Three are implicated for check, ATM fraud

Two brothers were arrested earlier this month and a third alleged accomplice now in jail in Jacksonville will be charged in a check writing scam in late July that resulted in at least \$800 in fraudulent withdrawals from an ATM on a Vystar debit card.

Aaron Taylor, 22, of Glen St. Mary is charged with defrauding a financial institution and issuing a counterfeit check. Ryan Taylor, 19, of Macclenny is charged with defrauding a financial institution, forgery of a public record, issuing counterfeit checks and issuing checks on accounts with insufficient funds.

Toddler is okay after hit by taxi

A toddler escaped serious injury when a van taxi backed over her in the driveway of her parents' residence off Mud Lake Rd. the morning of August 20.

The injuries to 2-year-old Madison Bennett were described as minor abrasions from when she was struck by the rear of a 2004 Chevrolet van driven by David Sanders, 33, of Jacksonville.

The taxi had just returned with the baby and her parents to Sunshine Lane near CR 130 from a methadone drug treatment center in Jacksonville when the accident occurred about 10:30.

Trooper Justin Smatt of the Florida Highway Patrol said the baby was dragged underneath the cab and Mr. Sanders "stopped immediately" when he realized she was under the vehicle.

Mining companies withdraw zoning petitions

Two separate sand mining proposals totaling nearly 500 acres in Baker County were put on hold by the Baker County Commission on the evening of August 20 after the applicants withdrew their petitions to allow more time for reviews of the plans by regulatory agencies and a consultant for the county.

The decision to postpone the matter was not received well by members of the audience, however, as dozens of opponents had come to the meeting on a rainy night hoping the plans would be rejected.

"I just think it's a stalling tactic by the sand mines to give them more time to get all their things in order," said Pat Shannon, one of an estimated 60-70 people in attendance at the meeting, which was held in the biggest courtroom at the county courthouse because a large gathering was expected.

"I call for a vote up or down — period! The majority of people are against the sand mines," Mr. Shannon said.

There would be no vote that night, however, nor would the county accept a petition signed by residents urging denial of the mining proposals because the hearing, scheduled to begin at 6 pm, was cancelled during a regular commission meeting that began an hour earlier.

In e-mails sent to County Manager C.J. Thompson earlier that afternoon, the two companies — Old Castle Southern Group of Tampa and E.R. Jahna, Inc. of Lake Wales — had asked for a final vote to be deferred, an action that would have been considered after the public hearing began.

But about 5:15 pm, County Attorney Terry Brown announced that the two firms had asked him if they could legally withdraw their applications. He told them they could.

At that point, Commission Chairman Gordon Crews announced that he knew a lot of people in the audience were interested in the issue but that the public hearing would have to be cancelled. That's when Mr. Shannon stood and made his comments, which received no response from commissioners.

Marcus Rhoden, a member of a citizens group that recently worked to defeat a proposed medical waste incinerator in the same Trail Ridge vicinity targeted for mining by E.R. Jahna, also was disappointed that the board would not accept a petition that he said contained the signatures of more than 2,000 residents county wide opposed to sand mining.

"We wanted to see a vote," Mr. Rhoden said. "We wanted it over with — final."

Commissioners delayed voting on the mining projects in June after some board members said they had not heard enough information concerning potential impacts on local water resources to make a fully informed decision.

Specifically, the two mining companies are asking the county to

grant zoning exceptions to allow mining operations on property zoned for agricultural use, which generally prohibits such activity.

County land development regulations require the applicants to obtain permits from the St. Johns River Water Management District (SJRWMD) and the Florida Department of Environmental Protection, which regulates surface water and wetland impacts, before mining operations begin.

That's where the process has stalled. Both agencies are seeking additional information, including the results of an extensive test well drilling and sampling program in accordance with state environmental standards.

Old Castle is seeking a 20-year consumptive use permit from the water management district to withdraw roughly two million gallons daily from the lower Floridan Aquifer during the first five years of mining and about 100,000 gallons per day for the next 15 years. The company agreed to construct the well and do the required sampling, but only after the permit is issued.

E.R. Jahna, in an application submitted to the water management district on August 7, is requesting a 20-year permit to withdraw 2.16 million gallons of water daily from the lower aquifer for five years and 180,000 gallons per day for the next 15 years.

The FDEP review will include an evaluation of potential impacts that the mining plans could have on the water table, wetlands and shallow wells, according to HSW Engineering in Tampa, an independent consultant hired by the county and paid for by the mining companies for a third-party evaluation of the proposals.

HSE submitted two interim reports to the county on August 17, in which associate engineer Dean M. Mades noted the ongoing review process for both companies and stated that insufficient information is known "relating to the potential for environmental harm, primarily to nearby offsite wetlands; flood damages associated with a high water table near the tailings (waste material) storage and processing areas where process water, product and waste tailings will be stored; and violation of state water quality standards."

Mr. Mades also made the following comments in his report:

"The localized modeling is insufficient ... to evaluate the potential effects of mining on wetland hydrology and groundwater levels and lake stages associated with wet- and dry-season antecedent conditions."

"There are no nearby wells constructed in the Lower Floridan Aquifer, hence site-specific data are lacking to characterize the chemistry of the LFA at the proposed mine site. The SJRWMD has inferred from regional water-quality data that the LFA water quality may be suitable for makeup mining process water and

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



release to the mine lake."

A final report will be submitted to the county after additional tests have been completed as required by the state, Mr. Mades said.

In a letter to the county manager dated August 20, Douglas Rillstone, a Tallahassee attorney representing E.R. Jahna, stated that his client was "in the process of completing the analysis of whether there will be any localized effects on the water table as requested by these regulatory agencies, and will provide such analysis to HSW and these regulatory agencies."

"It could be two months or two years, I don't know," he said.

Critics say it's in for the long haul. No matter how long it takes, they'll continue to fight.

"We're not giving up," Mr. Rhoden said. "We're going back to neighborhoods throughout the county, knocking on more doors. Our goal is to make it 5,000 signatures."

He said he wanted to make it clear that the citizens group he represents is not anti-business, simply concerned about the county's limited natural resources.

"We don't want to be labeled as anti-industry," Mr. Rhoden said. "We want to have industry in our county if it's not going to be detrimental. But this (sand mining) would be taking out so much of our natural resources for little or nothing back. Our biggest concern is the consumption of our drinking water and the effect on our wells."

"We've talked to so many people in our county and we found less than half a dozen that were in favor of it," he said, adding that two of them worked for DuPont, which owns the land Old Castle plans to mine under a lease in the southeastern part of the county.

Despite the technical reasons for the commission's decision to cancel the scheduled hearing this week, some residents left the meeting unsatisfied.

"We have to make it clear that the citizens group he represents is not anti-business, simply concerned about the county's limited natural resources.

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Dennis McClelland, general manager of Old Castle's aggregates division, told the board and the audience during the commission meeting that his company was "not trying to do any harm to Baker County. We want to be a good neighbor."

He further stated that the company's "calculations are correct that we would not have an effect on anybody's well." After the required state permits are issued he said he will return to the board for local approval.

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Trio in check, ATM fraud

es was issued in early August for Hailey Dan, 20, of Macclenny, who sheriff's investigator Mike Hauge says is in Duval County jail charged with a theft from her grandmother in Jacksonville.

Police say Ryan Taylor deposited a bogus \$900 check into the Vystar account of ex-girlfriend Amber Goldsmith of Macclenny on July 29 after borrowing her bank card on the false premise that his was not operable.

The check was written on an account that Mr. Taylor opened at TD Bank the previous day, and he then allegedly withdrew the maximum daily \$500 from an ATM using the Vystar card.

Investigator Hauge then confirmed that Mr. Taylor and Lauren Smith, 19, of Macclenny both opened TD accounts that day but deposited only \$10 in them.

Further investigation revealed that Mr. Taylor used the same card three times to obtain cash advances of \$100 each at Walmart on July 29. He later admitted he spent the cash on clothing and a tattoo.

Ms. Smith was identified as the girlfriend of Aaron Taylor, whose closed account at Wells Fargo Bank was used to issue checks for \$400, \$500 and \$800 to Ryan Taylor. They were worthless and deposited into his Vystar account.

The bogus checks for \$900 were written by Ryan Taylor and Ms. Smith for deposit into their TD accounts were also frozen and they were unable to withdraw cash. Mr. Taylor also implicated Ms. Dan in the scheme, and said she participated making out one of the \$900 checks and "completely walked (Aaron) Taylor through the process ... as she had done with him (Ryan)."

Investigator Hauge said further charges are possible as police consider the trial of bad checks and bank records including surveillance videos at the ATM machines.


In an unrelated fraud case reported to police the past week, a Macclenny woman reported she was being badgered by collection departments of several utilities and companies, apparently the result of bogus accounts opened using her personal information.

One of them involved a \$362 outstanding bill to Florida Power and Light owed on an account opened in her name. Others involve Verizon, Comcast and ATT.

She reported the situation on August 15.

Attacked his pregnant girlfriend

A Macclenny man who allegedly choked and struck his pregnant live-in girlfriend during an argument over babysitting their child was arrested the afternoon of August 14 on two felony charges.

Budget \$2.1 million short

The Baker County Commission will begin discussing how to close an estimated \$2.1 million budget deficit during its first workshop on the 2012-13 spending plan the afternoon of August 27.

The board starts with a \$24.7 million draft budget that's about \$2.7 million smaller than the one adopted last fall and will attempt to balance it with revenues expected to total some \$22.6 million, about \$5.3 million less than the current year's level.

County Manager C.J. Thompson said this week he anticipates the county will spend every dollar in the current \$27.4 million budget and all or some of the \$2.2 million allocated from reserves last fall.

But some \$4.3 million of the expected revenue loss stems from the fine and forfeiture fund portion of the budget, which pays for sheriff's office expenses like law enforcement, courthouse security and 9-1-1 dispatch.

According to the county's revenue estimates, the fund's reduction — from \$8,022,960 in 2011-12 to \$3,878,716 in 2012-13 — is largely due to the absence of a roughly \$4 million transfer from the county's general fund to the fine and forfeiture fund.

The \$3,971,113 transfer took place this fiscal year and another \$3,819,102 move occurred the previous year for 2010-11, the documents show.

The transfers represent the cost of housing local inmates at the privately-owned Baker County Sheriff's Complex. The cost for doing so is about \$85 per prisoner per day.

The 500-plus bed facility is owned by the Baker Correctional Development Corporation (BCDC), which pays the sheriff's office \$250,000 annually to manage the complex.

Still, the county's estimates don't yet include a similar transfer for the coming fiscal year, which begins October 1.

About \$3.2 million in property taxes are also expected to feed the fine and forfeiture fund, which is about \$100,000 less than this year's contribution but enough to fund law enforcement and associated functions of the sheriff's office.

The sheriff's budget for the coming year, excluding spending related to BCDC, is proposed at \$3,232,703, down 8.5 percent from \$3,532,642 this year.

Without a substantial drop in incarceration or crime, the bill for housing county inmates may top \$4 million in 2012-13.

Mr. Thompson said the local inmate population has been averaging between 130-140 prisoners in recent months, which is above the 120 average used for budgeting expenditures this year.


