Bad boys, bad boys, whatcha gonna do

It was back in the late 1980s when "Cops" first showed up on my TV screen.

It immediately garnered my full attention. Having had some experience in law enforcement, I was intrigued to watch the police officers going about their daily business. The program focused on the abuses and dangers endured by the officers every day.

On the CBS evening news out of Chicago, where I was spending my summers, anchor Bill Kurtis noted the "Cops" show was going to be the first in a long line of reality programming. Mr. Kurtis stated that in 20 years, reality type programming would take up over half of all television programming. He may have undersold it.

First off, "Cops" was not nearly the first reality show on the tube. A few years earlier HBO had premiered "An American Family, The Louds," and, going back even further, shows like "The Dating Game" had some semblances of reality.

Still, Bill Kurtis was correct. Cops ushered in a new direction. After that all sorts of TV programs began to show up that advertised themselves as reality (even

though there was little or no evidence of it.) Pretty quickly reality shows appeared that were obviously scripted and mostly poorly acted by amateurs. The whole thing mushroomed and by now is way out of hand.

Today, there is hardly a subject that does not sport a reality program and some have multiples. House repairing and flipping seems to be a big seller as does contests. CBS has a couple solid contenders with "Big Brother" and "Survivor," both of which have been around a long time and continue to pull good ratings. Popular shows like "Shark Tank" and "Swamp People" do well year in and year out.

Of course, the premier reality show is "Putting Up with The Kardashians," a show about a dysfunctional family in Hollywood or someplace. The Kardashians have been on for several years now and seem to be in it for the long haul. In my house, they have

managed to eliminate the "E" channel that airs it (and little else.)

My own preference is still the police shows. "America's Most Wanted" with John Walsh was a great program that lasted for years. Each week we watched as John profiled some criminal in hopes the viewing public would assist in the apprehension. Good stuff. We all suffered with Mr. Walsh, knowing his son had been brutally murdered. He says his show helped apprehend more than 2,400 suspects.

I like the latest cop offering called "Live P.D." That one purports to be showing you arrests as they happen. That is not often true, but it seems to be at least live on mostly unedited tape. A newer version of that show is focusing on the body cams worn by the cops. That is interesting and often startling.

Several entertainment shows have survived for many years; "Dancing With The Stars" and "America's Got Talent" to name a couple.

Romance is a big seller and, in that genre, the reality providers have gone off the hook. "The Bachelor" and "Bachelorette" are unreal reality programs, but the

"Wives" of here or there franchise is terrible. It seems the idea for those programs is to put a bunch of ladies into a building and watch as they become so very unladylike. Fighting and throwing things seems to be in every scripted plot.

I guess to each their own and live and let live has to be the motto, but one thing about these "reality" programs that bother me is the onslaught of faux celebrities. I once was up on the goings on in Hollywood and on television, but now am completely lost. On the rare occasion I tune in to TMZ, I do not know any of the "stars" they are profiling. When I check into it, the mystery guests are all from some obscure reality show. Oh well, I suppose I am just missing the days when television was well written and acted. Do you?

school and practiced law," she said in a news release. "I made my first quilt when I was seven years old, and continued every year since then.

Art has always been important to her, Ms. Austin said. "I took the plunge in 2004 to make art full time. My work is about my experiences, including a series about nature - images of leaves and fish surrounding figures and faces. Art contains the stories of both the artist and the viewer. I hear many personal stories sparked by my work. These interactions give me an understanding and an appreciation of the complexity of our lives."

She uses family photos to give her art a personal touch, with hand-dyed textiles to make fabric portraits and scenes, Ms. Austin said. "I try out different art methods to add distinct self-made designs, including raku and traditionally fired ceramic masks, stone

lithography, photo-chemical processes, dye removal and etching."

Using art to support her community also is important to her, she said. "My focus is to support art-makers who never call themselves artists. I help others develop maker skills to be used long after the project is done."

Ms. Austin's work has been exhibited throughout the United States and China, including at the National Underground Railroad Freedom Center in Cincinnati, Ohio; the Historical Society of Washington, D.C.; the Atlantic Center for the Arts Harris House Gallery in New Smyrna Beach; the National Afro-American Museum and Cultural Center in Wilberforce, Ohio; the California African American Museum; the Anacostia Museum of African American History; the Reginal Lewis Museum; and at Bethune Cookman University and Peabody Auditorium, both in Daytona Beach.

Happy new year: opportunities abound

As many of my regular column readers will remember, one thing I harp on quite often are the economics of opportunity.

A frequent theme in 2018 was how the hot Volusia County economy and growing population was creating a lot of business opportunities in all kinds of services. You can expect that trend to continue in 2019.

For example, One Daytona will continue to build out in 2019 and construction just started on the apartment complex there. Add that to the multitude of apartments in that area and you have a lot of young people who enjoy working out. So, the Gold's Gym folks in Ormond Beach decided to open a second one at the Shoppes at OneDaytona in the former Marshall's store building.

That's a big obvious one, but then the population and business growth also extends to small, less well-known areas. At Big Tree Plaza in South Daytona, Club Fitness is adding a juice bar. While that may not seem like much, for the owners of Club Fitness it's a great way to improve their fitness center for their

clients and to attract more clients.

There area a lot small, but important business developments every week in Volusia. The owner of Kenny's Liquors bought the former SunTrust Bank property at 111 North Causeway in New Smyrna Beach for \$880,000. Kid City USA wants to open a daycare at 1890 State Road 44 in New Smyrna Beach.

But it also adds to big ones, such as developers having the confidence to build a luxury community on an island in the Halifax River. Site work is beginning for Grand Isle, a river island subdivision off Wilder Boulevard in Daytona Beach. Construction is starting on a new headquarters building for Costa del Mar sunglasses at 2450 Mason Ave. (corner of Dunn Avenue) in Daytona Beach. Plans are underway for a 2,640-square-foot commercial office building on Lot 18 of the

Springview Center in DeBary.

Of course, it's not all gravy and biscuits for the county, you'll continue have some failures, such as the Sears closing at Volusia Mall and Pollo Tropical shutting down its shop on Dunlawton Avenue in Port Orange.

But, more often, we'll see developments like the orthopedic surgeons who own the East Coast Surgery Center buying about five acres from Consolidated-Tomoka Land Co. for \$935,000 to expand their medical campus on LPGA Boulevard, just east of Clyde Morris Boulevard in Daytona Beach.

The hot housing market continued into November. Realtors in the Volusia/Flagler area sold 894 houses in November, up 9.8 percent from November 2017. The median price, where half sold for more and half less, was at \$214,000, up 12.6 percent. Realtors sold 237 condos, up 11.8 percent, but the median price, at \$195,000, was up just .9 percent.

A couple of other commercial real estate deals to note include Harbor Oaks nursing home on Farmbrook Road, just off South Ridgewood Avenue in Port Orange selling for \$2 million. A Ponte Vedra investor bought the former SunTrust Bank building at 2300 S. Atlantic Ave. in Daytona Beach Shores for \$525,000.

On a final note, the state's minimum wage will be \$8.46 an hour as of Tuesday, up from \$8.25 an hour in 2018, according to the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity. It's hard to imagine that many people getting paid minimum wage in Volusia, but it is good news for those who do.

Every day is Chocolate Day

Every day is chocolate day except for Jan. 11, which is Bittersweet Chocolate Day.

So what's the big deal? Here's the big deal. Most people think milk chocolate is the only chocolate in town. The most popular chocolate in America is Hershey's and Ghirardelli's milk chocolate. There is a lot more chocolate that meets the tongue that doesn't have sugar and milk in it.

The Aztecs and the Mayans introduced us to bitter chocolate from the cacao bean in the 1400s. For more than 200 years, the Spanish kept chocolate a secret stored in church monasteries. The church supported a chocolate drink made from ground cacao beans whipped in water like the Aztecs. They felt it would help lessen the amount of wine consumed at that

time. It was made with no sugar or milk. That would come much, much later.

In 1600, the Italians added sugar and helped to distribute this chocolate throughout Europe. Finally, in the 1800s, a Dutch chemist came up with a process to make the chocolate less bitter and also cheaper to produce. This made it available to more people and it was called Dutch cocoa, which is used in baking today.

In 1875, a Swiss chocolatier, Daniel Peters, developed milk chocolate. His next door neighbor was a fellow named Heinrich Nestlé, who was working on developing

condensed milk to help as a baby formula to feed babies. Peters used Nestlé's condensed milk and milk chocolate was born as well as the largest food and beverage company in the world, Nestlé.

Chocolate reached England during the late 1800s, and it was touched again by Lindt, Cadbury and a gentleman named Milton Hershey.

Chocolate has a long and interesting history, dating from the Aztec and Mayans to the modern day Hershey's Kisses. What amazes me is the fact chocolate was introduced as a bitter tasting drink that evolved into the world's number one dessert; sweet with a melt in your mouth goodness.

Today, there seems to be a trend for 60, 70, 80 and 90 percent cacao bitter chocolate. People are searching for the pure, bitter taste of chocolate

without sugar or milk. Maybe the Aztecs and Mayans had it right the first time. Here is their recipe. You might be surprised. If it is too bitter, add two teaspoons honey.

Mayan Chocolate Drink

- Ingredients**
- ½ cup cocoa powder
 - 2 medium size dried Chiles (1 tsp Chile powder)
 - ½ tsp cinnamon
 - 6-8 cups water
- Directions**
- Whip until foamy

The never-ending clean up job

Cleaning viruses has become an almost daily task.

Hardly a week goes by where I don't have to go head to head with yet another infected system and it seems like I hear the same questions just about every time. I thought I would gather some of the most common questions that I hear and (without getting too technical) try to answer them here.

First question; why do people take the time to create these things in the first place? Well, outright theft is one reason. The rogue antivirus epidemic that has been going on for some time now makes a first attempt right off the bat to trick the end user into giving up the credit card number with the false promise of fixing an infection that doesn't exist. Yet.

Some viruses forward SPAM at an exponential rate by using infected systems as relays and one of the most widespread viruses will actually conscript your machine into a vast "zombie" army called a "Bot-Net," which is controlled (along with millions of other infected machines) by a "Bot-Herder." The Bot-Herder can then use all of these machines at once to attack a corporate or government network, spread out power needed to crack passwords, harvest information for identity theft, mine bitcoin or other crypto currency and more.

Those are just a couple

reasons but one thing is clear, there is often a great deal of sophistication in many of these infections that isn't readily visible from the infected machine.

Some questions I hear often aren't really questions but more like assumption; "I don't open email attachments so I should be OK, right? And "I don't go to anyplace "unseemly" so I'm safe, right?"

It is true viruses still rely on email to replicate so it's good not to open attachments from people you don't know but if you are running a typical machine running typical software there are certain security exploits that viruses will look for if you are connected to the network. Also, you don't have to go anywhere unseemly to run into an infected advertisement. One strategy they use is to run a legitimate ad on a popular website and switch the ad out with infected code.

Just about every machine I clean has an antivirus program installed, so I hear this question all the time; "I have an up to date antivirus program installed? How did I get infected?"

Not all antivirus programs are up to the job. Popular programs like McAfee, Norton and others cost money for a

subscription, but rate very poorly on the protection level and often bring a computer to a halt by using up so many resources. Without hesitation, I remove these programs and replace them with a free antivirus that is light weight and effective.

Even AVG (which I had recommended for years) has become too bloated and now causes more problems than it fixes. I have 3 free antivirus alternatives I recommend - Microsoft's Security Essentials (also known as Windows Defender), Avast and Avira. All 3 are free, self maintaining and use very little resources - they won't slow your machine down.

The next thing to consider is that new viruses are released daily but it can often take an antivirus company several days to come up with a definition, leaving all of us vulnerable in the mean time. And, finally, how can I keep my system safe in the future?

Use an antivirus that works and make sure it is updating itself daily. Then, keep your operating system up to date as many security holes are patched in the updates. Don't load up on multiple security programs! More is not better; most security programs are bloated and they all expect to be the "final authority" on what goes on in a machine. They don't share that responsibility easily and often will conflict and "cancel each other out." One antivirus along with the operating system's built in firewall is fine.

And finally, beware of any message that pops up telling you that you have a problem and telling you to call a number to get it fixed. On the other end of the phone number is a talented con artist waiting for your call and the phone number is a dead giveaway - genuine error or security messages don't have a phone number! If there's an alarming message telling you to call a number to get it fixed, it's a scam.

Well, that's just a few of the questions I get asked all the time, I know there are more. I hope I answered them to your satisfaction. If you have more questions or need clarification on something, email me; I'll be happy to answer.

Bluefish: Beware of the piranhas of the sea

Recently I had a call from a reader who was complaining about the many breakoffs he endured while blue fishing in the surf.

As you may know, bluefish have a mouthful of small, but sharp teeth. Those teeth are so efficient the blues are called "choppers" for the way they grind up baitfish. No doubt they are apex predators and vicious. Mostly hunting in packs that can range from a few to thousands.

When I first arrived in Florida in the '60s, I stopped at the Panama City pier. Fresh out of Louisiana, I had never seen a blue fish, but I was impressed when a fellow reeled up a nice one. When I admired it, he gave it to me and as I left I lipped it by putting my fingers through its mouth as you might a largemouth bass. Within a few steps, the fish clamped down and the blood flew. That was my unfortunate introduction to bluefish.

A bit later I was driving south on A1A at Sebastian Inlet when I saw at least 50 anglers on the beach standing almost shoulder to shoulder. Each one had a five-gallon bucket of fish. Welcome to the annual bluefish run. After that, I would spend a lot of time fishing the surf at Ormond Beach as the water came alive with them.

The bluefish would average around 14 inches, but, on occasion, you could catch a real bruiser. Up at Matanzas Inlet I caught a six-pound one

from the bridge, and at Sebastian Inlet, I landed an eight-pounder from my boat.

Back then, I would give half of my catch to a fellow in Deland who would smoke them. Later, I would invest in my own smoker and I still use it 'til this day. Smoked bluefish and a cold beer are always a hit and the smoked fish dip they yield is a thing of beauty.

Now to address the fellow's problems about line breakage.

If you are in an area where there are bluefish, you must have a leader. Steel is preferred, but I like to use 30-pound test mono. Bait them with most anything for they are indiscriminate feeders. Mullet or cut bait is best, but they will hit shrimp, squid, ballyhoo and the like.

Once I caught 25 on an old beer can opener. Three friends and I were fishing two miles out in the Atlantic Ocean in my 19-foot Starcraft when we came upon a huge school of bluefish feeding on a half acre of minnows. We were casting spoons until we lost them all. The only thing I had left that was shiny was the beer opener, so I wired a treble hook in one end and went to work. We caught more than 200 that day.

At times I have caught them

off the sand with a diving plug. Usually when that happens, you can see the blues in the breaking waves.

From a pier, the best artificial is a Sea-hawk type lure. That heavy little pencil-shaped bait was invented right here in Daytona Beach and is an old favorite.

Aside from the surf, you can catch them in the rivers in certain spots. The channel between the island and the causeway on the northwest end of the big Dunlawton Bridge is a good spot and can be fished day or night.

Remember, the limit is 10 fish per day and the minimum

length is 12 inches measured from the nose to the tail fork. Bluefish are such willing participants you might want to get the kids out after them. If you find feeding bluefish,

you can't help but catch them. Just be sure not to put your fingers in their mouths.
