Arrest for looting a trust fund

Money intended for step-daughter

A Macclenny woman was arrested on October 9 and charged with forgery and theft of trust fund and scholarship funds belonging to her step-daughter.

This marks the second time this year that Melinda Kay Lewis, 37, has been arrested for fraudulent activities involving money intended for use by Katie Lewis, who is considered an adult since her 18th birthday in March.

Investigator Chris Volz of the sheriff's department arrested the step-mother following an interview at county jail during which the defendant could not account for nearly \$11,000 drawn from a guardianship fund and Touchdown Club scholarship.

Ms. Lewis, accompanied by her attorney from Jacksonville, insisted the money was spent "on expenses related to Katie's well-being," according to the investigator's report.

Ms. Lewis, known in the area for her cheer leading clinics and as a former employee at area gyms, has been out on bond since May 13 when she was charged with spending \$7926 in educational funds from Higher One, a financial aid source intended to help with the step-daughter's college costs.

In the original count, she is accused of obtaining a debit card in her step-daughter's name "that was linked to several educational funding sources."

Between January, 2012 and March of this year, she allegedly used her daughter's personal information and the card to withdraw funds. Court records show the card was used for retail purchasing, medical care and other expenses both in Baker and Duval counties.

The sheriff's investigator said the step-daughter contacted him on May 30 and said

Florida Blue is 'it' Obamacare: initial rollout 'horrendous'

Only one insurance company, Florida Blue, is offering plans to Baker County residents through the federal Health Insurance Marketplace that launched October 1, albeit with many technical difficulties.

The insurer, formerly Blue Cross Blue Shield of Florida, is offering a wide array of options, however.

The list of plans and prices being offered throughout the state was released earlier this month. It showed more than 70 plans available in Baker County at five levels, which are based on how much of enrollees' healthcare expenses the plan covers and how much customers pay in premiums.

There's one catastrophic plan offered, which is the least expensive plan but it only picks up 60 percent of healthcare costs on average.

There's 18 bronze plans, which are the second least expensive level and cover 60 percent of expenses.

The silver plans, the third cheapest level, make up the largest number with 24 in all and they cover 70 percent. The average monthly premium for a silver plan covering a 27-year-old individual in Baker County is \$270. For a family of four, with two adults age 30, it's \$620.

The 20 gold plans, the fourth cheapest, cover 80 percent of costs on average and the 14 highest-priced platinum plans cover 90 percent.

The average monthly premiums for plans at all levels are shown at right for various enrollee types. They are the result of an analysis by *The Baker County Press* of premiums for plans being offered through the marketplace for Baker County residents. The levels — bronze, silver, gold and platinum — create tiered pricing, and generally, each tier's

average premium is separated by \$30-to-\$80 with some exceptions.

The jump in the average premium between plan levels for a 27-year-old individual is between \$26 and \$31 and the difference for a single parent, age 30, with two kids ranges between \$59 and \$80. But for a family of four, the price differences are between \$86 and \$118.

Jack Baker Jr., a licensed broker for Florida Blue based in Macclenny, said the company's marketplace premiums for Baker County are "a little higher" than what the company has offered historically.

"I went through and compared my and my wife's plan. It would go from \$700 to \$850," he said.

But that's likely because insurers offering plans through the marketplace are required under the Affordable Care Act, commonly referred to as Obamacare, to cover more healthcare services and they're prohibited from denying anyone coverage.

Florida Blue is the only insurance company offering plans in every county in Florida, and it's also the sole health insurance provider in 39 of the state's 67 counties, most of which are rural counties like Baker, Mr. Baker said.

He also countered the notation that Florida Blue premiums on the marketplace are slightly elevated due to a lack of competition.

"The rates didn't have anything to do with competition because everybody had to submit their rates at the same time," he said, adding that Florida Blue did not know whether other companies would be offering plans in Baker County until after they submitted their rates.

When asked why the company was the only firm to seek customers in Baker County, Mr. Baker said, "I have no idea to be honest. It may be that some [companies] want to wait and see how things shake out. Maybe more will offer plans next year."

Two of his recent clients, a husband and wife in their late 50s, would see their premiums jump be-

City, Rayonier back to table on sludge sprayfield

The City of Macclenny and Rayonier are on the verge of settling their legal dispute over a land deal that went sour last year after the company discovered that the city had employed a real estate agent to buy 114 acres of Rayonier timberland for use as a sewage sludge spray field.

Ironically, the key to settling the issue is the same 114-acre parcel that the city originally sought to buy but was rebuffed by Rayonier, a giant timber company and cellulose manufacturer, which now is offering to sell to the city on a slightly smaller scale.

"We're back on the original piece of property north of Steel Bridge Road," said City Manager Phil Rhoden, adding that Rayonier wants to trim 14 acres off the property to retain 500 feet of frontage on Steel Bridge Road in an area known as Trail

Ridge.

The city's access to the site would be via a 30-foot-wide easement on the eastern boundary of the parcel. Mr. Rhoden told city commissioners that he was in support of the proposal during a board meeting on October 8.

Pending approval by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection, the deal should be consummated next month, Mr. Rhoden told commissioners, adding that he received "a verbal (assurance) that we're okay there."

He said a "target date" of November 12 has tentatively been set for closure on the purchase, which would end a two-

and environmental officials are concerned that adequate controls may not be in place to accurately monitor the situation.

north of Glen St. Mary.

DEP officials have been urging the city to acquire its own property because the present disposal site also receives waste material from other sources

"We've been working on this a couple of years," Mr. Rhoden said, noting that a satisfactory resolution appears in sight.

The city manager assured nearby neighbors north of Steel Bridge Road, who had raised objections to the city's original plans because they feared odors and environmental contamination, that the operation would be conducted safely and in an environmentally friendly manner.

"We'll be a safe neighbor to them," Mr. Rhoden said, adding that the 100 acres will be fenced and will be buffered by trees around the perimeter.

Further, in accordance with DEP rules and regulations, a berm will be built around the sprayed area and monitoring wells will be installed to make sure the soil remains free of contaminants.

Mr. Rhoden, a former city commissioner, began negotiat-

'Lighter moments' as recovery proceeds

I'll try to be more light-hearted this week, since it is a humor column after all.

But first, an update. My daughter Sara Beth had a terrible auto accident on October 1 and we were very close to losing her. She was in ICU at Shands until last Friday with some pretty horrific injuries. The doctors and nurses stabilized her and her bodily injuries are healing. They did some surgery to remove fluid around her lung.

She has a traumatic brain injury and it will take some time to heal. No one can really say how long, but each day we look for positives to hold on to.

With the ventilator out she can "talk." Softly, but we can tell the vocal cords aren't injured. She can read. Her brother Dylan is the "keeper of the hospital room." He has put pictures and cards and posters on every square inch, to the point where nurses visit just to look at the room. The surgeon admitted he has never seen a room quite like it.

Dylan did that in ICU and when they finally decided to move her, he rushed ahead to her new room to get everything ready before she got there.

This morning, she looked at a poster that had festooned the junior float in the homecoming parade last week. A former homecoming queen herself in 2004, she would have appreciated that the girls all wore ribbons with her initials on their suits. The floats had ribbons and posters in "Sara Blue," and there was a moment of silence at the game. She looked at the poster and read it in a whisper.

She has moments of clarity and moments of confusion. That's common with a traumatic brain injury. The clear moments should increase over time.

Last night she was a little confused. Dylan was helping to feed her. She does most of the work herself, but he was operating the spoon. He cut up some tomatoes and fed them to her. Then he laughed.

"What are you laughing at?" I asked.

"She hates tomatoes. Watch this. She just ate a tomato. I'm going to write this down with the date. Wait until I tell her that I fed her tomatoes and she didn't spit them out."

"That's mean," wife Kelley said.

"She ate it didn't she? She even seemed to enjoy it."

This morning she was kidding with her husband Aaron. She pinched him and laughed. Later, after Aaron had told her a couple of times to stop picking at the staples that were holding a wound on her leg closed, she looked at him and whispered, "You can just leave."

"I've heard that enough," said Aaron, who has been married to Sara Beth for five and a half months. After she said it a second time, he left for about 10 minutes. She was very happy when he came back.

Later, when her brother was cleaning her face with a scrub and told her to stop picking at something, she rolled her eyes and said, "Dylan hates me." We've heard those words since she was 6 years old.

When he told her to do something else she rolled her eyes and mimicked him. She raised her eyebrows and shook her finger at her brother, Spencer. All good signs.

Dylan usually can get her to do things no one else can. He sits by her bedside and sings to her. "Somewhere over the rainbow, skies are ... what are they, Sara?" She whispered, "blue."

She mouthed the words to Journey's "Don't Stop Believin." A good song for her to sing, because we haven't.

We mentioned one of our drama students Savanna Jones and her eyes lit up. She "talked" for the next two or three minutes, telling the nurse about Savanna and her mane of curly hair, doing an imitation of her smile that looked just like her.

We have to think that these are positive signs of improvement. Our job is to stay faithful and positive and strong. We are doing our best so she can heal.

Here's a funny thing — no, not funny at all. Humbling. We thought that after some time the offers of help and prayers from friends and community members might drop off. It would be natural if it did. But it hasn't.

Aaron's Facebook page titled *Sara's Comeback Performance* has over 15,000 followers from around the world interested in his nightly updates. Churches have prayed. Individuals continue to pray for her recovery. People who have admitted to not having prayed regularly in years are praying for Sara Beth. It has strengthened our faith — in God and the inherent goodness in most people.

Like I said last week, we can't thank you enough for your faith and support.



Cut Congress, keep Ocean Pond open

Yea, we get it. The Obama administration, still believing it's in Chicago, decided early on that "non-essential" government workers will include stewards of America's greatest treasures — our national monuments and national parks.

That meant the closing of hundreds of sites to the people who paid for them, the taxpayers.

The most egregious example of course was the World War II memorial in Washington that "closed" for lack of Park Service workers who generally aren't needed there because it's an open area. Furloughed workers will eventually get back pay for time off, though many are experiencing hardships in the interim. Still, it's far better than a "real" layoff with severance pay and then ... nothing.



tween \$300-\$400 if they sign up on the marketplace, compared to their current employer-based coverage.
The husband is hoping to retire and was interested in getting covered until he's eligible for Medicare. Previously, though, people like him couldn't find affordable coverage.
"Now, they don't have that problem," Mr. Baker said. "Now, they [insurers] have to take everybody."

Mr. Baker said, after calculating the subsidies. That's between about \$11,490 and \$15,167 in annual income.
Even so, there will be people who cannot get subsidies and face the dilemma of either buying coverage at full price or paying a penalty via their federal income tax returns.

ing with Rayonier officials to end the legal battle and acquire the original parcel soon after he was appointed city manager in April.
"Scaling down the size of the parcel was part of the deal negotiated with Rayonier to acquire the property," he said.
Engineering tests, including soil samples, have already been completed on the original site at a cost of about \$20,000 and have met state environmental standards for the weekly disposal of up to 50,000 gallons of treated wastewater, otherwise known as "sludge."
Similar tests on two other alternate sites offered by Rayonier south of Steel Bridge Road proved unsatisfactory, city officials have said.

Several people were injured in an accident on Interstate 10 just east of SR 228 on October 9 that slowed traffic and contributed to a second rear-end collision minutes later.
Most of the injuries were minor, according to the Florida Highway Patrol, but those of Brett Johnson, 24, of Macclenny were described as serious. He was transported to UF Health in Gainesville.
Mr. Johnson's 2003 Honda Civic was heading eastbound on the interstate when another car slowed down due to the first accident.
Mr. Johnson, who FHP said was charged with careless driving, failed to slow down and well struck the rear of the 1999 Nissan Altima occupied by Ronald Simkanich, 51, of Jacksonville.
Mr. Johnson was not wearing a seat belt, but Mr. Simkanich was strapped in.
Damage to the Honda was estimated at \$4,000 and the Nissan \$3,500.
The first collision occurred when the 2005 Nissan Frontier driven by Nicole Hendry, 36, of Jacksonville was also eastbound and drifted into the inside shoulder.
FHP said she over-corrected into the outside lane and the front end of the Nissan clipped the back end of a 1992 Ford Ranger driven by Michael A. Waters, 47, of Glen St. Mary.
The impact sent the Ford spinning clockwise before it overturned and came to rest in the eastbound lanes. The Nissan, meanwhile, careened into the tree line.
Mr. Waters and his passenger, Michael A. Waters Jr., 25, also from Glen, had minor injuries. They along with a second passenger, Kathy R. Waters of Jacksonville, no age indicated, were transported to UF Health Jacksonville by rescue ambulance.
Ms. Hendry's injuries were also described as minor. She was charged with careless driving as well.
All parties in the initial crash were wearing seat belts.
Both crashes occurred about 1:30 pm.

Early morning fire levels chicken houses

The State Fire Marshal's office is investigating a structure fire that burned more than half-a-million dollars in property and contents in the north county last week.
Two chicken houses owned by Kenneth Crews of Baxter and located on CR 127 just north of John Padgett Road were fully involved when the county fire department arrived at the blaze about 1:40 am on October 11.
Charlton County's fire department was also dispatched to the scene and joined to local units, including emergency medical services. It took two hours to control the fire and the last unit left the area about 8:50 am, according to county Fire Chief Steve Marfongella's report of the incident.
It shows the property loss was valued at \$125,000 and the loss of contents was valued at \$500,000.
The state fire marshal's office said early this week the blaze remained under investigation, as does the probe into a mobile home fire last month off CR 125 south of Mud Lake Road.
No one was injured in either instance.

Following a simple swearing-in ceremony, Sam Kitching took his seat as the newest member of the Macclenny City Commission the evening of October 8.
He immediately received an ominous, though probably not entirely serious, warning from the head man on the dais.
"May God have mercy on your soul," Mayor Gary Dopson said, smiling as he looked over at Mr. Kitching seated in the Group 4 chair previously held by Richard "Dick" Johnson, who retired recently after two decades in office.
The mayor then asked Mr. Kitching if he had anything he would like to say, to which the new commissioner said his friends and family members in the audience were curious about something.

"They asked me to ask you if you were buying steak dinners tonight," Mr. Kitching said, drawing an immediate reply.
"I would," the mayor said, "but my wife is expecting me home right after the meeting."
"I see what I'm up against," Mr. Kitching said, smiling at the friendly little tete-a-tete he just had with the longest tenured member of the commission.
Mayor Dopson then told Mr. Kitching that he was fortunate to have such a small agenda, one containing only two items, at his first official meeting as a commissioner.

Chronic offender gets 32 months for multiple offenses

A circuit judge sentenced a chronic drug and traffic offender to 32 months in prison after he pleaded no contest to multiple counts during a regularly scheduled docket day on October 8.

Gerald Wyman Starling, 36, of Glen St. Mary entered the pleas to possession of controlled substances with the intent to manufacture methamphetamine, possession with intent to sell, having ingredients and paraphernalia and felony driving on a suspended license.

Court records show that Mr. Starling was arrested in both July and August following release on bond at both a local motel and a residence off Woodlawn Rd. that caught fire shortly after midnight on August 27.

In the second instance, four others at the address were arrested as well.

Three days earlier he was arrested for driving on the license with 10 suspensions.

Judge Mark Moseley allowed 71 days the defendant has been in county jail to count for his sentence in several of the minor offenses.

In other cases where defendants drew prison time, the judge ordered Leslie Manalo II, 36, of Jacksonville to serve 24 months for violating probation with his arrest in Duval County in April for battery on an elderly person.

Mr. Manalo was placed on house arrest and probation in 2009 for felony battery and aggravated assault with a deadly weapon. He gets credit for 180 days in jail.

James Nelson, 20, gets credit of one year off an 18-month sentence after admitting to violating probation in a 2012 burglary case. Court records indicate he failed to report to a probation officer and make mandated payments.

Kenneth Barron III pleaded no contest to felony driving on a suspended license and drew a sentence of seven months in jail followed by a similar probation period.

The judge ordered Samuel Fowler III onto probation two years following completion of a 120-day jail sentence for twin counts of trafficking in stolen property, grand theft and larceny.

He owes \$765 restitution to two victims.

Jerry Wilkerson pleaded no contest to felony drivers license offenses, trafficking in stolen property and resisting arrest, and will serve 180 days in jail.

Andre Garcia admitted to violating probation from two burglary cases in 2012 and will be in county jail 364 days less time already served.

Tamara Harris pleaded no contest to obtaining property by false statement and will be on probation 30 months after completing a 90-day jail sentence.

Judge Moseley ordered her to apologize to the victim in addition to paying \$1076 restitution, and do 100 hours of community service.

Keith Taylor pleaded no contest to cocaine possession and was ordered to county jail for six months, followed by a similar term on probation.

The state dropped one sale count then allowed Delvin Manning to plead no contest to possession of cocaine. He will be on probation two years.

Three related drug counts against Thomas Suggs Jr. were dropped in return for his no contest plea to trafficking in stolen property. He will be on drug offender probation five years, followed by a similar term on probation.

The judge also ordered \$5500 restitution.

Abby Vonk pleaded no contest to grand theft and illegal use of credit cards, and drew a two-year stint on drug offender probation.

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Early 2014 is forecast for bridge finish at Cedar Creek

The replacement of Cedar Creek Bridge on CR 127 — closed since June 2012 due to Tropical Storm Debby flooding — is scheduled to start next week, says the Florida Department of Transportation.

The bridge is located 2.5 miles north of Sanderson.

Traffic will continue to be detoured until the new bridge is in place, tentatively scheduled for completion in early 2014.

It will have two, 12-foot travel lanes and 8-foot wide emergency lanes. A 3.5-foot high concrete barrier wall will be built along both sides of the bridge, which will be 156 feet long.

Anderson Columbia Company of Lake City was hired by FDOT to do the work at a cost of \$1.6 million.

Crews plan on starting with demolition on the south end of the bridge first and will then begin pile driving supports. All work will be done during daytime hours.

Fishing at the bridge will be prohibited once construction begins because of safety concerns.

FDOT is overseeing the construction since federal funds are being used.

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Parking lot approved over protest

Christian Fellowship Temple, a large church in central Macclenny, is expanding its parking areas and has removed two homes in the process, irking a neighboring resident who wants to sell his home and move back to Jacksonville.

The conflict between the church and Lee Klenk of 113 W. Ohio Ave. surfaced at the City of Macclenny's Zoning Adjustment Board meeting the evening of October 7.

The church was seeking a special zoning exception for two West Ohio Avenue lots across the street from its chapel, one of which abuts Mr. Klenk's property to the east. The exception passed unanimously and gives Christian Fellowship Temple (CFT) permission to use the residentially-zoned lots for parking, classrooms or office space, in addition to dwellings.

David Burnham, a local contractor and a member of the church's congregation, represented CFT at the hearing and explained that the church intends to use the land for expanded parking, at least in the near term. The new parking lots will not be paved, he said.

Mr. Klenk, however, said the changes will hamper his ability to find a buyer for his home, noting that the church has not shown interest in the purchase, either.

"The church is wanting to turn my home into the parking lot ...," Mr. Klenk told the five-member panel and the city's building director Mike Walker, adding that he's trying to sell his home.

"I'm seeing my value plummet," he said.

Mr. Burnham assured the board that drainage would not be a problem for two reasons. First, he said, drainage ditches will be installed to help water drain off the parking lot without impacting neighboring parcels.

"It's very sandy and we're engineering swales in there with a slow drain," said Mr. Burnham.

Secondly, by moving one home to another location and demolishing a second residence re-

portedly infested with termites, the church reduced the amount of impervious surface, which should help the soil drain better, he said.

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Shoplifter resisted arrest

County deputies arrested two Jacksonville residents in separate incidents of shoplifting at the Macclenny Walmart the past week, both of them after attempting to leave the store with merchandise in excess of \$100.

A store security employee observed Chavei Patterson, 18, move about various departments placing jewelry and clothing into a large purse in the late morning of October 9.

The inventory that included T-shirts, shorts, earrings and other items came to \$125, according to Deputy Trey McCullough. He also charged Ms. Patterson with resisting arrest without violence, noting that she jerked away several times while being handcuffed and protested loudly.

Cody Wooten, 21, was arrested the afternoon of October 13 after he was spotted concealing a turkey sandwich in his satchel before attempting to leave the store.

Arrest for posing as cop

A Sanderson man faces multiple criminal charges including posing as an off-duty policeman when he tailgated then stopped a southbound motorist on CR 125 twice the morning of October 8.

Jonathan Harris, 34, was arrested later that afternoon when a county deputy learned via a tip by the suspect's father that he was going door to door on Eddy Grade in the north county seeking to enter residences.

Just after 11 o'clock that morning, Ralyn Hughes, 22, reported to Deputy Chris Walker that Mr. Harris began tailgating her in his 2004 Chevrolet pickup shortly after she left a relative's address on Thammie Harvey Rd. At one point on CR 125, Ms. Hughes recounted that the pickup passed her and blocked the roadway as the suspect exited and asked her what she was doing and whether she was "okay."

She drove around the pickup and continued south to near Odiss Yarborough Rd. where Ms. Hughes said the suspect forced her off the road onto a driveway, identified himself as a police officer and told her she had to exit her vehicle.

She once again drove off and said Mr. Harris pulled up to her in the northbound lane and again attempted to run her off into a ditch. She followed another vehicle closely to keep the pickup from doing so again, and reported that Mr. Harris headed west on US 90 when he reached Glen St. Mary.

Deputy Walker interviewed Ms. Hughes at her place of employment shortly after and she identified Mr. Harris from a driver license photo on file with the state. The deputy, who said he is acquainted with the suspect, was initially unable to locate him until the tip from his father.

Deputy Walker said Mr. Harris resisted being handcuffed and the two struggled on Eddy Grade before the officer's canine Blitz was released and attacked the suspect, who then attempted to choke the dog before being bitten several times and surrendering.

A rescue crew treated his dog bites at the scene before Mr. Harris was booked at county jail for aggravated assault with a weapon, false imprisonment, resisting with violence, impersonating an officer and harming the canine.

In other incidents the past week, a criminal complaint was made naming Henry Williams, 21, of Macclenny for attacks on his sister Georgina Keaton, 33, and her 8-year-old daughter at a residence on George Taber Blvd. in Glen about noon on October 12.

Ms. Keaton told Deputy Matt Riegel she went to the home of her grandmother and was confronted by Mr. Williams about an earlier ban from her residence because of drug use.

He allegedly grabbed her by the hair and pushed her to the ground, then injured the daughter when he attempted to strike his sister with a stick.

Deputy Riegel noted the girl had swelling over her right eye and she was checked at the scene by rescue. Mr. Williams fled before police arrived after Clayton Neely, 39, who lives at the address, pulled him off Ms. Keaton.

• Nicole Shaw, 33, of Macclenny was arrested for felony battery on emergency room physician Patricia White at Fraser Hospital in the early morning of October 13.

Deputy Clements Leo said Ms. Shaw became combative after she was taken to the hospital from Mac's Liquors about 2:35 for alleged seizures. Officers and staff managed to calm her, but she then kicked Dr. White in the chest shortly after.

• Deputy Leo said he filed complaints against two alleged assailants following a fight during which shots were fired near Rock Ct. and MLK Dr. in west Macclenny the evening of October 8.

Richard Johnson, 28, was charged with domestic battery on Mindy Johnson, 27, who Deputy Koty Crews noted had scratches on her leg and elbow from the confrontation that began when she attempted to leave the residence.

Ms. Johnson initially said she tripped and her husband fell atop her, a version of events that conflicted with what Deputy Chad Montean saw when he arrived at the address.

The deputy said Ms. Johnson "was struggling and yelling for help" and he had to threaten the husband with a taser shot to get him off of her.

The son, one of two children present during the incident, told Deputy Crews he made the call for help because "his dad was wrong and he wanted him to stop."

Must be trained in fertilizing

As of January 1, 2014, anyone who applies fertilizer commercially will need training and a license to do so legally. This means that no matter what type of fertilizer is used (granular fertilizer, weed-n-feed mixtures, manure-based fertilizer, etc.) or whether you pay a friend or a landscape maintenance company, anyone paid to apply fertilizers to lawns and landscapes must have the license.

The primary reason for the license is to educate people about proper fertilizer use and protecting our water resources.

Had crack, pipe in his pickup

A Taylor man with a history of drug-related arrests was charged on October 11 with felony possession of crack cocaine and a smoking pipe following an early morning traffic stop in Glen St. Mary.

Steven Wisneski, 49, was driving a 2000 Chevrolet pickup north on SR 125 just before 1 am when Deputy Daryl Mobley noticed the vehicle had no tag light. He stopped the pickup after pacing it at 45 mph in the 25 mph zone, and observed Mr. Wisneski to have "extremely bloodshot and watery eyes."

The officer also noted "small pieces of copper material" on the driver's legs and a box of scouring pads on the vehicle floorboard. The pads made of either steel or copper are commonly used to retain vapors of smoked crack cocaine.

Deputy Mobley said he also spotted a smoking pipe that Mr. Wisneski attempted to conceal

between front seats. The driver then admitted to having crack stored in a cigarette box in the driver's side door. He claimed a friend gave him the drugs, and that he had smoked crack several hours earlier.

Mr. Wisneski was booked at county jail on the possession counts and given tickets for speeding and having no proof of insurance. He was warned about the faulty equipment.

Court records show the suspect has an arrest record dating back to the late 1990s for offenses ranging from cocaine possession to aggravating fleeing. Convictions resulted in jail time and probation.

The BCHS cross country team traveled to Middleburg to compete in the Bronco Bob Cross Country Meet and the team's fourth meet of the season on October 12.

The runners will try to improve their times once again when the team travels to compete in the Amelia Island Invitational October 19.

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Wildcats pluck the Paxon Eagles 46-7 Cap off homecoming week

The BCHS Wildcat varsity football team capped off homecoming week with a dominant 46-7 victory over the visiting Paxon Golden Eagles (1-5, 1-3) to move to 3-1 in District 3-5A and 6-2 overall.

B'cats smother Tigers

The BCMS Bobcats remained undefeated with an exciting 74-36 win over Richardson at Memorial Stadium October 8 to improve to 3-0 in the Florida Crown Conference and 6-0 overall.

The Bobcats were hot throughout the game on the cool night and scored on all but one of its 10 offensive possessions, while also adding a special teams score.

"We scored so many touchdowns I can't remember who scored them all," Coach Rock Rhoden said. "I've never had a team score that many points. It was unbelievable."

The Bobcats stormed out to a 22-0 lead at the end of the first quarter. The scoring started early as Christian Watkins scored the first of his two touchdowns on a 65-yard run on the third play of the game.

Three plays later, Curtis Harmon hauled in an incredible one-handed interception that would have been returned for a touchdown but the ball was brought back to the 13 yard line after a penalty. It didn't matter, though, as Harmon ran the ball in for the score on the next play.

The defense forced its second turnover in as many drives when Dale Gene Hodges recovered a fumble and returned it to Richardson's 21 yard line. The offense didn't move the ball as easily on their third drive and they faced a fourth-and-one. The coaches decided to go for it, and the decision paid off: David Smith found the end zone on an 11-yard score on the fourth-down play.

The Bobcats would continue to add to their lead in the opening minutes of the second quarter, but Richardson's offense began finding its rhythm, too. Watkins scored his second touchdown of the night on a 28-yard pass down the sideline to extend the team's lead to 28-0.

The Tigers answered right back with a 52-yard touchdown run 31 seconds later. Baker County's offense responded less than a minute later with a 2-yard scoring run by Savoy Jefferson.

A cold drizzle began falling on Memorial Stadium as Richardson marched 60 yards on an eight-play drive that was capped off by a 17-yard touchdown pass to close the gap to 36-16 with 2:38 remaining in the first half.

Baker County committed what could have been a crucial turnover on its next possession when Brian West lost a fumble. The Tigers weren't able to capitalize on the turnover, which could have made it a two-possession game before the half. Instead, the Bobcats held a 36-16 lead at intermission.

The home team wasn't in the clear just yet as Richardson got the ball to start the second half. The Bobcats defense forced a turnover on downs, and Smith's 8-yard touchdown run three plays later all but sealed the game for the Bobcats.

Richardson's offense wouldn't go down quietly, however, as they drove 50-yards to get the ball to the 1-yard line. The Bobcats' defense held strong and

didn't allow the Tigers to punch the ball in for the score, forcing a turnover on downs.

Harmon would gash Richardson's defense on a 97-yard touchdown run on the Bobcats' first play of their next possession.

The two teams would then trade scores for most of the remainder of the game.

The Tigers answered back with a 73-yard touchdown run as time expired in the third quarter to close the lead to 50-23.

The Bobcats kept up the high scoring pace in the fourth quarter despite many of the backup players seeing action.

"We were rotating kids in and out," Coach Rhoden said. "That says a lot about my seventh graders."

The fourth quarter started with three touchdowns in the opening 90 seconds. Jefferson found the end zone once again on a 36-yard run on the second play of the quarter.

Richardson scored two plays later on a 55-yard touchdown pass. Harmon returned the following kickoff for a touchdown to end the scoring spree and give the Bobcats a 62-30 lead.

The Bobcat defense allowed its final touchdown of the night on a 20-yard run. The offense bounced back on its first play of their next drive with a 54-yard scoring run by Josh Haygood.

The defense forced its third turnover of the game when Noah Carter picked off a pass. He would take advantage of his interception two plays later with a 45-yard touchdown pass to Jaquez Jackson to close out the scoring and give the Bobcats a

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
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
