

Brevard schools earn 'A' grade

BREVARD COUNTY - One of the most significant factors in determining the autonomy of a person is education, and here in the United States, that starts with quality schooling from public insti-

This summer, Brevard Public Schools earned an 'A' grade for excellence in education, earning the district the No. 2 spot among Florida's 14 large districts.

"Improvement in our schools is always something to celebrate," BPS Superintendent Desmond Blackburn said in a statement. "When I consider the great diversity in our student population, the relatively new curriculum standards, and all of the many challenges faced, to be one of the top districts in the state is awesome."

BPS Assistant Superintendent and Public Information Officer Matthew Reed told Hometown News that BPS was judged on overall test scores and key subjects.

"Also learning games and test subjects improved, including how much we've improved with the 'bottom core-tile," Reed said.

BPS was also judged on 'middle school acceleration, or how many students were capable of handling high school and college courses.

Palm Bay to receive state funding for Bayfront restoration

The city of Palm Bay has announced that it has been awarded \$222,000 in State funding to be used for projects in Palm Bay's Bayfront.

The funding request, sponsored by State Senator Debbie Mayfield, will support efforts to repair and restore shoreline in the city's Bayfront area.

The primary goal of the project is to address the 2,000 linear feet of eroded harbor shoreline and near-shore sediment that was removed during Hurricane Matthew last year.

More Brevard students pass state English, math tests

More students in Brevard Public Schools earned satisfactory scores on state exams in critical subjects including third-grade reading and high school algebra and English in 2017.

The percentage of Brevard students

who earned satisfactory scores on the English language arts portion of the Florida Standards Assessment improved at all grade levels, especially in grades 3-5, according to recent data.

In the early grades – where reading proficiency is considered key to future academic success – passing rates increased by four percentage points, from 57 percent to 61 percent. In ninth and 10th grade, passing rates on the required state English exam increased from 58 percent to 60 percent.

In math, the percentage of students who passed the FSA algebra 1 exam increased from 61 percent last year to 64 percent in 2017.

In Florida, students must pass the Algebra 1 exam and 10th-grade English language arts tests to graduate.

Free screenings check for diabetes, kidney disease

COCOA BEACH - Are you uninsured or have you been thinking about getting your annual doctor's visit in sometime soon? Look no further than a free health screening provided by professionals as part of the National Kidney Foundation of Florida's "Keep Healthy" program.

This free screening is from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturday, July 15, at Club Zion in Cocoa Beach.

The screening will aid in the prevention and early diagnosis of diabetes and kidney failure through blood pressure and blood sugar screenings, as well as through body mass index (BMI) screenings.

For those participants who shows signs of high risk for diabetes or kidney disease, further advanced testing is available at no cost. This includes a urine analysis, which looks for protein in the urine and is one of the early signs of kidney disease.

If a participant's blood sugar level is ele-

vated, despite coming in to the test from fasting, they will proceed with an A1C test, which is similar to the blood sugar test but shows a three-month average reading of blood sugar levels.

The Lion's Club will provide a retina test for those showing signs of high risk.

'The retina screening is something new we're doing," said Bill Hahn, patient advocate as a diabetic and kidney transplant recipient. "If somebody does have a high A1C they would move to a visual acuity test, which is a basic eye chart reading. If there is something wrong with the vision in that regard, they'll also have a blood pressure indication, and then they'll move on to a retinal scan."

As someone who had been diagnosed with diabetes at age 26 and had underwent a kidney transplant many years later due to kidney failure, Mr. Hahn explained that he has seen big advancements toward screenings and technology.

One such advancement in technology that Mr. Hahn told Hometown News about



is a wearable artificial kidney that has recently been approved by the FDA.

"For diabetics and testing for diabetes, the insulin pump is something they've been using for a number of years and that is the closest thing to simulating the work of a pancreas," Mr. Hahn said. "Now, the newer systems combine the use of an insulin pump, which you program. It gives you much more freedom and it also gives you insulin around your meals."

It also includes a built-in monitoring system that will show the user their blood sugar level reading every half-hour on their smartphone, Mr. Hahn added.

"The implantable kidney is not some-

thing that is just good for people who can't find a match or are unable to get a match," Mr. Hahn said. "When someone has kidney failure, they're on dialysis for three days a week, anywhere from three to five hours, so they're maybe getting nine hours of their kidneys' functioning as opposed to 24/7. That's a huge difference."

Mr. Hahn said that he recommends anyone to take the opportunity of the free health screening. Those who have high blood pressure or family history of kidney failure, diabetes or heart disease are also encourage to take an hour out of their day for a free screening.

"We really want people to come out and take advantage of these screenings to make sure they don't have any issues," Mr. Hahn said. "It is treatable and early detection can save you a lot of heartache and give you a better quality, and longer, life."

Palm Bay Police partner with Back 2 School Festival to promote pedestrian and bicycle safety: The City of Palm Bay Police and Fire Departments are joining CenterPointe Church in kicking off the 2017-18 school year on a high note at the Back 2 School Event to be held from 8-11 a.m. Saturday, July 15, or while supplies last.

The Palm Bay Police Department will focus on pedestrian and bicycle safety at this year's event, hosting a "Bike Rodeo" for attendees. Officers, VCOPS, and citizens, who are trained in fitting helmets, will hand out more than 200 helmets to children who participate in the bicycle rodeo.

The helmets and bike/pedestrian safety information materials were supplied through the Space Coast Transportation Planning Organization's "Alert Today

his is a fair question, one that should be better explained to the readership at large. Since there are many books written on the subject, I will confine my comments to a discussion of what we generally perceive of as nonprofits.

Here I mean those organizations in Brevard County that address basic needs, such as housing for the homeless, care of the frail and elderly, feeding the hungry, etc.

Numerous organizations meet the criteria for being designated as a nonprofit. Unfortunately, some of these are self-serving organizations that pass themselves off as being necessary providers to those in need when, in fact, they are primarily money-making machines.

The purpose of my column is to help the generous and giving citizens in Brevard be better informed about where their money goes and how it is used to assist others.

There are many worthwhile causes that seek our support. Generally speaking, I will not donate to any cause that has a profit-making phone-calling

service seeking the donation.

There are many views on what constitutes a "fair" up-front cost to solicit your donation, but in my book any such cost turns me off.

Years ago when I was the alumni director at Florida Tech, I used students to solicit donations from graduates. They were fed pizza, made calls, told the person why they were calling and did a good job obtaining funds for alumni programs.

One way to establish the "worthiness" of a soliciting organization is to look up its IRS Form 990 online, which will give you its actual revenues and expenses. If you determine that salaries, medical and retirement benefits and building operational costs are in the 50-percent range, you may not want to donate to it.

I used to have to travel in town, back and forth, to work when school buses were on the road, and I used to get very annoyed with their drivers, just like semis on I-95. I like the middle lane, they are normally in the right lane, and it's nerve-wracking every time there's an on ramp because if there are cars, the semi "zips" over in front of me, and cuts me off, since no one seems to know how to merge anymore, everyone seems to think we, on the main road, have to move out of their way. What's that yield sign for? You have to really be a defensive driver these days.

Response to 'Brighthouse/ Spectrum'

I agree with the writer of the Brighthouse/Spectrum rant. Our service has declined, the equipment, especially the remotes, are inferior and cheap and our prices have skyrocketed.

They are giving super deals to pull in new customers; yet, all of us long-time customers get higher prices to subsidize these newer customers.

When they installed my rotor for my internet, they put it on one end of our house, so that we can barely get WiFi on our back porch. When I called them up about it, it's of course not their problem. They told me it's a \$50 charge to come out and see what they can do, plus whatever it costs to do it in excess of that \$50. We need a new, better cable company here to give them some competition.

Artists up to the challenge?

I've attended art festivals but seldom find anything worth buying. So, I have a few suggestions if there are any enterprising artists up to the challenge.

First, paint portraits or profiles of kids, grandkids and adults. Work from a digital photo if necessary. Use paint, pencil or charcoal. Make it inexpensive and quick. Personal art like this is kept forever.

Second, make an American flag, using material that won't fray and fade within a year of flying in our harsh weather. There is nothing on the market today.

Lastly, instead of a flag made of material, paint an American flag or other images on garage doors, driveways or interior walls using large, custom-made stencils. Multiple stencils may be needed per image per color. Hold the stencil in place with Velcro at the corners. Make your own images or purchase copyrighted ones to sell. Godspeed!

You can also determine how many organizations provide similar type services to identify those known to you and worthy of your support.

Like you, I receive calls from all over the United States and some foreign countries and make it a point to give only to a charity I know.

There are ways for you to determine the worthiness of almost any soliciting organization. You can certainly ask your friends, for many have already done the research I mention above. Why give to an organization that does not answer the required questions on its IRS 990, or that demonstrates poor leadership through mismanagement of already scarce funds, or that does not provide the service for which it is funded? Most importantly, as funding becomes more stringent, are its services really needed?

Helping Seniors did a county-wide survey in 2014 and found that the two biggest senior needs were for information and financial support. "Do we need nonprofits?" is a significant question for seniors. We have some of the best nonprofit adult day care organizations in Brevard, but only a few receive United Way or county assistance.

Perhaps it is time for the Housing and Human Services Department to conduct its own survey to determine the actual needs of Brevard's elderly and the capability of the nonprofit community to serve them.

Without timely surveys to determine actual need, how do the county commissioners and United Way determine funding priorities? Both county and United Way dollars come from the private sector, so this is a valid request. The need for advocacy and information has been demonstrated in many ways. We do need nonprofits, and we do need to find ways to financially support them

Florida Tech to offer marine conservation degree

BREVARD COUNTY – In recent times, there have been a number of programs that support the research and conservation of the environment, but the ecosystems and the animals that live within it are just as important— and just as fragile.

That's why Florida Institute of Technology will offer a Bachelor of Science degree in Marine Conservation beginning this fall term.

Dr. Mark Bush, chair of the Conservation Biology and Ecology Program in the Department of Biological Sciences, told Hometown News about the new program, including hands-on techniques that students will experience.

"The new way marine conservation has been going is very tech-oriented," Dr. Bush said. "Understanding chemistry and applying it in the real world, understanding statistics and [its applications] in the real world, ecological modeling, and things like Geographic Information Systems (GIS) and non-traditional mapping techniques are really important.

"Any and all of these will get students a

job at the end of [the program]," Dr. Bush continued. "And that's really our goal here: to produce someone who's not how we sort off traditionally in marine conservation — someone who'd go out and recognize a dolphin by its fin.

"Rather, we're looking for someone who really is quantitative, and technology-oriented, so they can fit into the modern workplace."

The program offers a unique opportunity for students seeking a degree in marine conservation and marine biology, which is Florida Tech's location.

Because the degree is offered in Florida, there is an advantage for marine biology and conservation students, as their field work is not limited to the summer months, where it is too cold to be in the water in northern states.

Brevard County's Indian River Lagoon offers unique fieldwork for students, Dr. Bush said.

"We've got a lot of work of course in the Indian River Lagoon restoration programs going on," Dr. Bush said. "People are involved with surveying fish, fish recruitment are out there doing seagrass surveys, looking at oysters and clam

recruitment, and all these other indicators of how the lagoon is doing.

"Certainly our students will be eligible to take part in any aspect of [the lagoon research] according to their interest."

The undergraduate program is the first to be offered as an undergraduate degree

instead of a postgraduate degree, Dr. Bush said.

Model trains chug into Cocoa library

COCOA – Model trains have captivated and delighted people for many years and for some, collecting trains have become a passion.

For those who still enjoy conducting and watching model trains, the Catherine Schweinsberg Rood Central Library in Cocoa will be hosting a free event centered around model trains from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Saturday, July 22.

"Trains, Trains, Trains" is returning for its ninth year at the library, and this popular event has lately outgrown its original set up.

Visitors can see a model of the Florida East Coast Railway, a regional railroad that runs from Jacksonville to Miami. The model takes up about 50-by-50-feet, and it takes 10 minutes to watch one train to cross the layout of the model.

"The FEC Railway is about a 351-mile run," said Gregg Stoll, member of the Florida East Coast Railway Society. "Our modules each represent a small piece of that railroad, and so when we put it all together it's almost like you're running up and down the east coast of Florida."

With the latest advancements made in technology, visitors can see how the trains will be run wirelessly from a command center

"We don't get to set up our layout that often because we need a large space," Mr. Stoll said. "We're able to set up about 2/3 of our layout in the main library room. It also gives us an opportunity to open it to the public."

One feature of this event is the Junior Engineer program, which allows kids to come in and run trains. Participants will receive a memento to say they became a certified junior engineer.

Narrator "Caboose Mikey," who will be dressed up in a conductor's uniform, will describe the model train set operations.

Jerry Groothouse will be the guest speaker, and he will have a presentation on moving historic railroad equipment and its preservation at noon.

When a railroad museum in Fort Pierce closed down, the FEC Railroad steam locomotive, steam crane and cars needed to be moved. Mr. Groothouse helped move them to the U.S. Sugar Railroad near Lake Okeechobee.

"We have videos, photographs and all kinds of stuff from that move," Mr. Groot-

house said. "A lot of people are asking us about how we did it, how it was moved, what it took to move it. It doesn't happen every day. It's kind of a rare event, so we decided to share this presentation on saving and moving that equipment."

Mr. Groothouse will also do appraisals of visitor's model trains and memorabilia, and said he encourages people to bring them in.

"We really look forward to the people coming in and enjoying what we present," Mr. Groothouse told Hometown News. "They're so interested in the history of trains and the FEC Railway. We get a kick out of it."

The central library is at 308 Forest Ave., Cocoa.

Brevard school board speeds security improvements to all campuses

Brevard Public Schools will move faster to keep students and staff safe by installing voter-approved security fencing, video cameras and remote-controlled entrance locks at all schools by spring 2018. The security measures will restrict entry to a single, controlled access point at each school while durable emergency gates and doors with "crash bars" allow students and staff to

escape, if necessary.

The \$2.6 million increase for the accelerated work will not affect the funding or pace of other, bigger projects to replace decaying school roofs, wiring, pipes and air-conditioning systems with proceeds from a voter-approved halfcent sales surtax. A series of such projects is underway at 21 schools across the Space Coast this summer.





Diabetes program comes to Brevard

BREVARD COUNTY – According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, in 2016 type-2 diabetes accounted for "about 90 percent to 95 percent of all diagnosed cases of diabetes," and that type-2 diabetes is avoidable through the support of programs such as the National Diabetes Prevention Program.

Here in Brevard, one such program is called the Diabetes Self-Management Program, renamed as the Living Healthy with Diabetes program. The workshop is a 2 1/2-hour class to support people with type-2 diabetes that meets once a week for

six weeks

The class is hosted at One Senior Place, 8085 Spyglass Hill Road in Viera and runs from 2:30-5 p.m. on Wednesdays from Sept. 13 through Oct. 18.

The class is sponsored by the Florida Department of Elder Affairs, said Paula Schroeder, Communications Manager of the Brevard Senior Nutrition Program. "[As well as] the Senior Resource Alliance. Aging Matters in Brevard is the leading senior agency in Brevard County, and we're contracted with them to provide the [Living Healthy with Diabetes] programs," Ms Schroeder said.

Ms. Schroeder told Hometown News

that the workshop is for people age 60 or over with type-2 diabetes.

"Type-2 diabetes is the kind that people tend to develop over a lifetime of habits," Ms. Schroder explained. "{Whether it is through] eating habits, or a sedentary lifestyle — it's the type of diabetes that is exploding across the country."

The program originally began at Stanford University 20 years ago and designed for and by Stanford researchers, but has since been put into use throughout the United States. The upcoming workshops beginning this August will be the first Diabetes Self-Management Program to be run in Brevard County.

"We all know that it's what we do every day that is going to make a difference in our health, as opposed to every time we go see the doctor," Ms. Schroeder said. "That might be a couple times a year, or once every three months or so... We need to hold ourselves accountable for the choices that we make, and that's really what the class is all about."

Street and stormwater pond projects finalized

The city of Cocoa, with assistance and guidance from the Space Coast Transportation and Planning Organization and the Florida Department of Transportation, began construction on Florida Avenue in late 2016 to transform the road, located in the heart of Cocoa Village, into a "Complete Street." A "Complete Street" ensures that the entire right-of-way is routinely designed and operated to enable safe access for all users - pedestrians, bicyclists, motorists and transit riders.

Along with the complete street project, the city of Cocoa constructed a

stormwater pond near the AT&T building, just south of Cocoa City Hall along Florida Avenue. This project, which was constructed on the site of a surface parking lot and former refrigeration plant, was partially funded by the Cocoa Stormwater fund, the St. John's Water Management District and the county's Save Our Indian River Lagoon program and helps with stormwater runoff in a historic community that has less acreage of available pervious land. Parts of the old refrigeration plant were maintained and used as walls for the pond.

The \$3.4 million Florida Avenue project was finalized on June 9 with a ribbon cutting ceremony on June 13 and See NOTES, page 21



Why is my computer so slow?

It's no secret; people want their machines to run fast. That's why people who know very little about computers will spend so much money making sure they have the most ram and the latest processor with all the bells and whistles. Even though they have only a vague idea of how any of these parts work, people know that in the world of technology, more equals faster.

These same people get their machines home and then hook them up to the fastest internet connection they can afford and then set about to check their email, do their banking, go onto Facebook etc. – you know, the typical things the average computer users do with their machines – then, they're shocked when they still find they have to wait for stuff to load.

Why is that? Why is it that you can spend an enormous amount of money making sure you have the latest and greatest hardware and fastest internet connection and yet, some things you click on take so long to load it looks like the computer's frozen? I get asked this question frequently, here's one way I try to answer.

Now imagine it's Monday morning at about 8 a.m. and you hop in the car and peel out onto the on-ramp on the way to run some errands and all is well, here's your exit coming up lickity-split but what's this? You turn off the off ramp and run into a traffic light and have to come to a complete stop! And it's like this all across town! You creep along from one red light to the next along with all the other people out there trying to run their own errands and by the end of the day you realize your new Ferrari didn't save you any time at all! You also find out very quickly that even though the speedometer goes up past 200, if you try to go that fast you'll lose control and crash. With the car analogy it's easy to see what the issue is and I don't think anyone

would bring their Ferrari back to the shop and complain "you sold me a lemon; this thing is supposed to go 200 Mph and on the way over here I couldn't get it up past 50!" I think they'd laugh you out of the dealership.

But as a computer support specialist, I hear similar complaints every single day. It's 2017. Computer hardware is so incredibly advanced that even the cheapest, entry level computer is running at "Ferrari speeds." And with most internet providers offering high speed connections right to the home, it's like having a house right on the on-ramp. The on-ramp to the "information superhighway."

The delay comes from the fact that so many of the things we use our computers for are dependent on that internet connection. Email, Facebook, online banking, all of that is dependent upon getting through traffic and (just like in our driving example) it's a two way street – you're going both ways! When you click something like email, your computer sends a message out through the internet to your mail server's address with a request for the latest mail. Then, it has to make it back to your machine through that same traffic with whatever was in



your inbox. Kind of like driving to your post office and then back home with the mail; it's anything but instant.

The other half of the problem comes from the fact that people believe more equals faster when it comes to computers. They think that just because the machine was so expensive and loaded with the latest technology, there shouldn't be any delay at all. That causes people to click and then after waiting for just a breath or two declare "this thing isn't working!" No, it's working fine! You just need to be patient and wait.

No tuition hike at EFSC for sixth straight year

Students at Eastern Florida State College received very good news recently. There will be no tuition hike for the sixth straight year as college officials continue their commitment to keep higher education affordable.

The provision is a main feature in Eastern Florida's new 2017-18 fiscal year budget, which the college's Board of Trustees unanimously approved at a Monday meeting.

The \$76 million plan goes into effect July 1.

Key elements of the budget include:

- No tuition increase for the sixth straight year, a period that corresponds with the time that Dr. Jim Richey has been Eastern Florida's president.
- A 2.5 percent base pay increase for members of the United Faculty of Florida Brevard Chapter in the third year of a three-year collective bargaining agreement.
- The College expects to incur a significant mid-year cost increase for health and dental insurance, and will continue to provide those benefits to its full-time employees at no added contribution from them.
- An investment of \$18 million in projects, including the start of construction of a new Student Union on the Melbourne campus, and improvements to classrooms, technology, security and parking.



Commissioner again lowers fees for concealed weapon license applications, renewals

Florida Commissioner of Agriculture Adam H. Putnam has announced that the fee to apply for or renew a concealed weapon license was reduced by \$5 as of Saturday, July 1.

Commissioner Putnam worked with the Florida Legislature to save Florida consumers \$5 on application fees, down from \$60 to \$55, and renewal fees, down from \$50 to \$45. Active law enforcement officers, correctional officers and correctional probation officers can now obtain a new license for \$55 and renew their licenses for \$45.

"I'm a proud supporter of the Second Amendment and am dedicated to making our concealed weapon license application and renewal process as convenient as possible," Commissioner Putnam said. "By reducing the concealed weapon license fee yet again, we can put the savings back in the pockets of Floridians."

This is the third time the commissioner has lowered concealed weapon license fees within the last five years, which has saved individuals \$20 when applying for or renewing a Florida concealed weapon license. Concealed weapon licenses are valid for seven years.

First-time applicants are required to provide fingerprints to the department to complete a background check. Initial licenses typically cost \$97, which

includes the fingerprint processing fee. Tax collectors are authorized to charge a convenience fee when applying for or renewing licenses at a local tax collector's office of \$22 and \$12, respectively.

In 2014, Commissioner Putnam helped develop a first-of-its-kind partnership that authorized tax collectors' offices to take fingerprints, photographs and accept applications on behalf of the department. Applications are still processed by the department.

Within the last year, the department has received nearly 450,000 concealed weapon applications, of which 120,000 have been received via tax collectors' offices.

Additionally, in July 2015, Commissioner Putnam announced that the

department is expediting concealed weapon license applications for all active military members and veterans. To date, nearly 81,000 active military members and veterans have received expedited concealed weapon licenses.

License holders can apply for or renew a concealed weapons license via mail, at 44 Tax Collectors' offices across the state or at one of the department's eight regional offices in the following locations: Doral, Fort Walton, Jacksonville, North Port, Orlando, Tallahassee, Tampa and West Palm Beach. Licenses can also be renewed online.

All 80 participants were honored with certificates and had their photo taken with the camp's lead instructor Roosevelt Jackson.



hen you win The Open Championship, you become "Champion Golfer of the Year" and your name is engraved on The Golf Champion Trophy, or as it is more commonly known, The Claret Jug.

The Open Championship, or as we Yanks call it, The British Open, is our sport's oldest championship. The Claret Jug is probably our most recognizable and desired trophy. However, when the first Championship took place in 1860 at Prestwick, this wonderful trophy wasn't even in the back of anvone's mind.

The original prize was the Challenge Belt. Made of Moroccan leather and embellished with a silver buckle and emblems, it looked very much like something you would see worn by a huge, muscle-bound guy on a televised wrestling match instead of a golf championship.

The Earl of Eglinton, who was key in setting up The Open Championship, came up with the idea of a belt to christen the winner of golf's championship. Since he had a keen interest in medieval pageantry, the belt made perfect sense to him. He sold the original Challenge Belt to the members of Prestwick Golf Club, hosts of the first Open.

The very first rule of the new competition was, "The party winning the belt shall always leave the belt with the treasurer of the club until he produces a guarantee to the satisfaction of the above committee that the belt shall be safely kept and laid on the table at the next meeting to compete for it until it becomes the property of the winner by being won three times in succession."

Apparently the club thought that the likelihood of anyone winning three successive championships and keeping the belt, thus leaving them with no real trophy for the winner, were pretty slim.

It didn't take long for them to realize their folly. In 1870, just 10 years after The Open Championship began, Tom Morris Junior won his third consecutive Open and became owner of the belt.

In 1871, St. Andrews, Musselburgh and other clubs wished to join in hosting The Open and it was discussed that they should all chip in for the purchase of a new belt. No final decision was made and with four or more clubs planning to host The Open it was decided by the members of Prestwick that it was not expedient for them to provide a belt to be played for solely at their club. The resulting debate meant that there was no Open Championship in 1871.

The following year The Royal and Ancient Golf Club's green committee decided to get together with the other clubs and revive the Championship with a view on also reviving the Championship Belt. They were authorized to contribute a sum not exceeding £15 toward the belt.

On September 11, 1872, an agreement was finally reached between the three clubs that were to host The Open - Prestwick,

the Honourable Company of Edinburgh Golfers and The Royal and Ancient Golf Club. They decided that the winner would receive a medal and that each of the three clubs would contribute £10 toward the cost of a new trophy, which would be a silver claret jug. Instead of another belt, The Open Champion would now hoist proper trophy. Its name was to be "The Golf Champion Trophy".

Unfortunately, these decisions came too late for the trophy to be presented to the 1872 Open Champion, who was once again Tom Morris Junior. Instead, he was awarded the first Gold Medal with the inscription "The Golf Champion Trophy".

What is now referred to as the Claret Jug was made by MacKay Cunningham & Company of Edingurgh and was hallmarked 1873. The first Open Champion to hoist the new trophy was the 1873 winner, Tom Kidd. However, Tm Morris Junior's name was the first to be engraved on it as the 1872 winner.

In 1920 all responsibility for The Open Championship was handed over to the Royal and Ancient Golf Club. Following the 1927 Open, which was won at St. Andrews by Bobby Jones, the club's Championship Committee made the decision to retain the Claret Jug and in future years present the winner with a replica.



Unlike the Claret Jug, which must be returned in time for the next Championship, the Gold Medal is kept by the winner. The early medals were in fact silver gilt with an oval design showing crossed clubs and a shield with "Golf Champion Trophy" inscribed around the edge.

During the late 1880s and 1890s the medal underwent several changes. In 1893 the basic size and shape became the circular design we see to this day. Up until 1929, the value of the medal, £10 until 1919 and £25 thereafter, was deducted from the winner's purse. Since 1930, no winner has had to "pay" for his medal. Somehow, I doubt today's winner would mind.
