Business up in flames

Fire marshal looking into cause of Monday fire

Fire officials were unable to identify the cause of a blaze that completely destroyed a commercial building off Reid Stafford Road south of Sanderson the morning of June 8.

Fire Chief Richard Dolan said the 3052-square-foot home of Erosion Stoppers Inc. at 7600 Nutty Buddy Lane was fully involved when he arrived shortly after being dispatched to the scene about 1:30 a.m.

"The whole thing was on fire, every piece of wood on the interior and exterior," he said.

Mr. Dolan and a dozen other firefighters used more than 27,000 gallons of water to extinguish the flames in about 45 minutes. Two fire engines and three tanker trucks responded to the call.

No one was injured and the building was unoccupied.

Detective Andy Redding of the Fire Marshals Office in Jacksonville, who began investigating the charred remains about 6:00 a.m., estimated the property loss at \$250,000

or more and said the structure was insured. Though arson isn't suspected, Mr. Redding said the damage was too great to determine what ignited the fire.

"It originated in a copy room, but the destruction was so bad we couldn't conclusively say it was electrical or something else," he said.

Randy and Louann Crews of Glen St. Mary own both the property and the business, which began 10 years ago.

Ms. Crews also couldn't say what caused the fire. She said the copy room contained a copier and server and was used as a mail room as well.

"We don't know anything," she said.

Library extension unaffected by the rain

Despite a 10-day rain delay last month, construction of the new addition to the Emily Taber Public Library remains largely on schedule and is expected for completion in mid to late August, said Dave Potts, superintendent for BillCo Construction.

Careful planning has gone into the exterior design to match the architectural style as closely as possible to the original structure erected as the county court house in the early 1900s.

The new ground floor addition will be accessible by elevator and stairs from the second story. It will give the library 2300 square feet of much needed space and will contain an area designed for children's programming.

The current stage of construction is referred to as a

"rough shell," when the main objective is getting the roof finished.

"Those ten days of rain last month set us back some, but as soon as the roof is done the other work can proceed with no delays," said Mr. Potts.

Next comes installation of the mechanical roughs, the internal organs of the building like plumbing, wiring, heating and duct work. When that phase is complete, trimming and finishing are next.

Late last week the crew was busy installing metal platforms over which the second story concrete floor slabs will be laid.

Patrons standing at the circulation desk inside the library were able to look through windows on the back wall and see a shower of sparks falling through the air as the platforms are welded into place.

Mr. Potts said the building has a little of everything — steel, block, brick and wood.

Starting June 11, the library will be closed to the public for three days while a dust wall is constructed. The plywood and plastic barrier will shield library staff and patrons as the "cut-throughs" are made to connect the present building with the new structure.

Mr. Potts says he has enjoyed his role as superintendent of construction for the library addition. He normally travels to multiple job sites throughout the day to check on the work for different projects.

"Staying in one location has been nice," he said. "I really like Baker County and its country atmosphere."

He was also complimented by library staff and says they have been most cooperative.

"The library staff has been great. They even buy us candy sometimes," he said.

City puts limits on 'off-site' sales, slashes local fees

The Macclenny City Commission moved ahead with limiting where temporary business sales can take place. It also included a less-restrictive exception for banks and credit unions that often use such sales to generate additional

loans for the purchase of big-ticket merchandise like vehicles and boats.

Though commissioner Floyd Bennett was absent from the June 9 regular meeting and the measure still needs approval on final reading expected next month, the remaining four commissioners voted unanimously to limit any location in the city to one temporary sale per year, except local banks and credit unions, which would be restricted to two vehicle sales and three non-vehicle sales per year.

The change originally proposed was to protect local re-

tailers from competition with out-of-town dealers, however; local financing institutions resisted the proposal because it restricted them to only one temporary sale per year.

The board also approved on first reading discounting the permit fee for temporary sales that use local retailers from \$300 to \$25 per day, adding a

new section to govern mobile food carts and specifying definitions for hawkers, merchants, peddlers, solicitors and temporary businesses.

In other business the board:

• Adopted approval on final reading required by the city's new liability insurance carrier — the Florida League of Cities.

Public Safety Director Buddy Dugger said the city received a substantial savings from the switch.

• Approved a \$250 donation to Anne Lewis' Camp S.T.Y.L.E., a summer camp program.

\$316K contract Asphalt over EZ Base

The Baker County Commission awarded a contract valued at roughly \$316,000 to Jacksonville-based APAC June 2 for the asphalt paving of nine road segments spread throughout the county, about 3.8 miles in all.

The segments include portions of Ruben Crawford and James Britt roads north of Macclenny; Rufus Powers, Pierce and Burned Crawford roads north of Glen St. Mary; Ruisse Lane in Margaretta and Thomas Sweat Road in Sanderson; Woodlawn Cemetery Road south of Macclenny; and Thomas Road east of Macclenny.

In 2007 the road department began applying an experimental material called EZ-Base to these segments, an inexpensive alternative to traditional lime rock made by the Jacksonville Electric Authority from recycled ash.

The board had discussed the paving projects for months, but with only \$150,000 in the budget it struggled to find enough money to complete all nine roads without dipping into reserve funds.

The solution came last week when an approximately \$400,000

reimbursement came from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) for damage suffered during last year's Tropical Storm Fay.

About \$92,000 of that sum was already dedicated to offset the cost for a new front-end loader. But the remainder plus the \$150,000 in the budget would complete the paving and leave \$152,000 unappropriated.

Commissioner Mark Hartly recommended combining that cash with some of the county's roughly \$7 million in reserves to complete more paving, particularly on roads like Cow Pen that are the most expensive to maintain.

However, others on the board weren't enthusiastic about eroding the rainy-day funds.

"We need to be careful on how we manage our money," warned Commissioner Alex Robinson.

More funds on the horizon

County Manager Joe Cone said more money for roads could be forthcoming.

About \$200,000 is expected this month from DuPont for county right-of-way given up during a road realignment benefiting the company's mining operation off CR 228 south.

The county has been expecting that cash for more than a year.

After rains blanketed the area with a foot or more of precipitation in late May, states of emergency were declared in a number of surrounding counties, but not Baker County.

That led local officials to seek the same declaration by the state's emergency management department, which would make Baker County eligible for the reimbursement of road repair expenses.

Mr. Cone said on May 28 and 29, a state assessment team surveyed damage here and added Baker County to the list of eligible counties after determining repair costs would top a \$75,000 threshold.

The reimbursement could be several hundred thousand dollars, commented Commissioner Mike Griffin. "We're qualified, but there's no guarantee we're getting any money," he cautioned.

Road department director Robert Fletcher also notified the board about the need for new sources of dirt for use in repairs and preparatory work prior to paving.

"We got to have some dirt," he said. "Something for the long

Corrections, clarification


Last week's edition of *The Press* misidentified the presumed owner of a group of nuisance dogs on College Street as David Valentine. Mr. Valentine does not own the dogs and did not agree to pay for damage caused by them. City animal control has addressed a warning letter to Jessica Richenbach, whose name appears on the utility bill where the dogs reside.

Also, the article on the Reality Check First Coast planning exercise held May 21 reported in error expected increases in population (3.5%) and jobs (2.5%) through 2060 in Baker County.

Rather, the percentages represent how much of the expected regional increase (650,000 new jobs and 1.5 million new people) was envisioned for Baker County. The general vision that emerged from the exercise was to plan for 52,000 more people (3.5 percent of the total expected across the region) and 16,000 new jobs (2.5 percent of the regional increase).

Another story in that edition about James Slattery allegedly threatening a county employee contained an error as well. Mr. Slattery did not call the county, rather an administrator called him when the alleged threat occurred. Also, Mr. Slattery said the reason he borrowed \$175,000 against his house was not to pay for his property on Crews Road as the article stated.

The May 7 edition of *The Baker County Press* reported in error that Commissioner Michael Crews didn't return voice mail messages requesting comment. Mr. Crews didn't receive the messages, he said, because his phone number had changed from that on file with *The Press*. He also provided updated phone and pager numbers for future use.

State's five-year road plan

Before approving the APAC bid, commissioners analyzed a list of Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) projects planned here and identified additional priority projects at the request of FDOT as part its annual five-year plan revision.

The board requested the following projects be added to the list:

- A connector sidewalk in Jonesville from Tony Givens Road to Five Churches Road and a sidewalk on US 90 leading to the Sanderson post office.
- Resurfacing of SR 228 south of I-10 to the Duval County line.

- Resurfacing I-10 to the Duval County line.
- Replacement of the Greens Creek bridge on CR 229 and the Cedar Creek bridge north of Sanderson on CR 127.

• A traffic light at 5th Street (121) and George Hodges Road.

FDOT's list already includes 12 projects, though all are contingent on the availability of funding.

Mr. Fletcher said federal stimulus funds are expected next month for resurfacing on CR 125 north of Glen St. Mary and that Mud Lake Road is in poor condition too.

"It's starting to get in bad shape," he said of the latter road.

New jail is 'big business'

Big payoff if revenue model works

If you have the time later this week, tour the new county jail, known forevermore as the Baker County Sheriff's Complex.

It will be apparent to you that law enforcement and the housing of federal prisoners is big business, whether they're illegal immigrants held for deportation hearings or criminal trials, or federal marshal detainees.

And, from next month forward, Baker County is tied to that industry — for better or worse.

The place is high tech and laid out for the organized flow and housing of transient inmates in an environment — if you'll excuse the political incorrectness — probably much more accommodating than they have at home in their native countries. Certainly better than being in jail in, say, Mexico or the Dominican Republic.

The digs for sheriff's department employees — the local guys and gals — are considerably upgraded as part of the \$45 million project. The digs for the sheriff himself — well, they're a bit opulent for a public servant.

On the other hand, if the sheriff pulls this off — keeping the 512 beds full or nearly full year round without a written contract from the federal Immigration and Customs Enforcement agency — it will be a financial coup of the first order.

The business plan anticipates \$80 fees per day per prisoner. That translates in a best case scenario to \$1.95 million and change annually — far above the annual debt service of \$365,000.

Even if the facility operates at less than capacity or at daily revenues less than anticipated, it stands a good chance to make big money. The bonded indebtedness could be paid off early, and future revenues flow to county government.

If it doesn't work that way, well, we're all on the hook and voters will take out their frustration on elected officials. I don't think that's going to happen.

The 800-pound guerrilla in the living room is the Obama administration. This is just me talkin', but I have virtually no faith so far in his ability to make the correct decision in matters like, well, immigration — or should I say "illegal" immigration.

You'll not hear much about it because the number of people sneaking in this county illegally has dropped due to the death of jobs. But it'll pick back up, and the odds that Washington will find an easier way out than enforcing existing laws are quite high.

The odds are higher now than they were with the Bush administration, which tried unsuccessfully to pull a fast one over on the public. At least the Democrats

had a logical, if flawed, reason to skirt the law; they're looking for new likely voters.

The Republicans? Your guess is as good as anyone's.

We'd all hate to see the business plan at the new jail go down in flames because of an easing of

immigration laws, including but not limited to the definition of

"criminal."

We can't worry about that now; we're in business — big business — housing these people, and it's best to remain optimistic that this endeavor will translate into a very generous revenue stream in years to come.





Lawsuit must precede lien filing on Hanson

The Baker County Commission directed its attorney last week to file a lawsuit against Hanson Roof Tile as a means of placing a \$300,000 lien against the company's Sanderson plant. "The lien was sought last month in response to the Texas-based building materials manufacturer violating its contract with the county to maintain minimum staffing levels or pay back the value of the land it was given as an inducement to locate in Baker County.

"To have an enforceable lien, I have to file suit," explained the board's counsel Terry Brown during the commission's meeting June 2. "That puts the county in the strongest position legally."

He said that because the lien is not for unpaid taxes or code enforcement fines, the suit is necessary and will not be challenged by Hanson's attorneys.

Hanson President Rick Chatellier confirmed that for commissioners.

"We're in agreement the lawsuit should proceed and it will be uncontested," he said. "It doesn't seem to be causing much resistance without legal staff in Dallas."

Mr. Chatellier said the company has three levels of attorneys and the decision not to contest the suit still needs approval from the last level.

"We intend to be a business member of this county in the future," he told the board, adding Hanson has invested \$39 million at the Sanderson site.

"We built a state of the art facility and we'd love to turn it back on, hire 70 people and turn a profit," said Mr. Chatellier.

Hanson's contract requires that it maintain at least 30 full-time employees at the plant. It violated the agreement in May 2008 when it laid off all but nine workers.

Pineview safe - so far

Pineview Chevrolet has made the cut, at least so far. The Macclenny dealership was not one of the 1124 notified last month that General Motors wouldn't be renewing their franchise agreements after 2010.

"We are not on anybody's list," said Pineview owner Ray Odum. "As far as a GM is concerned, we are a viable dealership. This dealership will be here for a long time after I'm gone."

However, General Motors has plans to shutter another 1200-1500 dealerships to reduce its network to 3500-3800 store-fronts nationwide by the end of 2010, said GM CEO Fritz Henderson in Senate testimony June 3.

The auto manufacturer last week entered Chapter 11 bankruptcy proceedings to restructure its operations.

General Motors hopes to emerge as a leaner, stronger and more viable company, said GM's sales chief Mark LaNeve in a video posted on www.gmreinvention.com.



"A viable dealership ... it'll be here for a long time after I'm gone," says owner.

"Over time, we will have less dealers," he said. "But up front, your local GM dealer should be open for business, ready to sell or service your vehicle ... If a dealer is going to be affected over a period, we'll let each and every customer know, probably several times, so we can have an

orderly migration to another GM dealer."

Being a rural dealership and the only new car retailer in Baker County likely helped keep Pineview off the closure list.

"We also carefully considered our dealer network coverage in rural areas," said Mr. Henderson. "We wanted to make sure that we maintained the strong competitive advantage we have in rural areas — in some cases, and on average, more than 10 points in market share."

The restructuring agreement means the federal government takes a 60 percent ownership share in GM, once the stalwart of American car manufacturers. GM, along with Ford and Chrysler, which is also in bankruptcy, have been beset the past decade by declining sales and stiff competition by foreign manufacturers that can deliver cars and trucks to the domestic market at lower prices.

The foreign-based companies are less burdened by union wages, benefits and work rules.

CODE ENFORCEMENT BOARD

Junk vehicles triggering fines

A property north of Macclenny used to store abandoned vehicles from a local mechanic's shop in violation of county codes has racked about \$5000 in code enforcement fines in the last five years, and more are likely on the horizon.

Bobby Ray Kirkland's lot at 6309 Bob Kirkland Rd. contains about 20 such vehicles that his son, Robbie Kirkland, said are mostly from customers who never paid their bills. But they've been there for more than a year.

The younger Mr. Kirkland appeared before the Code Enforcement Board in April 2008 on his father's behalf for the same violation, he pledged to work towards gaining titles to the vehicles and sell them for scrap.

"You get a little — about \$100 a car," he told the code board during its meeting June 8, where he said once again he'd attempt to have the titles transferred.

When asked how long that would take, he responded, "Maybe a couple of months, maybe longer."

The board gave him 10 days. If the violation isn't corrected by June 18, the four-member quorum of the seven-member body voted unanimously to impose a \$100 fine, plus another \$20 per day penalty for each

day the violation persists, for a maximum of 180 days.

All cases found to be in violation by the board are also subject to an \$85 administrative fee.

In other cases: • The board gave the brother of Louise Williams 20 days to finish razing a mobile home on her Margaretta property at 9661 CR 139 before facing a one-time fine of \$50 and 10 days until in compliance, for up to 180 days.

"We will get that out," promised Dale Williams, the brother. "It's all the way down to the steel."

Consideration of an additional violation for a second abandoned and unsafe mobile home on the property was postponed until next month's code enforcement meeting.

Mr. Williams said his sister hoped to repair the second trailer, however; county staff will determine if a third mobile home is on the same parcel and whether it constitutes a zon-

ing violation.

• Willie Griffis will have 30 days to repair or replace a fence and remove refuse from his Sanderson property at 13832 Bay St. or face a \$100 fine plus \$15 per day until the violations are corrected, for up to 180 days.

• The code board ordered fines of \$150 and \$25 per day for up to 180 days to induce Kevin Manley to correct an excessive refuse violation at his north Sanderson property on Annie Mae Paige Rd. Building Inspector Bobby Griffin said the lot contained four unregistered vehicles and household debris.

• The board gave Clarence and Syretha Taylor 30 days to clean up refuse at their Macclenny property, 8869 W. Ben Row Circle, or face fines of \$100 and \$15 per day for a maximum of 180 days until the violation is corrected.

• Consideration of vehicle and refuse violations at 8400 Brown Rd. in Macclenny and owned by the late Glendel Shedd was postponed until next month. The property is in probate.

• Violations for the presence of a donkey and other animals at Fred Sanford's Macclenny property at 6247 George Hodges Rd. were also postponed. Mr. Sanford has appealed to the Baker County Commission for a special exception to permit the animals on his lot. That request is set to be heard June 15.

Tax sale bidders, interest yields up

Roughly 30 bidders bought 998 delinquent tax certificates valued at close to a million dollars during the annual tax collectors office auction held June 1, the deadline for paying property taxes.

"It's our first time doing the sale when we didn't have to write anything off to the county," explained Barbara Yarbrough of the tax office. "This year, they bought everything."

Any unsold certificates are usually held by the county until the back taxes are paid and serve as liens against the property.

Property owners who don't pay up within three years with interest — as high as 18 percent in some cases — run the risk of having their parcels sold on the courthouse steps to the highest bidder.

The results of this year's auction are likely a sign of the tough economic climate for both landowners missing the payment deadline and bidders hoping to profit from the lapse.

The number of delinquent parcels increased by six percent over last year and the amount of unpaid taxes rose by about 22 percent to \$981,345.

The biggest delinquent tax certificate — about \$51,000 — was the unpaid bill for the Cornerstone shopping center on South 6th Street.

Auctioning off tax certificates to third parties willing to cover the taxes and accept the lowest interest rate on repayment of the debt helps the tax collector ensure timely payment of almost all taxes. Properties with less than \$100 in unpaid taxes are not eligible for the auction.

Another change this year was a sizable jump in the interest rates bid during the auction.

Tax Collector Gene Harvey estimated this year's average at about 15 percent, or four percent above last year's average.

"People are still scared to spend a lot of money, so if they do spend it, they want to get a pretty good return," he said.

This year bidders also seemed less competitive than usual.

"They kept [interest rates] really high," said Ms. Yar-

brough. "There was a lot more competition last year."

Bidders must wait two years to collect on the debt, however.

The interest rates increase about one percent a month until the bid amount is reached, though bidders are guaranteed at least a five percent return regardless of how soon the taxes are paid.

If they aren't paid after three years, certificate holders can pursue for up to four more years a court-ordered sale of the property to the highest bidder to satisfy the certificate.

Owners are given many notifications and opportunities to pay their delinquent taxes before the land is sold, Ms. Yarbrough said.

Boost in delinquent tax sales

Each year on June 1 the tax collectors office auctions off delinquent property tax certificates to third parties willing to pay the back taxes now and accept the lowest interest rate on repayment of the tax debt. Property owners have three years to pay the taxes plus interest, after which their land can be auctioned in a court-ordered sale to satisfy the tax certificate.

BCHS classrooms hit

Janitor reports suspicious vehicle

The sheriff's department is looking into thefts and vandalism at several classrooms at Baker County High School in the late hours of June 1 or early the next morning.

It appeared the intruder or intruders had key access to five classrooms that night, and laptops belonging to teachers Kristal Steiner and Donna Gun-gonious were missing. They are worth about \$1000 each.

Teachers returning the next morning for one of the final days of work following summer dismissal the previous Friday also found vandalism and damage in the classrooms of Cecil Wilkerson and Faith Fly. In the former's auto body shop, an unsuccessful attempt was made to enter a cabinet with valuable tools.

Night custodian Alberto Hawthorne told campus deputy Tracie Benton he noticed a late model Jeep Cherokee parked near the band building that night, and it drove off as he approached it. He believes a white male was at the wheel.

School officials cross checked enrollment and found a trio of students who had classes with the teachers involved. They were to be questioned.

In other cases, Teresa Vaughn, 47, of Macclenny first denied then admitted she was the person caught on surveillance tape taking a \$30 lamp from Fraser Memorial Hospital the afternoon of June 2. She was charged with burglary and petty theft.

A criminal complaint was filed alleging that David Pemberton, 26, of Macclenny took several items connected with tattooing from Michael Prevatt on Tall Pine Rd. between June 2-4.

Deputy Jeff Dawson said he interviewed the accused at his residence on 8th St., and Mr. Pemberton said he took the property valued at \$260 because he was finishing a tattoo on a female friend.

When informed he needed a tattooing license, Mr. Pemberton replied, "I don't need a license. I'm just practicing."

The complaint is for unlawful tattooing and petty theft.

Karen Rhoden of Macclenny told police her credit card was used to make unauthorized purchases from two perfume shops, one in Rhode Island, and other Internet buys. She reported the fraud on June 2.

Felon charged with store heists

The sheriff's department as expected has charged a convicted felon with the twin armed robberies of convenience stores in Macclenny on two Sunday mornings in early and late May.

Deangelo Thomas, 29, of Macclenny turned himself in at county jail on June 3 and a sheriff's investigator said the key link to his alleged involvement was the dating code on a pack of Newport cigarettes he took during the holdup of the Kangaroo station on US 90 on May 31.

Mr. Thomas told officers the morning of May 31 he purchased the cigarettes at a Shell station store in Lawley. Investigator Randy Crews noted in his report that coding on Newports in four stores in that area did not match that on the pack found at the sus-

pect's residence on Joan St.

A prison canine tracking team followed a scent that morning west from the Kangaroo across from the county courthouse to near Mr. Thomas' address, where he gave permission for the house search.

The suspect was also implicated strongly by his close resemblance to the gunman in the two robberies. Video surveillance images depict a black male of his size entering both stores about 7:00 on May 10 at the Quick N Handy on North 6th and at the Kangaroo the last day of the month.

The bandit brandishes a black semi-automatic pistol and his head is covered with a cloth. He is wearing what appears to be the same pair of long black shorts

and has another cloth over his right hand, ostensibly to avoid leaving fingerprints. Police say the voice patterns and other articles of clothing in both videos are similar.

The take from Quick N Handy was estimated at \$250; from Kangaroo \$172 plus the cigarettes.

Mr. Thomas, whose address is listed in Raiford, FL, was released a year ago after serving five years of an eight-year prison sentence for robbing the Amoco station in downtown Macclenny in 2002.

Alleged fraud against a lawyer

Felony criminal complaints were filed last week against a Macclenny couple for defrauding a Neptune Beach lawyer of \$1382 using her credit card terminal and by diverting checks written by two of her clients.

The victim is Maria Rogers, who maintains public defender conflict offices in both Macclenny and Jacksonville. The principal suspect in the bizarre chain of events is Glen Rafuse, 21, who was assigned by the court to perform community service hours at Ms. Rogers' local office.

According to a lengthy affidavit filed by the attorney as part of the case record, she said Mr. Rafuse began working for her in a num-

ber of office clerk roles in March of this year. She fired him May 11 after learning of the alleged fraud that transferred \$1142 in bogus refunds from credit accounts and two client checks worth \$240.

The money was transferred into an account at Mercantile Bank in the name of Mr. Rafuse's wife Starlene, 27, of the same address in the Deerfield Subdivision of SR 228.

Sheriff's investigator David Morgan said Mr. Rafuse admitted the allegations during a videotaped interview on June 2. He said he urged Lenee Purdy, a client of Ms. Rogers, to leave the payee line blank on checks for \$100 and \$140, then he deposited them

in the Mercantile account. The remaining transfers were in the form of credits into Ms. Rafuse's credit card account.

Ms. Rogers' affidavit also accuses Mr. Rafuse of violating the law against non-lawyers dispensing legal advice, of signing her up for a \$14,000 advertising package and committing for a telephone system valued at \$3200. Those alleged acts occurred in Duval County.

The state attorney's office in Baker County will make determinations on charging the Rafuse couple with grand theft, forgery and passing forged instruments.

Pays for copper to avoid 'trouble'

A federal probationer denied stealing a roll of copper wire from a construction site between June 1-3, but ended up paying for it on the condition that the victim not pursue criminal charges.

Robert Muse reported the wire missing from a project off Canal Rd. southeast of Macclenny, and a witness reported seeing Timothy Burnsed, 38, of Macclenny on the property on June 1, about the time Mr. Muse said it went missing.

According to Deputy Jerald Peterson, Mr. Burnsed said he was on federal probation and "could not afford to get in any type of trouble."

The report did not disclose how much Mr. Muse was paid for the material.

In other cases: Jeffery Stump reported a \$100 necklace taken from his residence off Jeff Starling Road while he was away between May 30-June 3. There was no sign of forced entry, and the victim

named a possible suspect who had been at the residence.

Prescription medicines Xanax and Demerol were reported taken from the residence of Mary Cole off North Lower in Macclenny on or about May 22. She reported the theft to police

on June 1 and named as suspects two former guests.

Nothing was immediately reported missing after what appeared to be an attempted burglary at the home of Heather Scott on Cypress St. in Sanderson overnight June 1.

School retirees polish image as 'rock hounds'

They're immersed in 'lapidary' art

Don and Sharon Boyett are self-styled rock hounds. For the past 20 years, the couple, who live off Woodlawn Road, have been collecting rocks. Both are retired from the school district and spend some of their leisure time cutting and polishing rocks or making settings for rock jewelry.

"We've both always been interested in rocks and bring some back every time we travel," said Ms. Boyett. "Some rocks we find. Others we buy."

The Boyetts frequently visit North Carolina, a state that has long attracted rock enthusiasts. They enjoy staying at Old Corundum Mill Campground near the town of Franklin, where they often run into other rock hounds.

Eventually, they became friends with a stone cutter who sometimes visited the campground to demonstrate his art and sell his gemstones.

"Sharon had a gemstone she wanted cut in a checkerboard pattern and this guy told me if I could get the pattern he could cut it, so I did," said Mr. Boyett, a former BCHS teacher and football coach. "When the other women at the camp saw it, they went nuts."

The technical term for the art of polishing, cutting and faceting stones is lapidary. The surface of a gemstone is cut into planes called facets which bend and reflect light, giving gemstones their characteristic sparkle. There are hundreds of different patterns.

"I was impressed by the beauty of my gemstone," said Ms. Boyett. "Don was impressed by the cutting and polishing process and the skill it takes. He'd

been wanting to take our hobby to another level so he decided to learn to be a stone cutter too."

Mr. Boyette started checking into places that offered lapidary instruction. When the rock cutter at the camp learned of his interest, he offered to teach him. Mr. Boyett enthusiastically agreed.

The machine used to cut and polish rocks is called a Facetrone. It has a rotating wheel fitted with interchangeable sheets coated in varying grades of diamond grit. Cutting is done in two stages and the third stage polishes the finished gemstone. Because gemstones are susceptible to high temperatures, a thin stream of water continually flows over the wheel to decrease heat caused by friction. When polishing a gemstone, a special plastic called Blue Lap embedded with cerium oxide achieves the shiny finish.


Rocks are attached to an adjustable rod called a dop chuck, used to hold them at a stationary angle against the wheel during the cutting and polishing process. Throughout the three phases of cutting and polishing, the craftsman may change the rock's position dozens of times. Because of a rock's hardness and the complexity of the pattern, producing one finished gemstone may take up to a full day and on occasion, even longer.

"And even longer than that if you screw it up," said Mr. Boyett. "When that happens you pretty much have to start over with a new rock."

The exception are cabochons which are done "freehand" without a pattern and take about twenty minutes from start to finish.

Cabochon is a term for gemstones that are not transparent. They are cut and polished but not faceted. Jasper, agate, lapis lazuli and malachite are commonly cut into cabochons.

With her husband on his way to becoming a proficient stone cutter, Ms. Boyett began taking classes in the craft of wire wrapping. The technique usually utilizes sterling silver and gold plated wire and is a less costly method of creating a setting for rock jewelry. The wire can be shaped into decorative designs and Ms. Boyett has perfected a setting in the shape of an angel.

Wire wrapping is not usually used for gemstones, but cabochons lend themselves well to this type of setting.

The Boyetts have learned some interesting facts while hanging out with their rocks.

"Did you know that the only gemstone indigenous to the state of Florida actually started out as coral?"

asks Mr. Boyett. "Tampa Bay Coral is actually a gemstone because it's petrified, meaning the coral has been replaced by minerals in the same process that creates petrified wood."

"Rubies and sapphires are actually the same material," said Ms. Boyett, "but certain conditions in the environment produce one or the other."

The couple often work together at a common table in their kitchen, wearing the magnification visors necessary for the exacting work their hobby requires.

They go to festivals and art shows to demonstrate their skills and have also visited Baker County schools.

"The kids get such a kick out of all this when they see it and that's always fun to witness," said Ms. Boyett. "What I love the most about this hobby is the surprise factor — I love to see the before and after. A dull uninteresting rock can be startlingly beautiful after it's cut and polished."

"We're having a ball," said Mr. Boyett.




