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Charges of selling purloined artifacts

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A Macclenny man was among 13 suspects arrested across the state and in Georgia last week for stealing valuable artifacts from state lands and attempting to sell them online and at trade shows during the last two years.

Undercover officers with the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) infiltrated a group of men accused of digging or dredging on state property to find the artifacts, some priced at \$100,000. Most of the suspects were arrested at their homes the morning of February 27, including Allen Charles Hyde at 53 W. Macclenny Ave.

Mr. Hyde, 49, faces 50 felony counts of dealing in stolen property, one misdemeanor count of theft and 51 felony counts of violating historical resources, according to FWC.

The state agency did not release details of each suspect's specific offenses like what artifacts they took from public lands or the exact locations of the alleged thefts.

"The artifacts seized during all of the arrests include arrowheads, pots and pottery pieces and gold coins," said Katie Purcell, FWC spokesperson. "They are from paleo-native Americans."

She said investigations into additional suspects are ongoing and the specific sites are part of that investigation.

"I can say that they are mainly in central and northern Florida and were on state lands — forests and wildlife management areas," said Ms. Purcell.

She said during FWC's covert operation, its officers were invited on illegal digs and to buy and sell the artifacts.

High-speed chase ends in woods

Two men fled cops in Madison

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A white Dodge Charger led authorities on a high-speed, four-county chase on Interstate 10 eastbound before crashing near Sanderson about 10 am on February 28.


The driver, Terrick Shadon Lundy, 26, of Jacksonville was captured some three hours later by K-9 search teams from Baker Correctional Institution and the Florida Highway Patrol (FHP) less than a quarter-mile from the wreck scene, ending a massive multi-agency manhunt.

Passenger Ronnie Bernard Williams, 31, of St. Augustine was critically injured when the vehicle, traveling at an estimated 100 mph, slammed into a large pine tree after Mr. Lundy tried to avoid stop sticks placed near the U.S. 90 interchange. He reportedly navigated around a similar obstruction in Columbia County.

Mr. Williams was taken to Fraser Hospital and flown to Shands Jacksonville. Neither suspect was wearing a seat belt, FHP's report indicates.

A Madison County Sheriff's Office deputy attempted to pull the Charger over for speeding about 9:30 am on I-10 eastbound. During the traffic stop, the vehicle sped away and at some point the deputy fired at the car.

FHP's account of the incident states the gun shots occurred before the vehicle fled the scene. A news release from the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, which is investigating the shooting at the request of Madison County authorities, said "an altercation occurred, shots were fired, and the chase began."

A spokeswoman for the department declined to provide further details, citing the ongoing investigation into the police-involved shooting. She said the investigation should be complete within a few weeks.

There have been other reports that the suspects possibly fired at police, but they have not been confirmed by officials sources.

An account in the *Lake City Reporter* noted that FHP initially said the deputy saw the passenger, Mr. Williams, reach under his seat and ordered him to show his hands before firing as the Charger drove away.

'Zumbathon' raises \$725 for Craig

A two-hour Zumbathon held at Anytime Fitness on the windy and chilly morning of March 2 raised some \$725 for the family of Corey Craig, who suffered a spinal injury in a vehicle accident last December that killed another teen, Jordan Sommise of Jacksonville. Mr. Craig, who attended Baker High, is currently rehabilitating at an Atlanta hospital. The event featured non-stop dancing from the South 6th Street gym's Zumba instructors. Classes meet there six days a week. Zumba pairs thumping, fast-paced music with aerobic exercise and the Zumbathon drew some 70 participants, many of whom received gift cards raffled off from local businesses. Anytime Fitness owner Jared Kirkland donated a one-year membership to Mr. Craig to assist with his recovery. Zumba instructor Kendra Morgan said besides a scary moment when the wind blew over the tent covering the stage, "it was just a lot of fun." The sheriff's department furnished the stage and tent, which was re-secured using weights from the gym.

Former auto lot sold for oil firm corporate offices

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Perhaps the most valuable single piece of real estate in downtown Macclenny, the former used car dealership of the late Danny Lamb, has been sold to Eagle Petroleum Group, LLC.

The company is moving its corporate headquarters from Argyle Forest Boulevard in Jacksonville to Macclenny, and bringing with it about a half-dozen employees based there.

Eagle Petroleum Group formed in early 2012, merging with Clay Oil Corporation, both managed by Keith Patterson. Mr. Patterson also recently purchased the gas station across the street from the Lamb property now known as the MyFuel station.

Mr. Lamb's widow, Deborah G. Lamb, sold the dealership property for \$459,000 with \$160,650 down, court records show.

Property records indicate the land consists of two parcels totaling 0.45 acres with a taxable value of \$232,505.

A single story masonry building built in 1947 and measuring 6581 square feet occupies one parcel and the vacant lot at the southeast corner U.S. 90 and South 6th Street occupies the other.

Mr. Patterson owns gas stations in Lake City, Gainesville and Jacksonville and wanted a more centrally-located corporate headquarters.

Ms. Lamb said the property in downtown Macclenny was on the market only four or five months before Mr. Patterson showed interest.

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

Cause for optimism on county's deficit?

Last week we got readers all caught up on the county jail, its landlord and how local crime and the resulting incarcerations aren't doing the county budget any favors.

However, there now appears to be some reason for optimism when it comes to the county's fiscal picture. Five months into the budget year, the county is about \$1.4 million in the black.

Now, keep in mind, anything can happen between now and the end of the fiscal year September 30. Recovering from a hurricane or other disaster could easily wipe out that money, which we'll call an imaginary budget cushion. County officials say most of its revenue arrives early in the year, so that cushion needs to last through the lean times, too.

Still, the county appears to be pinching its pennies like everyone else and trying to live within its means.

County staff and commissioners should be applauded for sparing the taxpaying public any drastic loss in services, or large tax increases, while it deals with what will be tough climb back to the good years, when the county commission sat on a healthy, \$11 million in reserves.

Those days are gone — some estimates put the reserves at \$3 million — thanks in large measure to paying the \$3.7 million bill from the Baker Correctional Development Corporation to house its inmates and the sheriff's office for the year. Paying that cost upfront, and spending a huge chunk of reserves in the process, saved the county more than \$200,000 in the long run. Without the new jail, one could argue the county would have spent millions to fund its own jail and sheriff's office complex, and eaten up the surplus anyway.

No such thing as a free lunch, right?

Lauds land use proposal

Dear Editor:

I applaud and encourage others to support the land use proposal for Sanderson. Baker County is a Free Trade Zone enjoying a strategic position in north Florida that can be positioned to take advantage of the Panama Canal and Jax Port expansion.

By changing the land use in Sanderson, the county could become a major player for things such as regional distribution centers or reverse logistics for recycling. This will not happen overnight, but with less reliance on China due to its rising wage structure I see a gradual shift away from massive offshore manufacturing and more opportunity here. Should JaxPort dredge the St. Johns River to 48' vs. 45' then it really becomes a game changer. We could become "all in" once the Panama Canal effort is done.

Couple that with Florida's right to work laws and the disruptions caused by the union at the Long Beach, CA port, additional vessels could be diverted to Florida in the event of strikes or strike threats. The vessels could come here vs. Oakland, Seattle, Panama or Ensenada, Mexico.

Having been in logistics for 20-plus years, I believe north Florida is on the cusp of some steady growth over time even with the all the current uncertainty. I cite the example of intermodal services that are better than they probably have ever been, with the Class I railroads making big investments into things like intermodal terminal facilities. I hope that Baker County will continue to demonstrate this type of foresight so we are prepared when these investments come our way.

If we don't look outside the box, we will become imprisoned inside the box.

Lynne Bolen By not buying anything but necessities, occasionally some extras...VERY occasionally.


Alyssa Nicole Fernandez: Scour town for the best prices. Grocery prices are going up, but there's no change in my pay. Gotta cut back on the junk.

short supply, said she hoped more applicants would be forthcoming this year. Ms. Mobley echoed those comments.

said last year was the first Baker County school to win "model school status" in the bronze category, has reached the pinnacle of success in the program.

"Now they're a gold model school," she said, adding that the concept behind the PBS program has a basic core component — teaching children about behavioral expectations. In other words, good behavior brings good results, bad behavior the opposite.

Next, she presented a bronze model school award to Macclenny Elementary, where officials said most behavioral infractions had occurred on school buses or in the cafeteria line. Corrective measures included using teachers in role-modeling situations to demonstrate appropriate conduct when standing in line, eating lunch or riding on the bus.

Each year schools reflect on their PBS programs and collect data on what has worked best and what hasn't worked so well in an effort to continuously improve, officials said.

The PBS Homepage for Model Schools describes the program as one which "provides a positive and effective alternative to the traditional methods of discipline. PBS methods are research-based and proven to significantly reduce the occurrence of problem behaviors in the school, resulting in a more positive school climate and increased academic performance."

Further, the website says PBS is consistent with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, which advocates the use of "positive behavior interventions and school-based disciplinary strategies that reduce or eliminate the need to use suspension and expulsion as disciplinary options."

Ms. Murray, who lives in Tallahassee but works in the University of South Florida's College of Behavioral and Community Sciences, said PBS model schools have met specific criteria established by the program, including the teaching of positive behavior throughout the school year, creative and engaging reward systems, extending the program throughout the campus and partnering with the community and parents.

The Positive Behavior Support program awards presentation segued into the next order of business, which was the recognition of "academic achievers" from the Taylor community — students who had earned a spot on the Principal's List, which means they made straight A's, or on the Honor Roll in their schools. Thirteen pupils at Westside Elementary received awards for making the Principal's List while eight others made the Honor Roll. Four students at Keller Intermediate received Honor Roll awards; two at Baker County Middle School were on the Principal's List and two were on the Honor Roll; and six students at Baker High, none of whom attended the board meeting, were awarded for making the Honor Roll.

Schools lauded for PBS programs

Unruly, disruptive or disobedient kids at school often end up in trouble with their teachers, principals and parents. Those who demonstrate good behavior, on the other hand, are rewarded for doing the right thing.

That was the message at the school board meeting when two schools that received high honors from the state of Florida for outstanding Positive Behavior Support programs were recognized.

"The PBS system we use here in Baker County teaches children (that if) you do positive things, positive things come back to you," said Superintendent Sherrie Raulerson. "Beginning in kindergarten children receive rewards for making good decisions."

A few minutes later, the Pre-K/Kindergarten Center and Macclenny Elementary School were praised for recognition from the Florida Department of Education for outstanding behavior programs.

The awards were announced and presented to school principals by Martha Murray, a training and technical assistance specialist who traveled from Tallahassee to appear at the board meeting held at Taylor Church.

Ms. Murray praised children for demonstrating their "PBS skills" and helping their schools win accolades that aren't easy to come by. Top schools are recognized at three levels, similar to the Olympics: bronze, silver and the coveted gold.

A pursuit by multiple law enforcement agencies ensued through Suwannee, Columbia and Baker counties, ending when the driver lost control and wrecked near Sanderson.

Mr. Lundy was exiting the car even before it came to rest, said BCSO Deputy Ben Anderson, one of the first officers at the scene. Another officer said police recovered about a pound of marijuana in the trunk of the mangled 2012 Charger. It sustained an estimated \$10,000 in damage.

Traffic was detoured onto U.S. 90 during the search for the suspect, which involved dozens of officers including sheriff's deputies, state fish and wildlife officers, FHP troopers and prison personnel stationed along the interstate, at exits, ramps and other perimeter points.

Although he's being held at the Baker County jail without bond, Mr. Lundy faces charges from Madison County of aggravated assault on a law enforcement officer, possession of marijuana with intent to distribute and felony fleeing and eluding.

His Facebook page indicates he graduated from Terry Parker High School and has a daughter. Mr. Williams' charges are pending further investigation.

Mr. Hyde was served with an arrest warrant from Hamilton County on eight counts of unlawful sale of archaeological resources, seven counts of dealing in stolen property and one count of dealing in stolen property through the Internet. His bond on those charges was set at \$80,000.

"The suspects were part of a criminal conspiracy," said Maj. Curtis Brown, head of the FWC's Investigations section. "Their crimes pose serious environmental, economic and cultural consequences." Florida law protects historic properties, including artifacts on state lands. When someone takes them, they are essentially stealing from the people of Florida, both those here today and future generations.

"This is not the situation of a family out hiking and finding an arrowhead or other artifact that they want to take home," Brown said. "We did not target the casual collector. These subjects intentionally destroyed lands and rivers for their own personal gain. Some even made their entire living on these illegal sales."

Experts at the Florida Department of State are working with FWC to identify the artifacts and estimate their value.

"Artifacts are a finite, non-renewable resource. When they are taken, destroyed or stored in private collections without being documented, they, and the history they represent, are gone forever," said Rob Bendus, state historic preservation officer and director of the department's Division of Historical Resources. "This is a significant loss to the state's quality of life, history, economy and cultural resources."

Others involved in the investigation included the Attorney General's Office of Statewide Prosecutor, Florida Department of Environmental Protection, Georgia Department of Natural Resources, various archaeological and anthropological societies, Florida universities and Native American groups.

Round-up rids county of toxic waste

Jean Veal of Macclenny dropped discarded fluorescent light bulbs, batteries and muriatic acid at the annual Toxic Round-up on March 2 at the county administration building, 55 N. 3rd St. in Macclenny. Also pictured is David Whitehead of the county road department. The collection is sponsored by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection, New River Solid Waste Association and the county. It allows local residents to rid their homes of toxic materials and electronic waste. This year's haul from 96 households totaled 9309 pounds including 1620 pounds of flammable liquids, 2580 pounds of latex paint, 1982 pounds of used oil/lubricants, 1010 pounds of electronic waste and 792 pounds of flammable solids like roof tar.

Teen on 'K-2' attacks granddad

A 16-year-old boy said to be high after smoking the synthetic drug K-2 was arrested for aggravated domestic battery on his grandfather the early afternoon of March 2.

The grandfather, 69, told Deputy Randy Davis the accused lunged at him with a 4-inch knife, inflicting a superficial cut on his right forearm during an argument at their residence on Shave's Bluff Rd. on the St. Mary's River north of Macclenny. Minutes before, the grandfather said the boy, who lives with him and his 66-year-old grandmother, returned from the garage area with "eyes wide open and a wild look to them" while slurring his words to the point they could not decipher what he was saying.

He then placed a tight bear hug on the grandmother and became angry when the grandfather yelled at him to release her. The grandfather told Deputy Davis the boy has a history of smoking K-2, also known as synthetic marijuana, and both he and his wife fear he will harm himself or others.

Police called to the scene did not immediately locate the suspect, who fled toward the nearby river following the incident just after 1 p.m. He returned later that day and officers were called back to make the arrest for the second degree felony.

The sheriff's department last month raided two area convenience stores and confiscated on Shave's Bluff Rd. on the St. Mary's River north of Macclenny. Minutes before, the grandfather said the boy, who lives with him and his 66-year-old grandmother, returned from the garage area with "eyes wide open and a wild look to them" while slurring his words to the point they could not decipher what he was saying.

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Traffic stops lead to several arrests for license suspensions

County deputies arrested four motorists the past week for driving without valid licenses after stopping their vehicles for minor traffic violations.

Deputy Robert Simpkins pulled over a 2001 Chevrolet pickup driven by Johnnie Carter, 31, of Macclenny late on February 27 downtown and learned his license had three suspensions and was currently revoked for drunk driving.

The officer also ticketed Mr. Carter for having an open container of alcohol in the vehicle. The driver admitted he had been drinking but did not appear to be impaired.

The same deputy arrested Grant Hembree, 26, of Macclenny late the next night for having

Ms. Brazell accused her son Kyle Raulerson, 22, who lives nearby, of removing a 2000 Dodge and 1994 Chevrolet without her permission.

Deputy Jeremiah Combs obtained documents from the scrap yard affirming the vehicles were brought there, and Mr. Bryant produced documents at the interview showing he notified the Department of Motor Vehicles as required that he had possession of them.

According to Investigator Dougherty, scrap yards are then required to wait three business days from the DMV notification before sending off the vehicles to be destroyed.

Mr. Bryant is accused of taking the Chevrolet to a shredder before the authorized date of March 6, and the Dodge before March 7.

A Glen St. Mary woman sought on a trio of local warrants was taken to county jail early on February 26 after county deputies made two unsuccessful attempts to find her at an address on Ridge Estates.

Both Tara McDuffie, 30, and acquaintance Justin Parmeley, 29, of Glen were also charged with felony battery on Ms. McDuffie's mother Sharen Tanner, 66, at a second residence on Pine Ridge Ct. south of Sanderson.

Deputy Daryl Mobley said he went to the first address late on February 25 after receiving information that Ms. McDuffie, wanted on warrants for failure to appear in court, was there.

Mr. Parmeley denied she was at the address and refused to allow a search. A half hour later, officers were back there and a search both inside and around the trailer turned up nothing.




