Spook Hill under consideration for National Register of Historic Places

LAKE WALES – After months of research and documentation, City of Lake Wales staff received notification April 15 that Spook Hill may soon be placed on the National Register of Historic Places.

The announcement was made during the April 16 city commission meeting.

“I want to compliment (Lake Wales City Clerk) Jennifer (Nanek) on seeing that process through,” Lake Wales City Manager Ken Fields said. “She went to the state first and then the state recommended it go to the Department of the Interior. We just got the letter yesterday. It’s to her credit that she pushed this through.”

Nanek said that while she helped initiate the effort, it was the hard work of a state em-

ployee that made this plan a reality.

Florida Division of Historical Resources Historic Preservationist Max Adriel Imberman did much of the research and completed the register application. If the application is approved after a review process, the application will be made public online.

“Jennifer was extraordinarily helpful, giving me a wealth of historic sources to use during the research process,” Imberman said. “Jennifer, as well as the Lake Wales Museum, provided me with great context as well as historic images and documents.”

The Sun obtained an advance copy of the application to summarize for fans of local history.

District-wide job fair highlights Polk Schools’ hiring push

Recruiting efforts by Polk County Public Schools are in full effect and the district’s largest annual recruiting event is looming.

The school district will be hosting a hiring fair May 4 from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. at Tenoroc High School (4905 Saddlecreek Road) in Lakeland. The event will see PCPS officials offering jobs on the spot, as well as providing on-site guidance on certification for those who may be looking to teach as a career change.

In total, the hope is for the school district to reach its hiring goal ahead of the 2019-2020 school year.

“Our goal for this year is to have zero vacancies,” said Jessica Solano, Polk School’s Teacher Engagement Leader.

In addition to the May 4 event, officials from Polk Schools will be at hiring fairs around the nation. Solano said that, in an effort to be more efficient, the team is looking to data from the past to know which hiring fairs to best target.

“We look at the different fairs that we’ve attended and we look at the number of offers we’ve given at those fairs — as well as the number of offers that were accepted,” Solano explained.

In addition to leaning into historical data for efficiency, Solano said Polk Schools staff are trying to individualize each candidate pursuit.

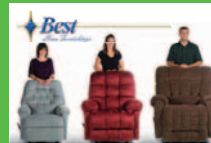

National measles surge has local officials encouraging vaccinations

Measles, the scourge that decimated families and targeted young and old alike decades ago — and was ruled eradicated from the United States in the mid 1950s — is back.

It is not in Polk County yet, but one case of measles has been reported in southeast Florida, adding the state to the list of some 20 others with outbreaks of the highly contagious viral disease.

So far, the surge has seen nearly 600 documented measles cases nationwide and there is no sign that the potentially devastating disease numbers won't continue to climb, says the World Health Organization.

Polk County Health Department spokeswoman Nicole Riley said that though no cases have been reported in Polk or other Central Florida counties, the health department is encouraging anyone with unvaccinated children to get their children the measles vaccine at any of the county's five health clinics. For children, the health department gives the vaccines without cost.

Adults can also get the immunizations, but there is a fee attached.

"If adults come to our clinic and are unsure of their immunization status, we can look up their record or request them from a different state," Riley said. "If this is unsuccessful, it does not hurt for an adult to receive the vaccine just to be sure."

Since measles is a virus spread by sneezes and coughs

it is easily transmittable, making it a "serious threat" to unvaccinated children and adults.

Recently, the National Center for Disease Control and Prevention issued a travel alert for several countries with major measles outbreaks. Included is the Philippines, where the lone Florida case is reported to have originated.

Although Polk County has more than 100,000 children in its schools, about 55 have not received the shots, citing medical or religious beliefs to obtain the waiver to admit unvaccinated children, says Polk Schools spokesman Jason Geary.

Proof of vaccination, or an approved waiver for medical or religious grounds, is required for admission to Polk Schools, he added.

Health officials at both the state and national level maintain that the internet has been flooded with anti-vaccination propaganda, with many claims that the vaccine is linked to autism. The CDC discounts those claims and adds that the vaccine is safe and unrelated to other diseases or disorders.

Usually, children are given an initial dose of vaccine when they are about a year old, followed by a second dose several years later, and the existing vaccines are 97 percent effective.

"Before 1963, an estimated 3-to-4 million people got measles in the US," the state health department reports say. "Since then, widespread vaccination has virtually eradicated the disease in this country."

"Unvaccinated people continue to get measles while

abroad and bring the disease into the United States and spread it to others," the Florida Department of Health website says.

Measles usually begins with a high fever, cough, runny nose and red, watery eyes. About three days later, the recognized rash appears.

"Measles is so contagious that if one person has it, up to 90 percent of the people close to that person who are not immune will also become infected," Riley explains.

Infected people remain contagious for four days before the rash appears to four days after the tell-tale rash surfaces, state officials say.

Measles also can result in pneumonia, encephalitis, or permanent hearing loss.

The recent outbreak is believed to be the most serious outbreak in the United States since 2000.

Anyone who is unsure if they received the vaccination as a child can go to the Polk Health Department for help in retrieving information locally or from other states. Anyone born prior to 1957 is considered immune.

The health department offers immunizations at five clinics: in Auburndale, at 1805 Hobbs Road; in Haines City, at 1700 Baker Ave. East; in Lake Wales, at 835 W. Central Ave.; in Lakeland, at 3241 Lakeland Hills Blvd.; and in Bartow, at the Specialty Care Clinic located at 1255 Brice Blvd.

Spook Hill is located a few hundred yards southwest of Lake Wales High School and northwest of Lake Wailes Park. Driving north on North Wales Drive near Spook Hill Elementary are a couple of Spook Hill signs and a line in the road. The first sign instructs drivers what to do — park your car on the line, put your car in neutral and see what happens.

Spook Hill is a “gravity hill” optical illusion. If you keep your eyes facing forward, your car will appear to move uphill after putting it in neutral.

“The optical illusion is caused by the view of the horizon being obscured by the high hill,” Imberman wrote. “Spook Hill was a significant local tourist attraction, well-suited to the post Second World War automotive age.”

According to psychological science researchers Paola Bressan, Luigi Garlaschelli and Monica Barracano, gravity hills, also known as spook hills, are “natural places where cars put into neutral are seen to move uphill on a slightly sloping road, apparently defying the law of gravity.”

There are only a handful of similar hills around the country that are associated with this optical illusion, including another Spook Hill in Maryland.

What may help set Spook Hill in Lake Wales apart from the others are the colorful legends associated with it.

The first signs near the hill were placed in 1950. Back then Lake Wales Chamber of Commerce staff got local business owners to sponsor the signage, one sign with instructions and another advertising the (now closed) “Great Masterpiece” tourist attraction.

In 1954 the first legend of Spook Hill was born after an advertising leaflet was published by the owner of a local restaurant. The brochure stated that a violent and feared pirate named Captain Gimme Sarsaparilla got “tired of the black flag and came to Lake Wales to retire and lead the life of a gentleman.”

As the legend goes, the captain and his assistant end-

ed up being buried at the foot of Spook Hill. One day a man parked his car on top of the grave of the assistant with “the weight of 16 dead men on a dead man’s chest.” Captain Sarsaparilla’s spirit then pushed the car uphill to relieve the weight on his aide’s grave.

In 1957, the Lake Wales Rotary Club sponsored a play called “The Legend of Spook Hill,” which described the life of Captain Sarsaparilla as a young pirate.

“The tangible connection to another era was a popular way to draw tourist attention and its resulting dollars,” Imberman wrote. “For this reason the legends behind Spook Hill began to reach further and further back into the past.”

In the 1960s the Spook Hill legend evolved with help from a sign that told the story of Seminole Chief Cuf-cowellax, who killed a giant gator terrorizing his tribe near Lake Wailes and was later buried near Spook Hill.

Members of the tribe noticed their horses labored on an old trail near the hill. Later, wagons carrying citrus had the same problem and that is how Spook Hill be-

came an attraction.

These stories connected Lake Wales to epic, historic events and made the tourists feel like they were using a road that had been used for hundreds of years, Imberman said.

Spook Hill may host more traffic than one would think, too.

In the 10 minutes or so of time the Sun was on site, five cars pulled up to the white line. Two of the families were on vacation from outside the United States. One family drove all the way from Kissimmee for the sole purpose of checking it out after reading about Spook Hill in a book called “Weird Florida.”

The last place to be put on the registry was Cypress Gardens back in 2014.

In addition to Spook Hill, the state is also considering adding two more sites in Polk County to the registry this year. The series of Gene Leedy homes near Lake Elbert and Shell Hammock Landing, a Florida Cracker-style house built in 1881 near Lake Wales.

Residents’ heroic efforts saved Winter Haven family of 3

WINTER HAVEN – At around 10 a.m. Saturday, March 23, Winter Haven residents Roger and Melissa Dodsworth were driving on First Street, near Winter Haven Hospital, on their way to Home Depot to do some springtime shopping.

They had no way of knowing that, moments later, they would play a pivotal role in saving three lives.

According to Roger, as they drove his wife saw what appeared to be a car that had crashed into Lake Silver.

“My wife jumped in with all of her clothes on,” Roger said.

As Roger got their car off of the road, he heard his wife yelling for him to grab something to break out a car window. All he could find was a hunk of wood.

“I took my cargo shorts off and jumped in the lake with my shoes, undies and a t-shirt,” Roger said.

Soon, they learned a piece of wood would not be enough to break a car window, but Roger saw another passerby with a tire iron and he called the man to come help.

Inside the car, Roger saw three people: a man in the driver’s side seat, a woman climbing into the back seat and an infant in a car seat in the back. Roger used the tire iron to break a rear window of the car.

“The second she got that baby out (of the car seat), the window broke,” Roger said. “It was perfect timing on everybody’s part. If she didn’t have the baby out of the car seat, the baby would have drowned. If I had been four seconds later, they wouldn’t have made it. It was perfect timing — an amazing thing to be part of.”

The three saved Winter Haven residents were Henry Saint-Hilaire, Suzanne, his wife, and their two-year-old daughter Zahlia. The family was on its way to church at the time of the accident.

Roger Dodsworth said he clearly remembers the yellow Easter dress Zahlia was wearing at the time. Nobody in the family was seriously hurt as a result of the crash. According to the Winter Haven Police Department, the

car’s steering wheel locked while they were going around the lake.

The crash happened at the same time as an All-American Ski Show that morning. Two boats associated with the ski show responded at around the same time that the Dodsworth family did.

Winter Haven Public Safety Director Charlie Bird attempted to award all six of the identified heroes who helped out that day during a Winter Haven City Commission meeting April 22. In addition to the Dodsworth family, Kat MacCalla was also present to receive her award.

MacCalla said she was working as a certified water extractor for the ski show and that she was part of the response, but that she did not personally rescue anyone. Also recognized were Andrew Petzold, Roger Alexander, William Simmons and Faith McHugh.

Two-year-old Zahlia Saint-Hilaire appears to have worn the same yellow dress to the Winter Haven City Commission meeting that she was wearing at the time of the crash. That could not be verified, though, as the Saint-Hilaire family speaks limited English.

Roger Dodsworth said in the days since, he has had some flashbacks about the accident while taking showers at home.

“Sometimes when the (shower) water hits all I see is the car and the little girl in that yellow dress,” Roger said.

Bird told Winter Haven commissioners that events like this define the community.

“These six individuals responded — they put themselves in harm’s way,” Bird said. “Had they waited until emergency personnel got there, this may have turned out different. This shows you the community we have here in Winter Haven that care so much.”

After Bird’s presentation to the commission, the family who was saved and some of the others involved all gathered in the lobby at city hall to talk.

As the grownups chatted, all Zahlia seemed concerned with was playing with the shiny “challenge coin” given to her during the presentation.

“We’re really trying to make the entire recruiting process a lot more personal,” she said. “We’re trying to make it a special moment, where they decide ‘this is where I want to start my career.’”

Solano spent 10 years in the classroom and is a former Polk County and Florida Teacher of the Year. As she tackles this new role, she says she is leaning on that experience in the classroom — but with students and colleagues — to craft a recruiting pitch that suggest Polks School is an organization one can grow within.

“We want them to see that this is more than a job — that it’s a career,” Solano said. “Sometimes the feeling is ‘I’m just a teacher’ ... what we are trying to really do by incorporating teacher engagement is to help candidates see that there are teacher leadership opportunities and ways to make an impact without leaving your classroom.”

Poinciana Parkway extension project could help northeast Polk residents

Polk County commissioners have endorsed a plan to give some traffic relief to residents of the county's northeast corner, supporting Osceola County's plans to extend the Poinciana Parkway.

Osceola Expressway Authority consultant Cliff Tate told the board the project would cost about \$275 million, but the Osceola authority is paying the freight for the extension, which will be from the end of the existing parkway to Osceola County Road 532.

Tate explained that the proposed extension would link with Ronald Reagan Parkway (County Road 54) so drivers could use the toll-road to reach CR 532.

"This will be a more efficient way to get to I-4," Tate explained, "and ultimately will link to Interstate 4."

County Manager Jim Freeman told the board that there

would be some right-of-way required by the Osceola project and the improvement as presented by Tate, but that the authority in neighboring Osceola would be footing that bill, too.

There were several alternatives presented, but the board opted for an intersection at Ronald Reagan Parkway which will be cheaper and require less land.

The part of the project that involves Polk County is from where the four-lane, limited-access highway crosses into Polk at Ronald Reagan Parkway near the county line, heads north, crosses U.S. Highway 17/92 and continues north across the CSX Railroad, west of Loughman, and dumps into 532.

The cost of the segment in Polk County will be about \$4 million, Tate explained.

The existing Poinciana Parkway opened in 2016 and spans a 10-mile stretch from Marigold Avenue at 17/92 and Ronald Reagan Parkway.

In other business last week, the county board approved giving \$328,128 to the Polk school system and the Vanguard

School to pay for driver's education. Freeman said the amount served 1,301 students. The money is generated from traffic fines, and, according to Freeman, \$5 of every traffic fine is earmarked for the Driver Education Trust Fund.

The board also okayed giving a \$790,000 impact fee credit to BWestwidge LLC in exchange for about five acres of land. Freeman told the board the property, located on the northeast corner of U.S. 27 and Bella Citta Boulevard near Davenport, would be set aside for the construction of a new elementary school in the future.

Officials explained that the school site would be a portion of the 20 acres needed to build a new school, which would be built on the site and ready to open in about five years.

Finally, the commissioners okayed the alignment for the Gibson Oaks Water Production facilities, which will serve the utility site near Socrum Loop Road in the north central county. The new facility will replace three aging water production facilities and include using two existing wells.

Polk Elections Supervisor talks Amendment 4, turnout at Tiger Bay meeting

BARTOW – With the passage of Amendment 4 to the Florida Constitution last year, about 1.4 million people with past felony records can vote in Florida as long as they fill out a registration form properly, said Polk County Supervisor of Elections Lori Edwards.

Edwards, who spoke at a Polk County Tiger Bay meeting on Wednesday, April 17, said despite the fact that the Legislature is working on a law hashing out exactly what Florida voters OK'd with 64.55 percent vote in favor of the amendment, no bill has been filed.

So, Edwards said all applicants for voting since the law went into effect in January have been issued voter ID cards.

Also, Edwards added, there is simply no way to know who has a past felony conviction.

"We cannot determine that," she said. "If 100 people register we don't know how many are felons."

Edwards estimated there are between 200-300 individuals in Polk County who can have their voting rights restored under Amendment 4.

In the Legislature, lawmakers are dealing with the language in the amendment. As stated on the ballot, people who cannot have their voting rights reinstated by the amendment are those convicted of murder or sexual

offenses. Those individuals can, however, appeal to the governor to have their rights restored.

"Before this measure, the only way to get the right to vote was to apply to the clemency board, which is the state cabinet," Edwards said. "They meet once a year and they look at 400 applications a year. Now it's going to be 10,000 applicants. It could take 25 years."

In the Legislature, representatives are arguing over items such as at what point a felony conviction is complete. The amendment said it can take place "after they complete all terms of their sentence including parole or probation." However, there is no mention of whether monetary penalties must be paid.

Edwards alerted the crowd to the relatively high turnout elections have been getting both in Polk County and in the state in the last few elections. In 2012, more voters appeared at the polls in Polk since 1994, with a turnout of over 60 percent.

"Picture Raymond James Stadium in Tampa," she said. "Imagine every person is a Polk County voter." The number of people who voted in Polk County would be that stadium filled three and a half times, she said.

Edwards also said the number of people voting without going to the polls is rising.

"Fifty-five percent voted before the poll workers showed up," she said, adding that 80,102 cast ballots by mail in Polk.

"I never thought it would be that high," she said.

Edwards said that the 2018 fall election was also memorable because of how close it was. There

were three recounts in Florida: the gubernatorial race, the U.S. Senate race and the race for agriculture commissioner.

Edwards said her priorities concern more communication and more voter privacy.

"I believe interstate data where we are sharing information on voters (is needed)," she said.

Another top complaint she hears often is the possibility of open primary elections. In primaries in Florida, people can only vote for candidates in the party for which they are registered. This leaves those who are not registered Democrats and Republicans from primary voting.

"I've seen complaints skyrocket," Edwards said. "People realize they can't vote and 29 percent are no party. They take it as a personal affront."

City introduces David Knowles as new deputy fire chief

David Knowles says there are a few things that brought him to Winter Haven to continue his career in public safety, but one thing stands out for the city's new Deputy Fire Chief.

"The size of the department — it's a department that I'll be able to know the name of everyone who works here," Knowles said. "They're not just a number. It's a family organization."

Winter Haven's Public Safety Department is the latest stop for Knowles in a career that has spanned three decades, dating back to his time with the Lehigh Acres Fire Department, east of Fort Myers.

Over that career, Knowles — who most recently served as the public safety director for Levy County — said that he has learned a few things. Namely, that communication matters.

"Communication is the key," Knowles said. "It's extremely important to communicate with your staff and communicate with the public ... get the department out into the public, so we can let the public know how we can work with them and make their lives better."

In a statement, Winter Haven Public Safety Di-

"I look forward to having David come on board and have the utmost confidence his experience will enhance the exceptional public safety services we already have in place for our citizens," Bird said.

Knowles accepted the position in March and his first day on the job was April 1. According to city staff, Knowles will earn an annual salary of \$85,720.

"Winter Haven is a super nice area to be in," Knowles said. "It's been great. The public has been great and a great bunch of employees have made that transition easier."

Financial education classes coming to Winter Haven, offered throughout Polk

Recent studies confirm that most Americans live paycheck to paycheck, a lifestyle which makes saving money difficult and one where even one missed paycheck could cause serious complications.

The Personal Finance Center of Polk County wants to help change that — and for free.

The organization provides financial education and coaching to Polk, Hardee and Highlands counties residents. Additionally, after meeting certain criteria, once graduates deposit \$300 into a savings account, the organization will match \$150.

“The idea behind this incentive is to get them into the mindset of saving,” said Stacy Brinkerhoff, Financial Stability Program coordinator for East Polk.

Other deposits and matching grants are available, but income-based, and also after meeting the requirements.

“We are here to help people,” said Tarrell Davis, Executive Director of the Mulberry Community Service Center, the organization that developed the finance education program. “We want to make it as easy to participate as possible.”

The organization is doing that by offering group classes in cities all over the county at various times of the day and online, as well. They also present the course, by request with at least 15 attendees, at business locations in the mornings before work or at lunchtime.

The financial course covers budgeting, working with financial institutions, getting out of debt and how to create and maintain good credit. It is held once a week for four weeks and is offered in young adult and Spanish curriculum, as well.

Davis said that enrolling in a class is easy and the first step is visiting www.financepolk.com, where you can find out details and RSVP for classes.

“If you are interested, determine what format you’d like to take the class in whether that be in a classroom setting and what location you’d like to attend. Once that is done, you will be assigned a coach,” Davis said.

Coaches provide educational assistance but, just as importantly, hold students accountable for attending the class as well as following through with their financial goals. Dinner is provided during the four evening classes.

An upcoming class will be held on Wednesday evenings from May 1-22 at the Wilfred Smith Community Center in Winter Haven.

The course has been offered to Mulberry residents for the past five years with much success. Because of that success, it is now being offered to East Polk residents and is funded in part by the United Way.

“The course really is for everyone from young adults leaving home and handling their own finances for the first time to newly-widowed people who may be handling finances for the first time,” Brinkerhoff said. “It really reaches across all demographics.”

After students graduate from the class, the coaches are there to continue to provide support, as needed.

“The coaches are there to help them work toward their goals after they graduate from the class,” Brinkerhoff said.

Davis proudly passes along numerous success stories of individuals and couples who have graduated from the course.

One couple is in the process of purchasing a home after their credit score in-

creased 84 points and \$1,800 toward tuition costs for a college student are two examples of how taking the course has helped successful course graduates.

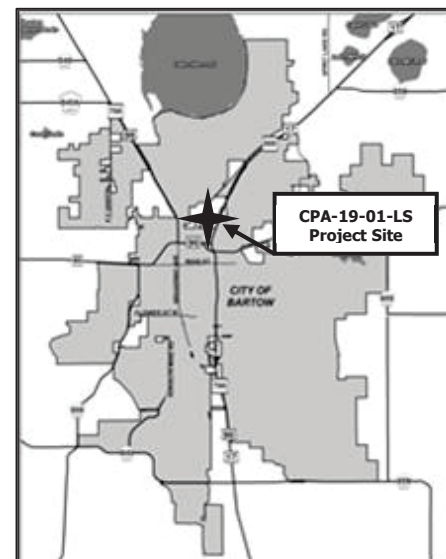

Winds suspected as cause of house fire

Crime Report

Lake Wales man arrested for possession of child pornography

On April 8, the Polk County Sheriff's Office arrested Richard Parr, 49, of Lake Wales and charged him with 22 counts of Enhanced Possession of Child Pornography, a second-degree felony.

Richard Parr was a firefighter employed by Polk County Fire Rescue. He immediately resigned at the time of his arrest.

The investigation began on March 6, when detectives received a CyberTip from the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC).

An image, first discovered on January 22, 2019, was determined to be apparent child pornography and was forwarded to NCMEC. 21 additional images were subsequently identified and flagged to an IP address associated with Parr's Lake Wales home.

The images depicted boys and girls between the approximate ages of 5 and 15-years old. The children were displayed in a lewd manner with adults and/or other children.

A search warrant was executed at Parr's residence on Monday, April 8. At that time, Parr was arrested, and numerous electronic devices and digital storage devices were taken by detectives. A forensic search of those items will be conducted and additional charges are possible, pending the outcome of that search.

At this point in the investigation, the identities of the children are unknown, as well as where the images originated.

"Make no mistake, those who view, possess, buy and trade child pornography are complicit in the crime against the child depicted in the images," Polk Sheriff Grady Judd said. "Some have not gotten the message. People in public trust positions are held to a higher standard and we expect better from them. The person we arrested is in a profession that a lot of kids look up to as a role model. We are going to continue to conduct these kinds of investigations to protect our children from those who trade and download child pornography-the demand for this vile material harms children, and ruins lives."

Jail inmate dies at local hospital

The Polk County Sheriff's Office is investigating the death of Gary Lee White, 59, of Mulberry, an inmate at the Polk County Jail since April 13, 2018.

White was taken to Winter Haven Hospital at about 4 p.m. Thursday, April 18, due to blood test results that showed an elevated potassium level. He passed away at 8:52 p.m. White was conscious and alert when he was taken to the hospital, and he was conscious, alert and answering questions while at the hospital.

The Medical Examiner will determine the cause and manner of death. White has an extensive medical history.

White's arrest last year was for three counts of felony failure to comply with sex offender registration laws and drug charges. He also had a pending charge for failure

to comply with sex offender registration laws from the Lakeland Police Department in January 2018.

The investigation is ongoing. It is standard PCSO policy for four separate, independent investigations. The PCSO completes a death investigation and administrative (internal) investigation. The Polk County Medical Examiner conducts the autopsy to determine the manner and cause of death.

All the investigative findings are forwarded to the State Attorney's Office for their investigation and review.

Fourth rabies case confirmed in Polk

The Polk County Sheriff's Office Animal Control Section confirmed on April 9 the fourth positive rabies case in Polk County for the year.

On Saturday, April 6, PCSO received a call that a dead bat had been located inside a garage at a home on Longleaf Circle in Lakeland. It appeared that no humans or animals were exposed to the bat prior to, or after, its death. However, due to the fact that it was found inside a dwelling, it was sent for rabies testing.

The bat was confirmed positive for rabies on April 9th.

Man tries to remove Haines City officer's weapon during altercation

A man was arrested late Sunday night, April 21, after a foot chase and altercation with an officer where the suspect violently tugged for the officer's gun.

Ervin Eugene Belford, 44, is being charged with battery on a law enforcement officer, depriving law enforcement of radio communication, resisting arrest with violence, resisting arrest without violence and violation of probation.

Officer William Tucker responded to 1603 Bartley St. after receiving word that a suspect with an active warrant was at the location. Upon seeing the officer, Belford fled on foot and was caught by Officer Tucker near 1305 Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Way. Belford, who had an active warrant out of Tallahassee, refused commands given by Officer Tucker and initiated a fight, pulling his mic from the officer's vest and throwing punches.

The struggle ensued in a confined space where Belford began tugging and pulling on the officer's firearm, attempting to remove it from the holster. Officer Tucker was able to free an arm and deploy his Taser. The first attempt yielded

negative results; Officer Tucker deployed his Taser a second time, which caused Belford to lose his grip on the officer's weapon. Officer Tucker was able to handcuff Belford.

"Every day, officers stand in the gap between good and evil," Haines City Police Chief Jim Elensky said. "When a suspect aggressively attempts to gain control of an officer's weapon, his intentions are clearly for the sole purpose of harming that officer. Officer Tucker was in a fight for his life and I'm beyond grateful that he won this fight."

Officer Tucker was able to regain use of his radio and call for other units to respond. Belford was taken to Heart of Florida Regional Medical Center where he was treated for minor injuries, cleared and ultimately transported to the Polk County Jail. Fortunately, Officer Tucker did not receive any injuries that required medical attention.

"Our residents deserve to live a life free of Belford and those like him," Elensky added. "Clearly, his time away from prison was not something he cherished. I'm going to ensure he returns to the gated community that he's become very familiar with."

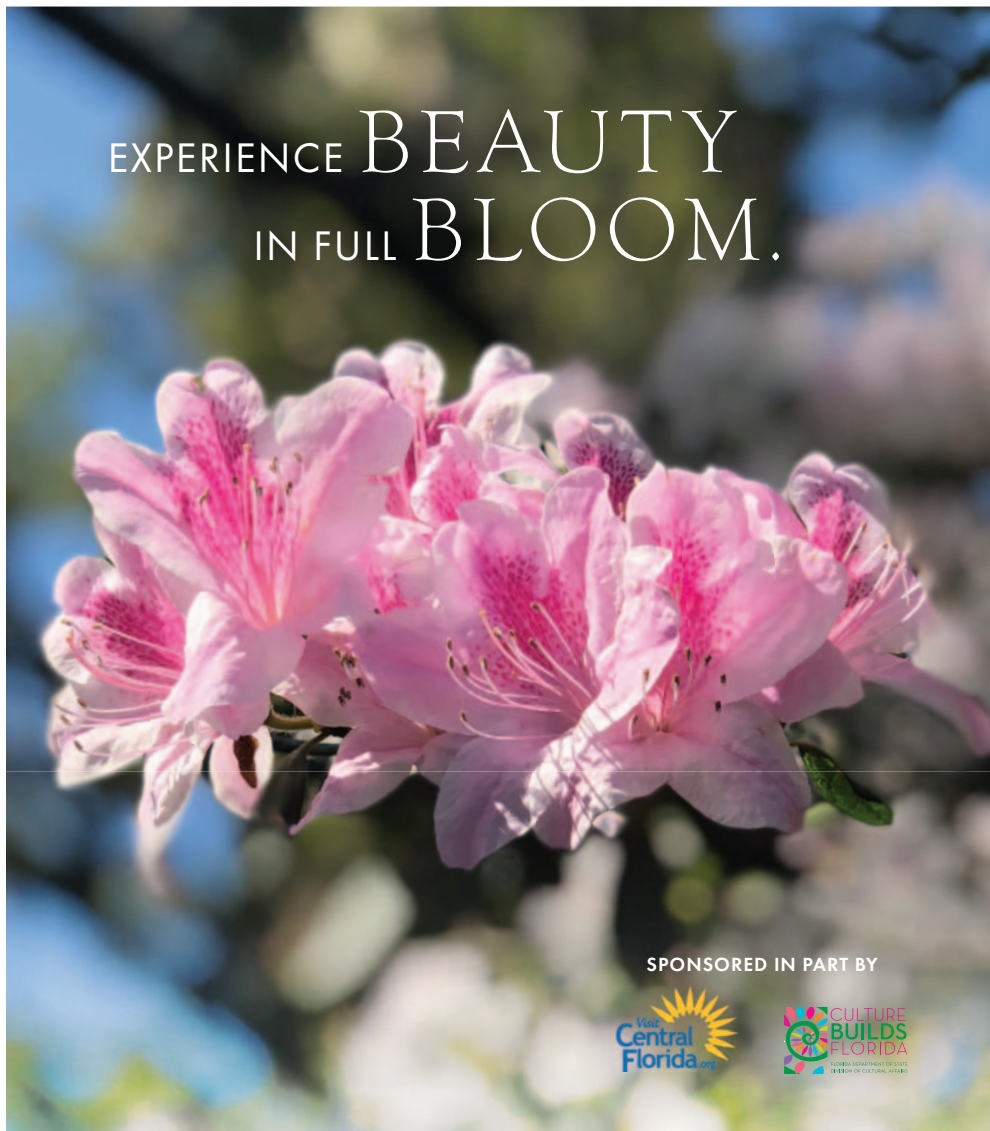

Downtown revival plans present Lake Wales with 'opportunity of an era'

LAKE WALES – During closing comments at a city commission meeting April 16, Deputy Mayor Robin Gibson said that Lake Wales Connected, the recent plan to redesign the downtown area, is an “opportunity of an era to take advantage of.”

Last year, the city commission decided to hire the urban planning firm of Dover, Kohl & Partners in an attempt to beautify the city and help get more foot traffic downtown.

On April 5, co-founder Victor Dover and his staff met with city residents to gather ideas and that meeting

impressed the deputy mayor.

“It is so good to have somebody from outside take a look and evaluate what we get accustomed to,” Gibson said. “Some of the things they came up with were very creative. I think that this next budget session is going to be really critical because we should figure out what portions of this will become a part of the budget. We have the opportunity of an era to take advantage of.”

Gibson said he wants city residents to approach the process as an investment — one that may take four or five years to implement.

“The return is in the form of increased property values,” Gibson said. “That is the measure of what we will

be doing. We have a magnificent opportunity to really set ourselves apart and do something really special for our town to make it more beautiful.”

The next public budget workshop is scheduled May 4 at city hall.

A draft report from Dover, Kohl & Partners is tentatively scheduled to be complete by June. A second budget workshop is scheduled in July.

Gibson encouraged residents to start thinking about this investment and communicate their ideas during these meetings.

“Everybody give it some thought,” Gibson said.

Commission receives update on Lake Wales Airport

LAKE WALES – The engineering firm of Hoyle, Tanner & Associates has had a contractual relationship to upgrade Lake Wales Airport for several years.

Recently, a firm representative told the Lake Wales City Commission that when they started, grass was growing through an active runway.

In 2004, city commissioners authorized a five-year capital expansion of the main east-west runway by 4,000 feet and add multiple taxiways. Planes then were using active runways to get from hangers to the refueling station.

The runway and taxiways on the north and east side of the airport are now done, the latter finishing up just last week.

Crews are currently working on taxiways servicing the north-south runway.

Before the capital project began, most jets could not land in Lake Wales. As a result of this investment, jets up to 6,000 pounds can land in Lake Wales, according to the commission presentation, and 125 jobs are dependent on the airport.

According to a March 29 Florida Department of Transportation bulletin, the Lake Wales Airport now has a \$15.2 billion impact on the Lake Wales surrounding area.

“As the airport grows, these numbers will grow,” according to the presenter.

Most of the monies used to pay for these upgrades were from state and federal

grants with relatively small amount of local investment.

In the coming weeks, city commissioners will have several meetings to discuss next year’s budget. There is talk of upgrading the fuel farm because the pavement there, if not well maintained, can easily damage a jet engine.

Some of the people who use the airport have rented camp sights. Lake Wales City Manager Ken Fields said FAA staff instructed him to end that activity. In the coming months, the camp sight will be shut down.

Kiwanis Park now has wifi and soon area residents will be able to enjoy surfing the internet at Crystal Lake Park and the soccer complex south of town.

LWFD firefighters will give kids a “splash down” and a LWPD K9 officer will demonstrate skills. Healthy snacks will be available while supplies last.

Gause Funeral Home owners recognized for Hall of Fame induction

BARTOW – On April 15, the Bartow City Commission issued a proclamation for the Gause Funeral Home in honor of the 91-year-old family business being inducted into the 100 Black Women of Funeral Service’s African American Funeral Home Hall of Fame.

At a convention in the first week of April, the funeral home — operated by the founder’s grandson, George Sabb, and his wife, Charlotta — earned the honor, prompting a show of pride from the city.

“There is such a rich history and legacy they have in Bartow,” Mayor Leo Longworth said, adding the city would be remiss to not recognize them for their achievement.

In thanking the city for the recognition, Charlotta said that, while she married into this legacy, the family will continue following “the footsteps of grandpa.”

Gause Funeral Home was started in 1928 by George Henry Gause Sr. and Marie Freeman Gause.

George Henry Gause Sr. died in 1933, leaving his wife to run the business. Later, his twins — Evelyn Marie Gause and George Henry Gause Jr. — helped. Both

took an active role in the community. When Marie Freeman Gause died in 1975, the funeral home was left to the twins.

George H. Gause was the first African American in the Southeastern United States elected to hold the office of mayor. That was in 1971. In 1977, he was also the first African American to sit on the Polk County School Board District III, when then-Gov. Ruben Askew appointed him to finish a term.

He was involved in civic and religious groups and is named in Bartow’s annual Martin Luther King Jr-George Gause Parade.

George H. Gause died in 1986, leaving Gause Funeral Home to his sister and surviving spouse, Alve Gause.

Until her death in 1998, Alve Gause worked with her sister-in-law, Evelyn Gause, and Evelyn’s son, George Sabb.

Since Evelyn’s death, the business is now run by the Sabbs.

No slowing her down: Local business owner, chamber board member balances life as a triathlete

DAVENPORT — It would be reasonable to presume that when Karen Tiner had to have surgery after injuring her knee doing yoga last year that she would have been sidelined for at least a few months.

It would be reasonable, but inaccurate.

Instead, just 11 days later, the triathlete ran in — and finished — a 10K race and six weeks later competed in a half-Ironman.

That determination reflects, in part, what has helped make Tiner successful.

As the co-owner of Amerifinance in Haines City and the past-chair and current treasurer of the Northeast Polk Chamber of Commerce, she has spent 26 years as a financial advisor building the business with her husband, Steve. Tiner is involved in the community, also, and was named Citizen of the Year 2016 and received the Outstanding Service Award in 2017.

“For me, being successful in endurance sports requires the same recipe of determination and setting high goals that I use in life and in my business,” she said. “I strive for my goals and never quit — I just keep moving forward.”

A runner since she was a freshman at Polk State College, the Haines City High alumna said she started competing in triathlons for several reasons.

“The thing about triathlons is that they are more complex and require more thinking, more training and just more discipline (than foot races),” Tiner said.

Up at 4 a.m. every day, Tiner said setting out on a run before the sun comes up functions as her cup of coffee.

“Running clears my head,” she said. “And, I get my best ideas when I’m running.”

Tiner first became interested in triathlons when the Ironman was held in Haines City in 2012.

“When I started to consider competing in the Ironman, I had never ridden a bike competitively but I thought it would be no problem and swimming, ‘Sure,

I can swim,’” she said. “But, what I didn’t realize then was there’s more to it than just frolicking in the pool.”

Competitors can participate in triathlons of shorter distances, but are all variations of the Ironman — or a “big daddy,” as Tiner refers to the race — consisting of a 2.4-mile swim; a 112-mile bike ride; and a marathon (26.2-mile run).

She has come a long way since her first Ironman seven years ago when she finished in 15 hours and 40 minutes. On April 14, she finished the Haines City Ironman in seven hours and 9 minutes.

“Quitting is not an option for me because I train too hard for that,” Tiner said. “I just think ‘I’ll never do it again,’ but then I finish and the payoff is worth it.”

Serious training and experience — she’s competed in 52 races since she started — are what have helped Tiner’s times improve so dramatically. She says that even when she’s not training for a triathlon, she runs every day and, of course, when she’s training she also incorporates swimming and biking.

“I have a gameplan for each event,” she said.

Proper pacing is an important aspect of each race and, for Tiner, it’s easiest during the run.

“I like to run next to people and talk to them,” she said. “I’m so humbled by their stories of why they are there, from cancer or having MS. I don’t ever finish a race without having made at least 3 or 4 friends along the way.”

Tiner’s husband runs, but hasn’t joined her in a triathlon yet. However, there is one member of her family who may follow in her triathlon footsteps. Paradise lost: Remembering the Poinsettia Park project



Beneath the Chinaberry Tree

It was about 1915 in Florida. Land speculation was popular across the state. Winter Haven was no exception.

One ambitious project named Poinsettia Park was planned for the shores of Lake Fannie — 600 acres and three miles of shoreline as proclaimed by a rare promotional brochure.

Among the principles in the project were: Lycurgus Burns, solicited professor; Fred H. Rankin, Assistant Dean at the College of Agriculture of Illinois; Harvey J. Sconce, president of the Illinois Corn Growers Association, Dean N. And Eugene D. Funk of the Funk Brothers Seed Company of Bloomington, Illinois; and J. G. Mel-luish of Bloomington, one of the foremost engineers of swamp land reclamation.

The group, motivated by the land potential, was considering a 20,000 acre investment. The brochure states,

“As they traveled about Winter Haven, Dundee, Lake Wales and the Garfield Tract they fell in love with the delightful climate, pretty woods and lakes and decided to buy a tract where they might build winter homes amongst the palms and flowers.”

After evaluating the area they selected and created Poinsettia Park for its great beauty, location and possibilities for development.

The planners selected seven residential lots for their homes and “are inviting many of their friends to join in making the park a most enjoyable social center, exclusive to the extent of soliciting and selling to none but good people.”

Forty-five acres of hammock and piney woods were to be set aside for a public park including one mile of Lake Fanny lakefront. The brochure touts the owners making avenues, roads and paths through the park and planting tropical trees, shrubs, plants and groves “retaining every pretty wild feature.”

There would be 100 one-acre residential lots. The promotion noted there were about 300 acres of “orange land” then covered by piney woods and that 40 acres would be cleared to plant citrus.

The pamphlet continues, “An attractive feature both for business and pleasure will be a boat line across Lake Fanny to the railroad station (Lucerne Park) for the carrying of passengers, mail, and freight. To facilitate boat traffic there will be piers and a boat pavilion.”

The Poinsettia Park project was associated with an organization called Peace Valley Farms Company whose officers included those mentioned previously as well as Winter Haven pioneer family members Florence Inman and Mary Jewett.

Very little of what organizers hoped for Poinsettia Park ever materialized.

There is some evidence of a pier across Lake Fanny and citrus acreage was prevalent there until the early 2000s. The Inman family had grove acreage in the area.

It seems that though the group had great enthusiasm, their enthusiasm was not shared with their target markets and the project eventually ran out of money.

The Fred Rankin family remained on property that was in the original Poinsettia Park concept. Fred Rankin died in 1958 at the age of 93.

Good grammar R us

Back in 1964, only a few weeks into my Florida National Guard career that would last for 30 years, Col. Ed Chassee, deputy commander of what was then the 53rd Armored Brigade, called me aside and said, "Frisbie, you and I are guardians of the printed word in this brigade."

I had three years of daily newspaper experience to my credit, plus two years

of administrative duties and personnel management in the active Army.

My entry job in the Guard was Officer in Charge of the Administrative Services Division. In the civilian world, this would have been called supervisor of the typing pool.

Colonel Chassee's point was that writing simple, declarative prose was not a common skill in the National Guard of that era, and he had appointed himself and me to do something about that in the 53rd Brigade.

I took Colonel Chassee's appointment as guardian of the printed (and spoken) word into the civilian workplace with me, and every now and then I set out to identify some of the egregious misuses that journalists, broadcasters and politicians engage in on a daily basis.

By far the most unforgivable misuse is the word "literally," whose purpose is to declare that a word that sounds like it can't be true actually is.

"This steak is literally the tenderest I have ever tasted." (Arguably true.) "It literally melts in your mouth." (Not unless it's a steak-flavored Popsicle.)

Another common way of identifying something truly remarkable is to identify it as "very, very, very exceptional." If that doesn't sound sufficiently declarative, how about adding maybe a dozen exclamation points

at the end of the sentence?

Sportscasters are the world's worst (with the possible exception of meteorologists) when it comes to exaggeration.

No football play was ever "brilliant" or "heroic."

A couple of weeks ago, I (literally) laughed out loud when a network sportscaster declared Tiger Woods' victory in the Masters to be "the greatest sports comeback of the century."

Words fail me.

When the Tampa Bay Lightning lost their fourth consecutive hockey game to be eliminated from contention for the Stanley Cup, a Tampa sportscaster called the loss "heartbreaking."

The death of a child's pet is "heartbreaking." The loss of the first four games of a best-of-seven playoff is "disappointing."

I have not strayed into a discussion of "who" and "whom." Use whichever one sounds right and your chances are pretty good that (1) you're right or (2) not many people will pick up on it if you're wrong.

I am less forgiving of anyone who is making more than minimum wage who will not learn the correct use of "me" and "I." I am unforgiving of the use of "myself" (usually pronounced "muhself"), often used as "muhself, our other coaches, and our team."

The use of its and it's is simple enough. (The apostrophe indicates a contraction; no apostrophe and it's possessive.)

That said, I can't be too critical of a good friend who explained his rule to me: "I use an apostrophe every third time I use the word."

Missing persons: Amber and Silver Alerts

Missing person cases are something the Polk County Sheriff's Office investigates often — more than you might think.

Many of the people reported as missing are found within hours. Many of those are due to miscommunication or a lack of communication. We've actually had deputies locate missing children in

their own homes, and that's not even unusual.

The cases that get most people's attention are the ones that are classified as Amber Alerts.

These are missing person reports regarding endangered children. For an Amber Alert to be issued, the U.S. Department of Justice has established criteria that

must be met first: the child must have been abducted, must be 17-years-old or younger, there must be great risk to the child, and detailed descriptions must be available for the child, abductor, and a vehicle.

At that point, the Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) will issue the Amber Alert.

Then, there are Silver Alerts for missing persons who are 60 years or older, endangered due to diminishing mental health and are in a motor vehicle or on foot. In some cases, a Silver Alert can be issued for someone between the ages of 18-59 (depending on the agency of the person).

Our Crime Prevention Section can provide parents with Ident-A-Kid kits, and they also have Project Safe & Sound bracelets for children and seniors with special needs.

NKorea's Kim on way to Russia to meet Putin

Thursday is a much-anticipated summit with Russia and NKorea

MOSCOW — Russian President Vladimir Putin will meet with North Korean leader Kim Jong Un for a much-anticipated summit Thursday, the Kremlin said, ending weeks of speculation about the meeting's timing and venue. Preparations for the meeting

in Vladivostok, a Russia city on the Pacific, were held in secrecy because of North Korean security concerns, Kremlin adviser Yuri Ushakov said Tuesday.

Ushakov said the talks would focus on the standoff over the North's nuclear program, noting that Russia will seek to "consolidate the positive trends" stemming from U.S. President Donald Trump's meetings with Kim.

Kim left Pyongyang by his special train at dawn Wednesday as he heads to Russia with top government and military officials, according to the North's state-run Korean Central News Agency. It said officials and residents gathered at Pyongyang's train station to see him off.

Kim will be the first North Korean leader to travel to Russia since his late father, Kim Jong Il, visited in 2011.

Kim Jong Un had two summits with Trump, but the latest in Vietnam in February

NEW YORK — Eyeing that can of soda in the supermarket cooler? Or maybe you're craving a pint of ice cream? A camera could be watching you.

But it's not there to see if you're stealing. These

cameras want to get to know you and what you're buying.

It's a new technology being trotted out to retailers, where cameras try to guess your age, gender or mood as you walk by. The intent is to use the information to show you targeted real-time ads on in-store video screens.

Companies are pitching retailers to bring the technology into their physical stores as a way to better compete with online rivals like Amazon that are already armed with troves of information on their customers and their buying habits.

With store cameras, you may not even realize you

are being watched unless you happen to notice the penny-sized lenses. And that has raised concerns over privacy.

"The creepy factor here is definitely a 10 out of 10," said Pam Dixon, the executive director of the

Mueller says FBI thinks Russians tried to hack Florida voting system; FBI not responding

MIAMI — Special counsel Robert Mueller says the FBI believes Russian agents gained access to "at least one" government computer network in 2016 while seeking to hack their way into Florida's elections system. Florida's elections supervisors and the state's elections chief say they have no reason to believe that's true.

And the FBI — the one agency able to clear the whole thing up — isn't saying anything.

Five days after a single vague sentence amid 448 pages in Mueller's Russian interference report seemed to upend public knowledge of 2016 elections hacking attempts in Florida, the FBI has yet to explain whether it indeed believes that Russia phished its way into the voting system. Both Florida's secretary of state and U.S. Sen. Rick Scott say the FBI has declined or ignored their requests for additional information, and neither the federal agency nor Mueller's office responded to requests for comment.

"The department reached out to the FBI to inquire which county was referenced in the Mueller report and they declined to share that information with us," Florida Secretary of State spokeswoman Sarah Revell said Tuesday. "The department does not have any additional details to share at this time."

Revell insists that the state's elections system remains secure and that it wasn't hacked in 2016. But the FBI's silence leaves an uncertainty around whether hacking attempts in Florida three years ago were indeed successful and if so, to what extent.

During August 2016, a Russian intelligence agency known as the GRU sent more than 120 emails containing a malware-infected Word attachment to "accounts used by Florida county officials responsible for administering the 2016

Myanmar court rejects appeal of jailed Reuters reporters

Reporters won Pulitzer Prize but will be jailed for 7 years

NAYPYITAW, Myanmar — Myanmar's Supreme Court on Tuesday rejected the final appeal of two Reuters journalists and upheld seven-year prison sentences for their

reporting on the military's brutal crackdown on Rohingya Muslims.

Wa Lone and Kyaw Soe Oo earlier this month shared with their colleagues the Pulitzer Prize for international reporting, one of journalism's highest honors. The reporters were

arrested in December 2017 and sentenced last September after being accused of illegally possessing official documents, a violation of a colonial-era law.

The court did not give a reason for its decision, which was quickly decried

by rights advocates.

"Wa Lone and Kyaw Soe Oo should never have been arrested, much less prosecuted, for doing their jobs as investigative journalists," said Phil Robertson, deputy Asia director for New York-based Human Rights Watch.

"Sadly, when it comes to media freedom, both Myanmar's military and the civilian government seem equally determined to extinguish any ability to question their misrule and rights violations."

Wa Lone and Kyaw Soe Oo, who are being held in a prison in Yangon, were not present for the ruling, but their wives were. Kyaw Soe

Oo's wife, Chit Su, broke down in tears when the ruling was read.

"Both he and I hoped for the best," Chit Su told reporters. "I am terribly sad for this decision."

Wa Lone, 32, and Kyaw Soe Oo, 28, had denied the charges against them and contended they

Saudi Arabia beheads 37 for terrorism crimes; most Shiites

DUBAI, United Arab Emirates — Saudi Arabia on Tuesday beheaded 37 Saudi citizens, most of them minority Shiites, in a mass execution across the country for alleged terrorism-related crimes. It also publicly pinned the executed body and severed head of a convicted Sunni extremist to a pole as a warning to others.

The executions were likely to stoke further regional and sectarian tensions between rivals Saudi Arabia and Iran.

Saudi dissident Ali Al-Ahmed, who runs the Gulf Institute in Washington, identified 34 of those executed as Shiites based on the names announced by the Interior Ministry.

“This is the largest mass execution of Shiites in the kingdom’s history,” he said.

Amnesty International also confirmed the majority of those executed were Shiite men. The rights group said they were convicted “after sham trials” that relied on confessions extracted through torture.

It marked the largest number of executions in a single day in Saudi Arabia since Jan. 2, 2016, when the kingdom executed 47 people for terrorism-related crimes in what was the largest mass execution carried out by Saudi authorities since 1980.

Among those executed three years ago were four Shiites, including prominent Shiite cleric Nimr al-Nimr, whose death sparked protests from Pakistan to Iran and the ransacking of the Saudi Embassy in Tehran. Saudi-Iran ties have not recovered and the embassy remains shuttered.

King Salman ratified by royal decree Tuesday’s mass execution and that of 2016.

The kingdom and its Sunni-led Arab allies have also been emboldened by U.S. President Donald Trump’s unwavering dedication to pressuring Iran’s Shiite clerical leadership, which includes his decision to pull out of a nuclear agreement with Iran and re-impose punishing sanctions to cripple its economy.

The individuals were found guilty of attacking security installations with explosives, killing a number of security officers and cooperating with enemy organizations against the interests of the country, the Interior Ministry said.

It brings the number of people executed since the start of the year to around 100, according to official announcements. Last year, the kingdom executed 149 people, most of them drug smugglers convicted of non-violent crimes, according to Amnesty’s most recent figures.

Executions are traditionally carried out after midday prayers. Public displays of the bodies of executed men last for around three hours until late afternoon prayers, with the severed head and body hoisted to the top of a pole overlooking a main square.

Powerful quake hits Philippines, day after deadly temblor

PORAC, Philippines — A new powerful earthquake hit the central Philippines on Tuesday, a day after a magnitude 6.1 quake rattled the country’s north and left at least 16 people dead, including in a collapsed supermarket, where rescuers scrambled to find survivors.

The U.S. Geological Survey put the magnitude of Tuesday’s quake at 6.4, while the local seismology agency said it was 6.5. The quake was centered near San Julian town in Eastern Samar province and prompted residents to dash out of houses and office workers to scamper to safety.

There were no immediate reports of casualties or major damage from the new quake.

Classes and office work were suspended in San Julian, where cracks on roads and small buildings and a church were reported. Power was deliberately cut as a precaution in the quake’s aftermath, officials said.

Meanwhile, rescuers worked overnight to recover bodies in the rubble of a supermarket that crashed down in Monday’s quake, which damaged other buildings and an airport in the northern Philippines.

The bodies of five victims were pulled from Chuzon Supermarket and seven other villagers died due to collapsed house walls in hard-hit Porac town in

Pampanga province, north of Manila, said Ricardo Jalad, who heads the government’s disaster-response agency.

Red Cross volunteers, army troops, police and villagers used four cranes, crow bars and sniffer dogs to look for the missing, some of whom were still yelling for help Monday night.

Authorities inserted a large orange tube into the rubble to blow in oxygen in the hope

of helping people still pinned there to breathe. On Tuesday morning, rescuers pulled out a man alive, sparking cheers.

Jalad said at least 15 people died in Pampanga province, including those who perished in Porac town. The quake damaged houses, roads, bridges, Roman Catholic churches and an international airport terminal at Clark Freeport, a former American air base, in Pampanga.

As Sri Lanka mourns, IS claims Easter bombings

Death toll rises to 321

COLOMBO, Sri Lanka — As the death toll from the Easter bombings in Sri Lanka rose to 321 on Tuesday, the Islamic State group claimed responsibility and released images that purported to show the attackers, while the country’s prime minister warned that several suspects armed with explosives are still at large.

Another top government official said the suicide bombings at the churches, hotels and other sites were carried out by Islamic fundamentalists in apparent retaliation for the New Zealand mosque massacres last month that a white supremacist has been charged with carrying out.

The Islamic State group, which has lost all the territory it once held in Iraq and Syria, has made a series of unsupported claims of responsibility and Prime Minister Ranil Wickremesinghe said that investigators were still

determining the extent of the bombers’ foreign links.

Sri Lankan authorities have blamed the attacks on National Towheed Jamaar, a little-known Islamic extremist group in the island nation. Its leader, alternately known as Mohammed Zahran or Zahran Hashmi, became known to Muslim leaders three years ago for his incendiary speeches online.

The IS group’s Amaq news agency released an image purported to show the leader of the attackers, standing amid seven others whose faces are covered. The group did not provide any other evidence for its claim, and the identities of those depicted in the image were not independently verified.

In a live address to the nation late Tuesday, Sri Lanka President Maithripala Sirisena said he also was kept in the dark on the intelligence about the planned attacks and vowed to “take stern action” against the officials who failed to share the information. He also pledged “a complete restructuring” of the security forces.

Wijewardene said the government had evidence that the bombings

were carried out “by an Islamic fundamentalist group” in retaliation for the March 15 mosque shootings in Christchurch, New Zealand, that killed 50 people, although he did not disclose what the evidence was.

The office of New Zealand Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern issued a statement responding to the Christchurch claim that described Sri Lanka’s investigation as “in its early stages.”

“New Zealand has not yet seen any intelligence upon which such an assessment might be based,” it said. An Australian white supremacist, Brenton Harrison Tarrant, was arrested in the Christchurch shootings.

As Sri Lanka’s leaders wrangled over the apparent intelligence failure, security was out in force for a national day of mourning Tuesday.

The near-simultaneous bombings Sunday at three churches and three luxury hotels, as well as three related blasts, left 321 dead and 500 wounded, representing Sri Lanka’s deadliest violence in a decade. The U.N. children’s agency said the dead included at least 45 children.

In some places, entire families fell victim.

Florida Senate OKs bill for firefighter cancer benefits

TALLAHASSEE — Cancer would be treated like an on-the-job injury for Florida firefighters and they’d receive a new package of benefits under a bill the Senate unanimously passed Tuesday.

The bill would provide firefighters with cancer the full cost of treatment, a

\$25,000 payout, disability pay and death benefits for beneficiaries. The bill lists 21 forms of cancer that would be covered.

“Firefighters do in fact get cancer at a much higher rate at a much younger age,” said Republican Sen. Anitere Flores, the bill’s sponsor. “Two out of every three firefighters in our state and across the country will contract one

of these types of cancers in their career.”

The bill is also one that has failed for years. Flores said some version of it has been filed since 2003. It almost died this year because the House wasn’t going to take it up. It was revived last week when Speaker Jose Oliva acknowledged pressure to hear the bill and allowed it to be considered in

committee. The full House was scheduled to consider the bill later Tuesday.

Republican Sen. Ed Hooper is a retired firefighter who said the statistics Flores cited makes him nervous. He said back when he was a firefighter, his colleagues didn’t take as many precautions about cleaning their gear of potential carcinogens.

“It was not cool to have

clean gear. It was cool to have really dirty, filthy gear to show that you were not the rookie, that you had been there and done that more than once and that made you a little tougher,” said Hooper. “Little did we know back then that all we were doing was working toward killing ourselves. Stupidity is not necessarily a great thing, but with progress comes

knowledge.”

Firefighters would have to be tobacco-free for at least five years before diagnosis to be eligible.

The bill is a priority for Chief Financial Officer Jimmy Patronis, who serves as the state’s fire marshal and who has been handing out decontamination kits at fire stations while pushing for the cancer benefits.

Punching Easter bunny who broke up fight has rap sheet

ORLANDO (AP) — It turns out an Easter bunny in Florida who was hailed as a hero for intervening in a fight between a man and woman has a rap sheet.

The Tampa Bay Times reports Antoine McDonald is wanted in New Jersey.

Police in South Brunswick, New Jersey, say McDonald and an accomplice were caught on surveillance cameras burglarizing a car in September 2018.

Dover, Delaware, police say McDonald was also arrested there in 2017 after he and two others were accused of committing two armed robberies.

Bystanders videotaped McDonald in the bunny suit intervening in the fight Sunday night in Orlando by punching the man. The fight was broken up by a police officer and no arrests were made.

McDonald tells Orlando television station WKMG that he tries to avoid fights.

Bill making texting when driving main offense passes House

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Texting while driving in Florida would become a primary traffic offense punishable by fines under legislation passed by the Florida House.

The vote was 104-9 Tuesday for the bill, which now goes to the Senate where a similar bill is set for debate Wednesday.

Under current law, officers can only cite drivers for texting if they are pulled over for some other violation. The House-passed bill would allow officers to stop motorists simply for texting alone.

A first offense is punishable by a \$30 fine, with a second offense costing \$60. Court costs and fees also would apply.

The texting ban does not apply to a driver using a navigation device or system or to a driver whose vehicle is stationary.

The bill requires reports to guard against racial profiling.

2 boating deaths in 2 days in Keys

KEY WEST (AP) — Officials say two boating deaths have occurred over two days in the Florida Keys.

The Miami Herald reports that 38-year-old Hector Emmanuel Rodriguez Sr. died Sunday, and 55-year-old Michael Wimer died Monday.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission says Rodriguez was operating a personal watercraft near Fort Zachary Taylor State Park in Key West when he rode over a larger vessel’s wake and fell off. Investigators say Rodriguez returned to shore, where he complained of breathing problems and collapsed. He died on the way to a nearby hospital.

FWC says Wimer had been rowing a smaller boat to his house boat off Islamorada shortly before someone saw him floating face down in the water. FWC officers responded and began CPR. He was pronounced dead a short time later.

Florida’s high court asked to reject Everglades oil drilling plan

FORT LAUDERDALE (Sun Sentinel) — Opponents of an oil drilling proposal for the Everglades have taken their case to the Florida Supreme Court, asking for a review of a lower court’s order that the state issue a permit for the controversial project.

Broward County and the city of Miramar filed papers asking the court to review a decision by the First District Court of Appeal telling the Florida Department of Environmental Protection to issue a drilling permit to Kanter Real Estate LLC.

The company, which represents the family of banker and developer Joseph Kanter, proposes to drill an exploratory well in the Everglades of western Broward County about five miles west of U.S. 27 and 10 miles south of Alligator Alley,

nearest to the city of Miramar.

The basis of the request for review is unclear. A short document submitted by the county and Miramar says the lower court’s ruling “expressly construes a provision of the state constitution and expressly and directly conflicts with a decision of another district court of appeal or of the Supreme Court on the same question of law.”

The proposal sparked intense opposition among environmentalists and local governments. The Florida Department of Environmental Protection denied the permit. But a state administrative judge ordered the permit to be issued, finding that the land in question was already degraded and that the project would not pose a threat to water quality.

During the administrative hearing, the company’s expert testified that there was a 23 percent chance of finding oil, considered high by industry standards, and if oil were found, it could be possible to extract 180,000 to 10 million barrels.

US expands probe into air bag failures to 12.3M vehicles

2010 through 2019 Toyota, Honda, Kia, Hyundai, Mitsubishi, Fiat Chrysler models included

DETROIT — U.S. auto safety regulators have expanded an investigation into malfunctioning air bag controls to include 12.3 million vehicles equipped with bags that may not inflate in a crash. The problem could be responsible for as many as eight deaths.

Vehicles made by Toyota, Honda, Kia, Hyundai, Mitsubishi and Fiat Chrysler from the 2010 through 2019 model years are included in the probe, which was revealed Tuesday in documents posted by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. It involves air bag control units made by ZF-TRW that were installed in the vehicles.

The control units can fail in

a crash, possibly because of unwanted electrical signals produced by the crash itself that can disable an air bag control circuit housed in the passenger compartment, according to NHTSA documents. The electrical signals can damage the control circuit, the documents say.

ZF, a German auto parts maker which acquired TRW Automotive in 2015, said that it's committed to safety and is cooperating with NHTSA and automakers in the investigation.

The case is another in a long list of problems with auto industry air bags, including faulty and potentially deadly Takata air bag inflators. At least 24 people have been killed worldwide and more than 200 injured by the Takata inflators, which can explode with too

much force and hurl dangerous shrapnel into the passenger cabin. The inflators touched off the largest series of automotive recalls in U.S. history with as many as 70 million inflators to be recalled by the end of next year. About 100 million inflators are to be recalled worldwide.

On April 19, NHTSA upgraded the ZF-TRW probe from a preliminary evaluation to an engineering analysis, which is a step closer toward seeking recalls. So far, only Hyundai and Kia and Fiat Chrysler have issued recalls in the case. Four deaths that may have been caused by the problem were reported in Hyundai-Kia vehicles and three in Fiat Chrysler automobiles. NHTSA opened an investigation in March of 2017 involving the TRW parts in Hyundais and Kias.

The upgrade came after investigators found two recent serious crashes involving 2018 and 2019 Toyota Corollas in which the air bags did not inflate. One person was killed. Toyota said it's cooperating in the probe, doing its own investigation and will take "any appropriate action."

Jason Levine, executive director of the Center for Auto Safety, a nonprofit consumer group, said the ZF-TRW case shows the auto industry thus far has learned very little from Takata.

"A single supplier of an important safety component provided what appears to be a defective part across multiple manufacturers and 12 million cars," Levine said. "While the first fatality reports emerged three years ago, it has taken a higher body count for more significant action to be taken

by NHTSA and most impacted manufacturers remain silent. The industry needs to do better."

NHTSA said it will take "appropriate action" based on the investigation's findings.

In the ZF-TRW investigation documents, NHTSA said that it didn't find any other cases of electrical interference in Hyundai, Kia or Fiat Chrysler vehicles that used the ZF-TRW system but were not recalled. Also, the agency has not identified any other cases of electrical interference in other Toyotas including Corollas, since the company started using the ZF-TRW parts in the 2011 model year. In addition, no electrical interference cases have been identified in Honda or Mitsubishi vehicles with the same parts, the agency said.

Justices seem ready to OK asking citizenship on census

Supreme Court's conservative majority seems ready to uphold Trump administration's plan

WASHINGTON — Despite evidence that millions of Hispanics and immigrants could go uncounted, the Supreme Court's conservative majority seemed ready Tuesday to uphold the Trump administration's plan to inquire about U.S. citizenship on the 2020 census in a case that could affect American elections for the next decade.

There appeared to be a clear divide between the court's liberal and conservative justices in arguments in a case that could affect how many seats states have in the House of Representatives and their share of federal dollars over the next 10 years. States with a large number of immigrants tend to vote Democratic.

Three lower courts have so far blocked the plan to ask every U.S. resident about citizenship in the census, finding that the question would discourage many immigrants from being counted. Two of the three judges also ruled that asking if people are citizens would violate the provision of the Constitution that calls for a count of the population, regardless of citizenship status, every 10 years. The last time the question was included on the census form sent to every American household was 1950.

Three conservative justices,

Samuel Alito, Neil Gorsuch and Clarence Thomas, had expressed skepticism about the challenge to the question in earlier stages of the case, but Chief Justice John Roberts and Brett Kavanaugh had been silent, possibly suggesting a willingness to disrupt the administration's plan.

However, over 80 minutes in a packed courtroom, neither Roberts nor Kavanaugh appeared to share the concern of the lower court judges who ruled against the administration.

Kavanaugh, the court's newest member and an appointee of President Donald Trump, suggested Congress could change the law if it so concerned that the accuracy of the once-a-decade population count will suffer. "Why doesn't Congress prohibit the asking of the citizenship question?" Kavanaugh asked near the end of the morning session.

Kavanaugh and the other conservatives were mostly silent when Solicitor General Noel Francisco, the administration's top Supreme Court lawyer, defended Commerce Secretary Wilbur Ross' decision to add the citizenship question. Ross has said the Justice Department wanted the citizenship data, the detailed information it would produce on where eligible voters live, to improve enforcement of the Voting Rights Act.

S&P 500, Nasdaq close at record highs

Marks stock market's complete recovery from end of last year

The S&P 500 hit an all-time high Tuesday, marking the stock market's complete recovery from a nosedive at the end of last year.

The benchmark index's previous record was set last September, shortly before the market sank in the fourth quarter amid fears of a recession, an escalating trade war between the U.S. and China, and concern the Federal Reserve was moving too aggressively to raise interest rates.

Those concerns have eased or taken a back seat to more optimism among investors this year. Investors are more confident in the prospects for

steady, if slower, growth. And they've been encouraged by an increasingly hands-off Federal Reserve, which has signaled this year that it may not raise interest rates at all in 2019 after seven increases the prior two years.

Traders are also feeling more optimistic about the global economy. In China, economic growth held steady at 6.4% in the first quarter of the year as increased government efforts to stem a slowdown gained traction. In the U.S., job growth rebounded in March following a surprisingly weak February.

And the uncertainty over the costly trade dispute between the U.S. and China has eased in recent weeks amid signs that both sides are making progress toward reaching a resolution.

The S&P 500 has now recovered all of the ground it lost last fall, gaining 24.8% since it hit a bottom on Christmas Eve.

"New highs, in and of themselves, tend to be bullish and tend to beget more new highs," said Willie Delwiche, investment strategist at Baird. "You have the combination of Fed friendliness, the economy still in good shape and some expectations from an earnings front being reset that create a fundamental backdrop that isn't all together unfavorable for stocks."

Tuesday's broad rally was driven by big U.S. companies turning in solid results for the first quarter. That surprised investors because analysts have forecast the worst quarter of earnings growth in years.

Court rules against Parkland sheriff

Israel fought his removal from office after the governor claimed he failed to prevent Parkland school shooting

MIAMI — The Florida Supreme Court on Tuesday ruled against a sheriff who fought his removal from office after the governor claimed he failed to prevent last year's Parkland school shooting.

Florida's highest court agreed that Gov. Ron DeSantis was within his authority to suspend Scott Israel as Broward County sheriff earlier this year. The justices noted that under the Florida Constitution, the state Senate is responsible for deciding whether the removal should be permanent.

"Today's Florida Supreme Court opinion leaves no doubt of my authority as governor to suspend a government official for neglect of duty and incompetence," DeSantis said in a prepared statement. "Scott Israel failed in his duties to protect the families and students of Broward County, and the time for delay tactics is at an end. I look forward to the Florida Senate resuming the process of formal removal."

Senate leaders previously decided to first let the case go through the courts. Senate President Bill Galvano had appointed a special master to

preside over a suspension hearing earlier this year. The special master announced Tuesday that a hearing has been scheduled for May 28.

DeSantis suspended Israel from his elected position in January and appointed an acting sheriff. Besides blaming Israel for allowing the Feb. 14, 2018, shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School that left 17 people dead, DeSantis has also criticized Israel's leadership during a mass shooting at the Fort Lauderdale Airport in early 2017.

Israel has said DeSantis overstepped his constitutional

authority and interfered with the public's right to elect their sheriff.

Israel's attorney Ben Kuehne said in a prepared statement Tuesday that Israel remains confident he engaged in no neglect of duty and fully intends to challenge his suspension in the Florida Senate.

"With today's ruling, local elected officials now need to be aware of the potential for governor overreach when discharging their duties," Kuehne said. "Political considerations that were never before a basis for suspension may now be a constitutional reality in Florida."

LA street to be renamed Obama Boulevard

LOS ANGELES (TNS) — A Los Angeles road (currently Rodeo Road) will officially be renamed in honor of former President Barack Obama on May 4, City Councilman Herb Wesson announced Tuesday.

The name change was first suggested by Wesson in 2017. In his proposal, Wesson noted that Obama held a campaign rally at Rancho Cienega Sports Complex on Rodeo in 2007 when running for president.

Rodeo Road — not to be

confused with Rodeo Drive in Beverly Hills — is a 3.5-mile residential street in the predominantly African American Baldwin Hills/Crenshaw neighborhood. The street intersects with King Boulevard, "creating one of the most significant African American points of interest in the country," according to the street festival event site.

Obama Boulevard will further establish a "presidential row" that includes Washington, Adams and Jefferson boulevards.

Mars lander picks up what's likely 1st detected marsquake

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — NASA's InSight lander has picked up a gentle rumble at Mars, believed to be the first marsquake ever detected.

InSight's quake monitor recorded and measured the faint signal April 6, and scientists announced the finding Tuesday.

While the rumble sounds like soft wind, scientists believe it came from within the red planet. The Paris Institute of Earth Physics' Philippe

Lognonne, who's in charge of the experiment, said it's exciting to finally have proof that Mars is still seismically active. Mars is not nearly as geologically active as Earth and, like our moon, lacks tectonic plates.

"We've been waiting months for a signal like this," Lognonne said in a statement.

InSight's lead scientist, Bruce Banerdt of NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, California, said this carries out the scientific work begun by

the Apollo moonwalkers nearly a half-century ago. The astronauts left behind seismometers that measured thousands of moonquakes.

As for Mars, "we've been collecting background noise up until now, but this first event officially kicks off a new field: Martian seismology!" "Banerdt said in a statement.

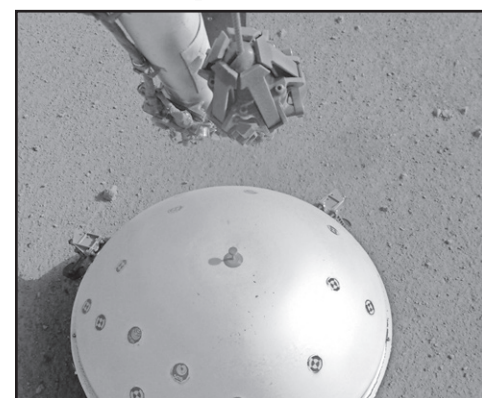
Researchers are still analyzing the data, as well as three other even fainter seismic signals detected since mid-March. By analyzing marsquakes, scientists

hope to learn more about how rocky planets formed.

The French seismometer was placed directly on the Martian surface in December, a few weeks after the spacecraft landed.

InSight's other main experiment isn't going as well.

The German-built drilling instrument — dubbed the mole — has managed to penetrate only a foot or two into Mars, far short of its goal to measure the planet's internal temperature. Engineers are still trying to figure out why and how the device got stuck.

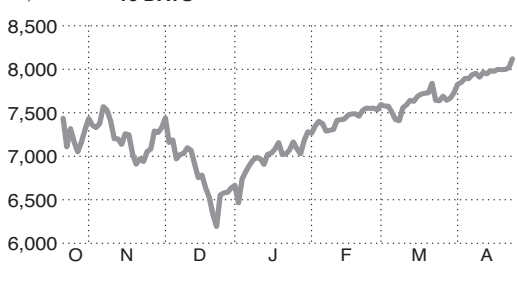
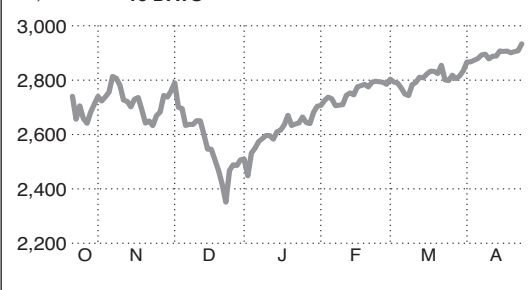

Need to urinate at night is a common problem for men

DEAR DR. ROACH: My husband, 79 years old, is getting up five or six times at night to urinate. The urgent care doctor said he doesn't have an infection but doesn't know what's going on. He is taking Flomax, but that doesn't seem to be helping. Who should he see? — E.L.O.

ANSWER: Urinating at nighttime ("nocturia") is a common problem for men, but if this is a new or suddenly worsened problem, it requires evaluation.

The first question is whether he is urinating a lot or a little. A male bladder typically holds about 500 cc (almost a quart), so if his bladder were full every time, he might be making as much as 2.5 liters a night.

Nighttime urination is considered high-volume when it constitutes a third or more of total urine output for 24 hours.

High-volume nocturia can happen when there is too much

of something to get rid of: sugar, in people with mellitus ("sugar diabetes"); salt, in people who eat too much salt at dinner; water, in people who drink a whole lot of water, especially at night; and occasionally in people with congestive heart failure. In heart failure, there is not enough blood flow to the kidneys during the day, so when the person is at rest, the kidneys have enough blood flow to get rid of the fluid that has accumulated during the day (often in the legs and feet).

Another cause of high-volume nocturia is diabetes insipidus, a problem with either the kidney or the control center in the brain, causing the kidney to excrete too much water. That control center uses a hormone called anti-diuretic hormone to regulate water excretion. Normally, it is high at night, so there is less urine output at night. Sometimes this normal variation is reversed, leading to excess urine output at night, even without diabetes insipidus.

High-volume nocturia is most commonly evaluated by doctors in internal medicine, including kidney and heart specialists.

Low-volume nocturia is caused by a problem with the bladder or, in men, the prostate. Urologists are the experts in figuring out where the problem is and the best course of treatment. Many men get treated for prostate problems when the real issue is an overactive bladder.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am a woman going crazy with hair loss. My hair has always been long and thick, but it is coming out in handfuls. I can only think it must be due to my blood pressure medicines. I've been taking amlodipine and lisinopril for years. I'm in good health and 90 years young. — M.

ANSWER: It is unlikely that the hair loss is due to either amlodipine or lisinopril. Neither of these are well described to provoke hair loss, and if a medicine is going to do that, it usually does within a few months.

The most common cause of hair loss in a 90-year-old woman is female pattern hair loss, in which the hair loss is mostly on the front and top of the scalp. However, there are several causes of hair loss, and a dermatologist may be helpful in determining the cause and treatment.

Please don't stop taking your blood pressure medicine.

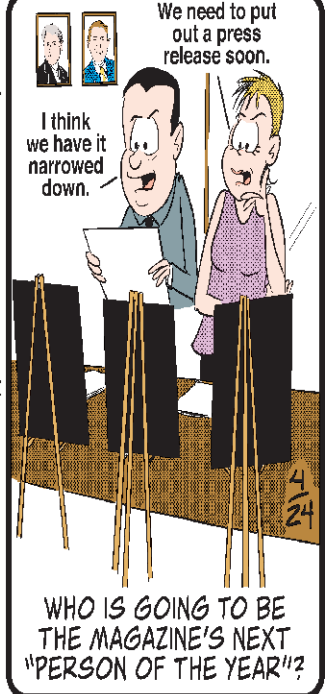

When the bidding came back to him, he tried a psychic two no trump, confident that the bidding wouldn't end there on this freak deal. His partner showed signs of life by raising no trump, so Zia tried another psychic bid. Five hearts was exclusion Blackwood, which suggested that he was void in hearts. The response showed one ace, so Zia gambled on seven diamonds, hoping either that partner's ace was in clubs or that West would lead the wrong thing. West, thoroughly confused after this auction, led a spade. Zia claimed when the dummy came down, discarding his club on dummy's ace of spades.

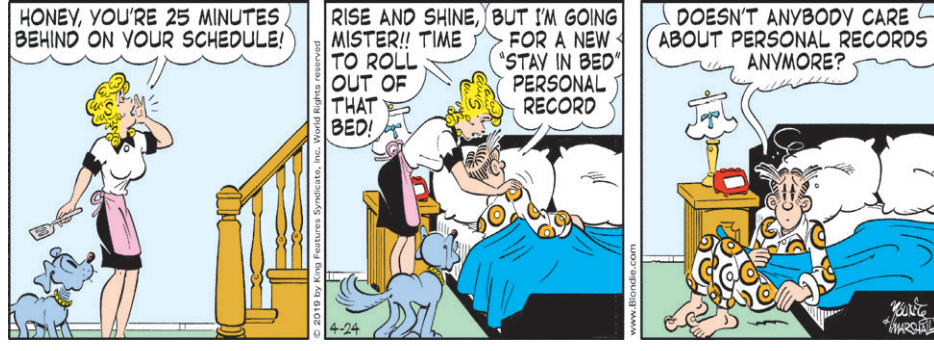
You might think that this hand is an example of Zia's great flair at the bridge table, but we disagree. A younger Zia would have discarded his ace of hearts on the ace of spades at trick one, carefully drawn the outstanding trump with dummy's jack of diamonds, and then discarded his club on the king of hearts. collapsed because North Korea wanted more relief from sanctions than Washington was willing to give for the amount of nuclear disarmament offered by Pyongyang.

Some experts say Kim could try to bolster his country's ties with Russia and China as he's increasingly expressed frustration at the lack of U.S. steps to match the partial disarmament steps he took last year. It's not clear how big of a role Russia can play in efforts to restart the nuclear diplomacy. But the summit could allow Putin to try to increase his influence in regional politics and the standoff over North Korea's nuclear program.

Putin's adviser added that the Kremlin would try to help "create preconditions and a favorable atmosphere for reaching solid agreements on the problem of the Korean Peninsula," Ushakov said.

Ushakov pointed at a Russia-China roadmap that offered a step-by-step approach to solving the nuclear standoff and called for sanctions relief and security guarantees to Pyongyang. He noted that the North's moratorium on nuclear tests and scaling down of U.S.-South Korean military drills helped reduce tensions and created conditions for further progress.

Ushakov said that Putin-Kim summit's agenda will also include bilateral cooperation. He added that Russia's trade with North Korea is minuscule at just \$34 million last year, mostly because of the international sanctions against Pyongyang.

World Privacy Forum, a nonprofit that researches privacy issues.

At the National Retail Federation trade show in New York earlier this year, a smart shelf on display by Mood Media tried to detect "happiness" or "fear" as people stood in front it — information a store could use to gauge reaction to a product on the shelf or an ad on a screen. Cineplex Digital Media showed off video screens that can be placed in malls or bus stops and try to tell if someone is wearing glasses or sporting a beard, which in turn can be used to sell ads for new frames or razors.

The screens can also be placed at the drive-thru. A minivan pulling into a fast food restaurant, for example, might get an ad for a family-sized meal on the video screen menu.

For now, the cameras are in just a handful of stores.

Kroger, which has 2,800 supermarkets, is testing cameras embedded in a price sign above shelves in two stores in the suburbs outside Cincinnati and Seattle. Video screens attached to the shelves can play ads and show discounts. Kroger said the cameras guess a shopper's age and sex but the information is anonymous and the data is not being stored. If the tests work out well, the company said it could expand it into other locations.

Walgreens, which has more than 8,000 drugstores, installed cooler doors with cameras and sensors at six locations in Chicago, New York, San Francisco and Bellevue, Washington. Instead of the usual clear glass doors that allow customers to see inside, there are video screens that display ads along with the cooler's contents.

Above the door handle is a camera that can try to guess ages and track irises to see where you are

looking, but Walgreens said those functions are off for now. The company said the cameras are currently being used to sense when someone is in front of the cooler and count the number of shoppers passing by. It declined to say if it will turn on the other functions of the camera.

Privacy experts warn that even if the information being collected is anonymous, it can still be used in an intrusive way.

For instance, if many people are eyeing a not-so-healthy dessert but not buying it, a store could place it at the checkout line so you see it again and "maybe your willpower breaks down," said Ryan Calo, a professor at the University of Washington School of Law and co-director of its Tech Policy Lab.

"Just because a company doesn't know exactly who you are doesn't mean they can't do things that will harm you," Calo said.

The technology could also lead to discriminatory

practices, like raising prices when an older person walks in or pushing products based on your perceived mood such as ads for anti-depression medication if the cameras think you look sad, adds Dixon of the World Privacy Forum.

"We shouldn't be gathering the emotional state of anyone," Dixon said.

Not all retailers are keen on adding embedded cameras. Walmart's Sam's Club, which is testing shelves with digital price tags, is cautious about them.

Jon Reily, vice president of commerce strategy at consultancy Publicis.

Sapient, said retailers risk offending customers who may be shown ads that are aimed at a different gender or age group. Nonetheless, he expects the embedded cameras to be widely used in the next four years as the technology gets more accurate, costs less and shoppers become used to it.

For now, he said, "we are still on the creepy side of the scale."

election," according to Mueller. He wrote in his report that the FBI, which investigated the hacking attempts, believes the GRU was able to gain access to "at least one" Florida county's computer system through this method.

But just as they have for more than a year, state

and local elections officials insisted last week that the FBI and the Department of Homeland Security explained in 2017 and again last year that there's no evidence that their networks were breached. And Mueller wrote that his office didn't try to confirm whether the FBI's belief that an attempt had succeeded was, in fact, accurate.

"It's very disturbing. It's troubling," Patricia Brigham,

president of the League of Women Voters Florida, said about the lack of clarity.

If the GRU was able to gain access into a computer network, elections officials stress that hackers would have accessed the voter registration network, so the system that processes and counts ballots is separate and would have remained pure. The state also released millions of dollars in federal security

grants ahead of the 2018 election.

But questions still linger: When Mueller referred to the GRU gaining access to "the network of at least one Florida county government," was he referring to an independent, county-level elections supervisor or simply a county government? And if he was referring to an elections office, how many does "at least one" actually refer to?

were framed by police. International rights groups, media freedom organizations, U.N experts and several governments condemned their conviction as an injustice and an

attack on freedom of the press.

Khin Maung Zaw, a lawyer for the two, said the pair could still seek their freedom by petitioning the president's office or the legislature.

President Win Myint could reduce the sentence, order a retrial or have them

released. Legislative action for a retrial would be a lengthier, more complicated process.

Myanmar's military launched a brutal counterinsurgency campaign in the western state of Rakhine in 2017, driving more than 700,000 members of the Muslim

Rohingya minority to flee to Bangladesh.

The Reuters reporters had worked on an investigation of the killing of 10 Rohingya villagers in Inn Din village, for which the government last year said seven soldiers were sentenced to up to 10 years in prison with hard labor.

Reversals show new day on Florida Supreme Court

TALLAHASSEE — On Jan. 4, just days before the start of a makeover of the Florida Supreme Court, justices issued two 4-3 decisions.

The cases drew relatively little attention across the state --- one dealt with Orange County elections, the other with attorney fees in a foreclosure battle. But on the losing end of the decisions were Chief Justice Charles Canady and his frequent allies Ricky Polston and Alan Lawson.

Four days later, three members of the majority in those cases --- longtime justices Barbara Pariente, R. Fred Lewis and Peggy Quince --- left the court because of a mandatory retirement age. And after Republican Gov. Ron DeSantis named three replacements, the Supreme Court took the unusual step this week of reversing course on the Jan. 4 decisions.

Justices, in a pair of 6-1 opinions Thursday, overturned the two rulings. The only dissenter in both cases: Justice Jorge Labarga, who had sided with Pariente, Lewis and Quince in January.

The new opinions are a tangible early sign about how the Supreme Court has changed since DeSantis appointed justices Barbara Lagoa, Robert Luck and Carlos Muniz to join fellow conservatives Canady, Polston and Lawson. The appointments erased a more-liberal majority that included Pariente, Lewis and Quince and had frequently bedeviled Republican leaders and business interests. The Orange County and

attorney-fee decisions are not the kind of high-profile issues that will draw heavy scrutiny or even necessarily reflect a conservative-versus-liberal divide. But they came as state policymakers ponder the effects of the Supreme Court makeover.

For example, the Florida House this week passed a bill that would require parental consent before minors could have abortions. The Supreme Court in 1989 struck down such a law as unconstitutional and has ruled in favor of abortion rights in other cases through the years. But now, with the more-conservative majority, lawmakers are debating whether a parental-consent law could be found constitutional --- with Republican backers expressing confidence that it would.

The Orange County elections ruling Thursday offered a more-detailed picture than the attorney-fee case about the new direction of the Supreme Court.

The case dealt primarily with a voter-approved 2014 ballot measure that called for Orange County's constitutional officers, such as the sheriff, property appraiser and tax collector, to be elected in non-partisan races. The requirement was challenged, and the 5th District Court of Appeal ruled in 2017 that state law governed such issues and blocked non-partisan elections for the offices.

In the Jan. 4 ruling, Quince wrote a majority opinion that overturned the appeals-court decision and approved the non-partisan elections. Quince wrote, in part, that

“we find that the Florida Election Code does not expressly preempt Orange County's home rule authority to determine that constitutional officers be elected in a general election without partisan affiliation.”

Polston wrote a sharply worded dissent that said the majority “blatantly disregards the language of the Florida Election Code.”

The Supreme Court on Thursday withdrew the Jan. 4 majority opinion and substituted a new decision that tossed out the non-partisan elections. “(The) Florida Election Code expressly preempts the Orange County ordinance, an ordinance that is in direct conflict with the Florida Election Code regarding whether candidates nominated by major political parties in the primary election may appear on the general election ballot for county constitutional officers,” the new opinion said. “Therefore, we approve the decision of the Fifth District (Court of Appeal), which held that the Florida Election Code preempts the Orange County ordinance requiring nonpartisan elections for county constitutional officers.”

Labarga wrote a one-paragraph dissent that said he continues to “agree with the analysis and conclusion reached by the earlier majority. Accordingly, I dissent from the current majority's holding that the nonpartisan-election portion of the Orange County ordinance is preempted by the Florida Election Code and to the decision of the majority to recall the mandate issued in this case.”

Recognize the signs of charitable fraud

It's now easier than ever to donate to charity. Prospective donors can now make donations using traditional telephones, computers, tablets and mobile devices, not to mention donating money in person. But if charities can solicit donations via such avenues, it's fair to assume criminals posing as charities can do so as well. To safeguard themselves and their money from perpetrators of charitable fraud, prospective donors should be on the lookout for the following signs.

- **Uncooperative solicitor:** Representatives of legitimate charities will be forthcoming with detailed information about their organizations, readily answering questions about the charity's name, mission, organizational structure and cost, and donation allocation. Criminals posing as charities may be less forthcoming with such information because their organizations are not real. When solicited by someone who claims to represent a charitable organization, insist they answer all of your questions thoroughly, ending the conversation politely if the solicitor seems unwilling or unprepared to share information.

- **Suspect tax information:** Legitimate charities routinely inform donors and prospective donors about the tax benefits of donating to their organizations, so solicitors should be able to instantly share information about tax deductions. The Federal Trade Commission warns against donating to an organization that won't provide proof that donations are tax-deductible.

- **Pressure from the solicitor:** Reputable charities and nonprofit organizations do not pressure prospective donors into making contributions. Criminals committing charitable fraud may try to pressure their victims into making immediate donations, asking for credit card numbers and other personal details without sharing information about the charity or giving donors time to research the organization.

- **Cash or wire requests:** Solicitors who insist on cash donations or wire transfers are another indicator of charitable fraud. Reputable organizations allow donors to contribute money via personal check or secure websites, and would never insist that donors make only cash or wire transfer contributions.

- **Promise of prizes:** Some criminals perpetuating charitable fraud will try to entice victims to part with their money by promising them prizes or sweepstakes winnings. But the FTC notes that the law dictates that donations are not required to make a person eligible to win a sweepstakes.

- **Donation pickup offer:** Reputable organizations will not require immediate donations to keep the lights on in their offices, so donors should avoid solicitors who offer to send couriers to their homes to collect donations immediately. This is another pressure tactic used by criminals. Legitimate organizations will allow prospective donors the time they need to vet the charity so they can make informed donation decisions. GB16B564

How to find an attorney

Tips when starting a neighborhood watch

Neighborhood watch programs can provide communities with a sense of security while serving as a low-cost deterrent to crime. The National Crime Prevention Council even notes that watch groups can serve as a stepping stone to community revitalization.

Establishing a neighborhood watch program is no small task. Such programs are most effective when the entire community lends its support and participates. Men and women hoping to start watch programs in their communities can consider the following strategies, courtesy of the NCPC.

Getting started

Gathering neighbors and fellow community members to gauge levels of interest and discuss the challenges ahead is a great first step toward establishing a neighborhood watch program. Before hosting your first meeting, contact the local police or sheriff's department and ask if an officer or deputy can attend the meeting and provide insight.

When planning the initial meeting, give fellow residents ample notice and choose a location that's easily accessible to all.

At this initial meeting, discuss the purpose of the program and ask fellow community members how willing they are to participate, including how much time they can realistically devote.

Moving forward

Once the decision has been made to start a program, organizers can then ask for men and women to serve as block captains. Block captains will be responsible for disseminating information about the program to their neigh-

bors, keeping them up-to-date on any crime or issues in the neighborhood as well. Captains also will serve as liaisons between the community and local law enforcement.

Men and women who volunteer to serve as block captains should devise a regular way to communicate with fellow watch members and residents. Email can be effective and easy, but keep in mind that older residents may prefer phone calls or direct contact.

Once community members have agreed to participate, organizers and block captains can create maps that highlight the homes of group members, including their phone numbers and/or email addresses as well.

Working with law enforcement

The cooperation of law enforcement can be considerable for neighborhood watch organizers. Speak with local agencies, asking if they provide training for watch programs. Such training may teach observation techniques and offer suggestions on reporting crimes.

Some local law enforcement agencies may even provide community members with neighborhood watch signs that participating households can post in their yards. Such signs can serve as a deterrent to prospective criminals and potentially help community members in distress.

It's important that neighborhood watch programs also discuss vigilantism with local law enforcement agencies. Neighborhood watch participants should never take the law into their own hands. Block captains should emphasize to members that the point of the watch is to observe and alert.

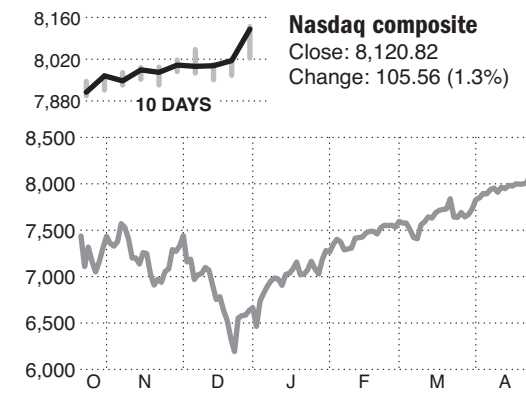
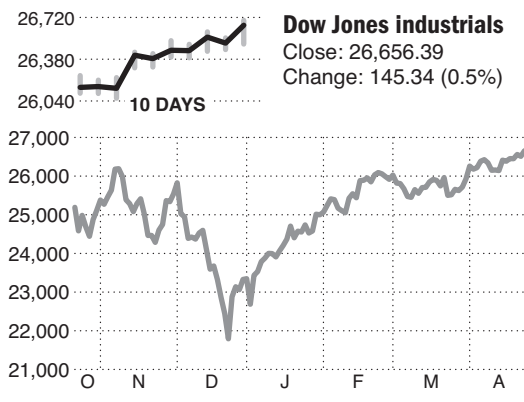
