

# **Port** reports record breaking year

PORT CANAVERAL - Port Canavannounced record-breaking results from all operations, and new marks for its business lines of cruise and cargo.

In its year-end financial reports provided to the Canaveral Port Authority Board of Commissioners at its regular monthly meeting on Oct. 30, John Murray, Port Chief Executive Officer and Mike Poole, Chief Financial Officer, reported that the Port earned \$103.75 million in total revenue for the 2018 fiscal year.

"This is more than double the Port's Fiscal Year 2008 revenues of \$47.4 million and represents an exceptional return on cruise and other capital investments," said Port Commission Secretary/Treasurer, Tom Weinberg.

The Port's 2018 fiscal year operating revenues reached \$101.72M with over \$10M in cargo revenues earned. It marks the first time in the Port's history and an all-time high for multi-day cruise ship passengers. The figures report \$8.44M above last year's reported revenues of \$93.28M and a 120-percent jump from its 2008 fiscal year,

In addition to the multitude of vendors, the expo will provide free refreshments and entertainment throughout the day.

"We want them to come and find out about everything that is available to them because they've earned it," Ms. Verruso said. "Come take advantage of the care you deserve."



# Babcock reconstruction begins Nov. 5

The final phase of a project to rebuild and repave Babcock Street between Hibiscus Boulevard and the Florida East Coast Railway will begin on Nov. 5. The full rebuilding and resurfacing process is expected to be completed in early 2019. Specific road closures will be posted on the City of Melbourne website as they are scheduled.

The project to rehabilitate Babcock Street began with work to replace a water main underneath the roadway that was more than 60 years old. Other recently completed infrastructure work included needed repairs to the stormwater drainage system, as well as improvements to curbs, medians and crosswalks.

The City's roadway restoration contractor, Asphalt Paving Systems, and the City's asphalt contractor, VA Paving Inc., will reconstruct and resurface the roadway using a process called "full depth reclamation," which involves pulverizing the existing asphalt and mixing it with cement to provide a strong and stable base on which asphalt is laid. Full depth reclamation is more cost effective and takes significantly less time than traditional roadway reconstruction.

The Babcock Street reconstruction project was made possible by an agreement between the City of Melbourne, Brevard County and the Babcock Street Community Redevelopment Agency. This agreement has enabled the section of Babcock Street from Hibiscus Boulevard to the railroad tracks to be transferred to the City of Melbourne for the reconstruction project and ongoing maintenance of the roadway.

"We are always recruiting and looking for our future officers and we hope this program will benefit the police department as well as the students."

Planning and development for the Pirates2Police program began in the summer of 2018, when a number of officers, led by Sergeant Spears, met with PBMHS Principal Jud Kaminski and other staff to design a program that will allow students to receive in-depth exposure to the law enforcement field, build relationships with local officers, and create future opportunities for agencies to recruit within the community.





# **Brevard Schools make voting priority**

BREVARD COUNTY - Brevard Public Schools made it easier for their employees to cast their ballots and help more students become voters.

The district allowed all BPS faculty and staff leave their schools at the same time students depart on Tuesday, Nov. 6, allowing employees time to drive to local polling places and cast their ballots.

"The outcome of elections has an impact on public education, our employees, our students and our communities. For this reason, we are urging all of you to take the necessary steps to prepare to vote," said Mark Mullins, BPS Superintendent in a joint letter with leaders from the Brevard Federation of Teachers, IUPAT Local 1010 and the Brevard Association of School Administrators.

In addition, throughout the month of October, BPS schools partnered with the Brevard County Supervisor of Elections in a nonpartisan effort to register and preregister students to vote. Principals organized registration tables and activities at various high schools. Every BPS student who was at least 18, but not yet listed on the voter rolls, received a postcard at

school with information on how to register.

As of the Oct. 9 registration deadline, those efforts had contributed to an "impressive" 1,357 students ages 16-19 either per-registering or registering to vote, the Supervisor of Elections office reported. Of those, 580 eligible high school students (ages 18 or 19) registered to vote in this year's election, a 34 percent increase compared to the 2016 presidential election year.

BPS has not endorsed any candidates or positions, but believes people who work in and attend Brevard schools should have a voice on the issues. Three school-board positions are up for election including two open seats, as are several seats for state senator and representative – positions that control school taxes and funding.

"As public school employees, we can have a huge impact in our schools by setting an example that others can emulate, especially our students," Mr. Mullins said. "Wear your 'I Voted' sticker proudly to school. Our right to vote is a privilege and responsibility."

Consider this if you hear charter schools being disparaged by a public school teacher; public school teachers whose unions contribute heavily to political campaigns.

Governor Andrew Cuomo made this point best in 2015 when replying to a member of a teachers union who claimed he represented students.

"No, you don't. You represent the teachers. Teacher salaries, teacher pensions, teacher tenure, teacher vacation rights. I respect that. But don't say you represent the students," Governor Cuomo said.

He continued.

"If [the public] understood what was happening with education to their children, there would be an outrage in this city. I'm telling you, they would take City Hall down brick by brick. It's only because it's complicated that people don't get it," Governor Cuomo said.

# New historic Brevard ornament released

BREVARD COUNTY — Ornaments can be more than something sparkly to hang on a Christmas tree. To some, ornaments reflect memories of years gone by or places that hold a special meaning.

Each year, the Zonta Club of Melbourne releases a new Historic Brevard Ornament as part of its collection of popular landmarks.

The 2018 ornament captures Sams House in Merritt Island, known as the oldest building in Brevard. The single story home was constructed in 1875 in Eau Gallie by John H. Sams. The family later decided to move to North Merritt Island, and the house was rafted up the Indian River in 1878.

By 1888, a second two-story home was constructed adjoining the first building. Mr. Sams served as Superintendent of Schools for the county from 1880-1920 and his descendants occupied the homes until 1995.

Proceeds raised from the ornament collection help to support the Zonta Club of Melbourne's administrative costs, scholarship funds and community projects.

"What we're finding is parents here and children have moved away, and they're buying them for their kids as Christmas gifts for memories of where they were and things they did as family events," said Donna Melcher, president of the Zonta Club of Melbourne.

Past ornaments have included Ashley's of Rockledge, Green Gable, Del's Freeze, the 1900 building, Henegar Center and the Strawberry Mansion.

"Sandy Michelson [past co-president of Zonta Club of Melbourne] started this since 1999, and she said she never expected this fundraising to continue," Ms. Melcher said. "We're going to have to be challenged and see what else is still out there and continue our collection."

The Zonta Club of Melbourne is a non-

profit organization and is part of a larger, international organization, which aims to educate the public about human trafficking— something Brevard County is not immune to.

According to Ms. Melcher, Zonta Club of Melbourne members volunteer at the Sue M. Pridmore Center for Women and Children by providing cooking, cleaning classes and financial aid classes, and any needs the women and children in the shelter might have.

The Zonta Club of Melbourne is preparing for next year's big event- the 2019 Chocolate Festival, which is scheduled for Sunday, March 3 at the Melbourne Auditorium, 625 E. Hibiscus Blvd.

# Does my new computer have enough RAM?

ne of the questions that I am asked frequently by people who are looking to buy a new computer is whether the machine they are looking at has enough RAM. Usually I ask them what they are planning on using the machine for and how much memory the machine has.

It's very common today to hear things like "well it only has 4 gigabytes of memory and all I'm planning on doing with it is email and surfing the web. Will 4 gigs be enough?" Or, "I don't use the machine for much, I just mainly use it for email and Quicken. Quicken is very important to me and I want to make sure my new machine is going to be able to run it OK. Are you sure that just 4 gigabytes is going to be able to do the job?"

And, "the ad says this machine can take up to 16 gigabytes. Maybe I should get sixteen just to be safe. What do you think?"

It's at that point I usually have to stifle a chuckle because I can remember, not too long ago, when just the idea of having just one gigabyte of memory in your home

computer was the stuff of science fiction. I can even remember writing a column in 1996 explaining to readers how they should be able to run their machines with just 16 megabytes of memory. (Just to put that in perspective, 1,000 megabytes equals 1 gigabyte).

Again, don't get me wrong, I'm not saying you can run one of today's machines with only 16 mb; you certainly do need considerably more than that to run Windows but even with a fancy operating system such as Windows 10, the basic tasks haven't changed much and 4 gigs of memory will be just fine to check email, surf the web and run Quicken.

Another way to put the whole memory

question into perspective is to think of it in terms of money.

Back around 1996, when Windows was still in its infancy, RAM was very expensive. At the time that I wrote that previous column saying 16 mb was enough, RAM was going for about \$50 per megabyte, meaning that the 16 mb I was advocating cost about \$800. So that means a gigabyte (1,000 megabytes) back then would have cost about \$50,000!

Another factor that I consider is the level of machine that they are replacing. Very often, I will speak to someone who is replacing an old system (maybe an old Windows Vista machine with 2 gigabytes or ram or something) and they wonder if 4 gigabytes will work for them on the new machine. Doesn't it stand to reason that if you were able to surf the Web, check your email and run Quicken on the machine you are replacing, then a new machine, with double the memory, shouldn't have a problem handling those same tasks?

Today, the tasks haven't changed. It's still

email, the Web and yeah, maybe some critical program such as Quicken or something, but whenever I hear people pondering whether 4 gigabytes will do it for them I can't help but hear that little "grampa voice" in the back of my head saying, "back in my day we couldn't afford a gigabyte. We got by with 16 megs and we liked it!"

Back in 1996, I don't think I could have ever imagined being able to get a gigabyte of RAM, let alone pay less than \$100 for it. The whole thing makes me wonder what things will be like a decade or so in the future.

In 10 years will we have people wondering if 1 terabyte (1,000 gigabytes) will be enough or if maybe they should spring for two? Regardless, I'm sure they will probably still only use their machine for checking email, surfing the Web and running Quicken.

# **Community Foundation funds Florida Tech**

BREVARD COUNTY — The Community Foundation for Brevard awarded the Florida Institute of Technology researchers nearly \$80,000 under the Medical Research Grant to Find Cause and/or Cure for Alzheimer's, Cancer, and Other Pervasive Diseases initiative. The program is funded from the Kenneth R. Finken and Dorothy Hallam Finken Endowment Fund based at the Community Foundation.

One grant, for \$40,000, will assist a trio of Florida Tech researchers in their efforts to develop new anti-cancer drugs. Eric Guisbert, Nasri Nesnas and Karen Kim Guisbert, in the department of Biomedical and Chemical Engineering and Sciences, have initiated a drug discovery program to inhibit heat-shock factor 1 protein expression.

"HSF1 is a protein that is important for cancer cell growth. Eighty percent of women with invasive breast cancer have abnormally high amounts of HSF1," said Dr. Eric Guisbert, associate professor. "Women that have breast cancer tumors with the highest levels of HSF1 have the worst outcomes with current therapies."

HSF1 is a key component of how normal cells respond to stress, but HSF1 accumulates in cancer patients and cancer cells become addicted to this protein. This makes cancer cells more sensitive to HSF1 inhibition than normal cells. This new strategy could help patients who do not respond well to current therapies.

"We have made a new discovery about how HSF1 is controlled. We then used this discovery as a basis to try to identify a new anticancer drug. Thus far, we have identified several lead compounds that can inhibit HSF1," Dr. Guisbert said. "Now, we are undertaking the next steps in the long road that we hope could eventually result in a lifesaving new therapy for breast cancer."

A second grant, for \$39,523, will assist Dr. Kunal Mitra, professor of biomedical engineering, in additional cancer research.

Cryotherapy, the freezing the cancerous tumors, and radiofrequency ablation, which uses radio waves to destroy the tumor, have been used to treat some cases of liver cancer but with varying degrees of success.

The ability to model such tumor micro-environments in vitro is an advantage to the study of tumor progression and chemotherapy drug development. An accurate representation of the tumor microenvironment will be achieved using a 3D cell culture model which will allow for investigating the optimal temperature range which will result in liver cancer cell death.

"The models for drug development and testing that have been predominantly used in the past have generally consisted of 2D cell culture limiting cell-cell inter-connectedness," Dr. Mitra said. "With 3D printed tissue that closely mimics the function of a real human liver, pharmaceutical companies can begin doing pilot studies right away, narrowing the field down to the most promising drugs well before they ever get to human clinical trials."

Dr. Guisbert added that this new research would not have been possible without the four-year support of the Community Foundation of Brevard.

"We would not have even tried to turn our basic science discovery into a drug discovery program without their support," Dr. Guisbert said.

Over the last 11 years, Florida Tech researchers have been awarded 17 individual medical research grants via the Community Foundation that have a combined value of nearly \$510,000.

"The Community Foundation for Brevard is proud of our ongoing partnership with Florida Tech and deeply honored to be stewards of the Finken family legacy, which enables researchers to pursue promising medical advances in pervasive disease research," said Theresa Grimison, president and CEO of the Community Foundation.

# **Riverside Chamber Orchestra to perform 'Bohemian Spirit' concert**

COCOA BEACH – On the afternoon of Nov. 11, the Riverside Chamber Orchestra will perform "Bohemian Spirit," a performance composed of some of the most popular works from Bohemia. The free concert is part of the 2018-19 season of the Dr. Vernon Boushell Concert Series and will feature a solo performance by saxophonist, Andrew Cleaver.

Bohemia is an artistically rich region in the Czech Republic and the birthplace of Czech Romantic-era composer Antonín Dvoˆrák whose work will be spotlighted during the concert.

"The three-chamber orchestra and chorus concert as part of the series are the most costly, and hopefully, most rewarding of our programs because they bring together fine local musicians to present music that is not commonly performed by larger performance organizations," said Richard Sabino, Riverside Chamber Orchestra conductor. "It has been a gift to our community to organize and develop the Riverside Chamber Orchestra and Chorus. Definitely, we need the generous support of our audience and of the community to continue these programs."

The concert will open with "Variations on a Theme of Tchaikovsky" for string orchestra by the Russian Romantic era composer, Anton Arensky who was influenced by Tchaikovsky.

His "Variations" are among his most popular compositions.

Andrew Cleaver will be the featured soloist for the "Concerto for Saxophone and String Orchestra" by Russian Composer, Alexander Glazunov.

Antonín Dvo^rák's "Serenade for Strings" will comprise the second half of the program. Composed in only 12 days, it remains one of

the composer's most frequently performed orchestral works.

Mr. Sabino stated that the chamber orchestra has 17 players as compared to a typical "symphony orchestra" and hence considers music that is written for strings alone or with a limited number of wind parts. Their selections are normally from the Baroque or Classical period but "Bohemian Spirit" has three pieces that were written in the Romantic period.

"Not many conductors are aware of the many unique and entertaining concerti written for saxophone, but Richard Sabino is an exception," said Mr. Cleaver. "We discussed various compositions for the saxophone over the last few years and he surprised me by suggesting Glazunov concerto. I wasn't sure if I was up for the challenge of such a difficult work, but when I heard it was on Veteran's Day and featured a chamber orchestra-as originally written-I couldn't pass it up."

Mr. Cleaver feels that "most of the notes are on his fingers" but he is still practicing the entire 15-minute piece start-to-finish twice daily.

"I don't think I ever practiced this much, even when I was performing full-time in the Air Force Band," Mr. Cleaver said.

An Air Force veteran, Mr. Cleaver enlisted

# Andrei's serves unforgettable dishes

MIMS — There's a hidden gem of a restaurant inside Indian River Preserve Golf Club that won't disappoint.

Andrei's Restaurant, located at 3950 Clubhouse Drive, Mims, is a casual fine dining experience with beautiful views of the Indian River Preserve golf course and food that can satisfy all taste buds.

The restaurant has been open for four years, with Executive Chef Graham Ellis preparing meals you won't forget any time soon.

The restaurant is open to the public, although reservations are preferred. The wait for a table can be anywhere from 15-20 minutes on an average night.

"We like to switch our menu up three or four times a year," Chef Ellis said. "I think our St. Louis ribs are a pretty good staple, everyone seems to love a prime rib. Right now on our menu, pig wings, which are miniature pork shanks, is pretty popular. I like to create stuff people may not have seen or cook stuff people know but put a twist."

Andrei's Restaurant is open for lunch and dinner, and has no set dress code. Wednesday's are known as prime rib night while Thursday nights have a pasta bar where diners can choose what they want on their plate and Chef Ellis will prepare it in front of you.

My dining experience was a unique one, as it fell on Halloween night with servers in their own costumes, and it was prime rib night.

My guest and I ordered fried mozzarella sticks and loaded potato skins, which came out with a beautiful presentation along with some fresh, warm bread rolls.

The mozzarella sticks had a creamy, cheesy center that was unlike any I've tasted at other restaurants before, and that alone would be a good enough reason for me to return!

The loaded potato skins were just as tasty. Each half of potato was stuffed with Andrei's sauce, Gouda cheese and bacon with a side of scallion sour cream.

Our salads preceded the prime rib entrée, which came prepared with soft summer greens, cucumber,

shredded carrots, cheese and sherry vinaigrette. The vinaigrette is not for those with a sensitive palate, as it comes with a sharp tangy bite if you douse too much. The right amount, however, elevates your salad to a wonderful, crisp level.

On prime rib night, you can't refuse what is sure to be a delicious slice of beef. My guest ordered his prime rib rare, while I requested medium.

When the hot plates came out with a side of gravy, the prime rib was sitting on mashed potatoes and a medley of vegetables, including squash, zucchini and green beans.

The prime rib itself looked excellent, and tasted even better. It was a sizable portion, and I had to take half of it home, but if you've got a good appetite like my guest, you'll have no trouble finishing it all.

Each bite was soft, tender, juicy and smelled divine. Even serving myself leftovers the following day, it was just as memorable.

The menu boasts of French onion soup, a variety of flavorful salads, coconut shrimp and corn fritters for appetizers. The lunch menu offers sandwiches, burgers, tacos, wraps and a hot dog, all at an affordable price.

The dinner menu is a bit more elevated, as are the prices (an average of \$13 to \$20). Dinner includes a flat iron steak, jambalaya, burgers, asiago chicken roulade and sesame crusted ahi tuna platter.

The atmosphere was a casual, relaxed environment and the staff were friendly and helpful whenever you needed something.

Andrei's Restaurant is located in the Indian River Preserve clubhouse and is open 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday through Tuesday, and 11 a.m. to 8 p.m. Wednesday through Friday.

BREVARD COUNTY - Advent Lutheran Church will be filled with joyous companionship this Sunday as attendees join for an afternoon of pipe organ music as part of its concert series.

The new season will kick off with organ scholar Oliver Brett for a free performance at 3 p.m. on Sunday, Nov. 11 at the church, 7550 N. Wickham Road, Suntree.

'[Guests] can expect to hear a passionate, virtuosic performer who will engage the audience with music that spans the centuries, from the 17th to the 20th," said Betty Jo Couch, Advent Lutheran Church Organist and Concert Series Coordinator.

Mr. Brett will play the works of composers Bach, Shumann, Durufle, Buxtehude, Widor and Willan, all while performing on the American-made A.E. Schleuter pipe organ of 36 ranks and 2,196 pipes.

My piano teacher took me in to play it, and I was immediately hooked by its huge tonal possibilities and the sheer amount one person can do on a single musical instrument, as well as by the excitement of being able to play a keyboard with my feet.

"It transports me to a different world and when everything clicks, I really feel like I am living inside of the music and am experiencing it in quite an intimate way, Mr. Brett continued. "It's like a beautiful journey.'

Mr. Brett will be Advent Lutheran Church's first solo concert of the season, with events coming up such as the annual "Advent Season Mini-Concerts," performer Mark Miller in February, and "Rising Star" concert performer Amanda Mole.

"We are most looking forward to hearing Oliver matching his talents to the colors and sounds of our A.E. Schlueter pipe organ," Mrs. Couch said. "After listening to some of his recordings and reading his biography and reviews, the committee enthusiastically issued an invitation."

# **Test your golf game on the new and** improved PGA Resort course

ost every week, serious golf fans dream of playing the courses the pros play. We want to know what they face when playing for over a million dollars. We'd love the prefect conditions. The firm fairways where the ball seems to bounce and roll forever. The perfect putting surfaces where the ball tracks true and the speeds are identical on every green.

Most of us have watched or attended the Honda Classic at PGA National in Palm Beach Gardens. The resort has been home to the Honda Classic, the Tour's longest running sponsor, since 2007. Over that time the Champion Course has seen several renovations and tweaks to both challenge the pros and make them more comfortable.

After the sun set on this year's event back in early March, the Tour and the resort heard a lot of comments from the players. Most were not the kind you want to hear from the people who make your brand popular. The players were not thrilled at all with the greens. They complained about the surfaces being too different from one hole to the next. They didn't like that some of them had bare spots that had more green sand than

The PGA Tour and PGA National Resort got together and decided the time



had come to renovate the greens. Over the past few years some other components of the course have seen attention. The bunkers have been rebuilt, tees have been added to change angles and add distance, and even some trees have been planted or removed. It was time for some attention to be paid to the greens.

Jack Nicklaus Design, which has overseen most every tweak or change made to the Champion Course over the past two decades, was again brought in. Over time the grass around the greens creeps in and encroaches on the putting surface, making them smaller and smaller over the years. The Tour wanted to get the greens back to their original size and remove all the encroaching grass on the fringe or collars.

By returning the greens to their original size, there will now be more places for the Tour to put the pins over the course of tournament week. Some will be completely new, giving the pros a hole location that they have yet to see

when playing the event at this course.

In all, an average of just over 800square feet was added to each green. Couple that with bringing back the undulations the greens used to have, and you get greens that will certainly challenge the best in the business.

The Tour also likes that the greens are a bit firmer and the new drainage system under the greens' complexes will allow the staff to better control just how firm and fast the greens are for not only the Honda Classic, but for resort guests as

Work began on June 4, and was completed the first week of October, with the course re-opening for play on Oct. 3. A lot of work was done in just four months. The old layer of grass was stripped and removed. New drainage was built, and a new subsurface was constructed. Then the new irrigation was put in, followed by new Tiff Eagle Bermuda for the final putting surface.

After the ribbon-cutting ceremony, we teed up to give the course a thorough testing. You immediately notice how well-groomed the entire course is. Having followed many of the players around at the Honda Classic and having played the course a couple years ago, I am well aware of what the greens used to look like. The size of the greens immedi-

ately jumped out to me. They are noticeably larger and some of the pin placements we had for the day, were ones the course hasn't been able to use since last century.

The course is best known for the Bear Trap. Holes 15 through 17 are where Jack Nicklaus decided to truly challenge the players and guests. The holes were difficult before. Adding a few more spots to place the pin on 15 and 17, and making 16 green a lot bigger than I ever remember it being, will just add to the difficulty and pressure.

I did my best to appease the golf gods and hit a ball in the water at each of the three holes. Hopefully the leader has better luck than I come late February.

The best way to play the Champion Course and test your game against one of the toughest venues on the PGA Tour is to stay at PGA National Resort & Spa. 

immigrated to the United States. When WWII broke out, he tried to enlist in the U.S. Army, but was told he was too old.

I could always see the spirit in his eyes as he read the paper everyday about world events, and he would always say how lucky we were to live in this country and how precious freedom was, but that it came at a price. A price our veterans paid to give us this great life we have here.

My Dad's favorite meal was lamb; here is his recipe.

#### **ROASTED LEG OF LAMB**

#### Ingredients

15-6 pound bone-in leg of lamb (USDA Choice, not imported)

1/4-cup olive oil

5 cloves of garlic, sliced lengthwise

1/3-cup balsamic vinegar

1/4-cup fresh squeezed lemon juice

1 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon black pepper

2 tablespoons leaf oregano

1 tablespoon fresh rosemary, chopped

2 cups celery, chopped

2 cups carrots, chopped

2 cups red onions, chopped

#### **Directions**

In a small bowl mix olive oil, lemon juice, oregano, rosemary, balsamic vinegar, salt and pepper together.

Make 9-10 small slices all over the lamb. Insert the garlic into the slices and rub the entire lamb with the seasoning mix.

Layer a roasting pan with carrots, celery, and onions and place leg of lamb on top with the fat side up. Add 1 cup water and 1/2-cup red wine to the pan.

Roast at 350 degrees for approximately 1-1/2 hours or until a meat thermometer reads 135 degrees internal temperature. Let rest for 30 minutes and slice thin.




