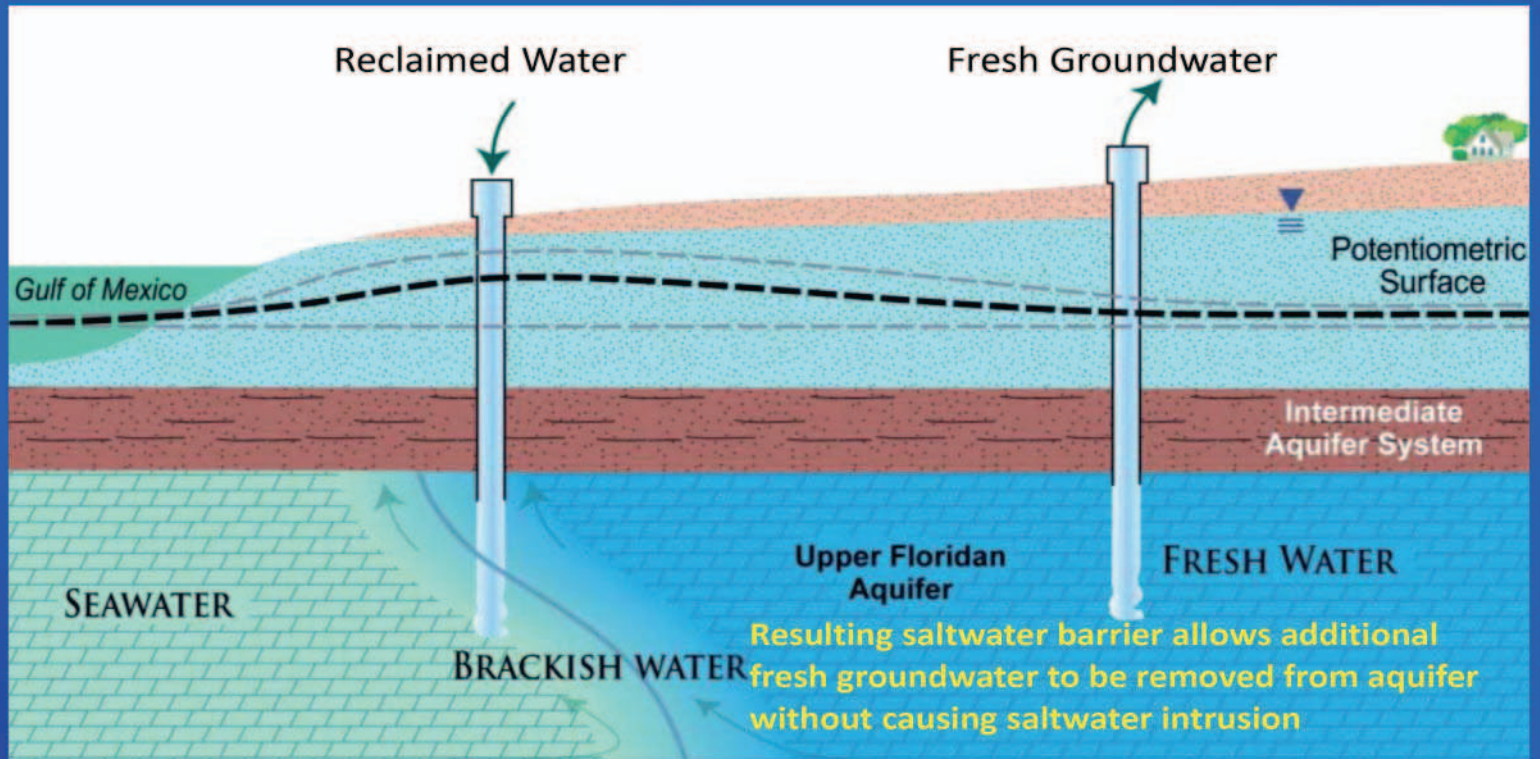

Armstrong asks PRWC board to stall litigation

POLK COUNTY –Southwest Florida Water Management District (SWFWMD) Executive Director Brian Armstrong told the Polk Regional Water Cooperative (PRWC) board Sept. 19 that he remembers how the water wars between Hillsborough, Pinellas and

Pasco counties of the 1980s cost taxpayers millions, created animosity between government bodies and caused public distrust in government.

Armstrong told the PRWC board that he thought the PRWC May 2018 legal action against the Peace River Manasota Regional Water Supply Authority (PRMRWA) was just

as counterproductive as the water wars of the 1980s. The PRWC legal action alleged that PRMRWA authorities wanted to pull additional water out of the Peace River and that this would prevent Polk authorities from using the Peace River as a future alternative water supply.

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D-R Media buys Sun Publications of Florida

When the Dunn-Rankin family bought its first newspaper in Highlands County, the announcement stressed the mission of community newspapers. That belief in making a positive impact on the local communities continues today as David Dunn-Rankin, president and CEO of D-R Media and Investments LLC, announces the acquisition of Sun Publications of Florida, a group of four weeklies in Lake and Sumter counties, from Lakeway Publishers.

"We believe in the future of community newspapers. Well-run local papers are growing and thriving. Lakeway newspapers are strong community-focused products located near our existing publications in central Florida. The newspapers in Mt. Dora and Clermont are a natural fit for our existing papers in Highlands and Polk counties," Dunn-Rankin said.

The four new newspapers represent over 100,000 households in Lake and Sumter counties. They are all weekly community shoppers that provide not only local advertising but also community news and public service announcements.

The Sumter Shopper has a circulation of 21,500 and serves the areas of Bushnell, Webster, Center Hill, Coleman, Sumterville, Oxford and Lake Panasoffkee in Sumter County. The Four Corners News Leader has a circulation of 30,000 and serves the areas of Haines City, Davenport and the south end of Clermont in Lake and Polk counties. Clermont News Leader has a circulation of 38,000 and serves Groveland, Mascotte, Clermont, and parts of Mont Verde and Winter Garden in Lake County. The Triangle News Leader is delivered to more than 28,000 addresses in Mt. Dora, Eustis, Sorento, Tavares and Umatilla. All four newspapers are delivered by direct mail.

In addition, the acquisition includes a facility with 38,000-square-foot manufacturing and distribution space in Polk County that produces and mails not only the four weekly products being acquired, but also serves as a commercial print facility of many other third-party products all over Florida.

The acquisition is scheduled to close in the next few weeks.

"We like the mission of community newspapers. Helping local businesses thrive and making our communities

a better place to live because we are there," Dunn-Rankin said.

"We hope to be in the community newspaper business for a long time to come," Dunn-Rankin said. "Our local advertising business was up 13 percent over the last three months because of our team's focus on helping local businesses succeed."

Highlands News-Sun Publisher Tim Smolarick said, "D-R Media's commitment to local newspaper service is alive and well. We are excited to add Sun Publications of Florida group to our company. The community newspapers that come to us with this transaction are outstanding and we look forward to learning more about each operation."

R. Jack Fishman, president of Lakeway Publishers, Inc. said, "Serving the central Florida readers and advertisers during the past few years was rewarding and a pleasure. Our staff has produced quality papers and we are very pleased that David Dunn-Rankin and family, with their experience and background, will be expanding their presence in central Florida. Community newspapers are a vital part of local communities and are very important to the citizens that live and work in them."

Cribb, Green and Cope represented Lakeway Publishers in this transaction. Terms of the deal were not disclosed.

D-R Media and Investments was created in June when the Dunn-Rankin family sold Sun Coast Media Group to Adams Publishing Group. Dunn-Rankin chose to retain the newspapers in Highlands and Polk counties, as well as the Sun Events division.

The Dunn-Rankin family purchased The Journal in Lake Placid in 2009, the News-Sun in 2014 and the Highlands Today in 2016, bringing all publications together as the Highlands News-Sun. It is D-R Media's only daily publication.

The Highlands News-Sun is now the last family-owned and family-operated daily newspaper in Florida, and fourth generation Floridian Dunn-Rankins are part of the newspaper business.

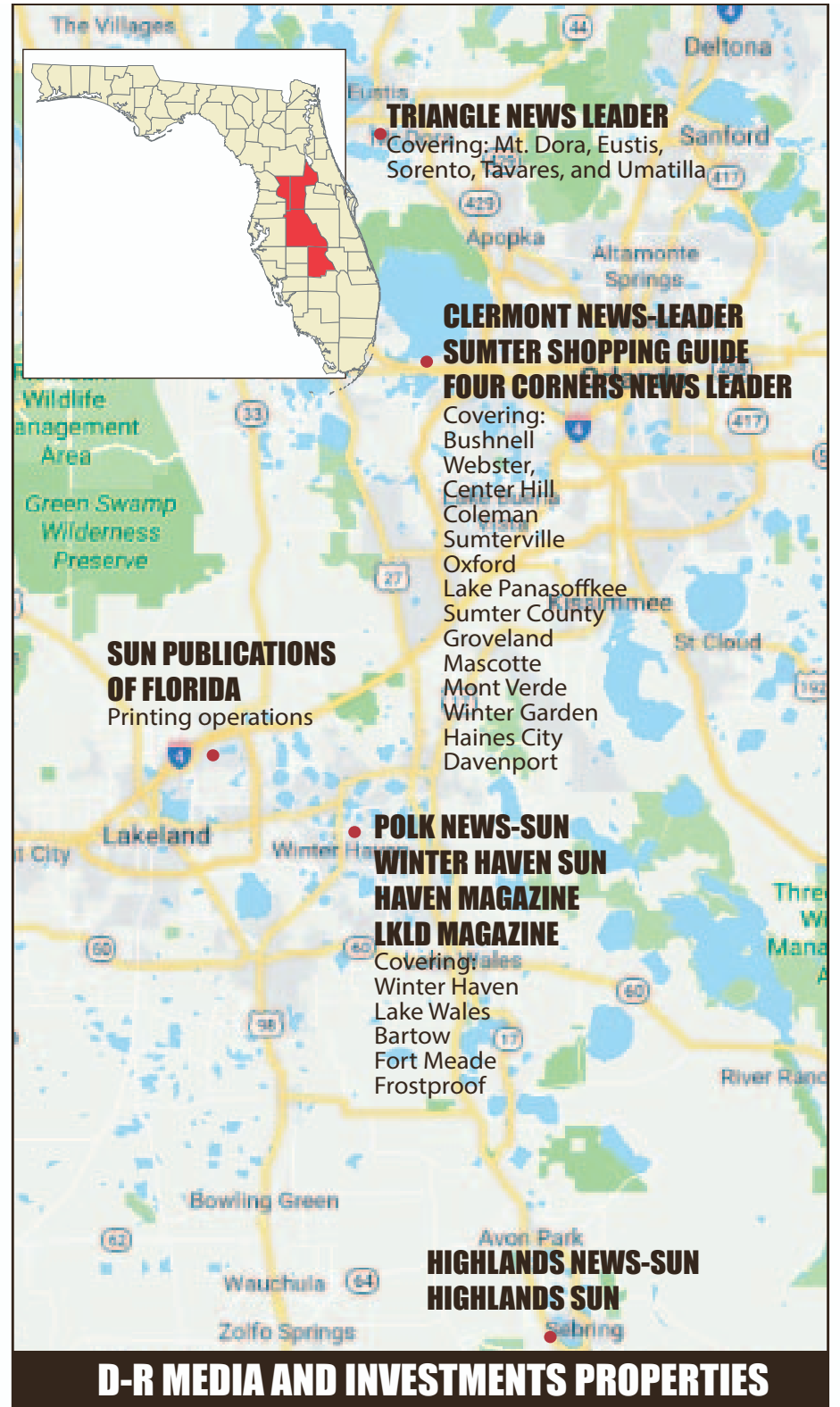
The late Derek Dunn-Rankin, the family patriarch, started Sun Coast Media Group in 1977 with the purchase of the Venice Gondolier. The same year he

started papers in Englewood and North Port. Two years later, the company grew with the addition of the Charlotte Sun. The company would eventually come to own a group of daily and weekly community newspapers along the west coast of Florida, as well as Sun Events, an entertainment division of the company.

In all, the four weeklies will be joining other D-R Media and Investments properties: in Highlands County, the High-

lands News-Sun and the Highlands Sun, a free weekly entertainment newspaper; and in Polk County, the Polk News-Sun, the Winter Haven Sun (a free weekly edition), and the Haven and LKLD magazines.

Dunn-Rankin said with the addition of 50 new employees, there are now more than 100 employees working for D-R Media and Investments. D-R Media's corporate office is in Venice.



Congressional medal of honor recipient needs your help

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POLK COUNTY – With Veterans Day fast approaching in November, a group of county residents are trying to keep the name James Henry Mills alive.

Mills is the only Polk County resident to have ever been awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor.

On May 24, 1944 Pvt. Mills was point man, leading his platoon, down a draw toward a heavily fortified German position in Italy. On that day Pvt. Mills killed a machine gunner at point blank, captured two other Germans and killed another. Pvt. Mills then charged six other Germans who all surrendered. Seeing another enemy position, Pvt. Mills flanked away from his platoon and started shooting, covering fire allowing his platoon to advance and capture 22 Germans without one American casualty.

There are multiple memorials to the life of Pvt. Mills, one at the capital in Tallahassee, one in Tampa and a third in Lakeland. Part of the Polk Parkway was renamed in honor of Pvt. Mills.

On Sept. 13, Polk County Veterans Council Chair Gary Clark sent out a letter asking for help restoring the memorial in Lakeland. More funds are needed to improve the memorial with an interpretive plaque telling the story of Mills' life and his tragic murder on Veterans Day, Nov. 11, 1973.

Clark said it will cost \$5K to create and install the plaque and that Polk County Veterans Council still needs to raise another \$3K.

Home Solution Leaders Marketing Director Janet Durden said their Bartow company donated \$1K toward the plaque to honor Polk's only Congressional Medal of Honor awardee.

The Veteran's Day ceremony and parade Nov. 11, 2018, at 10 a.m. in Lakeland will be a tribute to Pvt. Mills.

"This event promises to be a moving and inspirational tribute to one of Polk

County's heroes from the Greatest Generation," Clark said.

Fort Meade native and Polk County historian Cantor Brown will give the keynote address.

County leaders at odds with state legislators

LAKE WALES – In 1997 state legislators started collecting real estate taxes to fund state affordable housing projects. Since FY 2007-08, however, state legislators have collected much more than has been appropriated for affordable housing.

On Sept. 17 County Commissioner Melony Bell said this funding discrepancy recently caused local leaders with Habitat for Humanity to request consideration for county support to make up the difference.

According to a state government analysis of Senate Bill 874, for example, last year nearly \$300M in "Documentary Stamp Taxes" were collected to fund affordable housing programs but only \$137M was appropriated to these programs. The remaining amount was appropriated to balance the state budget.

"The Sadowski Trust Fund, set up to assist with affordable housing, is being used for other things," said Habitat for Humanity of East Polk County Executive

Director Julie Farish.

County Commissioner George Lindsey requested County Manager Jim Freeman to have the county lobbyist start pressuring state legislators representing Polk County to support efforts to make this illegal. County Manager Freeman said this would be placed on the agenda.

"At least we can encourage them to stop sweeping and start spending those dedicated dollars," Commissioner Lindsey said Sept. 17.

State Senator Kelli Stargel (R – Winter Haven) is on the Senate appropriations committee that killed a bill proposing to make such a process illegal last year.

"Each year as the legislature works to pass a balanced budget, lawmakers must evaluate all the needs of the state and make a determination on how to appropriate a limited number of taxpayer dollars, including those dedicated to specific trust funds," Sen. Stargel said.

Farish said while some sources of funding have not been consistent re-

cently, Sen. Stargel has fought for affordable housing in other areas. The Community Contribution Tax Credit Program allows tax breaks for corporations donating time and money toward affordable housing. Sen. Stargel said for the past several years she has worked hard to keep this corporate tax break in place.

"Most of these funds are used by Habitat for Humanity," Sen. Stargel said of the corporate tax break. "I was proud to support this great program that helps people realize the American dream of home ownership."

Funding issues aside, Farish said that Habitat for Humanity of East Polk needs as much help as possible to build eight homes in FY 2018-19.

"We love our volunteers and always need more," Farish said. "They are needed on the job sites and at our Winter Haven and Dundee ReStores."

Habitat homes are not free. Recipients must help build homes for others first and pay a zero interest 20-year mortgage once their own home is built. Currently, the waiting list is full, Farish said.

Armstrong proposed that the PRWC board hold off on litigation while he negotiates a deal with water authorities in Tampa to sell "significant water supplies" to Polk authorities, replacing any water that could possibly be pulled from the Peace River water in Polk County.

Armstrong said that water authorities in Tampa have proposed pumping around 30 million gallons per day of highly treated reclaimed water into brackish water under the ground around Tampa. Armstrong said this water could serve as a barrier, preventing salt water from further getting into the freshwater aquifer

deeper inland. In doing so, Armstrong said the scientists say this may result in more than 20 million gallons of day of water that could be shared between Polk and Hillsborough counties from a well that would be built near the county line.

PRWC scientists say Polk could need as much as 46 million gallons per day more by 2035 to keep pace with population growth so water purchased from Tampa in this possible deal would not in itself solve the Polk water crisis, said SWFWMD spokesperson Susanna Martinez Tarokh.

However, such a deal with Tampa could save Polk County taxpayers a substantial amount of money. Using PRWC 2017 estimates, around \$600M

is planned to be spent studying and building two sets of wells into the Lower Floridan Aquifer, one that might produce 30mgd near Frostproof and another near Lakeland that may produce 15mgd. Conservation efforts could produce 4mgd and the "Peace Creek Integrated Water Supply" plan could produce another 5mgd.

PRWC Project Administrator Gene Heath said Sept. 19 conservation efforts are half as expensive as building LFA wells. If the PRWC board built one LFA well for 30mgd, they got 10mgd from Tampa and another 9mgd from conservation and recharging the Peace River Basin with stormwater, there may be no need to build the other LFA well near Lakeland.

The LFA well near Lakeland has an estimated cost of \$157M and taxpayers are currently paying another \$9.3M just to study whether there is any good water in the LFA near Lakeland. If the public pressured the PRWC board to invest more in conservation and using stormwater to recharge the aquifer in Polk, it is possible the \$340M LFA well near Frostproof and the \$11.8M study of water near Frostproof may not be necessary either.

PRWC conservation experts say half of all water pumped out of the ground in Polk County is used to keep lawns and shrubs green. It costs next to nothing to pass tougher lawn watering restrictions.

WINTER HAVEN – The Winter Haven Chamber of Commerce Banker's Cup Awards, considered Winter Haven's highest honor, were awarded to 2018 Woman of the Year Chris Hazlewood and 2018 Man of the Year Greg Littleton Sept. 20 downtown at Nora Mayo Hall.

Mrs. Hazlewood's contributions to the Winter Haven community include longtime work with Meals on Wheels of Polk County, Relay for Life Winter Haven, the American Cancer Society, Big Pink Ribbon, the Pampering Event at Belk and Winter Haven Charity Challenge.

"Because of her humble attitude, she has been able to leave a charitable legacy on our community," according to the Winter Haven Chamber of Commerce. "Chris is completely deserving of this designation and we were honored to give it to her."

During a video presentation prior to receiving her award, friends described Mrs. Hazlewood as uplifting, inspirational, passionate, hands-on and somebody who has the "heart of the woman I aspire to be." The 2017 Man of the Year Mark Voisard presented Mrs. Hazlewood with her award.

"This is crazy," Mrs. Hazlewood said in an emotional, cracked voice after reaching the podium. "Thank you all for the comments, the sweet words and to the community."

The 2016 Woman of the Year Zuzanne Moraco presented Mr. Littleton with his award. A Brief History of Winter Haven High School

Winter Haven's first official high school opened in 1915. It was a kindergarten through 12th grade facility located on Central Avenue on the site of the current downtown post office. By October of 1916, the school fielded a basketball team. There were fifteen students in the first graduating class. The first yearbook was published in 1917.

By 1922 the community was feeling the effects of the Florida Land Boom and a new high school for just the upper grades was opened on the site of today's Denison Middle School. It was an eight-room brick building and cost \$20,000. In 1925 the first football team was organized. Professor R. E. Bowen was the coach. R. E. Norton, a local merchant, rallied the community to support the team. Norton, a graduate of Duke University, also suggested calling the team the "Blue Devils," the name of the Duke team.

The rapid growth of the land boom continued and in 1926 a massive new \$200,000 high school opened adjacent to the 1922 building which was then referred to as the Annex. The 1926 building would serve as the high school for 30 years until the present 28-acre campus opened on Sixth Street, S.E. Many will recall attending "Denison Junior High" in the former high school building until it was razed

in the early 1970s and replaced with the current facilities for Denison Middle. The "Denison" name was derived from the family that donated the land that is now the site of Denison Field. When the high school moved to Sixth Street, the decision was made to honor the Denison family for their generosity.

Denison Field was built in 1947. The concept for a new stadium was proposed in June and was immediately supported by the Quarterback Club. Several key leaders were involved. Jean Knox was the architect, Harry E. King, chaired the fund drive, and C. McElvey was the building committee chairman, which included Kenneth Harmon and R. H. Fackelman. It cost \$40,000 and was dedicated at an October 17th football game. (Prior to its conversion to football, Denison Field was the site of the city's baseball stadium which hosted several spring training teams including the Philadelphia Nationals and Buffalo Bisons.)

The current site has been home to Winter Haven High School for more than sixty years. The original 1956 campus has been significantly modified over the years. What for many years served as the gymnasium was converted to a performing arts auditorium in the 1980s. More recently major new construction included a new administrative office building on the site of what many remember was the bus circle drive. It also included new classroom buildings. Total renovation costs came

to \$22 million. The current enrollment at WHHS is 2325 students.

Information for this column was taken from "The History of Winter Haven" by Josephine Burr and materials provided by Gina Williams, principal at WHHS.

The Museum of Winter Haven History will reopen on Saturday, October 6 from 9 a.m. to Noon. A pictorial program about the history of Winter Haven will be presented at 10 a.m. that morning. The museum, located at 660 Pope Avenue and Lake Howard Drive, is free and open to the public. Come explore.

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Lake Gwynn to be reborn soon

WINTER HAVEN – A short distance to the east of the intersection of Rifle Range Road and Bomber Road on the southern outskirts of Winter Haven, immediately to the east of Wahneta Elementary, is a soccer field surrounded by trees.

Near the school a sign directs residents to a nearby walking trail and just inside a chain link fence around the soccer field is a sign about stormwater pollution. It takes a while to see the trail on the far side of the soccer field. If you didn't cover county commission meetings, it would be hard to tell what is just beyond the trees surrounding the field.

Lake Gwynn was killed around 100 years ago when city leaders at the time dug a canal to help rid the new city of stormwater. Still in existence today, the canal starts near the south side of the US17 bridge near the Chain of Lakes Complex, follows Rifle Range Road

a bit, winds around the east side of Wahneta and eventually connects with Peace Creek south of Wahneta. When the canal was built, it drained the lake.

A 100 years later, water experts now realize how lakes and the wetlands surrounding them are instrumental on removing stormwater pollution before the water soaks into the ground.

In 2015, state and local leaders found the funding to bring half of the lake back to life and build a trail where the canal once was. In July, funding was approved to finish the other half of the lake restoration project. Sept. 17 county commissioners voted to approve the selection of the winning contractor to finish the job and work should be starting soon.

Five corporations bid on the job with the winning \$2.5M bid awarded to RAM Excavating of Dunedin, FL. Work is scheduled to be complete within 580 days once construction starts soon. An estimated 165K cubic yards of soil and muck will soon be excavated but trucks

will not be allowed to haul during school pickup and dropoff times at Wahneta Elementary.

Once finished, Lake Gwynn will not only help reduce pollution but may

also raise land values in Wahneta and encourage more real estate investment on the east side of the lake, which is currently undeveloped and privately owned.

Another straw in the sand coming

WINTER HAVEN – The Winter Haven City Commission approved a plan to build a new \$5M water production facility in the Wahneta area Monday, Sept. 24.

Water pressure and volume in the southern portions of Winter Haven needs improvement according to Winter Haven Utility Services Department Director Gary Hubbard. This would be the 10th water production facility in the city once it is built.

“The first step is to approve a facility plan and to apply for a loan,” Hubbard told the commissioners during an agenda review meeting last week.

The fixed .85 percent interest 20-year loan would have annual payments of \$282K, Hubbard said.

The facility would be the city's receiving point for water once the Polk Regional Water Cooperative finalizes a “loop” of water pipes connecting all of the municipalities in the county in

the coming years. The dwindling supply of water being pumped out of the ground has been an ongoing news topic over the past year or so when the PRWC was formed.

Explosive growth countywide has, in part, caused what some call a water crisis. For example, in 2012 Winter Haven residents used 9.2 million gallons per day in water. In 2017, that number climbed to 10.1 mgd, edging the city closer to what they are permitted to get out of the Upper Florida Aquifer.

The pump booster station, 500K gallon ground storage tank and limited chemical treatment plant will be built on a 6.4-acre property near 4th Street and Pollard Road in the Wahneta neighborhood of Winter Haven.

The facility will have the capacity to add two additional wells and pumps if needed in the future according to documentation given to the city commission.

Hope Equine Rescue moves to WH

WINTER HAVEN – Around a year ago, a licensed, practicing veterinarian was accused and arrested for neglecting many of the three dozen animals living on her Lakeland property.

Dr. Gail Nichols and her husband Paul Smith owned 28 miniature horses, two full-sized horses, eight dogs and two parrots. Nichols and Smith were criminally charged for animal neglect of ten of the animals, three of which had to be killed they were so neglected. According to court documents others were described as emaciated, caged in a house not fit for human habitation, missing feathers, overgrown hooves with infections, fleas, infected teeth, hookworms, and other findings.

Just like some kids end up in foster care, sometimes animals need people to step in and take over also. There is a place like that here in Winter Haven called Hope Equine Rescue.

Last April, Hope Equine Rescue Pres-

ident Dani Horton and her supporters celebrated 10 years in business, mostly on a farm in Auburndale. In June, having outgrown the Auburndale farm, Horton bought a farm just off Dundee Road near Country Club Road where 40 horses are kept, many formerly owned by Dr. Nichols.

On Sunday Sept. 23, Hope Equine Rescue hosted trainers from around 60 equine rescue facilities across the county taking part in a prestigious Homes for Horses Coalition Conference training day.

Trainers at horse rescues have to work with abused horses who are often scared of humans. On Sunday a trainer named Trevor Carter and his team from Mexico helped teach the other trainers better work with abused animals. For example, Lilly is one of the abused horses confiscated from Dr. Nichols. With a flag attached to a flexible stick, Carter showed others how to humanely get Lilly to follow instructions and voluntarily walk into a horse trailer.

"We are honored to be able to play even just a small role providing a family with a home that will help them achieve the strength, stability, and independence they need to build a better life for themselves and their families," Wilkes added.

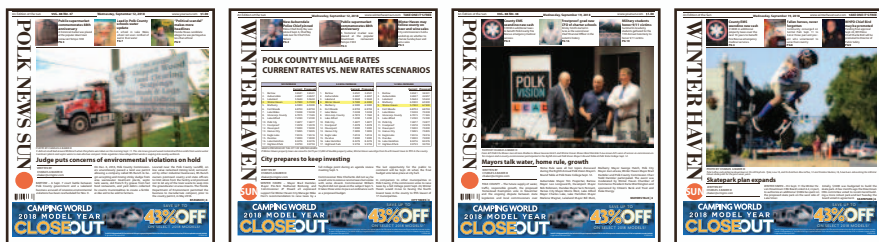

LW fire fee no longer a hot topic

LAKE WALES – With little fanfare, and absolutely no public objection, Lake Wales has once again approved a fire fee for residences and business in the city.

When it was first introduced, there was much public outcry about the fee since fire protection costs had up to that point been covered through regular ad valorem taxes.

The displeasure was so intense that petitions circulated that almost put the measure to a public vote, which was actually held, although a judge had ruled the tally unconstitutional a few weeks before residents went to the polls. A total of 1,192 voted to abolish the fee, and 697 voted in favor of it.

The latest fee – part of the 2018-19 fiscal year budget which goes into effect

Oct. 1 – was approved unanimously at a city commission meeting held on Sept. 11.

The residential rate is \$146, the third year the rate has come in at that number according to Fire Chief Joe Jenkins. Multi-family homes are rated at \$72 per dwelling unit and mobile homes are charged \$129.

Commercial property charges are computed at six-cents per square foot, while the industrial charge is a penny per square foot. Institutional structures are calculated at eight-cents per square foot.

All charges are included as part of the county tax bill.

Even with the fee, about 55 percent of the cost of running the Lake Wales fire department comes out of the city's general budget, according to a memo from Jenkins to city commissioners.

LW takes 4 minutes to spend \$3.3 million on airport

LAKE WALES – Multi-million dollar infrastructure improvements are finally ready for takeoff at Lake Wales Municipal Airport.

City commissioners officially accepted a grant from the Federal Aviation Administration last week and is also getting a grant from the state Department of Transportation that will cover the vast majority of the costs.

Local officials were left to scramble, however, to make sure that the paperwork accepting the grant was delivered on time. The city has known for a while the grant money was coming their way.

However, the official paperwork to receive it didn't arrive in Lake Wales until Friday, Sept. 14, and it was due in the FAA's regional office in Orlando on Tuesday, Sept. 18.

A special city commission meeting – that lasted all of four minutes – was called for Monday, Sept. 17, to pass a resolution accepting the federal funds. Then, a city official drove the paperwork to Orlando on Tuesday to make sure it got there on time.

The money – over \$3.4 million in total – will be used to rehabilitate one taxiway and add another that will service an extended runway at the airport.

The FAA is providing \$2.07 million, while the state is adding just over \$868,000, leaving the city to cover the remaining \$303,000. Lake Wales has been aggressively promoting and expanding its airport in recent years – including taking over its operation – as an economic development tool. Without the upgrades, mainly the lengthened runway, corporate jets currently use airports in Winter Haven or Bartow.

"Bo" is horse found by the Polk County Sheriff's Office who was found abandoned near a deceased horse, a harness around his face had been there so long it had made its way under his skin. Bo served as a training aide also.

It costs roughly \$100K per year to keep Hope Equine Rescue operating, even with an all-volunteer staff. Horton said she is able to stay in business with help with several major donors who sponsor stalls, by hosting two fundraisers per year, collecting adoption fees and collecting fees for events like Reading with Rescues.

Have a child who loves horses but don't have the land to adopt one of her own? Every second and fourth Monday your child can come to Hope Equine Rescue, read to a horse and spend time with like-minded kids after.

"Kids reading to her seems to be helping," said volunteer Kara Huebsch.

Horton said ultimately the goal is to heal the horses enough to be adopted although some were so abused that may not be possible. If you've got the land, it is only \$200 to adopt.

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McLaughlin plan gets chamber support, city next?

LAKE WALES – The Lake Wales Charter system proposal to take over operation of McLaughlin Middle School Fine Arts Academy has the support of the local chamber commerce, and school officials are hopeful the city will officially come on board as well.

Chamber director and past president Brian Marbutt said the Lake Wales Chamber recently approved a resolution in support of the plan, which would operate as Bok North Academy.

McLaughlin is currently a middle school operated by the county, but has had failing grades the last three years. Sometime this fall, the county school board must adopt a contingency plan for McLaughlin if it does not get a passing grade this school year.

One of those options is to turn the school's operation over to a successful charter system.

"The Polk County School board indicated they only hear from the charter system. They don't hear from the community, they don't hear from the chamber or the city," Marbutt told commissioners at a city meeting Sept. 19. "Based on that, the chamber board voted to support this idea. We're asking the city to consider supporting this as well. Let's show the Polk County School Board we stand united as a city, chamber, and community."

Lake Wales Commissioners are expected to consider a resolution of support at its next regularly scheduled meeting on Oct. 2.

Charter System Board of Trustees Chairman Jimmy Nelson said the time is right for the proposal, which includes \$1.2 million in operation aid from the char-

ter system's foundation, money above and beyond what the school already receives in state and federal funding.

It also includes a pledge that all middle school students within the Lake Wales district boundaries would be guaranteed a seat at either Bok North or Bok South. Bok South has been an A school ever since its inception eight years ago. Bok North debuted last month with 200 sixth graders meeting at First Baptist Church in Lake Wales.

"It's just the right thing to do, honestly," Nelson said. "I don't think there's any arguments against bringing all our schools under the same system that trump the fact the best thing that can happen for our students and community is for that to happen. Everything else, you might say, has to fall subservient to that."

He said the community's back-to-school breakfast in early August, which included the teaching and administra-

tive staffs from McLaughlin Middle and Spook Hill Elementary, also a county school showed what a unified system in Lake Wales might look like.

"It was a celebration of coming together. For three to four hours, we were not district schools or charter schools. That stigma just needs to go away. We beseech you to support our efforts."

Two commissioners have direct relationships to the local schools. Robin Gibson was one of the community members key to getting the charter system started, and still serves as its general counsel. Terrye Howell, the longest-serving commissioner, is a long-standing elementary school teacher at Spook Hill.

Several county school board members have said if they were to support the McLaughlin takeover, the charter system should also bring Spook Hill into their fold.

Facelift to downtown Lake Wales in the works

LAKE WALES – The Lake Wales Main Street Annual Meeting scheduled for Sept. 27 has been rescheduled for January 24, 2019.

On July 20, the Lake Wales Main Street Board of Directors selected the prestigious firm Dover, Kohl and Partners out of Coral Gables to help start redesigning downtown Lake Wales.

Founding Principal Victor Dover is scheduled as keynote speaker at the annual meeting to put on a presentation on how the process will develop. Readers can get a sneak peak by watching some videos describing their work revitalizing dozens of other quaint downtowns across the nation at www.doverkohl.com

Multiple meetings will be scheduled giving Lake Wales residents input on how the downtown area should look, where work should start and help get more pedestrian traffic and businesses to move in.

"Part of the Main Street philosophy is that downtown belongs to the entire

community," Lake Wales Main Street Executive Director Karen Thompson said. "Everyone has a stake and a role to play in the revitalization of their downtown."

Thompson described their new partners as "the best of the best" and "They wrote the book on town planning and street design."

Money to pay for the redesign will be raised through Main Street fundraising projects. No city general funds or city CRA funds will be used to initiate the process, Thompson said. Once a plan is in place, city funds may be incorporated if approved by the city commission or CRA board.

The design process should take six to eight months and that more specifics will be available as the plan comes into shape, Thompson said.

"The timing of the new trail, parks and planned improvements downtown and in the northwest part of Lake Wales is perfect," Thompson said. "All will flow seamlessly together and will have similar design elements."

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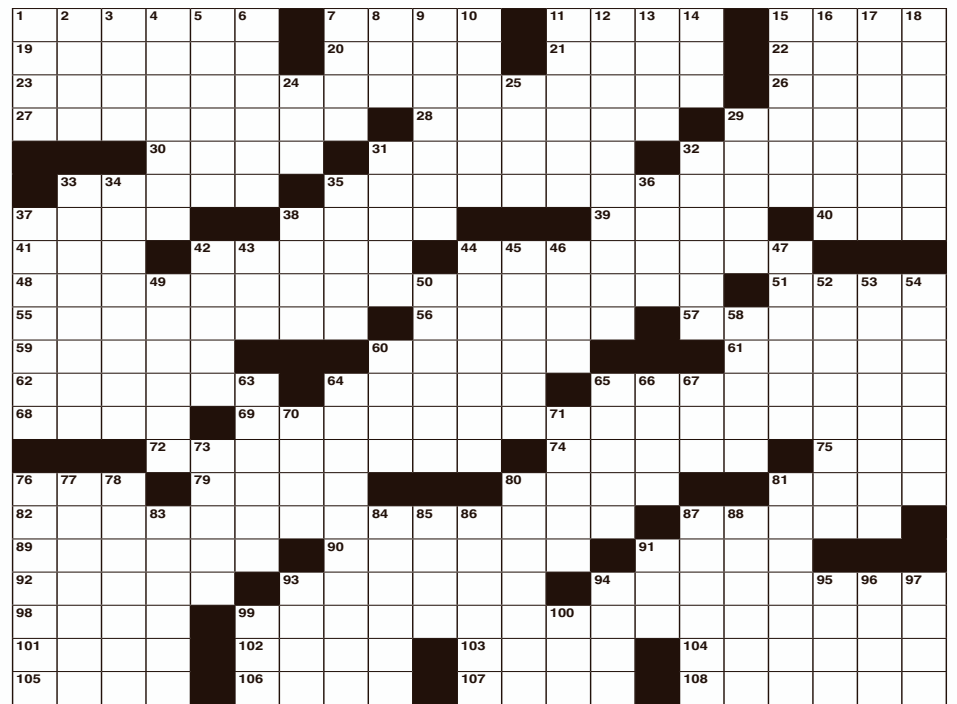

Bartow OK's millage rate

BARTOW – With little fanfare, the Bartow City Commissioners gave the three-person team congratulations for not raising the property tax rate for the 10th straight year Tuesday as commissioners unanimously approved the 2018-19 budget.

All told, the ad valorem rate for the city is 3.5378 mills, meaning a house is charged \$3.54 for each \$1,000 of assessed value. A \$150,000 valued house would pay \$353.78 in city taxes, 3.2 percent less than last year.

“With the rollback rate, this is the 10th consecutive year we have not had tax (ad valorem) rate increase. The staff is doing a wonderful job,” Commissioner James Clements said.

Mayor Leo Longworth said city staff has done a wonderful job with the budget over the years.

“They also provide not the same service but better services to the people of Bartow,” he added.

Fanfare came from Gerald Cochran, a long-time critic of how the city spends its money. He said the amount of money he pays in property taxes has risen and that is because the value of his home has increased.

“I looked at the budget and I see a lot of fat that could be eliminated,” he said. “In other words, it keeps going up little by little and at somewhere there is going to be a breaking point. You say that the

millage rate stays the same but when you look at the value, the pay increases to me.”

In response to Cochran at the second public hearing on the budget, City Manager George Long said the rise in the assessment has nothing to do with the government nor with whether a person has to pay more in ad valorem taxes.

Commissioner Trish Pfeiffer pointed out that Bartow has the lowest property rate taxes in Polk County.

According to the city, the total budget is \$117,473, 459. This year's budget is about 6.5 percent more than last year's spending. This year the city plans a \$2.5 million water softening project and another \$2.5 million on fiber optic that can eventually reach city residents. The city is also using \$1.4 million in Phase I of a road project that would improve streets, curbs, and sidewalks.

“We're trying to give customers the best bang for the buck,” Long said.

In roll call votes, commissioners unanimously passed the millage rate and the budget.

CITY SUPPORTS AMENDMENT 4: The Bartow City Commission voted unanimously for a resolution saying it supports giving back voting rights to convicted felons who have served their time. The resolution is to urge voters to vote yes on Amendment 4 in the November general election.

A yes vote would automatically restore voting rights to people with prior felo-

ny convictions except those convicted of murder or felony sexual offenses when they complete their sentences. That includes prison, parole or probation. A no vote would oppose the move. To become an amendment to the Florida Constitution it must have 60 percent of the vote.

“This would give them a second chance,” Mayor Leo Longworth, who is the current president of the Florida League of Cities, said.

Commissioner Billy Simpson said the amendment is a move in the right direction for people who have served their time.

In seconding Simpson's motion to pass the resolution, Commissioner Trish Pfeiffer said, “This is happening very late for Florida and part of that is because our governor doesn't want this. You have to wait five years. I know a person whose son was arrested in high school for having pot and he can't vote.

Since 2018 people with prior felonies can never regain the right to vote until

and unless a state board restores his or her voting rights. Under former Florida Gov. Charlie Crist, the Executive Clemency Board automatically restored the rights of felons who had completed their sentences, paid restitution, and had no pending criminal charges. Scott eliminated the changes and convicted felons had to wait five to seven years to request the board consider restoring voting rights.

As to whether or not this will affect elections, The Sentencing Project estimated there is 10.43 percent of voting age people in the state and in the 2010 and 2014 gubernatorial campaigns as 1.2 and 1 percent margins of victory, respectively.

Florida is one of four states (Iowa, Kentucky, and Virginia) where convicted felons do not gain back the right to vote until and unless a state officer or board OKs it. There are 19 other states that do restore that right.

The general election is Tuesday, Nov. 6.

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Schools superintendent said communication is a key to diversity

BARTOW – Inspired by some action she sees in her own field, the superintendent of schools said at the Bartow Diversity Luncheon, “We must go back to where we once were. It’s going to take everyone in this room and everyone outside this room for us to get back where we were. We are a great country. We are a great people, but we must do it together.”

Byrd told the crowd of more than 200 that diversity doesn’t necessarily mean what most think it means anymore. It is not just a person’s skin color.

“It’s an age, it’s gender, it’s disability. Diversity is a way of life,” she said.

It reflected what Community Relations Co-Chairwoman Gloria Washington said earlier in the program about why this group formed this annual luncheon where it names a Diversity Award winner to a local organization or business and to an individual.

“Each of us has to tear down the walls that divide us and build bridges,” she said. Strong communication and dialog are necessary.

Lewis, Good Hope Church awarded

It was that the winner of the 2018 C.C. Corbett Diversity Award who illustrates what these two were talking about. Just four days earlier when he spoke at the Daughters of the American Revolution on Constitution Day, it could be heard from him.

“Work together along religious, racial and political lines and what is there? What can be achieved if we work together as one nation under God?”

Described to the crowd for the award, Lewis, who is the executive director of the Bartow Neighborhood Improvement Corp., and overseer of the L.B. Brown House Museum and festival that focuses on youth scholarships, he was recognized for getting the museum to be an exhibit in Washington, D.C., in the African American Heritage Museum. He was recognized for his efforts to build up East Bartow successfully getting help from the Communi-

ty Redevelopment Agency to have a study done.

“Now we have the reality with new homes being built,” Hazel Sellers said when presenting the award.

But, Sellers, who attended the DAR luncheon Saturday, mentioned that too at the Diversity Luncheon.

“I heard him speak Saturday and it was from his heart. He inspired everyone in that room,” she said.

The group award for an organization went to the Good Hope Missionary Baptist Church for its open door. People of all backgrounds come to this church on Old Bartow/Eagle Lake Road, where Pastor Lanelle Pickett Sr. presides.

“They give to the young, the middle age and the senior citizens,” Washington said when presenting the award.

She added: “You reach out with open arms to incorporate all in the church. And the church leadership is as diverse as the community it represents.”

She pointed out their help is for whoever needs it.

Good Hope isn’t perfect she said, as it does preach to felons, but as “they take all walks of life and you become part of their family.”

Byrd: A new normal is here

The open communication is more necessary now than it has always been because times have changed.

“We are at a new normal. It may not be one we want to be in but we must,” she said.

She never thought of how to come up with a school safety plan, a protection plan for her students and employees.

“Parkland, that’s the closest one to here,” she said about the school shooting on Valentine’s Day in South Florida where 17 students were killed. “The sheriff and I were looking at plans, after the Act was passed, and put aside all differences (over school shootings).

We must come together. We have to hold together as a people.”

Ultimately with the plan their common background of caring about the future of their family’s freedom, she was able to handle her most important role as superintendent where it says in her bio on the school’s website, “Our key mission is simple: to provide a high quality education to all students.”

At the luncheon, she concluded, “We have to put aside our differences and say we can work together. We start with ourselves. We work it out the county, the state, and the nation,” she said.

History Center opens new exhibit at 20th Anniversary Party

BARTOW – It's now been 20 years since the name of the old courthouse was changed to the Polk County History Center. It's been six years since the 14 foot by eight-foot concrete sign was placed. But around Bartow – and other places here – it was still the "old courthouse."

To some, it will remain that, but with last week's "Walk Through History" celebration perhaps that will change a little. Celebrating its 20th year as the Polk County history museum under a domed top building built in 1909, a celebration was held that included a tour of the museum, characters dressed from Polk County's past, a speech by a Jacob Summerlin actor and more. About 250 guests celebrated the milestone. The history center opened a new permanent exhibit, the Arts and Culture Exhibit.

Also at the event, John R. DeYoung Jr. was inducted into the Arts and Culture Hall of Fame.

A Michigan native, DeYoung moved to Bartow in 1960 as the band director where the Bartow High School band always ranked as one of the best, winning several state titles. After 24 years there he retired but only for a short time. About six years later he and his wife started the Bartow Adult Concert Band which for 24 years played seven monthly shows a year with about 75 musicians on stage and always a full house at the Bartow Civic Center. Also in his career, he has been inducted to the Florida Music Educators Hall of Fame and Florida Bandmaster Association Hall of Fame. Wednesday he was inducted into his third Hall of Fame, and it stood out to him as much as anything he did in his career calling it a "high honor."

"I told the adult band that this was too much fun to ever quit," DeYoung said. "I did retire, but I'm not quitting. I still sing in the church choir."

In one sentence, Polk County Commissioner Melony Bell summed up DeYoung's career: "He had a 67-year career and taught more than 50,000 musicians."

In another award, Bell was recognized for what she has done for the county in terms of art and history in her eight years on that board.

Joining the Tourist Development Council when she was first elected, She led an effort to bring art into the design of Polk County to attract people here. She was instrumental for getting tourist tax money to begin that effort. Money from tourist taxes went almost entirely sports and conventional events, she told commissioners, and eventually, some went to developing art displays. Since she joined the TDC tourist tax money rose from just less than \$5 million a year to about \$12 million a year.

Meri Mass, the director of the Polk Arts Alliance, who presented Bell with the award and recognition, said, "In 2010 Martha Rope and I discussed the imperative that Polk County needed a visionary. That visionary was Melony Bell."

She said the arts now provides \$45 million a year in economic impact.

Bell said when accepting the award she knew nothing when she started about the arts and how it could be tied to economic impact, but she quickly learned and became interested.

"They are the visionaries," she said. "They talked about bringing me on, but I knew nothing. But they just kept banging on the door."

She said it has been a wonderful experience serving on the county commission where she learned how to be a "true servant" for the people.

Bell's term ends in November and can no longer run for the county commission. She is currently a Republican candidate for the Florida House of Representatives.

Behind the meeting room, the history center opened the Arts and Culture Display that covers Polk County history in dance, theater, music and more. It also has a display showing the members of the Polk County Artist Hall of Fame which will now include DeYoung. Also in it is Richard Powers from Frostproof, Robert MacDonald from Florida Southern University and Norman Small of Theatre Winter Haven.

Summerlin speaks

Daryl Ward, Ph.D., the principal of Harrison School of the Arts, slowly limped out in a suit and tie and amused the crowd for 15 minutes as he played Jacob Summerlin, known as the King of the Crackers.

"You'll have to forgive my slow moving," he said as he grabbed the microphone. "I'm not used to this. I've been dead for 125 years."

He said he doesn't normally dress this formal, but the last time he was at an event in Bartow when the school was opened for which he donated 40 acres, he said he was under-dressed.

"I didn't want to make the same mistake twice," he said.

Summerlin told of his life from 1820-1893 saying he is known to be the first white person born in Florida after the United States acquired the state from Spain. He is buried in Oak Hill Cemetery in Bartow.

Born in Alligator (now called Lake City) he moved to Hillsborough County where he worked as a sheriff's deputy.

"(Polk Sheriff) Grady (Judd) can keep his job," he said. "Come to think of it that's a pretty great Cracker name."

Arguing that while the conception of a Cracker is not good and one newspaper referred to Crackers as men who didn't understand and need a grooming, his living as a Cracker was far from that. They were cow hunters and good businessmen. In fact, the origin of the name is not known for sure,

so whether or not it was an insult isn't known. One was it came from people planting cracker corn, he said. Others said it was from eating biscuit crackers, which Summerlin doubted was the origin. A third is from the sound of the whip when herding cattle.

For years Summerlin made his money supplying Cuba with cattle and getting paid in gold rather than Confederate script. He spent the Civil War years as part of the Cow Calvary taking them into Georgia to feed the soldiers while he also took them to places like Fort Myers, Punta Gorda, and Punta Rassa to ship to Cuba. During the Civil War, he also donated 200 cows to Confederate widows and orphans.

His proudest moment, Summerlin told his audience, was when the Bartow's first school was started in 1886. Summerlin is credited with starting the city when he donated 120 acres of land. The condition was the acreage be used for the school, a Methodist Church and a Baptist Church. Also, Bartow would be the county seat of the new Polk County.

A ceremony was held in his honor at the new school (where Bartow Elementary Academy is today) and he was given a gold-headed cane. The cane is on display at the Polk County History Center.

It was at this ceremony, where up to 1,000 attended, he felt he was under-dressed.

"This was the most significant ... 40 acres for a school," he said. "The first floor was the school and they called it Summerlin Institute. I didn't want them to name it after me, but they did."

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Bad news (still) does not improve with age

Seven years ago, an obscure retired community newspaper publisher wrote a book in which he set forth "20 Surefire Rules for Successful Management," nuggets of wisdom learned over a career of more than 46 years.

These he modestly called "Frisbie's Laws."

The 17th Law: "Bad news does not improve with age."

The premise: when something jumps the track, the boss needs to be notified right away. Whether it's the breakdown of an essential piece of equipment, the loss of a major account, or a serious error by the staff, keeping the news from the boss only makes things worse.

Although written from a business perspective, the same principle applies to all venues of management, including government.

The debacle over an accusation of serious misconduct made against Judge Brett Kavanaugh is a classic example of the kind of chicanery that can result from hiding "bad news" from the boss. The boss, in this case, is the Senate committee determining Kavanaugh's fitness to serve as a Justice of the Supreme Court.

It was not until the contentious Kavanaugh hearings were coming to an end in early September that Sen. Diane Feinstein, a Democrat from California, revealed that on July 30, she had received a letter from Christine Blasey Ford, a California college professor.

In it, Ford alleged that when Kavanaugh was 17 and she was 15, Kavanaugh attempted to remove her clothes at a party.

Kavanaugh vehemently denies the allegation, and 65 female classmates and three high school girlfriends have said he was always a gentleman.

It is a classic "she says/he says" argument. It is unlikely that either the charge or the denial can be proven. I will not try to suggest who is telling the truth. I have no idea.

But if the charge had been disclosed before the Senate hearings began, there would have been ample time to investigate the allegation, and the opportunity to question Kavanaugh regarding the accusation at the hearings.

The timing of Feinstein's disclosure of the letter clearly was intended to disrupt the orderly process for examining nominees to the Supreme Court, and it has done exactly that.

(Because of the deadline for submitting this column for publication, it is not possible to report the current status of the issue, a status which changes daily.)

In the often tawdry arena of partisan politics, last minute "gotcha" revelations (whether true or not) are not unusual.

But the Senatorial duty to examine the fitness of nominees to the nation's highest court should be above such duplicity.

Delaying disclosure of "bad news" for the purpose of disrupting the orderly process of government is reprehensible.

Cosby declared 'sexually violent predator'

NORRISTOWN, Pa. — His Hollywood career and good-guy image in ruins, Bill Cosby was led away to prison in handcuffs Tuesday at age 81 for perhaps the rest of his days, sentenced to three to 10 years behind bars for drugging and sexually assaulting a woman at his gated estate. The punishment made him the first celebrity of the #MeToo era to be sent to prison and completed the dizzying, late-in-life fall from grace for the comedian, TV star and breaker of racial barriers. "It is time for justice. Mr. Cosby, this has all circled back to you. The time has come," Montgomery County Judge

Steven O'Neill said. He quoted from victim Andrea Constand's statement to the court, in which she said Cosby took her "beautiful, young spirit and crushed it." Cosby declined the opportunity to speak before the sentence came down, and afterward sat laughing and chatting with his defense team. His wife of 54 years, Camille, was not in court. Constand smiled broadly upon hearing the punishment and was hugged by others in the courtroom. In a blistering statement, Cosby spokesperson Andrew Wyatt said the comic was subjected to the "most racist and sexist trial in the history of the United States." Among other things, Wyatt said all three of the psychologists who testified against Cosby were

"white women who make money off of accusing black men of being sexual predators," and he accused prosecutors of using a doctored recording of a telephone conversation between Constand's mother and Cosby. Cosby's lawyers asked that he be allowed to remain free on bail while he appeals his conviction, but the judge appeared incredulous over the request and ordered him locked up immediately, saying that "he could quite possibly be a danger to the community."

Trump challenges UN, boasting of America's go-it-alone might

UNITED NATIONS — President Donald Trump poured scorn on the "ideology of globalism" and heaped praise on his own administration's achievements Tuesday in a speech to the U.N. General Assembly that drew headshakes and even mocking laughter from his audience of fellow world leaders. "The U.S. will not tell you how to live and work or worship," Trump said as he unapologetically promoted

his "America First" agenda. "We only ask that you honor our sovereignty in return." Speaking in triumphal terms, Trump approached his address to the world body as something of an annual report to the world on his country's progress since his inauguration. He showcased strong economic numbers, declared that the U.S. military is "more powerful than it has ever been before" and crowed that in "less than two years, my administration has accomplished more than almost any administration

in the history of our country." Just sentences into the president's remarks, the audience began to chuckle and some leaders broke into outright laughter, suggesting the one-time reality television star's puffery is as familiar abroad as it is at home. Trump appeared briefly flustered, then smiled and said it was not the reaction he expected "but that's all right." Later he brushed off the episode, telling reporters, "Oh, it was great. Well, that was meant to get some laughter, so it was great."

The leaders' spontaneous response to Trump's address only reinforced the American president's isolation among allies and foes alike, as his nationalistic policies have created rifts with erstwhile partners and cast doubt in some circles about the reliability of American commitments around the world. Barely an hour before he spoke, in fact, U.N. Secretary-General Antonio Guterres declared to the assembly that global cooperation is the world's best

US-China tensions spilling over into the military arena

WASHINGTON — A deterioration in U.S.-China relations, seen most dramatically in their escalating trade dispute, is spilling over into the military arena. The Pentagon on Tuesday confirmed that China had canceled a Washington visit by the head of its navy, and U.S. officials said China had denied a request for a U.S. Navy ship to make a port visit next month at Hong Kong. Also on Tuesday, China demanded the Trump administration cancel a planned \$330 million sale of military equipment to Taiwan, the self-ruled island that Beijing considers a renegade province. The Chinese foreign ministry warned of "severe damage" to bilateral relations if the sale announced Monday goes through. Washington has no official relations with Taiwan's democratically elected government but is obliged by U.S. law to see that it has the means to defend itself. The backdrop to these tensions is the U.S.-China trade dispute. Each imposed tariff increases on the other's goods Monday, and Beijing accused the Trump administration of bullying. A Chinese official said China

Antibiotics for appendicitis? Surgery often not needed

CHICAGO — When emergency tests showed the telltale right-sided pain in Heather VanDusen's abdomen was appendicitis, she figured she'd be quickly wheeled into surgery. But doctors offered her the option of antibiotics instead. A new study from Finland shows her choice is a reasonable alternative for most patients with appendicitis. Five years after treatment with antibiotics, almost two-thirds of patients hadn't had another attack. It's a substantial change in thinking about how to treat an inflamed appendix. For

decades, appendicitis has been considered a medical emergency requiring immediate surgery to remove the appendix because of fears it could burst, which can be life-threatening. But advances in imaging tests, mainly CT scans, have made it easier to determine if an appendix might burst, or if patients could be safely treated without surgery. The results suggest that nearly two-thirds of appendicitis patients don't face that risk and may be good candidates for antibiotics instead. "It's a feasible, viable and a safe option," said Dr. Paulina Salminen, the study's lead author and a surgeon at Turku University Hospital in Finland.

Her study in adults is the longest follow-up to date of patients treated with drugs instead of surgery for appendicitis and the results confirm one-year findings reported three years ago. Research has also shown antibiotics may work for some children with appendicitis. The Finnish results were published Tuesday in the Journal of the American Medical Association. A journal editorial says "it's a new era of appendicitis treatment." Appendix removal is the most common emergency surgery worldwide, with about 300,000 performed each year in the United States alone, said

Salminen. She said the results from her study suggest many of those surgeries could be avoided. U.S. doctors have started offering antibiotics instead of surgery and Salminen says she occasionally does too. The journal editorial says appropriate patients should be given that option. The study involved about 500 Finnish adults who had CT scans to rule out severe cases. Half were treated with antibiotics; the others had surgery. Among the antibiotics patients, 100 ended up having surgery within five years of treatment — most for a suspected recurrence of appendicitis in the first year. Seven of

them did not have appendicitis and likely could have avoided surgery. The results suggest the success rate for antibiotic treatment was almost 64 percent, the authors said. About 1 in 4 surgery patients had complications, including infections around the incision, abdominal pain and hernias, compared with only 7 percent of antibiotics patients. Antibiotic patients had 11 fewer sick days on average than the surgery group. In the first year, their treatment costs were about 60 percent lower. A cost analysis for the full five years wasn't included in the published results.

Trump: Venezuelan socialist president easily toppled

CARACAS, Venezuela — President Donald Trump suggested on Tuesday that Venezuela's leader Nicolas Maduro could be easily toppled in military coup and the U.S. stepped up financial pressure by slapping the socialist president's inner circle with fresh sanctions.

Trump declined to respond to questions about whether a U.S.-led military intervention in the crisis-stricken country was possible, saying he doesn't reveal military strategy.

"It's a regime that,

frankly, could be toppled very quickly by the military if the military decides to do that," Trump said in comments on the sidelines of the U.N. General Assembly. "It's a truly bad place in the world today."

Earlier in the day, the Trump administration slapped financial sanctions on four members of Maduro's inner circle, including his wife and the nation's vice president, on allegations of corruption.

As part of the actions, the U.S. barred Americans from doing business with and will seize any financial assets in the U.S. belonging to First Lady Cilia

and Defense Minister Vladimir Padrino.

"We are continuing to designate loyalists who enable Maduro to solidify his hold on the military and the government while the Venezuelan people suffer," Treasury Secretary Steven T. Mnuchin said in a statement.

Over the past two years the Trump administration has sanctioned dozens of individuals, including Maduro himself, on allegations of corruption, drug trafficking and human rights abuses.

But until now it had spared key leaders like Delcy Rodriguez, as well as the U.S.-trained

Padrino, believing they occupy seats of power and could play a key role in an eventual transition.

David Smilde, a Tulane University professor who has spent more than two decades living and working in Venezuela, said Tuesday's actions would seem to suggest the U.S. has given up trying to sow division within the government in the hopes it could force a democratic transition from within.

"This clearly breaks from that strategy, said Smilde. "If everyone is sanctioned then it could end up uniting the government."

Iran says US wants to overthrow govt, rejects two-way talks

UNITED NATIONS — Iranian President Hassan Rouhani accused the United States on Tuesday of trying to overthrow his government, rejecting bilateral talks after President Donald Trump predicted stepped-up U.S. sanctions would get Tehran to negotiate over its nuclear program.

Addressing world leaders at the U.N. General Assembly, Rouhani accused the Trump administration of violating "state obligations" from the Obama administration by withdrawing from the 2015 nuclear deal that Iran signed with the U.S. and five other major powers.

"On what basis and criteria can we enter into an agreement with an administration misbehaving such as this?" Rouhani asked. "It is ironic that the

U.S. government does not even conceal its plan for overthrowing the same government it invites to talks."

Rouhani invited the U.S. to come back to negotiations within the U.N. Security Council, which endorsed the nuclear deal. There, he said, both sides can listen to each other.

"Beginning the dialogue starts with ending threats and unjust sanctions that negate the principles of ethics and international law," he said.

In remarks released while Rouhani was still talking, National Security Adviser John Bolton doubled down on the decision to withdraw from the deal, echoing his president's strong language and using blunt language to dismiss any entreaties from Tehran. He called the scrapped Iran deal "the worst diplomatic debacle in American history."

5 EU countries reach deal to end limbo of rescued migrants

MADRID (AP) — Five European Union countries struck a deal Tuesday to distribute between them 58 migrants rescued in the Mediterranean Sea and left stranded by continuing disagreements in the bloc over how to cope with the influx of people trying to enter illegally from North Africa.

A Spanish official who wasn't authorized to be named in media reports said Spain, France, Portugal, Germany and Malta agreed to take the migrants, who were rescued by charities off Libya last week but then stuck on a private rescue ship because it couldn't find a country which would let it dock.

The breakthrough came after days of uncertainty, with EU countries either reluctant to act on the divisive migrant issue or determined to halt the migrant flow. Humanitarian boats loaded with rescued migrants are increasingly shunted between European governments under pressure to stem newcomers.

UK Labour opposition party vows to reject May's Brexit deal

LONDON (AP) — Britain's main opposition Labour Party announced Tuesday it will reject Conservative Prime Minister Theresa May's proposed divorce deal with the European Union when it comes to a vote in Parliament and might even support a new Brexit referendum.

The party's chief Brexit spokesman accused May's government of offering the country a choice between "really bad and even worse."

If Britain and the EU agree on a deal, it must be approved by the British and European parliaments before Britain leaves. The math on the U.K. vote looks ominous for May's government, however, because it lacks an overall majority.

Brexit spokesman Keir Starmer told Labour's annual conference that the party would vote against a Brexit deal along the lines that May is proposing because it does not meet "six tests" it has set, including protecting workers' rights and retaining access to European markets.

Merkel's party ousts close ally of chancellor from top post

BERLIN (AP) — A close ally of Chancellor Angela Merkel was ousted Tuesday as head of her conservative bloc's parliamentary group, a surprise defeat that dealt a blow to the longtime German leader's authority in her own ranks.

Volker Kauder, who had led the parliamentary group of Merkel's Union bloc since she became chancellor in 2005, was defeated by Ralph Brinkhaus — a budget policy expert who had been one of his deputies.

The vote followed a wobbly start to Merkel's fourth government, a coalition of the Union and the center-left Social Democrats, which has squabbled persistently since it took office in March. It came a year after the conservatives lost significant support in an election that saw the far-right Alternative for Germany enter parliament.

Kauder, who had Merkel's support, had been widely expected to prevail in Tuesday's vote of lawmakers from Merkel's Christian Democratic Union and its

Bavaria-only sister party, the Christian Social Union. But he was defeated by a 125-112 margin, with two abstentions.

WHO warns of 'perfect storm' for Ebola in eastern Congo

GENEVA (AP) — Insecurity, public defiance about vaccinations and political jockeying could create a "perfect storm" leading Congo's latest Ebola outbreak to spread, the emergencies chief for the World Health Organization said Tuesday.

Dr. Peter Salama said the response to the deadly hemorrhagic fever is at a "critical juncture" in eastern North Kivu province, where the outbreak was declared nearly two months ago. Health officials have reported 119 confirmed cases, including 69 deaths.

WHO's operations in Beni, where work to control the outbreak is centered, are "in effect suspended" following a weekend attack by suspected Allied Democratic Forces rebels that killed at least 18 people, Salama said.

Police: Woman fatally stabs pet pit bull attacking husband

DAYTONA BEACH (AP) — Authorities say a Florida woman fatally stabbed her pet pit bull as it was attacking her husband.

The Daytona Beach News-Journal reports the husband was taken to a nearby hospital for treatment following the Sunday attack.

Daytona Beach police say the 54-year-old woman stabbed the 75-pound dog multiple times with a kitchen knife to get it off her 57-year-old husband. Officials say the pit bull got into a fight over a toy with the couple's Labrador mix, and the husband tried to break it up.

That's when the pit bull turned on the husband, who ended up losing part of his finger.

Florida teen charged after Instagram school shooting threat

PEMBROKE PINES (AP) — A Florida 13-year-old who threatened to shoot up a school in a group chat on Instagram now faces a felony charge after another juvenile alerted adults.

A Pembroke Pines police news release says the boy was arrested Monday on a charge of making a false report concerning the use of a weapon in a violent manner.

Police say about nine juveniles were participating in the chat Sunday when the boy posted that he intended to shoot up Pines Middle School. Detectives soon arrived at the boy's home, where he told them he only meant the threat as a joke.

But posting a threat about a mass shooting is a felony now in Florida, where similar arrests have soared since the killings of 17 people at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School.

Florida man charged with ignoring arm, colliding with train

HILLIARD (AP) — Authorities say a Florida man is facing charges for ignoring a crossing arm and colliding with a freight train.

The Florida Highway Patrol says the collision happened just after midnight on Tuesday in Nassau County, Florida, located between Jacksonville and the Georgia border.

Troopers say Ronnie Slayton drove around a crossing arm as the CSX train was heading north and collided with the train.

The train returned to service a short time later.

Slayton faces charges of driving under the influence with property damage and possession of marijuana. All are misdemeanors.

Court records showed he was still in jail early Tuesday and couldn't be reached for comment.

Florida church targeted by vandal responds with love

ST. PETERSBURG (AP) — After a vandal left a homophobic message on a sign outside a Florida church, the church responded by displaying the message "Love Always Wins!" on the message board along with hearts in the color of a rainbow flag.

The St. Petersburg Police Department says it's investigating the vandalism outside the Allendale United Methodist Church that took place late Sunday or early Monday.

The Tampa Bay Times reports the sign had originally had a message supporting state ballot measure that would restore voting rights to felons.

In response, the vandal spray painted "gay pastor" on the

sign. In July, someone threw a brick through the message board when it displayed a pro-civil rights quote.

The Rev. Andy Oliver says the church has decided to respond with a message of love.

For escaped inmate, taste of freedom included sweet tea

PALATKA (AP) — For a Florida prison inmate, the taste of freedom was short-lived but included sweet tea.

The Putnam County Sheriff's Office says 23-year-old Taylor Fender walked away from a work crew Monday.

The inmate purchased clothes at a store where a customer thought Fender looked suspicious and called 911.

Fender headed into a restaurant just as a deputy was pulling into a parking spot.

Authorities say a bulletin was issued with Fender's description.

The deputy arrested Fender in the restaurant but not before the inmate ordered and paid for sweet tea.

Fender was returned to prison where he is serving a five-year term for grand theft of a motor vehicle. The sweet tea was left unfinished.

The sheriff's office tweeted, "For some Southerners, that could be considered the bigger crime."

Study of public schools says UF lags in racial equity

GAINESVILLE (AP) — A new report on racial equity at public universities shows the University of Florida lags other institutions.

The study conducted by the Race and Equity Center at the University of Southern California ranks the University of Florida in the mid-tier with public institutions in the state

and behind a number of peers nationally.

The Gainesville Sun reports the study used representation equity, gender equity, completion equity and black student-to-black faculty ratio in evaluating schools.

The University of Florida received an "F" for representation equity, a "C" for gender equity and "B" grades for completion equity and black student-to-black faculty ratio.

School officials say the university has a variety of outreach programs designed to increase both application and enrollment of minority and first-generation students.

Florida wants court to nix NRA bid to keep names private

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — The state of Florida is arguing there is no reason for the names of two 19-year-olds to be kept confidential in a challenge to the state's new gun law.

The 11th Circuit Court of Appeals is considering a request by the National Rifle Association. NRA attorneys argued Jane Doe and John Doe will be subject to threats if their names are included in the lawsuit.

The NRA is suing to block a Florida law requiring a gun buyer to be at least 21 years old. The restriction was enacted shortly after a shooting at a high school in Parkland, Florida that left 17 people dead.

Florida Attorney General Pam Bondi filed a brief on Friday that said the NRA has produced no evidence that the two teenagers are in danger.

Teacher says she was fired for refusing to give credit

PORT ST. LUCIE (AP) — A Florida history teacher says she was fired for refusing to

give half-credit to students who didn't turn in their assignments.

Diane Tirado says her school along Florida's Treasure Coast had a "no zero" policy, requiring teachers to give students no less than a 50-percent grade on assignments.

Tirado tells television station WPTV that she was fired in mid-September when she refused to follow the policy after several students didn't turn in a homework project.

No specific cause was given in her termination letter from the principal at West Gate school, since Tirado was still on probation having been recently hired.

The principal deferred comment to the school district.

A spokeswoman for St. Lucie Public Schools says there is no district policy prohibiting teachers from giving a grade of zero.

Man throws bicycle, then other man off bridge

DAYTONA BEACH (AP) — Police say a man and a woman whose bike had a flat tire were attacked as they tried to walk across the Main Street Bridge in Daytona Beach, Florida.

Police say 21-year-old Derrick Goodin began yelling about money at Stephanie Ellis and threw her bicycle off the bridge. They say Anthony Mascaro tried to intervene, but Goodin threw him "face-first" into the water, 30 feet below.

Goodin told an officer that Mascaro jumped.

But the officer, who happened to be driving across the bridge, said he witnessed what happened and recorded it on camera.

The Daytona Beach News-Journal reports that Mascaro swam to a pylon, suffering a small cut and a bloody eye. Goodin was held without bond on aggravated battery charges and couldn't be reached for comment.

Trump says Dems using 'con game' to sink Kavanaugh's bid

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump accused Democrats on Tuesday of using a “con game” to scuttle Brett Kavanaugh’s Supreme Court nomination, forcefully dismissing allegations against the judge as Republicans began preparations for a pivotal hearing Thursday with Christine Blasey Ford, a woman accusing Kavanaugh of sexual assault.

Kavanaugh’s march toward Senate confirmation

has been rocked by allegations of decades-old sexual improprieties from two women. Preparing for the hearing with Ford, Senate Judiciary Committee Chuck Grassley of Iowa said Republicans had hired an “investigating counsel” to handle questioning. He declined to provide the attorney’s name.

“We’re going to ask some questions on our side, by this person, for the same amount of time as the Democrats have collectively on the other side. And we’re doing it strictly to depoliticize the whole operation, to

offer Dr. Ford the professional environment she asked for,” Grassley said. Republicans decided to hire a female attorney because of the risk that the panel’s 11 Republican men — there are no GOP women on the committee — might say something insensitive to Ford. A major slip-up could endanger Kavanaugh’s confirmation and create political pain for the GOP in the midterm elections.

Ford alleges that Kavanaugh tried removing her clothes during a party when they were in high school. He says

she covered her mouth to prevent her screams after he pinned her on a bed. Kavanaugh denies the accusation.

Ahead of the hearing with Ford, Republicans have been rallying to Kavanaugh’s defense, accusing Democrats of waging a “smear campaign” against the appellate judge and stressing that there should be a presumption of innocence. Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell predicted Kavanaugh will be confirmed, saying, “I’m confident we’re going to win.”

In a show of

confidence, Republicans said they were discussing keeping the Senate in session this weekend so that they can begin the process of confirming Kavanaugh right away.

“I think we’ll all be here all weekend,” said Sen. John Cornyn, the second-ranking Republican.

Yet GOP senators acknowledge the hearing Thursday with Kavanaugh and Ford is a do-or-die moment. A split-second facial expression, a tear or a choice of words by either witness could prove decisive. Several

Republican senators have said they won’t decide how to vote on Kavanaugh until after the hearing.

Sen. Susan Collins of Maine, one of the undecided Republicans, said she will be “glued to the television” during the hearing.

But one frequent Trump critic, Sen. Bob Corker, R-Tenn., was clearly leaning toward supporting Kavanaugh.

“I go into the hearings with very positive feelings about him, and I hope Thursday goes well,” Corker told reporters.

Higher interest rates and oil prices send US stocks lower

NEW YORK — Major U.S. indexes finished mostly lower Tuesday as rising interest rates hurt stocks that pay big dividends and higher oil prices pushed transportation and shipping companies lower. The S&P 500 index fell for the third day in a row.

Oil prices continued to rise after a weekend meeting of OPEC and its allies ended without an increase in oil production. That’s helped energy companies, but it is pressuring airlines and other companies that will have to pay more for fuel. Higher oil prices can also ripple through the economy and increase inflation, and that’s helped

push interest rates higher this week.

On Wednesday the Federal Reserve is expected to increase its benchmark interest rate for the third time this year. Investors have been sure for months that the Fed would raise rates at this meeting, so they’ll be focusing on the Fed’s economic projections and Chairman Jay Powell’s press conference afterward.

The S&P 500 fell 3.81 points, or 0.1 percent, to 2,915.56. The Dow Jones Industrial Average lost 69.84 points, or 0.3 percent, to 26,492.21. The Nasdaq composite added 14.22 points, or 0.2 percent, to 8,007.47. The Russell 2000 index of smaller-company stocks gained 3.49 points, or 0.2 percent, to 1,708.80.

WWII code breaker buried in Nebraska with UK military honors

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — A 92-year-old woman has been buried in Nebraska with British military honors for a secret that she held for decades: her World War II service as a code breaker of German intelligence communications.

The Union Jack was draped over Jean Briggs Watters’ casket during her burial Monday, the Omaha World-Herald reported. Watters died Sept. 15.

The tribute honored Watters for her role decoding for a top-secret military program led by British mathematician Alan Turing, who was the subject of the 2014 Oscar-winning film “The Imitation Game.” Watters was among about 10,000 people, mostly women, who participated in the

Allied effort to crack German communication codes throughout the war.

Just Dunkin’: Dunkin’ Donuts to change its name

(AP) — Dunkin’ is dropping the donuts — from its name, anyway.

Doughnuts are still on the menu, but Dunkin’ Donuts is renaming itself Dunkin’ to reflect its increasing emphasis on coffee and other drinks, which make up 60 percent of its sales.

The 68-year-old chain has toyed with the idea for a while. In 2006, it

released a new motto — “America runs on Dunkin’” — that didn’t mention doughnuts. Last fall, it tested the “Dunkin’” logo on a new store in Pasadena, California; it has put the name on a few other stores since then.

“Our new branding is a clear signal that there’s something new at Dunkin’.” It speaks to the breadth of our offerings,” said David Hoffman, the CEO of Dunkin’ Brands, the chain’s parent company, in a conference call with media.

The name change will officially take place in January, when it will start appearing on napkins, boxes and signs at new and remodeled U.S. stores. The change will gradually be adopted as franchisees update their stores. It will be phased in overseas over the next year, the company said. Dunkin’ Donuts has 12,500 restaurants worldwide.

Owner of Texas 3D gun company resigns after arrest

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — An activist who garnered national attention for running a Texas company that sells blueprints for making untraceable 3D-printed guns has resigned from the firm he founded after being arrested on charges of having sex with an underage girl.

Cody Wilson tendered his resignation Friday evening to tend to “personal matters,” Paloma Heindorff, director of development for Austin-based Defense Distributed said at a Tuesday news conference. The company is at the center of a federal case in which several states sued to block it from posting plans to build 3D-printed guns online.

Heindorff said she would be taking over Wilson’s duties as director and was a strong believer in the Second Amendment.

The comedian — who is legally blind and uses a cane — removed his watch, tie and jacket and walked out in a white dress shirt and red suspenders, his hands cuffed in front of him. He must serve the minimum of three years before becoming eligible for parole.

“For decades, the defendant has been able to hide his true self and hide his crimes using his fame and fortune. He’s hidden behind a character created, Dr. Cliff Huxtable,” Montgomery County District Attorney Kevin Steele said at a news conference, referring to Cosby’s best-known role. But “now, finally, Bill Cosby has been unmasked, and we have seen the real man as he is headed off to prison.”

Constand stood at Steele’s side but shook her head to say she had no comment.

Former model Janice Dickinson, who was among the 60 or so women who have come forward to accuse Cosby of drugging and violating them over the past five decades, looked at him in the courtroom and said: “Here’s the last laugh, pal.”

Another accuser in the courtroom, Lili Bernard, said: “There is solace, absolutely. It is his fame and his fortune and his phony philanthropy that has allowed him to get away with impunity. Maybe this will send a message to other powerful perpetrators that they will be caught and punished.”

The punishment, which also included a \$25,000 fine, came at the end of a two-day hearing at which the judge declared Cosby a “sexually violent

predator” — a modern-day scarlet letter that subjects him to monthly counseling for the rest of his life and requires that neighbors and schools be notified of his whereabouts.

The comic once known as America’s Dad for his role on the top-rated “Cosby Show” in the 1980s was convicted in April of violating Constand, Temple University women’s basketball administrator, at his suburban Philadelphia mansion in 2004. It was the first celebrity trial of the #MeToo era.

Cosby faced anywhere from probation to 10 years in prison. His lawyers asked for house arrest, saying Cosby is too old and vulnerable to do time in prison. Prosecutors asked for five to 10 years behind bars, saying he could still pose a threat to women.

cannot hold talks on ending the trade dispute while the U.S. “holds a knife” to Beijing’s neck by imposing tariff hikes.

The two countries are mired in a dispute over Washington’s allegations that Beijing pilfers foreign trade secrets and forces U.S. companies to hand over technology in return for access to the Chinese market.

The predatory practices, the U.S. says, are part of China’s relentless drive to challenge American technological dominance.

Also at stake, beyond economic cooperation, are U.S. hopes for gaining China’s help in persuading North Korea to give up its nuclear weapons. In his address Tuesday to the U.N. General Assembly in New York, Trump thanked Chinese President Xi Jinping for his assistance with the North Korea problem, but he also blasted China for what he called unfair use of international trade rules to diminish U.S. jobs and deepen U.S. trade deficits.

“Those days are over. We will no longer tolerate such abuse,” Trump said.

Military ties between Washington and Beijing

have been relatively stable in recent years, even as the U.S. complained of China militarizing reefs and islands in the South China Sea amid overlapping territorial claims by other Asian nations. In May, Defense Secretary Jim Mattis disinvited China from participating in a multinational naval exercise in the Pacific.

Pentagon officials cited China’s military buildup on disputed South China Sea islands.

In recent days the breadth of military tensions has grown. A Pentagon spokesman, Army Lt. Col. Dave Eastburn, said China informed the Pentagon that the chief of the Chinese navy has been recalled to Beijing, canceling a planned meeting with his American Navy counterpart at the Pentagon after visiting a naval conference at Newport, Rhode Island.

On Monday a reporter asked Mattis what he made of these developments and how he expected to address them.

“Right now, it’s too early to say. We’re still sorting this out,” he said, adding that he and Secretary of State Mike Pompeo agree “we do have to have a relationship with China. ... And so we’re sorting out the way ahead right now.”

hope and “multilateralism is under fire precisely when we need it most.”

Since taking office, Trump has removed the U.S. from the Paris climate accord, promoted protectionist tariffs and questioned the value of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization and other alliances in furtherance of what he termed on

Tuesday a strategy of “principled realism.”

To that end, Trump flaunted his embrace of negotiations with North Korea’s Kim Jong Un just a year after he had warned of raining down “total destruction” on a leader he branded “Little Rocket Man.”

As Trump praised Kim’s “courage” on Tuesday, he unloaded harsh rhetoric on nuclear-aspirant Iran as a persistent malign influence across the

Middle East.

“We ask all nations to isolate Iran’s regime as long as its aggression continues,” said Trump. The president has removed the U.S. from the 2015 nuclear accord with Iran, citing the country’s destabilizing actions throughout the region and support for terrorist groups like Hezbollah, and he accused its leaders on Tuesday of sowing “chaos, death and destruction.”

Surgery patients in the Finnish study all had conventional incisions rather than the less invasive “keyhole” surgeries that are more common for appendix removal in

the United States. The non-surgery patients received three days of IV antibiotics in the hospital, followed by seven days of pills at home.

Dr. Giana Davidson, a University of Washington surgeon, is involved in a similarly designed multicenter

U.S. study that may answer whether similar benefits would be seen for antibiotics versus “keyhole” surgery.

Davidson called the Finnish study “a critical piece to the puzzle but I don’t think it answers all of the questions.”

Heather VanDusen was

treated at the University of Washington in 2016. She said she chose antibiotic treatment partly to avoid surgery scars, and now offers advice to patients for Davidson’s study.

“I knew the worst case scenario was ending up back in the hospital so

why not try antibiotics first,” said VanDusen, who works in university communications.

She said she has done well since her treatment, but that the biggest drawback “is wondering, with every episode of stomach or bad gas, if it could happen again.”

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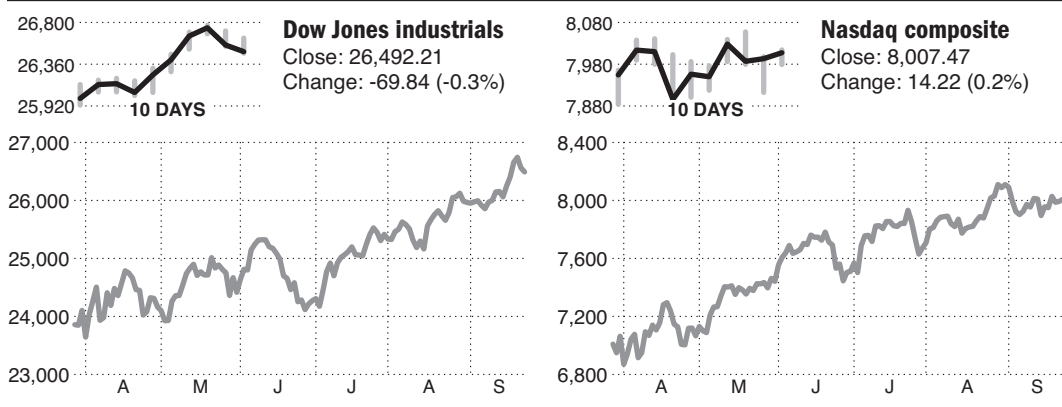
