Cops raid drug house Thursday, arrest two

County deputies armed with a search warrant raided the 9th St. residence of a south Macclenny couple on November 3 and arrested them for sale of both powder cocaine and prescription drugs last month.

When investigators and the sheriff's department special response team searched the address of Nikke Ross, 29, and Kenneth Johnson, 25, they also found items associated with the sale of drugs. Both suspects were home when police showed up with the warrant shortly after 6 am and were taken into custody.

Investigator John Hardin said he and investigators Mike Hauge and Tracey Benton set up the undercover buys at the address on October 20 and 25. In the first instance, informants working for BCSO purchased \$100 worth of Oxycodone and cocaine; the second buy, they bought \$100 worth of cocaine.

Officers the morning of the arrest seized an electronic scale, small plastic baggies, three pills and other items.

In another arrest, Genaro Harris, 25, of Macclenny was charged with possession of a marijuana smoking pipe after his vehicle was stopped off Woodlawn Rd. the evening of November 1.

Deputy Patrick McGauley said he detected an odor of pot in the 1999 Oldsmobile driven by Mr. Harris and stopped about 8:30 for having a faulty tag light. The pipe was found concealed under the dashboard.

The officer also learned Mr. Harris' driver license had been revoked for three drunk driving convictions and he was booked for that offense as well.

Dispatcher injured in wreck

Sheriff's office dispatcher Scott Mobley was seriously injured in a single-vehicle accident on the stretch of N. SR 121 just south of Steel Bridge Road about 11:15 am on November 7.

His northbound 2004 Ford F150 ran off the highway and into a ditch where it collided with a culvert, according to a media release from the Florida Highway Patrol.

The crash caused the pick-up to become

airborne and overturn before landing north of the culvert on its driver's side in the ditch.

Neighboring residents said they heard the crash, but didn't see it happen.

Jason Waters, whose mailbox was damaged in the accident, said it appeared the truck had run off the road and over-corrected before swerving onto the shoulder again to avoid a passing car.

Passerby Gary Kreiser was on his way home nearby when he saw the accident scene.

He said a group of 5 to 10 people gathered to remove Mr. Mobley, 35, of Glen St. Mary

from the vehicle after someone smashed a hole in the windshield using a hammer.

County fire chief Richard Dolan said the driver had a laceration on his head and seemed confused following the crash.

Mr. Mobley was wearing his seat belt and charges against him pend a medical evaluation, the FHP release shows.

He was taken by ambulance to Shands Jacksonville.

A helicopter was requested but could not respond due to adverse weather conditions.

ATV trails finally open at Shoals

ATV riders — after years of waiting — recently gained access to roughly half of the St. Mary's Shoals Park trail system, marking the last milestone in the county park's seven-year development.

About a month ago, the county opened trails on the park's western side to riders on Saturdays and Sundays after a test-group of motorists shared positive reviews.

Now, park ranger and sheriff's deputy David Wright said, 10 to 12 riders a day regularly visit the more than 2400-acre tract acquired from private owners in two purchases in 2004 and 2010 using millions of dollars in land conservation grants from the state.

"It's mostly families just wanting to go someplace outside to ride and get away from other vehicles," he said.

The county hired Mr. Wright, a retired Florida Highway Patrol trooper, early this year to patrol the grounds, do maintenance and manage Shoals Park on a part-time basis.

ATVs, or all-terrain vehicles, are restricted to the weekends between the hours of 8 am and

6 pm, which coincides with much of the officer's work schedule.

Equestrian riders and hikers, who have been frequenting the park since it opened in 2009, have access to trails on the eastern side of Shoals Park seven days a week from dawn till dusk.

Each half of the park has a separate entrance and parking area to keep the horses and hik-

ers buffered from ATV riders.

The park, located about four miles north of Glen St. Mary on Odis Yarrowborough Road, is functionally complete with signs, trail markings, paving for the ATV parking area, rest rooms, fencing,

picnic tables and pavilions, all in place.

More improvements could be forthcoming, however.

The county recently signed a \$500,000 grant contract with the Florida Department of Environmental Protection, according to grants coordinator Maurice Postal.

"Fifteen percent can be used for planning and engineering [at Shoals Park]," he said by e-mail November 7. "The rest of it has to be spent on strengthening or replacing the logging road bridge over Cedar Creek and on improving the trail system."

Securing a tractor would make maintaining the trails easier, Mr. Wright pointed out last week. Today, a tractor is borrowed from the road department, which works Monday through Thursday, on the weekends when the park sees most of its visitors.

The state's Greenways and Trails office is sending someone to do GPS mapping of the trail system, but officials have estimated in the past there's about 17 miles of ATV trails and 19 miles of horse trails in Shoals Park. The property is also bounded on the north by a roughly 2-mile stretch of the St. Mary's River.

Recent timber harvesting at the park generated some \$360,000, from which about

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Six lose jobs amid changing markets

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NEFCOM, the Macclenny-based telephone and Internet company, shed a handful of employees last month, and while they weren't given much notice, some said they weren't surprised due to increased competition in recent years from cable giant Comcast.

Six workers including the phone company's former president and more recently consultant Leon (Toppo) Conner lost their jobs, according to two of the affected employees who spoke with *The Press* last week after NEFCOM general manager and former county commissioner Mike Griffis said he wasn't authorized to speak publicly about the matter.

NEFCOM, formerly Northeast Florida Telephone Company, was bought by Arkansas-based Townes Telecommunications in 1998.

"It's competition is what it boils down to," said Jessalyn Thrift of Macclenny, who lost her sales job after 25 years with NEFCOM. "It's Comcast moving into our service area with video, phone and Internet all bundled together in a package deal."

Ms. Thrift, 46, said some of the laid off workers were eligible for early retirement benefits and she understands why NEFCOM cut the jobs.

"I'm not surprised," she said, adding that NEFCOM's lack of television service made it difficult to keep customers, particularly those who abandon their land-line telephones.

"As far as service goes, I think we got them beat," said Ms. Thrift. "We're local. If anyone has a problem, we're there to fix it within a few hours."

She intends to search for another job, preferably one close to home.

Like Ms. Thrift, laid off plant manager Ralph Blume doesn't harbor any ill will toward the company or its other employees. But, he said, he would've liked more time to prepare for unemployment.

"The biggest thing was how they done it," said Mr. Blume, 57. "I walked in Friday morning to go to work and they called me in to say your job's been eliminated. It's been downsized. You can basically go home. There was no warning. No severance."

Mr. Blume worked for the telephone company for 37 years and was among those eligible

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

OK's improvement plans for all schools

State-mandated school improvement plans to increase attendance, academic performance and parental involvement in 2011-12 were approved by the Baker County School Board for all district schools on the evening of November 7.

The plans are developed annually with input from school advisory councils, consisting of faculty and parents, to identify specific goals that usually target FCAT performance, attendance and discipline. The intent is to measure improvement from one year to the next.

All schools will be expected to meet higher standards, including those that helped the district earn an overall B grade this year from the Florida Department of Education: Westside Elementary, Macclenny Elementary and the Pre-K/Kindergarten Center. Most of the goals in the 2010-11 improvement plans were achieved at those schools.

However, the district's three highest grade level schools — Keller Intermediate, the middle school and the high school — all failed to reach benchmarks set in their improvement plans for 2010-11. Ironically, the middle school earned an A rating from the state this year despite falling short of most of its goals.

Principals from each school reported their results to the school board last month, including Keller, which was demoted from

a B to a D by the state this year after failing to achieve 12 of 13 goals included in its 2010-11 improvement plan. One goal that fell short of success was to become an A school.

The 2011-12 improvement plan for Keller isn't quite as ambitious. Its goal is to regain the previous B grade, which the school had held for two consecutive years, in part by focusing more attention on struggling students after school and on weekends and by more closely monitoring students identified as needing extra help.

The drop from a B to a D school was caused partly by insufficient numbers of low-performing students making reading and math gains on the 2011 Florida Comprehensive Assessment Test, or FCAT, last spring.

The goals for this year include a 2 percent rise in the percentage of students scoring 4 or 5 in reading and math on the FCAT's 5-point scale, a 6 percent gain in high writing scores and a 4 percent gain in high science scores.

Appearing equally challenging is the improvement plan for the high school, which has received seven grades of C by the state and a D in 2009 and 2010. The 2010-11 grade is expected to be announced this month.

According to information contained in the new strategic plan, the high school has never made adequate yearly progress, including failing to meet seven of 11 ob-

jectives in its 2010-11 improvement plan. However, student performance on the eight FCAT categories improved from 419 points to 475 points in the past two years and students in the bottom quarter showing improvement in reading grew from 38 percent in 2010 to 48 percent this year.

One way the high school hopes to turn things around is by furthering the professional education of its "out-of-field" instructional staff, including expanding the certificates of teachers to include subjects they currently teach but are not certified to teach.

The school board unanimously approved each school's new improvement plan with no discussion. After the second plan's swift approval, board chairman Dwight Crews offered the audience an explanation.

"We have work-shopped these plans," he said. "We're not just sitting up here approving them off the top of our heads."

Board member Patricia Weeks also emphasized the amount of work that had gone into development of the plans and thanked teachers and administrators for continuing to strive for excellence.

"These (plans) represent hours and hours and hours of work on the part of the administration and faculty," Ms. Weeks said. "We appreciate what you're trying to do so that this district will become an A district instead of a B district."

In other business the board:

- Awarded plaques to Sheriff Joey Dobson and nine of his officers for their many contributions to the school district, including campus deputies and programs such as Stranger Danger, along with bringing speakers to the schools to talk about the sometimes tragic consequences of teens drinking and driving.

- Recognized 17 costumed students from Keller Intermediate declared winners in the school's recent Vocabulary Parade, a Halloween-themed contest designed to test their creativity and expand their knowledge of words.

- Presented a plaque of appreciation to Rhonda Sharman, who retired after 30 years as an administrative aide at the high school, including her most recent assignment as guidance assistant.

- Approved a \$3,200 consulting contract with Mazy Ruise-Paige for dance camp/dance instruction/choreography for the Baker County Middle School's Dancin' Paws team through June 30, 2012. School Superintendent Sherrie Raulerson said the money came from fund-raisers.

for early retirement. Still, he doesn't want to retire, he said.

"I don't know what I'm going to do," said Mr. Blume. "I have a couple of little jobs I'm looking at right now, but they're not in the phone business."

The NEFCOM layoffs took place October 7, and Mr. Blume said they were among some 22 jobs cut at Town Tele-Communications subsidiaries. Townes owns seven other telephone companies, according to its website.

\$109,000 was siphoned to re-plant pine trees in accordance with park's timber management plan, said county manager C.J. Thompson last week.

Some of the revenue from tree harvesting could be used to fund a second bridge over Cedar Creek, which would further discourage interactions between ATV and horse riders, he said.

There's also potential for advertising revenue, added Mr. Thompson, like signs promoting ATV manufacturers. Park use remains free, though county commissioners have discussed a small fee for ATV riders to ensure the park remains self-funding.

According to the county manager, harvesting and replanting pine trees has been the biggest challenge lately, but another has been public perception.

During a recent meeting with a group of residents about the county's budget woes, Mr. Thompson said they suggested Shoals Park as a place to cut to reduce the county's estimated \$2.2 million deficit this year.

"I've had to repeatedly tell some that the park isn't costing

us any money. And some just simply don't believe me. Some people are convinced that if we shut the park down tomorrow, that will somehow reduce the deficit," he said.

Still on the county manager and Mr. Wright's wish list for the park are brochures with a trail maps and information about the wildlife and other park features, rough terrain warning signs, larger print on signs noting park rules and an ATV for the park ranger, who traverses the area in a sheriff's office-issued SUV or smaller, golf-cart like vehicle called a gator.

"We have an ATV park, but I don't have an ATV," said Mr. Wright. "I could be a little more aggressive on patrols with an ATV."

The officer also wants to remind visitors that under Florida law, ATV riders under 16 years old must wear a helmet and eye goggles and be with an adult at all times.

The speed limit on the ATV trails is 25 mph.

"These are nature trails, not competition trails," Mr. Wright said.

County deputies responded to a rash of domestic violence calls the past week, filing criminal complaints in some and making arrests in others.

been slapped. Two hours later, he summoned the officer to his residence off CR 125 and he had a swollen left eye that was not noticeable during the earlier call.

The couple has four children. • A domestic battery complaint was filed the afternoon of November 1 against John Wingo, 38, of Jacksonville after an alleged attack on his girlfriend at his mother's residence on Columbia St. in Sanderson.

Julia Vanderburg, 28, of Jacksonville told Deputy Johnny Hodges her boyfriend pulled her hair, punched her and caused a laceration to her finger during an argument about 3 pm before they returned to Jacksonville.

• Deputy Matt Yarborough arrested Gregory Malavolti, 45, for striking his wife Donna, 58, during a rampage in the garage of their residence on Constitution Place near Macclenny.

Ms. Malavolti told the officer they were drinking and her husband became enraged, throwing items and flailing his arms at her after pinning her down. Deputy Yarborough described the hus-

band as "very intoxicated."

• Misty Smith, 23, was arrested the afternoon of November 3 for repeatedly violating a protective order banning contact with her estranged boyfriend Wesley Prevatt, 25, of Jacksonville.

Deputy Yarborough was called to Ms. Smith's residence off CR 122 north of Sanderson because she sought a similar order against Mr. Prevatt.

While the officer was there, Jacksonville police telephoned Ms. Smith to advise she violated an existing order banning her from contacting Mr. Prevatt.

The boyfriend told Jacksonville police he received 79 calls from Ms. Smith that day, and Deputy Yarborough confirmed that the girlfriend had been served notice of the order that afternoon.

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Sold RR plates as scrap

The sheriff's department issued a grand theft warrant for the arrest of a Sanderson man for allegedly stealing \$560 worth of metal tie plates from a CSX siding in Sanderson and selling them for scrap in Lake City.

The warrant also alleges that Joseph Yusten, 29, stashed the ties in an old appliance that was then sold at the Recycling Center with enhanced weight that garnered a higher price. The suspect then allegedly split the proceeds with Kenneth Barnes, 26, also of Sanderson, who transported the appliance.

A CSX investigator in his affi-

davit said both men admitted to their role in the heist during interviews in early May. The report did not, however, specify when the theft occurred from the track side near Beech St. close to where Mr. Yusten's mother resides.

CSX more recently recovered the tie plates.

In another theft, this one from a home construction site on Canal Rd. southeast of Macclenny, someone made off with a \$2500 walk-behind concrete trowel and \$500 in hand tools stored in a shed.

Owner Keith Muse called police on November 12 when he dis-

covered the loss, and estimated it occurred sometime after October 10.

The suspect's mother told Investigator Brad Dougherty she saw a white pickup truck in the area in mid-October. She is also acquainted with Wilmar Bryant, owner of Scrappy Pappy's yard east of Macclenny, who recalled the items were brought in about that time by a man driving a white pickup.

As of November 3, Mr. Bryant told the investigator he was unable to produce a record of the scrap sale.

\$5700 in property is stolen

Sheriff's investigators seek to interview a Middleburg man in connection with the theft of over \$5700 in property from a workshop and residence off Mud Lake Rd. during September and October.

Thomas Ledford reported the thefts on November 3, and told Investigator Steve Harvey he believes the items were taken piecemeal between September 20 and October 28 when the suspect was working for him.

The most valuable single item was a \$2000 ring, but other jewelry was said to be missing as well, as were collectibles, a radio taken from the victim's pickup, \$500 cash and tools.

The investigator learned that the suspect, identified as Timmy Gaskins, 21, pawned several items in Macclenny recently. Mr. Ledford went to Duval Gun and Pawn, and identified a \$150 bracelet.

In a second theft off Mud Lake Rd, the victim's son and girlfriend were named in criminal complaints for stealing a pressure washer valued at \$500.

Donnie Simmons reported the washer taken from a shed on October 31, and the report by Deputy Brandon Kiser indicates his son Garrett, 26, admitted taking it and having Lindsey Townsend, 20, pawn it on October 11 for \$40 at Duval Gun and Pawn.

The complaint against the son is for grand theft; against Ms. Townsend for dealing in stolen property — second and third degree felonies.

• There is a suspect in the theft of a camera and lenses from the residence of Susan Green on Honeysuckle Lane near Glen St. Mary between October 22-31. She valued the property at \$300.

Thief leaves bizarre note at Ocean Pond

Police are looking for the person who took property from a locked shed beside Ocean Pond and left a bizarre note apologizing for doing so.

Wayne Morne of Orange Park told Deputy Steven Smith he returned to the property on October 31 after an absence of about two weeks and found that a jon boat, trolling motor, battery charger and dirt bike had been taken.

The note read: "I'm sorry for taking what I needed, and someday I will repay — just please don't be too mad and be thankful you didn't loose [sp.] everything. God bless you all ... P.S. I'll set the Jhon [sp.] boat adrift in a few weeks, just look and you will find it."

The boat was located at the residence of Joe Smith of Lake City, the Ocean Pond campgrounds keeper interviewed by Deputy Smith and Officer Jim Ellis of the US Forest Service.

Mr. Smith said a group of campers left the boat behind when they checked out on October 22, promising to come back for it "in a few weeks." When they did not, he took the boat home for safe keeping.

Police learned the name of the person who reserved the campsite and were attempting to contact him.

Of the unrecovered property, the battery charger was valued at \$100, the dirt bike at \$1000 and the trolling motor \$500.

In other thefts reported to the sheriff's department, the owner of American Automotive garage on US 90 west in Macclenny said a \$1500 transmission was taken from behind the building.

Tommy Rollins told Deputy Robert Simpkins the theft occurred sometime between October 28-31.

• Kimberly Crews reported her purse valued at \$400 along with identification and other contents were taken from her unlocked and parked vehicle overnight on October 31.

It was outside her residence on Lauramore Rd.

Gregory Sheppard said a cultivator and harrow, along with six vehicle batteries, were taken off his property on Jack Dugger Rd.

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
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Sesquicentennial cost \$25,000 Committee likely to have about \$2500 left over

Organizers of the Baker County Sesquicentennial Celebration last September say the event was so well received that many are hoping for another, similar event next year.

There's even some money left over that could help fund it.

The Baker County Commission pledged \$15,000 to this year's festivities to honor the county's 150th year, but only donated \$7500 to the Baker County Historical Society and its Sesquicentennial planning committee, which included society members and others from the public and local government agencies.

The committee also raised some \$15,000 in private sponsorships and about \$5000 from vendor fees and souvenir sales, said the committee's treasurer Timothy Whelan.

There were in-kind donations as well that Mr. Whelan couldn't put a price on.

The sheriff's office, for instance, provided tents, garbage cans and inmates to clean-up after the celebration. Numerous volunteers spent about six months planning the event and helped staff it during the celebration.

Mr. Whelan said expenses for the Sesquicentennial included about \$12,000 for entertainment, roughly \$4000 for advertising and some \$5500 for the purchase of souvenirs like shirts, mugs and commemorative booklets.

Those items are still for sale through the historical society, 42 W. McIver St., which is open Saturdays 10 am to 4 pm.

The costs for plane fly-overs

the day of the event and travel expenses for demonstrators and tractor owners totaled about \$3500, Mr. Whelan said.

All in all, with about \$27,500 in funding and \$25,000 in expenses, the committee has about \$2500 left over, though Mr. Whelan said bills are still arriving as well as revenue from souvenir sales.

"We didn't go in the red," he said. "We're a little in the black."

What will happen to the extra cash?

"That will be up to the Sesquicentennial committee and the county commission," said Mr. Whelan, adding that he hopes it can be pledged toward another

community-wide event.

"I don't know what it would be," he said, "but many people have expressed interest in another event next year."

Macclenny resident and historical society member Larry Rosenblatt chaired the Sesquicentennial committee. He said spearheading another event next year is not something he's ready to do.

"I'll be glad to advise and help, but I don't want to lead another one," said the retired CSX supervisor. "There's too much out west and in the northeast that I haven't seen yet."

Mr. Rosenblatt plans to travel with his wife Linda. Alaska and

Montana are already on the list.

"We all realize [the Sesquicentennial] came off well and it was a success with good feedback from everyone," Mr. Whelan said.

It's unclear, however, whether that success will be repeated.


Prior to that he lived in Jacksonville where he gained experience serving on the Jacksonville Building Codes Adjustment Board and the Jacksonville Planning Commission.

"My business is such that I now have free time in my calendar," said Mr. Gazes. "And community service is how I choose to fill most of it."


He believes it is important for communities to support entities such as the code enforcement board.

Parlayed military into a skill

Bobbi Croft capitalized on her stint in Navy

In the early 1990s, Olustee native Bobbi Croft was busy completing requirements for an associate degree from Lake City Community College.

She knew she wanted to continue with her education beyond that, but paying for it was going to be a challenge.

"I wanted to be a writer or something in communications," she said. "And I knew I needed more school, but the money wasn't there."

So she started looking for a way to pay for it. Entering the military seemed the logical route.

It would be the Naval Technical Scholarship Program in advanced electronics that would make more education possible and help the young woman find her niche in communications.

In August 1991, with an associate's degree under her belt, Ms. Croft reported to Naval Recruit Training Command Orlando for boot camp. The following November she graduated from electronics technician school.

The girl from Olustee soon found herself completing tours of duty aboard naval ships like the *USNS Leroy Grumman* and *USS Mason*. Her shore duty would include assignments in Great Britain and Manama, Bahrain. She retired from her military career in October 2010, returned to Florida and began working as a computer analyst at the New River Correctional Institution in Raiford.

While in the Navy, Chief Petty Officer Croft also completed a tour of duty in Afghanistan in 2006. The following are excerpts from her diary of weekly dispatches sent to friends and family.

May 21, Week 1 We arrived here on Sunday night after spending about a week in Kuwait. Myself and the one other female in my group were assigned to our B-hut (living quarters). It is a plywood building that has been divided in half and then again into fourths.

Denise and I each have a section that is about 8 feet by 6 feet. The only thing that was in them when we arrived was a bed frame and a mattress. We have bought several small rugs from the BX (base exchange — no Walmart yet in Afghanistan, but give them time). We also bought some plastic drawers to put our clothes and such in.

We also got a brief on the land mines that are here in Afghanistan.

It is crazy the number of mine fields that are still active here in this country. That is one of the biggest threats to the local population. Also, even when they think that they have cleared an area of mines, they might have an earthquake, which causes the mines hidden under the surface to rise up. There are literally millions of old land mines in this country from when they fought against Russia and most of them were left by the Russians.

June 11, Week 4 One thing that happened here this week is known as the Fallen Comrade Ceremony. I'm sure many of you heard about the two American Soldiers that were KIA (killed in action) last week.

When this happens, soldiers, sailors, airmen, and marines on duty in Bagram will line the sides of the Disney Road (the main road through the base named for the first American killed in the war in Afghanistan) and when the fallen soldier's bodies are brought from the morgue to the airfield for their final trip to the States, they pay honor by saluting as they pass.

June 18, Week 5 We had three more Fallen Comrade Ceremonies this week — a lot for Afghanistan. Also, this week there was a soldier that died from a heart attack after exercising one morning. I was told that his body was on a flight back to the states that same day.

July 3, Week 7 I'm in the Kandahar area of Afghanistan to work on communications gear and get computers ready for our guys working here.

This area is very volatile with a strong Taliban presence. And it's extremely hot. Never below 100 degrees during the day and as high as 130 degrees but at least it's dry heat.

We were invited to eat with some Russian workers who built our permanent field team building and they had slaughtered a lamb. I took my Cipro (antibiotic for infections including anthrax) and said a prayer and headed to dinner.

During the meal there was an explosion which turned out to be a rocket that was launched by the Taliban. It landed on the main dining facility where I usually ate my daily meals. Ten people were injured.

July 28, Week 10 I was able to get out of Bagram this week with a short trip to Jalalabad. It's 112 degrees with 98 percent humidity. The airport terminal is about the size of a shoe box and we were sent across the runway to wait for the plane to arrive. I was wearing my body armor and Kevlar helmet while carrying my rucksack, tool bag and M-16.

Then we got the news the flight was canceled. Jalalabad has no paved roads on the base, no PX exchange and a broken air conditioner in the women's shower facility. They do have a store run by some local Afghans and they sell some electronics, bootleg DVDs and Cuban Cigars!

August 1, Week 11 Had to cancel a trip to JAF as the #2 engine in our HELO (helicopter) went out.

On Sunday I sang a solo at a church service and participated in the Bagram talent show that night. I didn't win but I had a good time.

August 9, Week 12 I'm currently in Salerno where I have been fixing computer problems since Friday morning. I never thought I would spend 14 hours a day for 6 days straight reloading computers, removing viruses and fixing human error.

I'm supposed to be on a flight back to Bagram tonight and looking forward to sleeping in my own bed. I saw rain yesterday for the first time since coming to Afghanistan.

It really came down here. My office is actually just a tent with a plywood floor and the rain and wind made it nearly fall down on top of my head.

August 9, Week 12 My unit, TF Paladin, has been setting up a field team office in Ghazni and came as part of the advance party to coordinate communications.

We're at about 7500 feet above sea level and the nights are cold. The Chinook that arrived to fly us out only had room for four of us from Paladin and I ended up riding in the jump seat between the two pilots.

Talk about a view. And we were so high up in the mountains you could feel the air pressure changing as we descended. My personal

computer's hard drive crashed and I have lost two years of correspondence and photos. It stinks being over here and not having pictures of everyone at home to cheer me up.

September 12, Week 17 I was able to attend our command awards ceremony last Saturday morning and was one of five sailors awarded the joint Service Commendation Medal. Guess all this hard work is paying off.

Unfortunately the Suicide Vehicle Bourne IED that killed two soldiers in Kabel last week cast a shadow over that good news. You may have seen some of our guys on TV or in the pictures from CNN.com after the blast.

September 18, Week 18 Only 47 more days left in Afghanistan. Our unit has been in the news lately. Just remember when you see or read those articles that I am only communications and computer support. I am not a gunslinger going outside the wire looking for the bad guys. We leave that to people who are a lot better trained than I am for that sort of thing.

October 4, Week 20 Made it to Qatar for a much needed four day pass! After four months with no good fast food or eating establishments I was ready for Appleby's. And the visiting the mall there. Since January I have lost 45 pounds.

October 24, Week 23 I'm very busy working on local area network connectivity in the new headquarters building. It was built by the Russians when they occupied the country and the walls are 3 feet thick. I'm drilling into concrete and it's very trying.

October 30, Week 24 WooooHoooo!!! Last week in Afghanistan! My relief arrived on Sunday night and the turnover process is going pretty smooth. I moved out of my Plywood Penthouse and into open bay berthing. That's one step closer to home. By this time next week I'll be on a flight back to the United States.

I'm so excited about coming home. I'm actually looking forward to the controlled chaos I know I will experience. My cell phone will be turned back on soon and I can receive calls. Looking forward to seeing you all.

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
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

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

Fish family marriages = 576 years!

Bill Fish was driving back to his home in Marion County after the annual Fish family reunion in Macclenny last August and the thought struck him — of the 10 children of the late Benjamin Foy and Sarah Canaday Fish who lived past infancy, their marriages to the same person have spanned a total of 576 years.

You read that right. More than half a millennium, during decades when divorce became more common.

Ike Pearson and Cherrie Fish Pearson lead the way with over 64 years of marriage. Just behind are the late T.J. Raulerson and Lyma Fish Raulerson with 62.5 years. Only three out of the 11 had less than 50 years of marriage between them, and all were married for over 30 years.

"We were taught that marriage was sacred," said Bill Fish, an ex-Marion County school superintendent who has been married to wife Betty for 56 years. "It never really crossed our minds not to stay married."

Fish credits his mother and the community for the longevity of their marriages. She taught her children the value of self-reliance. If one was going to succeed, one had to work hard and not depend on anyone else.

That kind of work ethic laid the ground work for how the Fish children would live their lives and set the stage for their married lives. They were taught to be problem solvers and to communicate with their spouses. If there was a problem in their personal lives they worked through them rather than cut and run.

"My mother told me when I was a little boy, 'Son, I don't know what you'll amount to when you grow up, but if you work hard and let no man make you do what you know is wrong, you'll be all right,'" he recalls.

The Fish clan took those words to heart.

"The older I get the smarter my mother seems to get," he said, borrowing from Mark Twain's famous quip. She taught each member of the family to be self-reliant. She gave each of the children pine trees and showed them how to cut a "gash," for turpentine.

"She nailed turpentine cups to the trees. We worked our trees and kept whatever we made off of them."

The patriarch father died when Bill was only 6 years old. Sarah Fish was 43 at the time and never remarried. Benjamin Fish had provided well for his wife and family by planting rows of pecan trees that still are producing today on the old homestead off CR 127 near Taylor.

During the sparse Depression and into the war years the Fish children used the money that they made from turpentine to help provide for the family. They bought their own clothes, shoes and paid for their schooling and never thought twice about it.

Bill Fish put himself through the University of Florida and met his wife at the annual FFA banquet while working as a first-year agriculture teacher.

"All the teachers had boutonnières, and she pinned mine on me and I looked her in the eye and I just knew. I went home and told my brothers and sisters that I had found the one I was going to marry," he said.

Mr. Fish had high standards, based in part on the values instilled in him by his mother. He had put together in his mind a set of parameters that his future wife would have to meet and Betty

Teuton met them all.

"First, I didn't want her to be from a broken home. I wanted a wife with brothers and sisters, because that's where you learn to work with others. And she needed to be from a rural background," he said.

Mr. Fish started to work his way into her family's good graces. He started going to church with her and to lodge meetings with her father. She got his mother's seal of approval and about a year later they married.

"Mama liked all our spouses, or at least if she didn't, she never told us about it," he said. "She said she worried about each and every one of us children until we got married and then we were each other's responsibility."

Bill Fish also credits the small, tightly knit community with helping hold marriages together.

"Everybody knew their neighbors and knew their neighbors' business. They saw each other every day and helped out if there were problems. Also, in those days churches had a bigger part in people's lives and most people were churchgoers," he said.

Mr. Fish said he and his siblings all communicated well with their spouses and that they did a lot of things together as a family.

"It's important to do a lot of things together and be an active

part of the community," he said. "We got to know each other and after all those years there aren't really a lot of surprises."

He believes his upbringing played a pivotal role in the success of his marriage. As in every part of life, he was taught to work hard to succeed. Nothing came easy and many young people today don't have that kind of hard-scrabble life. Instead, they take the easy way out and in some cases that is divorce. Instead of working hard to solve problems, young people often turn away from them.

Not the Fish family. "We always felt that if we stuck together we could accomplish whatever we wanted to," he said.

There certainly has to be something in that way of thinking. You don't stay married for a grand total of 576 years without getting something right.

Bill Fish is the sole surviving son of Sarah and Ben. His other brothers were Dorsey, Kenneth and Wassie. Buster died as an infant.

Among the seven girls, only Iris is dead. Her surviving sisters are Lyma, Cherrie, Joyce, Ellen and Tythnes.



'Chicka Booming' across US Letter exchange linking preschoolers

Inspired by the award winning alphabet book *Chicka Chicka Boom Boom* by Bill Martin Jr., and John Archambault, three pre-K classes at the Baker County PreK-Kindergarten Center are participating in a unique letter exchange with other schools across the country.

Teacher Kelly McLarty discovered the Chicka Boom Letter Exchange project through her involvement with an online kindergarten teachers group two years ago.

Ms. McLarty and fellow pre-K teachers Catina Jones and Kimbra Lane and their classes have been sending out letters since the beginning of October. Nearly all schools that received a letter from Baker County have sent a letter back, but a few are still pending and the preschoolers are anxiously awaiting them.

Here's how the exchange works.

The project assigns a participating school a letter of the alphabet. Students engage in discussions and learn words that begin with their letter.

They also create an artfully decorated examples of their assigned letter. Then the class collaborates on composing an actual written letter introducing themselves and their school as well as sharing facts about their community and other projects they are working on.

After the letter is signed by each child, it's paired with one of the decorated alphabet letters and mailed to a participating school.

By the end of the exchange a school should have received an example of all 26 letters of the alphabet from other schools.

Ms. Jones included a geography map in her letter writing exercise so students could grasp

the location of states where letters were being sent and received from.

"We've gotten all but five letters back," she said.

The teachers say that their classes love learning about children in schools other than their own.

For example, not all classes have a lot of students. One school in Brooklyn, New York only has eight children in its class. A class at Carnell Elementary School in Pennsylvania only has two students.

"My students enjoyed learning facts about the area a school is located," Ms. Jones said. "They learned about the oldest bridge in the area, what a typical day at school is like there, those students' bus riding experiences and the projects they were engaged in, even cooking."

Students have enjoyed learning about schools in places like in Griffin, Georgia; Sutherlin, Oregon; Minneapolis, Minnesota; Holliday, Texas; Lake Zurich, Illinois and Lake Elsinore, California, where Disneyland is located.

Ms. Lane described how her students looked forward to checking the classroom mailbox to see if any letters had arrived.

"It's checked each day," she

said. "And one student is picked each day to be the mail carrier. They get to bring the mail from the box to the teacher's desk. It's a big deal."

Here is an example of a Chicka Chicka Boom Boom letter received from a school in New York.

"Hello Baker County, from Mrs. Berger's 4th and 5th graders! We live in Brooklyn, New York which is known as the Big Apple! There are 22.2 million people living in New York. Our school's name is Ann Sullivan. We start at PreK and go up to 8th grade. In our class there are 3 girls and 5 boys. We worked on the letter M so many of our favorite things begin with M like milk, money, mixing, moving and especially monkey. Your friends, Jose, Michael, Janyiah, Adam, Jennifer, Rigo, Isa, Bogdan, Mrs. Berger, Ms. Li, Ms. Debbie and Ms. Stacey."



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Larry Dupree one of Fla/Ga Hall of Famers

I ran across some interesting information the other day as I watched the Florida/Georgia game. Former Wildcat and Gator great Larry Dupree of Glen St. Mary is in the game's Hall of Fame.

Those new to Gator or Wildcat football may not know who Larry Dupree is, but he was really something. He almost went to Georgia before heading down to Gainesville, where he was a three-year backfield standout for Coach Ray Graves.

A fantastic bust of Dupree is in the front office at Baker High. He was a fantastic runner who is second in career rushing over three years with 1725 yards. Dupree played from 1962-1964 for the Gators and set a school record with 31 carries in one game against the Seminoles.

Dupree was also a three-year All-SEC and an All-American in 1964. He was one of only three players in the history of the SEC to garner the honor three years in

a row. He is in the Top 25 Gators of all time.

"He could go one speed to the next very quickly. He would get

by a linebacker before the guy realized he was by him. Then he was a great open-field runner — just a

good, natural, instinctive runner," commented Gator historian Norm Carlson.

Dupree was named All-American in his senior season at Florida and despite nursing a knee injury never missed a game.

His name surfaced recently as 20th in the *Florida Times-Union* Top 90 standout players in the annual Florida-Georgia showdown, which celebrated its 90th year two weeks ago.

So, Larry Dupree is definitely hall of fame.

The Wildcat's 20-17 district loss at home to the Bishop Kenny Crusaders was a game of missed opportunities for the hosts. Twice they were 2 yards away from the end zone and twice they were denied. In the end, the Wildcats came away empty handed. Literally.

For the Baker High Wildcat football team, it is out of the frying pan and into the fire. After a disappointing three-point loss to Bishop Kenny that cost them the district championship and a place in the playoffs, the Cats will face a Bradford County team that has seen fortune's good side.

The Tornadoes whipped Mt. Dora 40-0 to assure themselves of a spot in a three-way playoff with Keystone Heights and Mt. Dora. After six years out of the playoff picture, it was a bit of good luck for the Tornadoes.

Things continued to fall their way as Mt. Dora beat Keystone Heights to give Bradford a rematch with a team they had severely battered. It proved to be a much closer affair than Bradford would have imagined, but an 85-yard fumble recovery for a touchdown by Dakota Rice proved the difference.

It's been an up and down season for Coach Derek Chipoletti's Tornadoes. They started strong with five straight wins. Chipoletti's son Austin quarterbacks a team with quickness and athleticism. But like the Wildcats, a pair of one-point losses, but to South Sumter and Keystone Heights, kept Bradford from a perfect season.

A few weeks before the meet in Starke, Armoreda believed his team was improving day-by-day. He was just waiting for the results to bear out his confidence. His faith was rewarded October 20 as the Cats won a tri-meet

with West Nassau and Yulee in commanding fashion.

In its first home meet, the Wildcat cross country team placed first with 27 points, West Nassau took second with 34 points and Yulee finished third with 63 points. Ezra Rice, who has proven to be the boys' top runner, placed first in 20:34.

time."




