County commissioners set legislative priorities

POLK COUNTY – County commissioners voted Jan. 8 to approve the 2019 Legislative Policy Statement, a document that provides focus for lobbying efforts during the state legislative session.

Each year, state legislators work for two months writing new laws. This year, the 2019 Legislative Session in Tallahassee begins March 5 and ends May 3. During this time, a lobbyist representing Polk County will work to get laws passed that benefit county residents. This year, county staff recommended the county lobbyist focus on eight priorities.

County staff want more state funding dedicated toward behavioral health. In 2018 Polk County commissioners voted to accept a few hundred thousand dollars from a Florida Department of Children and Families grant to initiate several programs that would help incarcerated residents with mental health problems

prepare for reintroduction to the general public. This pilot program is set to expire in three years and county staff want this funding to be ongoing.

County staff would like state legislators to relax the law associated with how building inspectors get certified. Currently, county staff are having a hard time finding certified inspectors, causing county residents and business owners to have longer wait times. County staff say the certification process could be simplified.

Recently, county staff stated that residents are placing too many un-recyclable materials in recycling bins, leading to rates going up. Now, they are hoping state legislators will fund strategies to combat this problem. Last legislative session, state legislators worked on two bills that never got passed. County staff are seeking small changes to SB1308 and HB1149. County staff allege these bills would place the burden on county governments to solve this problem. According to the policy statement, county staff say the state should get more involved

with education and enforcement matters to solve the problem.

County staff allege that county taxpayers overpaid the Florida Department of Juvenile Justice for services rendered between fiscal year 2009 and fiscal year 2012, to the tune of \$7.3 million in costs plus interest. County staff want the state to correct that problem.

Last year, the Polk County Health Department tried to raise prices for septic system inspections without a public hearing. Once county commissioners realized they authorized this without a public hearing, they repealed the higher fee until a hearing was set. They also decided to lobby the state for more funding.

An ongoing issue is the ability of local water supplies to keep pace with explosive population growth of late. In the recent past, state legislators passed a law called the Heartland Headwaters Protection and Sustainability Act. The law defined the Green Swamp as a state asset that ought to be protected because it is the headwa-

ters of multiple Florida rivers. County staff want more money to protect the Green Swamp. County staff have told the state the best way to protect the swamp is to build a wellfield in the Frostproof area that would suck 30 million gallons per day out of the Lower Floridan Aquifer.

County staff are seeking more state funding for affordable housing. In 1992, state legislators increased real estate taxes to fund such an effort but, starting in 2001, county staff say state legislators have diverted \$2.2 billion out of this tax to fund other projects. County staff say they received \$2.1 million from the state for affordable housing in fiscal year 2017-18 and \$744,000 in fiscal year 2018-19.

Finally, county staff are recommending the county lobbyist oppose all state legislation that imposes what they call "state mandates or other financial burdens." County staff allege that state legislators passed laws that cost county taxpayers \$70 million last year. In the policy document, county staff did not elaborate on how they reached that number.

Changing lives through community service

They're the men and women behind the scenes helping keep Polk County clean and beautiful, polishing up their tarnished records by paying for their crime working in the community, not sitting in jail.

The Polk County Jail Inmate Work Program is aimed at transforming inmates convicted of crimes, mostly traffic penalties and drug charges, into better citizens through hard work and community service. It serves a great purpose and has transformed lives, teaching some inmates new skills.

Picking up trash is one of the go-to duties assigned to these weekday and weekend road warriors. They help keep our parks, schools and public facilities clean. They have painted government buildings, completed landscaping projects for county, state, and city proper-

ties, cleaned up the Sheriff's Youth Villa and rehabilitated a cemetery.

In addition to being restorative, it saves Polk County taxpayers millions of dollars by keeping costs down for local governments.

In 2018, hundreds of inmates in the program worked 207,592 hours on 247 projects, saving Polk County taxpayers \$1,934,757.44, in total. They collected 37,757 bags of trash, collected 4,222 discarded tires, and cleaned 2,672 miles of roads.

The program is truly a great return on investment; the taxpayers benefit, society benefits from cleaner and more beautiful roads and parks; and hopefully, the men and women in the program learned from their mistakes. There is also hope they'll become better stewards in the community and feel proud that their hard work has made Polk County an even better place to live, work and play.

Robillard certainly got better at his craft, so much so that he began building up a loyal customer base. The growing demand for his whiskey, which he named Cabin Fever, got to be such that it was a bit of a hassle.

"People are coming to the house to get their maple moonshine and it was getting to be too much," Robillard recalled. "It just blew up — it was like we were selling the fountain of youth."

Robillard and his wife, Melissa, decided to run with it and make the hobby a business. Operating independently, Cabin Fever grew and eventually was being sold in 15 states. As often happens, offers came from larger companies to buy the mom-and-pop operation, and eventually Diageo Brands — which owns many of the most well-known alcoholic beverage brands

in the world — came calling with an offer in 2012 the Robillards couldn't refuse.

"We sold that brand and it changed our lives," Robillard said.

Cabin Fever went national and, eventually, Robillard had an opportunity in 2016 to purchase his company back, which he took. In the meantime, he and his family moved to the Lake Wales area, following his son, who had gone to college in Florida.

Melissa Robillard became the chief financial officer for Bok Tower Gardens and that is where Rob Robillard, a master distiller who has become a well-regarded figure in the whiskey industry, will be presenting a whiskey tasting and pairing class Friday, Jan. 25, from 6-7:30 p.m.

The class is open to members and non-members at Bok Tower Gardens, and will feature the kind of insight often only available at functions for professionals within the industry.

"(I thought) 'Let's open it up to people who appreciate whiskey,'" Robillard explained. "Some of them you cannot buy in stores — it's going to be a real education as far as a tasting of whiskeys."

Among those being shared will be Robillard's new project, Walrus Blood. One of the distinctive traits of this new product is an innovation: putting two oak cubes in the bottled product to continuously age the whiskey.

"Some people think it's a gimmick but it changes the color and the flavor of

the whiskey — it tastes a lot better," Robillard said.

For his part, Robillard remains passionate about whiskey and passionate about being an entrepreneur. Sharing his own story, and engaging with others who share the spirit, has become one of the driving motivations for the Lake Wales resident.

"That's what gets me out of bed every morning — to go out, tell the story and interact with people," Robillard said. "There's never a stopping point — it's a journey."

Team Berto says goodbye to a local legend

WINTER HAVEN — Even the balcony seats were filled to capacity at Faith Baptist Church for the Jan. 5 funeral of Dieuseul "Tiger" Berto.

The journey for "Caribbean Kid Berto," the founder of Tiger's World Martial Arts and Boxing Fitness, ended Dec. 29 at age 60.

His first name is pronounced like "Giselle," but at the funeral all of his friends simply referred to him as Berto.

"Truth be told, that was probably because he wanted to spare a bunch of southern boys from Polk County the agony of trying to pronounce his name," John Hosegood said.

Dieuseul Berto grew up in the streets of Modle, Haiti. He came to the United States with his family around 1980, initially picking fruit in his early 20s. His love of the martial arts would set him on a different path, though. Eventually Berto settled down to raise his family in Winter Haven and crossed paths with wrestling trainer Karl Gotch. Soon after, Berto was wrestling profes-

sionally for the Florida Wrestling Foundation, building a reputation as a hard hitter. The style he used was not like traditional wrestling. Berto was regarded as a pioneer in the Ultimate Fighting Championship style of fighting, a mix of boxing and wrestling.

Former Cypress Gardens ski team athlete and Winter Haven resident Hank Longo was the commissioner and ring announcer for Florida Wrestling Foundation back then. During the Jan. 5 funeral there was a video montage of Berto in the ring, accompanied by cries of sadness throughout. Longo said Berto's professional wrestling career was cut short by a serious car accident that left him in a wheelchair for around a year.

But Berto bounced back.

"Like a Detroit diesel going downhill, he got back into shape," Longo said.

In 1996 Berto founded Tiger's World Martial Arts and Boxing Fitness across the street from Winter Haven High School. John Hosegood said Berto was his trainer around that time.

"We beat the stew out of each other before Tiger's World was a school," Hosegood said. "Berto loved the battle, he

loved the hard training. He didn't believe you had to be the best fighter. He believed you had to be in the best shape and had to have the most heart and he didn't just preach it, he lived it. Berto brought out the best in people."

David Bowen used to spar with Berto. Over the years they became good friends. When David's mother passed in 2003, he said his first phone call was to Berto.

"He beat the crap out of me but what I most remember was his encouraging nature," Bowen said. "He was the ultimate motivator and taught that hard work overcomes adversity. He would not quit a fight."

Those who spoke uniformly said that Berto's largest legacy was not his athletic or training prowess, but the children he and his wife Wilnise raised. One son, Andre Berto, is a two-time world welterweight boxing champion. Edson Berto and daughter Revelina Berto have both fought mixed-martial arts professionally. Cleveland Berto has appeared in three movies and Noah Berto is a standout wrestler at Winter Haven High School.

Other surviving family members include daughters Jessica and Rachelle and

grandchildren Jolahny, Nylah, Jessica and Latiffa Berto.

Five members of "Team Berto" spoke at their father's funeral.

"Thank you for being there next to me in battle, in the ring and outside the ring," Andre Berto said. "Thank you for the 500 push ups and 500 squats that you made me and my brothers do every time we got into trouble. Thank you for letting me know what tenacity and being fearless was. I will take all that and pass it on to my kids. The Berto legacy will evolve, I promise you that."

Inside Tiger's World Martial Arts and Boxing Fitness are several quotes stenciled onto the wall. One reads, "We are judged by what we finish, not what we started." Another quote reads, "I can live with losing the fight but I cannot live with walking away from it."

The Winter Haven community lost one of its leaders with the passing of Berto. Hank Longo thanked the Berto family for inviting him to speak at the funeral.

"This is probably one of the biggest honors of my life," Longo said. "Not only was he my best friend mentor, but most of all my hero."

Some nonprofits underspent Indigent Health Care Tax money

POLK COUNTY – County staff recently reported that in fiscal year 2017-18 county residents paid more than \$46 million into the half-cent Indigent Health Care Sales Tax that provides health insurance to around 4,600 county residents who are uninsured.

The sales tax funds a variety of subsidized healthcare services for those who struggle financially, primarily the Polk HealthCare Plan, but also several other health programs, such as dental,

specialty care and behavioral health.

Recently, members of the Citizens Healthcare Oversight Committee were given an end-of-year report about these programs, and the numbers suggest some area nonprofit organizations are not spending the public tax money they were allocated.

“We under-spent on a lot of stuff,” committee member Dr. Peter Verill said.

For example, programs like dental, specialty care, prevention and behavioral health spent around \$6 million

less than were budgeted. County staff made up for that shortage by spending around \$3 million extra toward the Polk HealthCare Plan.

Committee member Steve Bissonette asked county staff if there was a lack of demand for these services, or if there was a shortage of nonprofit agencies that can benefit from this funding.

“That would be a question for each one of the agencies to see why they did not spend everything that they requested,” said county financial analyst Kelvin Almestica.

Committee chair Lance Anastasio said it is possible that, in subsequent years, less money will be allocated to the areas where the money is not being spent.

The issue of underspent funds does not apply to the whole of nonprofit programs receiving taxpayer funds. Staff said most spent all or the vast majority of their allocated money, but that there were a few providers who did not. In actual costs, of the \$46 million collected, around \$46 million was spent on indigent healthcare in fiscal year 2017-18.

‘Skip a Week’ program encourages water conservation

POLK COUNTY – With the new year comes the beginning of the annual Southwest Florida Water Management District “Skip a Week of Irrigation” campaign.

According to City of Winter Haven staff, 15 percent of Winter Haven residents use approximately 45 percent of all potable water, primarily for irrigating lawns.

Officials at several levels of government — from city and county levels on up through the state level — are concerned about excessive water use as a result of a dwindling water supply in Florida. Officials say that water conservation is one of the most affordable means of dealing with this problem.

According to representatives from the City as well as SWFWMD, there are many ways residents can help with conservation. A good rule of thumb is to apply one-half to three-quarters of an inch every 10-to-14 days in the winter months, when grass needs less water to thrive.

Winter Haven Water Conservation Specialist Keeli Carlton said when your grass blades fold in half or appear blue or grey, or if you can see your footprints when you walk on your lawn, those are other gauges to alert you as to when your lawn needs water. Over-watered lawns can actually be less adept to survive droughts and are found to encourage pests and disease.

“Do not forget to skip a week,” Carlton said. “It just makes sense.”

Winter Haven staff are teaming up with UF/IFAS staff to host several Flor-

ida-friendly landscaping programs in the coming months.

On Feb. 20, between noon at 1 p.m., is “Fertilizer Use in the Home Landscape,” held at the Rotary Park clubhouse at 350 6th St. NE in Winter Haven. On March 20 is “Watering Like a Pro,” with the same hours (noon to 1 p.m.) and location.

On April 17 is “Landscaping to Manage Stormwater Runoff,” set to take place between noon and 1 p.m. at the Winter Haven Library.

Charters to be warned of proposed bus cuts via letter

POLK COUNTY – On Jan. 8, the Polk County School Board decided to instruct Superintendent Jacqueline Byrd to send a letter to a dozen charter school site administrators warning them that next year they may have to provide their own school bus transportation.

According to the board, the change is necessary for two reasons. First, there are not enough bus drivers and some students are arriving to school late as a result. Second, a majority of the board said that while state legislators mandate school choice, which requires more bus transportation, this added cost is not adequately funded. Staff said it costs around \$37 million to bus all of its students and the state provides \$25 million towards this cost.

The letter is intended to give the charter schools ample time to make necessary arrangements.

Lake Wales Charter School Superintendent Dr. Jesse Jackson said Lake Wales Charter Schools would not be affected by this proposed change because the charter district already provides its own transportation. Jackson said the state pays for half of the bus transportation costs for the Lake Wales Charter system.

The proposed change would impact around 350 students who attend the

following schools: Achievement Academy (all three sites), Chain of Lakes Collegiate High, Cypress Junction Montessori, Compass Middle, Lakeland Montessori Middle, Lakeland Montessori Schoolhouse, Polk State College Collegiate High, Polk State College Gateway High and Victory Ridge Academy.

Eliminating service to the 12 school sites would save around \$130,000, staff said.

An additional idea the board considered was to stop busing many of the 18,000 students who live within two miles of their school. The state does not mandate busing students who live within two miles of their assigned school, but several members of the school board voiced opposition to this idea.

In theory, eliminating service to those students would save much more money. For instance, Jackson said Lake Wales Charter Schools already saves on transportation costs by not busing most of the students who live within the two-mile proximity.

School board members Lisa Miller, Billy Townsend, Sara Beth Reynolds and Chairman Lynn Wilson all verbally expressed support for instructing Superintendent Byrd to mail the letter. Board members Kay Fields and Sarah Fortney did not object when the chairman asked if there was a consensus.

Teachers, parents sound off at schools roundtable

POLK COUNTY – Five of the seven Polk County School Board members participated in a roundtable discussion Jan. 8, offering an opportunity for teachers and parents to be heard on a variety of issues.

The first non-board member to speak, a teacher, made note that school board members spoke for around 60 minutes of the 90-minute event and that members of the public only got three minutes to speak each. She said for the past 15 years she has been teaching at-risk students who tend not to score as well on tests, and that her salary is lower than teachers with the same experience who teach students in better neighborhoods who tend to score higher on tests.

“I do it because of my passion, and I love it, but I’m about done,” she said.

Polk Education Association President Marianne Capozziello said she sees this frustration throughout the county and that communication between school departments is slow. She said Governor Ron DeSantis gave an inaugural speech that mentioned expanding school choice at a time when

many suggest traditional schools are being starved.

“Solutions can flow up, not just down,” Capozziello said. “Your teachers are stressed, your support staff are stressed, your students are stressed and they are trying to tell you.”

Other speakers brought up issues including communication, mandated reports that were not being completed, large class sizes, understaffed departments and low pay.

“I have tested kids last March who are not yet staffed into ESE classes,” one longtime school psychologist said. “That to me is bordering on criminal. I believe that is a denial of public education.”

The last speaker was a teacher of 24 years.

“There are a lot of things going on out there that if you knew or if the (media) knew, it’s a lot,” she said. “These kids are bringing in money, federal dollars. It may not be enough and will probably never be enough, but there is no accountability to make sure that those kids bringing those dollars in are getting those services.”

School-to-Work program has CenterState Bank employees mentoring Winter Haven High students

WINTER HAVEN — The CenterState Bank Operations Center in Winter Haven might seem like an unlikely place to find 28 high-school juniors on a Thursday morning.

And yet, there they were Jan. 10, learning the basics of credit from a guest speaker and, afterward, getting to spend one-on-one time with their assigned mentors, all of whom are CenterState employees who volunteered to be a part of the program.

The program is called "School-to-Work" and it is under the larger umbrella of Big Brothers/Big Sisters of Tampa Bay.

The program pairs the high-school students, in this case from Winter Haven High, with mentors in the workplace. The mentors, known as "biggs," are able to share their experience as professionals in their field, in this case banking, and also help the students — "littles" — come up with a plan for their future as they prepare for life after graduation. It provides an opportunity for the students to get a glimpse of what the professionals do on a day-to-day basis, but also to have a mentor with whom they can discuss things like applying for college or seeking out a part-time job.

The iteration of the program in Winter Haven is fairly new — the meeting Jan. 10 was the third session. According to Stephen Koch, the president and CEO of BBBS Tampa Bay, this is the eleventh location for the program, which has other partnerships with employers in Hillsborough County and Pinellas County.

For someone like James Spence, a CenterState employee who volunteered to become a big, the program has become a chance for him to give back within the context of his normal work day.

"Just in my own life, I've benefited from having a lot of excellent mentors," Spence said. "I think part of that experience is continuing it."

James is a mentor to Alonzo, 17, a junior at Winter Haven and linebacker for the Blue Devils football team. Alonzo would like to play professional football, but has also considered becoming a firefighter as a possible career choice.

During his time spent with Spence, they've been able to discuss things like grit and how it can help Alonzo get to the places he'd like to go — something the Winter Haven teen isn't afraid to seek counsel on.

"I just needed help and I heard about this and decided I might as well try it out," Alonzo said. "I really do like it and want to see where it goes."

The program has partnered with several types of employers, including the Moffitt Cancer Center, and although occupational knowledge is not the focus, each employer provides a unique value and experience for its participants.

In this case, the Winter Haven students get to absorb bits of knowledge about the financial industry and what it takes to be part of it.

"We have these bank employees, that live and breath the banking industry, directly working for half-a-day a month with these kids," Koch said. "The issues of financial literacy are just going to naturally be transferred here — that kind of knowledge is invaluable."

For their part, the staff at CenterState saw getting involved in this program as a unique opportunity to invest in Winter Haven.

"At the end of the day, we are a community bank and this is what it's all about," said Brett Rawls, the Chief Administrative Officer for CenterState. "This is our local market."

A handful of local leaders were in attendance for the recent session, including Polk Schools Superintendent Jacqueline Byrd, who encouraged the students to embrace this opportunity to have a mentor.

"This is going to make an impact in your life and in our community," Byrd said. "I am happy to see this program come to life."

Students will continue meeting with their mentors each month and are in the program through their senior year, after which they will all be eligible for a new program from BBBS called "Big Futures," which focuses on young adults who recently graduated high school.

"This was something that spoke to the hearts of our staff and so we thought it

would be a great opportunity," Thompson said.

Brad Dantzler chosen again as mayor

WINTER HAVEN – For the second year in a row, as well as the third time in the three past four years, Bradley T. Dantzler has been elected Mayor of Winter Haven.

Each January, members of the Winter Haven City Commission cast ballots to determine their leaders. Dantzler won on a 3-2 vote, with Commissioner Pete Chichetto nominating Commissioner William Twyford for the top spot. Mayor Pro-Tem Nathaniel J. Birdsong, Jr. was elected for a seventh time, with his selection coming in a unanimous vote.

The commission also discussed a number of topics Jan. 14.

Commissioners voted unanimously to accept what is called a guaranteed maximum price (GMP) to finish construction of the Chain of Lakes Field House. In October, Rodda Construction staff submitted a GMP of \$19,405,643, but at the time they were still working

out the costs to build the air-handling system. The new total is \$24,333,789. The city borrowed around \$26 million for the project and the county authorized an additional \$1 million to cover some upfront expenses.

By contract if expenses exceed the GMP, Rodda ownership shall bear such costs without reimbursement. If under budget, Rodda ownership and the city will split the savings.

"This is an iconic project for the city of Winter Haven," City Manager Mike Herr said. "Once this field house and conference center is built, it's going to be a wonderful asset for the city."

The project is on schedule and 30-45 days from now, residents may see walls going up, Assistant City Manager T Michael Stavres said.

"It's beyond juggling cats out there," Stavres said. "They are pouring concrete and moving dirt starting at 3 o'clock in the morning — and they are there until it's dark every day. There is always something happening."

The project is scheduled to be completed in November 2020..

The commission also voted unanimously to authorize \$15,000 for a homeless study to be conducted by a non-profit called Heart for Winter Haven. Dantzler said that for years he has been trying to address homelessness in Winter Haven, especially homeless students. Money will be spent studying the problem and the commission will address possible solutions once the report is complete.

Citrus Connection Executive Director Tom Phillips gave the commission an update on mass transit. Last year 187,000 passengers rode mass transit in Winter Haven, down one percentage point from last year, Phillips said. In reference to the ongoing federal government shutdown, Phillips said there is enough cash on hand to maintain services through March.

The commission had a first reading on an ordinance that would allow a concrete crushing complex be built near the intersection of Lake Hamilton

Drive and Lucerne Park Road near Nash Road. A vote will take place two weeks from now.

At the Jan. 3 Planning Commission meeting, dozens of residents expressed opposition to two proposed Winter Haven developments, a proposed retirement development north of Dundee Road and west of Country Club Road, and a second development near the airport.

City Manager Mike Herr told the commission that he expects a large crowd at the next city commission meeting Jan. 28. As such, the meeting is taking place at Nora Mayo Hall to accommodate the expected crowds.

Those who attend will also be able to watch a presentation on a railroad "quiet zone." City staff said many residents have complained about train horns blowing as rail traffic has increased of late. City staff want to spend a few hundred thousand to improve several train intersections, a change necessary to prevent train horns

Charter system, school district outline conflicting plans for McLaughlin Middle

LAKE WALES – Officials from the Lake Wales Charter Schools system and the Polk County Public Schools Board agree that operation of the three middle schools in the city is problematic, but there was little agreement about what to do about it during a city-sponsored community forum on the topic last week.

The topic of discussion largely focused on McLaughlin Middle and who will manage it in the event it receives another failing grade. If McLaughlin does not receive a “C” grade or better this year, state legislation mandates that operations be taken over by an outside entity, with charter systems serving as one of the potential choices. That mandate is what led the Lake Wales Charter system to advance a plan to absorb the school into its the current setup.

Conversely, the county has told the state it would use Educational Directions, a private firm, to run McLaughlin, if such action becomes necessary. McLaughlin has had a failing school grade for three straight years.

Respective representatives of the charter system and the county school board each expressed concerns about having both entities continuing to operate middle schools in Lake Wales, especially since the charter system’s second middle school – Bok Academy North – will be authorized to accept as many as 600 students in the next few years.

Jimmy Nelson, the chairman for the charter system’s board of trustees, said that would create an excess of some 900 middle-school seats available.

“As I see it, a failure to address this issue now could inevitably lead to an exacerbation of the issues that have plagued us to this point,” he said. “If McLaughlin does not come into our charter, quite honestly, our incentive will be to be as successful as we pos-

sibly can, and attract as many students as we possibly can.”

Lynn Wilson, a member of the county school board, termed the situation unhealthy.

“Unfortunately, we have a competitive environment between the school district and Lake Wales Charter that isn’t working. It’s not serving our students. It’s not serving our communities,” Wilson said. “We have to work together to find a solution, whatever that solution is.”

Wilson, whose district includes Lake Wales, Frostproof, Eagle Lake and some of Winter Haven, called the divide a “significant difference.”

“I hear from those communities all the time. We’ve got to find a way to put the past behind us. We’re here. It’s a very serious matter,” he added.

By far the biggest applause from the 150 or so in attendance came after a plea from Lake Wales High School Principal Donna Dunson.

“This is about a community — a community that wants to be one community, in terms of students going from elementary to high school and (having) a continuity with the culture of the schools, the approach that we take and the autonomy the educators have,” Dunson observed.

She said the greater flexibility charter schools have in how they direct their resources is an advantage.

“I know we spend a lot of money bringing in experts, after experts, after experts, And if that doesn’t work, well, there’s someone else with a new idea,” she said. “You come back and you collaborate, and you have someone like (McLaughlin Principal) Donna Drisdom cut loose from the shackles that can be cumbersome. If we can leverage that energy I think we can blow it out of the water in Lake Wales. It’s not about the school grade. It’s about giving educators the autonomy to do what we know they can do.”

Several county administrators revealed, however, that a proposal for the charter system to take over operations at McLaughlin – in the wake of three straight failing school grades in the last three years – may not even be legally considerable.

Moreover, staff at McLaughlin aren’t interested in leaving the district, according to Polk Schools Superintendent Jacqueline Byrd.

“I will tell you that we did speak with the teachers at McLaughlin at the beginning of this year, and the end of last year, and at that time those teachers told us (they) were happy with McLaughlin being part of Polk County Schools,” she said.

The charter system’s proposal includes an additional \$1.8 million in aid to the school over the first three years of the takeover, which includes a pledge of \$1.2 million from the charter system’s foundation, and about \$600,000 in expected additional start-up money from the federal government.

“That goes to the autonomy that Donna was talking about,” Nelson said. “The principals of the charter schools are the CEOs of those schools — they manage and are responsible for their own budgets.”

In addition, the plan, according to Nelson, would keep Drisdom as the school’s principal.

“If this were to happen, the lady who is there is the right person for the job, regardless under which system she works,” he added.

Questions of legality

Having the Lake Wales Charter Schools system take over operation of McLaughlin Middle schools is a moot point, according to several Polk County School officials, including Superintendent Jacqueline Byrd.

That’s because the Lake Wales system doesn’t qualify to be an operator under state law, county officials revealed.

“Under that particular option, it says ‘insures the district enters into a contract with a charter or multiple charter that has a record of turning around a high poverty school serving low performing students with similar demographics,’” said Carolyn Bridges, the school district’s senior director of acceleration and innovation. “We have to demonstrate that the entity that we selected is experienced in turnaround work, which is a very specific type of work, and has that track record of success. And while the Lake Wales Charter schools have a lot of successes, there isn’t turnaround work that would meet the requirements of state accountability.”

Dr. Michael Akes, Polk Schools’ Chief Academic Officer, reaffirmed that position.

“When we are looking at this, the criteria we don’t believe is met,” he said. “Legally, what they’re asking the school board to do can’t be done.”

Lake Wales Superintendent Dr. Jesse Jackson said he believed the state’s department of education would, in fact, approve the local charter system as a qualified operator, based on the fact the Lake Wales system was invited by state officials to make a presentation about 18 months ago to operate the Jefferson County school system, which was also in turnaround mode.

“Eventually we backed out of that opportunity, principally because we were in the midst of trying to establish Bok North,” Jackson said. “They deemed Lake Wales Charter Schools qualified to take over that district. So I believe we would certainly qualify for McLaughlin Middle School.”

Bridges countered, however, that the new rules were issued by the state just prior to the start of this school year.

The charter system currently operates two middle schools in Lake Wales, including Bok Academy South, now in its ninth year. Bok North opened this past August with 200 sixth-grade students, and will expand to 600 students by the 2020-21 school year.

Cheri Kelley accepted two proclamations recognizing the annual Martin Luther King Jr.-George H. Gause Parade, which is planned for Jan. 21 and sponsored by the Bartow Deacons and Stewards Alliance. She also was recognized for heading up the Florida Department of Transportation's Black History Month celebration on Feb. 28. This year's event at the FDOT office, located at 801 N. Broadway Ave., will feature Bartow native and entertainer Jamarice Daughtry, known as J. Daughtry.

The annual parade honors the memory of Dr. King and also honors Gause as a Polk County pioneer. Gause was a civic activist who served on the Bartow City Commission and was Bartow's first black mayor, elected in 1971. He was also the first black person to serve on the Polk County School Board.

The parade, which begins at noon on Monday, Jan. 21, starts at Main St. and Floral Ave. and goes through downtown, ending at the Carver Recreation

Center. There, a celebration will take place and last through the afternoon. Kelley said this year there will be a number of events going on for the celebration.

Daughtry, who has appeared in Broadway theaters in a number of shows, is a Bartow native and grad-

uate of Harrison School for the Arts. Shows he has appeared in include "Cirque Dreams Holiday," "Motown the Musical," "Beautiful: the Carole King Musical," and "The Color Purple." He has also appeared in a number of television shows. The event will honor him as the 2019 Annual Black History Recognition ceremony.

Northern Connector Feeder to be built

BARTOW – City commissioners unanimously approved a contract Jan. 7 to build a tie on the Northern Connector Feeder.

City Manager George Long explained to commissioners the contract and the plan help meet the goals of the city's strategic plan. This construction meets the goals of reliable infrastructure, expanding the local economy and redeveloping and grow the city, as outlined in the strategic plan.

"It's a good project and meets a number of goals in the strategic plan," he told commissioners. "This will help us move in that direction."

A memo from the Bartow Electric Department states the Lyle Feeder from the Northwest Substation is at 58 percent under summer peak conditions, which is close to the 60 percent that is the recommended limit.

This will allow a capable feeder tie to Lyle and may reduce normal loading. Also, the proposed Stuarts Draft Planned Unit Development will need power and the Lyle Feeder is one potential source. This, it concluded, will provide a reliable source for the anticipated electric demand.

The staff had recommended awarding Pike Electric LLC the \$499,960.52 to construct the project. Project materials will be provided by the Bartow Electric Department at \$300,835.65. With the approval, work is scheduled to start on this project early this year.

Holiday garbage pickup

Bartow City Hall will be closed Monday, Jan. 21, for Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Day. Because of this, the regular meeting of the Bartow City Commission is scheduled for 6 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 22, in City Hall.

Also because of the holiday, garbage collection will change. Garbage normally collected on Monday will be collected on Tuesday, Jan. 22. Tuesday collection will take place on Wednesday, Jan. 23. There is no change to collection on Thursday and Friday.

Cigar Factory work session

Bartow City Commissioners have scheduled a work session on the Thompson & Company Cigar Factory at 1 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 29 in City Hall.

Last month, commissioners listened to a proposal from Gregory Fancelli, of Prestige WorldWide Group LLC, who said the 93-year-old building and grounds can be restored and can be turned into an attraction. After hearing his plan, commissioners asked Fancelli to return in January with a more-detailed plan.

The city has maintained the Cigar Factory since it was acquired from the county in 2011. It hopes to convert the property into something to benefit Bartow, but so far has gotten little response. Meanwhile the city has been maintaining the building and spent in excess of \$200,000 for upkeep.

Hoops roundup: Lake Wales picks up important win

Turns out they can play pretty good basketball in Highlands County, too.

Not that Lake Wales thought they could head an hour south on U.S. 27 to face Sebring and come back to Polk County with an easy win. But, after dropping a district contest to Booker a few nights earlier, the Highlanders were in need of a district victory.

It was a roller-coaster ride from the start, and early in the third, the Highlanders lead was seven. But the Blue Streaks launched, and made, some three-pointers and took the lead.

Lake Wales clawed back and led 57-51 heading into the final minute, but Sebring was not done, going on a 6-0 run to tie the game. Moments later, in the closing seconds, it appeared for all the world that the Blue Streaks were heading for the winning basket on a fastbreak.

Somehow, from somewhere, Lake Wales senior Raykwon Frazier used

his 6-foot-4 frame and athleticism to block the layup attempt with about six seconds to go. A subsequent foul put another Highlander senior, Jevon Holt, at the free throw line. He nailed both shots for the 59-57 win — improving Lake Wales to 10-4 overall and 2-1 in Class 6, District 10.

The rematch comes Jan. 29 on Highlander Hill, the final regular season district game for Lake Wales on their slate. The chance to avenge the road loss at Booker comes Jan. 22.

Elsewhere on the hardwood, Haines City's boys team is trying to rewrite a script that usually has just the Lady Hornets in the headlines. The boys team is 11-4 and 3-1 in Class 9A, District 7 play, although its latest league matchup was a 67-49 loss at Osceola. Antwan Walker (16.3 points per game) and Tarik Williams (11.7 ppg) are leading the offense.

The district fate for Bartow (10-5 overall), at least in the regular season, will likely come down to a pair of contests against Lakeland. The first game is on the Yellow Jackets' court Jan. 23, with the rematch coming Feb. 1 in Lakeland.

Auburndale still has two games to go with Lake Region and two with Lake Gibson in Class 7A, District 6, with postseason seeding hanging in the balance.

Lake Region's Stavel Johnson is averaging 16 points per game for the Thunder (5-7). Don Skipper is averaging 13 points per game.

Ridge Community doesn't have a win since the calendar flipped, and is 5-9 overall. Their home rivalry game against Haines City is Jan. 24.

All Saints is 9-1, winners of six in a row, and had its only loss in early December against district-foe Canterbury.

Speeding around the learning curve?

My career in community journalism began on July 26, 1964, a date I can remember because it was the day after I was discharged from two years in the Active Army.

Local government would become my primary reportorial focus over the next 46 years.

Early on, I remember hearing a city commissioner observe — many times — that it is amazing how quickly newly-elected legislators became smarter than the people who elected them.

It was clear that the city commissioner did not share the high self-opinion of freshmen legislators. The phenomenon he described has given rise to at least two terms commonly used in government: home rule and unfunded mandates.

Home rule powers were established by a 1968 amendment to the Florida Constitution, which was approved by the voters. It basically gives cities (and charter counties) control over their local governance.

Unfunded mandates are rules imposed by the Legislature (or Congress) without funds to carry them out. It is a form of generosity practiced by state and federal lawmakers using somebody else's money.

(Although city and county commissioners are fond of saying that the burden falls on local government, the fact is that local taxes come from local taxpayers, not local politicians.)

The Florida League of Cities has made home rule its major focus for 2019, rallying behind the slogan, "We Live Local."

Leo Longworth, Bartow's mayor, is president of the League, and is taking

the message to as many organizations as he can address to seek citizen support for telling lawmakers, in the League's words, "to stop meddling in our backyards."

His cause deserves support.

While the state properly should concern itself with competent local governance in Florida's municipalities, the Legislature goes far beyond what is called for.

Among issues cited by the League:

- The state has preempted regulation of rental housing to allow what the League calls "unruly mini-hotels" in residential neighborhoods. Few issues are as essential to municipal government as planning and zoning, and this is a classic area where local control is essential.

- The state does not allow cities to regulate the placement and appearance

of small cellular phone equipment on local rights-of-way. This visual clutter is a blight on streetscapes.

- The state is attempting to specify when city elections must be held. It is hard to think of a bona fide state interest in scheduling local election dates.

According to the League's materials, the Legislature has entertained "141 attacks on Home Rule" in the past two years.

The Legislature has enough statewide problems that are its own responsibility to solve without trying to micro-manage local government.

(S. L. Frisbie is retired. Politicians often speak of a "learning curve" that newcomers to public office must master. He suggests that lawmakers at the state level take it a little slower around the curve, and master their own jobs before injecting their newly-discovered expertise into local government issues.)

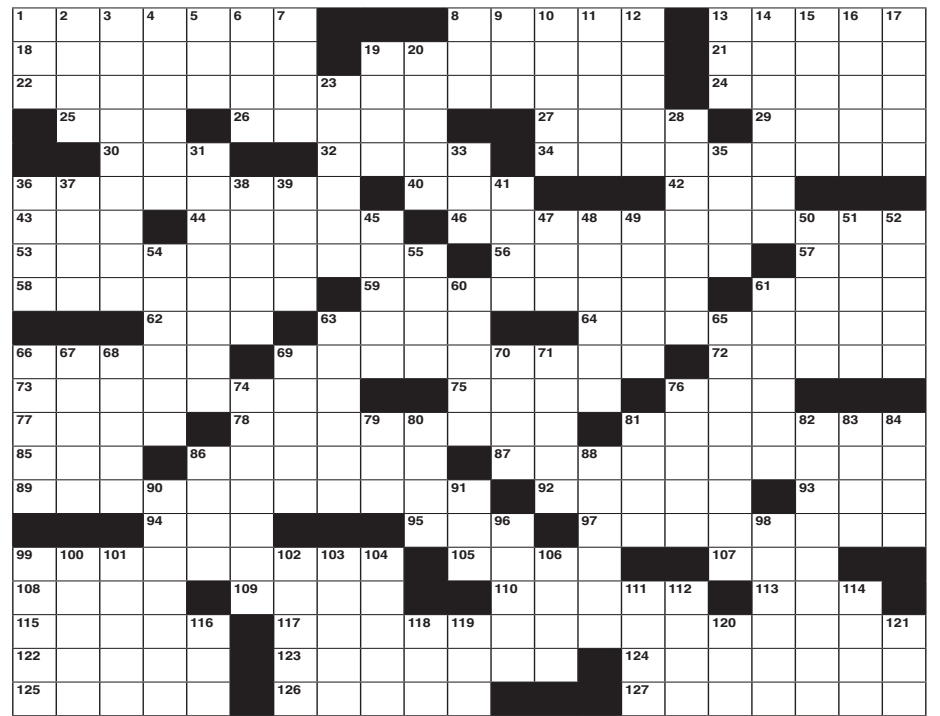

Beneath the Chinaberry Tree

Odds, ends and curious facts from yesterday's news

The Herald, a Winter Haven weekly newspaper, ceased publication some years ago. Published by George and Josephine Burr, the paper often chronicled events from Winter Haven's early history. Here are a few excerpts from May 27, 1955.

First fences: Population vs. pigs

How large a population would you guess Winter Haven had in 1913?

There was no official state or government census that year, but the town had 1,013 people. It was noted that either the state or county had a peculiar law on the books that said a community could not legislate against cattle or hogs, etc., roaming the streets and highways at will unless said community had a bona fide population of 1,000 or more. City residents were working to create a more progressive image and livestock running loose wasn't a part of that plan. The census, and the resulting 13 resident surplus, provided the solution.

First cars: No need for a parking garage in 1912

How many present-day Havenites have seen or heard of a K.R.I.T. automobile? If you had lived here in 1912 or 1913, you would have seen a number of them. In 1912, the town had about 20 cars and at least five were "Krits." They were among the more than 2,300 different makes of motorcars that were a part of America's early automotive industry. They looked like other vehicles of the day, such as Oldsmobile and Hupp, but they were

reported to be particularly good in negotiating Florida's sand roads.

First child, school, teacher

Early accounts of Winter Haven mention the birth of the first child born, named Paul W. Baily. Born in 1885, Mr. Baily went on to a successful career in real estate and citrus. His older sister Lillian was one of seven children to attend the town's first public school when it opened in 1887. Miss Bessie Walker was the teacher.

First chamber president, first Banker's Cup Award

The late John F. May had been president of the Florida Orange Festival for many of its early years. He also served as president of the Winter Haven Chamber upon its official transition from a Board of Trade (founded 1910) to a Chamber in 1923. Mr. May was termed a veritable "one man Chamber of Commerce" and one of the most indefatigable civic workers any city ever had. He was awarded the first Banker's Cup Award in 1924 and subsequently won it two more times which, at the time, permitted him to retain the trophy. The Banker's Cup is Winter Haven's oldest recognition for accomplishment and community service. That first Banker's Cup is on display in the Museum of Winter Haven History.

First brick building

Winter Haven's first brick building was the Plaza Hotel, built in 1908, followed by the Snell Bank Building (now Times Square), in 1911, and then the Christian Church in 1912. Only the Snell building remains in 2019.

First mass transit: Peggy

Early in the last century, residents traveled between Bartow, Winter Haven and Chubb (Lake Alfred) on a wood-burning locomotive affectionately called "Peggy." It is said that young couples would dress and travel to Chubb on Sunday afternoons for excitement.

The Museum of Winter Haven History is open Saturdays from 9 a.m. to Noon. An exhibit tour is offered at 10 a.m. Group tours are available for four or more people by appointment. The museum, located at 660 Pope Ave. and Lake Howard Dr., is free and open to the public. Come explore. For further information contact Bob Gernert, 863-206-6855 or bobgernert@gmail.com

The IRS is recalling 46,000 workers to handle tax returns

Employees won't be paid during government shutdown

WASHINGTON — The Internal Revenue Service is recalling about 46,000 of its employees furloughed by the government shutdown — nearly 60 percent of its workforce — to handle tax returns and pay out refunds. The employees won't be paid during the shutdown.

With the official start of the tax filing season coming Jan. 28, the Trump administration has promised that

taxpayers owed refunds will be paid on time, despite the disruption in government services caused by the partial shutdown now in its fourth week.

There had been growing concern that the shutdown would delay refunds worth hundreds of billions of dollars because the money wouldn't be available for them from Congress. But last week, the administration said customary shutdown policies will be reversed to make the money available to pay refunds on time.

'I will not be bullied'

Trump's attorney general nominee asserts independence from White House

WASHINGTON — Vowing "I will not be bullied," President Donald Trump's nominee for attorney general asserted independence from the White House on Tuesday, saying he believed that Russia had tried to interfere in the 2016 presidential election, that the special counsel investigation shadowing Trump is not a witch hunt and that his predecessor was right to recuse himself from the probe.

The comments by William Barr at his Senate confirmation hearing pointedly departed from Trump's own views and underscored Barr's efforts to reassure Democrats that he will not be a loyalist to a president who has appeared to demand it from law enforcement. He also repeatedly sought to assuage concerns that he might disturb or upend special counsel Robert Mueller's investigation as it reaches its final stages.

Some Democrats are concerned about that very possibility, citing a memo Barr wrote to the Justice Department before his nomination in which he criticized Mueller's investigation for the way it was presumably looking into

UK's May sees Brexit plan crushed in Parliament

British Prime Minister faces no-confidence vote today

LONDON — British lawmakers overwhelmingly rejected Prime Minister Theresa May's divorce deal with the European Union on Tuesday, plunging the Brexit process into chaos and triggering a no-confidence vote that could topple her government.

The defeat was widely expected, but the scale of the House of Commons' vote — 432 votes against the government and 202 in support — was devastating for May's fragile leadership.

It followed more than two years of political upheaval

in which May has staked her political reputation on getting a Brexit deal and was the biggest defeat for a government in the House of Commons in modern history.

Moments after the result was announced — with Speaker John Bercow bellowing "the noes have it" to a packed Commons chamber — May said it was only right to test whether the government still had lawmakers' support to carry on. Opposition leader Jeremy Corbyn quickly obliged, saying May's government had lost the confidence of Parliament.

Lawmakers will vote Wednesday on his motion of

US Sugar, mystery DC group among top donors to inaugural pot

TALLAHASSEE — When Gov. Ron DeSantis took his oath on the steps of the Old Capitol in front of more than 2,000 people, then danced with the first lady to a live jazz band at the Inaugural Ball, one question lingered: Who paid for this?

Because DeSantis' inauguration fund-raised through the state Republican Party, it's impossible to separate donations used for the inaugural festivities and other party needs. The inaugural programs listed sponsors, but no amounts.

However, new finance reports begin to provide some answers.

U.S. Sugar donated \$350,000 to the Republican Party of Florida between the midterm election and the end of 2018, making it the No. 1 donor for that time period.

During the campaign and since his election, DeSantis has made repeated comments calling out the sugar industry as being inhibitors of toxic algae cleanup in a way that was unprecedented for a Republican candidate for governor. In one of the primary debates, DeSantis even labeled his primary opponent Adam Putnam, as the sugar industry's "errand boy." Putnam was Florida's Agricultural

Commissioner at the time.

When asked if U.S. Sugar's donation went toward the governor's inauguration, RPOF spokeswoman Yohana de la Torre responded in a statement saying donations in this time period were not "earmarked," meaning that all the donations were deposited into the party's account and then spent on inaugural events as needed.

Meredith Beatrice, spokeswoman for the governor's office, also emphasized the list of expenses other than the governor's inauguration that would have benefited from U.S. Sugar's donation.

"The donation to which you refer was to the Republican Party of Florida general revenue fund and may be used at the discretion of the chairman and the executive committee," she said.

Because the inauguration was paid for by the Republican Party of Florida, the same account used for the inauguration was also used to recoup legal fees from the midterm recounts and was available for any inaugural events for Chief Financial Officer Jimmy Patronis and Attorney General Ashley Moody. Patronis held a modest event at a local Tallahassee pizza parlor. Moody never released a schedule of inaugural events.

Kimberly Mitchell, executive director of the

Everglades Trust, which made a surprise endorsement of DeSantis in the general election, said she is certain the donation from the sugar industry will have no effect on DeSantis' policy.

In his first week in office, DeSantis announced a sweeping executive order aimed at cleaning up the toxic algae and also asked all the members of the South Florida Water Management District, who approved a last-minute extension to the sugar industry's lease, to resign.

"It's not a concern. I know Ron DeSantis and ... this is not a man who can be bought," Mitchell said. "What you're highlighting is something that is troubling and has been for long time which is the influence and the sheer dollar amount that is doled out to politicians is obscene. They are desperately trying to do anything they can to change the tide — and they can't."

U.S. Sugar did not respond to multiple requests for comment.

Another top donor to the Republican Party of Florida is a health care management company, Centene, which is a parent company for others that contract with the state to provide Medicaid or health services in 61 Florida correctional facilities. Centene donated \$100,000.

Yet another \$100,000 donor is a mysterious

Washington group called the Center for Advancement of Integrity and Justice, which listed a Washington, D.C., address on Pennsylvania Avenue and its purpose as "advocacy" in contribution reports. However, the group has no website and just registered in October 2018 as a corporation in Delaware, a state known for lax business registry requirements.

No contact information was available for the group. A receptionist for the center's registered agent in Delaware, called the Corporation Trust Company, said they weren't legally allowed to provide any information

on their clients.

Associated Industries of Florida, a powerful lobbying group, donated just over \$290,000 in their name and also through their affiliated political committees.

Others in the \$100,000 category: Florida Power and Light, the Florida Association of Realtors, private prison operator The Geo Group, Blue Cross Blue Shield, Consulate Health Care and the Republican Governors' Association.

Tampa's Third Lake Capital, LLC, part of the Ashley Furniture family of companies, also donated \$100,000. ZWB Holdings, an Orlando real estate

investment company, donated the same amount.

Disney donated \$75,000, while Ashbritt, the massive debris pickup company that has fallen under state scrutiny — and employed DeSantis' new emergency management chief former Rep. Jared Moskowitz — donated \$50,000.

Utility giant Duke Energy, Florida's largest payday loan company AmScott, and Surterra, the medical marijuana company, also donated \$50,000 each.

Defense seeks evidence from school shooting commission

FORT LAUDERDALE (AP) — Lawyers for Florida school shooting suspect Nikolas Cruz sought Tuesday to pry loose evidence for his defense from a state commission that investigated last year's Valentine's Day massacre at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School.

The commission did dozens of interviews and collected numerous pieces of evidence before releasing its 446-page report earlier this month. Cruz attorney Melisa McNeill said at a hearing Tuesday the defense needs access to that material for his defense.

"We don't know what they have. We just want

to know what they have," McNeill told Circuit Judge Elizabeth Scherer.

Jason Jones, who represents the chairman of the 15-member Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School Public Safety Commission, said most of the key witness statements and transcripts had already been turned over to Broward County prosecutors. Jones said he'd have a list of other evidence to Cruz's defense by Friday.

"We have turned over all recorded and or transcribed statements," Jones said. "All those have been turned over to the state as we promised."

Assistant State Attorney Steven Klinger said prosecutors were still going through about 180 witness statements collected by the commission but would soon turn them over to Cruz's lawyers. Judge

Scherer set a Jan. 29 deadline for that to happen.

Jury awards family \$500M in wrongful death lawsuit

JACKSONVILLE (AP) — A Florida jury has awarded nearly \$500 million to the family of a woman fatally shot during an argument in a car in 2011.

The family of 20-year-old Kalil McCoy of Jacksonville filed a wrongful death lawsuit against the man who shot her and two other men who helped dump her body.

Frederick Lee Wade was sentenced to 45 years for second-degree murder in 2017. The other men pleaded guilty to accessory charges.

On Tuesday, a Duval County jury awarded McCoy's family over

\$495 million for emotional distress and punitive damages.

The family's attorney, John M. Phillips, said he sought an eight-figure award to send a message that violent criminals will "get prosecuted and get punitive damages" in Florida.

Phillips said the case will be turned over to collection attorneys.

7 people accused of using Florida teen as sex slave

OCALA (AP) — Seven people have been arrested in a human trafficking case in Florida involving a 15-year-old boy who investigators say was used as a sex slave.

News outlets quote St. Petersburg police Maj. Mark Hensley as saying

that six men and a woman have been arrested. He says the men introduced the boy to sadomasochism.

Investigators say a woman the boy knew introduced him to two men after he said he was unhappy with his life at home. The boy left a note for his mother telling her not to try to find him, but she went to the sheriff's office.

Hensley says the boy is receiving special care designed for human trafficking victims. Police believe there could be more victims.

Good Samaritan's pickup stolen while helping crash victims

DAYTONA BEACH (AP) — Investigators say a 27-year-old Florida

man caused a crash on Interstate 95 and then stole a pickup truck from a man who stopped to help.

Florida Highway Patrol Lt. Kim Montes said in a statement that 27-year-old Zachary Searls hit a van in front of him Monday night. Searls' car then hit a tree and caught fire.

Montes says 52-year-old Felix Coffman stopped to help. When Coffman got out of his truck, Searls got in it and drove away, Montes says.

Volusia County Sheriff's deputies say they found the truck parked outside Searls' home a short time later and arrested him. He's charged with several offenses including grand theft of a motor vehicle and is being held on a \$6,000 bond.

No attorney for Searls was listed in court records.

Extremists attack Kenya hotel; al-Shabab claims role

NAIROBI, Kenya — Militants stormed a luxury hotel in Kenya's capital on Tuesday, setting off thunderous explosions and gunning down people at cafe tables and offices in an attack claimed by Africa's deadliest Islamic extremist group. Witnesses reported seeing several bodies.

"It is terrible. What I have seen is terrible," said Charles Njenga, who ran from a scene of blood, broken glass, burning vehicles and pillars of black smoke.

Al-Shabab — the Somalia-based group that carried out the 2013 Westgate Mall attack in Nairobi that left 67 people dead — claimed responsibility for the bloodshed at the DusitD2 hotel complex, which includes bars, restaurants, offices and banks and is in a well-to-do neighborhood with many American, European and Indian expatriates.

Authorities sent special forces into the hotel to

flush out the gunmen believed holed up inside. Late Tuesday night, about eight hours after the siege began, Interior Minister Fred Matian'i said that all of the buildings affected by the attack had been secured and that security forces were mopping up.

"I would like to reiterate that the situation is under control and the country is safe," he said.

He did not say give a toll of the dead and wounded. And it was not clear how many attackers took part in the siege.

However, a police officer who spoke on condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to talk to the media said that bodies were seen in restaurants downstairs and in offices upstairs, but "there was no time to count

the dead."

Also, a witness who gave his name only as Ken said he saw five bodies at the hotel entrance. He said that other people were shouting for help and "when we rushed back to try to rescue them, gunshots started coming from upstairs, and we had to duck because they were targeting us and we could see two guys shooting."

New migrant caravan sets out from Honduras for US

SAN PEDRO SULA, Honduras — Hundreds of Hondurans trekked out of a violent northern city Tuesday, part of a new caravan of migrants hoping to reach the United States or Mexico, following in the path of another group last year that U.S. President Donald Trump turned into a hot political issue during the U.S. midterm elections.

The first groups of migrants left San Pedro Sula's bus station Monday night, with many women and children boarding buses bound for the Guatemalan border while others started walking and hitchhiking under a steady rain.

Others departed Tuesday morning trying to catch up. Some pushed toddlers in strollers or walked holding older children's hands. More people continued to arrive at the bus station, making it likely the caravan's numbers could grow.

Honduran media reported that the country's

authorities had reinforced the border with Guatemala to make sure everyone had proper documentation. Children must carry passports and written parental authorization to leave the country, and parents could face up to three years in prison if found to be taking a child without the right documents, Security Minister Julian Pacheco was quoted as saying.

The latest caravan comes as Trump has been working to convince the American public that there is a "crisis" at the southern border to justify construction of his long-promised border wall. Trump's demand for billions of dollars to build the wall has resulted in a standoff with Congress that has forced a partial government shutdown.

"A big new Caravan is heading up to our Southern Border from Honduras. Tell Nancy and Chuck that a drone flying around will not stop them. Only a Wall will work," Trump tweeted Tuesday.

Feds say 'star' DEA agent abroad stole millions

MIAMI — A U.S. federal narcotics agent known for his expensive tastes and high-profile drug seizures has been implicated in a multimillion-dollar money-laundering conspiracy that involved the very cartel criminals he was charged with fighting in Colombia.

A once standout Drug Enforcement Administration agent, Jose Irizarry is accused of conspiring with a longtime DEA informant to launder more than \$7 million in illicit drug proceeds, sometimes using

an underground network known as the black-market peso exchange, according to five current and former law enforcement officials.

The officials described the case as one of the biggest black eyes in the history of the DEA, an agency that has seen repeated scandals in recent years, and one they fear could have compromised undercover operations in the U.S. and South America.

The conspiracy not only allegedly enriched Irizarry but is believed to have benefited one of South America's top money launderers, who is a relative of Irizarry's Colombian wife, said the

officials, who spoke to The Associated Press on the condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to discuss the federal investigation.

The allegations have sent shockwaves through the DEA and drawn new scrutiny to the agency's Colombia field office, a critical outpost that has been steeped in turmoil in recent years. The division has seen internal strife and turnover in leadership even as it grapples with record-high levels of cocaine production.

Some of the details emerged in a federal case in Tampa, Florida, in which a former DEA informant, Gustavo Yabrudi,

a dual Venezuelan-American citizen, recently pleaded guilty to money laundering. That case refers to an unnamed "co-conspirator 3" — a suspect who is in fact Irizarry, the five officials said.

It is unknown where the 44-year-old Irizarry is living, or whether he has been charged in the ongoing criminal probe. Repeated messages seeking comment left on a cellphone number the law enforcement officials said belongs to Irizarry were not returned.

Chad Van Horn, a Miami attorney who represented Irizarry in a bankruptcy case, said he had no

comment and could provide no assistance in efforts to reach him. Barry Wax, a Miami defense attorney who has also represented Irizarry, did not return phone calls and emails seeking comment.

A DEA spokeswoman said Irizarry resigned from the agency after he was recalled from Colombia to Washington in 2017 but declined further comment.

When word of the scandal reached Washington that year, the FBI and Justice Department dispatched investigators to Colombia to conduct criminal and internal inquiries, fearing that it could backfire on the

DEA's ability to keep the trust of sources in the criminal underworld, the law enforcement officials said.

The case raises new questions about the DEA's screening practices in its hiring of special agents. Irizarry was hired by the DEA despite indications he showed signs of deception in a polygraph exam he took upon admission, three of the law enforcement officials said.

There were other red flags. In 2010, Irizarry declared bankruptcy with debts of almost \$500,000, but he was nevertheless permitted to handle financial transactions in his role at the DEA.

Federal workers take on odd jobs to make ends meet

PROVIDENCE, R.I. — When her paychecks dried up because of the partial government shutdown, Cheryl Inzunza Blum sought out a side job that has become a popular option in the current economy: She rented out a room on Airbnb.

Other government workers are driving for Uber, relying on word-of-mouth and social networks to find handyman work and looking for traditional temp gigs to help pay the bills during the longest shutdown in U.S. history.

The hundreds of thousands of out-of-work government employees have more options than in past shutdowns given the rise of the so-called "gig economy" that has made an entire workforce out of people doing home vacation rentals and driving for companies like Uber, Lyft and Postmates.

Blum decided to capitalize on the busy winter travel season in Arizona to help make ends meet after she stopped getting paid for her government contract work as a lawyer in immigration court in Tucson. She said she has no choice but to continue to work unpaid because she has clients who are depending on her, some of whom are detained or have court hearings.

But she also has bills: her Arizona state bar dues, malpractice insurance and a more than \$500 phone bill for the past two months because she uses her phone so heavily for work. Blum has been tapping every source she can to keep herself afloat — even her high school- and college-aged children — and is even thinking about driving for Uber and Lyft as well.

"So after working in court all day I'm going to go home and get the room super clean because they're arriving this evening," she said of

her Airbnb renters.

"I have a young man who's visiting town to do some biking, and he's going to come tomorrow and stay a week," she added. "I'm thrilled because that means immediate money. Once they check in, the next day there's some money in my account."

The shutdown is occurring against the backdrop of a strong economy that has millions of open jobs, along with ample opportunities to pick up Uber and Lyft shifts.

The Labor Department reported that employers posted 6.9 million jobs in November, the latest figures available. That's not far from the record high of 7.3 million reached in August.

Roughly 8,700 Uber driver positions are advertised nationwide on the SnagAJob website, while Lyft advertises about 3,000.

But the gig economy doesn't pay all that well — something the furloughed government workers are finding out.

Pay for such workers has declined over the past two years, and they are earning a growing share of their income elsewhere, a recent study found. Most Americans who earn income through online platforms do so for only a few months each year, according to the study by the JPMorgan Chase Institute.

Some employers were looking at the shutdown as a way to recruit, at least temporarily.

American Labor Services, a staffing agency that employs 500 people a week in Rhode Island and Massachusetts, sent out an appeal to furloughed federal workers on Monday, asking them to get in touch for clerical or light-industrial work.

"Some might not realize that they could get something temporary, it could last for a short period," said Ben Kaplan, the company's president and CEO.

Judge bars citizenship question from 2020 census

NEW YORK — A federal judge blocked the Trump administration Tuesday from asking about citizenship status on the 2020 census, the first major ruling in cases contending that officials ramrodded the question through for Republican political purposes to intentionally undercount immigrants.

In a 277-page decision that won't be the final word on the issue, Judge Jesse M. Furman ruled that while such a question would be constitutional, Commerce Secretary Wilbur Ross had added it arbitrarily and not followed proper administrative procedures.

"He failed to consider several important aspects of the problem; alternately ignored, cherry-picked, or badly misconstrued the evidence in the record before him; acted irrationally both in light of that evidence and his own stated decisional criteria; and failed to justify significant departures from past policies and

practices," Furman wrote.

Ross' explanations for his decision were "unsupported by, or even counter to, the evidence before the agency," the judge said.

Among other things, the judge said, Ross didn't follow a law requiring that he give Congress three years notice of any plan to add a question about citizenship to the census.

The ruling came in cases in which 18 states, the District of Columbia, and 15 big cities or counties, and immigrants' rights groups argued that the Commerce Department, which designs the census, had failed to properly analyze the effect the question would have on households where immigrants live.

A trial on a separate

suit on the same issue, filed by the state of California, is underway in San Francisco. The U.S. Supreme Court is also poised to address the issue Feb. 19, meaning the legal issue is far from decided for good.

"We are disappointed and are still reviewing the ruling," Justice Department spokeswoman Kelly Laco said in a statement.

AP sources: Gillibrand moving toward 2020 bid in coming days

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Kirsten Gillibrand is expected to move toward launching a 2020 presidential campaign within days by forming an exploratory committee, according to several people familiar with her plans.

The New York Democrat will likely announce her intentions ahead of a trip to Iowa this weekend, one person said. She will be a guest Tuesday night on CBS' "The Late Show with Stephen Colbert."

The people spoke to The Associated Press on condition of anonymity because they weren't authorized to speak on Gillibrand's timing. Gillibrand's representatives didn't comment Monday on her plans.

Gillibrand would become the fifth Democrat — and second senator — to jump into a presidential primary that could ultimately feature dozens of candidates. Sen. Elizabeth Warren of Massachusetts along with former Obama Cabinet member Julian Castro and Rep. Tulsi Gabbard of Hawaii are among those who have taken steps toward a 2020 run. Sens. Cory Booker of New Jersey and Kamala Harris of California could also enter the race soon.

Effervescent 'Hello, Dolly!' icon Carol Channing mourned

stars like Kristin Chenoweth and Bette Midler poured in to honor the life and career of Carol Channing, the three-time Tony Award-winning musical comedy star who delighted American audiences over 5,000 performances as the scheming Dolly Levi in "Hello, Dolly!" on Broadway and beyond. She died Tuesday at 97.

Publicist B. Harlan Boll said Channing died of natural causes at 12:31 a.m. Tuesday in Rancho Mirage, California. Boll said she had twice suffered strokes in the last year.

Besides "Hello, Dolly!," Channing starred in other Broadway shows, but none with equal magnetism. She often appeared on television and in nightclubs, for a time partnering with George Burns in Las Vegas and a national tour.

"Channing was one of the few who paved the path for so many women in theater and beyond," Chenoweth wrote on Twitter. "I will forever

admire and look up to you, Carol." Midler called Channing "a complete original" and "a legend."

Netflix raising prices for 58M US subscribers as costs rise

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Netflix is raising its U.S. prices by 13 percent to 18 percent, its biggest increase since the company launched its video streaming service 12 years ago.

Its most popular plan will see the largest hike, to \$13 per month from \$11. That option offers high-definition streaming on up to two different internet-connected devices simultaneously. Even at the higher price, that plan is still a few dollars cheaper than HBO, whose streaming service charges \$15 per month.

The extra cash will help to pay for Netflix's huge investment in original shows and films and finance the heavy debt it has assumed to ward off rivals such as

Amazon, Disney and AT&T.

While subscribers may bemoan a bigger monthly bill Wall Street cheered, sending shares up more than 6 percent in midday trading.

This marks the fourth time that Netflix has raised its U.S. prices; the last hike came in late 2017. But this is the first time that higher prices will hit all 58 million U.S. subscribers, the number Netflix reported at the end of September.

Chunk of Tappan Zee Bridge is demolished with explosives

TARRYTOWN, N.Y. (AP) — A big chunk of the Tappan Zee Bridge went down in history — and the Hudson — on Tuesday after a detonation that thrilled onlookers who played hooky from work and school to watch the spectacle.

Despite a few delays, the crowds had cameras at the ready when a boom shook the ground and rattled trees. Acrid black smoke filled the air as the structure dropped straight into the river. It remained about half submerged; the remnants will be salvaged and recycled.

The structure has already been replaced by the Gov. Mario M. Cuomo Bridge, which carries Interstate 87 traffic between Westchester and Rockland counties, about 30 miles north of New York City, at one of the broad Hudson River's widest spots. The new bridge, which parallels the old one, was closed to traffic during the demolition.

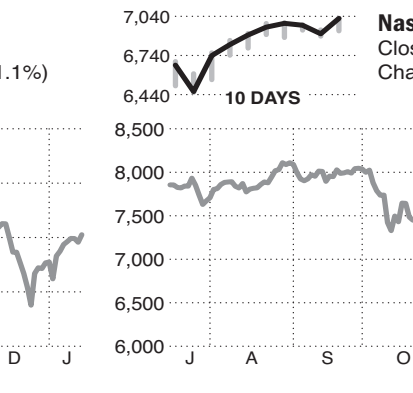
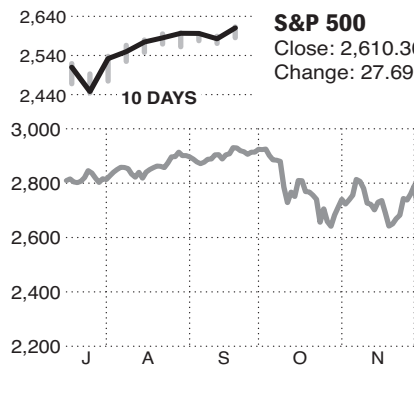

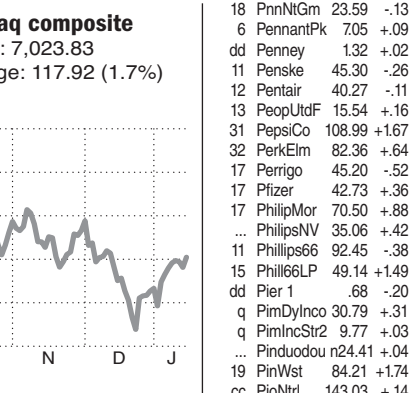

US indexes hit one-month highs as Netflix leads tech rally

NEW YORK — U.S. stocks rallied to their highest level in more than a month Tuesday after China's government moved to inject more life into its economy by cutting taxes and increasing spending. Netflix led a surge in high-tech companies.

The S&P 500 index rose 27.69 points, or 1.1 percent, to 2,610.30, its first close above 2,600 since Dec 13. The Dow Jones Industrial Average added 155.75 points, or 0.7 percent, to 24,065.59.

The technology-heavy Nasdaq composite jumped 117.92 points, or 1.7 percent, to 7,023.83. Oil prices rose as investors felt a bit better about China's economic growth.

DEAR DR. ROACH: My heartbeat is around 98-100 per minute. I checked with my primary doctor, and she said it's normal, as I am getting older. (I'm 48 now, female, and other than heartbeat, my health is normal.) My doctor checked my blood and said everything is normal except low calcium. I can work all day long, but I can't run even three minutes. Do you think I have a heart problem or am just getting older like my doctor said? — V.N.

ascribing symptoms to getting older.

If no condition is found, an exercise regimen should help you tolerate more activity and slow your heart rate.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I received my laboratory values (a "complete metabolic panel") from my doctor. What do all these results mean? What organs are they reflecting? How can you tell if the results are good or bad? — C.J.

ANSWER: A complete metabolic panel is a standard set of 14 blood tests. It is not a complete look at the body, but it does evaluate function of kidneys and liver.

The kidney tests include the electrolytes and calcium, as well as two measures of kidney function: blood urea nitrogen and creatinine. Abnormalities of these numbers can indicate disorders of salt and water balance or intrinsic kidney disease. The carbon dioxide level may indicate lung issues.

The liver tests are total protein and albumin, the liver enzymes (ALT, AST and alkaline

phosphatase), and the bile and breakdown product bilirubin. There are many types of liver diseases, and they can make those levels too high, reflecting liver cell damage (especially the enzymes ALT, AST) or obstruction of bile flow (alkaline phosphatase and bilirubin), or too low (low protein levels mean any kind of severe liver damage). A high bilirubin can indicate breakdown of red blood cells.

The last test in a complete metabolic panel is the glucose. Diabetes is often diagnosed with an abnormal glucose on routine lab testing before any symptoms are noticed.

Although the "normal" ranges are given to you along with your results, a normal result doesn't always mean everything is fine, nor does a result outside the range always indicate a problem with one of these organs. Results need to be interpreted with the person in mind, and with the recognition that about 5 percent of values in healthy people fall outside the range.

About 10,000 employees are deemed essential and have been working. Some 800,000 federal employees have been furloughed or are working without pay. President Donald Trump didn't budge Tuesday from his demand to have Congress provide \$5.7 billion to build his promised border wall with Mexico. Democrats say they will discuss border security once the government has reopened, but House Speaker Nancy Pelosi is refusing money for the wall Democrats view as ineffective and immoral. About three-quarters of U.S. taxpayers receive annual refunds, giving them an incentive to file their returns early. Many lower-income people count on refunds as their biggest cash infusion of the year. Overall, refunds average \$2,800. The issue is politically sensitive. The massive tax law enacted by

Republicans in Congress in late 2017, which is President Donald Trump's signature legislative achievement, gave generous tax cuts to corporations and the wealthiest Americans and more modest reductions to middle- and low-income households. The law is expected to bring lower taxes for 2018 for the great majority of Americans, and the refunds are a big tangible part of that. Trump told supporters on a conference call Tuesday that his administration has been working to minimize the painful impacts of the shutdown. "People are actually amazed that, with this many people, that government is really working so well. So we're very proud of that," he said. Angered over employees having to work without pay, the union representing IRS staff sued in federal court last week to challenge any such agency action on constitutional grounds. The Constitution doesn't allow the government to obligate funds that haven't been

provided by Congress, and the executive branch "can't continue to force more and more employees to show up in exchange only for an IOU," the National Treasury Employees Union said. On Tuesday, a federal judge rejected the union's challenge, declining to force the government to pay the recalled employees. Some experts question whether the administration has the legal authority to reverse earlier policies to allow the government to issue tax refunds during a shutdown. In 2011, the chief counsel at the IRS concluded that such payments were legally allowed during a shutdown. At the time, the White House Office of Management and Budget, under President Barack Obama, rejected that position and directed the IRS not to pay refunds during a shutdown. But the IRS said last week that OMB had reviewed the issue at the Treasury's Department's request and now agrees with the IRS counsel's position that refunds can legally be paid.

whether Trump had obstructed justice. Sen. Dianne Feinstein of California, top Democrat on the Senate Judiciary Committee, told Barr the memo showed "a determined effort, I thought, to undermine Bob Mueller." The nominee told senators he was merely trying to warn Justice Department officials against "stretching a statute" to conclude that the president had obstructed justice. Though Barr said an attorney general should work in concert with an administration's policy goals, he broke from some Trump talking points, including the president's mantra that the Russia probe is a witch hunt. Trump has equivocated on Russian meddling in the 2016 presidential election and assailed and pushed out his first attorney general, Jeff Sessions, for recusing

because of his work with the Trump campaign. Barr stated without hesitation that it was in the public interest for Mueller to finish his investigation into whether the Trump campaign coordinated with the Kremlin to sway the election. He said he would not fire Mueller even if Trump asked him to do it and called it "unimaginable" that Mueller would do anything to require his termination. "I believe the Russians interfered or attempted to interfere with the election, and I think we have to get to the bottom of it," Barr said. Positioning himself as independent from the president, he said that, at 68 years old and partially retired, he felt emboldened to "do the right thing and not really care about the consequences." "I will not be bullied into doing anything that I think is wrong by anybody, whether it be editorial boards or Congress or the president," Barr told the hearing.

no-confidence. If the government loses, it will have 14 days to overturn the result or face a national election. Although May lacks an overall majority in Parliament, she looks likely to survive the vote unless lawmakers from her Conservative party rebel. Northern Ireland's Democratic Unionist Party, which props up May's government, said it would support her. "The House has spoken and the government will listen," May said after the vote, which leaves her

Brexit plan on life support just 10 weeks before the country is due to leave the EU on March 29. May promised to consult lawmakers on future moves, but gave little indication of what she plans to do next. Parliament has given the government until Monday to come up with a new proposal. She faces a stark choice: Steer the country toward an abrupt "no-deal" break with the EU or try to nudge it toward a softer departure. Meanwhile, lawmakers from both government and opposition parties are trying to wrest control of the Brexit process from a paralyzed government, so that lawmakers by majority

vote can specify a new plan for Britain's EU exit. But with no clear majority in Parliament for any single alternate course, there is a growing chance that Britain may seek to postpone its departure date while politicians work on a new plan — or even hand the decision back to voters in a new referendum on EU membership. "If you can't resolve the impasse here in Westminster, then you have to refer it back to the people," said Labour Party lawmaker Chuka Umunna, who supports a second referendum. May, who had postponed a vote on the deal in December to avoid certain

defeat, had implored lawmakers to back her deal and deliver on voters' decision in 2016 to leave the EU. But the deal was doomed by deep opposition from both sides of the divide over U.K.'s place in the bloc. Pro-Brexit lawmakers say the deal will leave Britain bound indefinitely to EU rules, while pro-EU politicians favor an even closer economic relationship with Europe. The most contentious section of the deal was an insurance policy known as the "backstop" designed to prevent the reintroduction of border controls between the U.K.'s Northern

Ireland and EU member Ireland. Assurances from EU leaders that the backstop is intended as a temporary measure of last resort completely failed to win over many British skeptics. Two and a half years after the referendum, Britain remains divided over how, and whether, to leave the EU. As lawmakers debated in the chamber, there was a cacophony of chants, drums and music from rival bands of pro-EU and pro-Brexit protesters outside. One group waved blue-and-yellow EU flags, the other brandished "Leave Means Leave" placards.
