SunRail celebrates its 5th year in operation

The SunRail is celebrating its fifth anniversary this week, having originally begun operations May 1, 2014. In Sanford, the train has been the subject of much discussion as leaders tried to make it easy for people to access the downtown area from the station, which is located off West State Road 46 and is not in walking distance of downtown. The solution has recently come in the form of a trolley, which the Sanford Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) has championed as a way to solve the problem as it makes rounds to and from the station at regular intervals.

Barroom Challenge raises more than \$1,000 for Sanford Historical Society

To raise money for projects, the Sanford Historical Society teamed up with local bars last month for a spree of creative drink-making with the Smith's Barroom Challenge. The impetus of the project was a deed found from one of Sanford's earliest bars, Smith's Barroom, from the late 1800s. Found among the documents was a list of the ingredients used to make drinks back in those days. So Brigitte Stephenson, assistant at the Sanford Museum, and Amber Babcock, social media coordinator for the Historical Society, issued a challenge to local watering holes: to create a cocktail based off the old ingredients

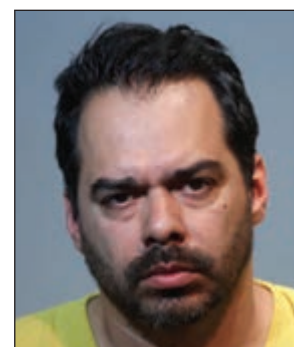
Altamonte Springs police arrest man, charge him with DUI manslaughter

An Altamonte Springs man, 40-year-old Ulises Andree Mora, was arrested Friday in connection with a car crash in March that killed a juvenile female victim, the Altamonte Springs Police Department said in a press release.

The crash occurred March 29, when the green Porsche Mora was driving collided with a black Acura, containing a family of four, as the Acura was turning from Montgomery Road onto Jamestown Boulevard. The Porsche was going around 75 to 80 miles per hour, far above the 40 miles per hour

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THE BULLETIN BOARD: New Salem Baptist Church celebrates 149th anniversary

New Salem Primitive Baptist Church, Inc., 1500 W. 12th Street in Sanford (Elder C.J. Haynes, Pastor), celebrated their 149th Year Anniversary with two services, with the theme, "149 Years of Doing Our Part to Add to the Kingdom." On Sunday, March 17, 2019, the guest church was Clearwater Missionary Baptist Church of Sanford; Rev. Matthew Jackson, Pastor. Jennifer Haynes gave the Welcome and the Occasion on behalf of New Salem. The Clearwater Choir sang; their Deacons and other officers served; and Pastor Jackson preached the Gospel Message.

On Sunday, March 24, 2019, the guest church was Mt. Zion Primitive Baptist Church of Eustis, FL; Elder Jerald Blue, Pastor. Ashley Bradshaw gave the Welcome and Occasion and Vanessa Arvinger and Pastor Haynes expressed Words of Appreciation on behalf of New Salem. The Mt. Zion Choir sang "Sending Up My Timber" and "I Need You Lord"; their Deacons and other officers served; and Pastor Blue preached the Gospel Message. Well-known Gospel singer, Evangelist Mildred Hampton of Sanford, sang "Blessed Assurance". There was food and fellowship following the services.

Church History Excerpts: New Salem Primitive Baptist Church in Sanford, FL was founded in 1870 on land that was donated by General Henry S. Sanford, for whom the City of Sanford is named. New Salem was one of the first Black churches in what was then Orange County. In the 19th Century, a church was not really a church without a church bell. On April 17, 1871 General and Mrs. Sanford donated a bell to the church. The bell tolled fifteen minutes before each service. The original church bell currently sits in the churchyard of the Moriah House of Prayer on Locust Avenue in Sanford, formerly known as Mt. Moriah Primitive Baptist Church.



New Salem Primitive Baptist Church

The first site of the church was on Eighth Street and Palmetto Avenue and it was a wooden structure with lanterns for lights. The worship services would last until the late evening hours with everyone making a joyful noise unto the Lord. Transportation for the members consisted of a horse and buggy or mule and wagon. After years of complaints by surrounding white citizens, the church was eventually burned down as a show of racial intolerance. This tragic event caused the members of the church to gather for worship services in each other's homes. Unfortunately, a division among the congregation arose at the turn of the century. However, even this seemingly tragic situation was blessed by God, as it led to the formation of many flourishing churches and denominations that originated out of New Salem. In later years, New Salem was rebuilt on 12th Street and Cedar Avenue. In October 1943, history repeated its cruelty as the church was again burned down. During this fire, all church records

were destroyed. This period also saw the formation of Macedonia Primitive Baptist Church. In 1944, the foundation for the third New Salem Primitive Baptist Church was laid in bricks. During this time, a storm swept through Sanford and destroyed the foundation. However, with the Will of God working through Rev. Simeon Austin and many loyal members, the church was rebuilt with stone. In the latter part of 1945, the congregation, led by Rev. Austin, marched into the fourth foundation at 1500 West 12th Street and Oleander Avenue, with joyful and triumphant voices praising God for the victory. Of those triumphant saints, Deacon Garfield Armstrong was the longest surviving warrior before his death in 1985. New Salem's Pastors: Rev. Simeon Austin; Rev. P.H. Frison; Rev. O.W. Williams; Elder Eli Simpson; Elder Warren K. Little; Elder Henry Buxton; Elder Ivory Amos; and currently Elder C.J. Haynes.

"Dragged Across Concrete" (R) -- Officers Ridgeman (Mel Gibson) and Lurasetti (Vince Vaughn) are suspended for excessive tactics that are caught on camera, but both have compelling reasons to stay in the game: Ridgeman's wife is sick, and Lurasetti is on the cusp of proposing to his longtime girlfriend. They need money. The pair dig deep in their dirty contacts to find an enterprising lit-

tle side job -- robbing a group of bank robbers. Standing in their way is a pair of moralist criminals (Tory Kittles, Michael Jai White) with their own compelling reasons for cash. Much like the title says, it's a violent, slow lurch toward a grisly end that leaves a trail of destruction in its wake.

"Miss Bala" (PG-13) -- Gina Rodriguez stars as Gloria, a young, pretty LA makeup artist in Mexico to visit her best

friend. At a nightclub, the women are witness to some cartel violence. Her friend is kidnapped, but instead of being helped by the police, Gloria is handed over to the cartel. To find her friend, she must embrace her inner baddie and journey through a world of double-dealing drug lords, police, government agents and more. It's an English-language remake of the 2011 version by Mexican director Gerardo Naranjo, and it's a little lighter

and a little less gritty.

"Level 16" (NR) -- Canadian director Danishka Esterhazy offers a dystopian and very gray look into a secluded (read that windowless, color-drained, possibly underground) boarding school for girls, who are taught the "virtues" of femininity: cleanliness, obedience, silence, etc. They practice in hopes that being a "clean girl" will lead to adoption by a loving family.

The whole thing is headed by a serious bottle blonde with neither a speck of lint on her sharp black suit nor trace of a soul. Suspicious yet? So is Vivian (Katie Douglas), who has just leveled up and joins previous classmate Sophia (Celina Martin) on Level 16, the presumably final level, where new and dangerous rules apply.

"Serenity" (R) -- Baker Dill (Matthew McConaughey) is a fishing boat captain in search of a great big fish. His ex-wife Karen (Anne Hathaway, strangely blonde) tracks him down for help: take her new, abusive husband (Jason Clarke) fishing, and drop him in the ocean for the sharks to eat, thereby saving her and their son from any more abuse.

There are big, impressive twists -- at least that is how the producers would like you to see them, and I'm not going to ruin them for you. It's a hard combo to pull off, but this movie managed to be both overly complicated and as transparent as a shallow lagoon.

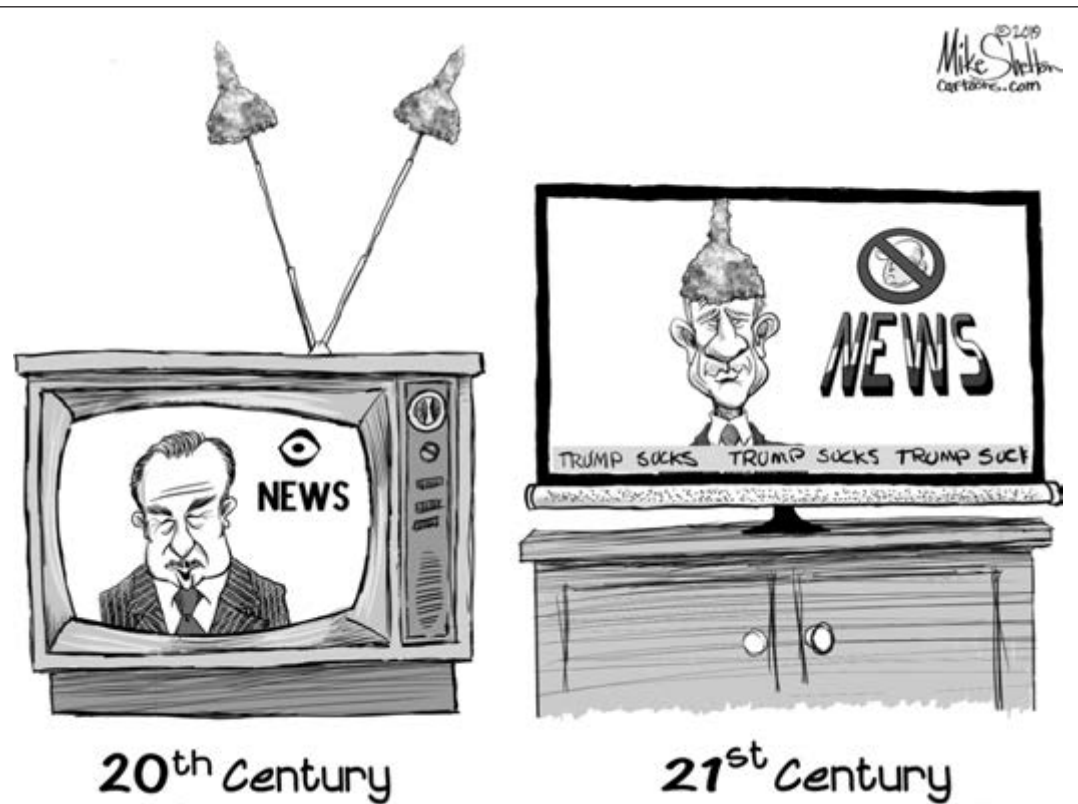

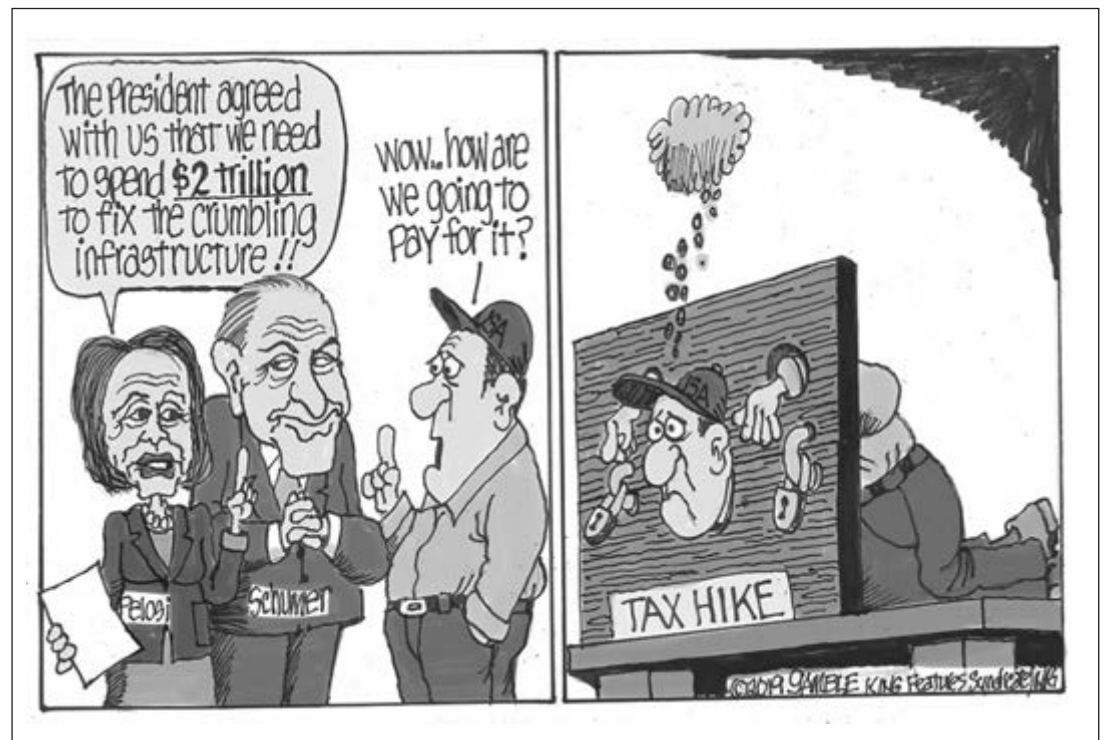

disposed of by law enforcement.

From 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. last Saturday, the Central Florida Regional Hospital, the Hunter's Creek ER and the Oviedo Medical Center partnered with law enforcement in the nationwide effort helmed by the Drug Enforcement Administration. The intent was to provide a "safe, convenient and anonymous way to drop off prescription drugs," according to a press release.

Seminole County had the second-highest weight of drugs collected, with only Brevard County's 3,143 pounds topping it this year. Orange County collected 1,680 pounds of drugs and Volusia County collected 1,894 pounds. The total weight of drugs collected across all Central Florida counties was 10,362 pounds.

R. Sean Benoit, MD, Chief Medical Officer with Central Florida Regional Hospital, told the Sanford Herald that the day had gone well and that the benefit was to efficiently and cleanly get drugs out of society.

"There are so many drug overdoses every year," Benoit said. "We hope to get people to voluntarily give them up, so they're not a problem to themselves or their families."

Benoit said the point of having a coordinated day to turn them over for destruction was so that they could be assured that the drugs wouldn't cause harm.

"They can hand the drugs over to the DEA, rather than putting them in a trash can where

a child could get to them," he said.

The drugs collected, Benoit said, are prone to abuse if the user begins to take too much of them.

"Some of them are dangerous if you take more than what's prescribed," he said. "If you begin to take them for the effects, or if you get used to it and take too much. There can be side effects. They can make you sleepy. There's a potential for abuse."

Benoit said the efforts were "just one piece" of their long fight against opioids. Other parts include equipping law enforcement with Narcan, which is used to revive those who have overdosed, and keeping a network of community members in schools and churches to prevent tragedies before they happen.

The opioid epidemic is considered a nationwide crisis. In Seminole County, opioid overdose deaths have surged in recent years.

Sheriff Dennis Lemma was appointed late last year to be the chair of Attorney General Ashley Moody's Transition Advisory Committee Working Group on Opioid Abuse, where his duties would entail keeping up to date with the best practices to stop the epidemic.

And the Seminole County Sheriff's Office has made a point to go for a holistic and nuanced approach in fighting the epidemic, partnering with local resources dedicated to helping people fight addiction.

Also, recently, the Sanford City Commissioners heard about a possibility of filing a lawsuit against several pharmaceutical companies for their roles in exacerbating the epidemic, though no official action has been taken yet.

CRA Chairman Charles Davis said he thought the issues had mostly been alleviated.

"When we started talking about SunRail, we were very interested," Davis told the Sanford Herald. "Now, the fact that we've had over 28,000 people riding the trolley since last October from Amtrak and Sunrail, proves we've closed the gap. Kudos to the City and the CRA for making this possible."

Mayor Jeff Triplett wrote in an email that he believed the SunRail had paid off since its inception.

"We have closely monitored SunRail since inception including traffic counts and the maintenance yard concerns over the years," he wrote. "I truly believe that it is, and will continue to be, a benefit to Sanford. We need to continue to talk about expanded hours, operating efficiencies and expenses that are forthcoming."

Triplett said he was "cautiously optimistic" about the public and private capitalization of the area surrounding the station, but said they would "continue to fund the Sanford Trolley to deliver passengers into our downtown corridor, we promote the benefits of having a station within our city limits and we look forward to what the future holds for the Transportation Overlay District and it's

development."

SunRail has been expanding since its inception, beginning as a 32-mile system with 12 stations in three counties.

But now, it's 49 miles and counting, having added four more stations and locations in a fourth county, and going up to 40 trips per day.

According to Steve Olson, Public Information Officer for SunRail, there had been over a million people riding the SunRail from July of last year to March of this year. That, he said, showed the staying power of the service.

He said future expansions will continue north, with a new line from DeBary to Deland planned in the coming years, which they're in the process of gathering funding for.

Also, by May of 2021, he said the long-planned transfer of paying for SunRail will shift to local governments rather than the Department of Transportation. This has been a concern for smaller cities like those in Seminole County, which have discussed how to pay for the coming costs.

"Local governments are negotiating how to do this and how to fund it," Olson said. "They're having discussions among themselves."

And, as always, safety was a major concern, Olson said, with engineers making sure every train was running smoothly. But he said in many situations, the onus was on the public to be safe around the train tracks.

for drinks from Smith's Barroom.

"We were expecting three bars to participate," Stephenson said. "We got more than 15. It was mind-boggling."

The challenge went on for the entire month of April at a number of local staples, including 119 French, Hollerbach's Willow Tree Cafe, The Old Jail, Bitters and Brass, St. John's River Steak and Seafood, the Smiling Bison, Tuffy's Bottle Shop and more.

10 percent of the proceeds from every drink sold went towards the Historical Society.

The winner of the contest was Hollerbach's Willow Tree Cafe, with 280 drinks sold. Their

weekend of May before closing again.

The original Smith's Barroom closed in 1892 for unknown reasons, though a press release from the Historical Society postulates that it could have been "the rising tide of 'prohibis' wanting Sanford to be dry," or perhaps that Smith "wanted to go into another prosperous industry such as citrus."

Speaking to the crowd at Celery City on Thursday, Stephenson said Sanford's reputation as a "historic city with a drinking problem" had held true for the majority of its history.

"Our history with alcohol is quite contentious," she said. "We had about seven to eight local elections on the issue of wet or dry, going back and forth all the time. We had a prominent group of women who were part of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, who advocated heavily against alcohol. In fact

at one point they found a petition to support the local saloons here, and they actually wrote all the names down on giant sheets of paper and stuck them on all the lawns of all the people in Sanford. An early form of doxxing, you know. So nothing's really new these days."

But Stephenson said Smith was one of the original proprietors downtown who promoted alcohol, and "paved the way for business owners in Sanford, but also kind of enjoying our alcoholic past."

Part of the funds raised will go toward the digitization of the Henry Shelton Sanford papers, which, aside from the personal history of the founder of the city, include historic documents related to the Belgian Congo and Civil War-era espionage, according to Stephenson and Babcock. The documents are frequently coveted by historians, and the digitization would make them easier to access.

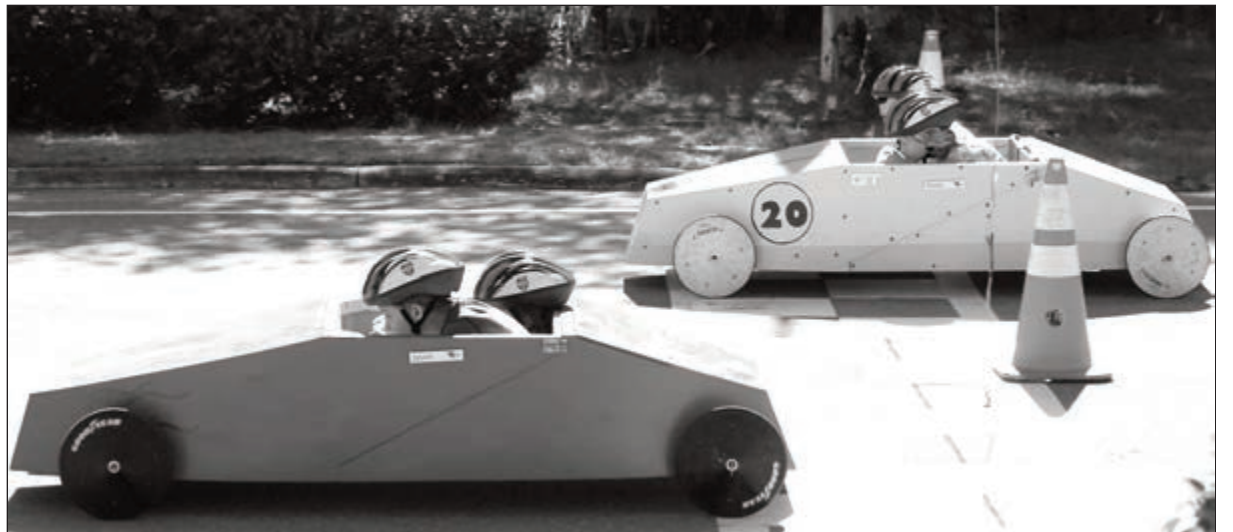
Local Derby

UCF MEN
 Matt Milon is coming home. The former Oviedo High School star has officially signed on to play his final season of college basketball at UCF, head coach Johnny Dawkins announced on Wednesday.

Milon, who started his career at Boston College, has spent the last two seasons at William & Mary. The 6-foot-5 sharpshooter averaged 13.0 points per game, while shooting 41.3 percent from three-point range and 80.3 percent from the free throw line in two years with the Tribe.

"It's great to get Matt back home to play in front of Knight Nation," Dawkins said. "He can really shoot the ball effectively and will open up a lot of things for us with his ability to knock down shots. He's a hard worker with outstanding leadership qualities and we're excited to have this great young man be a part of the UCF Family."

At Oviedo High School, Milon was the Florida Class 7A Player of the Year and an All-State selection in 2014 and 2015. He was a finalist for Florida's Mr. Basketball award, averaging 23.0 points and 7.0 rebounds while leading Oviedo to the state championship game as a senior.

Milon joins recent signee Dazon Ingram from Alabama as graduate transfers on the UCF roster for 2019-20. The two will look to create a formidable backcourt for the Knights in hopes of following up on UCF's best season in program history in 2018-19.

Milon and Ingram will be joined by other newcomers freshmen Tony Johnson Jr. and Darin Green Jr., as well as junior college transfers Avery Diggs and Moses Bol. Other new faces for 2019-20 will be Ibrahim Famouke Doumbia, Dre Fuller Jr. and Yuat Alok, who all sat out last season.

The Knights are coming off of the best season in program history, advancing to the Second Round of the NCAA Tournament and finishing 24-9 overall. UCF defeated VCU for its first NCAA Tournament win, before ultimately falling to top-seeded Duke at the buzzer in the Second Round.

The UCF baseball team needed extra innings on Tuesday night to complete the season sweep of North Florida on the road. The Knights tied the game in the top of the ninth and later scored four runs in the 11th to win 9-7.

Ray Alejo and Dallas Beaver powered the offense with a pair of three-hit games, with the latter driving in a trio of runs on the night. Zack Hunsicker tossed two innings to earn his first career win at UCF.

North Florida benefitted from some shaky defense to start the game, as the Knights allowed four runs on a trio of errors in the bottom of the first.

UCF cut the gap in half in the top of the second. After Jay Lyons reached on a fielding error, Tyler Osik launched a two-run home run to left center. Beaver drove in the next three with an RBI double in

the fifth, an RBI grounder in the seventh and a bases-loaded walk in the ninth that tied the game at 5-5.

In the top of the 11th, the Knights scored four runs on five hits. Dalton Wingo put the Black and Gold ahead for the first time all night on a single through the right side that brought Alejo in from third. The one-three-five method of bidding is seldom the right one, and this hand was no exception. A three-notrump contract, with 10 tricks immediately available, would have been far more sensible.

However, it would be injudicious of South to bid three notrump over three clubs, considering his weak heart holding. South's proper rebid is three diamonds, paving the way to a notrump game if North is agreeable to the suggestion. Once diamonds are mentioned, North can readily bid three notrump.

The play at five clubs requires careful handling. South starts with three potential losers — a heart and two spades. If he plays thoughtlessly, he will finish a trick short of his goal.

South wins the diamond lead with the ace and draws trump. The natural play appears to be to take a heart finesse and, if it fails, to hope to lose only one spade trick. As the cards lie, this approach fails because South cannot avoid two spade losers against proper defense.

Attempting the heart finesse is incorrect, as South cannot be defeated if he plays the hand correctly. At trick three, he cashes the diamond king and then leads a heart to the ace, ignoring the finesse. The queen of hearts is next played and, regardless of which defender wins the trick, only one spade can be lost.

Suppose East has the king of hearts. He can't afford to yield a ruff-and-discard, so he returns a low spade. Declarer simply plays low, and the contract is made.

If West turns up with the heart king, he will also have to lead a spade. Dummy plays low, and again South loses only one spade trick.

speed limit in the area, according to witnesses of the crash. The impact of the crash was severe enough to split the Acura in half and kill a girl in the car. A boy in the Acura sustained injuries as well, and was hospitalized.

Additionally, the Porsche became lodged in a wall of an apartment building nearby after the crash, and the passenger in Mora's car suffered a broken arm, and feared he was stuck inside due to its position. The passenger remembered seeing smoke coming from the vehicle, as a small fire had started due to the crash.

The crash came after what was allegedly a long day of drinking for Mora.

According to the passenger in Mora's green Porsche that night, he and his wife had invited Mora, Mora's wife and others to their home, where they drank alcohol and swam in the pool. The passenger allegedly saw Mora consume at least two glasses of whiskey. Then later, as Mora and the passenger drove in the Porsche, they reportedly stopped at a bar and had a shot of alcohol.

Then, as they were driving after that, Mora allegedly told the passenger that he wanted to show off how the Porsche drove. They reportedly began to drive at a high rate of speed, going from the light at State Road 434 to Jamestown Boulevard in under a minute.

That was where the crash occurred, according to officials.

The passenger reportedly heard Mora talking about "getting their story straight" in the immediate aftermath of the crash.

As Mora was being processed after the crash, he was asked to lift up his shirt to show the injuries he sustained in the crash for a photograph, and he reportedly smiled for the picture.

The investigation was deemed to be a criminal one, and Mora was eventually charged on Friday with DUI manslaughter for the killing of the girl due to the crash he caused, and he was arrested. He was given no bond.

How did this happen? We answered TV and radio ads aimed at Medicare beneficiaries. By calling them for more information, we were offered "free" devices we didn't need. Per the Department of Justice

news release, medical doctors were bribed into prescribing the devices to patients they had never even met or those they'd only talked to via brief phone conversations. Once we gave them our Medicare numbers and personal information, our calls would be switched to a foreign call center, and they were then able to bill Medicare. It was a complicated scam, involving doctors, company executives, call centers, 130 companies, bribery, kickbacks and more.

Scary, isn't it?

If you see an ad on TV about free medical equipment you can get because you're on Medicare, write down the information and give it to your doctor. Ask whether that device or service is something you really need. If it is, and if it's something approved by Medicare, you can still get it for free. In fact, whether it's for free medical equipment, or insurance coverage, or for any reason, if it's related to Medicare, all the scammers really want is your Medicare number.

In other Medicare scams,

they'll call you and say they need to update your information, including your bank account number where your Social Security is deposited. Whether they use sympathy, offers of help or aggressive tactics ... don't let it fool you. Hang up.

Remember, once the scammers have your Medicare card number, they can use it again and again.

Vets Left to Suffer When Nurses Steal Painkillers

A registered nurse at a Department of Veterans Affairs medical center took vials of liquid morphine and other opioids from locked medical carts, painkillers that were intended for patients. He left behind in the vials a saline solution, basically salt-water.

He was sentenced to two years in federal prison for tampering with a consumer product and acquiring a controlled substance by deception and subterfuge.

That's it? Two years? He could have gotten 10 years in a federal prison and a fine of a quarter million dollars on the first count alone, with four years and another quarter million on the second,

and they let him off with two years?

That's not the only case of short prison sentences for stealing painkillers from veterans.

A nurse at another VA hospital stole opioids, specifically hydromorphone, morphine and fentanyl. The vials were refilled with saline and put back in the automated medication management machine. She was sentenced to 14 months in prison.

Sometimes the thieves don't even get prison time. An ICU nurse stole drugs and didn't bother to show on her application that she been fired from another hospital. The nurse was caught after she tampered with the override feature on the medication dispenser and took drugs such as

morphine and oxycodone. In a single month she had overridden the machine 19 times. She was sentenced to two years probation for two felonies.

In one of the more gut-wrenching cases, in a VA medical hospice in New York, a nurse stole painkillers from dying patients and replaced them with Haloperidol, an anti-psychotic, which did nothing to relieve their suffering. He admitted to doctoring at least 25 syringes of oxycodone hydrochloride, used to treat moderate to severe pain. The patients were World War II and Korea-era veterans. He was sentenced to only 82 months in prison.
