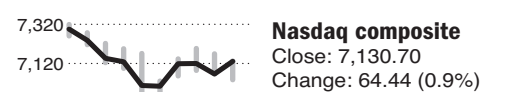

There's a thought shift on antibiotics before dental work

DEAR DR. ROACH: I have a stent, but also a knee replacement, for which I take four 500-mg capsules of amoxicillin each time I go to the dentist, including just for cleaning. This is per my surgeon's orders. Do you have any information that would question the necessity of this? — M.W.

ANSWER: Bacteria can get into the bloodstream occasionally in healthy people. They often enter through the mouth, especially in people with poor oral hygiene or with inflammatory oral conditions, such as gingivitis (gums) or periodontitis (tooth lining). The reason to take antibiotics is to prevent the bacteria in the blood from getting into someplace they are likely to cause harm, such as prosthetic heart valves, joints or stents. For years, expert groups recommended taking antibiotics around the time of dental procedures.

The problem is that it's not clear whether antibiotics help prevent infection, and it is clear that antibiotics have the potential to cause harm, although the risk of

serious problems with a single dose of amoxicillin is pretty small. No study has ever shown a reduction in the rate of serious infections from using antibiotics before a dental procedure. Further, bacteria are just about as likely to get into the bloodstream after brushing (or even after a bowel movement). For this reason, antibiotics to be taken before dental procedures are reserved for people at the highest risk, those in whom an infection would be extremely dangerous. This includes people with artificial materials in the bloodstream, such

as prosthetic heart valves, or with repaired congenital heart disease. People with any history of infection of the heart valves are at high risk and should receive antibiotics.

For people like you, with orthopedic hardware, infection after a dental procedure is rare. A joint statement by the American Dental Association and the American Academy of Orthopedic Surgeons instructed: "In general, for patients with prosthetic joint implants, prophylactic antibiotics are not recommended prior to dental procedures to prevent prosthetic joint infection." However, any given person may have underlying surgical or medical issues that may supersede these general recommendations.

What remains important is maintaining good oral hygiene and promptly treating any dental infections.

DEAR DR. ROACH: Does taking Norvasc or any calcium channel blocker reduce or destroy the calcium in the bones, eventually causing osteoporosis? — E.G.

ANSWER: No. Calcium channel blockers, like amlodipine (Norvasc), work on cells in the heart and blood vessels, controlling the flow of calcium into the cell. Calcium in the cell is one of the regulators of smooth muscle cells, and for Norvasc in particular, that means its major effect is on blood vessels, causing them to open up and reduce blood pressure, and thus work the heart needs to do.

Calcium in bone is used structurally, where it combines with other ions to form hydroxyapatite, the mineral that keeps bones hard and strong. The mechanism for calcium entry into bone cells is very different. Calcium channel blockers do not affect mineralization of the bone.

One group found that people on calcium channel blockers may have a higher risk of fractures; however, that was thought to be due to an increased number of falls. Physicians need to take care not to use too much medication, especially ones that dilate blood vessels, as they can increase risk of falls.

Florida to get \$340M in aid for citrus industry

TALLAHASSEE — Florida will get \$340 million to help citrus farmers replace trees and groves lost to Hurricane Irma, as the federal government continues to release details of the industry's much-awaited disaster relief funding.

The block grant, part of a \$2.36 billion package Congress directed in February to agricultural businesses impacted by hurricanes and wildfires in 2017, is designed to help the struggling citrus industry, which suffered at least \$761 million in losses from Irma.

For farmers, many facing years of diminished crops, applying for the funding could still be more than two months away. A news release from the U.S. Department of Agriculture said the overall "2017 Wildfires and Hurricanes Indemnity Program" will begin no later than July 16.

"While nothing in this town works as quickly as I would like, our team is working as hard as we can to make these resources available to farmers in need, as quickly as possible," U.S.

Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue said in a video release Tuesday.

The grant money will be available for citrus farmers needing to buy and plant replacement trees or for repairs, such as fixing damage to irrigation systems.

Florida Agriculture Commissioner Adam Putnam said in a video release that the goal is to deliver the money in an "effective and timely manner."

"While no amount of relief can make the farmers who suffered damages from Hurricane Irma whole, this much-needed disaster relief will help

Florida agriculture get back on its feet," Putnam said.

The state's overall agriculture industry suffered approximately \$2.5 billion in losses from Irma, according to an estimate that Putnam's department released in October.

The citrus industry, currently on pace to produce about one-third fewer oranges and about half the grapefruit compared to the past growing season, views the grove rehabilitation funding as a way to bridge anticipated production losses that will continue into the 2020 crop year.

U.S. Sen. Marco Rubio, R-Fla., noting Irma's

long-range economic impact to some of the state's rural communities, said the money should help "make sure that crop yields, and life throughout Florida's heartland, return to normal as quickly as possible."

U.S. Rep. Tom Rooney, a Republican whose district includes major citrus-growing areas, expressed confidence the money "will give Florida's citrus industry some financial certainty to get through the next couple of seasons."

The federal agriculture funding, part of a \$90 billion storm relief package signed by President Donald Trump in February, is

aimed at recovery efforts from Hurricane Irma, Hurricane Harvey in Texas and other areas of the western Gulf Coast, Hurricane Maria in Puerto Rico and wildfires in California.

Perdue noted that Irma's hit on Florida came as the growing season was just getting underway.

"The Florida citrus industry was likely hit the hardest, and with such a high-value crop, they face a steeper financial burden and as a whole, have less coverage through our traditional insurance options," Perdue said in the video.

Payments will be calculated based on factors including how much of a crop has been harvested, how much was expected to be grown and the amount of insurance a grower has on the crop. Payments can reach 95 percent of losses for producers with insurance and up to 65 percent for losses for producers without insurance.

Also, to be eligible for the money, damaged crops, trees, bushes or vines must be in counties declared primary disaster areas. For Irma in Florida, that covers nearly everything east and south of Taylor and Hamilton counties.

aim at policy changes under Trump, including a country-specific travel ban, the end of the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program, high-profile detention and deportation efforts, and proposals to cut back the overall numbers of people allowed to

immigrate permanently.

Trump and his supporters say the enforcement and policy changes are needed for national security and economic benefits. Some of the new policies have gotten tangled up in court, and Trump hasn't secured funding for his coveted border wall with Mexico.

After the rallies, immigrant rights groups will join LGBTQ, African-American

and women's organizations this summer to push for the election of new leaders, Salas said, adding that they hope to see more support from Americans who aren't immigrants.

"It is really a fundamental question about what kind of a country we're going to be," she said. "For us, the question of immigration is a question about race, and it is also a question about real equality in this country."

to interview him about several episodes early in his term.

The bulk of those questions focus on the firing of FBI Director James Comey, Trump's relationship with Attorney General Jeff Sessions, whom he has angrily criticized for recusing himself from the Russia probe, and his former national security adviser, Michael Flynn. According to Comey, Trump encouraged Comey to drop an investigation into Flynn.

The questions attempt to drill down into Trump's conflicting public answers for his reasons for firing Comey — in one interview he referenced "this Russia thing" — and ask him about the decision more directly.

"Regarding the decision to fire Mr. Comey: When was it made? Why? Who played a role?" reads one question.

COLLUSION IS STILL A FOCUS, TOO

Despite Trump's dismissal of the idea, the list does appear to indicate that Mueller is looking into possible collusion or coordination with Russia. Some touch on Russian meddling in the U.S. election and whether the Trump campaign coordinated in any way with the Kremlin. In one question, Mueller asks what Trump knew about members of his campaign

staff, including former campaign chairman Paul Manafort, reaching out to Moscow.

Mueller has brought several charges against Manafort already, including money laundering and bank fraud. None of the charges relates to allegations of Russian election interference and possible coordination with Trump associates, and Manafort has denied having anything to do with any such effort.

Another question asks what discussions Trump may have had regarding "any meeting" with Russian President Vladimir Putin. Still another asks what the president may have known about a possible attempt by his son-in-law, Jared Kushner, to set up a back channel with Russia before the U.S. inauguration.

MUELLER IS WATCHING TRUMP'S TWEETS

At least two questions directly address tweets from the president.

One asks: "What was the purpose of your May 12, 2017, tweet?" That references a tweet Trump posted after reports that Comey described a private dinner with the president in personal memos. Comey wrote in a memo that Trump repeatedly asked him for loyalty.

"James Comey better hope that there are no 'tapes' of our conversations before he starts leaking to the press!" Trump tweeted.

Another question asks about tweets in which Trump suggested Comey should be investigated for the way he handled an investigation into Hillary Clinton's emails.

environmental exposures and other lifestyle factors. They might wear fitness trackers and other sensors.

And later this year they'll start undergoing genetic testing, initially to look for so-called "variants" in DNA that affect disease risk, similar to what some private companies now sell, Collins said. Fully mapping the genetic code is too pricey now for a million people, but that more comprehensive approach eventually will be used with some participants, too.

Among the first lessons Collins hopes to learn is about resilience: Why do some people stay healthy despite smoking or pollution or poor nutrition?

"We have no idea how those people escape those odds," he said.

LEARN YOUR RESULTS

Unlike with most medical studies, participants can choose to see their own test results and share them with their physician long before the study reaches any big-picture conclusions. A caution: There are still many questions about how best to use the results of genetic tests. Still, "we will try to help their doctors sort through what it means," Collins said.

One result that might bring a quick benefit: Genetic variants can signal who is prone to side effects from more than 100 drugs,

The questions also reference television interviews that Trump has given.

WILL TRUMP ACTUALLY FACE QUESTIONS?

It's still unclear whether Mueller's investigators will be able to ask Trump any questions — or whether these are the ones they would ask. Trump has said he wants to answer Mueller's questions. But more recently, he and his team of lawyers, which has undergone changes in recent months, have not said when — or if.

It's also not clear whether the leak of the questions was meant to somehow influence whether he will do the interview.

Asked about the questions Tuesday, White House Press Secretary Sarah Huckabee Sanders repeatedly referred reporters to Trump's lawyers. Trump lawyer Jay Sekulow declined to comment to The Associated Press. So did White House lawyer Ty Cobb.

Comey, in an interview, gave an opinion that steered clear of politics and sounded like the law enforcement official he used to be: "Just as we've done in many investigations, you want to develop a complete understanding of the facts and then check them with the subject and see what they say about it."

In the meantime, Mueller's investigation continues. On Tuesday, the special counsel's office and Flynn, a key cooperator, agreed to put off setting his sentencing date for another 60 days, saying the delay was necessary "due to the status" of the investigation.

PROTECTING PRIVACY

The privacy of DNA databases made headlines last week when investigators used a free genealogy website to track down a suspected California serial killer. That's pretty different than the security under which medical DNA must be handled.

NIH said it has taken as many steps as possible to safeguard against would-be hackers. Volunteers' medical data is stripped of identifying information and replaced with a code. Only scientists meeting specific security requirements will be cleared to study the data. NIH also said federal "certificates of confidentiality" prohibit disclosure to law enforcement.

Privacy wasn't a worry for Michelle McNeely, 41, an early participant at Dallas' Baylor Scott & White Health System. She underwent breast cancer treatment in 2016 and considers taking part in All of Us a way to give back.

"If they can use my genes and someone's genes in California and someone's genes in New York to find some common ground, to help discover some cure — they can use my genes all day long," McNeely said.
