Driver in December teen death is charged

The driver of a speeding pickup truck that ran off Claude Harvey Rd. in early December of last year and overturned, killing one passenger and seriously injuring another, has been charged with vehicular homicide.

The state attorney's office filed the information on Austin Gage Kight, 18, of Macclenny in circuit court on August 5 after reviewing the Florida Highway Patrol's accident investigation report.

The homicide count is related to the death of Alexis Sommise, 17, of Jacksonville and another third degree felony, reckless driving with serious bodily injury, is related to Corey Leonard Craig, 18, of Macclenny.

Mr. Craig was paralyzed with a spinal injury that required months of rehabilitation at an Atlanta hospital.

All three occupants of the 1995 Ford had attended the annual Lighted Christmas Parade in downtown Macclenny earlier that evening.

The FHP report contends that Mr. Kight lost control of his northbound vehicle on Claude Harvey Rd. while passing others, then slid sideways and overturned several times before landing on its side off the east shoulder. All three occupants were thrown from the truck.

The driver was also injured, though less seriously than Mr. Craig.

The same day, the state filed multiple charges against James H. Nelson, 41, of Sanderson in connection with an accident during the early morning hours of August 4 on CR 122 near Cuyler.

He is charged with drunk driving in an accident with property damage, leaving the scene and lack of a valid driver's license.

Varsity 'faster,' says Cat coach

The BCHS football program continued training camp throughout last week in preparation for the kickoff of the season August 23.

After running through non-contact drills for the majority of the first week, the team was finally able to begin hitting with pads on August 10. The practice opened up with a hitting drill pairing players of similar positions against one another. The physical nature of the drill set the tone for the rest of practice.

Coach Ryan Sulkowski said he is happy with how the team has been performing. "I'm pleased with the speed we're practicing at," he said. "I think our varsity guys have gotten so much faster."

He attributed the quickness of the team to the veteran players at key positions. He said they are familiar with their assignments due to being in the system for so long, which means there is no hesitation in their play.

The offense was ahead of the defense in Saturday's practice, but the defense has caught up since two-a-days began Monday. Coach Sulkowski said there was a gap

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Land owners wince at mining ban

The Baker County Conservation Alliance has a perfect batting average so far, waging two successful grass roots campaigns to kill plans for a medical waste incinerator north of US 90 last year and a sand mine on duPont land last month.

But the citizens group is meeting stiff resistance to its latest tactic — convincing the county to prohibit sand mining entirely. Some of the county's largest landowners are kicking up a ruckus.

The first skirmish in the new battle occurred during a county commission workshop the evening of August 5, which

was scheduled to consider proposed land use changes presented by the group's attorney, Tom Callan of Orlando.

Mr. Callan submitted a 16-page document containing proposed revisions to the county's comprehensive plan to impose tighter restrictions in the future on the type of mining conducted by duPont, the extraction of titanium, and prohibit sand mining altogether.

"Titanium mined lands can be redeveloped after mining," said Mr. Callan, whose legal expertise is in the area of land use planning and zoning.

Sand mining presently is permitted in Baker County on industrial-zoned lands and, with a special exception grant-

ed by the county commission, on agricultural lands.

Mr. Callan said titanium mining, which has been allowed

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

for years in Baker County, is less environmentally harmful than sand mining, which is just now attempting to gain acceptance in the county.

Oldcastle Southern Group, one of two companies bidding for permits, recently was denied a permit to operate a sand mine for 50 years on land previously mined by duPont off SR 22 a few miles south of Interstate 10.

While titanium mining retains 97 percent of the excavated material at the mining site, Mr. Callan said, sand mining removes most of the material extracted from the earth and hauls it away, leaving water-filled craters in its place.

The proposals he submitted included the following language he would like to see inserted in the county's land development regulations:

"The county has concluded that the mining of the lands in Baker County decreases the tax base and prevents the property from being redeveloped for residential, commercial or mixed uses development in the future and stunts development on adjoining properties.

"Titanium mining, on the other hand, allows or provides for the retention of 97 percent of the mined material on-site which allows for redevelopment, is of a shorter duration than other open pit sand mines, and is capable of redevelopment as residential, commercial and mixed uses in the future.

"Having a far less impact on the surrounding properties and use of the county and state road system in Baker County, titanium mining has minimal impacts on the roadway system. Also, titanium mining has been previously approved in Baker County in certain areas. It is not the intent to close or limit the current titanium mining operations."

Once sand mining ceases, the remaining land is not suitable for any other kind of development and eventually "will be another mine," Mr. Callan told commissioners, adding that Baker Coun-

ty's proximity to Jacksonville makes the rural county ideal for "likely expansion of a suburban type nature."

He said the conservation alliance members are concerned about the county's image and how allowing mining would "advertise what the county is about."

But several large landowners in the audience told commissioners that they don't want anybody telling them what they can or cannot do with their property.

"It is a property rights issue," said John Kennedy, a Maccleddy resident who said he was "representing myself and a number of other property owners."

Mr. Kennedy said he helped write the county's comprehensive plan, which was approved by the state years ago, and he was offended by the remarks made by Mr. Callan. He said the coalition's proposals could "affect every land owner that owns five acres or more because most are zoned agriculture."

"We oppose this being presented to you," Mr. Kennedy told commissioners.

Jim Knabb, president of his family's LaBeuna Farms real estate corporation, staunchly defended his and other landowners' "right to use our land anyway we want to as long as it complies with the law."

Others expressed similar sentiments, including Clement Hilton, who said he was a plant manager at duPont's mining operation in southeastern Baker County and that the proposals put forth by the conservation coalition would "infringe on our property rights."

After Mr. Callan made his presentation and several property owners offered their views, Hugh Fish, a local attorney who represented Oldcastle during the application hearing before the county last month said the property sought for mining was "never intended for development" after it ended. It would have become the property of the City of Maccleddy as the result of a proposed deal wherein Oldcastle offered to

build a pipeline to its site off SR 228 to transport the city's treated wastewater so it would no longer have to be dumped into Turkey Creek.

Mr. Fish also questioned the purpose of the workshop and whether the board intended to vote on something that night.

"What are we doing here tonight?" he asked.

Board chairman Mark Hartley said the workshop was scheduled at the request of the conservation alliance for the presentation from Mr. Callan. He told Mr. Fish that "no action will be taken."

Afterward, several other landowners, including timber company representatives, spoke against the coalition's proposed land use revisions.

Ed Carter of Lake City, a manager representing Rayonier's land holdings in Baker County, said the proposed changes, specifically equating sand mining with "open pit mining," would limit the company's use of its own land.

"Open pit mining is a borrow pit," Mr. Carter said.

The last large land owner to speak was Doug Moore, who said he owns about 2,500 acres where he "grows pine trees and deer" in Glen St. Mary.

He said he has no particular plans for doing anything else with his property, but he doesn't want anyone trying to dictate what he can or cannot do.

"I want to leave my options open," said Mr. Moore, who supported Oldcastle's sand mining plans.

After everyone else had spoken, a perturbed Allison Broughton, one of the founders of the Baker County Conservation Alliance and a former member of the county's Land Planning Agency, challenged them to raise their hands if any of them had plans to allow mining on their property.

When no hands went up she said she didn't understand why they were so opposed to the group's proposals.

"Everybody's all in a tizzy but nobody wants to open a sand mine," she said, adding that her motive was simply "to protect our county and stop a bad business that's been invited to our county."

Mrs. Broughton then turned her attention to the five county commissioners and told them: "They (large landowners) don't run the county. You do."

At that, Mr. Harley adjourned the meeting without any comment from commissioners.

because the coaches are trying out different players on defense, but he is pleased with both sides of the ball.

"What we're trying to do is find younger guys who can play defense who can keep guys from playing both ways," Coach Sulkowski said. "We're trying to phase that out. We want to give the players a chance to show us they are capable of doing that."

Coach Sulkowski said having players focus on just offense or defense paid off last season as Falon Lee was able to stay fresh through the entire game at running back.

Now, with Lee playing for Miami (OH), seniors Dalton Dyal and Joseph McCray are battling for the starting running back role. Coach Sulkowski said both players have shown flashes in practice, but Dyal still has a slight lead.

But don't be surprised to see both players carrying the ball on Friday nights.

"It should give us a nice one-two punch," Coach Sulkowski said. "It will give us a changeup of running styles that could pose a problem for some defenses. We'll ultimately see an equal mix of those guys once we get into the season."

In addition to the running back battle, several freshmen have been trying to earn a role on the lines. Dalton Thomas is the leader of the group, but they have all held their own and made some plays, the head coach said.

While some players are fighting to earn their way onto the roster, Coach Sulkowski has already begun to name starters on the team's website.

There haven't been any surprises thus far, with mostly shoo-ins for starting roles being announced. Quarterback Jacob Carter, defensive ends CeCe Jefferson and Elisha Lee, wide receivers Mike Boone and Brandon Miller, and linebacker Rashodd Hadley have all been named starters. The team will announce one starter per day until Baker County's game against Camden County at the end of August.

In the meantime, the Wildcats will continue to prepare for the first game against Ed White in the Kickoff Classic on August 23. Although it doesn't count against the team's record, it's a valuable learning experience for the team.

"We will get to see what adjustments we need to make after next Friday night," Coach Sulkowski said. "It's a practice game to see who shines under the lights. We get to see which kids show up in the Friday night atmosphere."

Until then, the Wildcats will continue to practice with two-a-days being held Wednesday and Friday this week.

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Officials: we'll get grades up

To end a somewhat lively school board meeting last week that broke into a happy birthday song at one point, officials rallied against the state's school grading formula and pledged to do whatever it takes to boost marks next year.

Superintendent Sherrie Raulerson said school faculty have been brainstorming and contacting other high-performing schools, including one in Flagler County in which some 80 percent of students are on free or reduced lunch, a common barometer for family income levels in a given jurisdiction.

"We're excited about what's to come," the superintendent said at the tail end of the 45-minute meeting the evening of August 5.

"We're frustrated with the system in the State of Florida ... but we also don't want that to be an excuse for us here in Baker County ... We know we can do better and that's what we'll do," she said.

Her comments come on the heels of the middle school dropping to a B-school and Keller Intermediate School falling to a D-school against the backdrop of the shift to more rigorous testing standards nationwide.

According to the state, both schools benefitted from the State Board of Education's move just before the grades were released to not permit any school's grade to drop more than one notch.

News also broke just a few days prior to the meeting that Florida's education commissioner, Tony Bennett, resigned amid allegations he changed the school grading formula in Indiana to benefit a charter school connected to a prominent public donor. He was on the job only seven months.

"My prayer is we get some leadership, and I would love for it to be a Florida superintendent that understands the work and what happens in the schools, not just the politics involved," said Mrs. Raulerson.

"It would really be great to have somebody in the trenches who understands what's happening in our schools," she said. "We don't mind being evaluated, but there's so much confusion [about school grades]."

In other business that evening, the school board, minus member Jesse Davis, approved the following:

- The 2012-13 Safety Inspections report.
- The report notes the results of thorough inspections at facilities across the district by safety inspector Chris Chisolm, who recently became a fully-certified fire safety inspector.

Some of the more common violations included maintenance work like replacing light bulbs, carpent or ceiling tile repairs, needed painting but also the accumulation of combustible materials or hazardous materials not being secured properly.

Board chairman Griffith suggested that many of the violations represent repairs that may have been put off due to budgetary pressures.

"I guess we'll just have to do the best we can," he said.

There were 446 code violations noted at local schools — 212 at BCHS, 40 at Macclenny Elementary, 19 at Westside Elementary, 110 at the middle school and 27 at Keller Intermediate.

"Chris has written up everybody in this district, including his supervisor at the maintenance department," commented Mr. Griffith.

His boss, Denny Wells, director of facilities and maintenance, said the annual inspections occur during the last month of school, which can be a hectic time.

"One thing you need to realize," he told the board, "is this is a given moment on a given day and depending on what's going on in that classroom ... there may have been cleaning up when he walked through. We decided a long time ago what you see is what you write."

- Out-of-state travel for the varsity and junior varsity volleyball players and coaches to a water park on Jekyll Island, GA for the purpose of "team building."

Head coach Heather Sulkowski's request to the board notes that players have been seeking some kind of team trip to build better relationships prior to the start of the season and selected the trip. Parents will accompany the team, which is chartering a bus and covering their own expenses.

- The 2013-14 bus routes.
- Transportation director Johnnie Jacobs said there were no relevant changes from last year's routes.

Husband frets over woman's safety since she has not made contact since middle of July

Alisa Michelle Carter, 40, of Macclenny went missing in mid-July. Her husband of 20 years said she's left him in the past, but would always phone after a few days to let him know she was alright and where she was staying.

This time, however, he thinks something bad happened to her.

Jason Carter, 39, reported his wife missing on August 6, about three weeks after he left to run errands and returned to find her gone.

BCSB's Davis will vacate his seat

When Baker County schools open later this month there will be some new faces on local campuses and some old faces will take over new roles within the school system.

At the top — the school board — first-term member Jesse Davis is preparing to move his family to Atlanta following his promotion within Colonial Life and Accident Insurance Co. He started the new job August 1.

He said while the move hasn't been finalized, he's been working from the metropolitan area recently and plans to recommend retired high school assistant principal Fay Sinclair as his replacement, perhaps at the end of September.

The recommendation will be delivered to Governor Rick Scott, which makes such appointments.

"It's going to happen," Mr. Davis said of the move, "it's just a matter of when."

Mr. Davis said it's been a privilege to serve

on the school board since 2010, but the move to Atlanta is in the best interest of his family.

"If this wasn't a life-changing opportunity, I wouldn't have taken it," he said.

Another new face in a high-profile position for the 2013-14 school year is that of Heather Davidson, the middle school's new band director. Mrs. Davidson of Gainesville is replacing former band director Matthew Jernigan, who moved to Georgia after the last school year concluded.

Mrs. Davidson graduated from the University of North Carolina in 2006 with a degree in music education. Since then she's spent more than four years teaching in public schools in Chatham County, N.C.

Middle school physical education teacher Angela Laumore moved from the assistant volleyball coaching job to head coach and will also serve as an assistant coach under Jon Mobley for softball.

She gave up girls basketball coaching duties, a spot that remains open.

At the high school, Mrs. Sinclair's retirement from the school's leadership team set off a shuffling among other positions in the district.

Carrie Dopson, also an assistant principal at BCHS, will fill Mrs. Sinclair's position and Tonya Tarte will move into Mrs. Dopson's former job. Mrs. Tarte will be replaced as the

PreK-Kindergarten Center's lead teacher by Catina Jones, who taught at the school previously.

The new school year will also bring a new leader to the district's exceptional student education (ESE) program — Nancy Jo Crews. She will fill the shoes left by Debbie Melvin, who retired at the end of the school year.

The high school saw many teachers leave at the end of the last school year, including art department director Tiffany Armoreda and her husband Chris Armoreda, who coached both track and tennis for the Wildcats.

The couple is moving abroad to teach English, said Mark Bryant, who is replacing the art teacher this year. Mr. Bryant, who also serves on the Macclenny City Commission, announced his retirement from Florida Blue at the commission's meeting August 13.

He said he holds a fine arts degree and a valid teaching certificate for art instruction.

Mr. Armoreda's coaching position remains unfilled.

The district's human resources director, Robin Mobley, estimated there were 15 teacher vacancies at the high school, 10 of which resulted from resignations or retirements.

District-wide there were 14 open teaching positions in early June, which dropped to eight in late July, and down to one this week.

Sex offender violated probation House arrest for 6 months

A convicted sex offender admitted in circuit court on August 6 that he violated prison probation with an arrest for drunk driving and was placed on electronically monitored house arrest for six months.

Court records indicate that Edward Russell Carter Sr., 62, was charged in Bradford County last month after his arrest in Lawtrey for DUI and leaving the scene of an accident with property damage.

Mr. Carter was sentenced in November, 1995 to 15 years in prison followed by a likened term on probation for sexual battery on a child less than 10 years old in the summer of 1984. The victim came forward after a decade and accused the defendant of molesting her in Baker County.

County Judge Joey Williams, sitting on the circuit bench in the absence of Judge Mark Moseley, also ordered Mr. Carter to undergo psycho-sexual counseling and substance

abuse evaluation. Records indicate he is married and lives in Jacksonville.

He was also found guilty of violating another probation condition by leaving Duval County without approval of his probation officer. The arrest took place on July 8.

Mr. Carter was released from prison in January, 2002.

In other sentences handed down that session:

- Kyle Holton admitted violating probation for felony battery in a 2011 case and pleaded no contest to felony possession of marijuana and possession of paraphernalia.

- Mr. Holton, 22, will serve nine months in county jail less 48 days already served.

- Kevin Taver, 42, has already served half of the year-long county jail sentence received in return for his no contest plea to possession of drugs with intent to sell. Judge Williams ordered a year of probation following release, and re-payment to the

- sheriff's department of \$300 in expenses associate with setting up the controlled buy.
- Timothy Leighton Jr., 31, admitted he violated probation from a 2012 case for possessing methamphetamine and will be in county jail six months. The state dropped a

more recent case as part of the plea pact.

- The state dropped drug paraphernalia and resisting arrest counts against Garrett Follis, 25, in return for a no contest plea to having chemicals to produce methamphetamine.

- Judge Williams withheld adjudication of guilt providing Mr. Follis complies with terms of a two-year drug offender probation.

- Guilt adjudication was also withheld in the case of Justin Luke, 23, who pleaded to reduced counts of trespassing and petty theft, and to sale and possession of controlled drugs.

- The state dropped a companion charge of having drug paraphernalia and the defendant will be on probation a year.

- The judge ordered Deron Thomas, 38, to pay over \$5,400 for damage he did to a vehicle he was chasing from a bar to Steel Bridge Rd. the night of September 1, 2012. He pleaded no contest to felony criminal mischief.

- The state dropped counts of aggravated battery with a deadly weapon, leaving the scene of an accident and reckless driving resulting in property damage.

- He will be on probation two years.
- Scott Schneidermesser, 42, was banned from Walmart and given a two-year probation after his no contest plea to felony theft.

Stole jewelry and an iPad

A Sanderson man already in county jail for theft was charged with stealing jewelry and an iPad from a Macclenny residence where he resided until late July.

Victim Judith Whisman called police on August 5 when she noticed the property missing from her residence on Linda St. She gave Deputy Robert Simpkins the name of Samuel Fowler III, 18, as a possible suspect.

Ms. Whisman also said she received a phone call from a male juvenile, 17, who claimed the suspect had the iPad when he fled from a residence on Cleve Harvey Rd. last month when police arrived to question him about a missing dirt bike and bicycle.

Interviewed at county jail, Mr. Fowler admitted to Deputy Simpkins that he pawned a ring and bracelet worth \$1100 and stored the iPad that he insisted he "borrowed" at the Sanderson address.

A search of that residence later turned up nothing.

Mr. Fowler was charged with three counts of grand theft in addition to ones he is already facing for theft of the dirt bike and theft and re-sale of the bicycle. The juvenile informant is also charged with being an accomplice in the earlier case.

The case was one of a rash of property-related crimes reported the past week. Among them:

- Heather Stout, 42, of Sanderson was charged with grand theft of a \$350 ring from Vickie Snell about six weeks before the victim reported it to the sheriff's department on August 7.

- Ms. Snell suggested Ms. Stout as a possible suspect in the disappearance of the ring because she had been at the victim's residence on CR 23A, according to the report by Deputy Earl Lord.

- After the ring was identified at a local pawn shop, Investigator Chris Volz said he interviewed the suspect at county jail. She denied the allegation, insisting the item was once her wedding ring.

A Macclenny man with a history of domestic violence and threats was arrested late on August 5 following a verbal confrontation with his live-in girlfriend and fiancé at their residence on Tall Pine Rd.

Michael Prevatt, 31, was stopped by police near CR 125 and Bob Burnsed Rd. shortly after the incident involving Brandy Hoffman, 30, at 10:50 pm. She told Deputy Trey McCullough that her boyfriend made bizarre statements that others were coming to kill them, then turned on her when she attempted to calm

him.

The couple's two children were present at the time. Mr. Prevatt was charged with assault.

In another incident involving a live-in couple, complaints for domestic battery were filed late on August 7 against both parties involved in an altercation at their residence on CR 139-B north of Glen St. Mary.

Emily Barton, 20, told Deputy Matt Riegel that Michael Waters Jr., 25, choked her during an argument in their bedroom, and she kicked him in response.

Mr. Waters initially denied

the incident turned physical, but the officer noted he had scratch marks on his face and arm.

- A complaint for battery was filed against a male patient at Northeast Florida State Hospital for attacking an employee the morning of August 7.

- Daniel Long, 20, of Macclenny told Deputy Clements Leo he was struck about the face several times by the patient, 28, during a head count about 7 am. The deputy noted facial swelling and scratch marks about Mr. Long's neck and back.

'Spark up downtown' 'Mom and Pops' sought Sept. 28th

A group of downtown Macclenny business owners are planning a one-day sidewalk sale centered in the blocks surrounding the intersection of US 90 and 5th Street and featuring licensed businesses from the Macclenny and Glen St. Mary areas.

"We want people to come down, make some connections and have a good day outside milling around and checking out all the bargains to be had," said Lin Adams, owner of the Village Store in the heart of downtown, who is spearheading the effort.

It will take place September 28 from 9 am to 3 pm.

Right now Ms. Adams and other mom-and-pop business owners are busy spreading the word and inviting other independent businesses outside the city core to participate.

Ms. Adams said downtown businesses with ample sidewalk frontage, like Calendar's, have agreed to let other merchants use the extra space. The Chamber of Commerce has opened its sidewalk space as well.

The footprint of the event will depend on how many businesses take part.

Dozens of merchants downtown, on south 6th and 5th streets, along US 90 west and in Glen are being targeted for participation.

Ms. Adams indicated that the event, dubbed the "Downtown Macclenny Sidewalk Sale" is a pilot project and could grow in the coming years if it's successful. Streets could be closed off to create more space for retailers, for instance.

Electricity will not be available, but food vendors who function without power are welcome.

The sidewalk sale grew from the discussions among mom-and-pop business owners who find that customers often comment about how they didn't know such places existed in the historic downtown, Ms. Adams said.

"Outside the strip areas, places where there's no anchor store like a Walmart or Winn-Dixie, like downtown, are getting forgotten," she said. "And there are great, viable businesses down here and there is space available for other interesting businesses."



Brings English soccer to the Y

Traveling from Birmingham, England to Macclenny might seem like a long trip for some people, but for Jamie Haynes, it was well worth the transatlantic trip.

Mr. Haynes coached soccer as part of the Challenger British Soccer Camp, which hosts camps around the country to teach the fundamentals of the sport. He originally found out about the opportunity through his school backpack home.

"In college, there were a lot of posters up and a lot of my friends did it," he said. "They said it was a great experience."

Mr. Haynes was based in the Southeast region during his time coaching in the camp. He spent his first eight weeks coaching in South Carolina and Georgia, before making his final stop in Macclenny. Each camp lasts five days, and every day there is a new skill and life lesson.

He said it's great that he's able to teach kids off-the-field lessons like responsibility, integrity and leadership that they're able to use in life.

He said he tries to find fun ways to teach the players the fundamental techniques of the game.

"We teach technical things and we do it through having fun and playing games," the Birmingham native said. "I think it's a really good way to teach the kids because they're having fun and playing games and not realizing they're working on their technique. They get it much quicker."

The Macclenny camp was the smallest one he coached since arriving in the country June 1 with five participants. The week prior in Atlanta, the camp attracted about 200 participants with each

of the 13 coaches being responsible for about 15 players.

While the large camp was fun, the smaller camps are more beneficial, he said.

"Right here, I've just got five kids to myself," Mr. Haynes said, "so I can get to know them a lot better and I can work out what they like to do. We get through a lot, which is good for the kids."

But to Mr. Haynes, signing on to coach the Challenger British Soccer Camp was more than just an opportunity to teach the game he loves; it was also a chance to travel.

"You get to see the real America instead of all the touristy stuff, and that's what I really love," he said.

He had the opportunity to see the different parts of the country by staying with a different host family each week. He lived with the Sands family during his time in Macclenny.

Leslie Sands, whose son Cooper was one of the five participants in the camp, said they signed on to host Mr. Haynes after being handed a card advertising the soccer camp at the end of the season earlier this year.

She said she was anxious at first because the family wasn't given much information about the coach, but that nervousness quickly faded after meeting Mr. Haynes.

"It was fun," she said. "It was neat to learn about England. But I think it was more fun to show

him our culture."

Mrs. Sands said her husband and brother-in-law showed him what life in Northeast Florida was like. It included going to Suns and Jaguars games, seeing the St. Mary's River, and — for the first time in Mr. Haynes's life — getting to drive a truck.

All of this made for a great conclusion to Mr. Haynes's summer of coaching soccer.

"My host family I've had has been amazing," he said. "It may be the best week I've had since I've been here. It's a lovely little

town."

Mr. Haynes left the Sands family to meet his own family in Orlando for a two-week family vacation through Florida and Tennessee. Both sides are planning on staying in contact despite being separated by an ocean. He said the coaching in the Challenger British Soccer Camp was a great opportunity; one that he wants to relive again next summer.

"I want to come back next year," Mr. Haynes said. "I would love to come back here."

Although there is some preliminary interest from FSU, she



"Seems like old times, being here with you, just like old times ..."

You can look at that lead in two ways. It's a great song from the 1950s or it's another Jaguars football game.

For this column it's the latter. I watched the Jaguars play the Dolphins with great interest to see if they progressed under new coach Gus Bradley.

I wanted to see if Blaine Gabbert wouldn't shuffle his feet around in the pocket like he was being charged by a herd of raging rhinos — even when he wasn't.

On both counts I was disappointed. Despite some improvement in the starting defense I was unimpressed with the home team. As for Gabbert, he was lackluster at best.

The Jaguars have been quick to point out that had Gabbert not have come out in the draft early he would have been the top quarterback picked last year. Big deal — he did and he wasn't. E.J. Manuel, the first quarterback picked last year, looked in command in Buffalo. Gabbert — not so much.

Granted he was missing top receiver Cecil Shorts, loose cannon and wide receiver Justin Blackmon and running back Maurice Jones-Drew. All three could have added a lot to the offense that was basically non-existent. But still.

Second string quarterback Chad Henne wasn't brilliant, but he certainly was an improvement over Gabbert if only for the fact that he looked like he was in charge out there. He looked much more like starting quarter-

back material.

You can't really tell a lot from looking at the first pre-season game. They will make changes, improve on mistakes and get better. At least, we can hope they do. Otherwise, it could be another long season.

Speaking of "old times," that's how I felt watching Tim Tebow for the Patriots. Tebow got a lot of playing time when second stringer Ryan Mallett was injured in the win over the Eagles. I wish I could say that Tebow's mechanics have improved and that

his ability to hit wide receivers has improved, but that's not the case. He, too, looked the same as last year with the Jets.

I want him to do well too and I confound his critics. But in football parlay "it's go time." It's now, or probably never, for Tebow.

Mr. Altman plays in an adult softball league against players who are usually half his age, if not younger. The league consists of a lot of his family members, but Mr. Altman doesn't take it easy on them.

"He gets base hits," said Joel Burnett, who also participates in the league. "He probably bats anywhere from 2-4 to 2-5 in every game."

"I told them as long as somebody would let me pitch, then I was going to play until I was 80," he said. "That's one more year. If I'm still in good shape, then I'm liable to play until I'm 81."

"The Lord blessed me, that's all I can really say," Mr. Altman said. "It's just a gift that God gave me. I exercise it and I get along real well with it. I just thank the Lord that I'm out here and can participate."

The Taylor native has been around softball for nearly all his life. He's in his second stint playing in the local league after participating in it about a decade ago. Mr. Altman moved to Jacksonville, where he played fast pitch softball and umpired for 10 years,

which included calling a national tournament. Now, back in his home county, he has no intention of slowing down.
