

Attorney General sues the Ritz

WINTER HAVEN – Ritz Theatre Executive Director Stella Heath said she and her board made it through a five-month criminal investigation by State Attorney Brian Haas back in July, and that she is looking forward to the resolution of trust litigation filed against she and her board March 12 by Florida Attorney General Pam Bondi. "We were cleared (by Haas) and we stand by that," Heath said.

On Sunday Feb. 5, 2017, a group called Friends of the Ritz purchased an ad in the Ledger that, in part wrote, "Repeated efforts by a group of Winter Haven citizens who have offered to join the board, help the Ritz fulfill its potential and expand its mission have been either studiously ignored or summarily rebuffed. And so nothing changes and the Ritz remains a forlorn example of a beautiful but wasted community resource."

Before noon on Friday, Feb. 10, 2017, the group published a photo of a then-recently filed \$250,000 lien on the Ritz property, payable to Heath, should Heath be terminated, if the Ritz mortgage was refinanced, the mortgage satisfied or if the Ritz dissolved, or sold, or if the Ritz Board of Directors dissolved. According to Heath, as she was preparing to hold a date night showing of Breakfast at Tiffany's at the Ritz, just days after the newspaper ad and hours after another Ledger article questioning the lien, two people who identified themselves as working with the state attorney tried to question Heath about the lien, her sister Jane Tyl said.

After a five month investigation, the state attorney said, "Some members (of the Ritz board) have no recollection of (the \$250,000) lien being discussed or approved yet believe Heath is entitled to the lien for the work she's done for the Ritz over the years."

Hass concluded that there was probable cause of obstruction of justice through the use of simulated legal process but insufficient evidence to satisfy the state's burden of proof at trial of beyond a reasonable doubt. He then referred the case to the attorney general. After her own seven month investigation, the attorney general filed trust litigation electronically March 12, seeking a hearing with Judge Catherine Combee to decide whether to appoint a receiver at the Ritz, a third party to take over, and or seeking an injunction to cease and desist for the Ritz so the court can appoint an independent

Rec Center Supervisor loves her job

"I call these my kids because I really feel like these are my kids," says Dwan Lawrence, Winter Haven Recreational and Cultural Center supervisor. "I absolutely just love kids so much."

Hailing from Dunnellon, Florida, she was a cheerleader growing up and as a young adult, came to Winter Haven over spring break to see her two best friends.

Then, nine years ago, she moved to Winter Haven with \$60 in her pocket, and her little 3-year-old daughter.

Staying at a friend's house, she said she had no idea what the future held.

Ask her to describe Winter Haven in one word, and she says, "selfless."

Many people

reached out to her to offer to babysit while she searched for a job, others helped her financially or with words of encouragement. Dwan and her daughter visited the city's parks. "I said, 'the parks here are so nice and clean.' And I am from a small town, so we don't have a big park system. Just letting her run free in the fresh air and seeing how much fun she was having, I just decided to make it our goal to visit different parks throughout the city."

["]I really just fell in love with the atmosphere in the community that was here," she says.

First she worked in the school system as a para in ESOL, (English as a second language), helping break the language barrier for kids who spoke Spanish.

Then during the summer, she worked at the City of Winter Haven Parks and Rec, helping with summer camp.

"One of the benefiting things about working in Parks and Rec, I tell my staff all the time, you are literally saving lives right now. Whenever someone goes out and takes their kids to a park, whenever we throw an event, and someone is smiling, we are adding some time to lives," she says.

There are usually about 200 kids that show up at

the Rec center every day after school.

"You are not going to see one parent that comes in here," she says.

"I have to stay steadfast, I have to be consistent, I have to stay strong and firm, yet loving. Because I am the mother of this entire place for these kids. I make sure I know their names. They know my name."

Recreation was a natural path for Dwan.

Having grown up in a private school setting where teachers were able to offer the individual attention to each student according to their own learning style, she now applies what she saw as a child to her own work.

The years of working the city's summer camp turned into "more than I could imagine," she says. The camp is now more

Chain of Lakes Fieldhouse project unfolds

Plans continue to unfold for the first phase of the Winter Haven Chain of Lakes Field House, the funding of which was approved by the city commission through a \$25 million bond a few months ago.

Mark Jackson and Marc Zimmerman of Polk County Tourism and Sports Marketing and Tim Hoeft of Straughn Trout Architects spoke at the city commission meeting last week. Assistant City Manager T. Michael Stavres was also present to moderate and add details throughout the presentation.

Questions being asked by those in the planning stage include "What is the marketplace looking for?" in the Field House, "How does this building meet that head on?" and a question posed by city commissioner Willie Twyford as to the building's capacity for large events. Jackson noted that the state of economy and tourism in Winter Haven looks pretty good.

"If you are having a problem getting into our restaurants, that's a good thing," he said.

The vision of the complex has been that of a sports/business/tourism, "world class facility" which could host training and games.

Tourism and sports

assets drive dollars into the economy, Jackson told commissioners.

Their plan is to make the Field House, "recession proof."

What that means, he says, is "an investment in Winter Haven."

There is, he notes, already a "demand in hand."

There is an internal demand from local citizens for arts, culture and the theater. And there is an external demand from entities and teams wanting to hold conferences and competitions at the new facility.

"We have an indoor facility deficit of 60 percent," he said, noting that larger weddings, reunions, symposiums all need a place to land.

"Dollars and teams, families, go out of Winter Haven," he said, currently.

Zimmerman said the facility was going to be advertised and promoted, adding, "I know we could fill this facility every week with basketball and volleyball events, with 15 to 25 events annually."

"We have great volleyball clubs, but we have no volleyball tournaments," he said.

"Soccer came when Lake Myrtle was built."

Commissioner Pete Chichetto asked "What are you going to do to fill it up during the week?" and was told by Jackson "we really



In a rare show of good judgment when it comes to educational policy, the Florida Legislature left it to each of the state's public school boards to decide what is best for its constituents.

We would like to see this logic applied to other educational policies.

Polk County School Supt. Jacqueline Byrd was one of the state's first superintendents to declare that arming school personnel was not in the cards for the county's public schools.

We find greater merit in the Legislature's budgeting funds to put school resource officers onto every public school campus, and to allocate money for mental health intervention directed toward eliminating (or at least

reducing) the threat of campus carnage.

Sworn law enforcement officers are and should be society's first line of defense against deadly acts of violence. For them it is a primary mission, not a secondary responsibility.

SROs on campus provide many advantages beyond armed defense against attackers. Their presence can do much to build positive attitudes by students toward law enforcement.

By becoming a permanent, daily presence on campus, SROs have the potential to learn about actual or potential criminal activity. Their work is "community policing" in the extreme. The beat they walk — literally and figuratively — allows a prime opportunity to reduce lawlessness in the student communities they serve. Hopefully, money spent on mental health resources to identify and prevent potential campus violence can make inroads into this unique threat against our children's safety.

"We know who the potential predators are," one school principal told us a few days ago. Experienced teachers and administrators can recognize the danger signs, but have limited resources to bring about intervention.

Ready access to mental health professionals, along with new legal options for removing guns and ammunition from those identified as potential campus attackers, create new options for keeping campuses safer.

We believe that more SROs, better access to psychological services, and more effective ways to keep weapons out of the hands of persons identified as potential threats to student safety are sound approaches to combatting the kind of violence that has become too frequent in America.

It is one of the first laws of physics (if memory serves, which is never the way to bet) that we learn in school.

Consequences. This is a corollary of yet another law:

No Good Deed Goes Unpunished. To put it simply ... well really ... there is

no way to put it more simply than that.

County must discuss mental health

Since the Parkland school shooting, there has been a considerable amount of talk regarding mental health. At the next County Commission meeting, we will take up several issues that could impact how our county deals with inmates who are repeatedly arrested after having mental health problems. They may have been arrested under the Baker Act or for some other reason. The bottom line is we have a large number of "frequent flyers" and we need a better resolution than jail.

Mental health is such a difficult issue because in so many cases it starts with alcohol or drug abuse and there is little sympathy for these individuals. There are other individuals who for whatever reason just snap. When I was in college, a kid who I grew up with, went to church with, played golf with, experienced such a "snap." We were both in

Gainesville at the time and he came over to my fraternity house to visit one day, and he was not the same guy I grew up with, not even close. He didn't do drugs or alcohol, and he had always been a regular kind of guy. He dropped out of college and I didn't see him for over 25 years. One day I was at a store in the old Sears Town shopping center and there he was, pan handling. This guy had been a straight A student. He was close to graduating from college with a degree in chemical engineering. Now he was a street bum. I have wondered so many times what happened, what made him snap. Just a few years ago, he died in his sleep at a halfway house in Lakeland.

People like this don't need to be on the street, nor do they need to be in jail. Up until the 70's people with severe mental issues were sent away to large mental facilities where they lived for potentially the rest of their lives. Then the "do gooders" in our society decided these people had rights and should be free to do whatever. Who benefited from this type of thinking, certainly not the mentally ill? They have no place to go so they live on the street. Often, they are targets of abuse. Many of them turn to drugs after they have gone over the edge. Now we don't "warehouse" the chronically ill except in the most extreme cases and that usually means they have hurt or killed someone else.

Polk County will not solve this crisis, but as commissioners it is our job to do what we can to keep our streets safe. As human beings, it is our job to at least try to help those who can't help themselves.

The county will establish a set of criteria to determine if these new programs are getting the results we expect. If they don't work we will try something else. Regardless, we will keep trying.

In paragraph 59 of the trust litigation, the attorney general alleged that, "Efforts by several community members to obtain seats on the (Ritz) Board of Directors to help redress management and financial problems have been rejected by the (Ritz) board, which instead improperly filed an unsubstantiated \$250,000 lien against the Ritz Theatre property in favor of Heath.

that The Ritz owed Heath \$62,537.44 as of the end of 2014; and approximately \$117,625 by the end of 2017," according to paragraph 50.

The trust litigation describes how the how the state attorney came up with \$117,625.

According to the trust litigation, "The Ritz records show that, since July 20, 2012, Heath has not been consistently or timely paid by the Ritz for her work." The litigation further states that Heath's contract is \$400 per week, unless there are no funds, in which case she would be paid \$50,000 per year with three percent interest.

In paragraph 38 of the trust litigation, the attorney general stated Heath is owed \$62,400 in wages for 2015-17 at \$20,800 per year, but the math is based on \$400 per week and not \$50,000 per year plus interest. Calculated by her employment contract, Heath appears to be owed \$154,000 in back unpaid wages and interest alone. Since the difference between \$117,625 and \$62,537,44 is \$55,087.56, money owed to Heath not including unpaid back pay, using these calculations, Heath is owed a grand total of \$209,087.56.

This is still less than the \$250,000 lien, and the trust litigation documents several examples of how the board could have overseen Heath's book keeping better. Whether Heath and her board merit being removed for such has yet to be decided.

In paragraph 48, the attorney general stated Heath loaned \$15,250 of her own money to the Ritz between 2015 and 2017.

POLICE BEAT The information is gathered from police, sheriff's office, Florida Highway Patrol, jail and fire records. Not every arrest leads to a conviction and guilt or innocence is determined by the court system.

The numbers are in, and they're going the way we like to see them ... down. Every year, we track crimes in the unincorporated area of Polk County and our contract cities – our service area is 65 percent of the county. Those statistics are then forwarded to the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) for their Uniform Crime Report (UCR). The UCR tracks several types of crimes: homicides, forced sex offenses, robberies, aggravated assaults, burglaries, larceny-thefts, and motor vehicle thefts.

The FBI focuses on these crimes due to their seriousness, they occur regularly throughout the country, and they are mostly likely to be reported.


The results for 2017 show that we continue to see a decline in crime here, a drop of 10.4 percent to be specific.

That's 824 fewer crimes in 2017.

I see a lot of good things with these statistics, but one of the most amazing things to see is that we had a decrease in each of the tracked crimes.

In 2017 we had: 11 homicides (-3); 81 forcible sex offenses (-58); 133 robberies (-2); 981 aggravated assaults (-105); 1,475 burglaries (-273); 3,790 larcenies (-344); and 586 motor vehicle thefts (-48).

Reliable crime statistics first started being tracked in Polk County back in 1971. Back then, we had a crime rate of 4.16



crimes per every 100 citizens served by the Polk County Sheriff's Office. In 2017, we have an impressive rate of 1.64 crimes for every 100 citizens. Think about that, we are enjoying the lowest crime rate ever reported in Polk County. You might be thinking this all sounds familiar, like you've heard me say it before. Well, you are correct. I said the same thing last year when the crime rate dropped to a new low of 1.87, and the year before that when it fell to 1.95. I may sound like a broken record but the tune keeps getting better.

A lot of the success with lowering crime here comes from the hard work and skills of the men and women who work for the Sheriff's Office. It's not just the deputies; there are many folks at PCSO who never get a lot of accolades or attention from the public, but that doesn't make their work any less important.

Explosives found at residence

On Tuesday, March 13, 2018, PCSO deputies responded to a call indicating a package labeled "C-4 explosive" was found in a home located on State Road 60 in Bartow. Detectives executed a search warrant at this home, and subsequently found several firearms, military-grade explosives, and firearm silencers, according to reports. PCSO called The Bureau of Fire and Arsons Investigations (BFAI) and The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives (ATF) to assist in the investigation.

The PCSO says that Joel Ryals, 41, who lives at that address, was charged via warrant by the BFAI for 14 counts of possession of explosives requiring a license (F2). Ryals was taken into custody in Newton County, Mississippi, where he was conducting a K-9 training for a local law enforcement agency. Although Ryals has a law enforcement and military background, he does not have the required

Winter Haven News **Beymer rezoning draws neighbor discussion**

There was some discussion at a city commission meeting when a little rezoning ordinance was introduced in which Beymer Memorial United Methodist Church petitioned the city to rezone six parcels from multi-family residential use to public institutional zoning. The move would allow the church the freedom to expand their facility, according to Dennis Wood, of Dennis Wood Engineering, LLC, both member of the church and the one representing them at the city commission discussion.

However, because of recent opposition from nearby residential neighbors, at last week's city commission meeting, it was decided to move the rezoning matter to a future commission meeting in a few weeks, to allow the church more time to address those in the community who oppose the idea.

Neighbors nearby spoke at last month's city commission meeting, saying they are concerned the church is planning on building a soup kitchen, though Beymer has not said anything to date about doing that, or at least not in the city's paperwork approved by the planning board.

Neighbors say that those who come to receive goods from the food pantry two doors down from the church are already parking in other people's yards.

Mike Richardson, who says he lives across the street from the church, told commissioners he would rather "have a neighbor across the street than a food pantry," adding that he has called code enforcement on the parking issue.

Courtney Miller, who lives three houses down from the church, said "I have already seen this little street crowded," adding "would you want the scenario in your neighborhood?"

And it was because of the call to code enforcement that the city realized the church was erring by operating the food pantry

out of the house, as it is zoned residential.

Hence, the rezoning. Curtis Wampler told commissioners he has done lots of work with feeding the hungry and ministry to the poor and those in prison.

He says he has lived in the neighborhood 35 vears, and does not want the food pantry in the neighborhood at all.

Beymer did move their pantry, Dennis Wood said, in an interview with The Winter Haven Sun after the commission meeting, noting that was done because it was too difficult for the volunteers who helped stock and distribute the pantry to haul the food up stairs and down in the part of the church that faced Lake Howard. So, the pantry was moved to the other side of the church's thrift shop, the pink building next to the church.

Most of the volunteers are up in their years, Wood notes.

And most of those who receive food, Wood says, are not the "transients or homeless" described by Wampler as sleeping by his back door, but rather, "80 percent of them are elderly who just need a little help.'

Wampler's wife, Holly, spoke, the area has experienced "littering, trash, and crime."

She asked Commissioner JP Powell, who voted against a developer expanding a proposed housing development near his home by the Winter Haven Airport because of the amount of traffic it would cause on 21st Street, if he would want "this" in his neighborhood?

According to Jamie Brown, public information officer for the Winter Haven Police Department, there are "very minimal" calls for service in a 3 block radius of Beymer. The only crime committed recently in "calls for service" in the area, Brown said, was one car burglary at a residence along Ave. H.

"Oftentimes, there is a perception that crime is rampant when there are homeless or less fortunate citizens who are gathering in a location for food or clothing," said Brown. Wampler said he was

worried for his family's safety as well, noting that one of the homeless people used to sleep regularly on ground by the wall by his yard, close to his home.

Wood told commissioners that "Ultimately, Beymer wants to be a good neighbor.

"We are trying to do a service to the community." Beymer met with the neighbors in a private meeting at the church a couple of weeks ago. Wood proposed surrounding the residential house that was occupied by the food pantry with fencing and high shrubs, cutting off access from the residential side, and having the partakers of the pantry come in from the Lake Howard side of the church. Neighbors pressed Beymer to move the pantry back where it was, where people would line up by Lake Howard, instead of in their neighborhood.

At last week's meeting, Wood told the commission the church had stopped all their food pantry work until this matter is solved.

If approved, the ordinance would also include rezoning one parcel that was previously zoned mixed-use and placing it as public institutional.

The parcels are located at the southwest corner of 7th St. NW and Ave. I NW, as well as the southeast corner of Avenue H NW and 7th St. NW, about 2.34 acres and includes two single family residences, vacant lots, paved and unpaved parking, and a Scout building.

According to city records, some of the buildings were either demolished or used to house church functions. The Scout house is fully functional, and has been housing Boy Scout Troop 123 under Scout Master Tim Longstreet, for years, and meets there every Wednesday night.

Beymer's sanctuary, education building and preschool was rezoned to public institutional use in 2013.

City Principal Planner Sean Byers said in his memo to city staff and commissioners that the impact to the general neighborhood is expected to be "minimal."

Winter Haven News **Remembering Sarah Hulsey Hays**


Winter Haven lost a grand and gracious community activist with the passing of Sarah Hulsey Hays on April 3, 2002. To list only the organizations she founded or touched would fill more than this column. However, her love and dedication for both her family and Winter Haven prompt this review.

Sara was born in 1912 to Marion Jennings and Vera (Hill) Hulsey in Tampa. She attended Florida State College for Women (forerunner of FSU) and, upon graduation, taught home economics in the Hillsborough School System. As a young woman, she began her community involvement with the Merri Maker's House Club and was a maid in Ye Mystic Krewe of Gasparilla. In fact, she was scheduled to be Gasparilla Queen and chose instead to forgo that opportunity to marry Joseph Karl Hays in 1936.

Mr. Hays was a paper company executive, and in 1945 the family moved to Winter Haven, where he founded Hays Supply. The Hays family included daughters Sally and Susan, as well as son John.

Mr. And Mrs. Hays purchased and restored the grand home of Haven pioneer Dr. R. H. Peacock on the north shore of Lake Elbert. Sarah would fondly recall that as a young boy, son John would point to massive grove machinery that would travel a small road beside the house and say "funnyting." Today, that road (complete with street sign) is known as "Funnyting Road." The Hays would also know the tragedy of war as John became one of Winter Haven's early casualties in the Viet Nam conflict. Interestingly, that home is now owned by her great-nephew, James B. Threlkel, MD.

Sarah, busy raising her family, soon immersed herself in community activities. Girl Scouts and the



Winter Haven Garden Club were early pursuits. She, along with Lucille (Mrs. Sidney) Smith, founded the Winter Haven Senior High Cotillion and loved to reminisce about the students dancing at the Woman's Club with parents casting watchful eyes from the balcony.

The Hays met and became lifelong friends with Cypress Gardens founders Dick and Julie Pope. Sarah would recall traveling throughout the area with Mrs. Pope looking for suitable species of plants to augment the fledgling botanical gardens. With a wink and a smile she would add, "We always tried to get one cutting for the Gardens and one each for Julie's yard and mine."

Joseph Hays died in 1968 following a long illness. Following his death, Sarah took an even more active role in local and regional activities. An early advocate of bringing women's contributions to the table, she proved to be no "token" appointment to any of the formidable boards and organizations she served. Among her contributions, she served as a board member for Winter Haven Hospital.

In 1985, she was elected to the Winter Haven City Commission, eventually serving as Mayor pro tem. It was during this time that she was approached by a bipartisan committee regarding the removal of the railroad track from downtown Winter Haven. She was sought for her love of beautification and the community.

Sarah Hays was an elder and trustee at First Presbyterian Church, where she also taught Sunday School for many years. Her many interests included the Symphony Guild of Winter Haven, Keep Winter Haven Clean & Beautiful, Junior League of Greater Winter Haven, the Winter

Haven Chamber of Commerce, American Red Cross, and Historic Winter Haven.

Many have contributed to the beauty, welfare and culture of Winter Haven and none more richly than Sarah Hulsey Hays. For her tireless efforts and love of community, she was awarded Winter Haven's prestigious Bankers Cup in 1966, 1986 and 1996 ... the only woman to have received such recognition three times.

Information for this article is based on excerpts from "The History of Winter Haven" by Josephine Burr, newspaper articles and personal recollections.

About the series ... Early in Winter Haven's history, a large Chinaberry tree grew near the middle of Central Avenue at the corner of the Snell Bank (now the Times Square building). It was beneath this tree that early residents shared the news and solved the challenges of the day.

Welcome home Nickell Robey-Coleman

FROSTPROOF - Class of 2009 Frostproof Middle High School graduate Nickell Robey-Coleman returned home to sign a three year deal with the Los Angeles Rams for more than \$15 million March 14 at the Agricultural and Labor Program Lakeview Park Community Center.

The NFL cornerback didn't have an easy life growing up, but he had a loving family, and as he grew, a community that helped him become the man he is today.

Sitting down at a decorated table, surrounded by family and loved ones, Nickell said he felt like it was the draft day he never had. After graduating from Frostproof, the local athlete played ball at the University of Southern California and left school in his senior year to enter the 2013 NFL draft.



According to family, Nickell Robey-Coleman has 17 aunts and uncles, many of whom watched him sign with the Los Angeles Rams in Frostproof on March 14, 2018.

Unselected, the Buffalo Bills signed him later that year where he played until around a year ago. In April 2017, Robey-Coleman signed a one year deal with the Rams.

"This day, right here, words cannot explain it," he said. "The same people here, you were with me in 2013."

As his emotions welled, family gave Nickell time

to sit back and enjoy the moment.

Millie Ann Coleman, his maternal grandmother, said his mother would have loved to see the day. Maxine Robey-Coleman passed away right before Nickell graduated high school. Then one of his cousins lightened the mood by making a joke about all the money.

According to family, Nickell has 17 aunts and

uncles. And at 85 with her wonderful smile, Willie Mae Hamilton remembered how mailing Nickell \$25 made a difference when he was at college. She cautioned him to save some of those millions.

Nickell broke in to say he was one semester away from getting his bachelor's degree in real estate development from USC and that his

professional life would not end with the NFL. He then thanked John R. Alexander and his wife Sarah Jane Alexander of Frostproof for helping his family travel to see him play in college.

Christine Wilson is one of Nickell's other aunts. She still runs the ALPI daycare facility where Nickell attended in Frostproof at an early age.

"You had three suits, three pair of shoes and I remember you eating a lot of Ramen noodles when you were in college," she joked.

Aunt Semone Coleman was one of the last family members to speak.

"It was hard then but we had good times," Semone remembered aloud. "(Nickell's mother) Maxine would be ecstatic if she were here. She was always waiting for this."

Sitting quietly, soaking it all in was Nickell's father Earl Robey.

"I wish Maxine were here to see this family moment," he said.

Polk County Sports Tough day to score

For the longest time this weekend at the beautiful Country Club of Winter Haven, it was another Kim that looked like a winner at the Florida's Natural Charity Classic.

Hyemin Kim of Seoul, South Korea, held the outright lead after Friday's first round, and was tied atop the leaderboard Sunday morning when golfers headed out for their final round, delayed by heavy fog for about 90 minutes.

Kim had it rolling with three straight birdies Saturday on holes No. 11, 12 and 13, but also had five bogeys on her card, in a tie at five-under with a Florida favorite, Daniela Iacobelli of Melbourne, 90 miles to



Winter Haven's east.

Iacobelli might have won it, but ran out of holes Sunday, finishing one back. Her Saturday round was steadier than Kim's, with four birdies and just two bogeys. The flat stick was what kept her in it. "Honestly, the biggest thing that saved me, I probably made 40 feet of putts to save par," said Iacobelli. "It was just one of those days to where things could've got out of control both ways, but it just kind of stayed even. We're still dusting some rust off, still dealing with seeing your name on the leaderboard and remembering how to swing a club at the same time."

Saturday was a tough day to score, with only 16 golfers in the field of 132 getting under par.

All of Kim's five under came on Friday when she fired a 67, and she had to recover from a potentially disastrous shot on her opening hole, taking it all in stride. "My first hole at No. 10, my second shot went into the bunker and plugged. It was a struggle, but I made a good up and down from there," Kim said. "Then I feel way more comfortable to be on the course and I don't really feel nervous when I'm going somewhere that's really the wrong spot. I don't get discouraged at all, but sometimes when the missed shot go into good situation, then give me a lot of confidence. It's like golf."

Of course, the real winners are all the local groups and clubs and program that will get grants from Florida's Natural. The Tournament, 10 years strong, passed the \$1 million mark in giving to local charities.

When the stars line up

(Given that the Florida's Natural Charity Classic has been a fixture in East Polk for a decade now, one thing we've come to know is there are always interesting stories and characters and moments that make up the event. Take this year, for example. There was a hole in one, a pro golfer who actually was her own "twosome" since she played "with child," and there was even a player who literally came half way around the world just to tee it up in Winter Haven. Meghan MacLaren (Rushden, England) entered Winter Haven coming off her first Ladies European Tour victory in the Women's NSW Open at Coffs Harbour Golf Club in Australia on March 4. Get to know them all in a special edition of "Five Good Minutes," not with one individual, but with the future stars of women's golf, and a few others too.)

Victoria Morgan, on explaining how golf really is a team sport. "At USC, I learned the importance of the people that surround you. Since I left, I've created a new team. Whether that's a golf coach, trainer, mental coach, sponsor, fan (such as host families), or former teammates to practice with, these people mean everything to me. They're the reason I believe I can make my dream come true and make it on the LPGA Tour. I began working with (swing coach) Wade (Berzas) right after I walked-on during the spring of my freshmen year (at USC). He took my game from the level of a Division I walk-on to a Division I All-American, and now professional golfer. Wade believed in my potential and actually inspired me to consider turning pro. He is an invaluable member of my team. I train with Josh Loyo, a golf performance trainer and physical therapist at ForeFitness in Southern California. Last season I began to notice that during long stretches of tournaments, my body would begin to break down if I wasn't keeping up in the gym. I put in a lot of work this winter and will continue when I am on the road. The best decision I made this off-season was to begin working with Jim Gormley, the



head golf professional at Palos Verdes Golf Club. Jim works with a handful of LPGA players and I originally got to know him since he is a volunteer coach for the USC women's golf team. He has completely transformed my short game, which has historically been my weakness. I honestly feel like a different golfer now."

AJ Newell, a Tampa resident, on getting to play in her backyard. "I certainly love the travel that comes with playing golf as a professional, but it generally means no family or friends can come watch you play. Having this event so close to home means my parents will be able to come watch, and that means the world to me. Golf has given me a very tight knit family. To think back to all the clinics, lessons, practices, and tournaments that my parents sat through to get me to this point really amazes me. I remember all the tough practices and swing changes my dad and I worked through together, the workouts my sister motivated me to get through, and the pep talks my mom would give me when I was away from home. Playing so close to home makes

do. There are a few players in the field who I have competed with recently, so it won't be completely foreign. I think every tournament is an opportunity to learn about my own game and improve it, regardless of the results. Playing with the professionals, I'll definitely be on the lookout for things they are doing that I can improve on, or incorporate into my own game.

Davenport's Erica Popson on being back home to play. "Monday, I hung out with my best friend from high school. Just to be able to see my friends and have them come and see what I do for a living is pretty neat. I think playing at home also builds a little bit more of an expectation, so that's kind of hard to battle. It's just about being able to stay comfortable and not think this week is more important than any other week. Rachel Rohanna on playing while 28 weeks pregnant and how it affects her game. "She's getting more and more active, which makes me really happy and excited with each passing day. She's making it a little harder to golf each day, but soon we will get to meet her. There's nothing better than knowing she's growing and healthy. The hardest thing is going to the bathroom a lot. The swinging part is fine.

Distance for sure, definitely lost some. It's more the inconsistency of it. Some days it's two or three yards, some days it's 10 yards. With those irons, being used to hitting a 7-iron 165 (yards) and now pulling it out at 150/155 is a huge difference for me."

Josh Anderson, course pro, on Florida's Natural returning to the site where it originally debuted. ""They're great to work with. It's a recognized name and they're easy going, put on a good show. The tournament definitely wouldn't be what it is without them. The membership really supports it. They buy-in, not only from an exposure standpoint, but the quality of golf course."

Angelina Ye, at 16, on being the youngest player in the field. "It isn't the first professional event that I have competed in. Being the youngest player in the field doesn't really faze me. If anything, I think it's a little comforting knowing the rest of the field has more experience than I Jaclyn Jansen on acing the 161-yard sixth hole Saturday. "My caddy got the yardage. I was like, 'Seven?' He goes, 'No, a little wind, six.' I hit it well, just hoping to get on that green and get away with a par. Hits once, kicks a little right and falls right in. It was pretty cool."

Kim breaks Charity Classic record

Talk about going out in style. And the answer to your question, Lauren, is that golf is hard.

Putting a bow on the best round ever in the 10-year history of the Florida's Natural Charity Classic, Lauren Kim eagled the final hole to card a nine-under 63 Sunday to claim the championship on the first tournament of the season on the Symetra Tour Sunday at the Country Club of Winter Haven.

"It kind of didn't feel so hard to shoot 9-under. You wonder why it doesn't happen more often," she said, perhaps only half jokingly. The previous best round in the event was a 65, 10 years ago, on the same layout by Angela Oh, when the course was known as the Lake Region Yacht and Country Club.

The former Stanford standout had muddled through two largely non-descript rounds on Friday and Saturday, sitting just one-under going into the finals. Her comeback was sparked by a conversation with a fellow pro the night before he historic round.

"I was telling Charlotte (Thomas) last night, we had dinner and she's like, 'It's not impossible to win it.' And I said, 'Well, I have to shoot like 8-under.' I kind of brushed it off and then somehow I went off today," Kim said. "At certain points through my back nine, I had it in the back of my mind. I tried not to let myself get too far ahead because I knew there were great players behind me and I didn't know what they were going to do. I knew that I had to shoot a good score."

The winner's share of \$18,750 might help Kim earn her full-time status on the LPGA this year as the Top 10 money finishers on the Symetra Tour get their cards to play on the big circuit. She does have conditional status on the LPGA tour for this season, so she could play in some events there this year already.

It was her first Symetra Tour win. Daniella Iacobelli, of Melbourne, Florida, made a spirited run, grabbing an eagle of her own on the closing hole, to finish just one stroke back. "I had three eagle opportunities and converted one. I had one bad swing all day and it cost me a bogey," said Iacobelli. "I probably haven't hit the ball that well in months, if not years. Most of my putts for birdie were inside 20-25 feet. If they fall, I shoot 59. They didn't fall, I shoot 68. I have nothing to be upset about."



Bartow starts solar era

BARTOW - Mayor James F. Clements gave his city manager all the credit.

"George (Long) hit a home run on this," the mayor said. "It was him thinking outside of the box that made this all happen."

Last week, Bartow cut the ribbon on the first of what is likely to become three solar farms around the city over the next two years. The first one is cityowned, will power around 1,000 homes, and other than the man hours put into completing the deal, will cost taxpayers zero in advance.

NovaSol Energy President and CEO Haseeb Qadri was the developer of record. He said the \$11.5 million facility was financed, constructed and is now owned by third party private investors. The developer deeded the

land over to the city after the commission and city staff signed a contract with the developer to purchase all of the power generated.

Bartow purchases power in bulk from outside sources and resells it to residents for a small profit which allows them to keep property taxes low. For the last seven years, that policy saved the city enough money to justify the rate decrease which will kick in next month. When that contract ended in January, city manager Long started putting the pieces together to get a similar deal to buy power in bulk. The new deal also allows the city to purchase 20 percent of their power from renewable sources.

"It took us seven years to make that happen," Long said. "I feel great, but the decision to do this was not all mine." Long said the city

received 11 bids on the

Bartow city leaders cut the ribbon on a public/private solar farm with NovaSol and Renew Petra Solar leaders last week. project to make sure residents got the best deal. In addition to making this happen, Long also led the effort to get some additional solar panels on city hall which were recently completed.

Commissioner Billy

Simpson said that some time this week, with last week spent testing the new facility, the power will enter the grid. When that happens, solar power will be producing five to seven percent of the city's electric needs. Renew Petra Solar

President Greg Peterson,

who managed the construction of the facility, said it was a sod farm just months ago. The 40-acre solar farm is roughly a mile east of 91 Mine Road close to Clear Springs.

The other two solar farms that are in the works will be much larger but not city-owned.

Both of the other two are being developed by TECO. The second solar farm should be built by the end of the year and will be close to the first. The third will be north of Bartow and west of US 98. Construction on it is tentatively scheduled for December 2020.

School board may overrule Byrd on guns

LAKELAND – The recently enacted Florida gun law, in part, allows local school boards to decide whether to allow school staff to volunteer and possibly be considered as a candidate to carry arms and become guardians on campus after training.

Last week, Polk County Superintendent of Schools Jacqueline Byrd published a statement online saying she opposed training teachers to carry guns on campus. However, that decision is not up to her.

On March 13, the Polk County School Board met for the first time since Senate Bill 7026 was enacted into law. For more than an hour, they listened to Polk County Sheriff Grady Judd state exactly how much it cost to put a deputy in every school and how much less it would cost to screen and train guardian school staff. The sheriff and school board invited the father of one of the children murdered on Valentine's Day in Broward County and they listened to his emotional speech about how a guardian school board policy could have saved many lives on that tragic day. School board work sessions do not allow public comment, and no others were invited to speak.

After the two speeches, the board did not vote on the matter but there was discussion, a work session, and they all shared opinions which could provide insight on how each may vote soon.

For example Sheriff Judd, apparently somewhat jokingly, told school board member Billy Townsend that he did not appear in favor of the guardian program after a particularly testy exchange about gun control that ended when Townsend asked the sheriff if he was a member of the NRA.

"I don't think that is any of your business," Sheriff Judd said.

That is when board chair Lynn Wilson cut Townsend off.

In the immediate aftermath, school board member Tim Harris asked the sheriff how long it would take to get guardian teachers set up in school. The sheriff said it was a four week training and that it would be difficult to have in place by Aug. 13, the first day of school. Later in the discussion, Harris cited teaching history and the Second Amendment before he retired several times.

Fields asked some questions that the sheriff said, for tactical reasons, could not be answered in public. She commended the sheriff for being more proactive than other communities in regards to school safety.

"I don't think that private individuals should be allowed to have guns on our campus," Fields said. "I think that we really need to work hard to ensure that we get money and resources for law enforcement folks to do their jobs."

School board member Sara Beth Reynolds said she was not a fan of the concept when it first came to Southeastern University but values it more now. She asked the sheriff multiple questions about the guardian selection process and eventually blamed the press for using words like arming teachers, saying it was not just handing teachers guns.

"The PR for it has been awful and very misleading," Reynolds said. "I am truly disappointed in our media." School board member Hazel Sellers made note that there is not nearly enough money to put a school resource officer in every school.

"It's hard to choose some schools and not others," Sellers said. A few minutes later she elaborated saying, "I think that every school needs to have this kind of protection."

Board member Lori Cunningham said current funding is not enough to put a school resource officer in every school.

"We have to look at that next layer of protection in my opinion," Cunningham said.

Board chair Wilson only asked one question, whether teachers with other responsibilities would be allowed to become guardians. Sheriff Judd said part of the background check is asking administrators what they think and this could be cause enough not to pass a background check.

By the numbers, Sheriff Judd said to put a school resource officer in every traditional and charter public school, he would need to hire an additional 79 deputies at a cost of around \$7.5 million per year, not including schools on city property which would add the salaries of 44 officers. First year costs would be even higher. According to the chief financial officer for the school board, there is around \$5 million in funding for school safety now that the state has beefed up their security budget by a few million.

It costs \$3,866 to train a school staff member to become a guardian. Sheriff Judd said the school board could have 32 guardians for the cost of one SRO.

School hardening was not a large part of the new state law and was not part of the work session discussion.





Water School, part two

(Editor's Note: This is part two of a multi-part series on Water School, a two-day class offered to elected and other area leaders who want to understand more about water issues in the county.)

LAKE WALES – On March 9, a bus carrying 28 Polk County leaders left on a three-stop field trip to learn about local water issues.

Last week, the newspaper featured water conservation, reminding the public that half of all drinking water is sprayed on landscaping. The choice is simple, stop allowing that behavior or spend hundreds of millions of dollars sticking even more straws into the sand.

The water conservation class was the third stop on day one of Water School. Stop one was at Bok Academy in Lake Wales.

Getting off the bus, seventh and eighth-grade students used a simple way to help show how

runoff from high grounds can damage lakes below. They crumpled up a piece of paper, unfolded it and used markers to color the ridges in the paper. Then, using a spray gun of water, they sprayed the paper. The now brown ink pooled together on the paper. Bok Academy is on the

Bok Academy is on the western shore of Crooked

Lake. The Bok Boat of Knowledge took riders on a short tour to see results of a multi-year restoration project. Various state and local agencies teamed up to purchase around 500 acres on the western edge of the lake, changing the land to prevent runoff and promote more wildlife activity. According to Polk

County Parks and Natural Resources Director Jeff Spence, over the years the Crooked Lake levels have varied as much as 17 feet, and there is a direct correlation between how high the lake is and how much water gets pumped out of the ground.

Recently Lake Region Lakes Management District Executive Director Roger Griffiths told the newspaper that most area lakes were formed by limestone collapsing into sinkholes. Over time, sediment has clogged the sinkhole, but some area lakes are "leaky" in that water enters the aquifer from the lake at the sinkhole.

Spence said Crooked Lake "leaks" on the east side. It's either the second or fourth-largest lake in the county depending on what level it's at, Spence said.

For example, according to the Crooked Lake Quality Management Plan, high rainfall of 81.4 inches in 2005 is associated with the highest the lake has ever been. But the lowest that the lake has ever been was in 1991, a year with near average rainfall. There are factors beyond rain that affect lake levels, and over pumping water out of the ground is one.

As the crow flies, five miles east of Crooked Lake is where the Polk Regional Water Cooperative is on the verge of building several wells into the lower Floridan Aquifer. If things proceed as planned, within 20 years millions of gallons of water will be sucked out of the ground near Crooked Lake.

Spence said staff with Southwest Florida Water Management District have already started digging test wells near Bok Academy, near Frostproof and in Lake Wales to help them determine whether pulling more water out of the ground will affect surface waters like lakes, rivers and springs.

Spence described it as a delicate balance. He said Crooked Lake is much cleaner than any in the Chain of Lakes.

The Crooked Lake Quality Management Plan 21 county lakes have been prioritized as nutrient rich (not a good thing) and another 97 that had potential to be prioritized.

Next week the newspaper will be focusing on what governments are doing to prevent storm water pollution in county lakes.

Daylight savings time could be permanent

WASHINGTON, D.C. - U.S. Senator Marco Rubio (R-FL) introduced legislation, the Sunshine Protection Act, that would make Daylight Saving Time (DST) permanent across the country. He also introduced the Sunshine State Act, which would give Florida approval to establish permanent DST within its boundaries. This is in response to the Florida legislature's overwhelming vote in support of staying on DST. Many studies have shown that making DST permanent could benefit the economy and the country, according to Rubio.

"Last week, Florida's

legislature overwhelmingly voted for permanent Daylight Saving Time for the State of Florida," said Rubio. "Reflecting the will of the Sunshine State, I proudly introduce these bills that would approve Florida's will and, if made nationally, would also ensure Florida is not out of sync with the rest of the nation."

"As the 2018 session just recently concluded, I am proud to have sponsored HB 1013 which overwhelmingly passed both the House and Senate. We have heard from countless Floridians about the importance of maintaining Daylight Saving Time, including benefits to our economy, public safety and health. I look forward to working with Senator Rubio and his colleagues on addressing this issue. I am confident that the Sunshine State will lead the growing movement across the nation in adopting DST year-round," said the bill sponsor, Jeanette M. Nuñez (R-Miami), Speaker Pro Tempore of the Florida House of Representatives.

Potential effects of making Daylight Saving Time permanent for the nation:

• Benefits the economy, including the elimination of a substantial economic

decline that comes every November when clocks move back, according to a study by JP Morgan Chase of major city regions, which found that there is a drop in economic activity of 2.2 percent – 4.9 percent when clocks move back.

• Benefits the agricultural economy, which is disproportionately disrupted by biannual changes in time by upsetting farm schedules and farmers' relationships with their supply chain and distribution partners.

• Reduces the number of robberies by 27 percent, according to a 2015 Brookings Institution report, because of additional daylight in the evenings.

 Reduces car crashes and car wrecks involving pedestrians because the additional sunlight increased visibility, according to the American Journal of Public Health and the Journal of Safety Research.

• Reduces childhood obesity, according to studies published by the International Journal Behavioral Nutrition and Physical Activity and the Journal of Physical Activity and Health which found that children have more hours of physical activity during DST.

 \cdot Increased physical fitness, according to the

Journal of Environment Psychology, which found that Day Light Saving Time increased pedestrian activity by 62 percent and cyclists activity by 38 percent because of additional daylight.

• Positive impact on wildlife conservation, according to a collaboration of 16 experts who studied DST's impact on wildlife across the United States, Europe and parts of Australia concluded that DST reduces the number of vehicle collisions with wildlife by 8 – 11 percent by shifting normal traffic patterns to an hour off from nocturnal wildlife's behavior.

Make way for the bicycles and green trees

A new parking ordinance has passed the city commission, and there are two things among the many items addressed by the ordinance that are contributing to the city's vision of a walkable, green community.

One is the section on bicycle parking, the other is keeping the trees.

New developments or redevelopment of sites for commercial, industrial, institutional uses and multi-family uses of more than five units will now

have to provide on site bicycle facilities, according to the city's new ordinance.

Any development that provides at least 10 parking spaces will also have to either provide the "greater of 2 bicycle spaces or bicycle spaces equal to 10 percent of the number of vehicular spaces," reads the ordinance.

Additionally, bicycle parking areas have to be located within 75 ft. of any main entrance to a building, and all bicycle racks have to be anchored firmly to the ground. Facilities such as apartments or condominiums will have the option also of providing the required bicycle parking facilities within an internal, enclosed and/or secured facility, according to the ordinance.

As for parking lots, the standard is that such lots will be buffered and landscaped, and tree canopies will be required, according to the city records.

Where possible, the city is also trying to encourage developers to allow for grass overflow parking spaces.

Winter Haven residents join CRA committees

WINTER HAVEN - The Winter

Haven Community Redevelopment Agency Board selected five new city residents to serve on CRA advisory committees March 12.

Recently Polk County Commissioner Dick Lindley, and in May, former Winter Haven city commission candidate Debra Ogzewalla were removed from the CRA Downtown Advisory Committee as a result of unexcused absences.

City staff solicited applications, receiving one, and contacted previous applicants to see if they still had interest. Those on the final list were Carmelo Garcia, Macy Butler, Eve Strang Bass and Tinia Clark.

The CRA board unanimously selected Bass and Clark from the list.

Clark runs Sidestreet Studio downtown, a non-profit that uses art to inspire local disabled residents. She has previously served on the Cultural Arts Committee, and said she would like to incorporate more art into the downtown scene.

"I am a resident, civic minded and would like to have a voice in the potential growth of our city," Clark wrote on her application.

Bass owns The Shop, a store downtown.

"Winter Haven is my home and I'm proud of it," Bass said. "I feel really strongly about supporting and encouraging the neighborhoods surrounding our downtown and the continued development of residential opportunities in our downtown. A healthy mix of retail, office and residential is important. There are so many positive things happening and so much potential. I want to do my part to see that these improvements and enhancements continue."

In addition to selecting replacements for the Downtown Advisory Committee, the CRA board also selected two replacements for the Florence Villa CRA Advisory Committee. The eligible candidates were Dinah Joseph, an Orlando resident who owns a Winter


Haven insurance agency, Joe Bogdahn, a partner with Winter Haven developer Six/Ten, and Brian Yates with CenterState Bank. The CRA board unanimously selected Bogdahn and Yates.

Bogdahn said much of Winter Haven is beginning to bloom, but the Florence Villa neighborhood has struggled.

"The process of widening First Street in the late 80's decimated a once thriving business district, leaving many shallow lots along the First Street frontage that are essentially unbuildable," Bogdahn said.

He and Six/Ten staff built a 16,000 square foot office building, the largest new private construction in the area in decades.

"There are some great buildings in the





Local Real Estate Agents have Big Plans for a Puppy Program **Benefiting Veterans**

A Winter Haven real estate trio has teamed up in the effort to create a program that trains service dogs for a worthy cause. Dawn Flagg, Michelle Setien, and Chris Loschiavo are in the process of creating a 501(c)3 non-profit organization to get service dogs into the hands of disabled veterans.

The three share a passion for real estate, animals, and veterans, with each having a special connection to the military. Dawn is an Air Force veteran, Chris's father was a Navy veteran that served in the Korean War, and Michelle's husband retired from the Marine Corps., having served 23 years.

In an act of what can only be fate, the three met in a Keller Williams Winter Haven orientation class. Chris and Michelle saw a photo of Dawn with her pup Gypsy which got a conversation rolling between the three. Gypsy is a service dog in training and is Dawn's 4th to be raised and given to the V.A. to help veterans.

After talking at length, they realized they wanted an equal-partner working model in their real estate careers. "It had to be approved by our boss because it's never been done before," said Dawn. The three agents now act as one team for their clients.

From there, the Florida Veteran Team - Keller Williams Realty, as they have come to be named, set a goal that for every home sold, a portion of that commission would go to help provide a service dog to a disabled veteran in the county where the home was sold.

Dawn explained the larger plan, "We have a poster that we call 'our dream.' In our dream, we want a facility, locally, where we can train up to 20 dogs at a time." At this location, they would like to have an on-site professional trainer that will live on the property so the dogs are never alone. They also plan to have a trail that goes around the entire facility that the public can also use.

"On the other side of the facility, we want to have a full agility course. The military can come and use it one day, the police can come and use it another day, the sheriff's department can use it another day and then on the weekends it's open to the public," said Dawn.

They are even in talks of a doggy-café that serves gourmet hot dogs and a dog grooming facility in which all donations will go towards helping the program.

"We're also working on a puppy-partner program and we've got volunteers already," Dawn commented. A puppy would be given to a puppy-partner who would raise it until it is 6-9 months old. From there, the dogs would enter the service dog training program at their facility. Any dogs that do not make it to the level of service dog, will be trained as therapy dogs to go into libraries, hospice, nursing homes, hospitals, and elsewhere they are needed in the community.

They would like to have 40 or more dogs in the program at one time with 20 in the puppypartner program and 20 being trained in the program.

"It's all funded through real estate, so some of the proceeds will go towards purchasing a dog, getting the dog trained so that we can pass it on to a veteran because our passion is veterans and real estate," remarked Michelle.

While they go through the process to become a 501(c)3, they are building their reputation in the community and getting their platform in front of as many people as possible. They've been attending events like CommunityFest in Winter Haven to conventions in Orlando where they bring Gypsy and spread their message.

They have plans to do work in the community with kids as well. They are looking to hold a birdhouse-making contest in April, a doghouse building

contest in September, and edible real estate (gingerbread houses) around the holidays.

The big event will come in January when they aspire to host a sizeable pet expo in Polk County to kick-off their service dog training program.

Dawn concluded passionately, "We are just blessed, that we found each other, that we work so well together, and I think this is exactly what we're all supposed to do for the next 20 something years. We're in it for the long haul!"

Stina's AAA Vertical Blind Factory Bv Tara Crutchfield

It was by happy accident that Stina Conrod came to own her popular Winter Haven blinds business. Originally from Sweden, Conrod explained, "My parents owned a bakery, and I grew up in a bread box pretty much working there." It was moving to Winter Haven and making a happenstance phone call to a phone number in the newspaper that would eventually lead to her owning her own store.

Prior to opening the store, she and her husband lived in Fort Lauderdale. They moved to Winter Haven after which Stina came across an advertisement in the newspaper under sales that simply read, "Call Mr. Ferman."

When she called, they made a connection based on her Swedish heritage and he hired her over the phone. She worked for his blinds company in Lakeland for 3 years. "He was doing franchising and he wouldn't come to Winter Haven so I set up my shop over here."

Upon opening the 1000 square-foot shop called Stina's AAA Vertical Blind Factory on Cypress Gardens Road, the plan was for Stina to work there during the day, doing sales calls after work and her ex-husband would help her install after his work day. Because of how busy they became, he had to quit his day job after just 3 weeks.

Since then, Stina has increased her square-footage several times before moving to their current location at 785 Cypress

Gardens Blvd. in 1995. The building which used to be a donut shop and then an Allstate Insurance office started out at 1500 squarefeet, a number she had to double to suit her growing needs.

The store offers a selection of vertical blinds, plantation shutters, honeycomb shades, mini blinds, two-inch faux wood blinds and more. The most popular brand at Stina's AAA Vertical Blind Factory, according to Conrod, is Hunter Douglas. In their lobby, they have an Alexa device that is connected to a hub from Hunter Douglas. Stina showed me how it works, commanding, "Alexa, turn on 'good morning," and the display blinds began to automatically lift. "Alexa, turn on 'goodnight,"" said Stina, and they drew down.

Conrod took me on a tour through the factory part of her store. Laurie was busy assembling tracks and Bill was at work cutting them. She explained that they do commercial as well as residential with Winter Haven Hospital a client of hers for years. Also in the back was their office cat, a sweet black feline that they rescued from behind the building, aptly named Cat.

In a day and age when employee retention can be difficult to maintain, Stina has managed to create a work environment that has afforded her career employees. Bill Batton has been the company for 26 years, Stan Adams for 22 years, and Laurie Davis for 12 years. "We're like family," said the owner, "After so

long, I know how they think, they know how I think so it's really easy going."


Stina attributes her repeat customers to their customer service, honesty, and timeliness. The store has become generational with grandparents, parents, and now, their children using her for their window treatments. On the front wall of the store is a bulletin board with numerous handwritten 'thank you' cards from her years of happy customers.

Bond Clinic Celebrating 70 Years By Tara Crutchfield

The new year not only meant the opening of a new facility for Bond Clinic, it rings in their 70th anniversary. The clinic did a staggered opening of their much-anticipated building off of 1st Street, starting with the first floor on January 8th, the second floor January 15th, and the third on January 22nd. "That was wonderful from an administrative standpoint just because we wanted to give each floor our best as we opened it," expressed Bond Clinic's Marketing Director, Ashley Scanlan.

The first floor of the new Bond facility houses their Urgent Care and Pediatric department with its own Pediatric Urgent Care. A trip to this campus brings patients to the front of the building where there are three separate and clearly marked entrances to the Urgent Care, Pediatrics, and other Physician offices. The flow of the building is reflective of Bond Clinic's commitment to accessibility and efficiency.

Bond Clinic president and CEO, Thoracic and Vascular Surgeon, Dr. Iakovidis, spoke on finally being in the new facility, "The atmosphere is very different, it's a more open concept. It's something we want to build on which is a team concept. Everybody's together, we are one team trying to provide the healthcare that we want to provide."

He continued on that note about their exceeded expectations, "I was even more surprised about the efficiency. We were expecting a better flow, but we didn't expect it to the level that we've seen. We're able to see more patients faster, we're able to complete tasks as a team a lot faster than we did before so we are very pleased with that." In the Urgent Care alone according to the doctor, Bond has been able to evaluate and treat twice to three times more patients than at their previous facility. The last few years specifically have been a new era for the clinic. According to Dr. Iakovidis, "For many, many years it was about the same size, the same number of patients and the level of care. Now, we're getting into a different arena where the clinic is about to produce a product other than the traditional fit for service care we provided. The quality of care, the increase in access to the patients for the physicians, as well at the same time, decreasing the cost of the care that we provide without sacrificing quality and actually increasing the quality. The change that we have made over the last 3 years has been very rewarding not just to the local community immediately, the physicians, as well as the Bond Clinic team, but also to the patients that we take care of. That change gave us the ability to do today what you're seeing."

Though proud of their new clinic, the attitude at Bond is that of pride in the community first, with Dr. Iakovidis remarking, "That's how we intended it to be is an addition that will put another little star in the sky of Winter Haven and I think we have accomplished that."

Scanlan added similarly, "The goal of Bond Clinic was never to be big, the goal with Bond Clinic is to be the best at what we do, to be a blessing to this community with them having the best of specialists and healthcare in their backyard."

The form and function of their new facility is only a piece of this big year for Bond. Ashley Scanlan spoke on what the 70th anniversary means to the clinic, saying, "I can tell you that our history is something that has been a shining star for us." She went on to highlight that history, explaining that though she's been with the clinic for 7 years, only a fraction of the time that this innovative clinic has been established, she has had the opportunity to speak with people that were patients of Dr. Bond's and current patients alike that speak to what the clinic has meant to their health.

True to their word, Bond has endeavored and accomplished the hiring of more physicians to serve the community. According to Scanlan, Dr. Iakovidis said that upon launching the new building, there would be the potential of hiring 10-15 new providers. As of the beginning of March, just a few months from their opening, they've hired 9. On March 5th, the clinic brought on Family Medicine Board-certified Primary Care Physician, Mary O'Meara, MD, as well as triple Boardcertified Nephrologist, Sherif I. Ibrahim, MD.

In honor of their 70th, Bond has rolled out a new logo incorporating where they've come from back in 1948 to where there are now. The Marketing Director encourages the community to be looking for other events to be announced throughout the year to celebrate this milestone.

The clinic is currently working with the Chamber to set a date for their grand opening and ribbon cutting ceremony targeted to take place near the end of April. Scanlan expressed excitement for what is to come for Bond and their patients, "I think the 70th anniversary, it's a huge celebration. It's a celebration to the health of our organization, to our commitment to this area through good times and bad, and it's very exciting thinking about our future moving forward and all the possibilities."



Life with Type 1 Diabetes

According to the CDC, about 29 million Americans are currently living with diabetes. Out of that 29 million, 1.25 million people have type 1, says www.JDRF.org. A person with type 1 diabetes doesn't produce insulin, a hormone produced by the pancreas that regulates the amount of glucose in the blood. Type 1 is unpreventable and often hereditary. Type 2 diabetes develops when your body doesn't use insulin properly, known as insulin resistance. The risk for type 2 diabetes can also be genetic or can be caused by poor eating habits, lack of exercise, and being overweight.

With an overwhelming majority of diabetics suffering from type 2, type 1 doesn't always get

Partner at Ewing, Blackwelder & Duce Insurance, 73-year-old Robert Walker of Haines City was diagnosed with T1D on March 3rd, 1990. Robert began having trouble reading and couldn't get his eyes to focus. This prompted a trip to his ophthalmologist, Dr. Burry who ordered a new prescription for his glasses. After they arrived and he still couldn't get his eyes to focus, Dr. Burry suggested he see a medical doctor.

"Dr. David Green took a blood test and said my blood sugar reading was 800 plus. He admitted me to Heart of Florida hospital and got the reading under control and said I could get released as soon as I could give myself an injection," recalled Walker, saying he was released the next day.

He was instructed to get the supplies necessary, take readings, and give himself two injections daily. He was referred to Dr. Davidson at Watson Clinic in Lakeland where he was prescribed intensive therapy including readings prior to each meal including one at bedtime. The therapy also included four injections daily. "My visits to Watson Clinic, for many years, confirmed the seriousness of the disease," Robert said.

He continued, "Those visits included many other diabetic patients who were happy to share valuable information about the disease. There was a visible and compelling story being told by those patients with physical disabilities and amputations."

In 1995, Robert started taking 4 readings a day and recording them. He recorded those 4 readings per day from 1995 to 2014. In January of 2014, he went to 7 readings a day. Walker explained that he gives his doctor a copy of his records.

Robert explained why he finds it vital to take readings regularly, "The problem with keeping up with it is the longer you go the more at risk you are in my opinion. My experience tells me that if you are going the wrong way, too high or too low if you can catch it faster, you can correct it. We have the ability to take injections to take the peak off and we can eat something to keep it from getting too low."

Normal things, such as stress, that you or I go through that are just an inconvenience for us, can be life-threatening for someone with T1D. Walker explained how he has to manage his stress levels because they affect his sugar. After Hurricane Irma, his readings went up due to the hundreds of insurance claims he was dealing with at work.

From the outside, you might think that a shot of insulin is a cure-all for diabetics. This isn't the case. Even the amount they take is pivotal. He explained, "If you take too much insulin or if you don't eat the right food, that insulin is bringing your sugar down. If you get too low, your vision goes bad, you can't think, and you can go into a coma. So, it's a constant diabetic fear of going too low."

Weight is another constant battle for Walker and other type 1 diabetics. "The heavier you are, the more insulin you need. The more insulin you need, the more food you need and it's just a vicious cycle."

It hasn't all been bad says Walker. He closed with his positive outlook on being a type 1 diabetic, "This disease has changed my life for the better. I consider it to be a blessing. The Lord has shown me that I am not in control."

Robert gets by with the support of his wife and family, though he sees it as a burden to the family.

HELEN HASTY

A native Floridian, Helen Hasty was born in Kissimmee. She has lived in the Central Florida area her whole life. Helen owned a boutique for some 28 years called Helen's Ladies Specialty Shoppe that she closed in September of last year.

Thirty or so years ago, Helen began having common symptoms of diabetes-thirst, lethargy and generally felt ill. She went to the doctor and got news she didn't expect-she had Type 1 Diabetes.

Helen had one word to describe how she felt upon being diagnosed, "devastated." She remembers, "I thought I was dying, I thought death was imminent. It was an old person's disease, I thought, at that time and I was pretty young."

"They put me in the hospital and taught me how to take shots. I was in there for a while and when I came out I was scared to death. I didn't know what to eat or how to handle it," explained Helen.

When she was first diagnosed, the portable meter to check blood sugar wasn't available. Helen would have to go to the doctor to have blood drawn just to monitor her levels.

Helen takes insulin shots 3-4 times a day and has to check her blood sugar regularly. The worst part, Helen says, is having to prick your fingers all day.

We've heard about the mental and physical toll this disease takes, but what about the financial? At one time, Helen was paying \$2,500 a month for her healthcare alone. This was so she could have an insulin pump and the necessary healthcare diabetics need. When she couldn't continue paying the \$2,500, she had to let her insurance go and the only thing she could afford was insurance through the Affordable Care Act. According to Helen, the insurance she had through the ACA, "They didn't pay for anything and I lost my pump after 3 years of wearing the pump, I loved it [the insulin pump]."

With so much research done on the prevalent Type 2, Helen would like to see more awareness, more publicity, and more research into Type 1 Diabetes as well.

KYLEE ROBERTS



Kylee Roberts is nine years old and in the 4th grade. Her favorite subject is math and she loves to dance. On July 7th of 2016, her world changed.

She remembers the day vividly, "Whenever I was with people, they told my mom I was acting weird so she took me the doctor and they couldn't get a reading on my sugar. So, they transferred me to Arnold Palmer and it was over 1000."

The diagnosis came back as Type 1 Diabetes. Kylee's mother Kristian put her initial reaction into words, "My heart broke because I knew our whole world was going to change–and it did." She remembers thinking, "I know how to be a mother, but how do I take care of her and her needs. It was very overwhelming."

Not quite understanding the diagnosis at the time, Kylee recalled, "My mom, whenever they told her that, she made a surprised face, but I didn't know what it was."

Kristian had to learn to give her daughter shots every day and check her sugar. They have also changed their eating habits, staying away from fried foods, soda, carbs, and switching from sweet tea to Crystal Light.

Unfortunately, Kylee's diagnosis means life is a bit different from her peers. Her mom remarked, "She's broken my heart several times because there are things she can't do."

Kylee shared, "I have to wait before I can eat so I can check [her sugar] and then after, I can't go play because I have to take my insulin, then I can." Slumber parties have had to come to an end for now as well. Kylee can't stay the night away from her mom unless she's with family that knows how to take care of her diabetes.

"She's been pretty upset with me over some things. I don't want to chance something happening to her like her going to a sleepover and they don't know what to do. What if she passed out?" said Kristian.

To keep track of her sugar levels, Kylee has a transmitter in her back that connects by Bluetooth to a device that monitors her blood sugar. This device makes it so she doesn't have to prick her finger as often. Her mother has an app on her phone that allows her to see Kylee's sugar as well, a small relief for the mom.

Currently, the 4th grader takes 4-5 shots of insulin every day. She had an insulin pump installed that will be turned on in two separate sessions. Once the pump is on, she will be able to administer insulin without a shot.

Kylee described what she feels like when her sugar levels are off, "When it's low, I get shaky and kind of dizzy. If it's high I get hyper and I get like, mad," she looked at her mom and giggled, "My mom knows."

Even though it's a trying disease, not everything is so sullen. There is even a little humor sometimes. Kylee has 2 brothers, one of which is 4. Kristian laughed, "Tyson acts like he knows everything about it. He'll say something about her diabetes or he'll say, 'I need to take some insulin!" She smiled, "Or he'll say, 'You're eating too many carbs!"

With the roller coaster of having Type 1 Diabetes as a kid and also of being the mother of a young diabetic, the pair says they would love to have support from people that can relate. Kristian explained that there are not many support groups for this specific circumstance in the area, but would love to have one.



At the event, participants will be given a purple poncho donning the event logo before stepping onto the field to form the ribbon. Included in that ticket price is a 1pm game with the Lakeland Flying Tigers vs. the Charlotte Stone Crabs baseball team.


