The event, scheduled to take place 4-5 July, is the perfect occasion to spend quality time with friends and family. On the air side of things, visitors are sure to be amazed with the impressive line up of demo teams and vintage aircraft.

One of the most recognized and well-known Canadian Forces demonstration team is without a doubt the Snowbirds and their CT114 Tutors.

Comprised of Canadian Forces members, the team is also known as 431 Squadron of Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan.

Predecessor to the Snowbirds were the Golden Hawks with their six gold-coloured F86 Sabre 5 aircraft. Today, Hawk One still flies the proud colours of its team and represents this year a tribute to the commemoration of 100 years of Powered Flight in Canada.

Another well-known and beloved Canadian Forces demonstration team is the SkyHawks, Canada's premier parachute demonstration team. Over the last 38 years, the SkyHawks have performed in more than 3,100 shows around the world. Under their signature Canadian Flag parachutes, the team is sure to impress with their dynamic canopy work and daring parabatics.

Last but not least, the CF18 demonstration team will be taking to the skies in an exciting demonstration that promises to deliver

a spectacular performance. The team is pleased to announce that they will be flying a fully painted CF18 to commemorate the

100th Anniversary of Powered Flight in Canada. Vintage Wings, which acquire, restore, maintain and fly classic aircraft sig-

nificant to the early days of powered flight, will also participate during the 4-5 July celebrations.

They offer a chance to discover an important part of the aviation history with the Mustang, Spitfire, Hurricane and Corsair that will be part of the anniversary weekend.

Apart from the demonstration teams, many current Canadian Forces aircraft will be on display such as the CC177 Globemaster III, CH124 Sea King, CH146 Griffon, CC150 Polaris, CC130 Hercules, CC115 Buffalo, CC144 Challenger and many more.

## No aircraft to be housed in newest hangar at 8 Wing/CFB Trenton

The newest hangar built here at 8 Wing/CFB Trenton will be forever empty of aircraft. But it will be full of something much more precious -- children.

The Trenton Military Family Resource Centre (MFRC) celebrated the grand opening of *The MFRC Hangar*, the long-awaited and much-anticipated expansion of the daycare here on the base.

Colonel Mike Hood, Commander, 8 Wing/CFB Trenton, had the honour of cutting the red ribbon at the entrance to the new building on June 22, 2009.

Also in attendance were the Wing Chief Warrant Officer, CWO Tom Secretan, Daycare Director Lesley Patterson, and Lieutenant-Colonel Debbie Miller, 8 Wing Administration Officer, among others.

Patterson says that the new building

is licensed for an additional 64 children; the main daycare building, within the Siskin Centre, is licensed for 102-120 youngsters.

The four rooms that make up the new space have already been appropriately named: SkyHawks, Hercules, Griffons and Snowbirds.

Patterson says she and her staff are very excited about the new space, and credits LCol Miller with spearheading the much needed expansion.

"LCol Miller has listened to and supported us from the beginning, as have Col Hood, CWO Secretan and LCol Chantal Fraser, and too many more to mention."

After the ribbon-cutting, LCol Miller was presented with a very special award for her unwavering support -- *The Order of the Snotgobbler* -- which refers to her well known pet name for children, which Patterson says LCol Miller says with true affection.

## Four new SAR-Techs join 8 Wing Trenton

19 WING COMOX, B.C. – After 11 months of intensive training, four new Search and Rescue Technicians (SAR Techs) have received their SAR Tech Wings and distinctive orange berets and will be joining the 8 Wing Trenton Community.

Master Corporals Christoph Auger-Jalbert, Eric Boivin, Steve Delage and Philippe Friolet graduated from SAR Tech Course #42 yesterday in Comox, B.C.

"The Graduates of SAR-Tech course # 42 stand before this parade as both a tribute and testament to their former Land, Sea and Air elements and have demonstrated unequivocal professionalism and determination to achieve SAR Wing Standard," said Chief Warrant Officer John Oakes, Canadian Forces School of Search and Rescue Chief Warrant Officer. "This is but one small step in their new career. Upon arrival at the operational SAR Squadron, the next evolution of operational evaluations will test their true ability to become part of an Operational SAR Crew in support of the National SAR Mandate."

MCpl Auger-Jalbert joined the Canadian Forces as a reservist in the infantry in 1999. In 2003, MCpl Auger-Jalbert joined the regular force as an Aviation Technician and was posted to Canadian Forces Bagotville.

"I think the part I enjoyed most was my shifts as a paramedic," said MCpl Auger-Jalbert. "It was the first time we were in contact with real patients and we could finally begin to apply everything we had learned to that point."

MCpl Boivin, the father of two small children, joined the Canadian Forces in 1997 as a member of the 3rd Battalion of the Royal 22e Regiment. MCpl Boivin did a tour of Bosnia in 2001 and Afghanistan in 2004. He was a member of the parachute company of his regiment for seven years and spent the last year in Comox, B.C. studying English.

"I was reading the Maple Leaf one day and saw a picture of a SAR mission and knew that's what I had to do next," said MCpl Boivin. "I want to be able to help people out of bad situations and come home at the end of the day knowing I did my part."

The MFRC Hangar will be used for daycare purpose during the day, but will also be used after hours for other MFRC programs and activities, such as second language training, scrapbooking, belly dancing etc.

Lastly, the Hercules was tasked to assist an aircraft with engine problems by International Falls. They were stood down enroute after aircraft landed successfully.

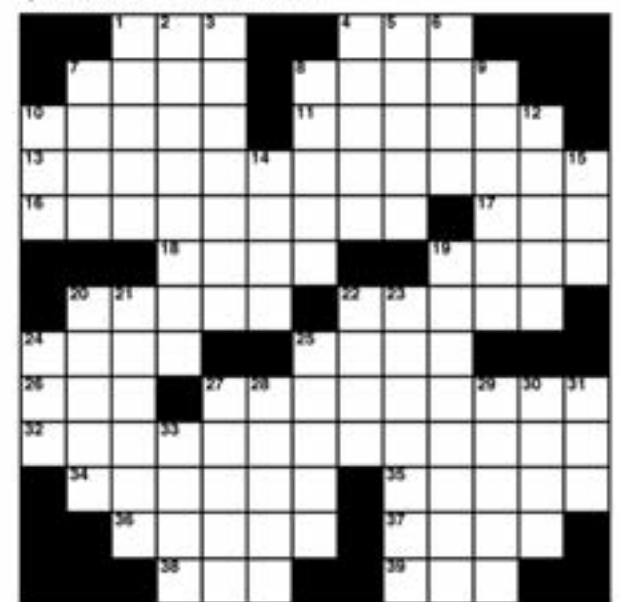

### This Week in Contact

1979 – Newly-sworn in Minister of Defence, the Honourable Allan McKibbin, saluted the troops of CFB Trenton as they celebrated National Armed Forces Day on June 25. Minister McKibbin, a retired military officer, called the men and women of both the regular and reserve forces a “national asset” and that they could be “justly proud of their (sic) contribution to the national fabric” of Canada.

1989 – Despite bilingual instructions and signs to STOP, the pilot of a French Air Force KC135 failed to stop his aircraft on the wet main runway of CFB Trenton, finally coming to a soggy halt in the mud about 370 feet beyond the pavement. The miss prompted a huge, multi-unit effort to free the plane and remove it before other aircraft could land. Believe it or not, the French pilot blamed the “too short” runway for the mishap.

1999 – Lieutenant-Colonel Chris Colton (now Mr. Chris Colton of the National Air Force Museum of Canada at 8 Wing), celebrated an “awesome air show” that was held on the base June 12 and 13, 1999. LCol Colton, who chaired the show that year, said unseasonably hot and humid weather held attendance down, but otherwise the show was total “crowd pleasing entertainment.”

Relay for Life is a 12-hour, overnight non-competitive relay designed to raise money and awareness for cancer research and prevention. Our Squadron chose to participate as dedicated members of the community, and as military representatives, since the theme this year was "Support our Troops."

Beginning at 1800 hrs with the opening ceremonies, we had amazing weather for O Canada and a 436 (T) Squadron CC-130 flypast.

After starting the evening off with a bang, cancer survivors took to the field for an emotional lap honouring them and their families. Immediately thereafter was the team lap where we proudly displayed our 436 Squadron banner and waved our Canadian

and Air Force flags for the gathered spectators and more than 140 participating teams.

A highlight of the evening was the "Support our Troops" lap just after 2000 hrs. Most people changed into red t-shirts

and waved Canadian flags and yellow ribbons as they walked around the track, showing support for the military community and deployed troops.

An important tradition during Relay for Life is the sale and display of luminar-

ies. These are paper bags that are lit from within in honour or in memory of cancer victims.

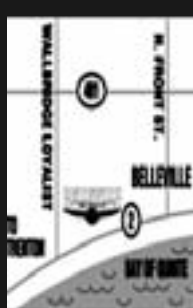

## Use 'SunSense' to protect yourself from harmful rays

Nobody wants to stay inside when the sun is shining. So when you're outside, using a little SunSense can protect you and your family from sunburn.

What can you do? If you can, plan your outdoor activities before 11 a.m. or after 4 p.m. when the sun is not at its strongest, or any time of the day when the UV Index is 3 or less.

Remember, if your shadow's shorter than you, it's time to find some shade or go inside. If you can't find shade, create your own. Take along an umbrella – that way you can have shade wherever you need it.

Babies need extra protection because their skin is very sensitive. It's best to keep babies out of direct sunlight. Use clothing that covers their arms and legs, add a hat and put on a little sunscreen. Put the stroller, playpen or carriage in the shade – under trees or an umbrella.

Cover up. One of the best ways to make sure you don't burn is to cover up. Choose clothing that is: loose fitting – like a t-shirt, tightly woven, lightweight.

Where's my hat? Don't forget to grab your hat on your way out! Most skin cancers happen on the face and neck. These areas need extra protection.

Wear a hat with a wide brim that covers your head, face, ears and neck. Hats like baseball caps won't give you enough protection.

Put sunscreen on your ears, chin and neck even when you're wearing a hat.

Wear your sunglasses. Sunglasses can help prevent damage to your eyes by blocking a large amount of UV rays. Keep your shades on and make sure your children wear them too. Choose sunglasses with even shading, medium to dark lenses (grey, brown or green tint). Look for UVA and UVB protection. These features can be found in many inexpensive sunglasses.

Sunscreen – Don't leave home without it. Sunscreen can't block all the sun's rays. Use it along with shade, clothing and hats, not instead of them. Use sunscreen as a backup in your sun protection plan. Your sunscreen should have a

sun protection factor (SPF) 15 or higher, and if you work outdoors or are planning to be outside most of the day, use an SPF 30.

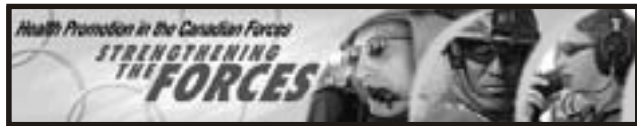
Look for "broad spectrum" on the label. This means that the sunscreen offers protection against both UVA and UVB ultraviolet rays.

Apply your sunscreen generously and at least 20 minutes before going outside. Read the label and follow the instructions for reapplying. Don't forget to cover your nose, ears and the tops of your feet. Use a waterproof sunscreen if you're in or near water.

Avoid indoor tanning. Just like the sun, tanning beds and sun lamps release UV rays that can cause sunburn, damage skin and increase the risk of skin cancer.

Check your skin regularly. You can never be completely safe from the sun. Over time, exposure to UV rays may cause skin cancer. Get to know the skin you're in and report any changes to your doctor.

## Did You Know?

Sunscreens are not intended to increase sun exposure time. They are meant to increase protection during unavoidable exposure.

## Understanding the UV Index

Environment Canada's UV Index is a useful tool when it comes to sun protection.

It tells you the strength of the sun's daily UV rays – the higher the number, the stronger the sun's rays, the more important it is to protect yourself.

You can find out the UV Index in your area by checking your local weather forecast. If the UV Index reaches 3 or more, it's included in the forecast. You can also go to the UV Index online for the daily forecast for your area.

The UV Index below tells you what each level means and how to protect yourself.

**0-2 Low:** Minimal sun protection required for normal activity.

If you're outside for more than one hour, wear sunglasses, cover up, use sunscreen.

**3-5 Moderate:** Take precautions – cover up, wear a hat, sunglasses and sunscreen – especially if you're outside for 30 minutes or more.

Look for shade around midday.

**6-7 High:** You need protection – find shade, get out the sunscreen, hats, sunglasses and cover up. Unprotected skin can be damaged and burn quickly. Try and stay out of the sun between 11 a.m. and 4 p.m.

**8-10 Very High:** Extra precautions required – find shade, cover up, wear a

hat, sunglasses and sunscreen. Unprotected skin will be damaged and can burn quickly.

If you can, avoid the sun between 11 a.m. and 4 p.m.

**11+ Extreme:** This is very rare in Canada. Maximum protection is required. Avoid the sun between 11 a.m. and 4 p.m. Stay in the shade, cover up, wear a hat, sunglasses and sunscreen.

Unprotected skin will be damaged and can burn in minutes.

# 429 (T) Squadron sends reps to East Moor ceremony

On the invitation of Colonel Chris Henneberry, former CO 415 Squadron, two representatives from 429 (T) Squadron, Captain Bryce Graham and Corporal Jessie Bush, travelled to Sutton-on-the-Forrest, England, to attend the 2009 East Moor Ceremony held on May 30.

This annual ceremony is held to remember those who flew on Canadian Bomber Squadrons from the East Moor airfield, an airfield that was situated close to the town during World War II. The Canadian squadrons that participated in operations from that area were 415, 429, and 432 Squadrons. In 1990, a cairn was placed in the township of Sutton-on-the-Forrest to commemorate those three squadrons that operated out of East Moor and, every year, a ceremony is held as an act of remembrance.

This year's ceremony was a small event with a few military representatives, including a WWII veteran from Montreal, Mr. Doug Sample, five members of the Canadian Forces, a few members of the Royal Air Force, and many residents from the local township. One such resident at the ceremony was Mr. Charles (Chas) Schofield, a WWII veteran who served with 429 Squadron at East Moor during the war.

All representatives assembled at the cairn for a special wreath laying ceremony recognizing all the bomber crews that flew mis-

sions in and out of the local airfields during the wars.

Some introductory comments were made by Col Henneberry followed by the singing of "O Canada" and "God Save the Queen." A local minister then said some words in remembrance. Following the memorial service, the congregation moved to the local community hall for some snacks and refreshments. This presented the opportunity to meet all those who participated and who were involved in the organization of the ceremony.

Also located in the township are three commonwealth Canadian gravestones. The day following the ceremony, a visit was made to a local restaurant known as "Betty's," a common hotspot for our Canadian bomber pilots during the war.

In the restaurant is a mirror hanging on the wall that had engraving on it done by various bomber pilots during the war. While relaxing at this local hotspot, many of our Canadian bomber pilots engraved their names onto the mirrors with their rings and, to this day, the mirrors remain almost completely intact.

With the recent reinstatement of 429 (T) Squadron, this year presented the first chance to participate in this ceremony in several years. It was an opportunity to re-live some of the squadron's history and remember the heroes and events that occurred in East Moor many decades ago.

# 424 Squadron Griffon at SAR MEET 2009, Netherlands

The Royal Netherland Air Force conducted an international Search and Rescue (SAR) competition from May 25-29, 2009, combined with celebrating 50 years of SAR by the RCAF. This meet was hosted and organized by 303 Search and Rescue Squadron based in Leeuwarden, Netherlands. The primary role of 303 Sqn is to provide rescue to their F16 pilots over the North Sea during range firing exercises; the secondary role is the provision of medevac services for all the nearby islands.

Both 424 Transport and Rescue Squadron and 1 Canadian Air Division are aware that with the ever-present likelihood of having to respond to a major air disaster (or other) in a remote area, there is an existing need to be able to quickly respond and evacuate multiple casualties with a Rotary Wing capability (Boxtop 22, or recently Air France crash). Combining SAR MEET with airlifting a SAR Griffon, led to exercising the capability of moving and re-deploying the helicopter for operational use at a different airfield in a different setting.

The Griffon was successfully loaded and transported to the Netherlands for this competition. The Sea King was the helicopter of choice for Netherlands (coast guard), Germany and Belgium; 303 Sqn and 424 Sqn used the Griffon while Slovenia showed up with a Lynx helicopter.

The competition began with a timed navigation and visual landmark identification event; the map to follow was handed to the first officer five minutes before the departure time. The map was a six-inch cube with turning points of the navigation legs, not a complete map and not in order either. For us SAR-Techs and Flight Engineers, we were handed photos of objects we had to identify along the route and match with navigation points: keep in mind it's timed and points were lost for being early/late for arrival or not correctly marking/identifying all the navigation points. We were very successful on all objectives and timings for this task.

Second event followed with a flight over the North Sea and a search for a person in the water, again all timed. We were pretty good with this task also. Thus, after these events we were second overall, one point behind first place. They beat our timings for the water event by less than one minute. We won't mention that the Sea King that was in first place does have radar and "flir" to help identify objects/body in the water, and that the person in the water took a picture of the Sea King from the water with a flash. Talk about a lucky break I guess.

The last part of the competition comprised a team-building event and a precision hovering competition. The team-building challenge was for a team of five people to figure out how to move from a small platform through an opening in a wall (15 feet

away) and up an elevated platform (10 ft high) on the opposite side. This exercise was timed; equipment was limited to one ladder, two planks and two ropes. Points were deducted for touching the ground with equipment or personnel. Looking around and judging by all the other tortuous contraptions they had set up in the forest, it's evident they do this stuff a lot. We were still doing well after this event (P.S. The CO needs to work on knots!).

The last event was the one that was rated as the most important and thus allocated the most points for the competition. Precision hovering! With 25-knot winds, the helo was timed to hook up a metal bucket full of water with a grapple on a 30-ft line attached to the helo hoist. Without spilling water, one had to move the bucket through difficult obstacles, lower it on a small target mark, release it, and finally with the grapple pull on a smoke canister to ignite it and stop the timing. Minutes are added to total time when spilling water, touching obstacles and so on. That's when we fell to fourth place. With valiant and commendable efforts the little Griffon (and the big FE) worked as hard as it could but did not stand a chance in gusting winds against its competition. The three first places went to the Sea Kings, with their fourth axis auto pilot, hydraulic winch and months of practice, it was a foregone conclusion before we started. These Sea Kings are designed and equipped, by the push of a button, for a steady hover over the ocean with no reference. The hoist operator in the back has a joy stick for correcting and moving the helo, combined with a fast raising/lowering hook with no slow mode like ours, they are equipped for serious steady hovering/hoisting capabilities. (Move aside, Griffon boy!)

The SAR MEET was a tremendous success for us as a squadron, 8 Wing movement personnel and the CC177 crew. We got to exercise the deployment of the Griffon in a CC177, which illustrated some deficiencies to be corrected for transport and a quicker turnaround of the helicopter. To meet other rescue squadrons' crews and their rescue swimmer was a rich, informative and educational experience. We got to view their equipment and procedures for rescue work, bring home lots of information on configurations and techniques. There is an old saying that states, "We are never fully appreciated for our true value at home." Little did I realize how much all the participating countries are knowledgeable and hold in high esteem SAR-Techs with all the rescue skills we possess, a necessity born out of the vastness of the land we have to cover to effect rescues.

In the end this mission was a success by the cohesiveness and professionalism of all the personnel involved in flying and maintaining the Griffon. I can only hope one day we can return the extraordinary hospitality received in the Netherlands. Now I know what precision hovering is all about "European style," in Canada I am the water bucket!

## Third Annual Soldier On tournament a huge success

John Casey, tournament co-organizer and general manager of Roundel's day-to-day operations, pointed to the teamwork behind the tournament's success. He also expressed appreciation to the corporate sponsors which included Sobey's Brighton and Labatt Blue, among others.

"This year, in a recession, we raised as much money with corporate sponsorship as we did last year," Casey noted.

The celebrities, too, donated their time to participate in the event including stand-up comedians Dave Hemstad (starring in Diet Pepsi commercials) and Johnny Gardhouse (of Comedy Now and, according to Casey, "is the next Jim Carrey.") They were featured in a comedy show the night before the tournament. Kennedy noted that Gardhouse has toured Afghanistan as part of an entertainment show.

A range of other well-known faces came to the fundraiser, from hockey

great Johnny Bower to actor/comedian Colin Mochrie of *Whose Line Is it Anyway?*, to The Raptor, mascot of the Toronto Raptors pro basketball team. Local personalities Mark Philbin and Kathleen Rankine of Classic Hits 95.5 Radio also took part.

A personal touch was added to the fundraising by Lee Lamoureux, a former member of the military and a Roundel Glen member who had vowed to shave his head at the tournament. The hat was passed around at the event and realized about \$2,000 for Soldier On, Kennedy said. Relieving Lamoureux of his locks was the evening's inspirational speaker Jody Mitic, a staunch believer in Soldier On with very good reason. While serving as a sniper in Afghanistan, he lost both legs below the knees but received prosthetics through Soldier On, remained in the military and now plans to take part in the Boston Marathon.

Kennedy said it was "very moving" to hear Mitic's story.

In addition to Mitic's talk, tournament participants enjoyed dinner and saw prizes awarded to golfers in various categories. The winning foursome of John Sheard, Larry MacDonald, Bill Headon and Stuart MacMillan was paired with celebrity Erin Alexandra who is a fitness model.

The tournament may be over but it will likely generate more money for Soldier On soon through the sale of a DVD that Casey said "is in the works." Some 16 hours of footage shot at the comedy night and tourna-

# National Air Force Museum of Canada: Preserving heritage for 25 years

This year marks the 25th anniversary of the National Air Force Museum of Canada (NAFMC), formerly known as the RCAF Memorial Museum.

To celebrate this milestone, the museum is opening a new exhibit that illustrates how the museum has evolved over the past quarter century. Undergoing location changes and interior design updates, it now stands as the largest Air Force museum in Canada with yearly attendance surpassing 40,000 visitors.

The current museum opened as the RCAF Memorial Library and Museum on the 1st of April 1984, when airmen and airwomen were celebrating the 60th anniversary of the Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF).

A ceremony took place at the newly renovated Rec Centre (today's Gymnasium), bringing together both RCAF and RAF veterans. *The Contact* amply covered the event and advertized the institution as "a most effective way to maintain and convey the spirit, history and tradition of the RCAF for future generations." Editors of *The Contact* assisted in spreading the word that the museum was in need of artefacts in order to increase its modest collection.

It wasn't long before the collection grew and space became insufficient. A larger facility was required to show comprehensive exhibits illustrating Canadian military aviation history and to properly preserve the artefacts accumulated over the first five years. Thoughts of relocating the museum began in the early 1990s, and a new building was selected at 220 RCAF Road – the address of the former Base curling club. An opening ceremony took place on the 1st of April 1994 to mark the occasion.

With additional space at the new location, the museum installed more exhibits, created a storage area, set up a gift shop and expanded to an outdoor facility. Adjacent to the south

side of the new museum, it is now known as the RCAF Memorial Airpark. Home to the aircraft collection, it eventually included the Ad Astra program and various monuments erected by the Air Force community in Canada.

Shortly after the relocation, the museum caught the attention of the Halifax Aircraft Association, a Toronto-based group of veterans. With the intention of commemorating those who lost their lives while serving with RAF Bomber Command, this group undertook the huge task of retrieving and restoring one of the iconic bombers of the Second World War: the Handley Page Halifax. In service with Britain's No. 644 Sqn, shot down over a Norwegian lake in 1945, it was located with sonar detectors in 1981 and brought to Canada in 1996. An extensive project was about to begin which required above all, an adequate facility for restoration.

This museum was chosen as the appropriate future location for this project and thoughts of expanding the facility developed once again. In 1996, a restoration workshop was added on the northeastern side of the old curling club. As the restoration of the Halifax progressed, more room

was needed to continue the project and display the aircraft. The museum thus entered a new phase of construction in 2004 and the Halifax was relocated to its final position the following year. By 2009, the second phase of the expanded building, including a concrete floor, walls, electrical and heating systems, was completed.

The arrival of the Halifax is a significant chapter in the museum's history. First, it created a need for physical expansion, and second, it increased the organization's prominence globally.

The expanded facility will allow the museum to better fulfill its mandate to tell the story of Canada's Air Force, beginning with the Canadian Aviation Corps (1914 – 1915), the Canadian Air Force (1920 – 1924), including the golden era of the RCAF (1924 – 1968), and ending with today's Air Command (since 1975). The NAFMC is a fitting tribute to the proud history of the men and women who have served Canada with distinction.

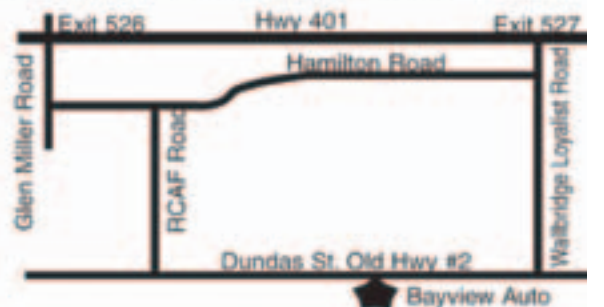

 1 pound corn bread, crumbled (makes five cups crumbs)  
 1 can (15 ounces) sliced peaches in juice, drained and diced  
 1 cup (4 ounces) pecan pieces  
 2 teaspoons vegetable oil  
 1 medium onion, chopped  
 2 celery ribs, diced  
 1/2 teaspoon dried poultry seasoning  
 1/2 teaspoon dried rosemary, crumbled  
 1/2 cup dried cranberries  
 1 tablespoon dark brown sugar  
 1 can (10 3/4 ounces) reduced-sodium chicken broth  
 1/4 cup chopped parsley  
 Salt and pepper, to taste

**Equipment:** Rimmed sheet pan; Large skillet

**Preparation:** Heat oven to 350°F. Combine the crumbled corn bread, peaches and pecan pieces on a large sheet pan and bake for 15 to 20 minutes until the cornbread is lightly browned. Meanwhile heat the oil in a large skillet. Sauté the onion and celery until tender, about 4 minutes. Add the poultry seasoning and rosemary and sauté another 30 seconds. Add the cranberries, brown sugar and broth, and stir until the sugar dissolves and the liquid is boiling. Combine with the toasted corn bread mixture, blending until all of the corn bread has been moistened. Mix in the parsley and season to taste with salt and pepper. # Remembering... Trenton's new, large and modern hangar

9 June 1961 – By all reports it was to be the largest and most modern hangar in Canada – large enough to house Bristol's new giant prop-jet Britannia aircraft – although it would never, exactly, shelter the "Whispering Giant."

RCAF Station Trenton was in the throes of a major revamping project as the close of the fifties brought not only a new decade but also a new chapter in its history.

From the moment Flight Lieutenant J.T. O'Brien Saint arrived on 3 September 1931 training had been the main focus of activity at Trenton. Siskins, Atlases and Vedettes, to name but a few originally graced the sky in this role. By 1937 the growing schedule of individual training encompassed elementary and specialized courses delivered to RCAF and RCMP personnel, aircrew and ground crew alike.

During the Second World War, Trenton became known as the "hub of the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan (BCATP)" for good reason. Virtually every type of training aircraft could be found in the skies above Trenton. The North American Harvard – the "yellow peril" – perhaps the best remembered of them all. The Central Flying School (CFS) not only graduated trained flying instruc-

tors, it developed and oversaw the BCATP's training and testing standards. CFS Visiting Flights crossed the nation ensuring that each BCATP school met these standards. The RCAF built its reputation for sound training methodology on the work done by the wartime CFS.

It was, then, perhaps only natural that Air Training Command would make its home at Trenton following the war. Flying training was briefly abandoned as the focus turned to making up short falls in many ground crew trades. With the beginning of the Cold War in 1947 came the resumption of aircrew training. Gradually, old BCATP schools across the prairies, abandoned after hostilities, were re-opened. Eventually they were turning out aircrew for Canada and, once again, for her allies. Air Training Command Headquarters in Trenton, however, grew more remote from its aircrew training responsibilities as these became more localized in western Canada.

Ottawa decided to act. Their decision meant big changes for RCAF Station Trenton. On 10 September 1959, Air Training Command was handed over to Air Transport Command. With the new Command came new Squadrons. 426 (Thunderbird) Squadron had arrived in August 1959 and they flew an entirely different kind of beast than the famil-

iar trainer aircraft. In their stead flew the North Star and the Boxcar and it was planned for these would be joined by the Cosmopolitan and the, as yet unnamed, CC 106.

Trenton's existing infrastructure just wouldn't be big enough.

Planning for a new hangar and work to the station's runway began quietly in the months before Air Transport Command left RCAF Station Lachine (Dorval). In July 1959, the first big announcements were made. Carter Construction Company Limited of Toronto had been awarded the construction contract. The Niagara Structural Steel Company of St. Catharines would provide the steel.

Covering an estimated six acres of ground (450 by 560 feet), the new hangar would be the largest yet built in Canada. With a planned completion date projected in 1961, it was estimated at a cost of \$4 million. Included in the contract were a pump house and extension of the runways. Upgrades and modifications to other facilities were expected to follow. The intended end result was to be the most modern and best equipped facility to handle both large transport aircraft along with smaller aircraft and helicopters.

Trenton's landscape would be changed forever.

It all came to fruition on 9 June 1961. Air Marshal Hugh Campbell, CBE, CD, the Chief of the Air Staff presided over the cer-

emonies. With a fanfare from the RCAF Trumpet Band, one Hercules, one Cosmopolitan, one CC 106, one Albatross, one Caribou and one Otter aircraft drew up in front of the new hangar. As a second fanfare echoed across the airfield, 200 airmen emerged from the CC 106, 150 from the Hercules and 50 from the Cosmopolitan and marched into place in front of the reviewing dais. The Colours unfurled, the men stood at attention for "O Canada" and the general salute.

"I wish to commend the officers and airmen of Air Transport Command on their enviable record of service," A/M Campbell told the gathered crowd, "and for the ingenuity they have displayed in overcoming the many problems they have met in carrying out this

wide variety of tasks. In particular, I wish to pay tribute to the technicians on whose skill and careful work the effectiveness of our whole air transport operation depends."<sup>1</sup>

Following A/M Campbell's speech, the huge hangar doors opened slowly to reveal the ribbon that "once cut" would declare the building officially open. To conclude the day's ceremonies, Mrs. Campbell approached the CC 106, the newest and largest addition to the RCAF fleet (its design based on the Bristol Britannia). Breaking a champagne bottle across the radome she declared: "I christen this aircraft Yukon and may God bless her, all like her and all who fly in them."

# The Aerodrome of Democracy: Canada's role in the BCATP

At the onset of the Second World War in September of 1939, the German Luftwaffe was the most potent and experienced air force in the world; dominating the airspace over continental Europe with aircraft much more numerous and advanced than their counterparts. To defend Britain and conquer the powerful Luftwaffe in the skies over Europe, the Royal Air Force (RAF) and the Allies had no choice but to hastily upgrade their equipment and build the most powerful, robust air force in the world.

With strong leadership and direction from the British Air Ministry, the Allies set forth a new vision: train an extensive numbers of pilots, navigators, flight engineers and other aircrew as quickly as possible to fight with UK-based RAF and new Commonwealth squadrons. However, with an unfavourable climate for flight training and their proximity to Nazi-dominated airspace, the UK Air Ministry and the RAF were forced to turn to their Commonwealth allies for assistance in training new aviators for war. In an epic partnership between Commonwealth allies, Canada, Australia, New Zealand and Great Britain signed an agreement regarding the training of pilots and aircrew – dubbed “The Riverdale Agreement” – in the early morning hours of December 17th, 1939 in the Ottawa Office of Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King.

Later that evening in a radio broadcast to the Canadian people, Prime Minister King

described the new British Commonwealth Air Training Plan (BCATP) as a “co-operative undertaking of great magnitude.” The Riverdale Agreement called for the four allies to build aircraft, airfields, training schools and support infrastructure, while also supplying and

single most vital and largest contributor to the BCATP. British Prime Minister Winston Churchill praised his allied friend's role in the BCATP, as “Canada's greatest contribution to the allied victory,” and although not “officially” part of the Riverdale Agreement, United

under the BCATP with over half of these students being Canadian.

Although the Canadian climate was better suited for flight training, it was not without adversity. The Prairie winters were often so bitterly cold that many foreign BCATP students experienced severe frostbite

between the urban centres of Toronto and Ottawa.

At RCAF Station Trenton, the Central Flying School, Flying Instructor School and #6 Repair Depot were major units under the training plan; aircraft flown and maintained at Trenton included Harvards, Grumman

and flying clubs are original BCATP training centres, still identified by triangular shaped runways such as the airfield at Norman Rogers Airport in Kingston, Ontario.

The BCATP has certainly helped shape the identity of today's Canadian Air Force. The 400-series flying Squadrons, i.e., 8 Wing Trenton's 412, 424, 426, 429, 436, 437 flying squadrons originated as Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF) “Article XV” Squadrons; where many BCATP graduates flew operational tours under RAF command.

To this day, Canadian Forces Search and Rescue (SAR) aircraft are painted yellow-orange in similar fashion to the aircraft of the BCATP era. Dubbed “Training Yellow” during the BCATP, the high visibility afforded by this bright yellow colour made the aircraft easily recognizable by searchers if it went down, no matter what season. Numerous museums, including the BCATP Museum in Brandon, Manitoba and 8 Wing Trenton's National Air Force Museum of Canada, showcase these yellow aircraft and other equipment used during the BCATP.

Canada remains an ideal training location for international military aviation training. Training establishments at 4 Wing Cold Lake, Alberta and the NATO Flying Training Centre at 15 Wing Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan are major NATO Air Training Centre's; and many of the Operational Training Units (OTU's) such as 426 (T) Squadron at 8 Wing Trenton, host international exchange students and instructors.

training new aircrew for operational flying tours with RAF Squadrons and new Commonwealth “XV Squadrons.” However, Australia and New Zealand were far from the UK where the majority of the flying was required but Canada, with millions of square kilometres of wide-open airspace, was an ideal strategic location being situated roughly halfway between the Atlantic and Pacific war theatre.

Canada recruited tens of thousands of training students and instructors; afforded easy access to fuel resources; had an abundance of industrial production facilities and offered a more hospitable climate for air training. These factors rendered Canada as the

States President Theodore Roosevelt paid tribute to Canada, referring to his northern neighbor as “The Aerodrome of Democracy.”

New RCAF stations, airfields and BCATP schools were stood-up throughout Canada. The first BCATP schools opened by the end of April, 1940 and by the end of September, 1941 all but three of the proposed schools were in operation. Training went ahead of schedule despite many challenges and as early as September 30, 1940 the first 39 pilots graduated out of Camp Borden followed by the first Air Observers from RCAF Station Trenton. From May, 1940 to March, 1945 over 167,000 students trained in Canada

and lost extremities. Through hardship however, they quickly adapted – emulating techniques to keep the circulation flowing in their hands and toes taught by their Canuck counterparts who were better adapted to the frigid weather.

In Eastern Canada, RCAF Station Trenton had previously been established in 1931 to be a smaller supporting base for the larger RCAF Station Borden, and the Bay of Quinte flying station procured a prominent role in “The Plan.” The airfield was built on one of the many swaths of land along the Bay of Quinte, but the new Trenton station was an ideal location, with proximity to Lake Ontario while centred roughly halfway

Goose, Mitchell, Liberator and Spitfire. With over 3,000 air force personnel and 500-plus civilian employees at any given time, the Trenton air base was the largest unit in the BCATP.

By VE Day on May 8th, 1945 the BCATP was deemed no longer needed and military activity soon ceased at most of the bases. Buildings were abandoned, personnel transferred out, and surplus equipment was sold or scrapped.

The BCATP ended abruptly but the program left a long lasting legacy. The municipal and international airports of many Canadian cities and towns today were once part of the BCATP aerodrome infrastructure; and many small airfields

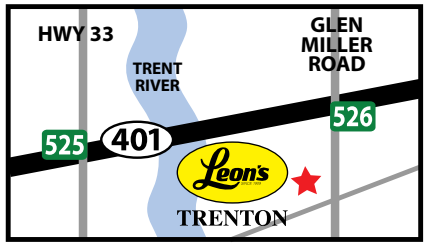
