Bank robbery suspect nabbed

A onetime Glen St. Mary resident who was released from prison in Tennessee in March is being held in the Baker County jail and likely to be charged soon with a trio of bank robberies — two in Tennessee and one in Alabama.

Douglas Terrell, 35, had apparently bragged to acquaintances in the Middleburg area about the robberies that occurred in the week after he disappeared from his residence in Lawrenceburg, TN on June 7. He expressed surprise to his girlfriend Danielle Combs, 31, of Sanderson that he pulled off the heists so easily after handling tellers notes demanding money.

Surveillance photos from the robberies forwarded to local authorities by the FBI in Nashville suggest that the man thought to be Mr. Terrell was not armed.

Baker County deputies arrested Mr. Terrell for trespass and loitering on a tract of land the morning of June 13 after being tipped off that a vehicle occupied by him and Ms. Combs had become stuck on a tram road about 200 yards east of CR 228. The property is owned by Gilman Paper and part of the ongoing Dupont mining lease, according to police.

Officers had been advised by the tipster that Mr. Terrell vowed he would not go back to prison and that police would have to kill him.

He was not armed when confronted about 8:20, said Deputy Shawn Bishara, and explained that, while he knew he was trespassing, he was driving around seeing what had changed in his absence when he became stuck. Ms. Combs claimed she was asleep, and Investigator Brad Dougherty stated later she appeared to be high on drugs.

At county jail, Ms. Combs related how she had moved to Tennessee to be near her boyfriend while he was in prison, and they remained in Lawrenceburg in the south-central part of the state near the Alabama state

McDonald's entrance closed

Barriers removed same day

Only a few hours after the City of Macclenny barricaded the northern entrance to McDonald's on S. 6th St. to stop drive-thru traffic from backing up onto Barber Road, the company decided it would voluntarily fix the problem.

The worst backups onto Barber Road occur during Saturday morning breakfast hours, said city code enforcement officer Joy Chapman.

Vehicles often pull into the drive-thru lane from the property's north side, and as more vehicles follow suit, a string of motorists begin blocking the street.

Repeated letters to a McDonald's restaurant deployment coordinator in Orlando in recent months concerning the traffic hazard solicited no response, which led to the more drastic action taken by the city

last week.

The city barricaded the Barber Road entrance to the fast food eatery the morning of June 11.

"The city is well within its rights to do that," city attorney Frank Maloney told city com-

missioners earlier that week, citing case law supporting the barricades.

Six of them stood just off the McDonald's property in the public right-of-way

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Harrell caps 35-year career sharing her love of art with BCHS students

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For over 35 years, nurturing the creative abilities of students has been at the center of Marilyn Harrell's life.

"Having leisure time to pursue my personal art endeavors and not being in a rush is what I'm looking forward to," said Marilyn Harrell, who retires this year after more than three decades as a Baker County High School art teacher.

She came to Baker County in 1975 as brand new graduate of Murray State College in Kentucky. BCHS was her first teaching job.

She never left. An art teacher can go through a lot of paint and paper, brushes and canvas in 35 years. Ms. Harrell spent last week sorting through, organizing and packing up her classroom. The memories and efforts of the many students who have passed through over the years lingers.

"This is very special," she said, pointing to a small sculpture. "Doug Register, who is now an administrator here, made this when he was my student. He kept it all these years and gave it back to me recently."

At her retirement party June 12, she displayed art by former students, many of whom traveled in for the occasion from as far as Seattle, Washington.

She is very proud of former students who have gone on to have successful careers as photographers, graphic designers, art directors, architects and engineers.

For Ms. Harrell, the fact that her art classes provided so many students the opportunity to identify and develop those aptitudes early on is a satisfying end to a wonderful career.

"Art is applied to all of life," she said. "That's what I loved teaching to my students. Everything around us, from a teacup to a desk to an airport starts as an idea and goes to the

drawing board before being produced. Somebody has to design it."

Her first day on the job at BCHS, she faced a classroom void of art supplies.

"There wasn't anything there but some old, very used paint palettes and a couple pair of broken scissors," she said. "I went to Jerry Sisk, the principal, for money and then went

shopping for paper and paint."

By February, the paper was gone and she had to hit up the principal for more money. Also, Tom Covington, a former high school coach who at the time worked for the city, located a lot of copy paper that no longer fit the copier, but was still viable for sketching.

"I still use copy paper to this day," said Ms. Harrell. "It's relatively cheap and the size fits nicely into the student's notebooks. It's indispensable for beginning drawing and working up studies for final projects."

Regarding the development of her ability as an educator, she gives a lot of credit to two special women she met early in her career through the Florida Art Educators Association. Nellie Lynch and Flo Head were art education supervisors with the Florida Department of Education.

They took the fledgling art teacher from Baker County under their wing, sharing their knowledge and resources.

"There weren't any specific guidelines for lesson plans at that time and I was writing my own," said Ms. Harrell. "Those two women

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Less cash coming in for public services

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Local government offices are facing sizable revenue losses in the 2010-11 budget year from declining taxable property values and state funding reductions.

Property Appraiser Tim Sweat estimated a 5-6 percent decline in the 2010 overall tax roll, which means about \$50 million less than the roughly \$800 million in combined taxable value county-wide last year.

At current property tax, or millage, rates, the county's loss in revenue would be more than \$400,000, the school district's more than \$173,000 and the hospital authority's more than \$61,000. The City of Macclenny, facing a drop in taxable value of about \$17 million, would lose approximately \$61,000 as well.

Combined with taxes lost to the two regional water management districts encompassing Baker County and cash for new school construction, the drop in property tax receipts could total \$1 million, provided tax rates remain level.

Mr. Sweat stressed that the drop in taxable value is based on preliminary estimates that don't account for other factors like new construction or changes in the Consumer Price Index.

He noted that final values are due to the state by July 1.

Last year, the total loss in taxable value paled in comparison at only \$6 million. However, taxable values also lag a year behind market values, which means last year's taxable value was based on 2008 sales data.

Likewise, sales and other market indicators from 2009 are being used for the 2010 tax rolls. And while the real estate market began its downturn in 2007, prices reached their lowest in 2009 and have largely remained there since.

Adding to the fiscal strain of falling property tax revenues are projected drops in funding from the state.

The Florida Department of Revenue's Office of Tax Research released revised estimates June 14 for the state's county revenue sharing program. They show Baker County receiving about \$24,500 less than last year's funding — \$402,742 — which was about \$37,000 less than 2008 funding.

The projected revenue comes from state sales and cigarette taxes. Estimates for local sales, gas and phone taxes are expected later this month. They can be found at http://www.floridalcir.gov/revenue_estimates.cfm.

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

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

«From page 1 for much of the Friday morning.

The S. 6th Street entrance remained open, but a number of would-be customers, seeing the barricades about noon, went elsewhere. Others coming off SR 121 into the drive-thru lanes temporarily blocked the vehicles of customers leaving after dining inside.

"We did what we set out to do," Ms. Chapman said, referring to the city's hopes that the blockage would garner the company's attention.

She said McDonald's operations consultant for the state, Scott Masson, told her the company would place 12 barrel-shaped barricades in the parking lot to separate the drive-thru lane from the north side entrance.

Flexible plastic bollards serving the same purpose, but only extending a short distance, are bent over from motorists mowing them down after entering from Barber Road.

The bollards were the company's first attempt at solving the issue after the city's warning letter in July 2007.

"A sign has been placed on the Barber Road side of the property advising motorists not to block the street with a reference to city and state codes," stated the letter. "A police officer will be stationed on that road issuing tickets to your customers when they block the road."

Letters in March and April of this year requesting further discussions with Mark Bonczyk of McDonald's USA went unanswered.

Adding the barrel-shaped barricades would extend the line of plastic bollards further west so that traffic from Barber Road can't enter the drive-thru lane without circling the building and approaching from S. 6th St.

The company also has plans to find a more permanent solution.

"[Mr. Masson] promised us the temporary barrels would be up this afternoon," Ms. Chapman said Friday. "But that's just a temporary fix. They'll probably put larger, more sturdy bollards in the ground."

One driver passing by McDonald's on Barber Road Friday afternoon saw the city's barricades and said, "It's about time."

Ms. Chapman said residents of the road have been complaining to the city about the drive-thru backups, which cut off access to S. 6th St.

The city's barricades were up only about five hours.

She said she reported her boyfriend missing on June 7 and didn't hear from him again until June 13 when he called to say he was in Middleburg at the home of a friend identified as Jason Woodcock. When she arrived at a sister's residence near Sanderson, Mr. Terrell picked up her and their daughter.

As a parolee, Mr. Terrell was not allowed to leave Tennessee, and when authorities there found out from Investigator Dougherty that he was here talking about the robberies they contacted the FBI and learned they occurred about that time in the Nashville suburbs of Brentwood and Hendersonville, and near Huntsville, Alabama.

It was during those robberies that the photos were generated showing a suspect who closely resembles Mr. Terrell and wearing the same shirt and hat he had on when confronted on the Dupont lease. He also has a matching arm tattoo.

Investigator Dougherty showed the photos to Ms. Combs, and noted "[she] hung her head and stated that it was definitely [him]."

The suspect's mother Inez Sullivan of Green Cove Springs "collapsed to her knees and grabbed her chest" when she looked at the photos. Due to recent heart surgery, she was checked out by a rescue crew and cleared.

The investigator then showed one of the photos to Mr. Terrell, who after invoking his Miranda rights nonetheless repeatedly asked, "Where did you get that picture from?"

«From page 1 county garbage programs from \$2.6 million to \$2.4 million.

The modest reduction to Baker County's grant will be roughly \$5000 from the \$78,000 in funding received last year, according to Chris Doolin, the county's Tallahassee lobbyist.

Legislators did maintain some funding streams despite closing a multi-billion-dollar budget shortfall during the 2010 session.

Mr. Doolin said money to offset the impacts of Amendment 1 property tax reforms approved by voters in 2008 was increased by legislators and two road improvement programs for small counties retained funding at current levels, about \$31 million.

Over the last decade, Baker County has used close to \$11 million from the Small County Outreach Program and Small County Road Assistance Program to pave dirt roads.

"We're very pleased with the \$31 million," said Mr. Doolin.

Much of the funding from Tallahassee remains in flux, how-

ever; due to Governor Charlie Crist vetoing some spending approved by the legislature, including a \$160 million sweep of the state's transportation trust fund to pay for education, and the yet unknown economic impact from the BP oil spill in the Gulf on tourism and other industries.

"Revenue collections will certainly be less than what the state had thought," Mr. Doolin said. "It's highly likely we'll see some budget adjusting."

Bob Gerard: Denny, I love soccer for many of the reasons you hate it. Far from being an un-American sport, soccer is the most democratic sport in the world. Anyone can play it and enjoy it. Boy, girl, man or woman — all you need is a ball. In fact, you don't even need a ball. In some parts of the world kids play it with a tightly wound bundle of rags and play it with jaw-dropping skill.

✓ There's no need for fancy equipment. A football player wears so many pads and so much armor that he's unrecognizable except for the number on his back. Put him on a horse and he resembles a mounted knight more than a sportsman. You could hit a football player with a tree limb and not hurt him, so don't talk to me about tough.

✓ I love soccer because something is always happening. Football fans say there's no action, but if you watch the game there's always action. From the first whistle to the end, the game is always moving — it only stops for fouls. If you want soccer to look more like football, have the players run around for 15-20 seconds and then stand in a circle for 45 seconds doing nothing. Then stop every little while for 10 minutes of beer commercials.

✓ Soccer fans make football fans look normal. Take the most rabid Raider fan and put him up against soccer fans and he'll whither. I went to a game in Buenos Aires where the fans on one end of the stadium jumped up and down and sang for 90 minutes. They never stopped.

When Guatemala lost to El Salvador in a controversial World Cup qualifier in the 50s the countries went to war for two weeks before the UN stopped it. I can't see Gainesville going to war with Tallahassee no matter how much they hate the result of a game.

✓ Soccer haters decry the lack of scoring, but that is the whole point. It's hard to score, and when you do score it's a big deal. Joe Posnanski said in *Sports Illustrated* that "a goal at the highest level is a miracle. It takes magic."

We have all watched football games where we knew that every time one team or the other got the ball they were going to score. Where's the drama in that? In the English FA Cup I've seen the world's biggest team, Manchester United, crash out to a team of nobodies from the town of Wycombe, which is about the size of Palatka.

✓ And even when there is no score it can be incredibly exciting. I watched a 0-0 tie between Uruguay and France that was as tightly contested and nail-biting as any 48-45 game between Boise State and BYU.

✓ You're right, ties are frustrating but in championship games there are no ties and that can be even more frustrating, and fascinating. For 90 minutes soccer is the most team sport of all games and if it ends tied it goes to a 30 minute overtime. But then, if still tied, chaos ensues. A player with the ball against a goalkeeper 15 yards away — staring each other down with nothing in between them except grass and air and the hopes of millions of fans. Nothing in football can match it for sheer intensity.


✓ Hey, 2.6 billion World Cup viewers can't be wrong.

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Schools retrofitted for hurricanes

Hurricane shutters are being installed at a number of schools buildings in the county, and just in time for the 2010 hurricane season.

The roughly \$200,000 grant-funded effort will add shutters capable of withstanding hurricane-force winds on a handful of school district buildings at Keller Intermediate, the Alternative School nearby, and the middle and high schools.

Six days after the official start of the season, a task force specializing in emergency preparedness projects like the shutter improvements held its quarterly meeting June 7.

Emergency management director Adam Faircloth attended the annual Governor's Hurricane Conference in Fort Lauderdale in late May where predictions about the severity of the impending storm season usually vary widely.

"Not this year," he said during the task force's mid-morning gathering. "All the predictions show an active season of 15 to 18 storms with three to four being high intensity — category 3, 4 or 5 — storms ... The question is

whether or not they make landfill and where they make landfall."

In the coming years, Mr. Faircloth said he hopes to pursue grants to expand the shutter retrofits to Fraser Memorial and its clinic. It's one of two facilities in the county with a generator strong enough to simultaneously power electricity and air conditioning.

The other is at Macclenny Elementary, which has been fitted with hurricane shutters but cannot support people with special medical needs.

Space at Fraser could become a problem during a large-scale disaster as well.

Mr. Faircloth said the Fraser clinic could hold 50 to 60 people, but there's twice that many on a special needs list maintained by emergency management.

During a large-scale disaster with many injuries, much of the hospital's shelter capacity could be eliminated, noted David Richardson, who heads emergency medical services for the county.

"We need a special needs shelter," he said, suggesting that Northeast Florida State Hospital could serve that role. "We have not faced a disaster on any large scale, but we need a plan in place."

Atop the task force's wish list of projects is a mobile emergency generator, which could be used to power pump stations that keep water flowing through the City of Macclenny's utility lines, as well as shelters.

Funding for that project has not been available. A generator strong enough to simultaneously run AC and electric outlets could cost more than \$50,000,

he said.

The task force's next meeting is scheduled for September 6 at 10:00 am. For more information about the group or to be placed on the special needs list, please call 259-6111.

Anyone who may need assistance evacuating their homes during an emergency should be placed on the list.

CODE ENFORCEMENT BOARD

No permits for trailers

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The county's Code Enforcement Board heard two cases the evening of June 14 in which property owners failed to obtain permits for mobile homes and gave them specific windows to do so or face fines.

Phillip Lane's 6.6-acre Sanderson property at 15222 Jack Dowling Circle has two residences, one on the road and another placed at the rear in violation of zoning rules permitting only one unit per 7.5 acres.

That latter trailer, installed sometime in 2007 or 2008 was never permitted.

Despite notification of the violations in April by certified mail, Mr. Lane did not appear before the code board, which gave him 10 days to remove the mobile home or face a \$75 fine plus \$15 per day until the property is brought into compliance, for a maximum of 180 days.

Another mobile home was placed at James Barton's 1-acre property at 8151 Myrtis Barton Lane southwest of Macclenny off Woodlawn Road without a permit roughly eight months ago.

The county's building department placed a stop work order at the site March 30.

Building department director Bob Hathcox, who also serves as the county's code enforcement officer, said only a licensed mobile installer can obtain a permit

from the county and that repairs will likely be needed to correct existing building code violations linked to previous installation work.

A mobile home permit is about \$140, though the county can double the fee since Mr. Barton failed to obtain the permit before the trailer was placed.

Mr. Barton's nephew, Chris Barton, appeared before the board, saying he occasionally lives in the trailer and his wife's expecting a child any day. Due to financial hardships, he said he would need 30 to 60 days to hire an installer to permit the trailer.

Board members provided a 60-day window for the property to be brought into compliance before fines begin for James Barton, the property owner.

The potential penalties mirrored the previous case at \$75 plus \$15 per day until the property is in compliance, for a maximum of 180 days.

Both property owners were assessed an \$85 administrative fee too. The fee is standard to help recover code enforcement costs incurred by the county.

A third case, in which property owner Sheldon Crawford failed to obtain a building permit for a garage addition at 10893 Mud Lake Road, did so the day of the code board's meeting.

He was spared the \$85 administrative fee, at the recommendation of Mr. Hathcox, due to Mr. Crawford's financial hardship.

"What a great way to end my career," she said.

But the brightest stars during Ms. Harrell's last two years at the high school were two former students who joined school system as art educators. Kari Rhoden is teaching at Keller Intermediate and Tiffany Armoreda, came on board as a member of the high school's art faculty.

"When Tiffany was my student, I loved her spontaneity and free style of painting. She has inspired me to push beyond the boundaries in my own work, which I love," said Ms. Harrell. "It's no small thing to have her here. I know I'm leaving things in very capable hands."

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

Brawls break out in west Macclenny, 13 accused of violence

Thirteen persons were either arrested or named in criminal complaints for involvement in an outbreak of street fighting in the southwest Macclenny neighborhood over a two-day period last week.

When sheriff's deputies converged on a disturbance involving an estimated 60 persons about 9:40 the evening of June 8, it was the fourth time they were called to the neighborhood that day.

Deputy Matthew Sigers said this time the crowd had gathered near the entrance of Keller Intermediate School, and police were advised of gunshots heard in the vicinity.

Deputy Michael Hauge used a taser pistol on Michael Washington Sr., 37, of Macclenny when the suspect refused to release his wife Tara, who was being detained by Deputy Matt Sigers. The second deputy said he was struck in the throat by Mr. Washington's elbow during a scuffle, and that he used the taser charge after unsuccessful attempts to restrain him.

Deputy Hauge also handcuffed Michael Washington Jr., 18, of Macclenny, when he rushed in to assist his father and acted aggressively when told to step back. The younger Mr. Washington had several facial injuries he said were inflicted when kicked in the face by Francis Jackson, 40, of Macclenny.

She was arrested for felony battery; the elder Mr. Washington for battery of an officer and his son was named in a criminal complaint for a similar charge and released because of injuries to his eye and nose.

Others either arrested or named in complaints for disorderly conduct and fighting include Rodney Braziel, 18, Eddie Fields, 36, Latoya Smith, 20, all of Macclenny; and Devon Moore, 20, of Jacksonville.

In other fights in that neighborhood:

- Michael Daniel, 18, of Jacksonville, Joseph Johnson, 30, of Baldwin and Terry Smith, 19, of Glen St. Mary were arrested by Deputy Kevin Jenkins for disorderly conduct following a fight earlier the same evening. It was at the corner of Minnesota and MLK and also drew a large crowd.

- A criminal complaint for felony battery named Phillip Givens, 25, of Glen as the person who struck Joseph Reed, 21, of Macclenny at the same location the evening of June 9.

The report by Deputy Daniel Nichols notes the assailant may have had a heavy object wrapped by a bandage on his fist when he struck Mr. Reed, who was treated at Fraser Hospital.

AC installers uncover problems

The contractor constructing classroom buildings at the high school two decades ago appears to have cut corners by not finishing some walls and disconnecting a power cable after inspection, presumably because it didn't work.

Another contractor installing new heating, ventilation and air conditioning [HVAC] systems at the school today, Little & Williams of Lake City, made the discoveries.

Denny Wells, the district's facilities director, said he wasn't sure about the identity of the original contractor or the total costs associated with fixing the shoddy work. However, according to the February 25, 1988 edition of *The Press*, the roughly \$10.9 million BCHS construction project was awarded to T.H. Taylor Inc. of Montgomery, Ala.

Mr. Wells informed the school board about problems during a workshop the afternoon of

June 7. He wanted to prepare the board for two change orders on the HVAC project that could be forthcoming later this month — one for roughly \$5200 to complete walls that weren't built all the way to the roof of building 7, and another for a yet unknown amount to correct the power cable problem at building 8.

"We have no idea why it was done this way," said Mr. Wells in reference to the unfinished walls, none of which affect the structural integrity of the buildings.

Leaving them unfinished, though, would make the new HVAC systems less efficient and could cause moisture problems in the ceilings, he said.

The district could bid out completion of the walls or instruct Little & Williams to move ahead with the work using a change order.

Bill Bishop, the district's architect, recommended a change order because bidding could delay the project by two months and possibly lead to conflicts between contractors working at the same site at the same time. He also said

that given the recent discoveries, more problems could surface at other buildings where new HVAC systems are planned.

"I like the bid process more than change orders," said board member Paul Raulerson. "I like to know we have a competitive price."

BCHS principal Tom Hill pleaded on behalf of staff and students at the school to complete the project before the end of summer break.

"It is hot in those classrooms now," he said. "When we come back in August, it will be very hot ... If we can do anything to avoid slowing down this process, I'd like to do that."

Less definitive is the power cable problem at building 8.

Mr. Bishop explained that the "big cable" of several hundred feet was found disconnected behind a panel in violation of building codes.

He said it could be that a malfunctioning cable that was connected to pass inspection, but later disconnected so it wouldn't cause an electrical short.

He suggested having the cable tested to determine if it works. If it does, the cable could simply be reconnected, but if not, it would need replacement.

"At this point, it's an unknown," he told the board of the potential replacement cost.

The school board's next meeting is June 21 at 6:30 pm in its board room on South Boulevard in Macclenny.

Armed driver didn't stop

A Sanderson man was jailed late on June 7 after a county deputy found a loaded pistol on the front floorboard of his car.

Deputy Matt Sigers said he got behind a 2000 Volvo driven by Roosevelt Paige, 49, after it rolled past a stop sign at CR 229 and Friendship place just after 11:00. Mr. Paige continued northbound on 229 to his residence and parked the vehicle in a garage after failing to stop on the road when the deputy turned on lights and siren.

The officer found a loaded .357 magnum revolver on the driver side floor. He also charged Mr. Paige with reckless driving, failure to stop and not wearing a seat belt.

In other arrests the past week:

- Deputy Kevin Jenkins arrested Kenneth Barron, 20, of Macclenny in the early morning hours of June 12 after learning he was driving on North 2nd St. with a license that had been suspended 18 times as an habitual offender.

He stopped the Chevrolet Blazer driven by the suspect while on routine patrol.

- Christina Pilgrim-Webb, 34, of Macclenny was arrested early on June 12 on multiple charges after her 2000 Chevrolet pickup became stuck on private property off Nancy Williams Dr. near Sanderson.

Deputy Daniel Nichols said the suspect was loud and belligerent

when questioned about 5:00 am, and a half hour earlier had been at a nearby residence where her behavior was described as "nervous and agitated."

She was jailed for disorderly conduct and possession of a crack pipe found in her vehicle.

- Deputy John Hardin arrested three Jacksonville men for loitering or prowling in an area off Mud Lake Rd. about midnight on June 9.

The suspects gave several conflicting stories as to why they were in the sparsely populated area and why their SUV was parked in the right-of-way on Jim Starling Rd.

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Warrant is sought in stabbing Sanderson girlfriend denies domestic attack

A warrant for aggravated battery was to be sought early this week for a Sanderson woman who allegedly stabbed her live-in boyfriend during an argument early on June 12 at their residence off Jefferson Circle.

Machel Givens, 44, stabbed Keith Jefferson, 53, in the upper right chest with a pocket knife that she retrieved from a back bedroom after he ordered her to leave the residence, the victim told police later.

The wound was sufficient to send Mr. Jefferson to Shands Jacksonville, where he was treated and released the same day in time to call police back to the neighborhood north of Sanderson when Ms. Givens returned.

In a subsequent interview with Deputy Daniel Nichols, Ms. Givens denied the allegation and insisted the boyfriend came at her with a knife and inflicted a small scratch on her left forearm. She then said she turned the knife around in Mr. Jefferson's hand and stabbed him in self-defense.

The victim was re-interviewed and insisted his earlier account to Deputy Brandon Kiser was the accurate version of events that morning just after 3:00 when he was stabbed.

In other incidents involving domestic violence:

- Joseph York was arrested for battery of Georgina Tillman,

29, of Sanderson during an argument in their van off God's Acre Lane near Taylor about noon on June 7.

The argument apparently started after one of several children with the couple spilled a fruit drink in the vehicle, angering Ms. Tillman, who then doused the children and Mr. York with water.

He allegedly caused a head laceration when he pulled her hair and restrained her by forcing her against a car door.

• John Yeomans, 48, of Macclenny was named in a complaint for domestic battery for allegedly attacking his estranged girlfriend Paula Rosier, 39, the evening of June 13.

Ms. Rosier told Deputy Matt Sigers she met her ex-boyfriend at a residence off Washington St. about 6:00 for a property exchange. Mr. Yeomans is accused of forcibly removing a ring from her finger and slapping her.

Interviewed later, Mr. Yeomans denied the girlfriend's version of events, saying only that they met and she delivered the ring.

• A Macclenny motorist was arrested for aggravated battery for striking a 17-year-old girl with her Ford Expedition during a confrontation off MLK Dr. about 10:30 pm on June 10.

• Frances Jackson, 40, is also

charged with fleeing police by refusing to stop when Deputy Patrick McGauley got behind the Expedition in north Macclenny shortly after the incident. She ran through two stop signs before pulling over at 4th St. and Ohio.

Three other occupants of the SUV were charged with disorderly conduct for interfering with officers during questioning about the confrontation on MLK and an earlier one at the KFC restaurant on South 6th where the victim works.

The girl told Deputy Jason Bryan the SUV lurched forward as she walked in front of it, striking her mid-section. She was checked out at Fraser Hospital's emergency room.

One of the occupants, Latoya Smith, 20, of Macclenny was booked on a charge of resisting without violence for walking away from Deputy McGauley during questioning. The remaining two are juvenile females, one from Macclenny and the other from Jacksonville.

Students exposed to classmate's bird Macaw named Nero

Amber Simmons had long wanted to share her unusual pet with her classmates at Baker County Middle School.

A special "show and tell" program on the next to last day of the school year seemed the perfect opportunity.

Teacher Tara Rhoden gave permission for her sixth grade students to receive a visit from Nero, a large macaw.

When Nero came for his very first visit to the middle school, he arrived swaddled in a towel, carried by Ms. Simmons' mother, Carmie McNarnay.

Nero didn't seem to mind being bundled up. In fact, he seemed to like it. The big bird looked content and seemed happy to snuggle like a baby in a blanket.

In the classroom, off came the towel, to the delight of the students, many of whom had never seen a live macaw.

Ms. McNarnay told students about the bird who sat perched on an inch-wide section of tree limb. Ms. Simmons slowly walked him up and down between the rows of desks so that students could get

a close look. The macaw's plumage was brilliant blue, green and yellow and his zebra-like leathery eye patches were black and white.

Although Nero was on his best behavior Mrs. McNarnay cautioned students about touching him.

"A macaw is capable of a bite that can equal 300 pounds of pressure," Ms. Simmons added.

The students were quiet and respectful and Nero, who behaved splendidly, was a perfect gentleman.

Nero is 13 years old, relatively young for a macaw. Students learned that in the wild, macaws live very long lives, typically about 50 years.

They can make rewarding pets if properly cared for and often bond strongly with their owners. The birds can be very entertaining as they are natural show-offs and great mimics of the human voice.

Nero had another owner previously, but has adjusted well to his new home.

"It took about a month before he really warmed up to us and trusted us. Now he's a regular member of our family," said Mrs. McNarnay. "When he says goodbye to one of us as we leave

the house, he even imitates that person's voice."

He patiently tolerates the other household pets which include a bulldog. Since he stays in his cage at night, Nero is allowed to crawl around on the outside of his cage during the day for exercise.

Ms. Simmons said he seldom leaves it, but occasionally when the dogs are present he causes a

little mischief.

"He'll climb down from it sometimes and playfully bite at the dogs' feet," she said. "They just ignore him."

Nero likes to play with the jewelry and earrings of the person holding him.

"Anything shiny," said Ms. MacInarnay.

A favorite game is to mimic

the sound of a blow drier while burrowing his face into someone's hair and shaking it back and forth.

When asked what a macaw eats, Ms. Simmons listed some of Nero's favorite foods.

"He loves peanuts, fruit, broccoli, lettuce and strawberries," she said.

If you're not used to soccer, tune in. Watch a few games and you'll see what 2.6 billion viewers worldwide already know — that soccer is an exciting and addicting sport.
