# Lake Jesup part of \$10 million contest to clean area of algae blooms in lake

Lake Jesup is at the center of a contest for the \$10 million George Barley Water Prize, which will be awarded to a winning team of researchers for coming up with a scientific method to clean the lake of phosphorous.

The lake, located in Seminole County around the Longwood and Winter Springs area, is faced with high levels of phosphorous and nitrogen, creating algae blooms in the lake. Algae blooms in the lakes causes fish deaths, wetland destruction, habitat loss and economic impacts.

În Florida over the last several years, algae blooms have threatened peoples'

# Seminole schools warn parents, students of electronic smoking trend in teens

Seminole County Public Schools, in an email sent out Friday, warned against students smoking marijuana products through electronic cigarettes or Juul devices on any school campus.

Juul, launched in 2015 and now the most popular electronic cigarette brand, makes "smoking alternative" e-cigarettes as they brand themselves, which contain addictive nicotine despite not causing cancer. They're intended as a new device for people who want to quit smoking due to the cancer risk.

# **VETERANS POST**

In a recent press release, the Department of Veterans Affairs announced that Little Rock, Arkansas, had joined the list of three states and 65 towns that had conquered veteran homelessness.

The list of those locations goes back to 2015, and the page announces, "The following jurisdictions have announced an end to Veteran homelessness as of Dec. 19, 2018." The actual facts raise questions, however.

Take New Orleans. The mayor issued a

statement in 2015 saying it was the first city in the nation to end veteran homelessness. OK. How are they doing now? At the end of 2018, the VA health center there held a Stand Down for homeless veterans. The director said that the VA has made significant progress, but there was more work to do. They still have homeless veterans.

In 2015, the governor of Virginia said they would work to end veteran homelessness by the end of 2017. The homeless number was cut in half, which is major milestone. But fast-forward to the January 2018 Point in Time Count (PIT). The numbers were not zero.

In late 2017, the mayor of Atlanta was quoted as thanking all those who helped

make it possible. The assumption, since his quote is on the list of cities that conquered veteran homelessness, is that there were no more homeless veterans in Atlanta. Two months later, on the day of the PIT, there were 96 unsheltered homeless veterans

It's to be expected that when people move around, the number of homeless will shift. But to include these locations on a list of those purporting to have achieved zero homelessness, when they currently have homeless, is to skew the numbers. They might once have been down to zero, but they're not there now.



### **The Good News**

The 2017 FBI Uniform Crime Report, (UCR) has been released. The figures show that Sanford's crime rate for major crimes dropped 15% from 2016. Property crimes have decreased by 8%. Crimes in total for Sanford have decreased by 9% year over year.

Break out the champagne, let's have a toast. Time to pat ourselves on the back for a job well done.

Not so fast.

#### The Bad News

Sanford is safer than 3% of the cities in the United States of America. Safer than 7% of the cities in the Great State of Florida.

For those in Pennichaw, let Snarky express it another way.

97% of the cities in the United States of America are safer than Sanford. 93% of the cities in the Great State of Florida are safer than Sanford.

How can this be if our crime rate is down?

Everybody else's crime rate is down also. Others went down more than Sanford's, thus Sanford was able to maintain its dubious position in the rankings.

### **The Solution**

The one statistic that cries out for improvement in Sanford is the size of the police force. Even with the increase in population to more than 60,000, the total force is still what it was ten years ago.

Sanford has 2.4 police officers per 1000 residents, the average for Florida cities is 4.2. That translates to Sanford having 43.4% less police than the average Florida city.

The major crime areas are a short distance from the Sanford police station.

The Sanford City Commission in the past has been happy with the situation and Sanford's reputation. They have not prodded the City administration to do something about Sanford's major problem. They have spent money on feel good projects like RiverWalk and bailing out Uber. In 2017, Uber lost \$4.5 billion. It would have been worse if Sanford, Altamonte and others hadn't chipped in \$150,000 or so, no questions asked.

Forcing the Mayor into a runoff to maintain his office was a clear expression of voter frustration with City Hall.

Maybe, with the change of leadership in the Goldsboro commission district, more emphasis will be placed on improving police protection for all of Sanford's citizens and visitors.

Two years ago, two men from opposite sides of the globe, one from the Caribbean and one from Africa, showed up at Christian HELP seeking similar help. Both are over sixty, American citizens, hoping to not rely on government subsidies, and only wanting to sustain and support themselves and their families. Little did they know that their paths would cross, their lives forever changed, and that they would become Christian brothers.

Raul a retired accountant originally from Puerto Rico, but most recently living in Venezuela with his wife and son, came to Christian HELP in July 2016 with a few simple goals – find part-time employment to supplement his SSI and to save enough money to bring his family to the United States. This was a huge unknown risk for Raul. For six months Raul and his Care Manager Jeff journeyed together, updating his resume, discussing online job search tactics, practicing interviewing, and praying to-

Raul had many peaks and valleys, tears and exhortations but in January 2017, Raul was offered a part-time job with local employer as a stock clerk and cashier. By the next month, he had earned enough money to fly his son here. Three months later, he was able to bring his wife here. In June 2017, Raul became a permanent employee. He continues to work for this employer today.

The Story Gets Better

While working at the same employer, Raul met a fellow Christian from Africa who had

an accomplished career as a civil servant for the state of Florida, but had fallen on difficult times. He was laid off. James was facing homelessness, hunger, and depression.

James had a part-time job, but they reduced his hours significantly—resulting in homelessness. He was now living in his car.

His new friend at work, Raul, recommended that he go to Christian HELP for support and assistance in finding a sustainable job. James came to Christian HELP in February 2018. His resume and his job search skills were outdated - since he had been gainfully employed for over 15 years - and his interviewing skills were lacking.

With the help of Jeff, his resume was updated which was the first priority. James was humble and implemented all of the suggestions we made. It worked.

Instead of searching for a job at a different employer, we encouraged him to apply for better positions, both in terms of pay and hours, at his current employer. It worked. He is now employed full-time with benefits. He also recently applied for his state retirement benefits. He is now renting a bedroom, has his own bathroom and shares a kitchen. He is hoping to one day have his own apartment. If you could only see the smile on his face today.

The Best Part

Today, Raul and James are close Christian brothers, and their families even hang out together. And recently, they came into Christian HELP to pray, to give thanks, and share their love and appreciation with anyone and everyone who would hear.


But on parade day, everyone comes out, and we see ever-increasing crowds.



ing been updated since 2009. And, as three new commissioners were elected in November on platforms relating to more sensible, controlled development standards, the issue became heated when Mayor Charles Lacev vetoed the moratorium days later.

In a letter explaining his veto, Lacey stated that it would not be helpful for business there, as it "effectively stops commercial development."

"Contrary to the effect of the ordinance, commercial development that is consistent with the residential character of Winter Springs should be encouraged," he wrote. "Familytype restaurants and small-scale entertainment venues are desirable."

He also writes that the image of the city would've suffered under the moratorium.

"Beyond the actual deleterious consequences, the perceived desirability of doing business in Winter Springs would have been harshly impacted," Lacey wrote. "Long after the moratorium would expire, the fear of an arbitrary or capricious response to starting a desirable project would have deterred investors."

At Monday's special meeting, ideologies clashed, with strong rebukes of the veto from Deputy Mayor Kevin Cannon and new commissioners Tianna Hale and Ted Johnson, and a defense of the measure from the final new commissioner, Geoff Kendrick.

Hale said the moratorium's 90day length wouldn't even be enough time to inconvenience any businesses, as the process to go through the city was much longer. And, she just wanted to honor the will of the voters who wanted less development.

"We're honoring the wishes of the residents," she said. "They're number one. They are in charge. We work for you. They say 'please help us,' but when we tried, we're being stopped. Y'all are our responsibili-

Cannon said the idea behind the moratorium was to prevent "uncertainty" with developers while they were changing the code, as they wanted to make sure there was a

clean, modern and updated standard and avoid any kind of confusion that could lead to trouble.

He said there had been no complaints about the moratorium in the week since it was voted on.

Kendrick said it was unlikely that anyone would've had an issue so far, as it had been little more than a week since any vote on the morato-

He said he was all for approaching development in a smart way, but that a moratorium wasn't the right way to market the city.

"They might not even come if there could be a temporary moratorium," Kendrick said. "We're not looking for any more apartments. But Starbucks, or some restaurants, are not even going to sniff Winter Springs if this kind of thing is in

place. The Mayor was completely within his right to veto this.'

Several citizens spoke out against Lacey's veto, including Sheila Benton, who said she was "appalled" by the "power grab."

The city has spoken," she said. "They want development slowed down. You didn't listen when you did this veto."

Another commenter simply read aloud several of Lacey's campaign donors from his last election, including business interests and developers like CED Strategies, Chris Dorworth and Juanita Bloomberg, among others.

The Commissioners agreed to bring forth another moratorium at a future City Commission meeting and try to work it in a way that Lacey could find more appropriate.

# Gone in a New York minute: How the Amazon deal fell apart

NEW YORK (AP) — In early November, word began to leak that Amazon was serious about choosing New York to build a giant new campus. The city was eager to lure the company and its thousands of highpaying tech jobs, offering billions in tax incentives and lighting the Empire State Building in Amazon orange.

Even Governor Andrew Cuomo got in on the action: "I'll change my name to Amazon Cuomo if that's what it takes," he joked at the time.

Then Amazon made it official: It chose the Long Island City neighborhood of Queens to build a \$2.5 billion campus that could house 25,000 workers, in addition to new offices planned for northern Virginia. Cuomo and New York Mayor Bill de Blasio, Democrats who have been political adversaries for years, trumpeted the decision as a major coup after edging out more than 230 other proposals.

But what they didn't expect was the protests, the hostile public hearings and the disparaging tweets that would come in the next three months, eventually leading to Amazon's dramatic Valentine's Day breakup with New York.

Immediately after Amazon's Nov. 12 announcement, criticism started to pour in. The deal included \$1.5

billion in special tax breaks and grants for the company, but a closer look at the total package revealed it to be worth at least \$2.8 billion. Some of the same politicians who had signed a letter to woo Amazon were now balking at the tax incen-

"Offering massive corporate welfare from scarce public resources to one of the wealthiest corporations in the world at a time of great need in

our state is just wrong," said New York State Sen. Michael Gianaris and New York City Councilman Jimmy Van Bramer, Democrats who represent the Long Island City area, in a joint statement.

The next day, CEO Jeff Bezos was on the cover of The New York Post in a cartoon-like illustration, hanging out of a helicopter, holding money bags in each hand, with cash

The number of high school students smoking tobacco products surged 38 percent in 2018, and the number of students using e-cigarettes spiked 78 percent, according to the

And while Juul doesn't offer marijuana

products, people quickly figured out ways to 'hack' the devices to incorporate a covert type of marijuana use.

For their part, Juul says they're trying to steer the focus away from youthful smoking and back towards their original purpose of helping adults with cigarette addictions. To do so, they're working on focusing less of their marketing on the numerous enticing flavors, like Mango, Cucumber and Creme, that have attracted young people in the past, and working harder on making sure people under 21 can't buy their products.

The Food & Drug Administration is also working on new legislation that would limit sales of flavored nicotine pods used in Juul devices to age-restricted vape shops.

Electronic cigarette use among teenagers, particularly Juul, was declared an epidemic by the Surgeon General in December, who said that while they had always cautioned against using traditional cigarettes, e-cigarettes came in different forms and parents had to watch out for their children becoming addicted.

billowing above the skyline.

Mirna Chamorro, Public Information Officer with the Seminole County Department of Health, said e-cigarettes could vary wildly in the amount of nicotine or other harmful chemicals contained within, and that it could potentially be a gateway for young people to smoke regular cigarettes later.

"The adolescent brain is still developing," she said. "Nicotine use during adolescence can affect their susceptibility to addiction."

health and caused beaches and fishing areas to close, harming tourism revenue.

The researchers will be trying to find innovative ways to clear out the algae and make the lake habitable for more fish and sea-life.

The George Barley Water Prize is a project of the Everglades Foundation aiming to better the water supply of the world. Contestants were from all over the world, from China, the Netherlands and Canada.

Previously, the contestants were competing in Canada. Now that it has been narrowed down to four finalists, they'll be testing their experiments on Lake Jesup to

prove they can work in multiple conditions.

"A winner will have shown endurance in a range of global temperatures," reads a document on the prize.

According to Dr. Erich Marzolf with the St. John's River Water Management District's Division of Water and Land Resources, the problem is the amounts of nutrients added to water.

"If you add a lot of nutrients to

a garden, you expect things to grow," he said. "But the same is true for the lake. They cause algae to bloom. We've had plenty of headlines about that over the last year. We want to restrict the amount of phosphorous in the lake. They'll remove the nutrients in the water, and hopefully there will be less algae and the lake will be clearer, with more light getting to the bottom. It will be like a nursery for sport fish - they'll have

a better place to spawn, and more things they eat can grow there."

Marzolf said the project was aiming to be complete at the end of the summer, and hopefully with a project that turned things around for Lake Jesup as well as other lakes in the future.

"Our larger goal is to come up with a cost-effective way to remove phosphorous affecting water all around the globe," Marzolf said.



# Rams boys 'head' to final Lake Mary to play for Class 5A title

Visiting Lake Mary (23-5-1) used its 'head' twice in a 6-minute period early in the second half to advance to its first State Championship Game since 2003 with a 2-0 victory over Lakewood Ranch (20-2-2) in an FHSAA Class 5A Semifinal Saturday night in Bradenton.

After a scoreless first half, the Rams and Luke Chappel dented the scoreboard 10-minutes into the second half \_ 50-minutes into the game \_ off a corner kick from Angel Flores and six-minutes later, Jack Ireland did likewise, burying a header into the back of the net off a corner kick from Gadiel Santiago, to make the score 2-0 and the defense, led by goalkeeper Michael Demarco with six saves, made that score stand up over the final 24-minutes.

Lake Mary, which was playing in its seventh semifinal, but first since 2005, will square off with Miami-Varela (14-3-3), a 2-1 overtime winner over Celebration (21-2-2), in the Class 5A State Final at 4 p.m. Saturday at Spec Martin Stadium in DeLand. The Rams, who finished as state runners-up in both 1987 and 2003, will be looking to hoist the Championship Trophy for the first time. Lake Mary will be traveling to DeLand alone,

# Vengeance is the Knights

# Taylor helps UCF men avenge loss to Memphis Tigers

ORLANDO — UCF men's basketball got the last laugh on Saturday after beating Memphis 79-72 at the CFE Arena, avenging its road loss to the Tigers in January.

Having started off on the wrong foot last time out against Memphis (15-11, 7-6 AAC), UCF (19-5, 9-3 AAC) made sure to go into the locker room at half time with the lead.

"In this game, we didn't start off great, but we didn't allow them to start off great [either]," UCF

head coach Johnny Dawkins said. And redshirt senior guard B.J. Taylor was a big reason why the Knights were able to do so. With Matt Williams \_ the Knights' all-time leader

in career three-pointers made \_ in the building, Taylor nailed three 3-pointers within the first 10 minutes of the game to give the Knights a 20-16 lead.

That was already more than the two points he scored in the entire first half in the Knights' first meeting with the Tigers. "How good was B.J.?" Dawkins asked the media

after the game. "I mean I thought he was terrific. I've coached him for the last three years and I think that was one of his best overall games."

Taylor finished the game with a team-high 25 points. He had five assists and five rebounds to go with it. After finishing with 10 points on 3-of-11 shooting at Memphis, Taylor said he was pleased with him and his team's improvement this time.

"It's always great when you can redeem yourself after a loss that you had earlier in the season," Taylor said. "For us, all week our whole thing was redemption. We need to make up for what happened up there in Memphis."

Although the Knights headed into the locker room with a 36-29 lead, the first half was physical. Between UCF and Memphis, there were 20 personal fouls called and multiple loose ball scenarios that resulted in hard-fought buckets or free throws for both teams. In the second half, the Tigers continued to make sure the Knights' revenge wouldn't come easy.

"There's desperation," Dawkins said. "Everybody's playing with so much on the line. Everybody's competing. Everybody's fighting and clawing and that's what you expect [from a conference game]."

It was two crucial time out calls by Dawkins that helped UCF win the game.

Memphis took the lead twice during the first six minutes of the second half thanks to efforts from senior guards Jeremiah Martin and Kareem Brewton Jr., making it 44-43 Memphis.

Martin led Memphis with 25 points, five rebounds and six assists. Brewton Jr. finished with 14 points and seven rebounds.

After the Tigers rallied to take a 41-40 lead with 14:22 left, Dawkins drew up a play for his son, redshirt junior guard Aubrey, with Dayon Griffin throwing a back door, alley-oop pass for a crowdthrilling dunk to put the hosts back ahead, and even though Memphis answered with a 3-pointer, the big play ignited a 26-13 run fueled by suffocating defense \_ including multiple blocks from senior forward Chad Brown \_ that gave the Knights a 12-point cushion with 6:28 left.

And when the Tigers gave their last rallying cry, again cutting the deficit to one point, it was Aubrey Dawkins who drilled a 3-pointer off a Taylor assist out of a UCF time out that made it 72-68 with 1:40 remaining.

B.J. found me when I was open," Dawkins said. "I did my job, he did his. I did mine, so that's how it's supposed to look."

From there, Taylor would hit 6-of-7 free throws to seal the game for the Knights, who converted on 25-of-30 charity tosses in the game.

Outside of Taylor and Dawkins, two other Knights finished the game in double figures. Senior big man Tacko Fall had 15 points, including going 6-of-7 from the floor and 5-of-7 at the free throw line, and seven rebounds. Terrell Allen added in 10 points, six rebounds and three assists.

For Memphis, which was in Orlando earlier in November for the Advocare Invitational at Disney, it was almost like a homecoming for two former Orlando Magic players \_ Tigers first-year Head Coach Penny Hardaway and first-year Assistant Coach Mike Miller.

"Of course the memories are there," Hardaway said. "When I flew into the airport I just remembered the times of flying out with the Magic and flying back in." With the win, UCF is off to its best 24-game start since going 20-4 to start the 2003-2004 season. It also gives the Knights a 9-3 record in the AAC, their best since joining the league.

UCF plays second place Cincinnati (21-4, 10-2 AAC) tomorrow (Thursday) at Fifth Third Arena in Cincinnati, Ohio. Tip-off is scheduled at 7 p.m. on ESPN2. Here is the box score:

ORLANDO (UCFKnights.com) — The UCF women's basketball team forced No. 4 UConn into a season high 21 turnovers but dropped a 78-41 decision to the Huskies in CFÉ Arena on Sunday afternoon. UCF (20-5, 9-3 The American) used its



When you next enter dummy with a spade and lead a trump to your queen, West again refuses to take the trick, playing the three instead. You then lead the ten of trumps from your remaining J-10-8-7-5, but this time West wins with the ace, on which East signals with the eight of clubs. West thereupon leads a club to partner's ace, and East returns still another diamond. Regardless of what you do now, West is sure to score his nine of trumps to sink the contract.

If you're inclined to be philosophical about such matters, you realize it wasn't anything you did that cost the contract, but rather West's shrewd refusal to overruff the king of trumps at trick two. Had he taken his ace then and there, you would have made 10 tricks very easily.

The principle that emerges is that when you're a defender, you usually take a trick when you can - unless there's a good reason not to. In the present case, West is in a good position to judge that if he discards at trick two, his nine is certain to win a second trump trick if East has any trump honor, or if East can later regain the lead to play another diamond. That is an excellent reason for West's not taking the ace at his first opportunity.
