LAKE WALES – State Attorney Brian Haas awarded seven area law enforcement heroes for excellence, bravery and quick thinking during the Polk County Police Chiefs Asso-

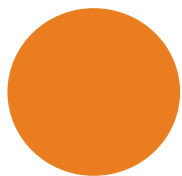
ciation's annual meeting in the Lake Ashton clubhouse Jan. 24.

Winter Haven Police Sgt. Christine Ford trained two of the seven heroes recognized.

On the job for 21 years this July, Ford — the 2003 Winter Haven Police Department Officer of the Year — also earned the 2019 Po-

lice Chief Association Distinguished Service Award (Large Department) for her work as training coordinator at the Polk State College Kenneth C. Thompson Public Safety Institution, the local police academy. Six of her classes have passed without a single failure, something no other coordinator has done in recent memory, according to her award.

## Proposed Davenport relief high school described as 'school of the future'

POLK COUNTY – The Polk County School Board met Jan. 22 to, in part, discuss the need to build a relief high school to match explosive population growth of late in the Davenport area.

"After we had the sales tax renewal, I want the public to understand what we are doing with those tax dollars," Superintendent Jacqueline Byrd told the board.

The proposed 330,000 square-foot school is projected to cost \$80 million and serve 2,500 students.

Right now, high-school aged students who live in Davenport either attend Haines City High or Ridge Community High, which are both at capacity. Staff said some students also go to school outside of Polk County.

School board member Kay Fields expressed some concern that the new high school may fill up soon after it opens. Staff said they are hoping that does not happen, but that if it does there is no existing plan to deal with such a problem.

If built as planned, construction would start this August and the school would be open by June 2021, staff said.

School board member Billy Townsend described the school as the Harrison School of the Arts in east Polk County, saying he hoped that would mean gifted arts students from east Polk would no longer need to be bussed all the way to Lakeland.

Staff said the school would have classes such as hospitality and hotel management, technology modeling and gaming, a fine arts academy, culinary arts, horticulture, landscaping, fashion

technology, computer programming such as digital video and digital camera, and applied engineering technology.

The address of the school has yet to be determined, but the proposed high school is to be built on property just west of the Davenport School of the Arts on County Road 547.

"I was so proud," Sgt. Ford said. "All three of us got honored that night."

Sgt. Ford was referring to herself and fellow award winners in Lake Wales Police Officer David Black and Polk County Sheriff's Detective Briana Bolin, who she helped train at the academy. Sgt. Ford and the three other training coordinators who work at the police academy have helped approximately 157 local recruits to graduate since 2014, around 20 of which now work for WHPD.

"I'm extremely lucky and thankful to WHPD to have this position, to do something I love every single day," Sgt. Ford said.

Below are the other law enforcement officers recognized, as well as the context for their recognition.

### No surrender

On April 16, 2018, just after 10 p.m., Lake Wales Police Officer David Black was conducting a traffic stop when he saw a man riding a bike without a headlight near the corner of State Road 60 and 12th St. Black asked the man to wait while he completed the traffic stop. He did not know that his suspect, an undocumented immigrant, had an incredibly violent criminal history.

A few minutes later, the suspect took off on his bike through the Orange Grove Shopping Center. After crashing, the suspect fled on foot and eventually wound up on top of Black, beating him with his own radio and baton. A witness stated that the suspect bit the officer twice.

Black withstood the beating, refusing to let go of the suspect or to allow him to escape.

"Had it not been for his level of fitness and will to survive, this incident certainly would have ended in tragedy," stated the award nomination. "This officer never gave up the fight."

The incident took Black out of action

for two weeks. For his heroism, he earned Officer of the Year from the PCPCA for a small department.

Brown said Black recently agreed to speak to her class of recruits and that he somehow managed to work humor into his presentation. Court records reveal that the suspect had previously been convicted of beating an Alturas woman in 2017.

### Digital detective work

The other award winner trained by Ford earned the Distinguished Service Award for the Polk County Sheriff's Office.

On March 27, 2018, Detective Briana Bolin was dispatched to a call in reference to a missing 10-year-old girl. While other deputies "pinged" the young girl's phone to get an approximate location, Bolin received permission to search the girl's electronic devices. Using her training, Bolin discovered that for weeks the girl had been exchanging graphic sexual messages with a 23-year-old Burger King manager from Miami who went by the the online persona of "El Yoni King Diaz," using the online app "Geeking," as well as Facebook Messenger.

Bolin found an image with the suspect's partial license plate number. A car matching the description she provided was found at a Motel 6 on U.S. 98 in Lakeland, where deputies found the two inside within 35 minutes of being dispatched for help. After questioning, the girl was returned home to her grandmother.

"(The suspect) is the poster child for why it's critical that parents monitor their children's activities online," Polk Sheriff Grady Judd said following the arrest

### Others recognized

The Officer of the Year (Large Department) went to Lakeland Police Officer Alex Rethwisch. On July 11, 2018, Rethwisch tried to pull over a man suspected of armed robbery. After a ve-

hicle and foot pursuit, the suspect allegedly shot Rethwisch multiple times, but the LPD officer never gave up and eventually the suspect dropped his weapon and surrendered. Despite the injuries, Rethwisch is already back on duty, according to LPD.

Deputy Sheriffs of the Year for the Polk County Sheriff's Office were Dep. Aaron Motta and Dep. Mark Pothier. On April 4, 2018, these deputies responded to a house fire in Lakeland. Upon arrival they were told the suspect who started the fire was in the backyard, armed with a knife. According to court records, the suspect was seen running back into the burning home while drinking a beer. The deputies forced entry, went inside and found the suspect unconscious, after which they brought him out to safety. Immediately after, a bystander said her puppy was inside the burning home. The deputies went back inside and rescued the puppy.

The Distinguished Service Award (Small Department) went to Florida Polytechnic University Officer Tommie

Jackson III. On Oct. 1, 2018, Jackson was first on the scene after a driver crashed into a pond. Jackson jumped into the water, rescued an infant in a car seat and the mother in the driver's seat, dragging them to safety.

"As a direct result of this officer's courageous intervention, a mother and a young child were saved," stated his award.

Also at the event, State Attorney Brian Haas installed the following officers for the PCPCA for 2019: Lake Wales Police Department Chief Chris Velasquez is the new president, Auburndale Police Chief Andy Ray is the new vice president and State Attorney's Office Executive Director Chris Nelson is the new secretary/treasurer. Retired Florida Polytechnic University Police Chief Rick Holland, Davenport Police Chief Larry Holden, retired Lake Hamilton Police Chief Ed Freeman, retired Haines City Police Chief Gary Hester and Lake Alfred Police Chief Art Bodenheimer are the new directors.

# School board celebrates Black History Month

POLK COUNTY – The Polk County School Board proclaimed February 2019 as Black History Month during its Jan. 22 board meeting, honoring some past and present black members.

Equity and Diversity Management Senior Director Ernest Joe honored board member Kay Fields for her years of service to the community.

Upon getting to the podium, Fields said there were restrictions placed on her due to the color of her skin while growing up in McComb, a town in Mississippi.

“My dad wanted us to become independent and not depend on anyone but ourselves,” Fields wrote by email when asked to elaborate on her Mississippi childhood. “He said education was the equalizer — then and now, that statement is so true and relevant. I believe that every child deserves an equal footing so they can be the best

they can be.”

Fields went on to honor school board members of color who paved the way to make Polk County Public Schools a diverse community.

George Gause was appointed the first black school board member in 1977. Gause was also mayor of Bartow before he died in 1986. Every year, the Bartow community honors Gause. Fields also honored Bartow resident and former school board member J.J. Corbett.

“Everybody knows Mr. J.J. Corbett,” Fields said. “He is an amazing man and is still active in the community.”

As a young man Corbett volunteered to be part of the first African-American paratrooper unit, the 555th Parachute Infantry — or Triple Nickles — during World War II. After an honorable discharge, Corbett taught and coached at Union Academy and Bartow High School for decades. After retiring, he volunteered as an official for around a decade.

Fields also honored Winter Haven residents Brenda Reddout and Debra Wright for their former service on the school board. Reddout now serves as executive director of Talbot House and Wright is still an active volunteer in the community. The school board recognized the leaders days after what would have been the

90th birthday of Martin Luther King Jr. Fields spoke of unity and the value of working together.

“If we do that, than Dr. King and many others would have not died in vain, so that we could have the freedoms that we have,” Fields said.

Winter Haven resident Craig Clevenger is a former Winter Haven High teacher and longtime active member of Kiwanis. Clevenger is on the board for Cypress Junction Montessori, a charter school, and the Public Education Partnership. He has also served

the community through the Greater Winter Haven Chamber of Commerce’s Government and Legislative Affairs Committee and is currently vice chair for Endeavor Winter Haven.

Lake Wales resident Angela Pulido Wadsworth was a trial lawyer with Lilly & Brown, LLP for 21 years before retiring in 2015. She is currently on the Lake Wales Charter Schools board and she has also served on other boards including the Lake Wales Chamber, Lake Wales Care Center, Lake Wales Arts Council and Holy Spirit Catholic Church Parish Council, among others.

# Fort Meade church celebrates 150 years with street festival

FORT MEADE — The oldest church in Polk County's oldest city is celebrating quite an anniversary.

First United Methodist Church of Fort Meade kicked off its 150th Anniversary Celebration in 2018, but the yearlong celebration is hitting its apex this month with a "Street Festival" this Saturday.

"We're winding it up," explained Pat Vancil, the member of the church responsible for planning the affair.

The festival will take place from Feb. 9 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. in front of the church, which is located at 135 E. Broadway St. in Fort Meade. Activities will include games and a bounce house for the children, as well as live music performances and plenty more.

For Pastor Marion Sortore, who has been at the church for nearly four years, it is a unique opportunity to be stationed in Fort Meade for this milestone occasion.

"To be here in this moment and realize that, for 150 years, men and women have been doing ministry," Sortore said. "It's 150 years of ministry in this community."

Indeed, the church is an important part of the fabric of the community in Fort Meade, with a reputation for lending a helping hand to members of the church and beyond.

"Everybody here and folks that don't even attend (this church) have roots here, explained Chuck Hancock, the church's historian and music director. "Everybody you

talk, to somebody has a family member that was here at one time."

Hancock, a pianist, will be playing a concert — "A Night at the Keys" — later in the evening Feb. 9.

The current church structure for First United Methodist was built in 1911 and has housed Sunday services and more for nearly 108 years. It has undergone renovations and additions — the large porch was added in the late 1960s, according to Hancock — but has been remarkably well-kept over the years.

Over those years, some of the church's oldest families has seen eight generations attend services there. Some of the church's longtime families have been celebrated over the past year, as well as the church's legacy of ministry and its sense of community.

"Fort Meade is known for its history — this church is probably one of the oldest churches in the state," said Jim Nunnallee. "The social aspects of it, the family aspects of it, are certainly a big part of what the church is."

The festival on Saturday is free and open to the public.

## WH chooses Zebra Longwing Butterfly as mascot

WINTER HAVEN – If you have lived in the area for awhile, it's likely that you have seen the painted fiberglass swans in front of Lakeland businesses. Known as Swansation, business owners purchase a "blank" fiberglass swan to paint as they choose, with proceeds benefiting local art projects.

Now, a group of Winter Haven leaders are trying to initiate a similar project.

The first step of the project was picking a city mascot. At the Jan. 28 City Commission meeting, Winter Haven Cultural Arts Advisory Committee members Judy Cleaves and Kurtis Flanders proposed making the Zebra Longwing Butterfly the city mascot.

"We can use this symbol to unite Winter Haven and enrich the community," Flanders said. "The City of Lakeland used its chosen mascot during the city art project Swansation to bring in \$370,000 for a local children's museum and several non-profits."

The Zebra Longwing Butterfly has already beautified a few places around the downtown area. Recently volunteers with Arts Ensemble Downtown Growing Positivity/Outer Space Gallery and members of the Cultural Arts Advisory Committee teamed up to place a public piano downtown, adorned with lots of brightly colored butterflies.

Outback Oasis owner Paul Schulz was recently commissioned to paint a Zebra Longwing Butterfly on a utility box in South Central Park.

Flanders and Cleaves said the Cultural Arts Advisory Committee considered several mascot ideas over the past year. Former committee member Macy Butler was first to come up with the idea. Butler proposed the Sand Hill Crane. Some said these would be harder to paint and creating the fiberglass mold may be expensive because those cranes tend to walk around in groups. Others thought the iconic image of a Cypress Gardens skier would be best.

"We are convinced that the Zebra Longwing Butterfly is the absolute best choice for Winter Haven's mascot," Flanders said. "A butterfly is symbolic in many theologies, representing change or transformation — beauty, life, and so much more."

The Zebra Longwing has been the state butterfly of Florida since 1996. It's the only species known to eat pol-

len and drink nectar, and the butterflies live five or six months — longer than other butterflies.

"Shouldn't our city mascot represent that we are unique, and that we work hard towards extended longevity," Flanders asked the commissioners

The commissioners agreed unanimously.

## Proposed assisted-living facility would include trails, retail

WINTER HAVEN – The Winter Haven City Commission meeting Jan. 28 lasted five hours.

It concluded with four-fifths of the commission voting 4-0 to send plans for a proposed "aging in place" assisted-living facility on Country Club Road to Tallahassee for state regulatory review just before midnight on Jan. 28.

The state regulators will allow public comment for two weeks, make a decision and send their decision back to the City Commission, who would make a final vote sometime in March or April.

Included in the proposed project would be a three-story assisted-living facility toward the center of the

70-acre property, several two-story townhouses so able spouses of those in assisted living can live close to their loved one, a meeting hall, a restaurant and around 4,000 square-feet of office space for businesses.

Sage Road, a dirt road to the old Humane Society building at Dundee Road, would be paved and extended from Dundee Road to Country Club Road. City staff said no commercial offices could open until the Sage Road extension is complete. Trails would wrap around three lakes on the property and connect the residents to Outback Oasis. The property was purchased over the past few years by Outback Oasis owner Paul Schulz.

For more than three hours, lawyers on both sides of the issue and 19 area residents stated their opinions, 12 in opposition and seven in support. Most in opposition said they preferred to keep the County Club Road area rural and

undeveloped. Many spoke of cows, beehives, quiet sunsets and tree-lined roads with little traffic.

One of the last to speak was Winter Haven City Commissioner Pete Chichetto, who lives near the proposed development, in the Hamilton Pointe subdivision, and spent \$500 to hire a lawyer to oppose the development.

"Would you like to see this across the street from your house?" Chichetto asked the commission.

Against legal advice, Mayor Brad Dantzler, whose family owns ranch land near the Schulz property, said he was going to support this project. The mayor said he has been driving on Country Club Road since a teenager and that if this proposal is not approved as planned, Schulz could instead build as many as 210 houses on the property — as currently zoned — and that Schulz could do so with-

out having to donate any of his land to extend Sage Road.

"My entire life I have wanted Sage Road to connect northeast Winter Haven to southeast Winter Haven, and the only way to get that is through this development," Dantzler said. "If we don't approve this we won't get that connector road. ... In spite of whatever we feel about development, the property is going to be developed. We can't stop everybody from developing their plans."

The commission also voted 4-1 in opposition of a proposed concrete-crushing business on West Lake Hamilton Road on grounds of noise, water pollution and proximity to residential housing. Mayor Pro-Tem Nat Birdsong was the dissent vote.



# The Education Connection: EPI program provides a path for teachers

These articles will outline some of the good things happening and how interested parties can become involved.*

The Educator Preparation Institute (EPI) at Polk State College is an online, competency-based teacher certification program that offers a state-approved pathway to a five-year professional teaching certification — at an affordable cost.

The program is for anyone who has earned a bachelor's degree in any discipline from a regionally accredited college or university.

The EPI program provides an alternative route for teacher certification for many, including Morgan Hammett. For Hammett, Monday through Friday is all about teaching her students — but with time running out on her temporary teaching certificate, she needs to earn professional teaching certificate soon. For this, she chose the EPI program, as it allows her flexibility, as most

of the program is online and she can devote time to the required courses on evenings and weekends.

"(EPI) is giving me the tools and knowledge I need to sustain a highly-effective classroom," Hammett stated. "I was relieved to find helpful, friendly faces that are always available to assist students."

According to Hammett, one of her favorite experiences in the EPI program has come in an Instructional Strategies course, during which she learned about cooperative and collaborative learning techniques, such as Kagan Structures. She says she has been incorporating some of these techniques into her lesson plans already at Haines City High School, where she teaches English.

According to Ms. Sherri Davis the EPI program coordinator, Hammett is an example of who the program can help most.

"Ms. Hammett is an example of someone who has a teacher's heart," Davis said.

In fact, Hammett's classroom was cho-

sen to serve as a model classroom for new teachers at Haines City High and, occasionally, others teachers will come and observe her teaching to gain perspective.

The way Davis, Hammett and many others see it, the EPI program fills a vital need.

"Schools are experiencing more teach-

er shortages each school year in Florida," Davis said. "We are proud of our EPI students. Many are hired while still in the EPI program, and many of our past graduates have been nominated for Teacher of the Year within their first few years after completing the program."

## Cigar factory renovations estimated at \$1.3 million

BARTOW – Bartow City Commissioners learned at a workshop last week that it would cost about \$1.3 million to fix the Thompson & Company Cigar Factory.

Gregory Fancelli, an interested party in the property with prior experience restoring historic structures, has proposed renovating the cigar factory and turning it into an attraction for the city. Policymakers, though, are unsure about potential uses for the space.

Fancelli said the factory could be designed as a public event space. It would have six bathrooms and a small kitchen to handle catering. He also suggested a separate building maintaining the theme for shops or event space.

Vice Mayor Billy Simpson said commissioners have to decide what would be most appropriate there.

“We need answers to what we are going. We still have homework on this on how we go forward,” Simpson said. “We don’t have a game-plan to move forward.”

Another question raised in the discussion is whether or not the city should consider selling the property.

Ultimately, commissioners decided that Fancelli would return on Feb. 22 to present more specifics about what can be done and, at that time, commissioners will consider what would

be its best use.

Commissioner Trish Pfeiffer has been organizing for years to save the structure and have it benefit Bartow. Pfeiffer came equipped to the workshop with a page of people who have said they favor saving the structure. She said she felt Fancelli’s willingness to help should be taken seriously. He understands, she said, the importance of history and his background shows that.

In 2014, Fancelli fixed and moved the Tudor House in Lakeland less than a mile west. It is now a restaurant on South Florida Ave. Fancelli is also currently working on the Lester House in Lakeland.

Commissioner James Clements expressed his desire to save the structure, but also asked if Fancelli was intending to buy it and whether its theme would remain. Mayor Leo Longworth said he is getting closer to feeling something can be done, but noted that he is concerned about the consequences of a failed venture.

“Failure is always a concept,” Fancelli said. “It is a challenging piece of real estate. If this were in downtown Tampa, it would be a totally different thing. On our end, we have to allow the building to be as flexible as possible.”

Scott Sjoblom said that he was not as tied to the historic significance of the building so much as he was interested in creating something to help Bartow. Sjoblom said he understands the desire to save the structure, but that it is

not his foremost concern.

“I think we can preserve the space in the city’s best interest,” Sjoblom said. “Now let’s see if a plan can be worked through.”

To Longworth, not only do commissioners have to consider what to do with the cigar factory, but they have to address the larger picture of the entire area in east Bartow.

“That area needs a master plan — and (to) tie the cigar factory to what has to be done,” Longworth said. “We have to be proactive in our vision of growth than reactive.”

In closing, Longworth encouraged Fancelli.

“Help me,” he said. “Bring back some info and maybe (we) can make some movement in preserving.”

## Polk History Center to run 6-part series on diversity

BARTOW – The Polk County History Center next week will kick off a six-part series on racial awareness and cultural diversity in Polk County and Florida.

The series comes through a grant the museum earned from the Florida Humanities Council.

The show will include presentations on Native American, Spanish and black cultural memories of Florida, said Myrtice Young, the historic preservation manager of the Polk History Center.

Featured in the series will be a marking of when the slaves in Florida were freed on May 20, 1865. That event is being sponsored by the Bartow Community Relations Committee.

The free shows will all run from 5:30-7:30 p.m. beginning next week and running through June.

The first show is on Tuesday, Feb. 12, and it will feature Melissa Stump, the associate pastor at United Methodist Church in Lakeland, as she talks about “Conversations and Race.” Her presentation is based on a book call “Holding Up Your Corner,” by Rev. F. Willis.

A presentation on Tuesday, March 12, will feature a speaker on the Florida’s Seminole Heritage.

Anthony Dixon, a historian and professor at Bethune-Cookman University, will discuss “The African Diaspora Experience in Florida” on Tuesday, April 9.

On Tuesday, May 14, Florida historian Lu Vickers will take her audience back to 1949 and Paradise Park. Down river from Silver Springs, this park catered to black tourists, as many were not able to get to other parks. It remained in operation until 1969.

Later that week on Saturday, May 18, Kitty Oliver — a historian, media producer and singer — will have “An Evening of Jazz and Multicolored Memories.” Before that performance, outside on the north side of the courthouse, Sergeant First Class W. Lloyd Harris, a local historian and instructor at Sumnerlin Academy, will tell of the history of the Emancipation Proclamation and what it meant — and still means — to the United States.

The series will wrap-up Tuesday, June 11, with Carrie Sue Ayvar telling “Stories of the Florida-Con Sabor!” and the heritage of the Florida’s Spanish culture.

All shows are at the Polk County History Center at 100 E. Main St. in Bartow, and all are free.

# Bartow Middle administrators recognized for averting tragedy

**BARTOW** – The first ever Superintendent’s Hero Awards were bestowed upon Bartow Middle School Principal Chris Roberts and Assistant Principal Dwayne Johnson Jan. 22 during a Polk County School Board meeting.

The two school officials may have saved a few lives recently.

On Oct. 21, 2018, a Bartow Middle student alerted a teacher of two pre-teen girls who were about to do something bad. According to police reports, after verifying the two girls were skipping class, they were found hiding in a restroom and brought to the school office. Assistant Principal Johnson then ordered the girls to empty their pockets.

One girl had a knife and a sharpener in her pocket. Staff then demanded to search their bags. Inside were several large kitchen knives, a pair of scissors and a pizza cutter. The girls reportedly told the school resource officer that they planned to kill “smaller students” who entered the restroom so the two girls would become “worse sinners” and “go to hell” after committing suicide.

In a letter to Superintendent Jacqueline Byrd recommending Johnson for

the Superintendent’s Hero Award, Roberts described his emotions that day.

“I am forever grateful for Mr. Johnson and his quick thoughts and actions on this day,” Roberts wrote. “He stopped a plan that no school or community ever wants to deal with — the intent by a person or group to cause great bodily harm to students, on school grounds, during the school day.”

Polk County Public Schools Senior Director for Public Relations and Strategic Partnerships Rachel Pleasant said it would be hard for Byrd to recognize all of her heroes on staff, because there are so many, but that she wanted to start awarding those who are most selfless.

“These brave individuals make a life-saving difference for our children every day, but all too often they go unrecognized,” Pleasant said.

The names of the students are being withheld due to their age, and because they have yet to be convicted. Both appear to have been expelled based on the court docket.

Also awarded for bravery Jan. 22 were Mulberry High School Resource Officer Preston Davis and Principal Michael Young.

In Nov. 2018, Davis heard gunshots,

called dispatch for help, and called school staff to lock the school down.

“The lockdown was lifted within the hour,” Young wrote in his letter recommending Davis for the award. “The students and staff of Mulberry High

School are extremely appreciative of Deputy Davis’ quick action in keeping our school safe.”

## Lake Wales High math teacher honored at gala

LAKE WALES – Principal Donna Dunson may or may not have shed a few tears when she was interviewing Lillian Anderson a while back.

But what is clear is Dunson was convinced Anderson needed to teach at Lake Wales High School, and that she was going to do whatever it took to get her there.

Seven years later, Anderson has been named Teacher of the Year for the Lake Wales Charter System, honored Feb. 1 along with teachers and support staff from each of its seven schools during the system's annual gala dinner at Lake Ashton.

"She is one of the finest educators I have ever worked for in my life," Dunson told the crowd of 300. "I knew that from the first moment I read her resume, and saw her letters of reference, and after her interview, I knew she had to be at Lake Wales. No question — I begged her to come. I even got a little teary eyed."

A native of Washington, D.C., Anderson got her bachelor's degree in Math Decision Sciences from the University of North Carolina, and her Masters of Arts in Teaching from the University of Southern California. An instructor of IB math at the high school, she cites both her mother, who encouraged her to go into teaching as a career, and

her grandmother, who was herself a teacher and principal, as being inspirations for her in the classroom.

"I continue to teach because I love seeing the light bulb go off for my students when they understand a difficult concept, or when they realize how much math is used in the real world," Anderson said. "I love having an effect on a student who learns so much, not just math, but about the real world from the conversation held in my classroom."

# Downtown planner describes interactive process

LAKE WALES – Residents and local businesses are being asked to put on their thinking caps this spring to help reinvent two areas of Lake Wales.

Urban designer Victor Dover has been hired by the Lake Wales Community Redevelopment Agency to come up with a plan that would redesign and reinvigorate two historic downtowns — the city's traditional downtown district, as well as a second in the north-west area of the city.

Dover and members of his firm, Dover, Kohl and Partners, are expecting to get ideas from the community when they are in town in early April for a week.

"We get to help people figure out what they want their town to be like, which means visualizing change before it occurs," Dover said during the Lake Wales Main Street Mixer and annual meeting Jan. 24. "We're going to get you to describe that to us. We'll go through a process together and arrive at a good plan."

Dover said he became aware early of the "infectious enthusiasm" of Lake Wales leaders, and that the process will be "a very interactive event" which will include many opportunities for input from the public.

"I think we've arrived at what we will look back on as a historic moment in the life of your community," Dover

said. "You'll help decide what should be in the design strategy. Every one of you has a list of the things you'd like us to improve on. You have to be citizen planners. We're living through the second coming of the great American small town — people are learning to leverage their assets."

The plan includes what Dover called "designing in the sunshine," which will include a spot where anyone can stop in to offer ideas during the week.

"We're going to set up an easy to get to location. We'll set up an open design studio, and we'll camp out here for a while. You can look over our shoulders that week," he said.

After all the input is gathered, a closing event at week's end will serve as a starting point for Dover's firm, when its preliminary plans would be made public.

"That would be a work-in-progress presentation. We're going to let you look at it. We're going to ask you, 'is this what you meant?' At that point the work will be very soft and very changeable," Dover said. "We'll have a lot of unanswered questions and we (will) use your feedback and fix what's wrong."

Dover said he was also pleased that the project included two distinctive and important areas in the town's past.

"You're all in this together. No one is left out," he added.

## FHSAA shakes up football system again

They're at it again, the Florida High School Athletic Association.

Just when fans and coaches and players were used to the latest version of "how we qualify for the playoffs," the governing body of prep sports in Florida has changed the system one more time.

And, as always, there are pros and cons — both for the football postseason, and for other team sports as well.

On the football side, out is the "points" system — used for the past two seasons — which not only took into account wins and losses in a current season, but wins and losses by opponents in the previous season, as well. It was something that a lot of coaches weren't crazy about.

The new system is simplified in that just three criteria will be used to come up with a new "power index" (RPI) for each school. That rating will be determined by your winning percentage (35 percent), your opponents' winning percentage (35 percent) and the winning percentage of your opponents' opponents (30 percent).

There are no bonus points, like with the previous set up, and final score is not a factor in the new rankings system. And, if weather wreaks havoc and causes cancellations, there's no real penalty for that, either, since it is winning percentage — not wins — that is used.

What hasn't changed in Classes 5A through 8A is that district champions will still advance, with playoff spots five through eight in each region determined by the power index ratings. Classes 1A through 4A will still award all playoff spots based on the index,

with six teams in each region getting the call.

The other interesting change — and this actually came down the pike last fall, but a lot of fans didn't notice it — comes in determining district champions in soccer, basketball, volleyball, softball and baseball. In fact, teams that win district titles in those sports starting will not necessarily have to play their district rivals.

While there will still be district tournaments, seeding for those events will

be based on a power index created from all regular season games, which will be determined by the individual teams — without mandated district games in the regular season. District tournament winners will automatically get a postseason berth, but the rest of the coveted playoff spots will be determined by the RPI.

The website maxpreps.com will do the RPI calculations for all sports. Football rankings will be released every Tuesday during the 2019 season, starting in Week Six.

The area's most dominant cheer squad, Bartow, finished in second place in its classification by less than a point — snapping five straight years winning a state title. Still, the Yellow Jackets qualified for the national championships, coming up at ESPN's Wide World of Sports.

#### District doings

Several local girls basketball teams are in position to claim district titles this week.

Winter Haven (17-7), of course, is a prohibitive favorite in FHSAA Class 8A, District 7, with the championship game for that tournament set for Thursday night at Kathleen High. Bartow (10-10) is the No. 2 seed. Haines City (21-2) is the No. 1 seed in FHSAA Class 9A, District 7 tournament. Auburndale (10-8) is the second seed in Class 7A, District 6. Should the Bloodhounds handle South Lake in the opening round, the district final would be Friday at the site of the higher seed, which could very well be Lake Gibson (19-7).

Lake Wales (12-8) is the No. 2 seed in Class 6A, District 10, and will host Hardee (12-11) Thursday. A win there would put the Lady Highlanders in the title tilt Friday, either at home or Sarasota Booker (17-6), the No. 1 seed. Frostproof (13-4) is the top seed in Class 1A, District 8, and would host a title game Friday with a win over rival Fort Meade (4-8) in the opening round.

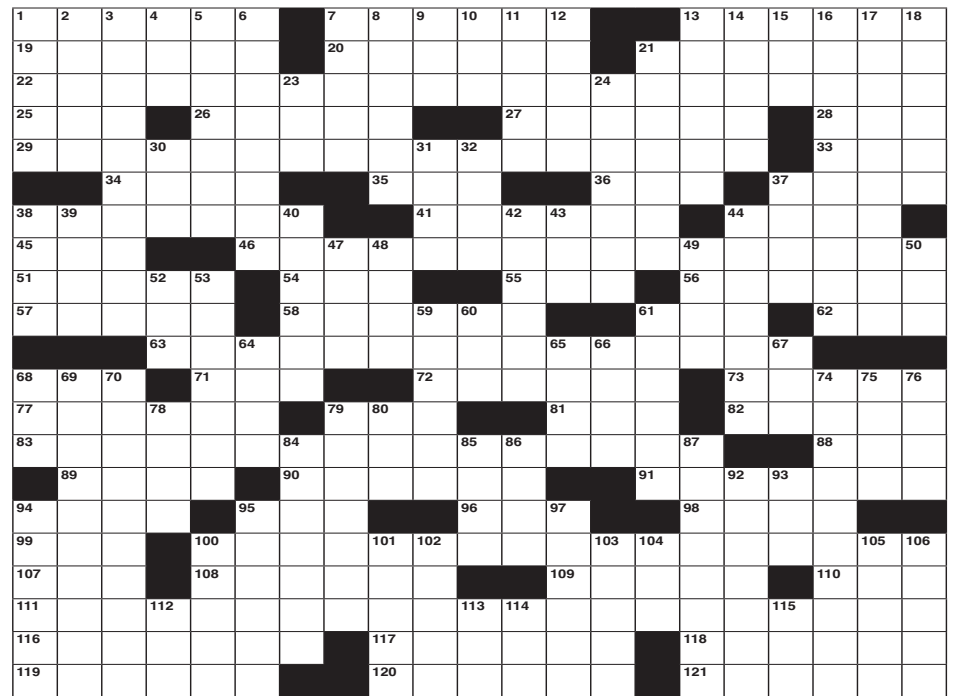

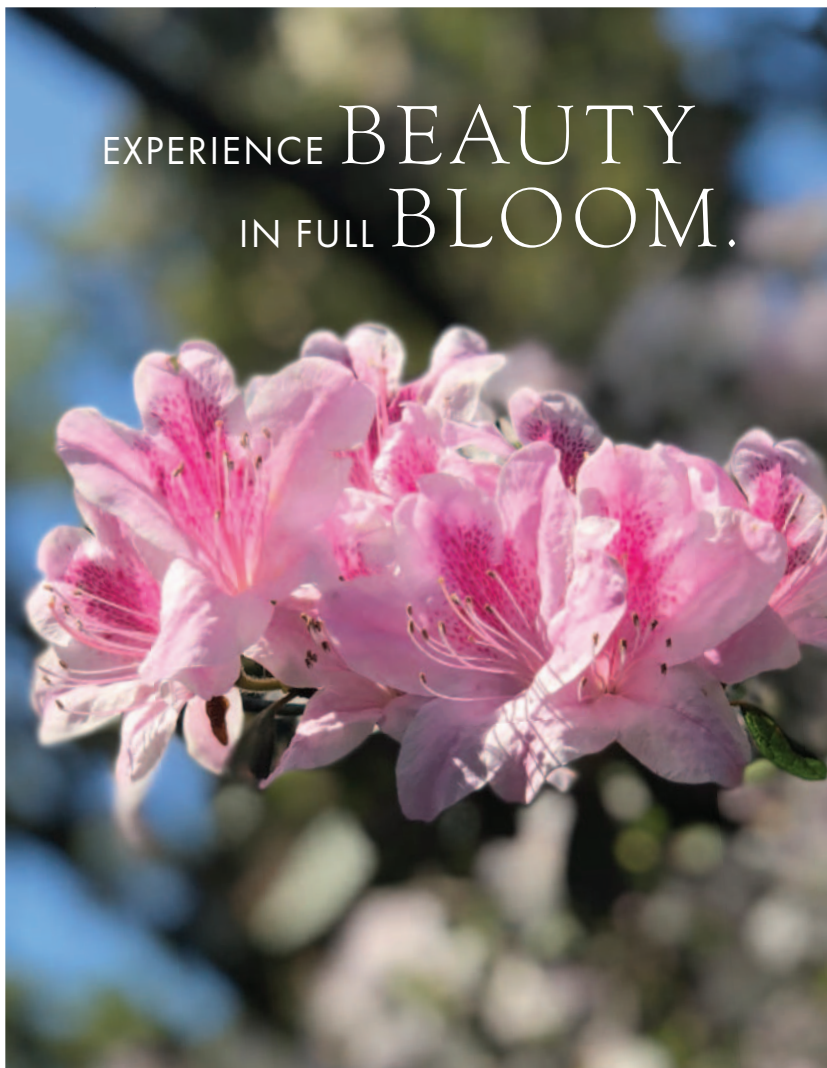

# Beneath the Chinaberry Tree

## Florence Villa and the Suffrage Movement

It seems hard to believe — almost impossible to believe — that little more than 100 years ago the women of this country did not have the right to vote. The 19th Amendment to the Constitution will celebrate the 100th anniversary of its passage on August 18, 2020, and the general election that same year will mark the centennial of women casting ballots.

In addition to Susan B. Anthony, another key suffragist was Anna Howard Shaw, a companion to Anthony during the last years of her life. Local papers in Winter Haven and Haines City reported on Shaw's visits to the Inman compound and the Florence Villa Hotel as a vacationer.

As reported by the Haines City Herald on March 9, 1918, "The Winter Haven Women's Civic League will entertain the Council of Defense at Florence Villa Hotel Tuesday afternoon, March 12 at 3:30. [Speakers include] Dr. Anna Howard Shaw, Chairman of the Women's Committee of the National Council of Defense, and Mrs. Wm. Hocker of Ocala, Florida, State Chairman of Council of National Defense. Both guests will address the audience and the occasion will be of of great interest to all. It is a great honor to have Dr. Shaw with us, and we appreciate very deeply her giving us any of her much needed period of rest and recreation after her strenuous year of patriotic work in Washington, to talk to the women of this region. Nobody should miss this opportunity to hear Dr. Shaw. Haines City ladies are cordially invited to attend."

Dr. Shaw had served the "suffrage cause" as Vice-President of the National American Woman Suffrage Association (NAWSA) from 1892 to 1904 and as President from 1904 to 1915.

Writing in her autobiography Shaw noted events of the 1880s led her to strive for social justice. She wrote, "We were entering upon a deeply significant period. For the first time, women were going into industrial competition with men and already men were intensely resenting their presence, Around me I saw women overworked and underpaid, doing men's work at half men's wages, not because their work was inferior but because there were women. Again, too, I studied the obtrusive problems of the poor and of the women of the streets, and looking at the whole social situation from every angle, I could find but one solution for women - the removal of the stigma of disfranchisement. As man's equal before the law, woman could demand her rights, asking favors from no one. With all my heart I joined in the crusade of the men and women who were fighting for her. My real work had begin."

It was President Woodrow Wilson who appointed Shaw to head the Woman's Committee of the National Defense Council during World War I, due to her work for the political freedom of women.

She later, while in Florida, accepted an invitation from past President William Taft to join him and others on a speaking tour from New Hampshire to Kansas. The tour proved strenuous and she succumbed to pneumonia on July 2, 1919.

She did not live to see the eventual passage of the amendment — passage due in no small part to her tireless work on its behalf.

The wording of the 19th Amendment, ratified in 1920, featured the same wording that Susan B. Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton had been submitting since 1878.

## Hey, all you Grampas, beware of scams

When a call comes in to our house phone (rather than one of our cell phones), odds are it is a junk call or a scam.

When my caller-ID shows a number I do not recognize, I usually say nothing for a couple of seconds to see if there is a real caller, or if it is just a recorded message.

I followed this protocol a few days ago, pushing the answer button on our cordless phone but saying nothing.

After a couple of seconds delay, the caller gave me a cheerful "Hello."

"Hello," I responded.

"Hi, Grampa!" came the response, a voice that I would describe as a young adult trying to sound like a teenager.

I have six grandchildren, all of whom mean more to me than life itself. None of them addresses me as Grampa.

"Who is this?" I asked.

"It's your grandson, Grampa," the caller replied.

"What is your name?"

"It's me, Napoleon." Actually, he didn't say Napoleon. He used a far more common male name. It was nowhere close to the name of any of my grandsons.

I hung up.

I'm pretty sure this was the same "grandson" who called me several weeks ago — these guys don't give up easily.

A half-century as a police reporter helped me develop a healthy ability to recognize most scams.

One of the most reprehensible scams is one in which a caller represents himself or herself as a grandchild in a bind who needs a substantial sum

of cash wired to him immediately, in order to get out of a jam with the constabulary.

As a newly-minted 78-year-old, I am still sufficiently in possession of my faculties to recognize this as a scam.

I also refused to respond last year to an email represented as being from a friend traveling in Europe, who said he had been robbed and needed me to wire him money to book a flight home. It was another familiar scam.

So why do I bother to write about these scams? Because some chronologically-gifted citizens with hearts of gold respond to them often enough to keep the scammers busy and profitable. And their money is seldom recovered.

So what to do?

I encourage my fellow senior citizens to beware of these scams, and to establish a relationship with an adult son or daughter or other younger adult friend — pastor, banker, lawyer, neighbor — whom you can call for guidance if you receive such an appeal.

Or call 9-1-1.

And if you are a younger adult with a parent or other older friend whom you believe could fall victim to this kind of scam, go to them and urge them to contact you if they receive such a call.

Nobody appointed me to be spokesman for my generation, but if you see yourself on either side of the generational divide I have alluded to, take action.

If your initiative is unappreciated, blame it on me.

Tell 'em a suspicious old Grampa put you up to it.

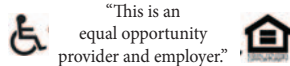

Transportation payment will be no less (and is not required to be more) than the most economical and reasonable common carrier transportation charges for the distances involved. A copy of the work contract or a copy of the ETA 790 in lieu of a work contract, and any modifications, will be provided to the worker on the day the work commences. If the employee is unable or unfit to perform the duties listed after the 14 day pre-trial, the employee will receive warnings, hours may be reduced to the minimum allowed in the certified petition or terminated.

Workers will be paid \$11.33 per hour, 3/4 guaranteed, 35 hours per week. Housing, equipment, and transportation provided at no cost to workers who cannot reasonably return to their permanent residence at the end of each workday. Workers must have a valid identification for I-9 preparation when they report to begin work. 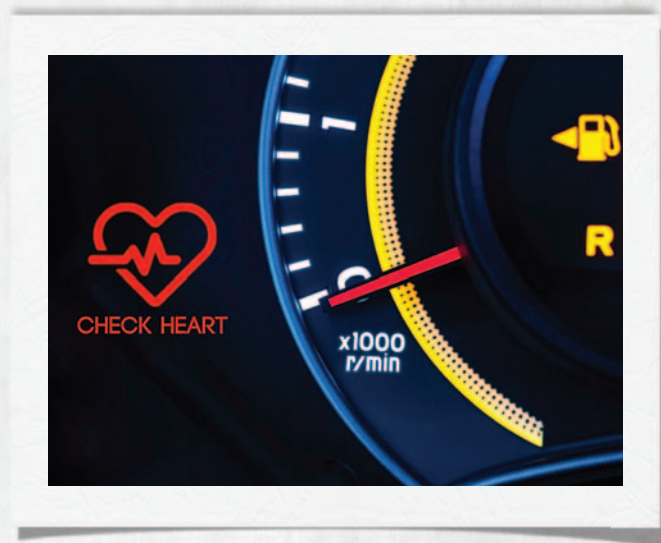

## Trump claims 'ridiculous partisan' probes may upset progress

### President says 'if there is going to be peace and legislation, there cannot be war and investigation'

WASHINGTON — In his first State of the Union address to a divided Congress, President Donald Trump warned Democrats on Tuesday that "ridiculous partisan investigations" could derail the nation's economic progress.

Trump peppered his speech with calls for

bipartisanship, urging Washington to govern "not as two parties, but as one nation." But his message clashed with the rancorous atmosphere he has helped cultivate in the nation's capital, as well as the desire of most Democrats to block his path during his next two years in office.

The president's remarks previewed how he planned to defend himself as Democrats launch

a flurry of investigations into his administration and personal finances.

"If there is going to be peace and legislation, there cannot be war and investigation," he declared.

Trump's speech to lawmakers and the nation comes at a critical moment in his presidency. He pushed his party into a lengthy government shutdown over border security, only

to cave to Democrats. With another shutdown deadline looming, the president has few options for getting Congress to fund a border wall, and he risks further alienating his party if he tries to circumvent lawmakers by declaring a national emergency instead.

Trump made no mention of an emergency declaration in his remarks. And though he offered a lengthy defense of his

call for a border wall, declaring, "I will get it built." But he delivered no ultimatums about what it would take for him to sign legislation to keep the government open.

"I am asking you to defend our very dangerous southern border out of love and devotion to our fellow citizens and to our country," he said.

In his speech, Trump also planned to announce details of a second

meeting with North Korea's Kim Jong Un, outlining a summit on Feb. 27 and 28 in Vietnam, according to his prepared remarks. Trump has been teasing the meeting in recent weeks. The two met last summer in Singapore, though that meeting only led to a vaguely worded commitment by the North to denuclearize.

## Pope publicly acknowledges clergy sexual abuse of nuns

### 'It's not that everyone does this, but there have been priests and bishops who have'

ABOARD THE PAPAL PLANE — Pope Francis on Tuesday publicly acknowledged the scandal of priests and bishops sexually abusing nuns and vowed to do more to fight the problem, the latest sign that there is no end in sight to the Catholic Church's abuse crisis — and that it now has a reckoning from the #MeToo movement.

Francis admitted to the problem for the first time in public during a news conference while returning to Rome from the United Arab Emirates. The acknowledgment comes just two weeks before he hosts an unprecedented gathering of bishops to craft a global response to the scandal of priestly predators who target children and the superiors who covered up the crimes.

# State: 83,000 voters in Florida didn't cast a valid ballot

## 'Non-valid votes' include ballots with write-in names such as Mickey Mouse

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — Whether they meant to or not, more than 83,000 Florida voters didn't cast a valid vote for governor, according to a new report prepared by state officials.

The combined total of invalid ballots outnumbered Republican Ron DeSantis's margin of victory over Democrat Andrew Gillum by more than 50,000 votes. The race between DeSantis and Gillum was so close that it triggered an automatic statewide recount. More than 8.2 million

votes were cast in the high-profile race for governor that attracted national attention. The total number of "non-valid votes" was 1 percent, which was a lower rate than either the 2016 presidential election or the 2014 governor's race.

These "non-valid votes" include ballots with write-in names such as Mickey Mouse and ballots that were left blank. It also includes those with votes for more than one candidate. More than 50,000 of the invalid ballots were left blank, suggesting that some people opted to skip the governor's race.

Florida's report — compiled from data collected by all 67 counties — is required after every major election. It got its start after the chaotic 2000 presidential election, which hinged on a contentious Florida recount famously involving "hanging chads" and more. The Division of Elections is supposed to review the data to determine if there was an "identifiable problem" that may have caused voter confusion or if voting systems malfunctioned.

In the report, state officials said the "data do not show anything to suggest or conclude that voter

confusion existed during the election as a result of ballot design and/or ballot instructions issues, or that the voting equipment manifested any anomalies."

The Division of Elections was required to look at the governor's race — and not the U.S. Senate race where the final margin was much closer. Some critics have suggested that a flawed ballot design in Broward County may have caused voters to skip the Senate matchup between Bill Nelson and Rick Scott. Scott won the statewide race by slightly more than 10,000 votes.

"The elephant in the room that is not being reported is the U.S. Senate race and the severe under-vote in Broward County," said Daniel Smith, a political science professor from the University of Florida.

Florida was required to do statewide recounts in three statewide races. In two large counties — Broward and Palm Beach — the Democratic elections supervisors came under fire from Scott and other GOP politicians for the way they handled the recounts. Both supervisors wound up resigning in the aftermath. Gov. Ron DeSantis, who

suspended Palm Beach County Supervisor of Elections Susan Bucher, said last month he wants to make sure that Florida is not embarrassed again during the 2020 election.

But State Sen. Dennis Baxley, a Republican from Ocala, said Wednesday that he isn't sure widespread changes are needed ahead of the next election.

"The more I learn, the more comfortable I am that we had a very close, but really a good cycle," said Baxley, who is chairman of the Senate committee that would be responsible for any election law changes.

#### Deputies say homeowner kills intruder after series of break-ins

EUSTIS (AP) — Deputies say a homeowner fatally shot an intruder following a series of burglaries at the central Florida home.

Lake County Sheriff's officials tell news outlets the shooting happened early Tuesday morning northeast of Eustis.

Lt. John Herrell says the homeowner told investigators he confronted the intruder and he shot him following a brief struggle.

Herrell says the homeowner was taken to the hospital as a precaution, but his injuries are not considered life threatening.

The name of the dead man hasn't been released, pending notification of his relatives.

Herrell says there were three separate burglaries at the home in the 24 hours preceding the shooting.

#### Cold case researcher found dead in condominium

ST. AUGUSTINE (AP) — Authorities say a woman who was investigating the 2010 death of a Florida sheriff's deputy's girlfriend was fatally shot inside her condominium.

Putnam County Sheriff's officials said 38-year-old Ellie Marie Washtock was found dead by her 15-year-old son on Jan. 31.

Investigators told news outlets that Washtock was a private citizen doing an independent investigation into the death of Michelle O'Connell, the girlfriend of St. John's County Sheriff's deputy Jeremy Banks. The weapon used was his department-issued handgun. Her death was ruled a suicide, but her family has questioned the investigation.

Because of that connection, the Putnam County Sheriff's Office was asked to investigate Washtock's death.

#### US Coast Guard seizes 35,000 pounds of cocaine in Pacific

FORT LAUDERDALE (AP) — The U.S. Coast Guard has seized nearly 35,000 pounds of cocaine from apparent drug smuggling vessels in the eastern Pacific Ocean.

The drugs were off-loaded Tuesday in Fort Lauderdale, Florida.

Cmdr. Michael Sharp told reporters the drugs were found over the last three months aboard fishing vessels and go-fast boats outfitted to conceal contraband and evade authorities.

Six crews seized the drugs from 21 separate vessels stopped in Pacific waters off Mexico and Central and South America. Sharp said the drugs had a wholesale value of roughly \$466 million.

The guard's commandant, Adm. Karl Schultz, said in the last few years, crews have seized

1.3 million pounds of cocaine and detained 1,200 suspects at sea.

Schultz said most of the drugs originate in Colombia and are destined for the U.S.

#### 11 people injured when stolen van hits bus in Florida

DAYTONA BEACH (AP) — Authorities say 11 people were injured when a stolen van collided with a transit bus in Florida.

Daytona Beach Fire Department spokeswoman Sasha Staton said in a news release that a pregnant woman and a child were among those injured in the Tuesday morning crash.

Staton says the injuries are not considered life-threatening.

Orlando television stations are reporting that the bus hit a passenger who bailed from the stolen van just before the crash. The driver also ran after the crash but a witness held him down

until police arrived and took him into custody.

#### Report: All 3 killed in wrong-way crash were impaired

BOCA RATON (AP) — A medical examiner's report says all three people killed in a wrong-way crash on an Interstate 95 exit ramp were under the influence of alcohol or drugs.

The Palm Beach Post reports 35-year-old Christopher Alfeo was five days away from having his license suspended for failing to pay a traffic violation when the Dec. 15 crash occurred.

The Palm Beach County Medical Examiner's Office reports that Alfeo tested nearly 3 ½ times the legal limit for alcohol. His 24-year-old girlfriend Amber Chelsea Reif was also impaired by alcohol. The report says Brenda Walker, whose car was struck head-on, was under the influence of marijuana.

The Florida Highway Patrol says the crash occurred when Alfeo turned onto the southbound exit ramp and struck Walker's car head-on.

#### 'Ball Cap Bandit' suspected in 4 bank robberies arrested

LAKE PARK (AP) — Authorities say they've arrested the "Ball Cap Bandit" suspected in four bank robberies in Florida.

An FBI news release says 37-year-old Rodrick Domonique Jones was arrested last week in Lake Park on federal bank robbery charges.

Investigators say Jones robbed two Chase branches located in Delray Beach and Stuart in 2016. Officials say he robbed the same Delray Beach bank again in 2017 and then the same Stuart bank again in 2018.

Jones was dubbed the "Ball Cap Bandit" because he wore baseball caps during the robberies.

# UK's May vows no return to hard border with Ireland

LONDON — British Prime Minister Theresa May told business leaders in Northern Ireland on Tuesday that she is seeking changes to the U.K.'s withdrawal agreement with the European Union, but not the total removal of the Irish border provision that is the most contentious part of the deal.

Seeking to ease fears about the return of customs posts and vehicle checks, May said during a visit to Belfast that the British government is committed to preventing the construction of a physical border between EU member Ireland and the U.K.'s Northern Ireland after Britain leaves

the European Union.

The prime minister said she was in Belfast "to affirm my commitment to delivering a Brexit that ensures no return to a hard border between Northern Ireland and Ireland — which is unshakable."

She also emphasized the government's support for the Good Friday agreement, the 1998 treaty that largely ended decades of violence in Northern Ireland known as "the Troubles."

May's words of reassurance did little to solve her Brexit border dilemma.

Britain is scheduled to leave the EU on March 29, but no withdrawal agreement has been approved because Britain's Parliament voted down May's plan last month, in part because of concerns

about the border plan, known as the backstop. It is a safeguard mechanism that would keep the U.K. in a customs union with the EU to remove the need for checks along the border until a permanent new trading relationship is in place.

The border area was a flashpoint during the decades of conflict that cost 3,700 lives. The free flow of people and goods across the near-invisible border today underpins both the local economy and Northern Ireland's peace process.

But many pro-Brexit British lawmakers fear the backstop will trap Britain in regulatory lockstep with the EU, and say they won't vote for the EU divorce deal unless it is removed.

# Migrant caravan reaches town on Texas border

MEXICO CITY — A caravan of about 1,700 Central American migrants was camped Tuesday in the Mexican border city of Piedras Negras, just west of Eagle Pass, Texas.

While previous caravans had preferred the border city of Tijuana, the relatively open section of the border around Eagle Pass is marked mainly by the Rio Grande and lacks the long sections of high barriers found in Tijuana. Still, the U.S.

Department of Homeland Security vowed that the "lawless caravan" would not be allowed in.

"Approximately 2,000 aliens have arrived in northern Mexico as

part of a 'caravan' seeking to cross the border into Texas. Illegal entry will not be tolerated and we stand ready to prevent it," DHS Secretary Kirstjen M. Nielsen wrote in a statement Tuesday, adding "DHS will take all steps to ensure the safety and security of law enforcement personnel on the frontlines."

Images from local media show U.S. agents with riot gear and shields standing on a bridge separating Eagle Pass and Piedras Negras. DHS said Border Patrol agents had already apprehended some migrants who crossed the border illegally overnight.

Coahuila state Gov. Miguel Angel Riquelme

said about 1,700 migrants arrived late Monday aboard 49 buses from the cities of Saltillo and Arteaga. Another smaller group headed toward the neighboring state of Nuevo Leon.

An improvised shelter was set up for the migrants at an unused maquiladora factory, and local officials said the migrants had been given sleeping mats, blankets, food and wireless access.

State child welfare officials reported there were 46 unaccompanied youths aged between 15 and 17 in the caravan.

A second, larger caravan of several thousand migrants is expected to set out across Mexico soon.

#### Egypt debates motion to extend presidential term limits

CAIRO (AP) — Egypt's parliament advanced a proposal on Tuesday to amend the constitution in a way that could allow President Abdel-Fattah el-Sissi to stay in office well beyond the end of his current term in 2022.

El-Sissi led the 2013 military overthrow of an elected but divisive Islamist president and was elected the following year. He has presided over an unprecedented crackdown on dissent, and was re-elected last year after all potentially serious challengers were jailed or pressured to exit the race.

A constitutional amendment to extend

el-Sissi's rule would add to concerns that the country is slipping back into authoritarianism eight years after a pro-democracy uprising ended Hosni Mubarak's nearly three-decade rule.

Parliament speaker Ali Abdel-Al said two-thirds of the general committee endorsed the proposed amendments. The 596-seat assembly — which is packed with el-Sissi supporters — will take a final vote on Feb. 17.

#### Moscow faces 300 bomb threats, up to 50,000 evacuated

MOSCOW (AP) — Russian news reports say that a flurry of fake bomb calls has prompted the evacuation of tens of thousands.

The Interfax news agency said the city's

emergency services received nearly 300 bomb threats Tuesday, resulting in the evacuation of about 50,000 people. The state RIA Novosti news agency said 130 venues were targeted with bomb hoaxes.

No explosives have been found.

The spate of fake bomb threats has engulfed Russia in recent days, prompting evacuations of shopping malls, schools and official buildings across the country.

A similar series of fake bomb calls plagued Russia in 2017, inflicting major economic damage. Some Russian media claimed then that the calls might have been launched from neighboring Ukraine, which has been locked in a tug-of-war with Russia after its annexation of Crimea.



# White House says feds' inaugural probe part of 'hysteria'

NEW YORK — A federal subpoena seeking documents from Donald Trump's inaugural committee is part of "a hysteria" over the fact that he's president, White House press secretary Sarah Sanders said on Tuesday.

Federal prosecutors in New York issued the wide-ranging subpoena Monday, furthering a federal inquiry into a fund that has faced mounting scrutiny into how it raised and spent \$107 million on events celebrating Trump's 2017 inauguration.

Inaugural committee spokeswoman Kristin Celauro told The Associated Press the committee was still reviewing the subpoena and "It is our intention to cooperate with the inquiry."

The investigation is the latest in a series of criminal inquiries into Trump's campaign and presidency.

"Actually, I think the common thread is a hysteria over the fact that this president became president," Sanders said Tuesday in response to a CNN question. "The common thread is that there is so much hatred out there that they will look for anything to try to

create and tie problems to this president."

Later, Sanders told reporters the investigation "has nothing to do with the White House."

"I think the biggest focus and the thing that most Americans care about has nothing to do with the inaugural and it has everything to do with what the path forward looks like," she said.

The subpoena seeks "all documents" related to the committee's donors and vendors, as well as records relating to "benefits" donors received after making contributions, according to a person familiar with the document. The person was not

authorized to discuss the ongoing investigation and spoke to The Associated Press on condition of anonymity.

"They want everything," the person said, referring to federal prosecutors.

The U.S. Attorney's Office in Manhattan declined to comment.

Among other things, the subpoena sought documents related to any payments made by donors "directly to contractors and/or vendors" who worked for the committee, the person familiar with the document said. Any such payments sent directly from donors to vendors,

without being passed through the committee, could potentially violate public disclosure laws.

The subpoena also requested documents relating to donations "made by or on behalf of foreign nationals, including but not limited to any communications regarding or relating to the possibility of donations by foreign nationals," the person familiar with the document said.

The New York Times reported late last year that federal prosecutors were examining whether anyone from Qatar, Saudi Arabia or other Middle Eastern countries made illegal payments

to the committee and a pro-Trump super political action committee. Foreign contributions to inaugural funds and PACs are prohibited under federal law.

The head of the inaugural committee, Tom Barrack, confirmed to The Associated Press that he was questioned by special counsel Robert Mueller in 2017. But he told The AP last year that he is not a target of the Mueller investigation, which is focused on Russian interference in the 2016 elections.

The subpoena issued Monday does not mention Barrack or any members of the inaugural committee by name.

## Trump judicial pick: 'I cringe' at past remarks on date rape

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump's nominee to replace Brett Kavanaugh on a high-profile appeals court said Tuesday she cringes at some of the language she used as a college student in writing about sexual assault, race and equal rights for women.

Neomi Rao told the Senate Judiciary Committee that writings in which she criticized affirmative action and suggested that intoxicated women were partly responsible for date rape do not reflect her current thinking.

"I like to think I've matured as a thinker, writer and indeed as a person," she said at a confirmation hearing for a seat on the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit. Trump nominated Rao for the seat left vacant when Brett Kavanaugh joined the Supreme Court.

Rao, who currently serves as administrator of the White House Office of Information and Regulatory Affairs, said there were "certainly some sentences and phrases" from her college writing in the 1990s that "I would never use today."

Sen. Joni Ernst, R-Iowa, who recently revealed she was raped by her boyfriend in college, said Rao's writings "give me pause," in part because of the message they send to young women who may be reluctant to report a rape.

Rao called rape a "horrible crime" and said anyone who commits rape should be prosecuted. Her comment that women should stay sober to avoid placing themselves at risk was merely "common sense" advice that her own mother gave her, Rao said.

Rao, 45, worked in the George W. Bush White House but has never tried a case in state or federal court.

## S&P 500 win streak marks 5th day on solid company earnings

Technology companies helped lead stocks broadly higher on Wall Street Tuesday as strong earnings reports from several companies put investors in a buying mood.

The rally, which briefly wavered around midday, extended the benchmark S&P 500 index's winning streak to five days.

Technology stocks, which have lagged the market in recent months, accounted for much of the rally. Financial sector companies were among the biggest laggards.

Investors welcomed the latest batch of solid earnings reports from a range of U.S. companies, including luxury retailers Ralph Lauren and Estee Lauder and media companies Viacom and Walt Disney.

The S&P 500 index rose 12.83 points, or 0.5 percent, to 2,737.70. The Dow Jones Industrial Average gained 172.15 points, or 0.7 percent, to 25,411.52. The tech-heavy Nasdaq composite added 54.55 points, or 0.7 percent, to 7,402.08. The Russell 2000 index of smaller companies picked up 2.69 points, or 0.2 percent, to 1,520.23.

## New Hampshire resort keeps alive tradition of harvesting ice from lake

HOLDERNESS, N.H. — Modern refrigerators have little appeal for summer guests at a rustic New Hampshire resort who prefer cooling their bottles of water, soda and beer the old-fashioned way.

The preparation begins five months ahead of time, when resort staffers and volunteers gather to harvest ice from nearby Squam Lake. The January ritual dates back to 1897, when Rockywold-Deephaven Camps first opened in the town of Holderness, and is practiced for commercial purposes only at a handful of other places in the country.

The group, equipped with chain saws, ice picks and a huge saw on a sled, can harvest 200 tons of ice over several days in a typical winter. They transport the ice to two storage sheds on the campgrounds, where it's kept until the summer. Then, staffers with wheelbarrows provide the ice to resort guests, who place it in an antique icebox — some dating back to the 1930s with oak exteriors and a tin or zinc lining — to keep beverages and snacks cold. Guests are told not to eat the ice, though some old-timers apparently still put a few shards in their cocktails.

"Many of the families

have been coming for generations, and people who come here don't like to see much change. They like it to be a simple, quiet place," said John Jurczynski, the co-general manager of Rockywold-Deephaven Camps for the past 29 years and who oversees the ice harvest. A push to bring in electrical refrigerators in the 1960s was rebuffed by guests.

"It's such a neat tradition. People love it," he said.

For weeks, Jurczynski had been putting out bulletins about ice conditions on Squam Lake. By mid-January, the word went out. The ice had finally reached a

safe thickness — in this case about 13 inches — and the harvest could begin.

Once they cleared the snow and charted a grid, the cutting started and whining sounds of saws echoed across the lake.

Workers mostly use a contraption called an ice saw — with a huge blade mounted on a sled — to make the cuts. The 16-inch-by-19-inch chunks weighing as much as 120 pounds look like huge pieces of cake with a powdery top and a clear body with bubbles. The blocks are pried loose with the help of chain saws and a line of workers with ice pikes float them along a chute.

They are then pushed up a ramp and into a truck for a trip to the storage facilities.

When it's all done, the group collects as many as 3,600 blocks of ice.

"Obviously spending this time and energy, we wouldn't have to do it. We could buy blocks of ice," said Jane Kellogg, a retired teacher on the ice whose father came to the resort as a boy and who used to bring her elementary school students out here to watch the harvest.

"But there is something about the pride this place has in still being the place that maintains that culture, that tradition," she said.

## MORE HEADLINE NEWS FROM AROUND THE NATION

### No verdict for El Chapo after second day of deliberations

NEW YORK (AP) — A jury at the U.S. trial of the infamous Mexican drug lord known as El Chapo has ended its second day of deliberations without a verdict.

Jurors were in court Tuesday to decide whether Joaquin Guzman should be convicted of drug-trafficking charges. Deliberations are to resume Wednesday morning.

The 61-year-old Guzman is accused of operating a drug-smuggling empire that moved hundreds of tons of cocaine north of the U.S. border over the course of two decades.

The jury heard from 14 co-operators who described Guzman's willingness to use violence against the Sinaloa cartel's enemies. The defense has accused the cooperators of making him a scapegoat.

Guzman has been in solitary confinement since being brought to the U.S. in 2017. He could get life in prison if convicted.

### Michigan man gets life without parole in 6 shooting deaths

KALAMAZOO, Mich. (AP) — A man who fatally shot six strangers in

southwestern Michigan was sentenced Tuesday to life in prison with no chance of parole, and some loved ones of those he killed said they believe he'll face a greater, more permanent punishment.

"Someday when you die and you face God, he will make the ultimate judgment for what you've done," Laurie Smith, who lost her husband and son in the February 2016 rampage, told Jason Dalton during the sentencing hearing. "All I can say is, I do not want to be you — not now and not then."

Dalton, 48, pleaded guilty to murder and attempted murder last month, just as jury selection was about to begin in his trial. Michigan has no death penalty, so he was guaranteed to receive the mandatory life sentence at Tuesday's hearing in a Kalamazoo County court.

Dalton admitted shooting eight people in three locations in between picking up passengers for Uber. After his arrest, police quoted Dalton as saying a "devil figure" on Uber's app was controlling him on the day of the shootings.

Four women were killed in the parking lot of a Cracker Barrel restaurant: Barbara Hawthorne, Dorothy "Judy" Brown, Mary Lou Nye and her sister-in-law, Mary Jo Nye. Rich

Smith and his 17-year-old son, Tyler Smith, were fatally shot while looking at a pickup truck in a dealer's lot.

### Chicago police have no record of pilot in California crash

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A pilot killed along with four people when a small plane crashed in a Southern California neighborhood was not a retired Chicago police officer, as initially identified, authorities said Tuesday.

The Chicago Police Department has no record of Antonio Pastini, 75, ever working in the city, department spokesman Anthony Guglielmi said in an email. Pastini was killed Sunday when the twin-engine plane he was piloting broke up in flight shortly after takeoff and fell in pieces on the Orange County community of Yorba Linda, igniting a fire in a home where four people — still not identified — were killed.

Pastini had been identified Monday as a retired Chicago officer residing in Gardnerville, Nevada, by the Orange County Sheriff's Department.

Coroner's investigators recovered credentials from Pastini after the crash that appeared to identify him as a retired Chicago officer, sheriff's spokeswoman

Carrie Braun said.

Discussions with the Chicago department later determined the credentials were not legitimate, Braun said.

The identification of the pilot as Antonio Pastini was not in question.

### College student finds man in closet wearing her clothes

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP) — A North Carolina college student says she found a man in her closet wearing her clothes.

Greensboro police spokesman Ron Glenn told news outlets the unidentified student at the University of North Carolina-Greensboro came home at lunch Saturday and heard a noise in her closet in her off-campus apartment.

The student opened the closet door to find the man sitting on the floor in her clothing with a bag full of clothes, shoes and socks. She said she talked to the man for about 10 minutes and texted photos to her boyfriend, who arrived and asked the man to leave.

Glenn said the man wasn't violent and doesn't believe he and the student know one another.

Police charged 30-year-old Andrew Clyde Swofford with misdemeanor breaking and entering.







# Secondhand marijuana not likely to trigger drug-test fail

**DEAR DR. ROACH:** My son is studying aviation maintenance, and the instructors tell the students to expect random urine tests for drugs when they are employed. Drinking alcohol is fine, but using marijuana and other drugs are cause for losing your license and thus your career. Recently we were walking around Boston for a day and we smelled pot frequently. Recreational and medical marijuana are legal in Massachusetts. He asked if one could fail a urine test by inhaling secondhand pot smoke. I doubt you could just by walking through a park, but what about attending a party or sitting in a car with someone who is smoking? — F.L.

**ANSWER:** Several studies have shown that a person sitting in a car or a closed room where cannabis is being smoked can result in low, but detectable, levels in a person's urine, even if they were not using the cannabis themselves.

However, most laboratories choose a threshold for calling a sample positive that is higher than was shown to be possible in the passive smoke experiments.

On the other hand, the concentration of THC in cannabis is much higher now than it was in those experiments, done mostly in the 1980s. In a 2010 study from the Netherlands (looking at a real-life coffee shop), urine levels in nonusers (between 5 and 8 ng/mL) still were well below the thresholds used to detect cannabis use that I

found in the published literature (25 to 50). I think it is unlikely that secondhand cannabis smoke will turn a urine test positive.

**DEAR DR. ROACH:** I have tongue-tie. My dentist recently mentioned it after several years with her and suggested that she use a laser to eliminate the issue. I am 63. Do you think that this would be useful or helpful to me at my age?

My tongue-tie is not severe, probably considered pretty mild. If I stick my tongue out of my mouth, I can touch the outside of my lips. The dentist, on the other hand, can almost touch her chin with her tongue. — T.T.R.

**ANSWER:** Ankyloglossia is a condition where the tongue is tied to the floor of the mouth by an unusually long or thick band of connective tissue, called the lingual frenulum. In infants and children, surgery is considered when there are problems with feeding or

speech that have not gotten better with time.

I have never had an adult patient ask me about having a procedure to eliminate the issue, but it is a fairly easy procedure for an expert to perform. However, if you aren't having any problems, I don't think I would recommend it being done. I have heard of professional wind instrument players undergoing the procedure to improve their playing, or people who speak publicly who develop tongue pain getting the procedure to reduce symptoms.

There has been some controversy about whether ankyloglossia is related to obstructive sleep apnea in adults and whether treatment, such as the laser procedure you mentioned, would be effective at relieving the sleep apnea. There is not enough evidence for me to recommend surgical treatment for ankyloglossia for obstructive sleep apnea at this time.

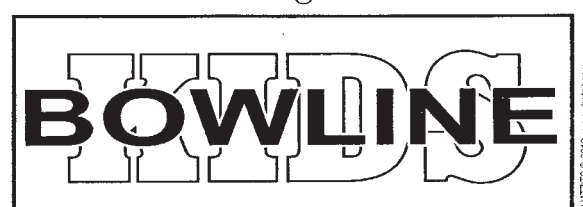

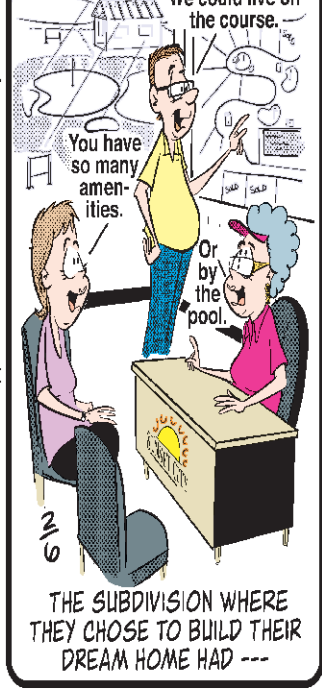

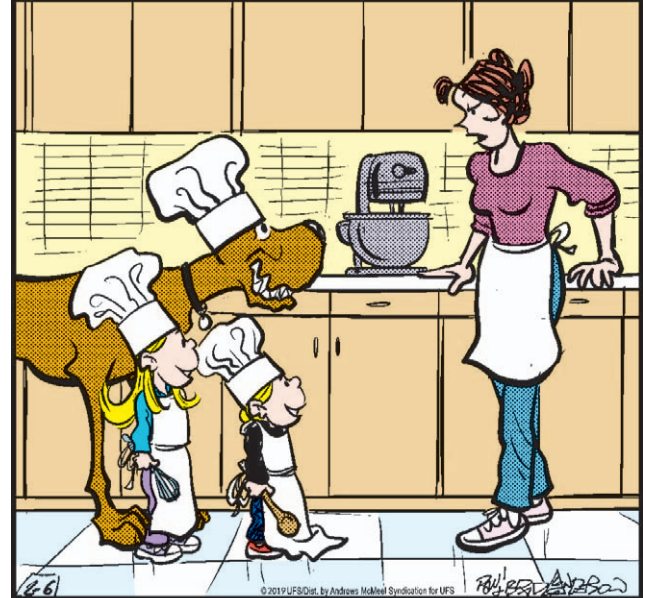

The opening club lead was ducked in dummy and won with East's king. East continued with a low club to dummy's ace as West followed with the eight. This contract would be easy if the diamonds split 3-2. Even a 4-1 split could be handled if West held the ace of spades, as two spade entries would allow South to set up the diamonds and then get back to

dummy to cash them. South had to re-think the whole hand when East showed out on the first diamond. The diamonds were now unusable except for the top three, and there were only eight tricks unless the spades came in for three tricks, which wasn't likely with no side entry to dummy.

Declarer found a clever way to get his ninth trick. He cashed both high diamonds in his hand and led a low spade to dummy's jack. He then made the key play of running the nine of hearts to West's queen. West exited with his last club to South's queen. South needed West to have started with three spades to the ace, to go with his known three clubs and five diamonds. He cashed the ace of hearts, removing West's last heart, and led the queen of spades.

West ducked the queen of spades, but there was no escaping his fate. South continued with another spade. West had to win and put dummy in with the queen of diamonds to enjoy the last spade. Nine tricks, with the help of his friends. Nicely played.

NEW YORK — President Donald Trump's four trips to his Mar-a-Lago resort in early 2017 cost taxpayers nearly \$14 million, a watchdog report Tuesday said.

The Government Accountability Office said travel and accommodations, Secret Service expenses, deployment of bomb-sniffing dogs and other costs for the trips between February 3 and March 5 in 2017 tallied to \$13.6 million. About \$60,000 of the tab went directly to Mar-a-Lago.

The GAO report provides one of the clearest pictures yet of the costs of the president's travel,

and how much of that money goes back to his own properties.

The nonpartisan research group for Congress also found that Secret Service costs for three trips abroad by Trump's two adult sons and their spouses in early 2017 ran to \$396,000.

Noah Bookbinder, executive director of the watchdog Citizens for Responsibility and Ethics in Washington, said the trips to Mar-a-Lago themselves are the real problem, not just the direct spending there.

"President Trump's failure to divest from his properties has created a situation in which he benefits from government spending

whenever he makes a promotional appearance at one of those properties," Bookbinder said in an emailed comment. "This is not a presidential vacation, but an official trip that provides invaluable free publicity to his business."

The White House did not respond immediately to a request for comment.

During one of Trump's trips to Mar-a-Lago in early 2017, the president played host to visiting Japanese Prime Minister Shinzo Abe.

The GAO report was requested by Democratic members of Congress, including California Sen. Dianne Feinstein and Maryland Rep. Elijah

Cummings.

The tally does not include expenses that are classified or salaries and benefits of U.S. government employees traveling with the president. The GAO said the latter would have been incurred if the president had not traveled.

The GAO also didn't include costs incurred by officials of the Executive Office of the President because the White House

did not respond to a request for the data.

Trump spent a total of 49 days at Mar-a-Lago in 2017 and 29 days in 2018, according to CREW.

In January 2017, Donald Trump Jr. and Eric Trump and their wives traveled to the United Arab Emirates. Eric Trump separately went to Uruguay that same month, then to the Dominican Republic the next month.

# Trump to meet North Korean leader Feb. 27-28 in Vietnam

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump said Tuesday that he will hold a two-day summit with North Korea leader Kim Jong Un Feb. 27-28 in Vietnam to continue his efforts to persuade

Kim to give up his nuclear weapons.

Trump has said his outreach to Kim and their first meeting last June in Singapore opened a path to peace. But there is not yet a concrete plan for how denuclearization could be implemented.

Denuclearizing North Korea is something that has eluded the U.S. for more than two decades, since it was first learned that North Korea was close to acquiring the means for nuclear weapons.

"As part of a bold new diplomacy, we continue

our historic push for peace on the Korean Peninsula," Trump said in his State of the Union address.

Director of National Intelligence Dan Coats told Congress last week that U.S. intelligence officials do not believe Kim will eliminate his

nuclear weapons or the capacity to build more because he believes they are key to the survival of the regime. Satellite video taken since the June summit has indicated North Korea is continuing to produce nuclear materials at its weapons factories.

lawmakers, the president was surrounded by symbols of his emboldened political opposition. House Speaker Nancy Pelosi, who was praised by Democrats for her hard-line negotiating during the shutdown, sat behind Trump as he spoke. Many House Democratic women wore white, the color favored by early 20th-century suffragettes. And several senators running for president were also in the audience, including Sens. Kamala Harris of California and Cory Booker of New Jersey.

Another Democratic star, Stacey Abrams, will deliver the party's response to Trump. Abrams narrowly lost her bid in November to become America's first black female governor, and party leaders are aggressively recruiting her to run for U.S. Senate from Georgia.

In excerpts released ahead of Abrams' remarks, she calls the shutdown a political stunt that "defied every tenet of fairness and abandoned not just our people, but our values."

Trump's address amounted to an opening argument for his re-election campaign. Polls show he has work to do,

with his approval rating falling to just 34 percent after the shutdown, according to a recent survey conducted by The Associated Press-NORC Center for Public Affairs Research.

One bright spot for the president has been the economy, which has added jobs for 100 straight months. He said the U.S. has "the hottest economy anywhere in the world."

He said, "The only thing that can stop it are foolish wars, politics or ridiculous partisan investigations" an apparent swipe at the special counsel investigation into ties between Russia and Trump's 2016 campaign.

Turning to foreign policy, another area where Republicans have increasingly been willing to distance themselves from the president, Trump defended his decisions to withdraw U.S. troops from Syria and Afghanistan.

"Great nations do not fight endless wars," he said, adding that the U.S. is working with allies to "destroy the remnants" of the Islamic State group and that he has "accelerated" efforts to reach a settlement in Afghanistan.

IS militants have lost territory since Trump's surprise announcement in December that he was pulling U.S. forces

out, but military officials warn the fighters could regroup within six months to a year after the Americans leave. Several leading GOP lawmakers have sharply criticized his plans to withdraw from Syria, as well as from Afghanistan.

Trump's guests for the speech include Anna Marie Johnson, a woman whose life sentence for drug offenses was commuted by the president, and Joshua Trump, a sixth-grade student from Wilmington, Delaware, who has been bullied over his last name. They will sit with first lady Melania Trump during the address.

Francis was asked about priests who target adult women — the religious sisters who are the backbone of the Catholic Church's education, health care and social service ministries around the globe — and whether the Holy See might consider a similar

universal approach to combat that issue.

"It's not that everyone does this, but there have been priests and bishops who have," Francis told reporters. "And I think that it's continuing because it's not like once you realize it that it stops. It continues. And for some time we've been working on it."

"Should we do

something more? Yes. Is there the will? Yes. But it's a path that we have already begun," Francis said.

The issue has come to the fore amid the Catholic Church's overall reckoning with the sexual abuse of minors and the #MeToo-inspired acknowledgment that adults can be victims of abuse whenever there is an imbalance of power in a

relationship. In the past year, The Associated Press and other media have reported on cases of abused nuns in India, Africa, Europe and South America — evidence that the problem is by no means limited to a certain geographic area.

Asked if any universal norms might be in the works to tackle the problem — as has been done

to handle cases of clergy sexual abuse of minors — Francis implied that the priestly abuse of nuns was still being dealt with on a case-by-case basis.

"There are cases, usually in new congregations and in some regions more than others," he said. "We're working on it."

"Pray that this goes forward," he said of the Vatican efforts to fight it. "I want it to go forward."

psychiatric problems, was arrested nearby and held on suspicion of having set the fire not long before. French police opened a criminal investigation for voluntary arson resulting in death.

Multiple neighbors said they heard the suspect and her neighbor, an off-duty firefighter, arguing over the woman's music before the fire broke out.

Police responding to the dispute stopped by the woman's apartment. The firefighter and his girlfriend told officers they were leaving to sleep elsewhere in peace and thought the neighbor had lost her mind and one day there would be an accident because of her, according to a police report seen by The Associated Press.

In an interview with Le Parisien newspaper, the 22-year-old firefighter

said he returned to the building a few minutes later, shortly after midnight, hoping the woman had gone. Instead, he ran into her in the stairwell, which was already beginning to smell of smoke.

"She wished me good luck, telling me that I loved flames," he recalled

in the interview.

Another resident later told him the woman put paper and wood in front of his apartment door, the firefighter told Le Parisien, which did not give his name.

Survivors described a chaos of smoke and flames, and the young

firefighter said he ran upstairs to try and evacuate the building. One neighbor recalled clambering out of her eighth-floor apartment and over balconies to reach safety.

Interior Minister Christophe Castaner spoke to reporters at the

scene Tuesday morning, as plumes of smoke speckled the sky.

"I want to salute the huge mobilization of the Paris firefighters," he said. "More than 250 people arrived immediately and, throughout the night, saved over 50 people in truly exceptional conditions."

It was the deadliest fire in Paris since the April 2005 hotel fire near the capital's famed Opera that killed 24 people. Over 30 people were being treated for "relatively" light injuries, Castaner said. Among the injured were at least eight firefighters.

Authorities suspect the fire resulted from a criminal act, he said.

Officials said suspect had "a history of psychiatric problems."

A judicial official, who spoke on condition of anonymity as an investigation was ongoing, told the AP the woman was drunk when officers detained her.

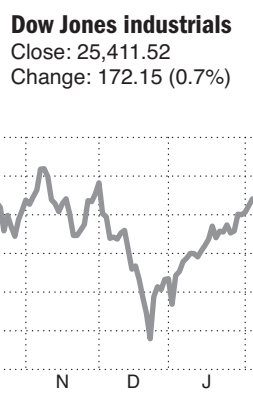
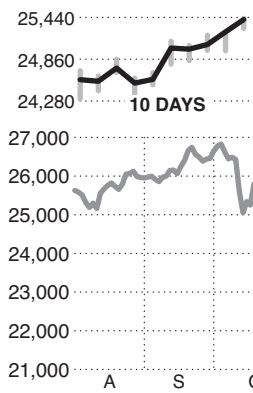
