## Bought 50 boxes of meth product

Investigators arrested a Macclenny woman the afternoon of April 12 and charged her with procuring 50 boxes of the key ingredient for the addictive drug methamphetamine during the past year and a half.

Anna Burnham, 37, was taken into custody at a residence on River Hills Rd. north of Macclenny on the basis of an investigation that began with the arrest of her brother Billy Burnham, 33, of Baxter back in March.

According to Investigator John Hardin, Ms. Burnham acquired either by herself or via others 127 grams of pseudoephedrine from area pharmacies dating back to November, 2011.

Police contend that's enough to produce half that weight in methamphetamine if the entire amount was "cooked."

It was the latest meth-related arrest by investigators working both for the Baker County sheriff's department and a joint area task force made up of local and federal agents.

Investigator Hardin said a criminal complaint was prepared the same day charging Milisa Hays, 43, of Glen St. Mary with procuring the over-the-counter drug for Ms. Burnham.

The probe also implicated sisters Denia Byrd, 32, of Glen and Danielle McHenry, 24, of Macclenny as procurers for the accused.

Buying ingredients for meth manufacturing is itself a felony.

In a related case, Joseph Yolum, 32, of St. George, GA was arrested on April 11 for making pseudoephedrine purchases for Billy Burnham to be used in his meth cooking operation on Moccasin Circle in Baxter.

The operation was raided in March.

## EMS assessments to benefit higher value homes

As proposed, the county's \$135.80 special assessment for Emergency Medical Services, or EMS, coupled with a roughly 24 percent cut in the millage, or property tax, rate, would benefit the owners of parcels worth at least \$130,440 by either leaving their tax bills unchanged or reducing them for properties worth more than \$130,440. The plan would impose a heavier burden on most properties worth less than \$130,440, however. Here's a look at four homes with different values and the potential impact of the new EMS assessments on the overall tax bills for both homesteads, which are owner occupied and eligible for up to \$50,000 in value exemptions, and rentals, which are not eligible for the homestead exemptions.



## Rescue fees gain ground Bigger break on higher values

A \$135.80 annual assessment for emergency medical services, or EMS, in Baker County would be offset by a reduction in property tax bills county-wide, according to a proposal presented by county officials to the Macclenny City Commission on the evening of April 10.

Some property owners would pay the same amount in taxes to the county, including the new assessment, while others would pay a little more and

some would actually see their total tax bill drop a bit, depending upon their property valuation.

No final decision was reached during the meeting, though city and county officials were in general agreement that a final EMS assessment plan will likely be forthcoming in the next few months following a collaborative effort to fine-tune the measure.

"I feel a lot better about the situation than I did when we started this evening," City Commissioner Vern Bennett said about two hours after the meeting.

ing with county officials began shortly after 6 pm. "I think we can solve this."

City officials have made it clear all along that they would not support an assessment if it meant the taxpayers of Macclenny would be hit with another county tax on top of the taxes they already pay.

County Commission Chairman Gordon Crews, who delivered a lengthy presentation to the city commission, said everybody would pay the same assessment fee and everybody would get the same reduction in property taxes, also known

## Commission support for incinerator is peeling off

If a proposed medical waste incinerator is built near the Walmart Distribution Center it would become the City of Macclenny's thirstiest water customer, consuming an estimated 36 million gallons of water annually, or about 139,000 gallons every day.

It's probably moot, however, for the city to begin counting on the new \$345,000 annual revenue the plant would pump into city coffers.

The proposed development by Integrated Waste Management Systems Inc. [IWMS], which set off a fire storm of protest throughout the county earlier this month from residents concerned about the potential health risks, attracted more heat during a Baker County Commission meeting on April 16.

"I've tried to be objective," Commissioner Michael Crews said. "But I'm at the position now where I'm opposed to the incinerator."

Mr. Crews, who has to face the voters in a reelec-

tion campaign this year, said he was concerned that the proposed biological waste incinerator could pose a potential risk to pregnant mothers and their unborn babies.

"A child is God's gift to us all and I will not vote for anything that would destroy those babies," he said. "I strongly encourage the company to come back and have the board hear what needs to be heard and take a vote. Let's put this thing to rest one way or another. The community needs closure, this board needs closure and the company itself could use some closure."

Commissioner Mark Hartley, who chaired the board meeting this week because Chairman Gordon Crews was on vacation, declined to specify how he will vote but said he agreed that the issue should be put to a vote sooner rather than later.

"I'm ready for that last public hearing and to make a decision as quick as possible," Mr. Hartley

## Fugitive now also wanted for a rape

A Macclenny man wanted for questioning in the stabbing of his cousin on April 9 is now charged with the earlier rape of a woman in a wooded area of the south city.

Sherrie Lee, 23, is the subject of a warrant issued by the sheriff's department for sexual battery on the 40-year-old victim the night of April 8.

The woman told Investigator Chris Volz she initially agreed to have sex with Mr. Lee, then changed her mind. He then allegedly forced himself on her, and possibly held a knife to her leg.

The victim said her assailant spent the night with her and threatened bodily harm if she told anyone. She later went to

the home of an acquaintance, who notified both police and the state attorney's office.

The incident took place off MLK Dr. near Lowder St.

Mr. Lee has been at large since the early morning of April 9 when police found his cousin Alonso McQueen, 48, bleeding from a deep stab wound in the bedroom of a residence on McIver St.

Another occupant of the address told police the suspect was with Mr. McQueen at the time, and left on foot after alleging the victim rolled over on the knife while in bed.

Mr. Lee has a criminal past and is also sought for battery on a girlfriend several weeks ago.

on property valuations.

The EMS department currently operates at about a \$400,000 annual deficit, which is covered by a transfer from the county's general operating fund comprised mainly of taxes.

"Ad valorem taxes are levied based on the assessed value of a citizen's property yet all citizens receive the same level of service," Mr. Crews told city officials. "The most fair and equitable way to address the operating deficit for EMS is to levy a special assessment versus utilizing ad valorem taxes."

He said the county has legal authority to levy such an assessment but "needs cooperation from the City of Macclenny and the Town of Glen St. Mary in order to assess all the county, including those residents who reside in the city and town limits."

Facts presented in the county's presentation included the current tax rate of 7.1495 mills, or about \$7.15 for every \$1,000 of taxable property value, and the number of improved parcels that would be subject to the assessment: 6,653, excluding churches and government buildings.

If the \$135.80 assessment is ultimately approved, which would fund the full operating costs of EMS, the millage reduction would be 1.6882 mills, or about \$1.69 for every \$1,000 of taxable property value.

Under that scenario, the owner of a home with an assessed value of \$130,440 would not pay any more, nor less, in taxes. Their property tax bill would drop from \$575.11 to \$439.31 and they would begin paying \$135.80 for EMS services. The owner of a home assessed at \$123,713 would pay \$11.36 more in taxes, while the tax bill on a home valued at \$197,326 would actually see a decrease of \$112.92. The owner of a home valued at \$38,121, on the other hand, would pay \$11.50 more in taxes because their property taxes would drop from \$90.23 to \$68.93, but they would then have to pay the new \$135.80 assessment.

The figures above assume the properties qualify for the up to \$50,000 in value exemptions for homesteaded properties, also known as the "Save Our Homes" exemptions. The first \$25,000 in value is exempt from all ad valorem taxes and the \$25,000 in value from \$50,000 to \$75,000 is exempt from all taxes except those for school districts.

"Some people pay very, very little and some people pay a lot," Commissioner Crews said. "We're trying to find a happy medium."

County Commissioner Jimmy Anderson, who resides in the county but owns rental properties in Macclenny, said that "as a city

Mr. Yocom told investigators he met Mr. Burnham while in jail in Charlton County, GA and on nine occasions between January and March made the purchases.

Several times Mr. Yocom said he would pay for the drug, marketed under the name Sudafed, and Mr. Burnham reimbursed him by working on his vehicle.

Police are tipped off on the identity of the illegal purchasers via an Internet watch list tagged the National Precursor Log Exchange [NPLEX] that records the time and date the product is bought from drug stores and other retail outlets.

Stores obtain names and other information of purchasers before entering data, and commonly the transactions are recorded on video cameras.

taxpayer and a county taxpayer I think we should all pay the same fee for a service. It's just the fairest way."

Although the county's proposal did not call for any exemptions for the elderly, disabled or poor, county and city officials agreed to work together to try to provide some exemptions for families with limited incomes.

Mr. Maloney had argued that a 2002 Florida Supreme Court ruling held special assessments for EMS invalid because they benefit people instead of property. The attorney general supported Mr. Maloney's contention that the high court ruling held that special assessments for EMS do not confer a special benefit to the properties assessed and, therefore, function like traditional property taxes instead.

However, the state's top legal officer said a special assessment for EMS in Baker County is legal because another state law says such assessments imposed by

special assessment for emergency medical services would be legal under state law, even though the assessments benefit people rather than property, which is a basic requirement of special assessments.

The county already levies special assessments on properties outside the City of Macclenny for garbage and fire protection services.

City officials said they want the city to be involved in any decisions related to annual reviews or proposed increases in the EMS assessment in the future. County officials said they agree that Macclenny and the Town of Glen St. Mary would have an equal say in the process.

The city's attorney, Frank Maloney, challenged the legality of the proposed assessment late last year and the county, in response, sought an opinion from Florida Attorney General Pam Bondi to settle the dispute.

In a late February response, the attorney general's office said a

certain counties "shall be construed to be ... a tax authorized by general law," like traditional property taxes, also known as ad valorem taxes.

The law defines such counties as those within a Rural Area of Economic Concern as designated by the governor, those with less than 75,000 people and levying less than 10 mills of ad valorem tax, or those that passed an ordinance authorizing EMS assessments prior to January 1, 2002.

In other business, city commissioners:

- Approved an ordinance that would allow owners, or authorized operators, of semi truck tractors to park the vehicles on the driveways of their residence, with a city parking permit. The ordinance, which does not allow trailers attached to tractors, will receive a final review at the next commission meeting on April 10.

The following restrictions would apply:

1. The vehicle must remain

parked on an area designated as a driveway and not block any sidewalk or have any part of the truck on a city street.

2. Such parking does not violate any deed restrictions or homeowners' association rules.

3. The owner or operator must obtain written consent of neighbors on either side of his residence and those directly across the street.

4. If any nuisance or violation of city ordinances is caused by the

parking of the truck at the owner or operator's residence, the parking permit will be revoked.

## Wave off 'enviro' risk prospects

The medical waste incinerator looks to be, well, cooked.

Last week the Pennsylvania company proposing to place what it says would be a \$27 million operation east of Macclenny called for a breather before proceeding with its request for both Baker County and the city's approval.

A delay, in this case, is tantamount to throwing a bucket of ice water on a burning book of matches.

Two county commissioners declared this week they, like dozens and probably hundreds of constituents, don't want to have anything to do with the burning of medical waste in or near Baker County. Assuming they don't change their mind, that means only a single vote separates the plan and its demise.

The others, we can assume, are sniffing the air (excuse the pun) and appeared noncommittal for now. Maybe they want to give (or appear so) Integrated Waste Management Systems more time to gel up its effort to quell fears that the incinerator will be an environmental freak show.

The company insists that, with approval from the multi-layered environmental regulation agencies, what it will send into the air is harmless.

Regardless of where one comes down on the air quality portion of the controversy, it has had the effect of setting a precedent.

Baker County wants jobs like everywhere else, but this community is more environmentally conscious than many assume (though one could excuse them from thinking so based on the amount of trash on many roadways).

In the future, should anyone — from inside or outside the county — entertain the idea of bringing something here with questionable environmental impact, the battle cry will be "Remember the Incinerator!"

Here's a proposition: should the commission reject Integrated Waste's project, it might be wise to then pass a "sense of the commission" resolution saying, in effect, that the board doesn't want either the Chamber of Commerce or Development Commission wasting its time on industrial prospects likely to ignite a debate like we've wit-

nessed the past few weeks.

That doesn't mean the development agencies can't tactfully and politely listen to such proposals, but it has the advantage of sending advanced signals that we'll only go so far.

If a future county commission deems that policy too restrictive, it could rescind it.

We want Walmart Distribution Centers, Insteels (formerly Wiremil), Sanderson Pipes and Hanson Roof Tiles (a great operation slammed dunked by the recession).

Of course, so does everyone

else. But Baker County with its proximity to major interstates and the port, railroads, available workforce, ready-to-go industrial sites, rural atmosphere adjacent to big city amenities, etc. — well, we got something to sell.

When the economy gets fired up again — and it will — we've got the assets to attract industries without big smokestacks and potentially harmful emissions.


It's possible the medical waste incinerator could rise from the near ashes (please excuse that pun also) and actually end up at Enterprise East.

But it's not likely. The "medical waste" concept just didn't

sit right — gooey stuff nobody wants to look at — not to mention that aborted fetuses could be in the mix. That's downright horrific, particularly when coupled with the image of a tall smokestack; well, you know where that thought's going.

Couple that with the fact that the project was revealed about the time Baker County and environs were blanketed with blue-grey smoke from the County Line Fire and you have an image, however accidental, that just didn't play into the hands of Integrated Waste's blueprint.

Let's move on.


Former Vice President Dick Cheney recently received a new heart.



I was wondering if you can get any information on the closing/repairs they are doing on the Reynolds Road bridge. The bridge covers the FL/GA border in Baxter. I was wondering what they are doing and how long it might take. Thanks!

The project on the Reynolds Road Bridge in the north county is nearly complete and repaired rotten wooden pilings that hold up the bridge some 25 feet above the middle of North Prong of the St. Mary's River on CR 120, said county road department director Robert Fletcher early this week.

The repairs also included new curbing measuring about a foot in height along the roughly 100-foot bridge.

Mr. Fletcher said the bridge was closed beginning April 9 for the improvements and fresh cement for the pilings was poured a week later. He said the concrete should be dry by April 30, after which the bridge will reopen to traffic.

The director said his department completed the project wholly in house as part of the county's ongoing road maintenance program, which "occasionally" includes bridge work.

The 42-year-old Reynolds Road Bridge was last inspected by the Florida Department of Transportation in August of 2011 and deemed "structurally deficient" due to the overall health of the bridge.

The state's most recent quarterly bridge information report shows there are no bridges in Baker County considered structurally deficient.

The designation means that the department believes a bridge should undergo a series of repairs or replacement within the next six years.

## under control

State and federal firefighters continued to make progress during the last week on containing the 35,000-acre County Line Fire burning in the Osceola National Forest.

About 75 percent of the blaze was contained as of late Tuesday, April 17, according to an update from the team managing the wildfire response at that time.

Two days before, a small fire measuring about one-tenth of an acre sprung up on the north side of SR 2 at the Baker and Columbia County line, but was quickly contained.

Firefighters continue to monitor the larger wildfire's boundary and conduct prescribed burning to eliminate potential fuel for the fire to spread.

Following a first public hearing on the issue on April 3, which drew a standing-room-only crowd voicing unanimous opposition to the proposed development, a final hearing was set for 6 p.m. on April 16. But IWMS temporarily withdrew its application and offered to fund the hiring of an independent third-party consultant of the county's choosing to conduct a thorough review and analysis of the company's proposal.

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# Wants US 90 bypass

## Seeks grant to divert Walmart traffic

Six roads in Baker County would be paved or resurfaced and one new road built — a bypass south from the Walmart Distribution Center on US 90 to State Road 228 and State Road 121 — if county officials succeed in obtaining state grants.

The road projects, approved by the Baker County Commission on the evening of April 16, were contained in a list of grant proposals in three funding categories administered by the Florida Department of Transportation.

Targeted for resurfacing under the Small County Road Assistance Program (SCRAP) were: 4.6 miles of SR 228 south of Interstate 10 to the Duval County line; and 2.2 miles of County Road 124 from CR 127 to CR 229 North.

Plans for paving shoulders on nearly two miles of CR 125 North, from Blair Circle to Glen Haven Road, and resurfacing 9.5 miles of CR 125 from Odie's Yarborough Road to CR 250 in Taylor fell under FDOT's Small County Outreach Program (SCOP).

The shortest of the two separate projects on CR 125 is of critical importance, officials said, because of the high volume of traffic and residences in that area.

"From Odie's Yarborough on back to Blair Circle is where we have most of the problems," county road superintendent Robert Fletcher told commissioners.

Paving shoulders along the highway not only would increase safety for motorists but also for pedestrians and bicyclists who use that stretch of roadway.

The third pool of money on the county's wish list is the County Incentive Grant Program (CIGP), which funds projects that relieve congestion on state highways. The county is seeking grants to pave Glen Nursery Road and Reid Stafford Road and to help fund the easterly bypass.

The bypass would extend southward from Enterprise East Boulevard on US 90 along a corridor through woodlands to SR 228/William Barber Road and continue westerly to SR 121.

Originally, the plan envisioned the bypass ending at SR 228 in what County Manager C.J. Thompson referred to as the "Walmart to Walmart" road. However, Commissioner Michael Crews suggested seeking assistance to extend the bypass to SR 121 near Wendy's Restaurant.

Mr. Fletcher said the request, which must be submitted to the state by May 1, could be changed to reflect the longer route. The grant proposal states that the county requests funding for "planning, developing, engineering and possible construction cost."

The proclamation, requested by Mothers Against Drunk Driving, will "bring awareness to parents of the importance of talking with their kids about the dangers of drinking and driving and of the danger of drugs," said Will Hobson, prevention program specialist in the MADD Northeast Florida office in Jacksonville.

"It never hurts to ask," Mr. Crews said.

## Stories differ on scuffle after dispute following sale of horse

Criminal complaints for battery were filed against both parties following a confrontation that broke out between two men during a dispute over purchase of a horse.

The incident took place on Orby Rhoden Rd. near the residence of Brian Hance, 28, who on April 14 sold the horse to Clarence Daniels, 57, who lives in the same neighborhood as John Allen.

Mr. Hance told Deputy Daryl Mobjoy the horse was back on his property the next morning and he returned it to Mr. Daniels' property.

Several hours later Mr. Daniels brought it back, claiming the horse was ill and hadn't been checked by a veterinarian.

The seller alleged he was arrested and pushed over his fence; the buyer countered that Mr. Hance approached him and attempted to strike him, and he fell over the fence while being restrained.

Mr. Daniels also told he deputy that Mr. Hance threatened him and twice used a racial slur. He is black and Mr. Hance is white.

The participants and witness gave the deputy conflicting versions of events.

In another theft case involving jewelry, Vanessa Harrell told police two diamond watches valued at \$3000 each were missing from a box stored in the console of her vehicle.

Ms. Harrell said she last saw the watches in December and noticed them gone on April 8.

She gave Deputy Brandon Kiser the name of a man she employed as a yard worker at the residence on CR 125 north late last year and had access to her vehicle.

She also said the man may be responsible for the apparent theft of iron lawn furniture worth \$500.
