Mistrial declared in rape trial last week Judge feared comment biased

The day-long trial of a Baker County man for sexual battery on a young girl came to abrupt halt the afternoon of August 3 when the judge declared a mistrial because she feared a defense attorney's closing argument may have biased the jury.

The decision means a new trial date will be set for later this year on the two felony counts pending against Charleton D. Lauramore. He is charged with raping a girl under the age of 12 on at least five occasions between December, 2005 and June of the following year.

Both the 45-year-old defendant and the victim testified earlier that day before the six-member jury began deliberation in the late afternoon. The jury foreman sent a note to Judge Phyllis Rosier shortly after inquiring about the maximum sentences under law for sexual battery and battery.

Before the jury was sent to deliberate, the judge mentioned during routine instructions that those two charges are options if the panel voted for conviction rather than an acquittal.

In his closing remarks, assistant public defender George Nelson remarked to the jury that it had Mr. Lauramore's "life in your hands" and Judge Rosier decided that may have been prejudicial. In fact, Mr. Lauramore could get life if convicted.

The jury that included five females was dismissed and the case will be re-set. The original trial date of July 11 had been twice postponed, once due to illness of assistant state attorney Lorelie Papel and the second time because of a feared outbreak of chicken pox at county jail where the defendant is housed.

Mr. Lauramore has a history of violent behavior, and in October, 2006 was sentenced to five years in prison for felony battery. He was released in the summer of 2011 and the victim made her allegations while he was still in a west Florida prison.

Mud flies in GOP runoff for sheriff

Most of the time local candidates running for public office focus on their own experience and qualifications in campaign ads. But in recent weeks some of the ads have taken a decidedly different approach, leveling attacks against the opposition.

The mud-slinging has been most apparent in the race for the Republican Party's candidate for sheriff in the general election.

Second-time sheriff candidate Gregory Bohannon, 50, has published multiple ads calling into question newcomer Cameron Coward's conduct as a deputy with the St. Johns County Sheriff's Office.

Mr. Bohannon has claimed his 28-year-old opponent failed to fulfill the terms of a school security contract by not neatly maintaining an on-campus residence and received a reprimand from his superiors. Another ad said he was suspended for failing to submit evidence, and as a result, a criminal case was dismissed.

A third ad asserts that Mr. Coward was disciplined and placed under investigation numerous times by his employer.

Mr. Coward responded with his own message, which was repeated in the newspaper and at *The Press'* candidate forum July 28, that the attack ads were "outright lies" and misleading. He also

conveyed his commitment to running a clean campaign.

In an effort to separate fact from fiction, *The Press* reviewed Mr. Coward's personnel files at the St. Johns County Sheriff's Office this week.

Mr. Bohannon had previously delivered 12 pages from the files, which consisted of several hundred pages in all, to

the newspaper at the candidate forum about a week prior to the review.

Mr. Coward's most recent annual evaluation was positive. He's received seven letters of commendation since he joined sheriff's office in 2004 and multiple awards from his commanding officers including one for administering "life saving measures" to a heart attack

victim.

Mr. Coward did, however, receive a one-day suspension for violating two department policies.

One prohibits officers from taking actions or making statements that "tend to bring the sheriff's office into disrepute or ridicule ..." which an internal investigation found Mr. Cameron did by abandoning the mobile home he was residing in while serving as an on-campus security guard at Nease High School and allowing the property to become unkept.

According to the candidate's personnel files, Mr. Coward also failed to register the trailer and his driver's license was suspended when the citation issued in 2010 for the registration violation went unpaid. Mr. Coward had moved out of the residence, but failed to update his driver's license address, which is also violation of the sheriff's office policy.

Another internal investigation resulted in a letter of reprimand, but not a suspension as Mr. Bohannon's campaign ad asserts, Mr. Coward said this week.

In that case, records show, Mr. Coward failed to turn into evidence a retractable baton confiscated from a suspect in 2008, and when confronted about it by an internal affairs investigator, he said he kept the weapon because he feared

Old Castle mining mounts PR push

Sand mining company Old Castle Southern Group has been on the offensive in recent weeks meeting with government officials, business owners and others in preparation for the upcoming hearing before the Baker County Commission.

The county has moved the August 20 hearing on the Tampa-based company's proposal to the courthouse in anticipation of a large crowd attending the 6 pm meeting.

Last June commissioners delayed consideration of zoning exceptions to accommodate Old Castle's mining plans and those of another firm, E.R. Jahna, Inc. of Lake Wales, for two months.

That's when a group of concerned residents launched a campaign to spur opposition to the plans and pressure commissioners, three of whom are up for re-election this year, to vote against the exception applications.

Old Castle and Jahna hope to mine hundreds of acres at two sites southeast and northeast of Macclenny, respectively, during the next several decades. They must obtain the

exceptions because mining is not generally permitted in the agricultural zoning districts where the tracts are located.

Both properties have historically been used for timber production.

In the meantime, Old Castle hired Elizabeth Revell, a public relations consultant from Fernandina Beach with experience helping companies combat the often negative perception of the mining industry.

Ms. Revell said she's been doing public outreach "to meet face-to-face with anybody and everybody we can." She's set up meetings between the head of Old Castle's aggregates division, Dennis McClelland, and neighboring landowners, business people, church groups, elected officials and county staff.

But not everyone wants to meet with the company, Mr. McClelland said during an hour-long conversation with County Commissioner Michael Crews the afternoon of August 3 at the county administration building. *The Press* was invited to the summit as well.

"They have their mind made up and it doesn't really make a difference what the facts are," Mr. McClelland said of the project's detractors.

From Mr. Crews' view, Old Castle's attorney at the last hearing, Wyman Duggan, insulted the board by telling commissioners they should consider the company's application in light of the law, not public opinion.

"The public's concern is my concern," Mr. Crews told Mr. McClelland and Ms. Revell, who was also at the meeting.

Now, the company is attempting to polish its public image. Old Castle is buying ad space to tout the results of a recently finished economic impact study and seeking a permit from the St. Johns River Water Management District to withdraw 2-3 million gallons per day from a deep aquifer well.

Ms. Revell said those ef-





 forts, combined with the soon-to-be completed analysis of the mining plans by a "independent, third-party" engineer, selected by the county and paid by Old Castle and E.R. Jahna, should help the company, and perhaps, ease fears that mining could adversely impact the local water supply and cause traffic headaches on the county's roadways.

"We don't want to be seen like we're making a last ditch effort or sales pitch," she said. "We're just trying to be transparent and tell people who we are and what we're about."

Mr. McClelland explained that the company has calculated the impact of its proposed water withdrawals from the lower aquifer.

He said the company's analysis shows that there will be no impact on the upper aquifer, where most residential wells pull water from, and a drawdown of 1.3 inches on the middle layer of the aquifer, where the City of Macclenny obtains its water supply.

"It's all just flowing out to the ocean anyway," Mr. McClelland said of the water in the lower aquifer.

The economic impact study, commissioned by Old Castle from Fishkind & Associates of Orlando, has not been released by the company yet, but Mr. McClelland said it estimates \$6.8 million of commerce during the 12- to 18-month construction phase of the mine, including \$2.5 million in "construction earnings" and 72 total construction jobs.

"Will all those be here? Probably not," he said.

The mining operation itself will generate \$4.4 million in annual economic impact following construction, Mr. McClelland said, including 16 permanent jobs, local taxes and ancillary impacts like purchases at the hard-

ware store and work for trucking companies who would be hired to haul the mined material.

To address concerns about potential damage to local roads, Mr. McClelland said Old Castle would assist with road repairs if damage occurs near its project site.

"If something happens on the county road, we'll be there to help you," he said.

Mr. McClelland also said the company would agree to donate the mining property, 436 acres in all, which will include wetlands and some 190 acres of man-made lakes, to the county for public use after operations cease.

That will not work," he said. "It's like borrowing money on a house for 20 years, but you can only live in it for two years and you have to keep paying on it for 18 years."

Unlike Old Castle, the other mining firm E.R. Jahna has not pursued public outreach efforts since the last hearing.

It's attorney, Corby Myers,

said Jahna may be in a position to help fund road repairs and maintenance, but it's not open to a limited zoning exception, either.

"Our initial investment is \$6-\$10 million and not knowing if you're going to be there a year or two from now makes any kind of business decision very difficult," said Mr. Myers.

"What we've been working on is getting the information in a timely manner to the independent third party reviewer," he said. "Hopefully that will quell some of the fears of the public on the water use and they'll see there's minimal to no impact on water resources."

Commissioners may be faced with another standing room-only crowd later this month at the courthouse. If recent history is any indication, many will voice reservations about the sand mining projects. Petition signatures being collected in the community against the projects are rumored to have some 2500 names, according to Commissioner Crews.

"When that many folks come out and say there opposed to something like this, your work's cut out for you," he said.

Bridge repair time murky Dependant on FEMA

Three bridges damaged during Tropical Storm Debby remain impassable and officials don't know when they may be fixed.

Traffic is being detoured around the Cedar Creek Bridge on CR 127, which lost a roughly 100-foot section. Motorists should take CR 229 to CR 124 to CR 127 to bypass the bridge.

Road department director, Robert Fletcher, said the Federal Emergency Management Agency will help fund its repair.

"It has to be rebuilt," said Mr. Fletcher. "There's no way around that. I can't give you any time frame. It has to go through the state and the feds."

Florida Department of Transportation spokeswoman Gina Busscher confirmed the project does qualify for federal funds, but its unclear when work would move forward.

"There are no funds in the work program to replace [the bridge]," she said via e-mail this week. "The repair costs are approaching the cost it would take to replace [the bridge]. It does qualify for federal aid. It is a candidate for replacement, but outside of our 5-year work program."

The detour for the closed Green's Creek Bridge at CR 229 S. is not long — CR 130 to Richardson Road to South Prong Cemetery Road to CR 229 — but it passes over a single-lane bridge on Richardson.

To avoid that, drivers must travel about 18 miles out of the way to take SR 121, Mr. Fletcher said.

There is major erosion around the wooden pilings supporting the bridge, which makes it unstable. Mr. Fletcher said the Green's Creek Bridge is on FDOT's replacement list, but not until 2017.

"They're trying to get it moved up for funding next year, in 2013. In the meantime, the state has temporary Acrow Bridges we can borrow to get traffic going," he said.

Funding from the Federal Highway Administration, which FDOT must seek on the county's behalf, will be needed for a long-term fix.

Ms. Busscher said the project has qualified for federal aid.

The Reynolds Road Bridge on CR 120 into Georgia is perhaps the least traveled of the three bridges, but FEMA will also assist with its repair, too, Mr. Fletcher said.

Much of its foundation is still underwater, however. "We have to wait for water to come down so we can do our own inspections," said Mr. Fletcher. "We know we have some erosion around it."

FEMA will also need to evaluate the bridge.

Ran stop sign with 12 suspensions

County deputies arrested three persons the past week for driving with multiple license suspensions, one of them as an habitual offender.

Looted laundromat of coins

A north Macclenny man whose wife had recently been fired from Baker Laundromat has been charged with entering the business on South 6th St. shortly after midnight on July 31 and stealing an estimated \$135 in coins.

Urban Cady, 52, admitted to prying open a rear door then kicking down an office door at the laundromat because he needed money for drugs, according to the investigative report by Deputy Daryl Mobley.

Police went to his Ivy St. home later that day after a surveillance video from nearby Winn-Dixie showed a white Chevrolet pickup that matched the description of the suspect's vehicle in the vicinity about 12:39 am when a second video in the laundromat caught the image of a white male engaged in the burglary.

Owner Carol Goodman of White Springs said \$100.35 in coins were left wrapped in a towel and placed in a basket in the office. Stashing the store receipts in that fashion was known to employees, including Mr. Cady's wife Malisa, 47, the fired employee.

Mrs. Cady admitted to Deputy Mobley that she accompanied her husband that morning and went with him to Jacksonville to purchase drugs after the burglary. She has not been charged.

Ms. Goodman estimated \$1200 damage was done to the premises, including the lock on the rear door and the cost to replace both doors. Also included in the missing cash was \$35 in in-house coins retained for "dry-fold."

Keys to dryer coin boxes were also missing, and the couple told police they pitched the basket and

other items out the window en route to Jacksonville, where Mr. Cady made an unsuccessful attempt to purchase drugs.

In a similar incident, police have video surveillance of a white male who pried a coin change machine at the Glen Laundromat the afternoon of August 4.

Deputy Randy Davis said the suspect, about six feet in height wearing tan shorts, a red shirt, white and black tennis shoes and a ball cap, placed paper over two surveillance cameras inside the building on US 90 before prying the machine. The time was 4:32.

The suspect and another white male were also seen on another camera stationed at the Country Boy's store to the east. The suspect entered the laundromat for several minutes before exiting and going to the trunk of a dark mid-size four-door car, then re-entering the building. The second suspect was a lookout.

The report does not indicate that owner Larry Davis of Glen St. Mary reported any money taken from the machine.

In another report, a criminal complaint for felony theft was filed August 2 naming Matthew Simmons, 25, of Glen St. Mary for taking a \$422 impact wrench and accessories from Jammie Starling of Macclenny.

The victim called police when he learned the set was pawned at Baker Gun and Pawn on South 6th by the suspect. Deputy Koty Crews filed the complaint after attempts to contact Mr. Simmons were unsuccessful.

Passenger wanted in Columbia

County deputies arrested four persons recently who were wanted on both local and out-of-county warrants.

Deputy Clements Leo stopped a vehicle on CR 229 north of Sanderson just after midnight on August 4 and learned that passenger Bobby Barnes, 34, of north Baker County was wanted in Columbia County for failure to appear in court on a suspended license charge.

Sanderson resident Debra Bussey, 58, was driving a vehicle on Interstate 10 the evening of August 3 when Deputy Jacob Satterwhite followed and stopped it as it weaved out of a travel lane several times.

The officer learned that Ms. Bussey was wanted in Columbia County for violating probation on a bad check charge.

Deputy Patrick McGauley said Darell Barnwell, 25, ran briefly from a residence on Bertha Mae Harris Rd. the afternoon of August 1 when the officer drove up to serve a warrant.

The suspect, sought for violating probation on a suspended license charge, halted when the officer threatened to release his K-9 dog Tango.

Mariah Trospier, 20, of Macclenny was arrested the morning of August 1 in north Macclenny on a warrant for violating probation on a marijuana possession charge.

Both arrested after domestic

Police arrested both parties to a domestic dispute at a residence on Water Oak Lane near Sanderson the afternoon of August 2.

Deputy Jeremiah Combs said he responded to the address shortly after 5 o'clock and was told by Kelly Sanders, 25, that she was attacked by boyfriend David Arnett, 28, during a confrontation that began after he accused her of being addicted to prescription drugs. Mr. Arnett had fled into nearby woods and a subsequent search by a county K-9 dog was conducted without success.

Shortly after deputies left the property, they were called back when Mr. Arnett returned and threatened to flee back into the woods with the couple's three children. When Deputy Combs confronted him, he gave the child in his possession to Ms. Sanders' father and was taken into custody.

Mr. Arnett allegedly resisted with a head butt to several officers when they were placing him in a patrol car and that resulted in a charge of resisting with violence in addition to domestic battery.

Homeless boy arrested for burglary

Police arrested a 16-year-old boy described as homeless and without a guardian and charged him with burglary and grand theft of a residence on Benny Givens Ct. north of Sanderson on August 5.

Deputy Jacob Satterwhite said the boy was found hiding under a porch attached to the YMCA building in Jonesville Park off CR 127 about 5:30 pm. He was spotted at the park minutes earlier by William Lee Jr., whose parents' residence was entered via a bedroom door earlier.

The boy had on a pair of boots taken from the residence and Mr. Lee later recovered jewelry, a watch and coins also taken from his parents. They were stashed in a backpack under the same porch.

The officer also spoke to William Lee Sr. and his wife Penny, who like their son had seen the suspect near their residence earlier. Mrs. Lee said the boy had come to her front door earlier that day looking for her husband, and was likely aware they would be in church that morning.

The recovered jewelry, including six rings and three bracelets, was valued at \$1600. Loose change of about \$20 was also taken from a bedroom dresser and among the property in the backpack.

In other burglaries, Ronald Taylor Jr. reported two dirt bikes taken from an unlocked shed on his property off CR 127 between the evenings of July 30 and August 1.

The vehicles, a 2007 Kawasaki and 2005 Honda, were valued at \$3000 each, and Mr. Taylor indicated to Deputy Robert Simpkins he might know who was responsible.

Eric Johnson called police when he noticed the evening of August 1 that the door of his

The manager said she confronted the accused for fighting with another female patron about 1:50 am.



disciplinary actions by his superiors.

An assistant state attorney later dismissed the case against the suspect because "the chain of custody had been compromised," the investigator's report states.

Mr. Bohannon claimed that his opponent was suspended as a result of the investigation. While Mr. Coward's personnel files note a one-day, unpaid suspension was recommended as punishment, Mr. Coward said the suspension never took place and he was not, as Mr. Bohannon's ad stated, relieved of his duties as a training officer.

Rather, Mr. Coward said, he lost his training officer duties last year as a result of his off-duty activities, including launching his campaign to become Baker County's next sheriff.

A number of other complaints against Mr. Coward, one of which has appeared in Mr. Bohannon's ads, have been investigated by the sheriff's office and found to be "unsustained."

Mr. Coward took issue with a campaign ad stating he was placed under investigation for "refusing to assist a stranded elderly female motorist."

Mr. Coward's personnel file includes a complaint from a female driver who flagged the officer down for help in changing a tire that was going flat. The complaint says the motorist alleged the officer refused and her tire eventually went flat, leaving her temporarily stranded on the interstate at 10 pm.

The allegations were not sustained following an investigation, records show.

Mr. Coward said the driver was in fact not elderly, as his opponent says, and did not need her tire changed. Instead, Mr. Coward said, the driver was a UNF student, likely in her 20s, and the vehicle's tires were not flat. Still, he directed her to an air pump at a nearby gas station, he said.

Other candidates have been criticizing their opponents as well, though some more directly

than others.

'Absentee candidate' vs. 'career politician'

In the District 1 contest on the school board, 28-year incumbent Dwight Crews has noted that his challenger, Clayton Griffis, has not attended a school board meeting since he announced his run for office last spring.

Mr. Griffis does not dispute his lack of attendance. He said he last visited the school board more than two years ago.

"I went one time and that's all I needed," Mr. Griffis said this week, adding that his experience before the school board, in part, spurred him to seek the office. Furthermore, the duties and responsibilities of school board members are clearly outlined by the Florida Department of Education, he said.

Mr. Griffis' campaign, meanwhile, has been directing its ire at Mr. Crews' lengthy stay in office and using buzz words like "career politician" in its ads. Mr. Crews has indeed been in office nearly three decades, but he contends that's a testament to his effectiveness in the post.

Competing portraits of local schools

In the other school board race, in which incumbent Patricia Weeks is facing Macclenny businessman Andy Johnston, the campaigns haven't become personal, but they do present differing images of the school district.

A recent ad from Mr. Johnston's campaign points out the district is ranked 51st out of 67 in the state, 43 percent of children here failed the FCAT reading test, almost 40 percent failed the math FCAT and 64 percent failed the science test.

An examination of the 2012 FCAT results shows that two of the three percentages are accurate, with the share of students failing the science test being 10 points lower at 54 percent.

Mr. Johnston and Mr. Griffis,

both seeking public office for the first time, have also used the local graduation rate to make their case that new leadership is needed in the district.

Mr. Griffis' campaign ad states the graduation rate here is lower than in Nassau, Union, St. Johns and Clay counties, and that less than two out of three minorities graduate.

Both assertions are true for the 2010-11 school year. More specifically, however, the graduation rate for black students was 64.3 percent that year.

The Florida Department of Education has not yet released the 2011-12 graduation rates.

Mr. Johnston's contention that the Baker County "is significantly behind surrounding counties in graduation rates" is partially accurate.

The gap between Baker County's most recent graduation rate, 83.3 percent, and the rates of Nassau, St. Johns and Union counties is roughly 10 percentage points.

The difference between Baker County and Columbia County's 86.8 percent graduation rate is 3.5 percentage points, and Baker County tops Duval, Bradford and Putnam counties in terms of the share of students it graduates.

What expense account?

There hasn't been many jobs thrown in the District 1 county commission contest between former commissioner James Croft and first-term commissioner Michael Crews in the weeks leading up to the August 14 primary.

Both men are registered Republicans. Due to the lack of an opponent from a different party in the general election, all registered voters may cast ballots in the race.

Still, Mr. Croft's recent ad detailing his plans should he win the election included his pledge to support eliminating "expense accounts" for commissioners.

County Manager C.J. Thompson clarified this week that commissioners are given monthly

stipends for their cell phones (\$50) and travel (\$100), but do not have county-issued credit cards or access to any other public funds for personal use.

The stipends are intended to cover travel expenses and calls related to their official duties, like attending meetings of various regional boards on which the county has an interest or taking calls from constituents. Commissioners are not required to submit receipts, however.

Percentage error

The reduction in the budget sought for the county commission portion of the clerk of courts budget for next year is 13.1 percent.

In last week's edition, that figure was erroneously reported at 8.7 percent. The amount sought next fiscal year is \$254,320, down from \$292,495 during the current period.

Wary of transportation alliance Pending a 'cost versus benefits' analysis

Whether Baker County joins a proposed seven-county agency to develop and implement future plans for a multimodal transportation network for Northeast Florida hinges on two key questions.

How much will it cost the taxpayers of Baker County? What's in it for Baker County?

County commissioners hoped to have some answers to those questions when the top official of the leading agency involved in the Northeast Florida Regional Transportation Study Commission met with them to discuss the proposal during an informal meeting at 4 pm on August 7.

But Brian Teeple, chief executive officer of the Northeast Florida Regional Planning Council, said it was too early yet to know how much counties would be assessed for their portion of the total costs, and too early to know what specific projects might be in the works for Baker County.

Afterward, commissioners said they won't be inclined to participate until they get concrete answers to those two very important questions.

Mr. Teeple said it could be early next year before costs are known. He also told commissioners that counties must make their intentions known before the Florida Legislature meets next year to vote on whether to create the proposed regional transportation commission.

Currently, there are five regional transportation authorities in Florida in all major populated areas except the northeastern corner of the state. Mr. Teeple said the sixth regional transportation authority could include the seven counties in Northeast Florida: Baker, Clay, Duval, Flagler, Nassau, Putnam and St. Johns.

Membership of the four counties in the North Florida Transportation Planning Organization — Duval, Clay, Nassau and St. Johns — would be enough for the Legislature to create the new agency, Mr. Teeple said. He added, however, that the study commission also wants Baker, Putnam and Flagler to participate.

"We hope there will be opportunities to help finance local (transportation) projects," he said.

He told county commissioners he didn't have to have their answer immediately because implementation won't come until next year, assuming state lawmakers approve the concept.

Each county's cost, he said, would be assessed on a per capita basis, adding, "We're trying to keep it as low as possible."

At one time, he said, the cost to administer the proposed commission was estimated at \$200,000 to \$300,000 to hire a planning director and supporting staff. More recent cost projections put the figure at no more than about \$150,000, he said.

One thing that must be accomplished in order for the plan to become successful is to identify dedicated funding sources for necessary capital for transportation improvements. Mr. Teeple said possibly sales taxes and gasoline taxes could be among those sources targeted.

The Northeast Florida Regional Transportation Study Commission has been working for over a year and a half to examine the need for a long-term plan to coordinate multimodal regional transportation to enhance overall economic competitiveness and mobility for the region.

The study commission has outlined the following as support for a regional transportation approach:

An efficient regional transportation system is central to the future economic competitiveness

and quality of life for Northeast Florida.

"There is an opportunity for enhanced coordination of planners and implementers on a regional scale specifically for regionally significant projects.

"There is a need for new, dedicated regional funding for regional transportation.

Having a strong and consistent regional voice on transportation issues is increasingly important in the successful pursuit of state, federal and private transportation funding.

A final draft recommendation is expected to be presented to the Florida Legislature in December.

Later, during a regular commission meeting that began at 5 pm, commissioners:

• Scheduled public hearings on two controversial sand mining proposals beginning at 6 pm on August 20. Because such a large crowd is expected for the hearings, they will be conducted in the larger Courtroom No. 1 in the county courthouse instead of the much smaller county commission chambers.

During a previous hearing on the sand mining proposals the county administration building was swamped with opponents, many of whom managed to get inside the commission chambers to voice their objections to the mining proposals.

Most of those expressed concerns for the adverse impact mining would have on the Floridan Aquifer and local water supplies, as well as increased heavy truck traffic hauling sand through the county.

Scheduled workshops for the 2012-13 county budget at 3 pm on August 27 and September 4 and scheduled public hearing dates for the new budget at 6 pm on September 17 and a final hearing at 6 pm on October 2, one day after the new fiscal year begins.

Adopted a resolution proclaiming September 12 as Muscular Dystrophy Association Firefighter Appreciation Month. The proclamation was requested by the MDA to recognize firefighters for their many years of volunteer work in annual boot drives to collect money to fight muscular dystrophy.

1466 students treated at schools 'A lot of sick children,' declares superintendent

For nearly a third of all students in Baker County public schools getting an education is only part of their campus lives. They also require special services that only a trained medical professional can deliver.

During the last school year, 1,466 students were treated by school nurses for an assortment of conditions ranging from allergies and asthma to much more serious health problems, according to the 2011-12 Annual School Health Services Report approved by the school board on the evening of August 6.

"We have a lot of sick children and they need professional care," said Superintendent Sherrie Raulerson. "Some of them have serious illnesses."

School district nurses often administer medications and perform medical procedures for many students, including some with major illnesses such as cancer, diabetes, heart problems, breathing disorders, kidney disorders and cerebral palsy.

The highest reported medical problem among students was 500 cases of asthma. The school district also reported 403 children with allergies, including 80 with "severe" allergies; 50 prone to seizures, including epilepsy; 40 with cardiac conditions; 19 diabetics; 11 with kidney disorders; four with cancer; three

with bleeding disorders; two with psychiatric conditions; and two with sickle-cell anemia.

Additionally, 10 students had a rare condition known as osteogenesis imperfecta, a genetic disorder characterized by bones that break easily. Another 307 with "other" health conditions that required the care and attention of school nurses.

"We're very pleased to have such good nurses in our schools," Mrs. Raulerson said, adding that about 93 percent of all the students who receive treatment from a school nurse are able to go back to the classroom.

In a related matter, the board adopted a new 2012-14 School Health Services Plan that contains all the policies and procedures for implementing basic health services to all public school students, as mandated by the Florida Department of Education.

The 27-page report states that parents will be required at the beginning of each school year to fill out emergency information cards with updated medical information on their children for review by school nurses.

Further, school health nurses are required to develop individualized health care plans and emergency plans for students with active and chronic health needs that need to be met during school or school sponsored activities.

The board did not discuss the

2012-14 health services plan, nor the 2011-12 health services report, which Chairman Dean Griffis noted was a lengthy and detailed document. However, he expressed pride in the quality of treatment given to the students by nursing staff.

"We do have a very good health program in our schools," Mr. Griffis said.

In other business, the board: • Adopted the new bus routes and a new operator's handbook for all bus drivers for the coming school year, which officials said were changed very little from last year.

"We did some tweaking and shifted some riders around but here are no new bus routes," Johnnie Jacobs, director of transportation, told the board. "We don't need new routes."

Mrs. Raulerson praised the transportation department for the good job it does transporting students safely and in a timely fashion, considering all the dirt roads in the county that are in rough condition.

Those rough dirt roads are the major reason six buses were declared surplus and approved by the board for sale to the highest bidder. Officials said the vehicles were worn out by years of traveling over bumpy roads.

"The dirt roads we have in our county pretty well beat our buses up," especially those with about 200,000 miles or more on them, Mr. Griffis said.

Five drama productions set

The BCHS drama department and the Baker County Community Theatre have an interesting and varied program for the upcoming season with five productions.

The season opens with a one-night only gala celebration of the reopening of the BCHS Theatre after a \$30,000 refurbishment with new stage curtains and padded seats, the result of a two-year fund raising campaign from ticket sales and business sponsors.

The show is called *Encore!* featuring songs and scenes from 30 years of BCHS drama productions. Many of the original performers are coming back for the Sept. 15 show. *Encore!* is emceed by School Superintendent Sherrie Raulerson and Spencer Norman-Gerard.

The fall BCHS drama production in October is four one-act plays — two comedies and two dramas. The dramas include Shirley Jackson's *The Lottery* and a tense science fiction tale called *The Cold Equations*. The comedies include a parody of romance novels called *Desire on Domino Island* and Jean Shepherd's (A Christmas Story) *Scat Farkas* and the *Murderous Mariah*.

The drama departments most popular productions are the *Broadway* in Baker events. One features favorite Christmas songs, carols and funny scenes as well as a traditional Christmas choir.

Broadway in Baker 6 in February is a high energy perfor-

mance of songs from the Broadway stage.

The season's final show in April is the premier of *The Old Time Gospel Jubilee*, a musical based on a gospel radio show from 1948. The show features great old gospel songs like "I Saw

the Light," "Church in the Wildwood," "Blessed Assurance," "Will The Circle Be Unbroken," "Uncloudy Day," and "I'll Fly Away." There are comic scenes, a dramatic testimony and a live gospel band.
