## Six-felony arrest for enraged boyfriend

A Jacksonville man is charged with six felonies and two misdemeanors following a standoff with two county deputies at a residence north of Glen St. Mary the afternoon of October 27.

Jason Ambrose, 35, had earlier been at the address on Yellow Pine Circle to retrieve property about noon when he allegedly broke through a locked door, beat estranged girlfriend Amy Masters, 34, then left in her 2002 Ford Explorer.

He returned about three hours later, and refused to allow Ms. Masters and her daughters, ages 10 and 16, to leave the residence. She managed to place a 911 "hang-up" call and Deputy Ben Anderson again returned to the scene.

He said he was met by Ms. Masters when he arrived, and she said the ex-boyfriend was inside with the two girls. The deputy coaxed them outside and heard what he believed to be the suspect attempting to exit through a bathroom window.

Deputy Anderson kicked open the bathroom door and twice tasered the suspect when he refused to show his hands.

Deputy Patrick McGauley arrived as a back-up and stationed himself with a drawn pistol near the window, and released the K-9 Tango when Mr. Ambrose continued to conceal his hands after the taser charges. The dog bit the suspect on the left arm until Deputy Anderson and Sgt. James Marker secured him with handcuffs.

The officer during the first call noted bruising on Ms. Masters consistent with her claim that the ex-boyfriend threw her against a wall and choked her after breaking down the locked door into the residence from the garage. The daughters were unharmed.

Mr. Ambrose is also accused of attempting to run Ms. Mas-

## 'Madhouse' early voting numbers

Elections officials reported a surge in early voting on Monday and Tuesday, roughly one week before the 2012 general election.

Carol Ruise of Supervisor of Elections Nita Crawford's office said they saw more than 700 voters on October 29.

"It was a madhouse," she said. The following day foot traffic remained steady outside the office nestled between N. 5th and 6th Streets and around the corner from the Baker County Republican headquarters.

Supporters for sheriff candidates Joey Dobson and Cameron Coward occupied opposite sides of N. 6th waving signs early this

week as well.

One early voter, Carol Baker of Glen St. Mary, said she's been casting early ballots since it became an option in 2004.

"I like to get it done and out of the way because you never know what's going to happen," said Ms. Baker. "It's a great service."

Yolanda Reed of Macclenny voted early for the first time this year to avoid long lines at the polls on election day November 6, which could be longer this year given the lengthy list of state constitutional amendments included on the ballot.

As of late Tuesday, after nearly four days of early voting, 2285 ballots had been cast, 911 from Democrats and 1213 from Republicans. That's about 16 percent of all registered voters here. Early voting ends Saturday.

## Physician booked on 822 fraud counts

Just over a year after the state stripped former Macclenny physician Charles Scarborough of his medical license, investigators arrested him on one count of fraud in excess of \$50,000 and 821 counts of filing false or fraudulent insurance claims.

Dr. Scarborough was taken into custody at 8 am on October 25 at his residence in southwest Clay County, said Special agent supervisor Andrew Shedlock with FDLE's Jacksonville Regional Operations Center.

The single count is a first degree felony that could net Dr. Scarborough, 76, up to 30 years in prison. The other counts are third-degree felonies, which are punishable by up to five years in prison.

The investigation began last year when authorities identified Dr. Scarborough as "a significant prescriber of controlled substances in Northeast Florida," according to a statement from FDLE.

FDLE reported that investigators said they discovered evidence allegedly linking the former Macclenny resident to overprescribing medications and allowing unlicensed and untrained staff to practice medicine.

"The employees were then being directed to inflate medical billing to Medicare, Medicaid and private insurers for a level of service that the patient did not receive," reads the FDLE statement. "Interviews with employees indicated that Scarborough, a sole practitioner, pushed his staff to see 50 or more patients a day and bill for medical issues not addressed and treatment not received..."

The investigation was a cooperative effort among FDLE and the Baker County Sheriff's Office. Both agencies served a search warrant at Dr. Scarborough's former office on S. 5th St. in September, 2011, seizing more than a dozen computers and other paper documents.

Special agent Shedlock called the information gleaned from serving the search warrant "instrumental" in devel-

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



# Okays mower, saw shop on 90

## The former Hayden's Glass will be razed

After five years leasing space on South 6th Street, Macclenny Mower and Saw is moving to the former Hayden's Glass Co. location on US 90. Business owner Jeffrey Conner said he recently bought the glass store property on the south side of the Macclenny Ave. and intends to build a new structure in its place.

To avoid running afoul of Macclenny's zoning rules, however, Mr. Conner petitioned the city's Zoning Adjustment Board for a special exception and setback variances to accommodate his plans, which include a new metal building of 2245 square feet and fresh landscaping. The existing building at 304 W. Macclenny Ave. is larger, but nearly 70 years old.

The lot is located in the city's Commercial General zoning district, which does not permit "repair shops" without approval from the Zoning Adjustment Board.

That panel, absent its chairman Mark Bryant, approved 3-0 the special exception and two setback variances with little discussion.

The zoning district calls for a 50-foot front setback, but the variance will allow the new structure to be 17 feet from the US 90 sidewalk.

The existing building sits just two feet from the sidewalk. The structure was grandfathered into compliance when the zoning restrictions

were passed.

The zoning board's Dennis Collins, Naomi Roberson and Bob Lambright also approved a variance that reduces the side setback from 5 feet to 2.2 feet.

Mr. Conner, a Sanderson resident, said he hopes to open the new shop in the fall of 2013.

Macclenny Mower and Saw's current location is 821-A S. 6th St. across the Crossroads Shopping Center.

oping the case against Dr. Scarborough.

The suspect was booked into the Clay County jail. The case is being prosecuted by the Attorney General's Office of Statewide Prosecution.

Court records show 10 days before investigators showed up at Dr. Scarborough's office on September 16, 2011 with a search warrant, they obtained arrest warrants for three individuals suspected of trafficking prescription drugs obtained illegally from the office.

Melissa D. Bledsole, 43, Kayla P. Dampier, 21, and Aaron T. Devereaux, 23; all of Callahan, were taken into custody and questioned.

The arrests were made partially on the basis of statements made by Dr. Scarborough and his staff, and medical records from

his office, which were provided voluntarily without a warrant or written releases from patients during several visits by state and sheriff's office investigators.

As a result, defense attorneys for the trio have filed motions to suppress the evidence gleaned from those visits.

State law protects the privacy of medical records and information exchanged between doctors and patients with few exceptions.

Judge Phyllis Rosier has granted two of the suppression motions, made by public defender Julie Johnson on behalf of her clients Ms. Dampier and Mr. Devereaux.

The judge is expected to grant a nearly identical suppression motion from private defense attorney Frank Maloney of Macclenny, who is representing Ms. Bledsole.

All three defendants face three


counts of drug trafficking. A fourth suspect who worked at Dr. Scarborough's office, Veronica L. Alford, 42, of Macclenny, allegedly wrote bogus prescriptions and sold or traded them for pills.

She was arrested a few days after investigators served the search warrant at the clinic.

Ms. Alford faced two counts of drug trafficking and two counts of obtaining or attempting to obtain illegal drugs by fraud.

Ms. Alford, who is represented by private attorney Jeffrey A. Siegmeister of Lake City, pleaded not guilty in January, but a change of plea hearing is scheduled for December 4.

The attorney is campaigning to be the next state attorney from the Third Judicial Circuit, which covers Columbia, Dixie, Hamilton, Lafayette, Madison, Suwannee and Taylor Counties.

# Waives subdivision regulation

## Couple can build retirement home off CR 127

Roger and Korina Barber can now fulfill plans to build their dream retirement home in Baker County after winning an appeal before the county's Land Planning Agency board last week.

The couple, who moved to Baker County after Mr. Barber retired from the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office, own 30 acres west of County Road 127 in rural Sanderson, where they had planned to build a new home. They presently live in a house and Mrs. Barber's mother resides in an adjacent mobile home, both of which were already on the property when they bought it.

However, when they submitted their application for a permit to build their home, the county's planning director, Ed Preston, said their property did not conform to subdivision regulations and this was not eligible for any improvements or expansion.

"There are two dwellings there now and the applicant wants to expand and build at least one more dwelling and possibly more in the future," Mr. Preston told the LPA board on the evening of October 25.

The Barbers' property, which they bought several years ago in two separate parcels — one 12 acres and the other 18 acres — is part of an original tract in 1991 that encompassed 60 acres south of John Williams Road at the end of a private drive named Wilburn's Way.

The unpaved driveway extends southward from John Williams, a dirt road, across another piece of private property before it reaches the Barber property. The nearest paved road — CR 127 — is about half a mile away.

Because the original 60-acre tract was divided over time into four separate parcels, two of which the Barbers bought, it falls under subdivision regulations, which requires direct access to county roads.

"Since the subject parcel is defined as a subdivision," Mr. Preston said, "subdivision requirements include the paving of internal roads to all lots and the paving of roads to the nearest existing paved road. Those roads are required to be 24 feet wide within 60-foot wide right of ways."

The Barbers, however, said they have no intention of selling any lots, only to build a new house and keep their 30 acres intact as a place to raise horses and enjoy their retirement years.

Nonetheless, Mr. Preston said, a vote in favor of their appeal would allow them to divide the land again and "possibly sell off more lots."

"The subject property has no direct access to a county road, paved or unpaved," Mr. Preston wrote in a staff report. "The property lies some 475 feet south of John Williams Road, an unpaved county road. The dirt driveway and legal easement crosses three other parcels for access."

The fact that the driveway gives them legal access to a county road, albeit through someone else's property, was one of the reasons the Barbers argued should be given consideration in their appeal.

"The legal access is in both warranty deeds," Mrs. Barber said during a public hearing on the matter. "Even though we don't technically own it, it is a legal easement."

During the public hearing one other person addressed the board, neighbor Jeremy Wilburn, who asked the Barbers if they had any plans to divide their property again or if they "just want to build a house?"

The Barbers responded that they only want to build a new house for themselves.

"If they want to build a house on their property, it's their property," Mr. Wilburn told the board.

Before a vote was taken on the appeal, Mr. Preston told the board some things could be taken into consideration in favor of the applicant's position:

- The subject property is more than large enough to accommodate the zoning density requirements of one dwelling unit for every 7.5 acres, or up to four potential residences.
- The violation of the subdivision regulations on the property was not executed by the Barbers.

The only issue the LPA board questioned during the hearing concerned the driveway access to the Barbers' parcel, which Mr. Preston said was a "legal easement to their land."

Afterward, the board voted unanimously in favor of the appeal and declared the applicant's property to be in conformity with the zoning code, which Mr. Preston said means the Barbers are now eligible to add two more dwellings or divide their property once.

## ATV tracks from burglary scene led police to a suspect

Sheriff's deputies arrested a north county man for a pair of home burglaries last week that occurred in the same neighborhood off Leon Dopson Rd. north of Sanderson.

The two incidents were among several home and shed burglaries reported to police the past week.

Anthony Simmons, 39, was charged with burglary, armed burglary and grand theft after two investigators followed ATV tracks to his residence off Fred Harvey Rd. about mid-day on October 24.

The tracks led from the residence of Tiffany McNarnay, where an alarm alerted authorities when an attempt was made to enter it at 11:21 via the rear door. Investigators Steve Harvey and Michael Hauge found the ATV near the address where the suspect resides with his parents.

The vehicle tracks and prints from a pair of Mr. Simmons' shoes matched those at the burglary scene, and Deputy Walker noted the suspect had lacerations on both legs and on his hand.

He initially said the cuts were the result of hunting in nearby woods, and that he used the ATV to get to a neighboring house. He eventually led the officers to a nearby wooded area where he had hidden seven rifles under pine straw.

The firearms were taken from the residence of Ray Harvey on Earlis Harvey Rd. during daylight hours the previous day. Entry was through a rear door window that was broken, and responding deputies noted the interior was ransacked.

Mr. Simmons told the investigators he did not enter the McNarnay residence because the alarm scared him off. Mr. Harvey declared the four rifles, pistol and three shotguns were valued at more than \$5000.

Investigators said as of this week there was no apparent connection between the suspect and several other burglaries in the north county recently, including another rear door entry at the home of Judy Yonn during the day October 23.

Several blank bank checks were taken from the residence on CR 127.

The same method of entry was noted at the residence of Travis Rhoden on CR 127 during the day on October 22.

Investigator John Hardin said the master bedroom was ransacked and stolen items included a safe and \$300, and various jewelry pieces including a ring, bracelets, chains and necklaces. No loss value was given.

## Stabs her brother during argument

A Macclenny man was flown to Jacksonville with a serious stab wound and his juvenile age sister was jailed following a knife attack that occurred after a day-long series of arguments at their Deerwood Circle residence on October 22.

Kenneth Barron, 22, was seated outside the residence in the east city wearing a blood-stained shirt when police arrived about 10:40, according to the report by Deputy Rodney Driggers. His mother Karen Barron, 44, was standing nearby and placed the knife used in the attack on a nearby fence post.

The deputy observed a serious stab wound in the man's side and a laceration on his arm, both of which he said were the result of a fight with his sister, 17.

The mother said the two had been in verbal arguments and ransacked each other's rooms. Just prior to the knife attack, she said the daughter became enraged when she saw the condition of her room, and confronted Mr. Barron while he was cleaning his room.

The daughter was treated at Fraser Hospital for a knife cut to the hand, then booked at county jail for aggravated domestic battery on her brother, and domestic battery on her mother, who was bitten twice as she wrestled the knife away.

In other arrests, Eileen Combs, 33, of Macclenny was charged with battery on Stephanie Perdue, 28, of Sanderson early on October 28.

Ms. Perdue and a store clerk told Deputy Clements Leo that Ms. Combs entered the Kangaroo convenience store on US 90 in east Macclenny about 2 am, walked up behind the victim and began striking her after pulling her hair.

Ms. Combs then drove off, but was located and brought back to the store by Sgt. Brad Dougherty. She told the officers the attack was in retaliation for an earlier incident at Mac's Liquors downtown.

Deputy Leo was called to the earlier disturbance, and noted in his report that the combatants refused to give him statements.

Deputy Earl Lord arrested Mergo Gaskins, 23, of Macclenny for domestic battery after witnessing her shove estranged boyfriend Jerry Johns Jr., 24, off the front steps of his residence on

## Intruder runs from yard

A Glen St. Mary man called police the evening of October 28 when he returned home and found a white male standing in the front of his residence off Mud Lake Rd.

The suspect, who Charles Norris described as about 6 feet tall with medium build and wearing dark clothing, fled on foot into nearby woods and a subsequent K-9 search of the area yielded nothing.

Sheriff's investigator John Hardin interviewed a neighbor who reported seeing a light-colored vehicle and dark pickup truck parked on the roadway near the Norris address. The incident occurred at 8 pm.

In other burglaries involving residential thefts, Deputy Clements Leo responded to a call at the home of Clarence Ruise on Faith Temple Church Dr. north of Sanderson the evening of October 26.

The owner said a game station and two shotguns were taken earlier that day, likely between 11 am and 2 pm when the house was unoccupied. A rear door was pried open to gain entry.

He valued the loss at \$450 and named a possible suspect.

Wayne Dickey of Jacksonville returned to his cabin at Ocean Pond on October 27 to find it had been entered via a screen porch and forced-open door. A stereo was taken from the interior and a lawn mower from a nearby shed.

He had last been there on October 16 and valued the loss and property damage at \$225.

Deputy Patrick McGealey noted the interior of the cabin, situated in a remote area, was ransacked and the owner's alcoholic beverages consumed.

The same deputy responded to a call October 27 at the residence of Patrick Hodges on Shepard Lane north of Glen St. Mary, where a \$600 chain saw

was stolen from a porch during daytime hours.

Danny Thrift reported to Sgt. Tony Norman that ten bags of pecans were taken from a carport on his property off CR 23D near the state line.

He said he last saw the bags the afternoon of October 23 and noticed they were gone the next morning. He valued the nuts at \$1000.

# Fleeing pickup stolen Suspects flee near Sanderson

# Pawns two stolen chain saws

Mr. Canaday told the deputy he pawned the saws because he was in "a bad spot" financially, and that he intended to tell the victim about it. He was booked at county jail for grand theft.

Mr. Canaday's name surfaced earlier when he was implicated as an accomplice in the theft of electric tools, a trolling motor and metal roofing trusses from a residence on the Baxter Grade on October 22.

The stolen property was valued at \$3730.



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# A 'purple memorial' Tree at City Park honors slain woman

Deanna Christine Waldrup's favorite color was purple, so the catabwa crape myrtle tree with violet blossoms was fitting. Her youngest son, 6, passed out purple ribbon pins to anyone who would take them and her family wore purple garments in her honor.

They were all at Macclenny's Memorial Park the afternoon of October 22 to plant the crape myrtle in Deanna's memory. She was murdered by an ex-boyfriend nearly five years ago on November 15, 2007 in Louisiana.

Her mother and father, Eva Redmon of Macclenny and Jack Waldrup of Jacksonville, joined Deanna's sisters Nadine Klem and Karen Kenney and other family members for a short ceremony with Ms. Redmon's pastor Simone Fouraker under a pavilion near the tree.

Deanna had recommitted herself to her Christian faith shortly before her death and Ms. Fouraker spoke not only about God's role in her family's healing after the tragedy, but about the immortality of the Christian spirit.

"This tree is not here to celebrate a life once lived, but a life ongoing ... She (Deanna) is still alive because she knew Jesus," said the pastor.

Her sisters gave emotional testimony about Deanna, who was the fourth of six children, three boys and three girls.

Ms. Kenney, who takes care of Deanna's youngest

of three sons, David, noted how the boy's initials — D.C.W. for David Christian Waldrup — match those of his mother.

"That's my precious little gift from my sister," Ms. Kenney said of her adopted son.

Deanna's other sister, Ms. Klem, said it was a struggle to forgive her sister's killer, but she's prayed for God's mercy and grace on him. She also recited a poem assigned the Lord to bless her sister's spirit in heaven.

Then family members in attendance, which also included one of Deanna's brothers, Garrath Phelps of Macclenny and his son Beau, took turns shoveling dirt around the tree's roots.

A marker at the base of the crape myrtle read: "In loving memory of Deanna Christine Waldrup, Mar. 31, 1967 — Nov. 15, 2007, mother of Michael, Bud and David."

Also present were friends of the family, county and sheriff's office officials and a victim's advocate with the 8th Judicial Circuit.

"I was very pleased with the way it came off and I was honored to have the sheriff and the county manager there," said Ms. Redmon, Deanna's mom. "That was a great surprise. I felt like it honored my little girl. She was all grown up, but she'll always be my little girl."

Ms. Redmon gave special thanks to the City of Macclenny for granting approval of the tree planting in the public park, specifically city hall's Joy Chapman, as well as Lin Taber of Glen St. Mary Nurseries Company for donating the crape myrtle.

### Football helmet research

A few years ago a young quarterback from Starke took a hit he would not easily forget. Chance Oody, 14, said "Big Josh," as he called the tackler, dislocated two ribs and gave him a minor concussion. The experience, however painful, opened his eyes to the dangers of the sport and the importance of wearing the proper head gear.

It also inspired the youth's sixth-grade science fair project: testing which helmet manufacturer, Riddell or Schutt, was better at protecting players' heads from injury, namely concussions.

The public discourse regarding concussions in pro and college football interested Mr. Oody as well.

"They were having a lot of head-to-head contact, which really isn't good," he explained to a handful of Baker County Kiwanis Club members during their meeting October 26 at Firehouse Subs.

"So I decided to take two things I loved, football and science, and put them together to see if I could resolve the conflict going on," said the teen, who was invited by club president Judy Becker of Lawtvey to be the guest speaker.

Mr. Oody, now a freshman at Bradford County High School, hypothesized the Riddell helmet he experimented on would stand up better to repeated strikes from a sledge hammer, the head of which weighed roughly the same as a human head, about 8 pounds.

And as it turned out, he was right. "Riddell came out the victor over the Schutt helmet," Mr. Oody said. "They were more protective against concussions."

Another year rolled by and it was time for another science fair. The teen said he began thinking that perhaps it was the padding inside the Riddell helmet that made it better, not a tougher outside shell.

"So I started testing the compression density," he said, "because you want it to absorb the shock to your head. You want it nice and compressible."

Again, a helmet made by Riddell, the official helmet manufacturer of the NFL, specifically the Revolution Speed helmet, proved to be the most protective.

By eighth grade, Mr. Oody moved onto another battery of experiments designed to measure the effects of different types of collisions.

Would a stationary player being hit by a moving player, in fact, be more likely to receive a concussion from the collision? How much worse would a crash between two moving players be than one in which one of the players was stationary?

Mr. Oody conducted tests using helmets on twin pendulums

# An interview with Commissioner Crews

**These are excerpts from a recent interview between a concerned citizen group and Commissioner Gordon Crews the week after the Saturday forum. Please read...**

**Concerned Citizen:** What is your vision for Baker County in the coming years?

**Commissioner Crews:** As the economy improves I would like to see our county grow as a business friendly community that will bring in more good paying jobs and people to live here. This will expand our tax base so we can continue to provide necessary services at the same high level we do today. To see our schools maintain their high standards and insure we are able to keep our teachers by providing them the best work environment and standard of living possible.

**Concerned Citizen:** Mr. Crews, why did the commissioners vote to go into a rainy day fund in the previous two years budget?

**Commissioner Crews:** We had several choices to make, regarding that budget, we cut spending significantly over two years, nearly \$800,000 in 2013 budget, however we were left with four choices.

- 1) Reduce wages to our employees
- 2) Lay off employees
- 3) Raise taxes
- 4) Go into the reserves fund

We opted for the reserves fund because we felt, and rightly so, the housing values were as low as they were going to drop, therefore our tax base was not going to erode significantly past these two years.

**Concerned Citizen:** What if the economy continues to decline and our property values continue to go down thus causing the tax base to continue to erode?

**Commissioner Crews:** I believe my

**Commissioner Crews:** If the trend continues as you stated, then we would have to make difficult decisions that we were not forced to make in those previous two years that could include reducing services to the county, reducing staff, consolidating departments, and/or raising taxes. Fortunately all indicators are coming back in Baker County based on recent land purchases.

**Concerned Citizen:** What do you think the biggest challenges facing our county are today?

**Commissioner Crews:** The easy answer is jobs but there are many pressing issues including lower property values, and the ability to continue providing high quality services our residents have become accustomed to. As commissioner, I continue to support good business that will bring value to our community without decimating our natural resources while putting our great citizens to work. I do not believe any job means a good job. My definition of a good employer is one who treats their employees fairly, offers them a good days pay for a good days work and makes a contribution to the county both in tax revenue and humanitarian purposes, like Walmart's distribution center, InSteel, NEFCOM, and Sanderson Pipe, as well as others. We have a great model for business expansion with these examples, but we cannot just accept anyone who comes knocking. We must do due diligence on everyone inquiring.

**Concerned Citizen:** What do you believe your biggest asset is and how does it help you be a good commissioner?

**Commissioner Crews:** I believe my

biggest asset is the ability to listen intently to what everyone says. But, not only to listen, but HEAR them. I have been and will always be THE COMMISSIONER WHO LISTENS. That will never change. I am the people's commissioner. Always will be! Couple that with the time I put into studying the issues facing the county and I believe I serve my fellow citizens to the best of my God given ability. Another asset I value is my ability to adjust without compromising principle. So many people can't change with the times and are stuck in the middle ages when decisions require forward thinking. I continue to improve myself every day. There is a saying "A dog that is too old to learn new tricks has always been too old to learn new tricks."

**Concerned Citizen:** What differentiates you from your opponent in this race?

**Commissioner Crews:** It's very clear. My opponent is a good man and has spent his life serving our country and our county in various capacities. I applaud him; however, I have spent my life honing my skills as a servant to all. As an Emergency Room Nurse Manager at Fraser hospital it is critical that I am "on" every minute I am there or it could cost someone their life. I take this responsibility very seriously. As your commissioner, I take this responsibility with the same dedication and seriousness I do my career. I examine every issue before the county, listen to all sides, all the while educating myself with as much knowledge on the issues as I can find.

**Concerned Citizen:** Recently there has been controversy regarding the possibility of granting a long term land use excep-

tion to allow sand mining. In one of your ads you said you were against it. Why?

**Commissioner Crews:** After much research, analysis, input from citizens in the county and prayer I have come to the conclusion we cannot place any risk on our water supply. Placing any risk on our fresh water supply is not a good use of natural resources. **Concerned Citizen:** What do you think about line item veto?

**Commissioner Crews:** I am generally a hands off administrator, I trust the people we put in charge to do their job, however, the circumstances ALWAYS dictate the measure we must take as Commissioners. The Bible says before you build the tower you must count the cost. This applies more than ever to today because we live in a very dynamic time in history and what worked yesterday may not work today and certainly not tomorrow. The commissioners must adjust to these changing times and be proactive. As I stated earlier that is one of my strengths.

**Concerned Citizen:** Mr. Crews, have you ever considered living anywhere else?

**Commissioner Crews:** As a lifelong resident of Baker County, I'm proud to say that I believe this is the best place in the world to live and raise your children. We are rich in natural resources out here in Baker County. We are close enough to the bigger cities if you want to visit and still far enough that we can enjoy the country living and the values that go along with that. I truly cannot imagine living anywhere else.

## Lee paces offense as Cats post 48-28 win at Forrest

The BCHS Wildcat varsity football team will be returning to the post season playoffs for the first time in Coach Ryan Sulkowski's tenure at the helm after their 48-28 win over Forrest on October 25. The Cats rode a touchdown-filled performance from running back Falon Lee, who amassed 142 yards rushing and five touchdowns that night to tie the school record.

Whether the Cats will enter the playoffs as district champions or runners-up will be determined on Friday when they travel to Jacksonville to meet last year's district champion Bishop Kenny. The Crusaders trounced Terry Parker 41-0 behind four Ahmad Fullwood touchdowns.

There was a lot on the line for the coach and the team as the Cats got off the bus at Forrest High on Thursday. BCHS and its fans relished a trip to the state playoffs, but to do it they would have to defeat a resurgent Forrest Rebel squad that was also looking at securing a playoff slot.

As the game opened it appeared the Rebels left their intensity in the locker room. For the first ten minutes it looked as if the game was going to be a run away for Baker County as the Cats score three times in quick succession.

Lee showed his intent to have a big game early on, running for a 30-yard touchdown in the game's opening series to put BCHS up 6-0 when the point-after failed.

The second score came quickly as quarterback Corey Lawler marched the team down the field in the second possession and hit Drew Rogers for a 14-yard scoring pass. Lawler ran in the conversion attempt and just like that BCHS held a 14-0 lead.

The defense, playing extremely well and containing Forrest's star runner Jordan Mixson in the early going, gave the ball back to Lawler after a fourth down stand and he knew what to do with it. Lawler ran into Forrest territory at the 47 and three Lee runs later the Cats were up 21-0 after DeAngelo Thomas hit the extra point.

But it is hard to keep a good runner down as Mixson proved on the kickoff. He found a seam in the coverage, broke into the open and raced 87 yards for the first Rebel score. Mixson had a great night for Forrest with 200 yards rushing on 18 carries.

BCHS answered right back at the start of the second period as Lee scored for the third time on

a 1-yard run. The PAT was good for a 28-7 lead.

Then the game got really interesting.

The Wildcats had the Rebels stopped, but a personal foul on an uncatchable ball to Tyrell Mitchell gave Forrest a first down. Two plays later, quarterback Jeff Vining found Mixson on a 30-yard pass play for the touchdown and the score was 28-14.

As the half wound down the Wildcat nerves really started to jangle. BCHS fumbled the ball deep in their own end and Mixson made them pay with a 10-yard touchdown run to narrow

the gap to 28-21. But the Wildcat offensive show was unstoppable and they put some breathing room between themselves and the Rebels a couple of minutes before halftime.

Lee took the Rebel kickoff all the way back to the 46-yard line. The Rebels crowded the line of scrimmage, Lawler and the coaching staff read the coverage change and Lawler went over the top to Rogers who pulled in the ball and raced down field for a 53-yard touchdown. The PAT was blocked and the Cats went into intermission up 34-21.

When Forrest returned from halftime, the home team moved the ball into Wildcat territory, but Jared Crews picked off a Vining pass and raced 63 yards to the Forrest 5-yard line. From there Lee ran it in for his fourth score of the night and a 40-21 lead.

The Wildcats got the ball back right away. Rashadd Hadley forced a fumble and Nativian Griffin recovered on the Forrest 20-yard line. Lawler hit a couple of quick pass plays to the Forrest five and Lee ran it in to tie the school record for touchdowns in a game at five.

Forrest narrowed the gap with a 58-yard run but it was too little too late.

Lee's heroics overshadowed a fine night from Mike Boone, who rushed for 111 yards on 8 carries and a strong passing night for Lawler, who was 8 of 10 for 109 yards. He also ran for 62 yards on 8 carries. The Cats had 331 yards rushing on 42 attempts.

Defensively the Cats recorded six sacks on Vining and forced five Forrest fumbles.

## It's against Kenny for title

The Wildcats clinched a playoff berth with a victory over Forrest on Thursday. They have a huge game coming up this weekend as they take on a very dangerous Bishop Kenny squad for the district title.

Kenny features two of the best players in the district in quarterback John Wolford and receiver Ahmad Fulwood. Both are Division 1 prospects and they led Kenny to the district crown last season.

The Wildcats are coming off a game that saw running back Falon Lee tie a school record with five touchdowns. Here's Coach Ryan Sulkowski's take on that and the upcoming contest.

Press: Falon Lee has certainly come on strong this last half of the season. What are some of the reasons for the late surge?

Sulkowski: Falon is a kid who never used to come off the field. This year we wanted to be creative and find a guy who could spell him on defense so he would be more fresh running the ball. We have been able to get production from guys like Anthony James, Mike Boone and Brandon Miller at cornerback so Falon does not have to be on the field every snap of the game.

That has been key for him and the success he is having, not to mention we preached all off-season to hold onto the football and to be more downhill runners. He has embraced that and continues to run with his shoulders parallel to the goal line, which means he is running down hill and not side to side.

Press: With the exception of a couple of unfortunate plays the Forrest game would have been a rout. Who were some of your standouts on defense?

Sulkowski: We did make some mistakes defensively on Thursday, but like I told the kids and the rest of the media outlets I have spoken to, Forrest has run the ball effectively against everyone they have played against, including Bishop Kenny ... Their running backs are very fast and all they need is a seam and they are gone!

We saw that on Thursday. Some surprise guys came up with being effective in making stops. I thought that sophomore linebacker Ruger Rauler-

(8 tackles) played well, along with junior cornerback Anthony James (9 tackles). We had some solid play from our usual guys. Junior Rashadd Hadley had a few tackles, two sacks and caused two fumbles. Our defensive line accounted for 3.5 sacks and we finished by sacking Forrest 6 times on the night. Now we have to switch gears from a power running team to a heavy spread passing team.

Press: What does Bishop Kenny bring to the table that you may not have seen in other teams on the schedule?

Sulkowski: A team that is 100 percent committed to the passing game. We have played teams that set up the pass by running the football, where as Bishop Kenny will set up the run by passing the ball, and passing a lot! They have a great system in place right now and do so many things well.

Press: With a playoff spot in the bag does it remove any of the tension going into the Kenny game?

Sulkowski: Not at all. I do not think many teams enter the season with a goal of finishing second place in their district and just making the playoffs. We certainly did not enter the season with that goal. We have a new sign each year at our practice field. This year when I designed it I wanted to make sure that our ultimate season goals were clearly stated on this board. The phrase "Get the ball, keep the ball" is highlighted in between two trophies. One trophy is a district 3-5A championship trophy and the other is the class 5A state championship trophy.

Press: What would a district title mean to you?

Sulkowski: That's a great question, but to be quite honest, it's not about me. If we can go out and win it and it provides our kids in the program an opportunity to play on a big stage and move on deep into the playoffs, then that's all that matters to me. I want people to look at them and say, "That group that no one thought would do anything won the district title?" Because that has been our ongoing joke all year and our kids have embraced that. We are the group that no one expected anything from and they continue to surprise the people around our area and we are having fun doing it.

The Baker High Wildcats clinched a playoff berth with Thursday night's win over Forrest. Friday they will go for the district football title versus high-flying Bishop Kenny. Here's a look at how the opposition did this week.

✓ Kenny stayed undefeated in the district with a 41-0 rout of Terry Parker. It was a big night for the Crusaders' star receiver Ahmad Fulwood as he caught three touchdown passes and returned an interception for a score. John Wolford was 10 for 10 throwing the ball in the first half.

✓ Palatka ended an 11-game road losing streak with a 21-10 victory over Menendez. Jeremy Faulk ran for two touchdowns for the Panthers.


