## BCSO turning to 'community' plan to battle crime rise

A rising number of thefts and burglaries in recent years has Sheriff Joey Dobson calling for a return to community policing strategies.

"I think the sheriff's office in Baker County has gotten away from community policing," he said during a press conference called the afternoon of May 3 in front of television cameras from First Coast News and News4Jax.

"We've been reactive to things that are happening instead of proactive," said Sheriff Dobson. "And that we believe has caused our crime rate to rise and these things to occur."

While the sheriff said the increase in rapes, from three in 2008 to 12 the following year, is not something law enforcement can do much to prevent, he believes the 84 percent rise in burglaries and 36 percent jump in thefts during the same period can be reversed through more contact with residents.

"Those numbers are just entirely unacceptable for us," he said.

"We're a county that's always been on the negative side of crime stats. In 14 years we've been here, we had one year it went up 1.6 [percent] and then we get this of 25.9 [percent]. As you can imagine I haven't been real happy about that, because we think we can do better than that, because we always have."

The move will consist of two initiatives dubbed "Drop it-Lock it-Stop it" and "Stop-Talk-Listen."

The latter effort began last week and involves the core strategy of community policing, engaging citizens on a regular basis and build-

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## EZ Base a health risk?

### Paving base hazardous if left uncovered

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A power plant by-product marketed as an alternative to traditional road bases by the Jacksonville Electric Authority [JEA] isn't harming the environment or posing a public health risk in Baker County, according to state environmental officials.

More than 31,000 tons of the material known as EZBase has been used on Baker County roadways in recent years, but only proved troublesome for a period during 2007 and 2008 after excessive dusting was reported by residents near Claude Harvey Road, said Greg Strong, director of Florida Department of Environmental Protection's [FDEP] Northeast district.

No complaints have been received from Baker County since that time, he said.

"That being said, we are seeing other issues with the application and management of EZBase in other areas," said Mr. Strong. "We are having ongoing dialogue with JEA and property owners to resolve these problems."

Last month, County Commissioner Michael Crews pointed fellow commis-

## Mental illness: assessing the signs

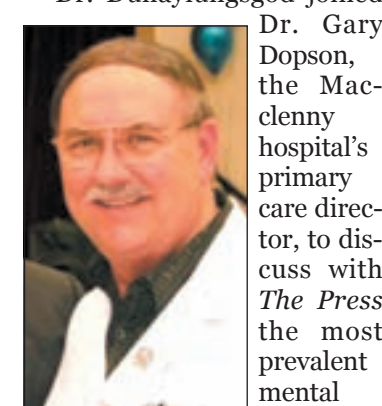

Drug abuse, an unkempt appearance, delusions and even abrupt changes in behavior can all be symptoms of mental illness.

Recognizing the warning signs and intervening early are critical to avoiding self-destructive behaviors, said Dr. Toribio Duhaylungsod, the lead psychiatrist at North-

east Florida State Hospital. Mental Health Awareness Month is observed each year in May and began in 1945.

Dr. Duhaylungsod joined

Dr. Gary Dopson, the Macclenny hospital's primary care director, to discuss with *The Press* the most prevalent mental health disorders and what people should do if their friends, family or coworkers display symptoms of them.

The most common mental health disorders are schizophrenia and a related composite condition of schizophrenia and mood disorders called *schizoaffective disorder*.

Schizophrenia afflicts about 10 percent of the general population and roughly six percent of the patients at NEFSH.

"It's a high number," Dr. Duhaylungsod said, adding that schizophrenics often have a history of substance abuse. "That's why some are very difficult to treat. They're treatment resistant."

Symptoms of schizophrenia can manifest as early as 17-18 years old, but also later in life. They include problems in school, isolation, grooming problems and talking to oneself, which can be a sign of hallucinations.

However, Dr. Dopson cautioned, the first course of action when such symptoms surface is to consult a physician, as some schizophrenic symptoms can mimic those of other medical and behavioral problems.

"You have to rule out general medical conditions and you have to rule out substance abuse," said Dr. Duhaylungsod.

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## To the V-E grads: the war seemed far off

Shortly before midnight on May 8, 1945, on the outskirts of Berlin, Germany, the final German Act of Unconditional Surrender was signed, officially putting an end to World War II in Europe.

Massive celebrations took place that day, most notably in London, Paris, Chicago, Los Angeles and New York.

In Baker County, another type of celebration was taking place, too. The 20 students of the Macclenny-Glen High School Class of 1945 were receiving their diplomas.

Standing with pride among her fellow students that day was 17-year-old Dorothy Bradley. The unselfish sacrifice of her

older brother Harold, a naval medic stationed in Guadalcanal, had made it possible for her to graduate.

Each month Harold sent his family \$12 from his pay. Without the additional money, Dorothy would have been working herself to help support the family. That precious \$12 freed her to attend school.

Among her classmates, graduation anticipation and excitement temporarily eclipsed the magnitude of the war's end in Europe.

But for Dorothy Bradley, who later became Dorothy Davis, the liberation of Europe and finally the rest of the world put a unique spin on her personal triumph. Both events have always loomed large in her memory.

"I got to attend and graduate from high school, the first person in my family to accomplish that," said Ms. Davis. "And all because of that extra \$12 each month."

Ms. Davis told of cards, pre-printed by the War Department that sometimes arrived in the mail from her brother. Since letters were censored, the pre-printed cards with optional check-off messages moved

without hindrance through the mail system.

The message checked off on Ms. Davis' card reads:

*I have not heard from you recently.*

She still has the card.

No one had a television set, but they sometimes saw a newsreels about the war at the movies. Although nearly everyone had a family member fighting

overseas, Ms. Davis said that she and her classmates were young and carefree and were somewhat shielded from the harshest realities of the war.

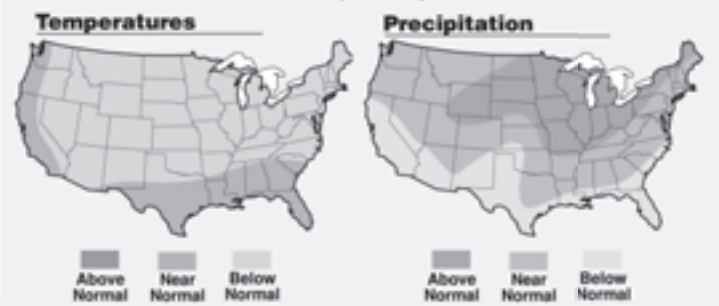

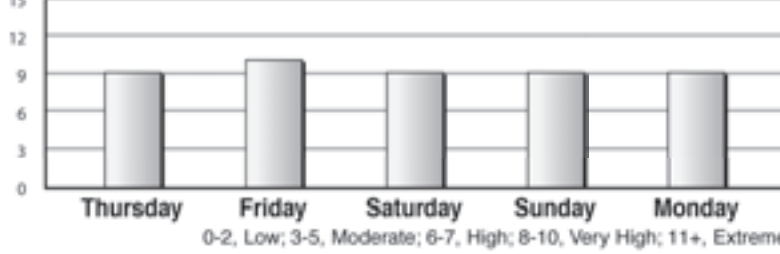

 god.  
 And should a family doctor or emergency room physician determine a patient's symptoms are indeed indicative of mental illness, then patients should consult a psychiatrist.

Top five most common diagnoses for mental health illness:

- Schizophrenia
- Schizoaffective disorder
- Mood disorder
- Dementia
- Personality disorder

The NEFSH physicians recommended the same actions for any form of mental illness, not just schizophrenia.  
 NEFSH patients come from a large swath of the state including Northeast and Central Florida, but it's the state hospital's affiliate — Community Behavioral Healthcare Services on Lowder Street — that offers mental health assistance solely to residents of Baker County.

Calling police is also an option when persons become violent or show signs of harming themselves or others. Those deemed by authorities as a threat to themselves or others can be taken into custody and ordered by a judge into treatment under the Baker Act.

People suffering from schizoaffective disorder typically have symptoms of schizophrenia, but also mood disorders like depression or mania, which is characterized by hyperactivity, extreme optimism, rapid speech and agitation or irritation.

For instance, schizoaffective sufferers may have the hallucinations and disorganized thought processes of schizophrenia and a lack of initiative common to depression.

Family history can also serve as a warning sign for schizophrenic disorders.

"It's not hereditary," Dr. Duhaylunggod said, "but the chances are higher."

Bipolar disorder, the third most common mental illness, is another mood disorder in which patients display cyclical mood swings from severe depression to severe mania and back again.

Dementia is the fourth most prevalent mental illness.

The NEFSH doctors said that while it's more common among elderly people, dementia isn't exclusive to the age group. Drug abuse that's more common

among young people can cause dementia too.

A typical symptom is forgetfulness, but dementia is often coupled with other conditions, Dr. Dopson said.

"One day, you just don't know how to get home," added Dr. Duhaylunggod. "It's a slow progressive illness. Reagan was displaying symptoms while he was still president."

There is also no treatment for dementia, which usually necessitates placement in assisted living facilities or nursing homes.

Alzheimer's is a common form of dementia that largely afflicts seniors.

"They become a walking dead person," Dr. Duhaylunggod said. "They can't identify their family or know their own name."

Alzheimer's typically appears in the 50-60 age range and progresses fairly quickly.

The fifth most common type of mental illness are personality disorders, which include a host of sub-disorders like multiple-personality, paranoid personality and anti-social or sociopathic personality.

Those in the latter group usually end up in jail, Dr. Dopson said.

"The War in the Pacific would go on until August 1945 when they dropped the atomic bomb on Hiroshima and Nagasaki," said Ms. Davis. "The end of the war did mean one immediate thing to us — an end to rationing."

Ms. Davis remembers working on the family farm in the summer of 1941 to raise and sell strawberries. She used her strawberry money to order a pair of stockings and white shoes from a catalog to wear at her eighth grade graduation ceremony. After that, shoes became a precious commodity.

"Shoes were rationed during the war years along with just about everything else like butter, sugar, meat, tires and gasoline," she said. "You had to have a coupon to buy shoes. There was a type of canvas shoes you could get without a coupon. My sister and I wore the same size so we shared those canvas shoes."

According to Ms. Davis, the streets of Macclenny were bustling on Saturday evenings as the town filled with young soldiers and sailors from Camp Blanding and Cecil Field.

"Those young men were from towns and farms all over America. They came to 'seize the moment' as it was called because the future was so uncertain," she said.

Romances blossomed between soldiers and local girls and sometimes there were marriages.

"Some of those unions endure to this day," she said.

With the 65th anniversary of VE-Day approaching, Ms. Davis has been watching documentaries on WWII such as "The Liberators." She is grateful the stories of the "Greatest Generation" are being told because so many are now advanced in years and passing away rapidly.

When she visited the Holocaust Museum in Washington D.C. recently, it hit home how little she and her classmates actually knew about the atrocities committed by the Nazi regime at that time.

It has made her even more grateful, she said, that "the reign of terror" did not come ashore to this country.

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# The 'aggrieved' attack Arizona

Another "howl" in the wake of the Arizona law is it will result in a "Your papers, please" mentality reminiscent of Hollywood's portrayal of Nazi Germany.

The authors of that law are well schooled in what the courts have said about profiling and unlawful search and seizure.

The law does not allow police to seek im-

migration status documents from people willy nilly. They can only do so via "lawful contact" like a traffic stop.

Is it unconstitutional for the cops to ask us for our license and proof of insurance during traffic stops?

What the professionally aggrieved don't tell you is that people with permission to be in this country on work visas are already required to have documentation at all times.

The very suggestion, as Mr. Obama voiced, that Hispanics can now be officially harassed when they take their kids out for ice cream is blatant nonsense, not to mention inflammatory and unrepresentative. But then again.

One commentator said this week that protests of the Arizona law are akin to a group of burglars gathering to object to the fact that you upgraded the anti-theft alarm system in your home.

"Get some 'real' doctors out here and let them use it to serve our county. I know

my heart doctor is looking for a place out here to come and serve this community."

Deborah Bitler-Starling:

"I say renovate it and use it for juvenile detention. That way if our youth get in trouble, they have a local place to go."

Cathy Johannes Rhoden:

"If it is renovated, why couldn't they keep inmates awaiting court until they have been for 1st appearance or use it for working inmates? Like community service, work release service could be handled from there for easier check in and out verses the larger jail that would require more security to maintain control on items being brought into the jail. Also check in for PO could be handled here."

Marsha Bennett:

"I'm sure there will be a cost analysis to determine how much of the county's money (taxpayers' money) it will take to keep two facilities in operation ... I see

there not enough room in the new jail to house local as well as federal inmates? If there is ample room, it would appear to be more cost effective to house them all in one location rather than have double the expenses (electricity, personnel, food, maintenance and upkeep on the building). As a taxpayer, I'd like to see budget expenditures kept at a minimum, if at all possible. However, if the space is needed to house locals, well, there it sits. I don't think I'd tear down a perfectly good building already outfitted for the purpose. A list of pros and cons would be helpful. Thankfully, I hold no decision-making position."

# Urged to take 'green' measures

## Community garden for food bank; paper recycling

The Baker County Commission went about making the county greener the evening of May 4, in more ways than one.

The board approved both the development of a community garden intended to help supply the Samaritan food bank on US 90 with fresh fruits and vegetables and the placement of a public paper recycling bin on county property.

The request for placement of the recycling bin came from Boy Scout leader Greg Shepard and Joseph Anderson of Paper Retriever Recycling, a subsidiary of the paper and wood products manufacturer AbitibiBowater.

Mr. Shepard leads a co-ed youth group that hopes to build an environmental stewardship project around the bin, which Paper Retriever will maintain free of charge.

"Long term, we'd like to see these at the county dumps," Mr. Shepard told commissioners.

Paper products disposed of in Paper Retriever's 7-cubic-yard bin will be used at AbitibiBowater paper mills, Mr. Anderson explained, eliminating such waste from garbage bound for the New River landfill.

He also said the youth group will be paid for each ton of paper that makes it into the bin.

Paper Retriever already operates in other Northeast Florida counties including Duval, Clay and St. Johns.

Then, one of the Baker County Farmers Market's chief organizers, Helene Guest of Lawtey, requested permission to use about

one of the county's six acres adjacent to the sheriff's complex off CR 228 N. for a community garden.

"It's something very near and dear to my heart," said Ms. Guest, an avid gardener. "Our economy has not recovered and there are still people suffering."

The Samaritan food bank, located between Macclenny and Glen St. Mary on the south side of US 90, receives donations from local grocers and the Walmart Distribution Center, but much of the supply is non-perishable packaged foods lacking in nutritional value.

"The food, as fast as it comes to the shelves of the food bank, it goes right back out," she said. "It's usable to eat, but it's not fresh produce."

Ms. Guest also pointed to the educational benefits the community garden could offer students and others eager to learn how to grow fruits and vegetables at home. She said school field trips to begin planting in the fall have been coordinated already.

"Teaching that to children — service to others — should be a part of their everyday life," said Ms. Guest, who retired this year as the manager of Macclenny's Wachovia Bank branch. "I'm really excited to get started. We just need the land."

With the commission's blessing, the site will be cleared of what Ms. Guest described as small saplings and a fence is also planned. Ms. Guest said she's secured sponsors to cover such costs and therefore wasn't re-

questing any funding from the county.

The board at one time planned to construct a county administration building on the land, but a lack of grant funding tabled the project.

"Since we're on hold with our project, it sounds like a good fit," said commission chairman Alex Robinson.

In other business that evening:

- Despite a county-wide freeze on hiring and pay raises, commissioners decided to increase the salary of IT specialist Clint Shivers by \$15,000 in an effort to keep him from taking a similar position at Northeast Florida State Hospital.

Mr. Shivers had been paid \$35,134 and will now receive \$48,200.

County Manager Joe Cone and the board heard from a number of department heads expressing the desire to keep Mr. Shivers on board. He maintains all of the county's computers and software, including those at the courthouse, assists with voting machine testing prior to elections and maintains public records databases of the clerk of court and tax collector offices.

Mr. Cone recommended the raise given the costs associated with hiring and training a replacement, even if someone with sufficient qualifications could be hired at Mr. Shivers' existing salary.

"It's not a good business decision," he said of not giving the pay hike.

sioners to a "blistering" article appearing in Jacksonville's *Folio Weekly* about the material's safety, specifically its use on a residential property in Middleburg.

"Before we use any more of that material," Mr. Crews cautioned, "we should make sure it's not hurting folks."

The largest application of EZ-Base in the county was more than 18,000 tons applied to Claude Harvey Road before it was paved with asphalt, which seals the base and prohibits the spread of toxins found in the material.

The fly-ash and lime rock mixture comes from JEA's Northside Generation Station, a coal-burning power plant.

EZBase contains arsenic, lead, mercury and many other metals. According to a material safety data sheet from the US Department of Labor's Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) on EZBase, it also has seven other "hazardous components."

The data sheet specifically warns that prolonged inhalation of one of the components, silicon dioxide, can cause chronic bronchitis and a lung-scarring condition called silicosis.

Skin or eye contact with EZ-Base is not recommended, nor is allowing it to become dry and dusty, which makes dangerous contact more likely.

Nonetheless, FDEP condones the proper use of EZBase, and has since 2005.

FDEP officials said problems arise when the material's applied inappropriately without respect for department guidelines, like using the it upon delivery so it doesn't dry out and become airborne.

"The main thing is you try to keep it contained and don't let it go out anywhere," said Robert Fletcher, the county's road department director. "Once it's sealed down and rolled, you're OK. You just have to keep it from migrating into wetlands and keep it out of ditches and swales. That's the main concern."

EZBase is also not supposed to be left uncovered at sites adjacent to wetlands, water bodies or roadside ditches; which occurred on the Claude Harvey project in October 2007 and again at Little St. Mary's Park in June 2008.

Mr. Fletcher said a contractor hired by JEA to market EZBase failed to provide the proper di-

rections. JEA eventually did so itself after firing the contractor.

"We didn't have the official, appropriate directions on how to use it," he said. "[The contractor] did a poor job of educating people."

FDEP hasn't seen any evidence of harmful impacts from more recent applications of EZ-Base at St. Mary's Shoals Park off Odis Yarborough Road.

JEA has been sampling water at the park, including Cedar Creek and ditch lines, and reporting the results to FDEP's Tallahassee office for the last six months.

"There's been no red flags or indications that the material is going to cause a problem in the environment," said Lee Martin, an FDEP engineer with that office.

The testing will continue for six more months.

The park's main entrance and parking area, which is covered with EZBase, is set for paving later this summer. A secondary entrance with EZBase — Fred Taylor Road — is not apart of that project, Mr. Fletcher said.

EZBase has also been applied, and remains uncovered, at Glen Nursery. It was used on the newly-relocated Glen Nursery Road that runs adjacent to the interstate and connects with Reid Stafford Road.

FDEP was unaware of that project until an April 23, when notified of it by *The Press*, and sent an inspector to investigate the site south of I-10 and west of CR 125.

"The EZBase application

looked good; however, there were some cracks in the EZBase so we will be asking JEA to rework the material to eliminate the cracks," said FDEP spokeswoman Jodi Conway.

As for the future use of EZBase in Baker County, Mr. Fletcher said it's not out of the question.

"Unless we plan to pave over it, we probably won't use it anymore, just because of the bad publicity," he said. "Ultimately, it will be up to the [county commission]."

In addition to the roads described above, EZBase has been used on Denise Street, Deerwood Circle, James Britt Road, Ruben Crawford Road, Thomas Road, Rufus Powers Road, Ruise Lane, Thomas Sweat Road, Woodlawn Cemetery Road and a residential property owned by Gary and Janet Smother at 12737 N. SR 121. All are paved today.

ing relationships that can help prevent and solve crimes.

"What this requires is that 10 minutes out of every hour on a deputy's 12-hour shift, they will have some community interaction," explained the sheriff. "They will either be in businesses — they'll turn off their cars; that's going to help us on gas consumption — or they're going to get into neighborhoods, talk to kids, talk to parents and find out what are their concerns that the sheriff's office can help with."

That interaction is mandatory for officers on patrol and those higher up the chain of command.

"They won't have a choice," Mr. Dobson said. "Ten minutes of every hour they work on a shift, they will be doing something, and we'll be keeping stats on that. How many citizens have we spoken to; how many businesses have we been in ... They're going to document that we're doing it."

The "Drop it-Lock it-Stop it" initiative will also involve interaction with residents and business owners outside the normal scope of responding to crimes after they happen.

As deputies travel the community, they'll be looking for open garages, unlocked doors and other things that increase the risk of crime. They'll also be stopping by businesses regularly to make themselves more visible, and in turn, deter criminal behavior.

"We can stop crime before it occurs," Sheriff Dobson said. "We're going to help our citizens look at their homes and their neighborhoods to help us find ways to prevent a burglary or theft. That deals with garage doors, bicycles in the yard or toys in the yard; boats, rods and reels, or anything of that nature that we think they need to be made aware of."

The sheriff believes the days when residents could leave their doors unlocked are gone.

"We're not the same Baker County we used to be, therefore we can't act like we used to," he said. "That's a sad day for us that we can't have those kind of good feelings, but if we can get the community involved along with deputies riding in the neighborhoods and by businesses, we think we can lower our crime rate."

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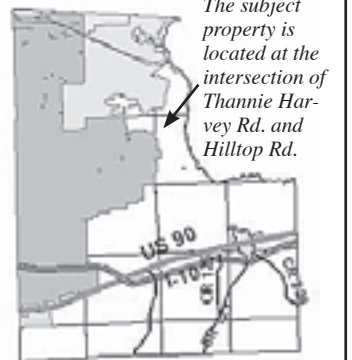

# O'Neal 'insulted' in Alachua

Alachua County and City of Gainesville commissioners rebuffed New River landfill director Darrell O'Neal the afternoon of April 29, asking that he not deliver a 15-minute presentation responding to what he called misstatements made earlier in the month by Alachua County's major trash hauler to both bodies.

"It was pretty insulting," Mr. O'Neal said the following day.

The director had traveled with Karen Cossey, chairwoman of New River's board of directors, to the 1:00 pm joint meeting between the two commissions.

They waited for more than an hour to speak, but after Mr. O'Neal approached the podium, Cynthia Moore Chestnut, Alachua's board chairwoman, and Gainesville Mayor Pegeen Hanrahan suggested the presentation be withheld so that Waste Management, operator of the Chesser Island landfill in southern Georgia that's competing with New River for disposal of Alachua's commercial garbage, could present alongside New River.

"Admittedly I won't have to sit through [Mr. O'Neal's presentation] if we put it off, but would it be better to have them compared side by side, rather than hearing this today and the other one a later day?" asked the mayor.

"I think it may be better, to have the whole complete picture," said Ms. Chestnut. "I'd like to hear them both together."

Some of commissioners didn't even want to keep color copies passed out that day of the presentation.

"Why don't we even return them, and then you can bring it back," Ms. Chestnut said.

In mid-April, Emerald Waste Services [EWS], the exclusive residential trash hauler in Alachua County and Gainesville and a non-exclusive commercial hauler, made presentations to both municipal commissions that cited New River's abundance of cash reserves and overly-generous "dividend" payments to the landfill's member counties — Baker, Bradford and Union.

Specifically, Mr. O'Neal said he hoped to address EWS's assertion that New River has \$20 million in reserves. The director intended to argue that \$14 million of that sum is "closure funds" required by the facility's Florida Department of Environmental Protection permit.

The department mandates that landfills have funds available should the department order them to shutdown.

Mr. O'Neal said further that most of the remaining reserves, all but about \$1 million, have been designated for future expenses.

"Everything else is obligated," he said.

This year EWS began diverting thousands of tons of its commercial waste from Alachua County's publicly-owned transfer station, which is contractually obligated to dispose of the waste at New River, to a transfer station it purchased from Waste Management on Bear Archer Road.

The diversion will cost New River an es-

timated \$2.2 million annually, according to Mr. O'Neal. It's also causing Alachua County's transfer station to operate at a loss.

The station's tipping fee is more than \$50 a ton, about \$30 of which pays for the tipping fee at New River. That led Alachua County to request a \$2.50 reduction in New River's fee earlier this month in hopes of recouping waste diverted from its transfer station.

These recent events have made it difficult for New River staff to begin estimating next year's revenues for budgetary purposes. The landfill's board usually adopts its budget in advance of the member counties, which must approve a budget by September 31, the end of the fiscal year.

Nonetheless, Mr. O'Neal intends to proceed as if no commercial waste will come from Alachua County. That will mean using the unobligated reserve funds, nearly \$1 million, for planning the 2010-11 budget.

"That's our stop gap until we see what Alachua County will do," he said.

Alachua County and Gainesville officials are reviewing options to better control the area's waste stream.

One avenue is passing ordinances to bid out exclusive hauling franchises and mandate that commercial waste is taken to Alachua's transfer station, and in turn New River.

New River's board of directors, in a letter to Alachua County this month, stated it would only consider a tipping fee reduction if the county gained control of its waste stream, presumably through exclusive franchises.

# Truck thieves captured

Two escaped prisoners from a west Georgia county were caught the morning of April 26 driving a pickup truck that had been stolen from a farm north of Macclenny near the state line.

Chief sheriff's investigator Chuck Brannan said he was notified by a detective in Liberty County, GA that morning after the 2001 Nissan was stopped and determined to be stolen.

The truck's owner, Ronald Francis, had reported it was missing from his property the previous evening, and police also learned another vehicle used by the escapees from Harris County was found abandoned on Farley Burned Rd. in Charlton County just north of the state line.

The inmates were identified as Jammaal Castilla, 22, a federal prisoner, and Joe William Seaborn, 37, who was being detained by Harris County.

Maj. Brannan had no details on the escape or the inmates' criminal record.

"We figure they left the other car just over the line and walked to the farm near Twin Bridges,

took the truck and headed back north again on 121 toward Folkston and northeast to near Hinesville where they were caught," said the investigator.

Baker County issued warrants for grand theft, but likely the local charges will be dropped in lieu of others in the Georgia counties.

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# Logging fire investigation

A state fire marshal is looking into the circumstances of a fire that destroyed and damaged logging equipment off Jack Dugger Rd. north of Sanderson on April 30.

County fire chief Richard Dolan said units responded to the remote area off CR 124 about 5:30 that afternoon and found that a log skidder was burned and a loading machine and trailer damaged.

About 2.3 acres of surrounding land was burned, as were logs that had been loaded on a trailer.

Chief Dolan had yet to get a damage estimate as of May 4. The equipment belonged to W. Long Logging of Old Town, and a crew had been at the site earlier that morning until about 10:00.

It appeared from the damaged equipment the fire had been burning for some time before it was noticed.

The afternoon of May 1, a double-wide mobile home belonging to Kenneth Gainey was destroyed by a fire believed started by a

power strip extension cord overload.

The largely vacant structure was nearly destroyed when volunteers arrived after the alarm at about 4:30. No one was injured.

Chief Dolan said the cord ran into the trailer from a nearby residence.

Police investigated several other incidents involving theft and vandalism to vehicles the past week:

- Brandon Staley, 22, of Sanderson was arrested for theft of mud tires and chrome wheels from an address on Brent Lane in south Macclenny overnight on April 26. The tires belonged to Dustin Whitney and the theft was reported April 27.

- Deputy Matt Sigers also arrested Damon Mann, 19, of Glen St. Mary after the tires were found in the kitchen of his trailer on Hambone Lane. He is charged with dealing in stolen property.
- Someone took a tool box and

tools valued at \$1500 from the rear of a 2000 Chevrolet pickup parked overnight April 26 on Adam Rd. south of Macclenny.

The tools were the property of Harvey Harris of Gray, Tennessee, as was a cooler filled with iced-down fish. It was valued at \$100.

- A 2003 Chevrolet van belonging to Baker County and parked behind the health department was damaged sometime during the weekend April 23-26. Pieces of brick were thrown at the vehicle.

- A 14-year-old male who lives in the neighborhood was named in a criminal complaint for theft of two bicycles overnight May 2 belonging to David Hill on MLK Dr. in Macclenny.

Deputy David Nichols said he came upon the suspect with one of the bikes about 4:00 am while on routine patrol. Both were recovered.

# Arrests after guns are fired at melee

Both parties to a confrontation late on May 1 during which shots were fired from two guns were arrested later for aggravated assault.

Charged with third-degree felonies after police sorted out the events that took place on Vicki Dr. off Woodlawn Rd. were Travis Crawford, 24, of Macclenny and Timothy Leighton, 27, of Maxwell.

The latter suspect was in a vehicle driven by his mother that was stopped near Interstate 10 and SR 228 by Sgt. Brad Dougherty about 12:20 the morning of May 2.

Police were investigating a report that shots were fired, and Deputy Shawn Bishara said Mr. Leighton was returned to the scene where Mr. Crawford was detained.

The two apparently argued in the presence of Rachel Crawford, the estranged wife of Mr. Crawford and until recently the girlfriend of Mr. Leighton.

The words escalated before Mr. Crawford allegedly reached into his vehicle for a .22 caliber rifle that he fired several times in the direction of Mr. Leighton, who took off running into a nearby residence where he retrieved a .12 gauge shotgun.

He allegedly fired that weapon into the air to scare off Mr. Crawford, who then left the scene. The shotgun was retrieved from the residence and the rifle from a wooded area aside the Country Club Lounge on South 6th.

In other reports:

- Benjamin Martin, 23, of Glen St. Mary was arrested for domestic battery on his wife Paula, 24, outside Mercantile Bank just after noon of April 29.

The wife, who is employed at the bank, told Deputy John Hardin she and her husband argued about use of a vehicle and he snatched keys from her hand, causing a laceration. She also alleged she was held briefly against her will.

- Criminal complaints for domestic battery were filed against both parties involved in an argument the evening of April 27 over custody of their infant son.

Deputy Larry Clark said Dan Hope, 27, denied acting aggressively against Xavier Ruise, 25, when she came to his residence on MLK Dr. about 7:30 to pick up the baby.

The mother claimed the baby was not being properly cared for, an allegation that Deputy Clark said was not borne out by an inspection of the child and the condition of Mr. Hope's residence.

# Historic Glen Nursery bell is recovered

An historic bell stolen from the Glen St. Mary Nurseries the night of March 5 was recovered last week at a residence north of Macclenny.

The bell, estimated to weigh around 300 pounds, was lowered from a 20-foot tower sometime during the night and police had no clues on its disappearance until it showed up in a photo taken at Scrapy Pappy's Recycling on SR 121 north.

Maj. Chuck Brannan, chief investigator at the sheriff's department, said the scrap yard owner Wilmar Bryant gave the bell to Charles Lauramore and he stored it in a barn on his property off CR 23C.

Mr. Lauramore told police he sought the

bell as a collector's item and was unaware of the theft from the nursery. It was then returned to nursery president Lin Taber, who earlier offered a \$400 reward for its recovery.

The bell is believed to be at least 110 years old and for decades was rung near the nursery office signaling the start and end of work days and lunch hours.

Maj. Brannan said police have urged Mr. Bryant to retain photographic records of scrap brought to his collection site because of the rash of stolen property turning up there.

"We'll have a more difficult time figuring out who stole the bell or who brought it there because the records are incomplete," said the

investigator.

In an unrelated case, Dustin Lee Irish, 23, of Glen St. Mary was arrested recently for fraud after he brought heavy storm water grates, rings that hold manhole covers and other iron material to the scrap yard and turned it in for cash.

Maj. Brannan said the materials were stolen from the Greystone Subdivision in east Glen St. Mary. They were stored on the property and had yet to be installed because the sagging housing market halted completion of the project.

Mr. Irish is charged with a third-degree felony because he signed an affidavit affirming he owned the property.

# Crack is found on Alt. School student

Several drug-related arrests were made in the county the past week, including that of a 15-year-old male student at the county's Alternative School found with crack cocaine in a plastic bag.

School principal John Staples told police he was searching students at the school for disciplinary problems in the early afternoon of April 29 when he found a baggie of crack in the pants pocket of the student.

Mr. Staples at the time was conducting an investigation into the theft of an iPod from another student.

The boy, with a Glen St. Mary address, was charged with felony possession and the case turned over to the Department of Juvenile Justice. He was released into the custody of a guardian.

In other felony arrests:

- Laver Chaplin, 21, of Jacksonville was charged with attempting to bring a small amount of marijuana into Baker Correctional prison the morning of May 1.

- Kemp Martin, an officer at the prison, said he found the marijuana in a baggie stuffed into Mr. Chaplin's right shoe during a routine search of visitors that morning.

The suspect told Deputy Brandon Kiser he was unaware of the pot in the shoe, which he claims belongs to a cousin who placed it there without his knowledge.

- Two brothers who live off Crews Rd. were arrested April 30 when sheriff's investigators found five marijuana plants growing in pots in the backyard of their parents' property.

- Wesley Zipperer, 22, and his 19-year-old brother David were booked for growing the drug, a third-degree felony.

Chief investigator Chuck Brannan said police were looking for stolen property in the area when Investigator Steve Harvey came upon the plants ranging from 2-12 feet in height.

"When their [the suspects'] mother Julie Theophile was asked who was growing marijuana in her backyard, she replied by pointing at her sons and stating,

"That would be them," related Investigator Brannan.

- Kimberly Ready, 19, of Vancouver, Canada was charged with having drug paraphernalia in the 1992 Nissan she was driving the evening of April 29 when it was stopped near Miltdonale and Lowder in west Macclenny.

Deputy Jason Bryan said he also charged Ms. Ready with contributing to the delinquency of minors because three males ages 15-17 were in the vehicle. One of them had a small baggie of marijuana in his pants pocket and was charged with misdemeanor possession.

The boys were from the Macclenny area. Deputy Bryan said he stopped the Nissan because one of its headlights was out. Ms. Ready was ticketed for that.

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# 'Armed,' (Jiu-Jitsu) dangerous

## Wins 1st tourney

"He was always determined, even as a baby," said Felicia Raulerson of her 16-year-old son Hampton. "When he came home last October and told us he wanted to try Jiu-Jitsu, we weren't that surprised."

What did surprise his parents, however, was their son winning his very first tournament during the Jax Brazilian Jiu-Jitsu Open. The event took place at the National Guard Armory on Normandy Boulevard on April 24.

Not bad for a guy with only seven months training.

Not bad for a guy who only has one good arm.

Hampton was born with an under-developed left arm that extends slightly below the elbow.

When asked about his victory he says winning the tournament was a great surprise to him.

"I was really surprised," he said, laughing. "Not to mention exhausted. But credit goes to my trainers. Those guys are awesome."

Hampton trains twice a week at Combat Martial Arts studio on east Macclenny Avenue. The instructors and co-owners of the studio, Steven Kish, James Collins and Chad Gaines, are extremely proud of their student's achievement.

Hampton not only beat three opponents to win but he also tapped out (forced to submit) every one of them into quitting.

Practitioners of Jiu-Jitsu defend themselves without weapons, subduing their opponents by turning their own energy against them. This branch of martial art relies heavily on holding and controlling one's opponent by the sleeves and belt of their uniform, which is known as a gi.

"There is a lot of grappling involved and usually a choke hold of some sort. It boggles my mind what Hampton is able to do," said Mr. Kish.

Energy was high at the open, with up to four matches taking place at once. Mr. Kish describes with great pleasure the experience

of witnessing Hampton take down his first opponent.

"When the guy realized he was up against someone with only one good arm, he looked over at his team with a little smirk on his face. I've seen that same look so many times on a guy's face during

competition when he walks out on the floor and his opponent is a girl. That is, until that girl whips his tail. That guy got a big surprise when Hampton quickly defeated him."

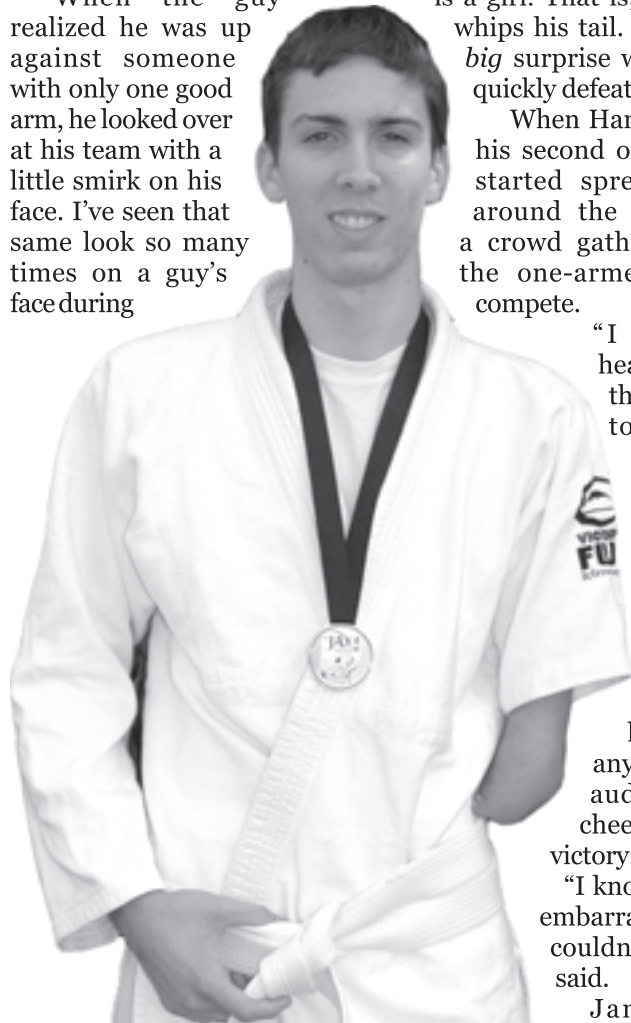
When Hampton defeated his second opponent, word started spreading rapidly around the armory. Soon a crowd gathered to watch the one-armed wonderboy compete.

"I remember hearing people in the crowd saying to each other 'Hey, you gotta come over here and see this guy!'" said Mr. Kish.

Mrs. Raulerson admits she was yelling louder than anyone else in the audience as she cheered her son to victory.

"I know it must have embarrassed him but I couldn't help it," she said.

remembers when Hampton first began at the studio. He naturally started out modifying the techniques with the idea of accommodating Hampton.

"I found out quickly that I didn't need to do that," he said. "Not with this guy."

The instructors say Hampton is very dedicated. The only time he misses class is for homework.

"Hampton is an excellent student," said Mr. Kish. "And about the humblest guy I've ever met. He's responsible and always respectful. For someone only 16, he's exceptional."

Extremely supportive parents have helped Hampton get where

he is today. From day one, Mrs. Raulerson and her husband DuShane decided to treat their son as if he was no different from anyone else.

"We never let him turn his difference into an excuse," she said. "I think that helped him develop his attitude of going after whatever he put his mind to. Whatever it is, he finds his own way to do it."

Mrs. Raulerson recalls when Hampton was just a small child and the family took him to a Shriner's Hospital where a staff member worked with the boy to help him learn to tie his shoes.

Hampton was determined to tie his own shoes with no help before they left. According to Mrs. Raulerson, the family had to wait an extra day at the facility to accommodate him.

"He wasn't going to leave until he could tie his shoes himself and so we just had to wait," she said.

Mr. Kish says they kid the young man about a similar thing at the studio which he takes in stride.

"We tease him a lot. We tell him it takes him longer to tie up the string to his gi pants than it does to defeat an opponent."

Hampton Raulerson has definite plans for his future. Currently dually enrolled, he plans to pursue a career in criminal justice.

# Earth Day at SpringFest

The 40th anniversary of Earth Day, observed nationally April 22, and the Baker County Extension Office's second annual SpringFest were celebrated at the Ag Center April 24.

Master gardeners and Baker County horticultural agent Alicia Lamborn manned information booths in front of the center to supply the public with recycling tips.

There were examples of cheerfully decorated rain barrels and a complimentary reusable cloth shopping bag from Walmart was issued to each attendee. Visitors could also register for a drawing to win free plants for their garden.

An informative and eye-catching display gave visitors lots of tips for reusing plastic containers. Such containers normally get tossed in the trash and end up in landfills where they take decades or longer to decompose. The master gardeners wanted to raise awareness of the importance of recycling such items.

One example was using plastic milk jugs as gardening tools and bird feeders.

Attendees could also take part in a variety of gardening demonstrations and presentations while their children enjoyed nature and gardening-themed craft activities.

The Plant Doctor (Dr. Kyle Brown) booth stayed busy helping gardeners get their most pressing questions and concerns addressed. The following

are some of the questions Baker County residents had.

**Question:** "My azalea blooms didn't last long and seemed to wilt quickly. What could be the cause?"

**Answer:** "It could be something called petal blight, a fungus that can become active when there is just the right combination of cool mornings and high humidity. Both those conditions came together this spring."

**Question:** "What is the best method for mulching live oak leaves?"

**Answer:** "Leaves from live oak trees are really resistant to decomposition because of their physical design and their naturally waxy surface. That makes them the slowest of leaves in North Florida to turn to mulch. To speed the process, try using the mulching blades of your lawn mower on the leaves or running them through a chipper/shredder to grind them up fine."

**Question:** "My pear trees aren't producing any fruit. Why not?"

**Answer:** "You many not have the varied species you need for cross pollination to occur. To produce fruit, at least two species of pear trees must be planted within close proximity to each other."

**Question:** "What is the best way to mix soil for planting small seeds?"

**Answer:** "It's recommended to buy bagged soil mix from the garden center for this purpose instead of trying to prepare your own from native soil. Any of the top brands will suffice, the ones that contain peat moss, perlite,

vermiculite and some bark. You can screen the soil to remove really large chunks of matter."

**Question:** "How do I control scale on my houseplants?"

**Answer:** "Scale is an insect infestation that can cause significant damage to houseplants. If it only effects a small area on one plant you can wipe off scale with rubbing alcohol and a Q-tip. For widespread infestation, move your plants outdoors to treat."

"You many need to do a soil drenching with an insecticide, one that contains Imidacloprid as an active ingredient. This is taken up through the roots to the stems and leaves and kills the scale that feed on them. These insecticides have become popular in recent years and are considered safer than others used in the past."

**Question:** "What varieties of hibiscus are best for Baker County?"

**Answer:** "Many are. Remember, they don't withstand the cold and many people lost hibiscus to the severe cold last winter. They have to be protected. All the hibiscus in the Mallow family do very well, as do the woody varieties like the altheas. Don't forget about the confederate rose, a variety of hibiscus."

**Question:** "Will blackberries grow in clay soil?"

**Answer:** "Yes, indeed. Just take a look around Georgia the next time you drive through. Blackberries thrive in all that

Georgia clay. They will certainly grow in north Florida clay."

**Question:** "We noticed good bloom on most fruit trees this year. What made it different from other years?"

**Answer:** "Fruit trees, like many plants, need a chilling period around 40 degrees. There was a prolonged cold period this last winter which resulted in some trees producing good fruit sets."

**Question:** "I've noticed a decline in the number of bees visiting my flowers and trees. Should I be concerned?"

**Answer:** "There is some concern because without adequate pollination activity from bees, plants don't bear fruit or vegetables. Spraying of pesticides and viruses spread by a certain type of mite to which the honeybees are particularly susceptible are believed to be the root of the problem."

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# Brothers looted AC components Witness followed them; scrapper ID'ed them

Two brothers are charged with grand theft and criminal mischief for stealing an air conditioner compressor and copper tubing at a residence off Crews Rd. on April 29.

David Zipperer, 19, and his brother Wesley, 22, were identified by a witness in the neighborhood who saw them leave the property of Wesley Mobley and drive to their residence in the same neighborhood. There, witness Randall Mobley said he saw the two unload materials from a Chevrolet Blazer.

Deputy William Hillard and Sgt. Bill Starling went to the residence where the brothers reside and found a top to an air conditioning unit that later matched up with the vandalized one at the Mobley residence.

The next day sheriff's investi-

gators interviewed the Zipperers, who said they were in Jacksonville on April 29 and denied involvement. They were arrested after the match-up of the air conditioner top.

Mr. Bryant also produced a form signed by David Zipperer attesting he owned the items.

The brothers were booked also for dealing in stolen property, and David Zipperer for fraud. They were also charged with felony possession for growing marijuana in pots at the Crews Rd. residence [see related story elsewhere in this edition].

## Shoplifters run from police

Mr. Strickland's wife Inez told police the couple returned from a trip to the grocery store about noon and he entered the garage where he retrieved a shotgun from a storage room.

• Kimberly Streiffert, 44, of Glen was admitted to Shands Jacksonville for treatment of a bullet wound to the shoulder and for a mental health evaluation after she shot herself at her residence on Ponsell Nursery Rd.

The associate in science nursing program's pinning ceremony will be at 2:00 the afternoon of May 7. Thirty-nine students will get degrees.

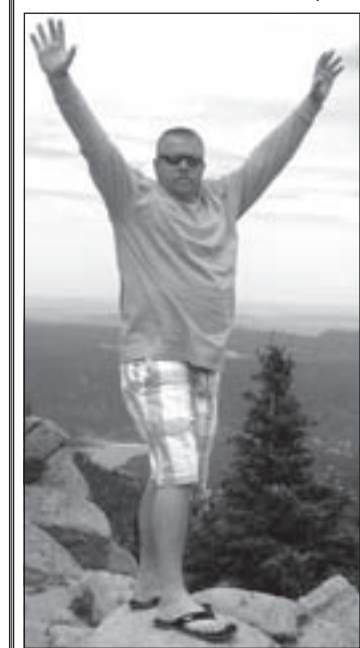
The general commencement begins at 5:00. Both are held in the Howard Conference Center.

## Sulkowski sizing up new squad for spring

As any football coach will tell you, sometimes you just have to drop back and punt. That's what the Wildcats had to do on Saturday when their plans for a Midnight Madness to open the first day of training camp was rained out.

The Jumbotron was flashing "118 days to West Nassau" as the rain pelted down on an empty parking lot. Things were different that afternoon, however as fans shielded themselves against the hottest day of the year and watched a spirited practice out on the field.

Many of the players weren't ready for the 90-degree temperatures and were clearly gassed as they bent over at the waist and held on to their knees to catch their breath. Others handled it better and impressed.

Overall, Coach Ryan Sulkowski was pleased with what he's seen so far.

"We've had two good practices," said Sulkowski. "We're looking at about 142 players total with 45 being 8th graders. The heat's been an extra obstacle but it's something that they have to get used to."

Sulkowski is sorting through the players and trying to decide who fits where. However, he knows that it will take time and that when the Cats don pads for the first time on Thursday that will change things dramatically.

"I've seen plenty of kids who look good in shorts and t-shirts who look completely different when they put on pads. That will separate the upper tier from the lower tier. Then we'll begin to see who needs more reps at what position."

Sulkowski said that a layman watching practice would see "controlled chaos" but that it all "has a rhyme and reason." The coaching staff is still understaffed and at present "we're not able to give as much individual attention as we'd like."

He laughed at the players' reaction to him now that he has put on his coach's hat.

"When they first met me they took my nice guy exterior for granted," said Sulkowski. "But football is my livelihood and on the field it's all business."

The Cats will continue to practice hard during the week and on Saturdays to prepare for the Red and White game on May 22. They will take the field at 6:00 pm in a scrimmage that will allow the coaches to see what they've learned after three weeks.

In the last five games the Cats have only committed a pair of errors and have improved their win streak to seven straight going into the regional playoffs against Episcopal on Wednesday night, May 5, at 7:00 pm at the BCHS baseball field.

"I've said all along if we don't give them any freebies we are a pretty unbeatable ball club," said Coach Staples, who is retiring after this season.

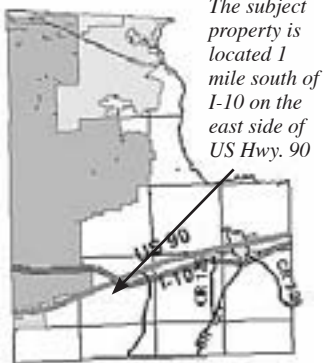
