**Teachers protest for more school funding as State Legislative Session begins**

At the corner of State Roads 434 and 436 on Monday, in the middle of rush hour traffic, teachers and others associated with education gathered to protest what they say are dire funding conditions in their field.

As the 2019 Legislative Session was starting Tuesday, the Florida Education Association union wanted to be proactive in getting teachers around the state to rally for better wages and more funding.

Teachers and union officials in Seminole County, accordingly, made sure people were out with signs ready.

The point was to try and persuade leg-

Wild turkeys flourish within many Florida habitats including pine flatwoods, turkey oak sandhills, oak hammocks, cypress woods and bottomland hardwoods.

"Turkeys really benefit though from natural openings within these forested habitats. Freshwater sloughs, ponds and marshes are great examples," said Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) biologist and Wild Turkey Management Program coordinator Roger Shields. "Turkeys also can be found along the edges of dry prairies and man-made openings such as clearcuts, agricultural fields and improved pastures."

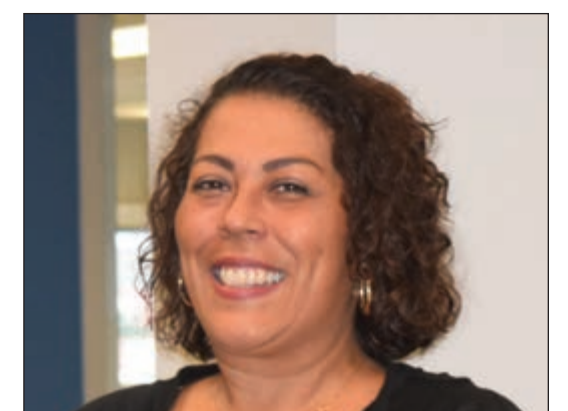

### Mid-Century Modern

Tomorrow, (Thursday) at noon begins the meeting at the Sanford Civic Center about architecture known as Mid-Century Modern. It is being held in the finest example in Sanford. There is also going to be a tour of homes and other buildings in town that meet the criteria.

In addition to its architectural design, the civic center is supported by tremendous laminated beams manufactured in a plant in Albert Lea, Minnesota. The proscenium on the stage is also constructed of two laminated beams bolted together. Two ancient speakers are in front of the junction.

Sanford and Sebring are home to two of the three "known" examples from Albert Lea. Maybe some of the participants in Thursday's event will shed light on where the other one is.

### Narrowing vs Widening

In the early 1940s when the Florida Road Department widened Park Avenue from 10th Street to 23rd St in conjunction with the street being named US Highways 17-92, the locals protested.

Then in 1954 the 17-92 designation

was shifted to what was known as the "truck route" or French Ave. A beautiful oak canopied road was four laned and all the trees were destroyed except one. That one was the huge oak on the grounds of Seminole High School. (Now the site of Sanford Middle School) Road engineers, who have never met a tree they liked were eyeing it. The bulldozer was in place. The Freshmen Class boosted up into the tree a young lady whose parents were influential in the town. The bulldozer went away. There used to be a series of chains holding the tree together, they rusted and were never replaced. That is why you see what's left.

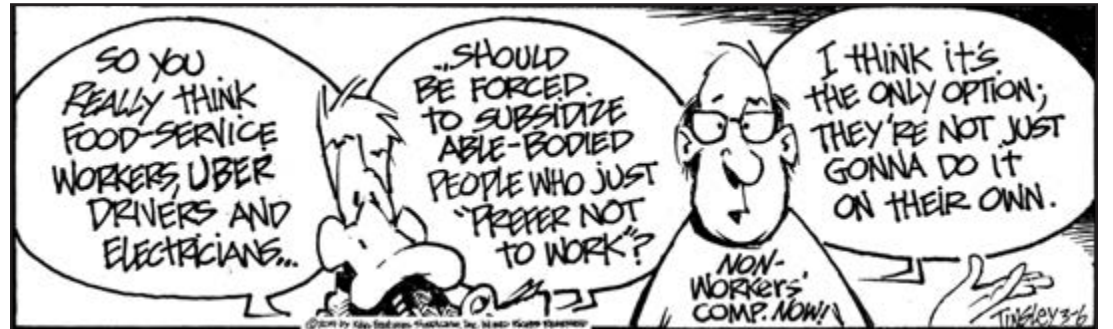
Now, the traffic on Park Avenue doesn't justify the extra width from the 1940s. With the decrease in traffic as a result of the RiverWalk project, French Avenue can be narrowed and landscaped also.

Milwee Middle School and Lyman High School also participated in the Student Astronaut Challenge at the Kennedy Space Center February 4-9. Milwee Middle was named the overall competition winner and Lyman

High School received 2nd place in the high school division.

The Student Astronaut Challenge includes four categories: Engineering Challenge, Lab Challenge, Landing Challenge and Space Flight Simulator Challenge.

The Student Astronaut Challenge is an aero-space based competition sponsored by Florida State University and presented with cooperation from NASA and the Kennedy Space Center. The focus of the competition is the mobile Space Flight Simulator which was designed to replicate the retired NASA Space Shuttle.

For the last six years, up to 200 Middle and High school students' each year have converged at the Kennedy Space Center in February to compete in the Astronaut Challenge. Teams from as far south as Miami to as far north as Savannah, Georgia have traveled to Titusville to see who has the right stuff. In 2015 and 2017 guest teams from Dublin, Ireland traveled to the Kennedy Space Center to compete in the competition.

"As a community, we all have a role in caring for vulnerable children. Our goal is to provide a stable path allowing them to flourish and thrive."

There are many opportunities for the com-

munity to get involved and help shape a young person's life, such as: Becoming a licensed foster family, Mentoring a child in foster care and Adopting a child.

The transition to Embrace Families also coincides with reaccreditation from Florida's Department of Children and Families, a process that happens every five years. This certification allows Embrace Families to maintain its role as lead agency.

islators to make education a priority as the legislative session began.

"We want to get better funding for students," said Amanda Clodfelter, a 3rd Grade teacher at Wekiva Elementary. "We need better funding to give them the exceptional education they deserve."

Her mother, Kimberly Clodfelter, a 4th Grade Math & Science teacher at Forest City Elementary School, concurred.

"We want to not be almost down by 50th in ranking," she said. "We'd like to be higher."

"Our schools are all A-rated," Amanda added, "but the schools are not funded at an A-rate."

According to a press release from the Seminole Education Association, Florida ranks low on spending for education, coming in 45th in the nation for teacher salaries and 47th for pay for educational staff professionals.

The press release says "no other state collects less to fund neighborhood public schools," adding that Florida ranks 51st in the nation in public school revenue for every \$1,000 of personal income generated in-state.

Florida started off this school year with more than 4,000 teacher vacancies, and are poised to have more than 10,000 at the start of the next school year, the press release reads.

The teachers who are at work, though, just need to be better funded, they said.

Some of the things they needed help with, they said, included pencils, spiral notebooks, technology, headphones, art supplies, music supplies and just about everything else, the

Clodfelters said.

Dan Smith, a Speech and Debate teacher at Lake Brantley High School, said he wanted to see public education taken more seriously by legislators.

"We are not focused on the right things," Smith said. "We're not teaching them to problem solve. The focus is only on their GPA, not on the problem solving skills. We want them to be able to take a problem and apply that to real world situations."

Much of the assessments in schools are done by test scores, and Smith said the issue was that "you can't measure problem solving," saying that students were good at learning data but falling behind on innovation.

He said he also wanted to see funding from public schools stop going to charter schools instead.

"Charter schools can pick and choose who

goes to school there," Smith said. "Public schools don't do that."

Charter schools, run by private companies, have become a heated issue among those invested in education. Gov. Ron DeSantis ran his election campaign on more school choice, and recently announced a plan to get more children into private schools on public money.

His logic is that it will assist children in getting into the schools that are best for them.

Tia Little, an administrative assistant with Seminole UniServ, rounded out the protesters on their side of State Road 434. She said the state did not seem to value teachers as much as its bottom line.

"Children are our future," she said. "We want them to be informed, educated individuals, so we should pay the teachers what they're worth. It's one way to show our appreciation."

With much of Florida having a nearly year-round growing season, vegetation quickly grows too thick for turkeys to easily see and move through. Because of this, the FWC and other public land managers continue to employ a variety of tools and methods to improve habitat quality.

"Depending on what an area needs, we do timber thinning, prescribed burning, roller-chopping, bush-hogging and mulching to open the forest canopy and reduce woody vegetation in favor of grasses and forbs," Shields said.

"Many other species also benefit from these habitat improvements, including game animals like white-tailed deer and northern bobwhites, and imperiled species such as red-cockaded woodpeckers, gopher tortoises and flatwoods salamanders."

The FWC partners with multiple government agencies and other conservation organizations to pool their resources and improve more habitat.

One such cooperative funding program is the wild turkey cost-share program between the FWC, the Florida Forest Service and the Florida State Chapter of the National Wild Turkey Federation.

"We've been involved with this program for 25 years and, this year, our nearly \$500,000 in cooperator funding combined with matching and in-kind funding totals more than \$2.2 million to pay for 37 habitat improvement projects on 29 wildlife management areas, including creating wildlife openings and planting food plots," Shields said.

Projects for this year include reducing hardwoods and cabbage palms on DuPuis and Picayune Strand WMAs.

"On DuPuis, the South Florida Water Management District plugged several ditches to return the hydrology back to the natural wet-dry cycle and reintroduced fire across the landscape. However, mature cabbage palm trees had taken over the area prior to this restoration. So, work is being done to reduce their density and allow more herbaceous plants to grow in these areas," Shields

said. "On Picayune Strand, the cost-share program also is helping reduce saw palmetto, gallberry and wax myrtle within pine flatwoods by mechanical means, followed by prescribed fire to promote a grassy understory."

FWC biologists also frequently work with private landowners who seek assistance with managing their properties for turkeys.

"We can give advice over the phone, but in many cases a site visit is necessary," Shields said. "There also are federal conservation cost-share programs out there like the Environmental Quality Incentives Program, and interested landowners can get help with these programs from FWC's Landowner Assistance Program at MyFWC.com/LAP."

Through combined efforts of the FWC, private landowners and public land managers, wild turkeys are healthy and flourishing in Florida. And if you're a hunter and turkey enthusiast, then you're extra excited for this time of year because of spring turkey season and youth turkey hunt weekends.

"We want to raise several hundred, or at least a thousand," West said. "It's for expenses we can help with. We know how expensive treatment is, and that she'll have to take some time away from work. She's worked here a long time, so it's not that she can't afford the treatment. But we don't know how else to help her than to be supportive this way. We want to help in whatever way we can."

Markham Woods Principal Linda Mumej told the Sanford Herald that they were happy to help with the fundraiser. On Monday, as Meriwether had just gotten her head shaved for future cancer treatment, Mumej said the staff and faculty had all worn hats just like the one she now had on, as a show of solidarity.

"We wanted to show her we're a family," Mumej said.

Meriwether, speaking with the Sanford Herald herself, said she was "just so overwhelmed" by the support.

"They went out of their way to have this Pi day event," she said.

On Monday afternoon, the cafeteria was bustling with activity and noise. Two volunteers sat at the table where the boxes for donations were set up, and reported that a lot of donations had been coming in for Tinsley.

Mumej said the last time she had checked, Tinsley was neck-and-neck with Bravo.

And she said it wasn't just the kids donating money to pie one of their teachers in the face - the adults, particularly those whose names were up for pie-ing, were also contributing to help one of their rivals win.

# 23 dead, dozens missing in tornado-blasted Alabama community

**BEAUREGARD, Ala. (AP) —** Rescue crews using dogs and drones searched for victims amid splintered lumber and twisted metal Monday after the deadliest U.S. tornado in nearly six years ripped through a rural Alabama community. At least 23 people were killed, some of them children.

Dozens were missing in Lee County nearly a day after the twister struck, according to the sheriff, who said that crews had combed the hardest-hit areas but that other places had yet to be searched.

The winds Sunday afternoon obliterated numerous homes, leaving huge, jumbled piles of wood and household belongings. Some homes were reduced to concrete slabs. Debris was scattered across the countryside, with shredded metal hanging from the pine trees.

"I'm not going to be surprised if we don't come up with some more deceased. Hopefully we won't," Coroner Bill Harris said. He said the dead included almost entire families and at least three children, ages 6, 9 and 10.

A post on the Lee-Scott Academy's Facebook page said fourth-grader Taylor Thornton was among those killed.

On the day after the disaster, volunteers used chain saws to clear paths for emergency workers. Neighbors and friends helped one another find some of their belongings in the ruins.

Carol Dean found her wedding dress among the wreckage of her mobile home. But the storm took her 53-year-old husband. She said David Wayne Dean was at home Sunday afternoon and had texted a friend to beware when the tornado hit.

"He didn't make it out," she said. Dean said she rushed home from her job at Walmart when she couldn't reach her husband on the phone. She pushed her way past sheriff's deputies who tried to keep her out of the damaged area. Her children had found David Dean's body in a neighbor's yard.

"They took me down to him," Dean said, "and I got to spend a little time with him before they took him away."

At the R&D Grocery, rattled residents asked one another if they were OK. And a big banner that read "#BEAUREGARDSTRONG" was hung on a fence at Beauregard High School.

The National Weather Service said one and possibly two tornadoes

struck the area, with a powerful EF-4 twister with winds estimated at 170 mph (274 kph) blamed for most of the destruction. It carved a path nearly a mile (1.6 kilometers) wide and 24 miles (39 kilometers) long, said meteorologist Chris Darden.

Darden said the "monster tornado" was the deadliest twister to hit the U.S. since May 2013, when an EF-5 killed 24 people in Moore, Oklahoma.

"It looks like someone almost just took a giant knife and scraped the ground," Sheriff Jay Jones said.

County Emergency Management Director Kathy Carson said she was "pretty sure" that tornado sirens in Beauregard sounded warnings but that authorities were busy with the search-and-rescue and had not yet looked into the question.

Crews searching door-to-door used dogs as well as drones that can detect heat from a body. "We're basically using everything we can get our hands on," the sheriff said.

President Donald Trump tweeted that he told the Federal Emergency Management Agency to give Alabama "the A Plus treatment."

The twister was part of a powerful storm system that slashed its way across the Deep South, spawn-

ing numerous tornado warnings in Georgia, South Carolina and Florida.

"All we could do is just hold on for life and pray," said Jonathan Clardy, who huddled with his family inside their Beauregard trailer as the tornado ripped the roof off. "It's a blessing from God that me and my young'uns are alive."

Beauregard, named for a Confederate general, is an unincorporated community of roughly 10,000 people near the Georgia state line. The community is in the same county as Auburn University and has a few small stores, two schools and a volunteer fire department dotting the main highway.

"Everybody in Beauregard is a real close-knit family," Clardy said. "Everybody knows everybody around here. Everybody is heartbroken."

Julie Morrison and her daughter-in-law picked through the ruins of Morrison's home in Beauregard, looking for keys and a wallet. They managed to salvage her husband's motorcycle boots and a Bible.

Morrison said she and her husband took shelter in the bathtub as the twister lifted their house off the ground and swept it into the woods. "We knew we were flying because

it picked the house up," Morrison said, figuring that the shower's fiberglass enclosure helped them survive. She said her son-in-law later dug them out.

Along one hard-hit country road, giant pieces of metal from a farm building dangled from pine branches 20 feet (6 meters) in the air, making loud creaking sounds as the wind blew. For an entire mile down the road, pines were snapped in half. A mobile home crushed by two trees marked the end of the path of destruction.

An early March tornado outbreak in the Alabama-Mississippi area is not unusual, tornado experts said.

The weather service's Storm Prediction Center in Norman, Oklahoma, posted forecasts for higher tornado activity in the region on Thursday, three days before the disaster. University of Georgia meteorology professor Marshall Shepherd said government forecasters "were all over it."

An EF-5 tornado that struck Joplin, Missouri, in May 2011 killed 158 people. And an outbreak of tornadoes in the Southeast a month before that left an estimated 316 people dead, including at least 250 in Alabama.

Lemma, Superintendent Walt Griffin, SCPS Security Director Rick Francis, Lyman High School Principal Mike Rice, School Counseling and Education Pathways Director Nicola Williams, SCPS Director of Student Support Services Amy Elwood and Sajid Hafeez, Director of Adolescent Psychiatry at the University Behavioral Center.

In the course of an hour, they fielded questions on how to make schools safer, what systems were already in place and the importance of a good support system outside of school, among other things.

Hafeez spoke about the delicate line one had to walk when assessing what a parent or teacher was to do with a student or child who seemed at-risk.

"A lot of kids make threats but don't mean them," he said. "Is it a true psychiatric problem, a medical problem? We have to look at personality issues, or if they are under strenuous conditions, and kind of separate things out."

Williams said that while some forms of

mental illness might not manifest until later in life, there were many signs parents could look for.

"It's not just symptoms," she said. "It's how it's affecting them doing daily activities in their life. Changes in mood. Are they withdrawn, or upset? Are there changes to their personality; are they acting out or doing dangerous things? Are they complaining of a stomach ache or a headache, or experiencing weight loss? There are lots of symptoms."

She said it was "not a quick checklist" of things to look for, recommending that parents with concerns consult with a trained professional.

Lemma spoke about the process of investigating threats at schools - such as, say, if a student had written a note on a mirror that seemed to indicate they wanted to harm others or themselves.

He said in those situations, an overnight response is done, with specialists sent to the student's home to try and assess the problem.

"We'll make contact," he said. "We'll look in their room. Usually, it won't have been the first time we were involved at that location. We will go out and make contact with the child, and make sure everyone is comfortable."

Griffin said it was important to him that they consulted with experts on delicate issues

like mental health, as neither he nor any of his people were experts in that field. He said it was important to remove the stigma against mental health issues.

"It's important to talk about mental health, to remove the stigma," Griffin said. "Everyone should have an adult they trust. Students need more education in mental health. They should know the signs of depression, who to speak to, what to do, how to handle a panic attack."

He also said students should be careful about reading media reports involving mental health, as some stories had been known to paint mental health issues in a bad light.

Lyman High School Freshman Ashlee Marley Rivera-Mallare got up at the end of the night, as well, to speak about her own experiences and struggles with mental illness.

She said one teacher in particular had been there for her in times of need, and she "wouldn't be here" without that teacher.

But that didn't mean there weren't issues to address anyway.

"Sometimes, it's really hard to talk about my problems," she said. "There are things going on in my mind that are hard to explain. We should talk about mental health way more often. Sometimes, teachers completely change the topic."

The more advanced plays in bridge fortunately do not arise very often, but even when they do, they are usually not hard to figure out.

The grand coup, for example, is a rather forbidding term for one type of advanced play, but it is not really difficult to execute when the opportunity presents itself. The nice part about it is that you know exactly what you're up against when the coup becomes necessary, and all you have to do is work out the details.

West led a club, and East cashed the A-K and returned the ten, ruffed by West. West returned a heart, taken with dummy's ten. Declarer then cashed the king of spades, on which West showed out.

South had already lost three tricks, and the problem now was to avoid losing a trump trick. He could take one finesse against East by leading dummy's last spade, but how could he then overcome East's remaining Q-9?

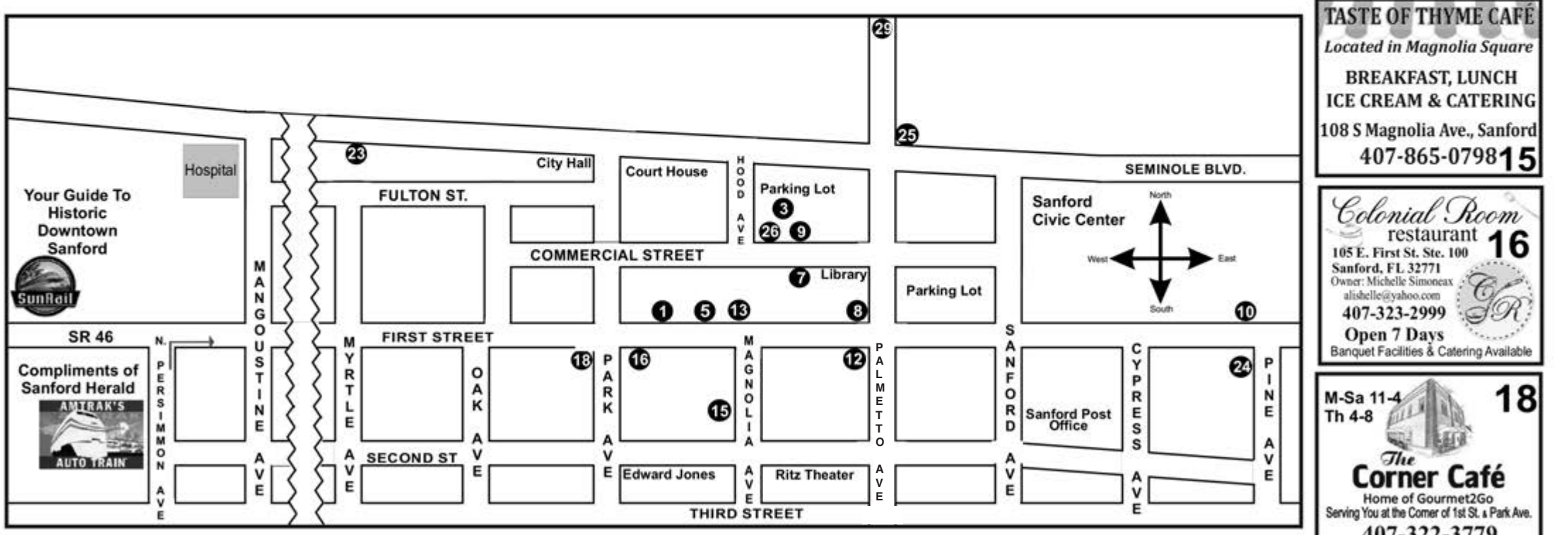
This is the typical grand coup situation where declarer has to take what in effect amounts to a trump finesse without having a trump to lead from dummy. The answer to how this is done lies in declarer's first reducing his trump length to that of his opponent, and then leading a card from dummy at the crucial moment to trap the adverse honor.

In the given case, declarer starts by taking the spade finesse at trick six, then leads the king of diamonds and overtakes it with the ace! Next he ruffs a diamond, crosses to the queen of hearts and ruffs another diamond.

He now returns to dummy with the ace of hearts, reducing everyone to two cards. With the lead in dummy and South holding the A-J of spades over East's Q-9, East's apparent trump trick is obliterated, and the contract is made.

That's when the Evans attack came to life, scoring the final eight points of the third period to close to

within, 58-51, and then, after Demari Henderson hit a pair of free throws to open the fourth quarter to give the Noles a 60-51 lead went on a 10-0 run to take the lead, 61-60, before Jacari Henderson dropped in a 3-pointer put Seminole back on top, 63-61, with 3:30 to play.

The Trojans answered with a three-point play of their own to go up for good, 64-63, with 3:17 remaining in the game.

# Knights men earn 69-64 win at No. 6/8 Houston

## Collin Smith scores season-high 21 points as UCF earns 22nd victory of the season

**HOUSTON (UCFKnights.com)** — On Saturday, under the watchful eye of a national audience and the bright lights of ESPN's College GameDay, the UCF men's basketball team went on the road and took on the team with the best record (27-1) in the nation, the longest home win streak (33 games) in the nation, and ranked No. 6 in the nation. After 40 minutes, the Knights came out on top, defeating Houston 69-64 to earn what might be the biggest victory in program history.

"You want to be in meaningful games," UCF head coach Johnny Dawkins said afterwards. "People talk about the stretch right now that we have, but that's good for us. It's galvanizing us even more. Guys are understanding what it takes to win in these types of environments and that's going to continue to help us get better."

It was not easy. The Cougars, who had lost just one game on the season coming into Saturday, got up on the Knights in the first half. In fact, they led by as many as eight points, and held a five-point advantage at the break.

Back on Feb. 7 in Orlando, the Cougars (27-2, 14-2 AAC) also got off to a fast start and were able to pull away. On Saturday in Houston, not so much. Trailing 33-28 at halftime, the Knights scored the first 11 points of the second half, all by big men Tacko Fall and Collin Smith, to take a 39-33 advantage five-minutes into the period.

UCF extended its lead to as many as eight points midway through the second, before the seasoned Cougars fought back. Houston scored eight straight points to take its first lead of the half, at 60-58, with 1:57 to play, and all the momentum was in favor of the home team.

With a sold-out 7,039 fans erupting, Dawkins called timeout. Out of the break, the team executed the drawn-up play perfectly, finding the Head Coach's son, Aubrey, open for a 3-pointer. He knocked it down to give UCF the lead again,

this time one the team would not relinquish.

The Knights made stop after stop after stop on the defensive end, and connected on its free throws. Dawkins, Smith and Dayon Griffin hit a combined four free throws over a span of 53 seconds to make it 65-60 with 25-seconds left and the Cougars were never able to recover.

When the buzzer sounded and the score read UCF 69, Houston 64, and the Knights had earned their second highest ranked win in program history, their second ever true road win over a ranked team and a clear bullet on the resume come Selection Sunday.

"I thought our staff prepared our guys really, really well for this game and we didn't let the moment get too big for us," Coach Dawkins said. "They were focused on what we had to do and all night long they executed."

Star guards Dawkins and BJ Taylor did what they needed to do when it counted. The former hit the aforementioned three and finished with 11 points. The latter also scored 11 points, going 8-of-8 from the line, and had three assists to just one turnover.

But it was the bigs that carried the way on Saturday. They were dominant. Smith and Fall scored. They combined for 34 points. Smith and Fall rebounded. They combined for 17 boards as the Knights outrebounded the Cougars 35-33. They got Houston's big men into foul trouble, and the led UCF to the victory.

For the 6-foot-11 Smith, it was a season-high 21 points to go with seven rebounds. For the 7-foot-6 Fall, it was 13 points and 10 rebounds for his fifth double-double of the season.

"He was terrific and I told him that after the game," Dawkins said of Smith. "He really stepped up and gave us a huge lift. He had an advantage and he really just took his time, he was poised and he made some really good plays for us."

The 22nd win of the regular season matches the program record for wins in a regular season (2003-04 and 2006-07). It was also the 12th win in league play, marking the most ever wins for UCF in the American Athletic Conference.

The Knights (22-6, 12-4 AAC) are now ranked 25th in the AP Poll, the team's first ranking since 2011, and have two regular season games remaining. UCF will host No. 19/20 Cincinnati (25-4, 14-2 AAC) on Thursday in the regular season home finale, the first-ever ranked matchup at CFE Arena. It will be the last regular season home game for Fall, BJ Taylor, Chad Brown and Dayon Griffin. Tip-off is set for 7 p.m. with coverage on ESPN2 and FM 96.9 The Game.

**Fall Named AAC Player of the Week**  
 Fall was integral in UCF's success this week. The 7-foot-6 big man averaged 15.5 points and 7.5 rebounds per game as the Knights won on the road at South Florida and No. 6/8 Houston to catapult themselves into the Top 25.

It marks the first time this season that Fall has been named Player of the Week by the league and the second time in his career. He also earned the honor once during his sophomore season in 2016-17. It is the third time UCF has had a Player of the Week this season, as Aubrey Dawkins has earned the accolades twice.

Fall scored 18 points, had five rebounds and went 6-of-8 from the free throw line in Wednesday's War On 1-4 victory at South Florida. In the big win at Houston, the Dakar, Senegal native finished with 13 points and 10 boards for his fifth double-double of the season.

**Knights Ranked 25th in AP Poll**  
 The UCF men's basketball team has won three in a row and on Monday, the Knights cracked the Associated Press Top 25 for the first time since 2011.

UCF is ranked 25th in the poll, the program's first appearance since Jan. 10, 2011 and just the fifth time the team has ever been ranked. All four of the other rankings were during the 2010-11 campaign.

The Knights are also back to receiving votes in the USA Today Coaches Poll, as one of the first teams outside of the Top 25.

# UCF women finish regular season on a high note

**ORLANDO (UCFKnights.com)** — In what has become a habit under UCF Women's Basketball head coach Katie Abrahamson-Henderson, Saturday afternoon's 52-42 win over Tulane marked another milestone in UCF's historic season.

Playing their final regular season home contest, the Knights came away with their 23rd victory of the season — the most wins in the program's NCAA Division I era.

The Knights (23-5, 12-3 The American) also locked up the No. 2 seed in this coming weekend's American Athletic Conference Championship. It marks UCF's highest seed since the 2010-11 Conference USA campaign when the Knights were also seeded second.

After a slow start, UCF rallied to hold a 10-7 lead over Tulane (15-13, 5-10 The American) after the first quarter. The Green Wave came back to tie the score, 16-16, with 5:44 left in the second quarter, but the Knights rallied to take a 25-21 advantage into halftime.

Tulane outscored the Knights 14-8 in the third frame to hold a slight 35-33 edge heading into the fourth quarter. UCF stepped up defensively, limiting the Green Wave to just seven points in the final stanza and just one point in the last four minutes. The Knights poured in 19 points and were a perfect 6-for-6 from the free throw line in the fourth quarter.

Kay Kay Wright led UCF with 16 points to go along with four steals and a trio of assists. Masseny Kaba added a season-best 14 points and pulled down six rebounds. Nyala Shuler led UCF with nine boards and tied her career best with a team-high five steals.

As a class, they have led UCF to three-consecutive 20-win seasons for the first time in the program's DI history and have improved UCF's finish in The American in each of the last three years.

**Win Streak Extended**  
 The team closed out the regular season on a high note with a 59-50 win over Houston in the Fertitta Center on Monday night.

The Knights (24-5, 13-3 The American) held Houston (15-14, 9-7) to just four points in the first quarter and held a 10-point advantage, 14-4, after the first 10 minutes. The Cougars cut UCF's lead to four, 16-12, but the Knights responded to take a 27-20 edge into halftime.

After Houston pulled within three, 35-32, at the 4:50 mark in the third quarter, the Knights outscored the Cougars 11-1 to take a 46-33 lead into the final frame. UCF pushed out to its largest advantage, 52-36, with 4:07 left in the fourth quarter, but a 7-0 spurt from Houston cut the lead to single digits, 52-43, with 2:23 left to play. The Cougars were able to get within six, 56-50, with 44 seconds remaining, but UCF hit clutch free throws down the stretch to come away with the victory.

Wright tallied her 14th 20-point performance of the season, scoring a game-high 21 points. Brittney Smith added a career-high nine points. Shuler and Kaba each had six rebounds. Wilson dished out three assists and Diamond Battles grabbed a trio of steals.

**Reaching More Milestones**  
 UCF's 24 regular season victories officially marked the most in program

history. The previous mark was set by the 1982-83 squad, who finished the regular season with 23 wins.

For the third straight year, the Knights also improved their mark in the American Athletic Conference.

The Black and Gold's 13 conference wins are not only their most in The American, but it's their most since the 2004-05 Atlantic Sun squad that went 16-4.

Next up, UCF heads to the American Athletic Conference Championship. For the third consecutive year, the second-seeded Knights will have a first-round bye and will face the winner of No. 7 Tulsa — No. 10 Wichita State at 6 p.m. on Saturday, March 9, at the Mohegan Sun Arena.
