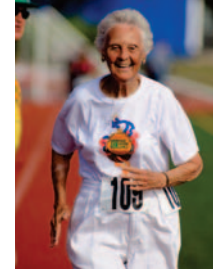

It's the sort of thing that is to be expected

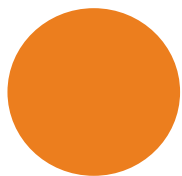

LAKE ALFRED – The Eighth Annual Lake Alfred Bluegrass & BBQ Bash is Saturday, Jan. 12, from 11 a.m. until around 9 p.m.

Each year, thousands of residents attend the free event on the south shore of Lake Alfred in Lions Park.

Attendees can listen to live music and purchase food from vendors competing to be named the event's best. Bounce houses and other kid-friendly activities are expected to be available.

This will be the 19th year overall for the annual event, which started in

Haines City but moved to Lake Alfred eight years ago.

Several bands will be playing under the large tent on site with seating.

The schedule is as follows: Ramblin' Rose Trio at 11 a.m., Hwy 41 South at 11:45 a.m., ReKindled Grass at 12:30 p.m., Southern Express at 1:15 p.m., Clogging Connection at 2 p.m. and Barbwire Bluegrass at 2:45 p.m.

Starting at 3:30 p.m., Hwy 41 South hits the stage for a second time, followed by Ramblin' Roses again at 4:15 p.m. and ReKindled Grass again at 5 p.m. The M&M Cloggers put on a show at 6:30 p.m. and Barbwire Bluegrass starts the final set of the night at 7:15 p.m.

"I'm so proud of them," Jolliff said. "Roll Tide — I never thought I'd say that."

Of course, with the growth and success of Bartow's cheerleading program and its alumni, the number of college allegiances the veteran coach and her staff will have to navigate will continue to be increasingly complex.

Yellow Jacket alumni are cheerleading or have cheered for the programs at UCF, USF, Kansas, Kentucky, Morehead State and many more.

And why wouldn't such elite programs want cheerleaders from Bartow? After all, the program has won five consecutive FHSAA cheerleading state championships — six total, including a state title in 2008 — two national championships and a championship at Worlds in 2018.

The program has come a long way since Jolliff, an Auburndale native, decided to take the job 16 years ago for what she figured would have been a short stint.

"I was just going to fill in for a little bit — and here I am 16 years later," she said.

Several things have changed since then. Once cheerleading became a sanctioned sport by the FHSAA, for instance, there was a sea-change in the way the sport was regarded.

"Once you can say that 'hey, there's a state championship attached to the sport' — I think that's a game-changer," Jolliff said.

Winning has become a tradition for the program at Bartow, which includes successful junior varsity and middle-school teams, also. The program has cultivated a family feel, in part because there are many family threads that run through it.

For instance, senior Kamarie Owens grew up around the program thanks to her older sister, Kayla Long, who was a part of the Yellow Jackets championship team in 2008.

"I was really nervous (to join the team) because they'd built up their name



and it was such a high-stakes program," Owens said. "(My sister) encouraged me and said it was a really great program that would teach me life lessons."

There are siblings currently on the roster, too. Gauge Stricklin is a senior and his brother, Lathan, is a sophomore. For Gauge, joining the team when he got to Bartow High was an opportunity to join a winning culture. With that said, he still recalls his surprise when confronted with how hard the team trains for its routines.

"I didn't realize how strong you actually have to be," Gauge said.

The competitive cheerleading calendar for the FHSAA has hit its stretch run, with the regional meet scheduled for Jan. 11 and the Florida High School Competitive Cheerleading State Championships scheduled for Jan. 31-Feb. 1.

For a program that is no stranger to chasing and making history, the goal is simply to maintain the standard.

"Our motto this year is 'uphold the tradition,'" Jolliff said. "We just want to respect what people have done in the past — and we also want to be better."

## Forecast: Snow coming to Winter Haven, after all

WINTER HAVEN — Snow Central started in the mid-1990s, with tons of man-made snow blown on the street around Central Park, close to where the Bank of America building is.

"Ever since then, the event has been offered to the community annually," Winter Haven Assistant to the City Manager Donna Sheehan said.

That will hold true this winter, albeit a bit delayed.

The event, which is usually held in December and was originally scheduled for Dec. 14, was postponed not once, but twice, by threatening storms last month.

But city staff refuses to let a little bad weather rain on the tradition, and this year Snow Central has been renamed

"Winter Wonderland" and scheduled for 6 p.m. Friday, Jan. 11, at the Chain of Lakes Complex.

Over 70 tons of snow will be placed in a covered batting-practice area at the site, allowing area residents to get a small taste of what it feels like to live in places that aren't called the Sunshine State.

In addition to playing in the snow, there will be photo opportunities with special guests, cookie decorating, bounce-houses and a variety of food trucks present.

Adults cost \$2 each and kids are \$1 each for the event, which will run until 9 p.m. Parking is free.

In years past, the food trucks were placed just south of the parking area, along with a large snow slide where residents can slide down the snow on tubes. Around the stadium area, city staff normally set up thousands of

lights that lead to the batting cage and a giant pile of snow.

Attendees normally have a certain amount of time to play in the snow before a sound goes off, allowing for the next group to get in on the fun.

# Former state rep Baxter Trout arrested again

WINTER HAVEN – Recent candidate for Florida Commissioner of Agriculture Baxter Troutman was arrested a second time for allegedly abusing his wife, Rebecca “Becky” Troutman, on Jan. 4.

According to the Polk County Sheriff’s Office, Becky Troutman — a one-time candidate for Polk County commission — told deputies that her estranged husband walked into her bedroom saying, “Get up, it’s a new day, it’s time to get a job the (expletive) gravy train is over.”

Then he allegedly grabbed the comforter she was under and yanked it so hard that it pulled her off the bed and onto the floor. According to the report, the two have been sleeping in separate bedrooms for years.

Baxter later returned and allegedly grabbed his wife by the chin and jaw, pulling her head upwards and back, saying, “(expletive) get up.”

Becky further alleged that her husband gave her a bloody nose in September, following a dispute over a cell phone, and broke her pinky finger after a dispute in 2015. Baxter was previously arrested for abusing his

wife in 2012, but those charges were dropped.

The latest arrest seems to be centered around Mrs. Troutman’s desire to purchase a Lakeland home in her name.

Baxter Troutman represented Polk County in the Florida House for three successive terms beginning in 2002. He proposed to his wife on the House floor in 2008. Baxter is a grandson to Florida citrus and cattle magnate Ben Hill Griffin Jr., once one of the most wealthy residents of the county and state.

# Panhandling ordinance recommended for repeal

POLK COUNTY – The Polk County Commission was scheduled to vote on repealing the county panhandling ordinance Jan. 8. The vote took place after press time, but was likely repealed, based on County Attorney Michael Craig’s recommendation.

Polk County Ordinance 13-029 in part read, “Anyone engaging in aggressive solicitation in a public area poses a significant threat to the public health, safety and welfare”

On Aug. 30, eight lawyers representing seven civil liberty organizations wrote a jointly signed letter to the county commission warning that, “The court does not believe that a repeated request for money or other thing of value necessarily threatens public safety.”

Craig cited this letter in his recommendation to repeal 13-029. According to the eight lawyers who sent it, ordinances such as 13-029 have been ruled unconstitutional in multiple court cases over the years. A homeless person asking for money on a downtown sidewalk is considered free speech, the lawyers warned.

“These types of blanket bans on certain categories of speech on all public streets and in all public areas of the

county have long been held to be unconstitutional,” the eight lawyers wrote.

It is unknown exactly how this will change how Polk County Sheriff’s Office deputies will handle panhandling from here forward.

“Unfortunately, I can’t answer that because the whole thing is too complex,” PCSO Spokesperson Scott Wilder said. “There is more than just the statute – there are court rulings that interpret the statute as well. That would take more than my ability to translate, even if I definitively knew the current state of the law and current jurisprudence, which I don’t. I suggest asking the county attorney for his take.”

Craig did not respond to a request for more information.

It is possible that PCSO deputies will treat panhandling the same way that Winter Haven police officers do. In Winter Haven, officers do not prevent panhandling on the sidewalk, but they do stop the homeless from panhandling from a street median or panhandling to drivers in any capacity.

“It is a public safety issue when anyone steps into a roadway to solicit or accept items from a vehicle,” Winter Haven Police Spokesperson Jaime Brown said.

The eight concerned lawyers represent the American Civil Liberties Union of Florida, Florida Public Defender Association, Southern Legal Council, Florida Legal Services, National Law Center on Homelessness and Poverty, National Lawyers Guild South Florida Chapter and Legal Aid Service of Broward County. In their joint letter they wrote that it cost taxpayers \$30,000 per year to jail and hospitalize the homeless, and that spending this

money on permanent housing would be a more effective use of the money.

“We can all agree that we would like to see a Polk County where homeless people are not forced to beg on the streets,” the lawyers wrote. “But whether examined from a legal, policy or fiscal standpoint, criminalizing any aspect of panhandling is not the best way to get to this goal.”

## Court docs describe Christmas fight

WINTER HAVEN – A street fight involving 20-30 people resulted in seven arrests Christmas night, with five of those individuals arrested being charged with battery on responding officers.

“Our officers showed extreme restraint in dealing with this crowd that continued to escalate in aggression,” Winter Haven Public Safety Director Charlie Bird said. “I am thankful that everyone went home safe and those who chose to act out on Christmas Day went to jail.”

Jamie Brown, the public information officer for the Winter Haven Police Department, said that four responding officers were either pushed, kicked or spat on during the altercation. The occurrence, described as “multiple fights,” took place in the Florence Villa neighborhood near the intersection of First Street and Avenue R NW, at approximately 9:30 p.m. Dec. 25.

Officers are not sure how the fight started, but based on social media posts it appears to have been a fight over a woman.

Police identified one of the primary aggressors as Derrick Munson, a 26-year-old who self-identified as homeless. Munson was arrested after

officers saw him fighting another man in the street wearing only his underwear. Officers said Munson refused to stop fighting as officers tried to break up the dispute. Munson then allegedly spit in the face of an officer twice while being placed in a patrol car. This is the third time Munson has been arrested for battery on a law enforcement officer in 2018.

The mother of least one of Munson’s children, 29-year-old Shantee Walden of Winter Haven, shoved two officers and allegedly tried to pull one of the men out of a patrol car. Walden’s 16-year-old son also shoved an officer multiple times and was arrested during the scuffle.

Latoya Munson, 37, of Winter Haven was arrested for trying to prevent her uncle, Eddie Munson of Lakeland, from being arrested for interfering with police. Eddie Munson was doused with pepper spray during the incident.

“That is my uncle and he only has one leg,” Latoya Munson said, according to what a responding officer wrote in his arrest affidavit.

Eighteen-year-old Marquarius Jasper of Auburndale allegedly struck several responding officers and eventually was tased.

After shoving officers twice, a 33-year-old self identified homeless man named Terrance Miller was also arrested.

## Downtown WH evacuated

WINTER HAVEN – A good portion of the downtown area was evacuated Saturday, Dec. 29, after two chemicals somehow got mixed, causing noxious fumes that sent two individuals to the hospital.

First responders were called to the area surrounding Tropical Smoothie, at the corner of Central Ave. and Third St. NW, in reference to the incident around 11 a.m. Upon arrival, firefighters from the Winter Haven Fire Department confirmed that something inside a shared retail bathroom and hallway had triggered the fumes, which caused an irritation to the throat.

Retail businesses sharing the hallway were evacuated and Winter Haven Police officers closed Central Avenue to foot and vehicular traffic between Second and Fourth streets.

The Polk Fire Rescue HAZMAT team was called to the scene. County firefighters entered the hallway equipped with special gear and detected ammonia (three parts per million) and hydrogen cyanide (.5 ppm).

Officials are unsure of how or why the incident occurred.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, “exposure to hydrogen cyanide can be rapidly fatal.” It has been used by military forces as a chemical warfare agent. Commercially it is used by fumigators. CDC staff say it is highly explosive when exposed to flame or alkaline.

One person was transported to the hospital by ambulance. A pregnant woman also took herself to the hospital to be assessed as a precaution.

Firefighters used fans to clear the fumes out of the hallway before clearing the scene roughly two hours after they had first arrived.

# Planning Commission approves four cases

WINTER HAVEN – The Winter Haven Planning Commission, a group of appointed area residents who make recommendations to elected city commissioners, voted to approve four requests Jan. 3.

City of Winter Haven staff have been attempting to build more underground reclaimed water pipes of late, so that an increased number of area residents and businesses can use treated wastewater instead of potable water for irrigation. Staff say too much potable water is being used for irrigation.

The planning commission voted to approve a new way to help expand these reclaimed water lines. There is a city ordinance requiring developers

to build reclaimed water lines whenever constructing something new. A developer building new housing on 53 acres near Wahneta sought an exemption from this ordinance. In October, city staff decided that in lieu of building lines, the developer could pay a fee. According to staff, the city was not prepared to build a reclaimed water line in this area in the next few years and the fee payment would help staff to build more lines in other areas of the city.

On Jan. 3 the planning commission approved this plan and, once the city commission sets public hearings, the exemption may be approved. Staff say the fee will cost the developer roughly the same amount of money as installing lines.

Winter Haven Planning Manager Eric Labbe said the city has around 21 miles of reclaimed water lines already built.

The planning commission will also be recommending the city commission allow food trucks be available for employees at the large State Farm building, near the west side Walmart on Cypress Gardens Boulevard. Currently, zoning does not allow food trucks to be permitted on the property.

Outback Oasis owner Paul Schulz requested around 70 acres of property north of Dundee Road and west of Country Club Road to be zoned to allow construction of a large retirement community. Schulz wants to expand Sage Road at the corner where the Chevron gas station sits on Dundee

Road to Country Club Road, so traffic can get in and out of the proposed retirement community. Once the city commission approves this plan, Schulz can start submitting more detailed plans to city staff for review.

A developer wanting to build a new 71-unit residential subdivision near the airport was also approved by the planning commission Jan. 3. The developer had previously submitted a plan for approval, but some of the houses were deemed too close to the airport. There also are not enough high school slots open for this area. The developer will have to submit plans to address this before the subdivision can be built.

## Chain of Lakes Elementary recognized

Chain of Lakes Elementary received a special recognition this past October during the Exceeding Expectations Conference in Orlando.

The conference is organized by the East Coast Technical Assistance Center (ECTAC), a network of 44 Florida school districts that provides assistance with Title I and other federal programs.

Chain of Lakes staff took part in a breakout session about their suc-

cessful practices, and were among the schools honored for "exceeding expectations by showing significant progress in improving student achievement."

Chain of Lakes also celebrated its first Hispanic Heritage Month Reading Night Oct. 11. Families and staff participated in activities including crafts, reading, dancing and games — and a great time was had by all.

# Late military pilot spent life serving others

WINTER HAVEN – Emory Allen Eason III, a highly decorated Vietnam helicopter pilot, Winter Haven resident and longtime service officer at American Legion Post 8 died Christmas morning.

“Al was a unique but quiet hero,” Polk County Veterans Council Chairman Gary Clark said. “He will be missed. CAVU, my friend.”

CAVU is an aviation acronym meaning “ceiling and visibility unlimited.”

Clark said Eason was awarded 26 medals as a warrant officer and pilot, including the Silver Star Medal, Distinguished Flying Cross Medal (three times), Bronze Star Medal, Air Medal (16 times), Commendation Medal, National Defense Service Medal, Good Conduct Medal and RVN Campaign Medal while serving with the 1st Cavalry Division.

Upon returning to the United States, Eason was a pilot instructor and later worked at the Pentagon, the United States Army Reserve Command, the Veterans Administration and the Federal Aviation Administration.

American Legion Post 8 Commander Mike O’Callaghan said Eason was a member of the Winter Haven post for 26 years, with between 12 and 14 years spent as a service officer, helping veterans apply for services.

“(Eason) helped a lot of veterans file claims and he loved going to Lakeland Tigers baseball games,” O’Callaghan said.

According to Eason’s obituary, no funeral service is planned, but his ashes will be flown to Washington, D.C., for a memorial service and interment of his ashes in Arlington National Cemetery.

## Commissioners discuss details of education forum

LAKE WALES – City commissioners are hoping public participation will be part of the agenda when officials from the Lake Wales Charter Schools system and Polk County School Board convene to discuss a proposal that would allow McLaughlin Middle School to be operated by the charter system.

The city will host a forum on Thursday, Jan. 10, starting at 7 p.m., moderated by Mayor Eugene Fultz, at the Vanguard School auditorium on U.S. 27.

Representatives from both organizations are planning to attend, city officials indicated. The two sides negotiated a format that would allow questions to be submitted ahead of time online or submitted that night, but only in written form.

Those questions would then be reviewed by a representative from both organizations to reduce any duplicity issues before coming to the floor.

However, Commissioner Curtis Gibson said he was concerned that there wasn't an opportunity for people to voice their opinions on the possible change. City

Manager Ken Fields said he would contact representatives for each to see if the agenda could be updated to include an opportunity for more public input.

"It was not designed as a public hearing in the sense that anybody can come up and talk about any subject they want to," Fields said. "This was designed as an informational forum."

Additionally, Gibson isn't so sure the forum is being moderated by the right person.

Gibson expressed concern last week that Mayor Eugene Fultz has already voted to support a resolution for the plan. Fultz was the only one voted that way when the matter came before the group last fall, with the other four commissioners against, opting instead for a public meeting.

In response, Fultz said his personal vote won't impact how he moderates the evening.

"Because I did not vote the way you wanted me to last time, does not mean I cannot do my job," Fultz said. "I am not a biased individual when it comes to doing the job of the mayor. The mayor has an obligation to speak my own mind, my own voice, yet be fair when it comes to anything that pertains to our citizens or even any other

comments that are made by our commissioners."

### LW to conduct 'shade' meeting

The Lake Wales City Commission will convene a special "shade meeting" later this month to discuss an ongoing legal case involving a public records request regarding the municipal airport.

Such meetings are allowed under the state's open meetings laws, known as the Sunshine Laws, to discuss specific legal matters.

Although held behind closed doors, a record of what goes on will eventually be released, according to city officials.

"The minutes of that meeting will eventually be made public," noted Commissioner Robin Gibson, himself an attorney. "It's not secret."

It could be a while, however, before a transcript of the shade session would be made available.

"The meeting itself is private, but once the case is settled, the transcript becomes public record," City Manager Ken Fields confirmed.

Commissioners were surprised to learn a couple of months ago that the city was involved in a public records dispute that ended up in court. As a result, a regular city attorney's report is expected to be included as part of future agendas.

"We should have been fully informed. Now we're in the position of picking up the pieces," Gibson added. "It really troubles me. I still can't get it out of my head that it happened."

City officials have said the matter is still being "negotiated," although a judge has ruled against the city. Fields said the issue was not the records themselves, but the cost involved in getting the information put together.

The shade session will be held when the group has its next regularly scheduled meeting on Jan. 15.

## Charity golf tourney hits record number of players

BARTOW – Who won the annual Herbert Dixon Celebrity Golf Tournament may not be as exciting as what was celebrated after the event's conclusion Jan. 5 at Bartow Golf Club.

The annual golf tournament, sponsored by the Deacons and Stewards Alliance to raise scholarship money for underprivileged children, had — by far — its largest turnout to date, with 128 participants

The event featured several well known athletes, including the man for whom the tournament is named, who played all 18 holes even at age 99.

"We should all just enjoy ourselves and know this is for a good cause," Dixon said after completing his round. "Today is part of the The Deacons and Stewards' celebration for our young men and women who don't have the sufficient sum of money to go to college."

Dixon said to the crowd gathered for the event that he is honored to have the event named for him. Given his professional career — 63 tournament victories spanning the 1950s and the 1960s — the honor is well-deserved. Dixon was elected to the National Black Golf Hall of Fame in 1998 and the African American Golfers Hall of Fame in 2012.

At nearly a century in age, Dixon still mows his own lawn, as was noted by Bartow Mayor Leo Longworth at the event.

"He still cuts his own lawn," Longworth said. "And it's not a straight yard, there's a huge hill."

### Phone and Internet Discounts Available to CenturyLink Customers

The Florida Public Service Commission designated CenturyLink as an Eligible Telecommunications Carrier within its service area for universal service purposes. CenturyLink's basic local service rates for residential voice lines are \$23.50 per month and business services are \$35.00 per month. Specific rates will be provided upon request.

A household is defined for the purposes of the Lifeline program as any individual or group of individuals who live together at the same address and share income and expenses. Lifeline service is not transferable, and only eligible consumers may enroll in the program. Consumers who willfully make false statements in order to obtain Lifeline telephone or broadband service can be punished by fine or imprisonment and can be barred from the program.

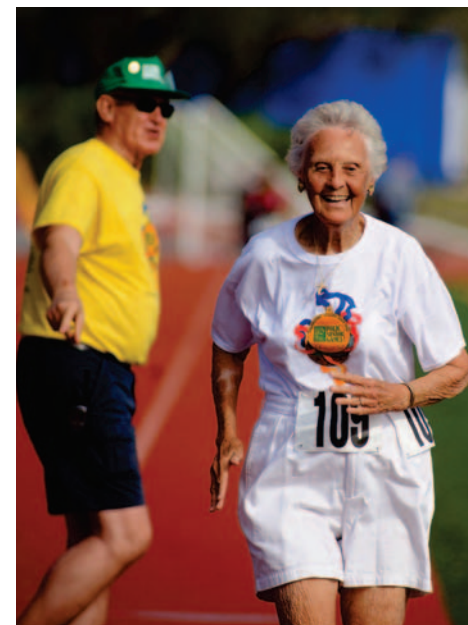

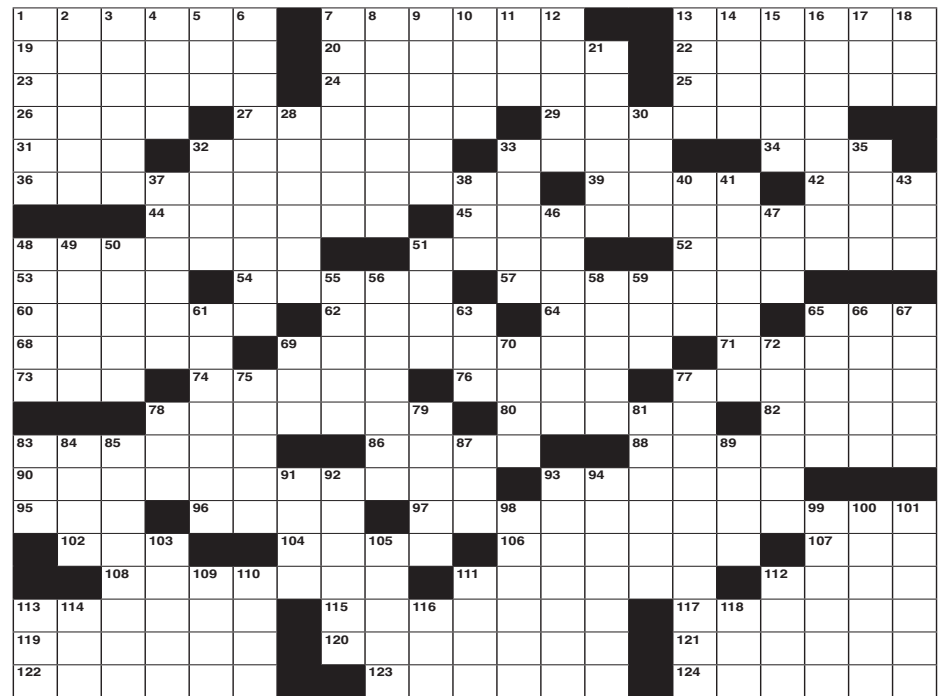

# Beneath the Chinaberry Tree

## 1920s Inwood: Location, Location, Location

Inwood is a large unincorporated area in northwest Winter Haven. It is bounded by the shore of Lake Cannon to the east, Havendale Boulevard to the north, 42nd Street to the west and Avenue G or Lake Deer to the South. It has evolved into a diverse mixture of mostly blue-collar families. It is also home to Garner Elementary, Westwood Middle and the Inwood Elementary School.

This writer's family settled there in 1959, and my parents lived out their lives on 26th Street near Lake Cannon. While Inwood is nearly completely developed, it was actually raw land — and hot property — during the Florida Boom.

Inwood was one of four primary areas promoted by the Haven Villa Corporation, with the others being Aldora Park, Elbert Hills and Eloise Woods. It was part of the "boom real estate market" throughout Florida during which property was changing hands sometimes several times per month — or even per week. Land values skyrocketed, speculation was rampant and Inwood was a part of the frenzy.

Real Estate activity was so intense that newsletters were often printed promoting the various developments available. The "Inwood Bulletin" contained both hype and exaggeration.

The publication noted that the engineering department of the Haven Villa Corporation "keeps more than a hundred trucks and almost six hun-

dred men at work six days in the week, in order that the development of Inwood may forge ahead on schedule."

One story tells of a gentleman from St. Petersburg that purchased a lot in Inwood Unit 5. At the time of purchase there were few improvements in that particular section. Some five weeks later he revisited the site. "Lo and behold — Where before there was but one roadway marked off on one side of (his) lot (he found) a paved asphalt boulevard with heavy traffic running on it." Adjacent and within several blocks of his lot it was reported that he found several residences under construction.

"It doesn't seem possible that so much could be accomplished in 30 days," was the comment of this gentlemen, as he stood on the corner lot, surveying the property. "You have not only the prettiest and fastest growing town in Florida, but you have the prettiest and fastest growing development in Florida."

Another section of the bulletin quoted noted film author Lionel Parrish, who had just completed a new story for silent film star Lillian Gish. He was reported to have visited Inwood and described it as "A Place of Dreams Come True."

Parrish was quoted as having wrote "I came to Winter Haven with a bit of the skeptic, but in twenty-four hours it got under the skin of the questioner and my eyes opened wide, and the language of the heart spoke, and in language clearly declared: 'Please make a home for me here.'"

He continued, "Florida, and Winter Haven in particular, will know me again, and the next time I come will be with the mantle of permanency."

In conclusion Parrish wrote, "Life holds two heritages. That is work and love. One is as necessary to the other as sun and air, and Winter Haven has its beautiful women. Its land values must, and do, increase in bounds, but that side of the question is one that does not sway me altogether, it's the romance, the stillness of the night with its voices that go with the night hours, it's the enchantment that bids me come again, and in its own language I respond."

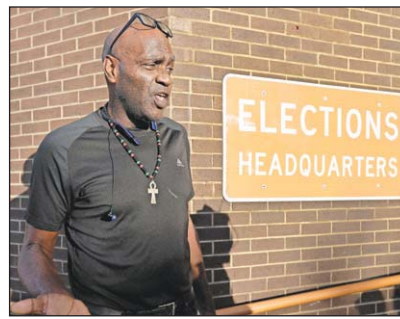

## Trump says illegal immigration is 'crisis'

President argues funding for border wall

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump made a somber televised plea for border wall funding Tuesday night, seeking an edge in his shutdown battle with congressional Democrats as he declared there is “a humanitarian crisis, a crisis of the heart and a crisis of the soul.”

Addressing the nation from the Oval Office for the first time, Trump argued for funding on security and humanitarian grounds as he sought to put pressure on newly empowered Democrats amid an extended partial government shutdown.

Trump called on Democrats to return to the White House to meet with him, saying it was “immoral” for “politicians to do nothing.” Previous meetings have led to no

agreement. Responding in their own televised remarks, Democratic House Speaker Nancy Pelosi and Senate Minority Leader Chuck

Schumer accused Trump of misrepresenting the situation on the border as they urged him to reopen closed government departments and turn

## Can Rick Scott adjust to the U.S. Senate after leading Florida the past eight years?

WASHINGTON — After the last eight years as Florida's governor, Rick Scott woke up Tuesday unemployed.

But by 4:05 p.m. he had a new job: U.S. Senator.

Inside a mostly empty U.S. Senate chamber, Scott clutched a childhood Bible and took his oath of office. Vice President Mike Pence conducted the ceremony.

“It's exciting to be up here,” Scott told reporters just before he took the oath. “This place doesn't seem to be working very well.”

The unique affair was quintessential Scott. He joined a body defined by its traditions and collaborative spirit on a day of his choosing and by himself. The rest of his colleagues were seated last Thursday, as set by the U.S. Constitution.

For a man who has flouted political norms and at times his own party, won three elections with his own money and governed like a solitary CEO, it was a telling if not

symbolic message: Scott will yield to no one, not even one of the world's greatest deliberative bodies.

“I've watched Gov. Scott operate and you can see the way his mind works in the form of a business plan,” said state Sen. Tom Lee, R-Thonotosassa. “And he will develop a strategic plan to elevate and move through the ranks of the United States Senate and he will be very aggressive about it.”

For the first time in much of his adult life, Scott is not the executive of a company or of a state. He is now one of 100. And because he chose to delay his swearing in until Florida's next governor took office, at age 66 he enters the Senate as its most junior member.

Scott wouldn't be alone if he struggles with that adjustment. Many former governors have complained about the slow pace of Congress compared to daily demands of the executive office. They are vexed by the lack of control and the inability

## President of Turkey says Bolton making 'a very serious mistake'

Turkish officials slam Trump's request to ensure the safety of Kurdish allies when U.S. withdraws military from Syria

ANKARA, Turkey — Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan accused the U.S. national security adviser of making “a very serious mistake” Tuesday by demanding that Ankara guarantee the safety of Kurdish fighters in northeastern Syria before the U.S. withdraws its troops from the war-torn country.

A strained morning of negotiation in Turkey ended without assurances

of protection for forces that fought alongside U.S. troops against the Islamic State group, and indeed brought them fresh new threats from Turkey. The diplomatic setback raised fresh questions about how the U.S. would protect its allies in the fight against IS and about the pace of the drawdown of U.S. forces in Syria.

“John Bolton has made a very serious mistake. We cannot make any concessions in this regard,” Erdogan said Tuesday,

just before Bolton left the country with tensions between the NATO allies at new highs. He added that Ankara's preparations for a new military offensive against what the Turkish leader describes as terror groups in Syria are “to a large extent” complete.

Bolton had insisted that Turkey refrain from conducting any operation unless it was approved by and coordinated with the U.S. Turkey's presidential spokesman fired back publicly that Turkey would

not seek permission from its allies to conduct a military offensive against Syrian Kurdish fighters, but was willing to coordinate operations.

A senior administration official said Erdogan's comments did not reflect President Donald Trump's understanding of his Dec. 23 conversation with the Turkish leader, days after the U.S. president announced his intent to withdraw American

# Registering to vote brings out emotions among Florida felons

ORLANDO — The normally humdrum bureaucracy of registering to vote brought tears to the eyes of some Floridians on Tuesday when most felons regained their right to vote under a state constitutional amendment.

"I'll be a human being again. I'll be an American citizen again," Robert Eckford said, choking up and weeping after filling out an application at the elections supervisor's office in Orlando.

The ballot measure went into effect Tuesday, overturning a ban that netted Florida the highest number of disenfranchised felons in the nation. It potentially increases the pool of eligible voters by as

many as 1.4 million people in a battleground state infamous for its narrow margins in key elections.

"I'm an ex-Marine," said Eckford, who served seven years for a drug conviction. "I served this country. I've done my time. I've made some mistakes. But thank God the system works."

Nearly 65 percent of Florida voters last November approved Amendment 4, which was crafted so that it would take effect on Tuesday. It applies to all felons who have done their time and completed the terms of their probation and parole, with the exception of people convicted of murder or sex offenses.

It is still not clear how those registrations will be treated in the state capitol. Gov. Ron DeSantis said on Monday that he believes

the Legislature still needs to pass an implementing bill spelling out the restoration process.

"There's going to need to be guidance for that. It's not delaying it. The people

spoke on it. It's going to be implemented, but I think it needs to be implemented the way people intended, and I don't think that they wanted to see any sex offenders fall through the

cracks," he told reporters.

Civil rights groups have maintained the measure is self-executing, but just to be sure, they warned that they are ready to go to court if there are any delays. Elections supervisors across the state posted notices at their offices and websites saying they would accept the registration forms starting Tuesday. They noted the new voters don't need to present proof that they completed their sentence; they can simply fill out the existing application, signing under oath that their voting rights have been restored.

Members of the Florida Rights Restoration Coalition said they expected the registration to go smoothly. Despite any confusion, the organization's president, Desmond Meade, encouraged

members to celebrate.

Meade has been fighting to regain his right to vote since 2006 when he had served his sentence for a drug offense. Meade readied his family to head out south of downtown Orlando before the sun rose Tuesday. Wearing shirts with the slogan "Let my people vote," Meade likened his journey to the 1960s movement to end widespread practices that kept black voters away from the polls.

"Moms and dads took their kids to vote with them during the civil rights era," he said. "I can vote for the first time with my family and that means a lot to me. That means not only do I get to vote, but this is an opportunity now to stimulate a conversation about how important voting is."

### Prosecutors want trial date in Florida school shooting

FORT LAUDERDALE (AP) — Prosecutors pushed a judge Tuesday to set a trial date this fall for Nikolas Cruz in the 2018 Valentine's Day Florida school massacre that killed 17 people.

At a hearing, Assistant State Attorney Jeff Marcus said the case is fairly uncomplicated despite its notoriety and magnitude. He asked Circuit Judge Elizabeth Scherer to schedule the death penalty trial for Cruz in September.

"We are coming up on the anniversary of this incident. Justice requires that this case be resolved as quickly as it can," Marcus said. "It's a pretty straightforward case that does not require years and years to prepare for."

Judge Scherer, however, said she is reluctant to move that quickly, with Cruz's lawyers contending

they still have large amounts of evidence to review and dozens of witnesses to interview. Assistant Public Defender Melisa McNeill said there are more than 300 frontline witnesses on the prosecution's list and added that capital cases in Broward County typically take two years or more to get to trial.

"We have to do everything we have to do and depose every witness so that we are effective in our representation of Mr. Cruz. There's higher standards of due process," McNeill said. Scherer instead set another status hearing for Feb. 21 and urged both sides to work as quickly as possible.

### Police investigate shooting of 3-year-old in Tampa

TAMPA (AP) — Police in Tampa said a 3-year-old boy is recovering from surgery after being shot in

the stomach at an apartment complex.

Tampa police spokesman Steve Hegarty said in an email that the shooting happened around 10 p.m. Monday in an apartment near Busch Gardens.

The child was taken to Tampa General Hospital, where he remains in the intensive care unit.

Hegarty said a young man may have been in the room with the child when the shooting happened. He said the man retrieved the gun and fled before police arrived. Police are looking for the man.

Officials said the child is expected to survive.

### SeaWorld's Aquatica gets autism-friendly designation

ORLANDO (AP) — SeaWorld officials said its Aquatica Orlando park is becoming the world's first

water park to be credentialed for visitors with autism.

Aquatica Orlando on Tuesday received a designation as a "Certified Autism Center" from the International Board of Credentialing and Continuing Education Standards.

As part of the credentialing process, the staff at Aquatica is continually trained to assist guests with autism and their families. Autistic guests and their families also are given specific information about which attractions might be best for them.

The park also is planning to have a quiet room with adjustable lighting and a comfortable seating area for guests to take a break.

### Panther mortality rate remains level in 2018

COLLIER COUNTY (AP) — Wildlife officials

reported 30 Florida panther deaths in 2018, matching the previous year's total.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission said 26 of last year's deaths were from vehicle strikes, while only 24 of the big cats were hit by vehicles in 2017. Two of the panthers found dead last year were killed by other panthers, and officials didn't know what killed the other two.

Florida panthers once roamed the entire Southeast, but now their habitat mostly is confined to a small region of Florida along the Gulf of Mexico. Up to 230 Florida panthers remain in the wild.

The 2018 and 2017 mortality rates are down from 42 deaths in both 2016 and 2015.

Three panther litters with a total of nine kittens were documented last year.

### Elderly man killed pulling U-turn into marked patrol vehicle

NAPLES (AP) — Authorities said a 94-year-old man was killed after making a U-turn into the path of a Florida sheriff's deputy whose emergency lights and siren activated.

The Naples Daily News reports that the Florida Highway Patrol said Arthur Roshask drove in front of the marked Collier County Sheriff's Office vehicle on a busy Naples street Saturday night. The deputy swerved to avoid Roshask's car but still hit it. Roshask then struck a sign and a street light, and was pronounced dead at a nearby hospital. An 80-year-old passenger was seriously injured.

The deputy suffered minor injuries. No citations against him were reported.

# Tapped-out pipelines cause gas shortage in Mexico

MEXICO CITY — Motorists lined up for a fourth straight day at gas stations in western Mexico Tuesday as the government continued to restrict pipeline deliveries to combat illegal fuel taps.

The administration of President Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador has switched to shipping fuel by tanker truck in a few western and central states, but there aren't enough trucks, and the pipelines are riddled with illegal taps drilled by fuel thieves.

Lopez Obrador said Tuesday that fuel theft gangs have grown so bold — and have so many connections inside refineries — that they've been stealing gasoline and diesel directly from plants.

Lopez Obrador said soldiers dispatched to guard depots and refineries found a 2-mile long hose leading from one refinery to a tank outside.

Authorities said Monday that attempts to re-open a key pipeline were abandoned after the duct was found to leaking fuel at numerous points.

Gov. Enrique Alfaro

of the western state of Jalisco said officials of the government-owned oil company, Petroleos Mexicanos, had briefly tried to resume shipments through a pipeline to a refinery in the neighboring state of Guanajuato, "but the pipeline was so damaged that re-opening it was impossible."

Patience was running thin in some cities where insufficient amounts of gasoline arrived by tanker truck and many stations have closed.

People lined up with jugs in hand to buy small amounts of gasoline and some stations limited

purchases to 2.5 to 5 gallons or less.

The long lines have reportedly begun to encourage small-scale reselling of gasoline by private individuals, something that could foment exactly the kind of fuel-theft rings Lopez Obrador is trying to combat.

The head of the Mexican Employers' Federation told the newspaper La Jornada that the fuel shortages "could foment illegal activities" because people may be willing to pay resellers more.

The opposition National Action Party

said 84 percent of gas stations were closed in Guanajuato, a state it governs, and claimed the figure reached 90 percent in the state of Michoacan.

"To fight fuel theft, they had the bright idea of shutting down pipelines," the party said in a statement. "By that logic, to combat thefts from ATM machines, you should close all the automatic tellers. It is absurd."

Lopez Obrador said fuel theft costs the government \$3 billion per year and the gangs are so sophisticated that they have established an alternative, clandestine and illegal

distribution network with their own depots.

Lopez Obrador said some gangs had actually built warehouses over pipeline rights of way to drill illegal taps into the ducts. At big construction projects, the gangs would set up sales points to supply stolen diesel to heavy equipment operators.

Lopez Obrador said his strategy of deploying military personnel to guard distribution depots and refineries and to shut down tapped pipelines has already led to a decline in thefts during his first month in office.

# UK Parliament moves to make 'no-deal' Brexit more difficult

LONDON — Britain's Parliament narrowly approved financial roadblocks that are designed to make it more difficult for the country to leave the European Union without a Brexit deal, giving a defeat to Prime Minister Theresa May's government Tuesday.

Lawmakers voted 303-296 to back a Finance Bill amendment that would prohibit government spending on "no-deal" Brexit preparations that Parliament didn't authorize.

The vote in the House of Commons illustrated the substantial opposition to the real possibility of Britain withdrawing from the EU on March 29 without a divorce agreement in place on the terms of its relationship with the remaining members.

Business leaders and some economists have predicted disruption in the lives of U.K. residents and financial damage if that happens. Without a trade deal in place, Britain could see tariffs slapped on its exports to the EU and possible food and medicine shortages.

But Britain has been headed in that direction

because May has been unable to persuade a majority in Parliament to back the divorce deal her government negotiated with the EU.

Concerns about the risks of a "no-deal" scenario has prompted talk of postponing Brexit day and even calling another referendum on Britain's EU membership.

### London's Heathrow briefly halts flights due to drone report

LONDON (AP) — London's Heathrow Airport briefly halted departing flights on Tuesday after a reported drone sighting — a development that came just three weeks after multiple reports of drone sightings caused travel chaos at nearby Gatwick Airport.

The suspension of takeoffs from Heathrow, one of the world's busiest airports, was announced shortly before 6 p.m. on Tuesday, a move the airport said was made as a safety precaution.

London's Metropolitan Police said it received a report about a drone "in the vicinity of Heathrow airport" at about 5:05 p.m. Police and airport officials were investigating the reported sighting, which was not confirmed.

Flights resumed roughly 90 minutes later.

### Fund for French boxer who punched officers raises money, ire

PARIS (AP) — French government ministers have criticized a public fund-raising drive for a former boxing champion who was seen on video appearing to punch police officers during the most recent yellow vest protests in Paris.

Online platform Leetchi said Tuesday that donors pledged over 100,000 euros to support Christophe Dettinger and the money would be used to pay legal fees.

Leetchi closed the fund after prominent ministers in French President Emmanuel Macron's government expressed outrage.

Equality Minister Marlene Schiappa told France Info radio the fundraiser was "illegal" because "it backs a criminal act, that is to say, gratuitous violence."

The 37-year-old Dettinger was taken into custody on Monday.

### Turkey: 28 on trial over Russian ambassador's slaying

ANKARA, Turkey (AP) — The trial of 28 people accused of roles in the assassination of Russia's ambassador to Turkey opened Tuesday in Ankara, among them a U.S.-based Muslim cleric whom Turkey blames for a failed coup the same year.

An off-duty police officer, Mevlut Mert Altintas, fatally shot Russian Ambassador Andrei Karlov at a photo exhibition in the Turkish capital on Dec. 19, 2016. Other officers later shot and killed the gunman at the scene.

Turkish prosecutors concluded that a network led by Muslim cleric Fethullah Gulen was behind Karlov's slaying and the attack was meant to derail warming ties between Turkey and Russia.

# Asylum seekers find it's catch and can't release fast enough

SAN DIEGO — President Donald Trump says he has ended “catch-and-release” for asylum seekers, but in cities on the U.S. border with Mexico it is catch and can't release fast enough.

Since late October, the U.S. has been releasing asylum-seeking families so quickly they don't even have time to make travel arrangements, which it blames on lack of detention space. Families are often given court dates without even having to pass initial screenings by asylum officers. They end up in shelters run by charities, or are dropped off at bus stations in border cities.

For one Salvadoran family that dizzying series of events began when their 7-year-old daughter,

Yariza Flores, landed on barbed wire after being hoisted over a border fence during their illegal crossing last month. She was rushed to a San Diego hospital to stop profuse bleeding.

Just four days later, U.S. authorities dropped her off at a San Diego shelter with her parents and 3-year-old brother. They had no money, the clothes on their backs and an order given to them during their stint in U.S. custody to appear in immigration court in Houston, where they planned to live with Yariza's grandmother and two aunts. They didn't even have time to arrange for relatives to buy bus tickets before they were released.

“I feel happy because we're finally here, we're finally going to see my family,” the girl's mother, Tania Escobar, said in

the shelter dining hall after a meal of shredded chicken, rice and beans. Her daughter sat nearby, all smiles, wearing a silver crown that a Border Patrol agent gave her and holding a stuffed animal from a doctor who treated the severe cuts on her lower back.

From California to Arizona to Texas, volunteers are scrambling to help families until they can arrange transportation to relatives across the U.S. The San Diego Rapid Response Network, an advocacy coalition that runs the shelter that housed Yariza and her family, has

served more than 4,000 people since opening in a church in late October, moving five times since then because it ran out of space.

U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement often coordinates with these shelters. On the December night that Yariza arrived, ICE brought 125 people in buses that came every half-hour. One night during Christmas week, the facility received 180 people, forcing it to use a church for the overflow.

The situation belies Trump's assertion, in a November tweet, that “Catch and Release is an obsolete term. It is now Catch and Detain.”

The Trump administration announced Dec. 20 that it would make asylum seekers who enter the U.S. on its southern border wait in Mexico

while their claims wind through clogged immigration courts, which can take years. But that “catch and return” policy has yet to take effect while the two countries work on mechanics; a legal challenge appears likely.

So, for now, many asylum-seeking families are being released in the U.S. before even they are ready. ICE dropped off hundreds of people daily at a bus station in El Paso, Texas, over the holidays. In Tucson, Arizona, charities have rented motel rooms when shelters are full.

ICE began shortening custody stays on Oct. 23 in response to the growing numbers of families crossing from Mexico. Officials said ICE previously ensured that families had travel plans first but that it's not legally required to do so.

## Sears gets another reprieve from liquidation

## Company's chairman and largest shareholder promised to keep struggling chain afloat

NEW YORK — Sears received another possible lifeline Tuesday when the company's chairman and largest shareholder promised to line up the necessary financing to keep the struggling department store chain afloat.

The reprieve came after what Sears lawyers described to a bankruptcy judge in New York as “round-the-clock” negotiations following the company board's initial rejection of Eddie Lampert's proposal, which sought to preserve 425 stores and 50,000 workers.

According to lawyers close to the matter, one of the main sticking points was that the bid didn't include cash. The revised version now requires Lampert to deposit \$120 million by 4 p.m. Wednesday through his ESL hedge fund.

The fate of Sears remains to be determined. Lampert's bid will go to an auction set for Jan. 14 and will compete with other bids from liquidators looking to shut down the company. A committee of unsecured creditors has been pushing for straight liquidation and believes there are litigation claims against ESL for prior transactions.

In a statement emailed to The Associated Press, ESL said it “appreciates the encouragement from the court and the constructive engagement of the debtors as we work to formalize our going concern proposal so that it can be evaluated at the upcoming auction.”

“We believe in Sears and will continue to do everything we can to ensure that it has a profitable future,” ESL added.

It's unclear who will be the winner of the auction process, which could take a few days. A bankruptcy judge will then weigh different scenarios including the value of retaining 50,000 jobs, according to David Wander, an attorney at Davidoff Hatcher & Citron, which represents two of Sears vendors.

“You always want a competitive bidding process. You never get the best value if you have only one party,” Wander said.

The 11th hour negotiation is yet another twist in the rocky journey of Sears whose fate has been hanging in the wind, particularly since it filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy on Oct. 15. As of the filing, the company had just under 700 stores and 68,000 workers.

Sears, which began as mail order watch business 132 years ago and grew to be the largest retailer in the world, has been in a slow death spiral, hobbled by the Great Recession and outmatched by competitors like Amazon and Walmart.

Under Lampert, Sears has bought time over the years by spinning off stores and putting on the block the brands that had grown synonymous with the company, such as Craftsman. Lampert loaned out his own money and put together deals to keep the company going, turning whatever profit he could for his hedge fund.

## Filing: Manafort lied about sharing poll data with Russian

WASHINGTON — Former Trump campaign chairman Paul Manafort shared polling data during the 2016 presidential campaign with a business associate accused of having ties to Russian intelligence, and prosecutors say he lied to them about it, according to a court filing Tuesday.

The allegation marks the first time that prosecutors have accused Trump's chief campaign aide of sharing information related to the election with his Russian contacts. Although the filing does not say whether the polling information was public or what was done with it, it raises the possibility that Russia might have used inside information from Trump's Republican campaign as part of its effort to interfere with

the election on Trump's behalf.

The information was accidentally revealed in a defense filing that was meant to be redacted. The Associated Press was able to review the material because it wasn't properly blacked out.

In its filing, the defense was trying to

rebut allegations that Manafort intentionally lied to special counsel Robert Mueller's team after agreeing to plead guilty last September. Prosecutors say Manafort breached their plea agreement by lying, but defense lawyers argued that any misstatements were simple mistakes.

made by a man coping with illness, exhaustion and extensive questioning from investigators.

Lawyers say Manafort suffers from depression and anxiety, has had little contact with his family and, on days when he met with investigators, was awakened before dawn to have hourslong interviews with little time to prepare for the questioning.

“These circumstances weighed heavily on Mr. Manafort's state of mind and on his memory as he was questioned at length,” the lawyers wrote.

Tuesday's filing revealed the first extensive details of what he is accused of having lied about. A spokesman for Manafort's defense team declined to comment on the incomplete redactions or on Mueller's allegations, but lawyers later filed a corrected version of the document.

#### Russian lawyer who met Trump Jr. charged in unrelated case

NEW YORK (AP) — The Russian lawyer who attended the Trump Tower meeting that is a focus of the special counsel's investigation into possible collusion was charged with obstructing an unrelated tax-fraud case, federal prosecutors in New York said Tuesday.

Natalya Veselnitskaya was indicted on one count of obstruction of justice after prosecutors said she teamed up with a senior Russian prosecutor and submitted deceptive declarations in a civil proceeding involving a Russian tax refund fraud scheme.

The indictment, which is unrelated to Russian election interference and brought by the Manhattan U.S. attorney, illustrates Veselnitskaya's close ties to the Russian government, which she has denied. And it renews questions about the circumstances of the 2016 Trump Tower meeting, which also was attended by Donald Trump Jr. and Trump son-in-law Jared Kushner.

Trump Jr. has acknowledged that he met with Veselnitskaya because he had been told she could offer damaging information about Democrat Hillary Clinton from the Russian government. But Trump Jr. and Kushner said the meeting amounted to nothing and mostly

involved Russia's ban on American adoptions in response to U.S. sanctions.

#### Clemency decision sparks praise, political questions

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — The Tennessee governor's decision to grant clemency to a woman who killed a man when she was 16 had the potential to pit political interests against widespread support for her cause. Yet the governor said the decision came down to doing the right thing.

Outgoing Republican Gov. Bill Haslam on Monday quietly issued his decision on Cyntoia Brown, who said she was a sex-trafficking victim. However, the news quickly spread, thrilling criminal justice advocates, celebrities and other supporters who had been fighting for years to help Brown, 30.

“Thank you Gov. Bill Haslam for your decision to grant clemency to Cyntoia Brown,” said U.S. Rep. Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez, a newly elected Democrat from New York, in a tweet. “We must reform our criminal justice system so that cases like Cyntoia's don't happen. Until then, it is up to leaders across the country with the moral compass to make decisions like these.”

Law enforcement officials had opposed clemency, arguing Brown

was not justified in killing a 43-year-old man who authorities said had paid to have sex with her. But celebrities like Kim Kardashian West and singer Rihanna spoke out for Brown. The governor's office received an estimated 100,000 phone calls and emails from supporters pleading for mercy.

The governor's decision was widely praised by Democrats and advocacy groups, and criticism from Tennessee Republicans was almost nonexistent.

But Haslam, who is considering a run for a U.S. Senate seat in 2020, has downplayed the effect Brown's lengthy and complicated case may have on his future political career. He told the Tennessee Journal just hours after publicizing his decision that he isn't going to analyze any possible impact until he leaves office Jan. 19 and GOP Gov.-elect Bill Lee takes over.

“Obviously there's a lot of people who think it's the greatest thing ever and some people who will be upset,” Haslam said. “I think you've got to shove all that aside.”

#### Facility's CEO resigns after vegetative patient gives birth

PHOENIX (AP) — The revelation that a Phoenix woman in a vegetative state recently gave birth has prompted the CEO of a private health care

facility to resign, putting a spotlight on the safety of long-term care settings for patients who are severely disabled or incapacitated.

Hacienda HealthCare CEO Bill Timmons stepped down Monday, spokesman David Leibowitz said. The decision was unanimously accepted by the provider's board of directors.

Local news website Azfamily.com first reported the woman, who had been in a vegetative state for more than 10 years after a near-drowning, delivered a baby on Dec. 29. Her identity has not been reported, and it's not known if she has a family or a guardian. It's also unclear if staff members at the Hacienda de Los Angeles facility were unaware of the pregnancy until the birth.

In a statement, board member Gary Orman said the facility “will accept nothing less than a full accounting of this absolutely horrifying situation.”

“We will do everything in our power to ensure the safety of every single one of our patients and our employees,” Orman said.

The birth has triggered a police investigation and reviews by state agencies. Gov. Doug Ducey's office has called the situation “deeply troubling.”

Phoenix police said the matter is under investigation and declined further comment Tuesday.

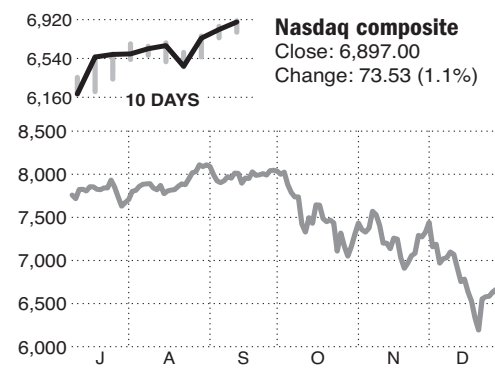
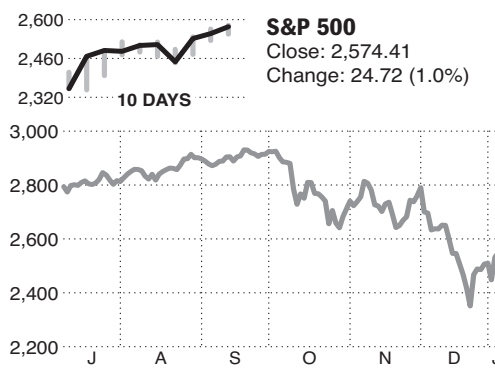

I have to take Flonase and an allergy pill on top of my allergy shots to get relief. I'm told this is due to there being much more pollen in the atmosphere. Is that plausible? Also, what is the best allergy pill? — J.J.C.

**ANSWER:** Allergy immunotherapy shots are one of the therapies available for seasonal or perennial allergies. The effectiveness of the therapy is variable, with some people having complete relief, as you did, and most people having significant but not complete alleviation of symptoms. Once the shots are discontinued, symptoms usually come back, but may take years to do so. Now that you have restarted the therapy, it will hopefully give you more relief as you continue it.

Pollen counts are highly dependent on where you live, as well as the season. Local weather conditions of temperature and humidity determine how much pollen a tree will release, but the number and type of trees that release pollen you are sensitive to is even more important.

There are many kinds of oral medications for allergies. Antihistamines are moderately effective, and the newer ones have low side effect profiles, so are a usual first suggestion. One may work better than another in any given person,

and while I usually recommend cetirizine (Zyrtec) as first line, fexofenadine (Allegra) and loratadine (Claritin) are first choices for some colleagues of mine.

The combination of allergy immunotherapy and oral medication may be the most effective treatment.

**DEAR DR. ROACH:** I am an active 75-year-old woman of small frame who has never smoked. After two bouts with pneumonia, I was diagnosed with Mycobacterium avium complex. I have no symptoms. Since the medication is very harsh and must be taken for over a year, they have decided not to start the medications at this time and wait six months to redo a CT scan and breathing tests.

Is this a fast- or slow-growing disease, and will waiting make it more difficult to cure? What is the easiest treatment regimen on the stomach? I do not tolerate medicines well. — Anon.

**ANSWER:** Mycobacteria are a class of bacteria that are related

to tuberculosis and are generally slow-growing. Mycobacterium avium and Mycobacterium intracellulare both are causes of a lung disease that is prevalent in older people, especially women and especially those who are thin. (The exact organism is often not identified, so the disease is called "Mycobacterium avium complex.") When symptoms are present, they typically are cough and sputum production, usually without weight loss or fever.

Not everybody with the diagnosis of MAC needs treatment, and if you really have no symptoms, then waiting six months to look for progression of disease makes a great deal of sense. I don't think waiting will make it harder to treat the infection. If the disease has not progressed, your doctors may continue to watch and hold off on treatment.

If you do need treatment, the medication regimens used for MAC are indeed difficult on the stomach, and between 20 and 37 percent of people need to stop treatment.

# Food stamps will be funded through February

## 40M Americans in Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Trump administration says benefits under the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, also known as food stamps, will be funded through February should the government shutdown continue.

Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue is asking states to issue the February benefits on or before Jan. 20 so that they can be paid to the nearly 40 million Americans in the program. SNAP is already fully funded for January.

The USDA said it can fund SNAP through February thanks to the short-term funding bill that ran out on Dec. 22. That bill included a provision giving federal agencies the authority to make obligated payments to support certain programs for 30 days after its expiration date.

Brandon Lipps, an acting deputy undersecretary, said other USDA programs will also be funded through February, including school lunches, food distribution

programs on Indian reservations and child nutrition programs. The latter includes WIC, which provides nutritional assistance to pregnant women, mothers and babies.

Under the provision, the SNAP program will operate as it normally does and without any lapse in service, but with an earlier deadline for states to request benefits through a process called early issuance. That process is typically used during natural disasters, Lipps said, enabling states anticipating hurricanes or other weather events to distribute monthly benefits ahead of time.

The SNAP program will cost roughly \$4.8 billion for February, and those funds have already been appropriated through the expired spending bill. But if the shutdown lasts until March, the USDA could be forced to dip into its reserves to help fund the program, and its \$3 billion SNAP contingency fund won't cover a full month of benefits.

# Fate of detained IS fighters uncertain as US exits Syria

WASHINGTON — What to do with hundreds of foreign Islamic State fighters captured in Syria has become a critical and growing problem for the Trump administration as it prepares to pull troops out of the country.

A senior administration official said Tuesday that resolving the fate of these prisoners is a top priority as the government lays the groundwork with allies to comply with President Donald Trump's Dec. 19 order to withdraw the 2,000 American troops from Syria, where they have been working alongside the U.S.-backed Syrian Defense Forces to fight the Islamic State group since 2015.

But there are no easy answers. The official, speaking on condition of anonymity, said releasing the fighters, among them Europeans and some U.S. citizens, would be "unacceptable" since they could simply rejoin the remnants of Islamic State fighters in Syria or elsewhere.

"This matters because SDF holds hundreds of IS fighters, including many European citizens, and they might go free if no solution is found," said Bobby Chesney, a national security law expert at the University of Texas.

European nations have been reluctant to take back citizens with ties to the Islamic State, not wanting the legal challenge of prosecuting them or the potential security risk if they are released.

And moving former fighters to the United States poses some of the same challenges the U.S. has faced with men detained at the military base at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, including whether it's feasible to prosecute militants

captured on the battlefields of northern Syria, according to experts.

Meanwhile, the prisoner problem is only growing worse.

On Sunday, the Syrian Defense Forces announced the capture of five fighters, including two U.S. citizens, one of whom has been identified as a former school teacher from Houston.

Secretary of State Mike Pompeo just began a tour of eight Middle Eastern nations to discuss the withdrawal of the American troops. National security adviser John Bolton returned Tuesday from a meeting in Turkey, where he was seeking a guarantee of safety for the Kurdish fighters who have fought alongside U.S. troops against the Islamic State.

There are fears the U.S. withdrawal will leave a door open for Turkey to assault the U.S.-allied SDF fighters. Turkey views them as part of a terrorist group linked to an insurgency within its own borders.

30-foot wall."

Schumer noted that Trump had promised to have Mexico pay for the wall. But he says having failed, Trump is now "unable to convince Congress or the American people to foot the bill."

Schumer says, "American democracy doesn't work that way. We don't govern by temper tantrum."

House Speaker Nancy Pelosi

says the president has "chosen fear" in making the case to the American people for the border wall and Democrats "want to start with the facts."

Pelosi said Tuesday night in a rebuttal to President Donald Trump's Oval Office address that "we all agree that we need to secure our borders."

She noted that the House passed legislation to reopen government on the first day of the new Congress. But Trump rejects that legislation because it doesn't have funding for his border wall.

railed against illegal immigration at the border, has recently seized on humanitarian concerns to argue there is a broader crisis that can only be solved with a wall. But critics say the security risks are overblown and the administration is at least partly to blame for the humanitarian situation.

Trump used emotional language, referring to Americans

who were killed by people in the country illegally, saying: "I've met with dozens of families whose loved ones were stolen by illegal immigration. I've held the hands of the weeping mothers and embraced the grief-stricken fathers. So sad. So terrible."

Trump has been discussing the idea of declaring a national emergency to allow him to move forward with the wall without getting congressional approval for the \$5.7 billion he's requested. But he did not mention that Tuesday night.

troops from northeastern Syria. Trump "thought he got a commitment from Erdogan" to protect the Kurds, the official said, speaking on the condition of anonymity because the official wasn't authorized to speak on the record.

An official at Tuesday's meeting between Bolton and senior Turkish officials said presidential spokesman Ibrahim Kalin stated that Erdogan committed

that Turkey would not take offensive action while U.S. forces were there.

Bolton departed Turkey without meeting with Erdogan in an apparent snub by the Turks — the meeting had been expected for days. A spokesman for Bolton said U.S. officials were told Erdogan cited the local election season and a speech to parliament for not meeting with him.

In the more than two-hour meeting with Kalin, Bolton outlined five U.S. principles for the Syria drawdown, including that

"the United States opposes any mistreatment of opposition forces who fought with us against ISIS."

In the high-stakes session in Ankara's presidential complex, Bolton also rebuked Erdogan's column in The New York Times, in which the Turkish leader restated his position that the Syrian Defense Forces were members of terrorist groups and criticized the U.S. air campaign against the Islamic State.

An official at the meeting said Bolton told Kalin that Erdogan's op-ed was

"wrong and offensive."

The official added that the U.S. stuck by Trump's request that the Kurds who fought with the U.S. not be mistreated, and the Turks stuck by their position that the Kurds "are terrorist groups and they're free to go after them."

Trump abruptly announced last month he intended to withdraw U.S. troops from Syria, and the U.S. has sent mixed signals over how soon that would be accomplished. Bolton's trip to the Mideast was aimed at assuring

allies it would not be done precipitously.

But Kalin told reporters after talks with Bolton there is no slowdown in the timetable for U.S. withdrawal from Syria. He said U.S. officials have said during their discussions that the withdrawal could take place within "120 days."

Kalin said talks with Bolton focused on how the U.S. would collect the weapons that were given to Kurdish militia fighting Islamic States as well as the future of U.S. bases in Syria.

to solve problems with a command.

But unlike some of his predecessors, Scott, a former healthcare executive, came to elected office late in life. He was a political novice when he launched his quixotic campaign for governor in 2010. Moving from a business background to government was already an adjustment, said Adam Hollingsworth, Scott's chief of staff in Tallahassee for three years.

"I don't think he's any different of a person today than the day he announced

his bid for governor in April 2010," Hollingsworth said. "But I do think he's very much more studied on the art of going through a political process to accomplish his goals."

Lee suggested that Scott's vast wealth will help, too. It can quickly win him friends in Washington through political donations. His private plane will allow him to remain visible in Florida despite his commitments in Washington.

Scott has spent about \$150 million on his three successful elections in Florida, including \$64 million to win the U.S. Senate seat.

For his part, Scott has

said he isn't coming to Washington to make friends or play the political game. He's here to "Make Washington work," as his slogan said. He ran on a menu of populist causes like forcing Congress to accept term limits, an unpopular idea among D.C. leadership.

He has raised eyebrows, though, with the message he sent on Day One of his new job by hosting a black tie Sunshine Ball in Washington — on Day 19 of the federal shutdown. Donors are asked to contribute up to \$100,000 as some federal employees struggle to get by without their pay.

The disconnect recalled an episode from the campaign, when Scott, after bashing "career politicians" and special interests, attended a D.C. fundraiser held by an entrenched political firm and headlined by Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell.

In the tunnels of the Senate, a reporter asked Scott about the fundraiser. He walked into an elevator and didn't answer.

Scott's attempt to be the driver behind term limits was already overtaken due to his late arrival. Sen. Ted Cruz, R-Texas, filed a bill on the first day of the new Congress to limit

Senators to 12 years and Representatives to six.

It's unclear what other policy proposals Scott has in the works. He offered few insights during the campaign, instead focusing his message on "retiring" his Democratic rival and long-time Florida politician Bill Nelson.

His committee assignments offer some clues: Scott will serve on the Armed Services Committee; Committee on Commerce, Science and Transportation; Committee on Homeland Security and Government Affairs; Committee on the Budget; and Special Committee on Aging.

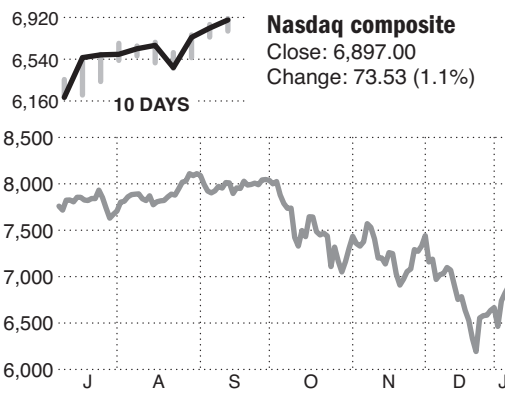
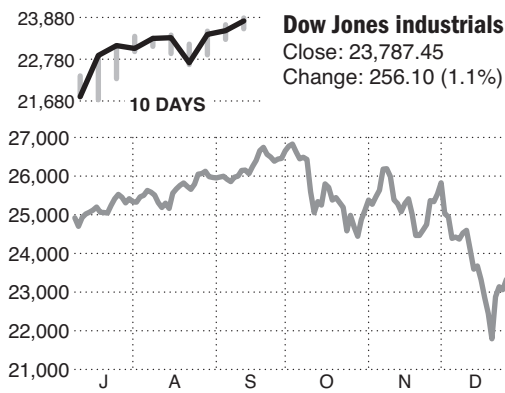
