SUV crashes during heavy storm

A Macclenny woman was critically injured the early evening of May 25 when the vehicle she was riding in west of Sanderson went out of control during a heavy thunderstorm on US 90 and collided with a tree.

The Florida Highway Patrol said a 2004 Ford Expedition driven by Shomari Wilcox, 27, of Macclenny was eastbound shortly after 6 pm, and crossed over into the opposite lane west of Interstate 10 through the north shoulder. It was rotating when it struck a tree, according to Trooper J. Beagle, ejecting 8-year-old Shamariana

Wilcox of Macclenny.

Passenger Tiffany Ann Doss, 23, was taken to UF Health Jacksonville (Shands). The driver was taken to Shands at Lake City, as were the ejected child and passenger Danial Thomas, 26, of Glen St. Mary.

Four other children ages 1 through 6 were released to family members. All occupants were restrained by seat belts. A severe weather front was moving through the area at the time with drenching rain, lightning and some hail, mostly along a corridor south of I-10.

In an accident earlier that day, Frank-

lin Taylor, 81, of Sanderson was seriously injured when his 1999 Chevrolet station wagon overturned on CR 125 after going out of control as he evaded a deer.

Mr. Taylor was southbound near the intersection with CR 127 at Cuyler just before 10 am. Trooper M.C. Childress said the vehicle veered onto the northbound shoulder then rotated clockwise back across the road onto the southbound shoulder before overturning.

The driver was not wearing a seat belt and was flown to UF Health Jacksonville.

Glen native is 'giving back' in Third World

On '60 Minutes' segment

Had you watched the fabled Sunday evening news magazine *60 Minutes* on CBS earlier this month, you likely caught the segment on a Sudanese clinic that does corrective heart operations on African children suffering from rheumatic diseases.

A portion of the broadcast was filmed in an operating room as an Italian surgeon repaired the heart of an 11-year-old African girl whose life-expectancy without the operation was dismally short.

The person in scrubs with mostly his back to the camera running the heart-lung machine was Kyle Hunter, a native of Glen St. Mary now living in Los Angeles. The segment was filmed last year during one of Mr. Hunter's frequent volunteer mercy missions to backwater and largely forgotten parts of the world.

Though the portion didn't make it into the broadcast the evening of May 11, Mr. Hunter was interviewed by correspondent Clarissa Ward, and the 37-year-old graduate of both Baker County High School and the University of Florida explained his duties as a perfusionist, a highly-trained specialist who monitors a machine that keeps blood circulating and a patient breathing during heart bypass operations.

The son of Ann and Tommy Hunter, Kyle Hunter's passion

for using his skills in Third World settings has taken him to far-flung clinics and hospitals in Africa and South America. He will soon take temporary leave of his free-lance job with a large California-based HMO health group and head off to the troubled Ukraine

After that, he'll be plying his trade in Brazil, then possibly Burma and India.

“When I started doing this I'd use vacation time, but with my job arrangement now I can basically work for six weeks or so and going off

for two weeks,” notes Mr. Hunter, who has been living in California 13 years and other locales out West since graduating from UF with a degree in biology.

In all those years of training, he's seen his share of prima donna heart surgeons operating in a pressure-filled world of modern medicine.

Mercy missions in Sudan and Peru are different.

“You're not dealing with a lot of egos then, you're dealing with a cause,” he explains.

The juxtaposition of having a home base in “glitzy” California while traipsing off to the Third World several times a year isn't lost on Kyle Hunter.

“It's been a real spiritual awakening for me over the years,” he admits. “It gives you perspective; you're born to do the most good for the most people. I choose this type of work so I'll be more fulfilled.”

“You learn the next new

City tightening up on night park activities

There are no fences with locked gates to keep people out of Macclenny's Memorial Park at night and no plans to implement such tight security.

But city officials are taking steps to discourage late-night visitors from hanging out at the park under cloak of darkness to drink, smoke marijuana and vandalize public property.

They're pinning their hopes on new signs stating specific opening and closing hours of the park. The exact times haven't been determined yet, but they will be from early morning to early evening.

“Right now, the sheriff's office doesn't have the authority to tell anyone to leave because it's a 24-hour park,” said City Manager Phil Rhoden.

Efforts to crack down on un-

desirable behavior at Memorial Park, centrally located between Eighth Street and West Boulevard, have had some success, including stepped-up patrols by deputies, Mr. Rhoden said.

However, vandalism continues to be a problem and some families are reluctant to take their children there because of the presence of unruly youths who sit or lie down on picnic benches smoking, uttering profanities and sometimes refusing to leave when parents and their

kids arrive for picnics, he said. “Families feel threatened to go up there,” Mr. Rhoden told the mayor and city commissioners at a board meeting on May 13 when the sign proposal was discussed.

In a subsequent interview on May 22, the city manager said it is time the city took additional steps to put a stop to illegal, disruptive or other “undesirable” behaviors in the park, particularly at night.

“We're at the point where we

need to go beyond what we have been doing,” Mr. Rhoden said, acknowledging that trying to keep people out of a public park is not easy if they're not clearly breaking any laws.

After discussing the issue at the May 13 board meeting, city commissioners gave the city manager and his staff authority to designate park hours and the wording to be displayed on the signs, which were suggested by the sheriff's office.

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

toy doesn't make you happy, so you try to start being generous and you find life in it as opposed to just consuming things."

Life in places like Khartoum in the Sudan where the 60 Minutes segment was filmed is fairly regimented with 16-20-hour work days not uncommon. The Italian-based relief agency Emergency that staffs the clinics makes sure its volunteers are well cared-for in dormitories, hotels or hostels, with as many creature comforts as feasible.

"They know we have to rest, we have to have safe food and a safe environment to keep functioning, so we're pretty well taken care of," says Mr. Hunter. "Over the years, it's also allowed me to develop a lot of colleagues internationally, people I would never been able to come across."

Kyle Hunter tries to make it back to his parents in Cuyler twice a year or so (he is with them this week) and stays in touch with friends in Baker County via Facebook and other social media.

But his life has shifted away from northeast Florida, with a friend base centered in Arizona and California, and places far beyond that many people would have trouble finding on a map.

He has a skill that serves him well in California, and for which there is a pressing need, literally world-wide. He's positioned himself in the best of two divergent worlds — one with an enviable standard of living and the other that keeps him focused on what really matters.

FCAT SCORES

Mixed bag on 3rd-8th grade results

Baker County's third graders and eighth graders outperformed the state as a whole on recent FCAT 2.0 testing, the final administration of the test before a new assessment is rolled out next year.

Some 67 percent of third graders here passed the math FCAT and 64 percent passed the reading portion, compared to 58 percent and 57 percent in Florida, respectively, according to results released last week by the Florida Department of Education.

More specifically, 62 percent of the third graders at Macclenny Elementary and 73 percent at Westside Elementary passed the math test, which means they scored a 3 or higher on the assessment's 6-point scale.

That equates to a 3-point year-to-year drop for Macclenny in math while Westside pushed its passing rate up 2 percentage points in math. The latter school's math results show the same year-to-year gains, but Macclenny's passing

rate in math fell by 11 points. Both elementary schools had the same share of students pass the reading test this year — 64 percent — but that's a 2-point jump for Westside and a 3-point slide for Macclenny.

The state also released the outcomes from FCAT writing tests taken by fourth, eighth and 10th graders last February.

The middle school shined brightest in writing with 60 percent of eighth graders passing with a score of 3.5 on the 6-point scale. The passing score was upped from 3 beginning in 2013.

The middle school's performance represents a big improvement, up 19 percentage points from a year ago. The high school's 10th graders, however, went from 65 percent passing the writing exam last year to 55 percent this year.

Across Florida, 64 percent of 10 graders passed.

Keller Intermediate's fourth graders also made progress with 44 percent passing the writing assessment compared to 41 percent last year, and 53 percent statewide this year, which was a drop of 4 percent-

age points. BCHS Principal Tom Hill offered some additional context to this year's results by e-mail. He compared his school to other high schools in the state, rather than stacking BCHS against itself in years past.

He said 1 percent of the students here got perfect writing scores of 6, while only 36 of the state's 595 high schools, or about 5 percent, had a higher share of perfect scores.

Only 9 percent of the high schools statewide had higher percentages of 5.5 scores than BCHS. To get a 5.5, one of the two test reviewers must score the writing test a 6.

Mr. Hill added that only 24 percent of schools in the state had a higher share of 5 scores than his 10th graders.

Looking at 5 and 4.5 scores, Mr. Hill argues BCHS is still ahead of most of Florida's secondary schools. Only 24 percent of the high schools had a higher share of 5 scores. Forty-three percent had a higher share of 4.5 scores.

He also said a new writing program is planned for the 2014-15 school year.

"All teachers at the high school will receive training during pre-planning in August," he said. "The campus-wide effort will help the staff prepare our students to meet the expectations of the new Florida standards."

Mr. Hill was alluding to the new assessment — the Florida Standards in English Language and Mathematics — that will replace the three FCAT 2.0 tests in reading, math and writing with one comprehensive testing instrument.

"While the FCAT Writes assessment sunsets this year, the ability to write effectively is absolutely essential. BCHS will continue to work purposefully to prepare our students for their future success," said Mr. Hill.

E-mails seeking comments on the latest FCAT scores from principals at BCMS, Keller, Macclenny and Westside were not returned by press time. The district's Susan Voorhees, the director of accountability and special programs, however, said the district was proud of the gains students made this year.

Local jobless rate still decreases

The jobless rate in Baker County hit its lowest level since early 2008 last month, falling from 5.6 percent in March to 4.8 percent in April, according to a preliminary employment report from the state released in mid-May.

Unemployment fell statewide and nationally in April as well, to 5.7 percent in Florida and 5.9 percent in the U.S.

University of North Florida economics professor Paul Mason attributes the job gains to a stronger housing market and shrinking labor force, according to a recent report from *The Financial News and Daily Record* in downtown Jacksonville.

Those not actively seeking work, who may still want a job, are not included in the workforce for the purposes of calculating unemployment.

Looking at the Baker County data from the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity, which compiles labor market statistics for the U.S. Department of Labor, the size of the labor force here, 12,505, is down from March by 41 workers, but it's up 276 workers from a year ago.

The estimated number of workers with jobs has steadily climbed from 11,410 in April, 2013 to 11,847 in March, 2014 and then to 11,899 last month.

Meanwhile, the number of unemployed has declined from 819 in April of last year to 699 last month, and then to 606 in April.

Assistant City Manager Roger Yarborough said the proposed signs will make it easier for deputies to "run people out of the park" at night because then they will actually be trespassing.

Mr. Rhoden said last week that the closing time probably will be around 9 pm during the six months of daylight saving time and about 7 pm the other six months of the year.

The park, also known simply as "City Park," has always attracted visitors to the duck pond on the grounds. But it became even more popular after it was upgraded a few years ago with a state recreation grant to install playground equipment, large picnic pavilions, a lighted 1/2-mile walking track and a public restroom.

Since then, vandals have damaged or destroyed most of the wooden picnic tables and repeatedly damaged playground equipment and toilets and sinks in the restroom. Mr. Rhoden said graffiti also has been spray painted on the picnic pavilions.

Most people, however, obey signs listing the following prohibitions in the park: No skate-

boarding, fishing (except for children under 12 and disabled or senior citizens), swimming, unleashed dogs or alcoholic beverages.

The people who seem to snub their nose at city rules and laws leave evidence of their presence on the ground for cleanup crews to remove in the mornings in the form of empty beer cans and bottles, as well as cigarette butts and other litter.

The vandalism and other unlawful conduct have continued despite another sign still attached to a fence in front of the restroom, which states: "Warning! Video Surveillance in Use



on These Premises."

But the sign was a ruse, a failed attempt to thwart mischievousness or illegal behavior.

"Those were fake cameras," Mr. Rhoden said, adding that he didn't know what happened to them.

If the city buys real video surveillance equipment, which has been under consideration for several months, the cameras will have to be cleverly disguised or well concealed, the city manager said.

"We wouldn't want anybody shooting at them with BB guns," he said.

After reading *The Baker County Press* and *The Florida Times-Union* that a recreation advisory board has been proposed for Baker County, I would like to state that the re-establishment of this board would be a very good step. We had such a board during the time that I served as recreation director.

With over 35 years in the field of recreation and parks, serving on several advisory boards, I would like to make the following suggestions on some ideas on how the make-up should look. These are not all of my ideas, but observations on how other recreation boards are composed:

✓ All members should be residents of Baker County and there should be a representative from each commissioner district, who is not a "league person" or representative of any league or sport. Their main interest should be the best aspects of recreation and parks, not only in their community but in the county as a whole.

✓ The board should have one representative from each sport that currently exists in the county. More can be added as needed. The person should be elected by each organization.

✓ Both the county manager and recreation director serve as ex-officios, but have no voting power.

✓ Members should be aware there is more to recreation than baseball, softball, soccer, youth football and any other current programs, with the vision to develop a master recreation plan and policies for the county.

✓ The board should work hand in hand with other boards and the commissioners. Use some of the "bed tax" monies to promote recreation and sports outside of the county to bring more money into Baker County for these events (this can be done).

✓ This board should work with state legislators to obtain funds through "turkeys" and also to support the continued funding of the Florida Recreation Development Assistance Program. Funds have been scarce for the past few years, but there are programs that will be funded through the program this year.

The Florida Recreation and Parks Association, of which I am a member, adopted the slogan "It Starts in Parks" and imagine what could start here in parks in Baker County by having an advisory board that cares. But if this board is overloaded with coaches, league parents and those who only support the activities they or their children are involved in, it will fail.

I hope my suggestions are helpful.

Mulls shortening liens for SHIP

An updated local housing assistance plan was approved by the Baker County Commission last week to meet a May 23 deadline to secure \$350,000 in state funds to build modest houses or repair existing dwellings for low income, elderly and disabled clients.

The plan is renewed every three years to provide guidelines for administering the State Housing Initiative Partnership, or SHIP, program funded by documentary stamp taxes paid on real estate transactions.

SHIP grants function as deferred loans in which the balance decreases yearly until it reaches zero after 15 or 20 years, depending upon the type of loan. For purchase assistance and renovation of existing dwellings the term is 15 years and for new home construction it is 20 years.

The loan amount depreciates 6.66 percent per year on 15-year plans and 5 percent on 20-year plans, which require liens on the property for the length of the contract. Applicants who live in their SHIP home for the duration of the loan term owe nothing.

Repayment of the loan is required only if the homeowner sells or transfers ownership of the home, ceases to use the home as their primary residence, or fails to maintain the property in accordance with county zoning code standards within the lien period.

One part of the plan that created some concern and debate about whether it should be amended is a section dealing with the death of an applicant well within the 20-year lien period on a SHIP home that was built new.

The plan states that if the applicant dies prematurely all heirs and successors will be held to the same rules and regulations as the applicant. It further states that the property may be sold, but if so "the lien shall be fully satisfied unless the new owner qualifies under the eligibility of the program."

In other words, said County Attorney Rich Komando, the loan "gets paid back at full amount," not a depreciated value.

Commission Chairman Jimmy Anderson said he felt a 10-year lien would be more reasonable because families who inherit a SHIP house after their parent dies would not be hit with such a large debt.

Most applicants for SHIP houses, he said, are quite elderly and, realistically, likely will die before the 20-year lien ends. If one passed away after only a few years it would leave heirs owing a lot of money.

"My concern is putting the burden onto

other family members," Mr. Anderson said. "The contract is with the applicant, not their family."

Other commissioners agreed last week and said they might be agreeable to amending the plan to cut the deferred payment loan period from 20 to 10 years and increasing the annual depreciation to 10 percent.

However, after having a week to think about it and discuss it with other people, Mr. Anderson said on May 27 that he wasn't so sure that heirs would have to pay 100 percent of the original loan amount.

He said he thinks the housing assistance plan could be interpreted to mean that they would simply have to pay the remaining balance after deducting the 5 percent annual depreciation factor, which would reduce the

debt burden.

Mr. Anderson said he intended to discuss the matter with County Manager C.J. Thompson and the county attorney on May 28.

In other business during the May 20 board meeting commissioners:

- Added six transportation improvement projects totaling nearly \$19 million to a "wish list" that the county hopes will be funded by the Florida Department of Transportation in the next few years. The projects — which include engineering, surveying, permitting and construction — are:

1. CR 127 North: Resurface 11.3 miles beginning at CR 127 and ending at Moccasin Creek Circle for an estimated cost of \$1.8 million.

2. CR 139B: Resurface 1.51 miles beginning at CR 125 and ending at US 90. Estimated cost is \$390,000.

3. Turner Cemetery Road: Pave 4.7 miles of unpaved road, beginning at CR 125 and ending at CR 127. Estimated cost: \$2.7 million.

4. Bill Davis Road: Pave two miles of unpaved road beginning at CR 130 and ending at Reid Stafford Road. Estimated cost:

\$900,000.

5. Midpoint Parkway (Macclenny truck by-pass route): The project consists of a road connecting SR 121, SR 228 and SR 10 (US 90). Approximate length is 4.1 miles at an estimated cost of \$12.9 million.

6. SR 228: The project consists of adding two lanes, sidewalks, curb and gutters for .9 mile at an estimated cost of \$3.9 million. This is in conjunction with the City of Macclenny's proposed Enterprise Corridor designed to attract commercial development between I-10 and Lowder Street.

- Awarded a \$4,250 contract to Dependable Heating A/C, a Macclenny contractor, for the replacement of an air conditioning unit at the public library. Dependable submitted the lowest of three bids for installing a 5-ton heat pump system, including auxiliary heat strips.

- Approved an application submitted by Mary and Thomas Going for a special zoning exception to subdivide a 7-acre parcel into three separate "family lots" in the Cedar Creek Farms subdivision north of Glen St. Mary. The request was granted after a public hearing at 6 pm.

The Goings told commissioners they wanted to give some of their property to their son and daughter, who already lives in a mobile home at the south end of the parcel with her husband and children.

The request was denied by the county's Land Planning Agency after learning that fire and emergency rescue services officials objected to it because of impassable roads during heavy rains in Cedar Creek Farms.

"Their property is not in a flood zone but you have to pass through a flood zone on the county road to get to their home," County Planner Ed Preston told commissioners.

The Goings showed the commission family photographs, including their grandchildren, and said they all wanted to live together on the same piece of land, which they have owned since 1981.

"We're here to plead for a special exception," Mrs. Going said. "This is for my family. We just want three individual pieces of land. Our daughter and son-in-law and grandchildren will live on one end, our son will live in the middle."

She said they have never had to call the fire department or rescue for assistance and if a hurricane were approaching "we plan to stay elsewhere."

The board, which previously have supported other requests for family lots, unanimously approved the special exception.

Probation violator gets 18-month term

A convicted felon from Glen St. Mary was sentenced to an 18-month prison term on May 20 after admitting he violated several provisions of his probation sentence for having

and firing a gun and felony driving with a suspended license.

Circuit Judge Mark Moseley imposed the sentence on Frank

Levi Pipkins, 34, during regular court session. He had been on probation since July of last year, and court records indicate he was arrested for possession of cocaine and hydro-

morphine in February.

His probation officer said Mr. Pipkins also lied to him, failed to make an appointment and moved without notification. He was arrested in April while out on bond for shoplifting the previous month.

In the only other sentencing that day, the judge ordered Richard Salazar, 31, of Jacksonville onto a three-year probation for aggravated assault with a deadly weapon.

The defendant was charged with driving his vehicle into the path of his estranged girlfriend in a service station parking lot near Sanderson back in March. The confrontation took place during an argument as they met to exchange a child.

Mr. Salazar must also take anger management and parenting classes.

Opposes allowing extra unit on acre

The Baker County Land Planning Agency has recommended denial of an application to divide a one-acre lot in half to accommodate two rental mobile homes at the northwest corner of Mud Lake Road and CR 125.

The final decision will be made by the county commission at a public hearing at 6 pm on June 17. But the proposal will come with a 3-1 vote by LPA members to reject the property owner's request.

The planning and zoning advisory board members who voted against the proposal agreed that it could set a precedent for increasing the density in a neighborhood dominated by single-family residential lots several acres in size.

"If we approve this, it would be more dense than any of the properties around it?" board member John Adams asked County Planner Ed Preston.

"That is correct," Mr. Preston replied.

After 30 minutes or so debating the pros and cons in a public hearing, the board concluded that the request to double the density on the lot could be detrimental to the rural-residential character of the surrounding neighborhood.

"We would be setting a precedent for 1/2-acre lots in that area all along Mud Lake Road. We would be opening the door for that," Mr. Adams said.

Glen Patten, who was elected to lead the LPA as its next chairman, agreed and recommended the request be denied. Mr. Adams seconded the motion and the third member to join them, Joseph DeFee, said he shared "the same concerns."

The dissenting vote was cast by Phillip Zamarron in his final official act as board chairman. He said he did not think the proposal would harm the neighbor-

hood because of its location at a busy street corner.

"You would logically expect to see a higher density at intersections," Mr. Zamarron said.

The application to increase the density on the lot and zone it for two mobile homes was recommended for approval by the county's planning department. The development review committee, which includes the fire and emergency rescue services departments and the sheriff's office, also had no objections.

Mr. Preston noted that properties north of Mud Lake Road are in the urban growth area designated in the county's long-range comprehensive plan as the area where most residential development is anticipated in the coming years.

Nonetheless, the testimony of three other homeowners — all of whom live on the south side of Mud Lake Road — helped convince the majority that the application to change the land use and zoning on the subject parcel should be denied.

One of those neighbors was Loraine Overland, who lives with her husband and two children at 7426 Mud Lake Rd. near the southeast corner of the intersection.

She said they bought their 2.5-acre lot because they wanted to live and raise their children in a low density neighborhood with large yards.

She said she has nothing against mobile homes but noted that "houses appreciate in value and mobile homes do not."

Danny Burger, who lives about three houses down at 7316 Mud Lake Rd., also spoke against the proposal because it would increase density.

"There's 550 acres across the street (former Blair Nursery property on the north side of Mud Lake Road between SR 121 and CR 125)," Mr. Burger said. "Are they going to be allowed to put 1/2-acre lots over there?"

Shelly Weichselbaum, a retired Miami police officer whose home at 7610 Mud Lake Rd. is surrounded by 5.5 acres, said that as a former law enforcement officer she knows that "with more density come more (crime) problems."

To grant the request, she said, would "not be fair" to others who chose the neighborhood because of its rural, quiet nature with large yards. She said the applicants had done "a beautiful job" cleaning up the site but said it should remain one acre.

The applicants, Jacqueline and David Robinson, removed a substandard old house and numerous trees and thick brush from the lot and placed a double-wide mobile home on it earlier this year facing CR 125. The back portion of the lot where she wanted to put a second mobile home is connected by a driveway to Mud Lake Road.

Mrs. Robinson told the LPA board that they also planned to erect a privacy fence around the property but the cost to clear the lot was so expensive they needed to add a second rental unit to justify the cost.

"I don't think anything we want to do is going to impact anybody," she said. "We made improvements to the lot. One additional dwelling would not increase the traffic that's already there."

She said she and her husband own several rental properties in the area, including some across the street or next door to their home on Mud Lake Road, and said they were "not trying to impact housing values."

Earlier in the meeting Mr. Preston told the board that he will be meeting with the county manager and county attorney on May 28 to prepare a schedule for the gradual adoption of revised land development regulations, which have been delayed for a year.

The adoption process, Mr.

Preston said, will begin with the simplest and least controversial provisions and end with the more complex, controversial issues, such as mining.

The LPA board sent a request to the county commission last month requesting prompt attention to the pending LDRs.

Next up was Kathy Sibley, a volunteer at Westside Elementary, and Genevieve Lucas, who helps out a Keller Intermediate.

Brandi Volz was touted for her work at the middle school running errands, organizing events and serving pre-game meals to student athletes. High school volunteer Trinity Rivest was honored for her volunteer service with the school's band program.

Mrs. Raulerson also recognized each school for their efforts to support volunteering at their campuses.

She said this year 445 people supplied 535 hours of volunteer time at the PreK-Kindergarten Center, 483 people gave 3383 hours to Macclenny Elementary, 433 people spent 4969 hours at Westside Elementary, 465 volunteers logged 3137 hours for Keller Intermediate, 72 volunteers counted 2795 hours at the middle school and 846 people amassed a whop-

ping 7466 hours at the high school.

The volunteer recognitions were preceded by a similar ceremony for the Baker County Extensions Services' activities with area school children.

The office is a partnership between the county, the University of Florida's Institute of Food & Agriculture Sciences and the USDA that assists local

farmers, consumers and youth via various programs.

The county extension director Mike Davis, its 4-H agent Shaina Bennett and its horticulture agent Alicia Lamborn were all recognized for their contributions to the county's schools.

Mr. Davis has been a guest reader in the elementary schools and served on the high school's Career and Adult Education Advisory Council. Ms. Bennett was feted for her work with the 4-H embryology project, which teaches children about the life cycle of chickens, from birth to hatching. She also teaches healthy eating habits to kids in school.

Ms. Lamborn, who was absent from the meeting because she recently had a baby, has planted, with student assistance, 51 trees at four schools since 2008. She's also led hydroponic gardening and raised bed gardening demonstrations.

"It's wonderful what you do for the kids of this community," Mrs. Raulerson said to Mr. Davis and Ms. Bennett.

Mr. Davis then thanked all the parents and children who've participated the extension services' programs.

Two monetary donations to the school district were announced at the opening of the

roughly hour-and-40-minute gathering. AT&T representative Heather Duncan was on hand to give \$2000 of her company's funds to match the district's investment in a hydroponic gardening project at Macclenny Elementary. An anonymous donation to the Baker County Education Foundation for the Positive Behavioral System, which rewards students for good behavior, was announced as well.

The biggest chunk of the meeting, however, was individually recognizing the honor roll students in the Macclenny area in grades one through five.

In the final seven minutes of the meeting, the school board approved unanimously the following measures:

- Raises for the high school's two Air Force JROTC instructors, Master Sergeant Liz Law-Wallace and Major Joseph Chiofalo, as required by the minimum salaries set by the Department of Defense.

The major's salary will go from \$62,793 to \$63,088 while the master sergeant's will increase from \$40,865 to \$41,056.

- Two plan renewals for training programs from a regional educational consortium known as NEFEC for the required certifications to be athletic coaches and English teachers to non-native speakers in public schools.

The five-year plans has no major revisions.

- An agreement with St. Leo University binding the district to promote the college's post-secondary degree programs to district personnel in exchange for a 10 percent tuition discount for district employees seeking higher education there.

- An agreement with the Seminole County School District for Medicaid administrative claiming services for the coming year.

The next school board meeting is set for June 2 at the high school beginning at 6:30 p.m.

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Opens assisted living home

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In a three bedroom, two bath home on a quiet street in north Macclenny a few blocks from downtown sits the county's newest and only assisted living facility.

During the last year, Stephanie Morales and her husband Jeremy Howell have invested about \$100,000 in the business, including renovations to the residential property at 132 W. Stansell Ave.

The facility, equipped with a TV room, crafting and dining room, large backyard and kitchen, is the brainchild of Ms. Morales, who formerly worked for the state's Department of Elder Affairs as an ombudsman and advocate for nursing home residents.

Though small compared to many assisted living facilities (ALFs) statewide with just five beds, the Clair Winston House may expand in the future if demand proves high enough, the owner said.

Mrs. Morales is targeting customers who could benefit from living in an environment where non-medical assistance is available 24 hours a day, including transportation services to shopping, doctor's appointments and social activities.

She said the Clair Winston House, named after her grandfather, cannot accept residents who require 24-hour nursing care or who cannot walk.

The house also can't take Medicaid recipients just yet.

"I'm working on it," said Mrs. Morales.

The house itself, circa 1960, has hardwood and tile flooring and a well-landscaped front and rear yard. There's a small deck off the side of the home as well. The premises are monitored continuously by video surveillance.

It's just waiting for residents, said Mrs. Morales, who is actively seeking her first live-

in clients.

So far, she said, the house has drawn interest for its respite, or adult day care, services, which can give other caregivers, perhaps the children of aging seniors, a break from around-the-clock supervision of their elders, albeit temporary.

Mrs. Morales, a Glen St. Mary resident with her husband and their six children, moved back to Baker County in 2005 to help care for her aging grandfather, who died in 2010 at 91 years old.

She said he was a very social person, but was not fond of clinical environments like hospitals and nursing homes. She said he often complained of the loneliness he felt after he was diagnosed with a hormonal illness known as Addison's Disease.

"I was close to him but I didn't know about ALFs until he became sick," said Mrs. Morales. "We all felt getting him into one would have prolonged his life."

That combined with her professional background spurred her to open a Macclenny ALF named after her granddad.

Mrs. Morales holds a bachelor's degree in healthcare administration and an aging studies certification from the

University of Central Florida. She also spent 13 years as a respiratory therapist.

But to operate an ALF in Florida more training is required. Such facilities are regulated and licensed by the state's Agency for Healthcare Administration, or ACHA.

The agency requires licensees undergo 40 hours of instruction and pass an exam. They must also learn CPR and first aid, and pass another exam on food safety. In addition, Mrs. Morales had to pass a background check and the house had to clear fire and building code inspections.

"It was really hard actually," she said the red tape involved the endeavor.

The Clair Winston House's license number is 12451. ACHA periodically inspects licensed facilities and the results are available online through a search database at http://ahca.myflorida.com/Executive/Communications/public_records.shtml under the "Public Records Search" link.

ACHA's press secretary Sheshisha Coleman said the Clair Winston House is the only currently licensed ALF in Baker County. The county's only other ALF was the Countryside Retirement Home in Sandersen, which closed in 1998, she said.

Shoplifting at self-check in Walmart

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A Glen St. Mary woman was arrested for shoplifting on the afternoon of May 24 after she was caught stealing an iTouch case and a tank top from Walmart that were valued at \$26.

Dep. Yingling obtained video footage, a photo of the subject and a receipt of the stolen items for evidence and charges of grand theft are pending identification of the suspect.

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Had pills, syringes in purse

Police arrested a Jacksonville woman for drug and paraphernalia possession the evening of May 20 after she was involved in an altercation with an ex-husband at Woody's BBQ on South 6th St. in Macclenny.

Deputy Jacob Satterwhite said he requested permission to search the purse of Megan Hoffman, 28, after noticing she had what appeared to be needle marks on her hands. She then reportedly admitted she had been shooting heroin.

Inside the purse was a wooden box containing syringes, a spoon, steel wool, two glass pipes and a lighter. The officer also found a small container containing two pills for which Ms. Hoffman did not have a prescription. They were Xanax and Hydrochloride.

Police were called to the restaurant about 8 pm after the suspect argued with the ex-husband, who refused to call someone to give her a ride home. She dined there earlier accompanied by a friend, who then ejected her from a vehicle and left her stranded.

The pill possession charge is a felony, paraphernalia a misdemeanor.

In other drug-related arrests, a 17-year-old male student at Baker County High School was arrested for having marijuana in a deodorant container stored in his backpack.

Deputy Chris Walker and assistant principal John Staples questioned the boy earlier after a trace amount of pot was found on the floorboard of his 1999 Ford pickup parked near the school tennis courts the morning of May 20.

The county's K-9 Blitz alerted to the presence of the drug during a "free-air" sweep of the parking lot, an exercise conducted occasionally on the Glen St. Mary campus.

The student was given a verbal warning then because of the small amount, and Mr.

Staples called Deputy Walker back to the school about 11:30 when informed the student was boasting that he got away with having marijuana. It was then that the backpack was searched again.

• Deputy Clements Leo arrested Richard P. Hodges, 29, of Glen St. Mary after finding him walking in the travel lane

of CR 229 near Thomas Sweat Rd. about 11 pm on May 20.

During a routine search, the deputy found two small baggies of marijuana in the suspect's pants pocket, along with rolling papers.

Deputy Leo said he was on patrol when he saw vehicles swerve out of their travel lane to avoid hitting Mr. Hodges.

The deputy later interviewed Ms. Tillis, who he said had a strong odor of alcohol about her with slurred speech. She had been picked up by another officer walking in the neighborhood following the 1 am incident. She was arrested for domestic violence and the Department of Children and Families was notified because the child was present.

In a second case involving a boyfriend and girlfriend, Kristopher Jones, 33, was charged with domestic battery on Jovita Staley, 40, at her residence on Boyce Rd. south of Sanderson the afternoon of May 21.

Ms. Staley told Deputy Jeremiah Johnson her boyfriend became angry after she asked him to leave following an argument, and threw a part from a charcoal grill at her, striking her in the leg.

He left, but returned shortly after and forced himself

back into the residence, tossing a bicycle pump at her before Ms. Staley doused him with pepper spray.

Deputy Johnson interviewed Mr. Jones at his residence in the same neighborhood, and he denied throwing the objects, saying only that the girlfriend became angry and sprayed him.

He was arrested after Ms. Staley produced a voice mail message during which the boyfriend called her an obscene name and threatened her.

• Deputy Clements Leo arrested Gary Jordan Jr., 19, for attacking John Harrington, 27, the night of May 19 at the latter's residence in Little Dixie trailer park off CR 250 in the north county.

Mr. Harrington told the officer his assailant became angry after he refused to take Mr. Jordan's sister to the hospital because his vehicle was low on

gas. He accused Mr. Jordan of pulling him out of his residence, then striking him several times about the face.

The deputy noted a cut about Mr. Harrington's right eye and extensive swelling below the left eye consistent with the allegation.

Mr. Jordan, interviewed at his neighboring residence, smelled strongly of alcohol and admitted to drinking up to a dozen beers. He also conceded that he attacked the victim.

• The same deputy filed a criminal complaint earlier that evening naming a 17-year-old male for attacking a 16-year-old male in front of a residence on CR 127, striking him on the side of his face.

The victim said the confrontation was the result of a past feud. The complaint was filed after the combatants and two witnesses gave conflicting versions of events.

Passenger had crack cocaine

Barged in on wife, new boyfriend

Lacey Padgett, 42, may have pried open a door at a residence on Woodlawn Rd. about 7:40 that morning when he stormed into a bedroom where Heather Padgett, 37, and Troy Thornton, 44, were sleeping. They told Deputy Robert Simpkins the intruder cursed at them and threatened Mr. Thornton before spinning out of the front yard in his vehicle, spraying mud onto the boyfriend's 2007 Toyota.

Shortly after, it was discovered that the left front fender of the truck had been keyed, and the officer noted flaked paint residue suggested the vehicle had not been moved after it was damaged.

Interviewed later at county jail, Mr. Padgett initially claimed to be unaware his wife was in another relationship despite her claims that he had left threatening voice mail messages recently.

In another report involving a vehicle, police have a female suspect in the disappearance of a 2002 Chevrolet SUV from the parking lot of the Country Club Lounge on SR 121 in the early morning of May 23.

Amanda Hays told Deputy Jeremiah Johnson she left her keys either on the bar or outside on a sidewalk between 12:15-1:30 am and named the suspect who she claims had been harassing her that evening.

The deputy noted the car was recovered back at the lounge parking lot about 9 the following morning.



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Lauded for breastfeeding policies

The state hospital and the school district received some of the highest marks in a recent survey of breastfeeding policies among the county's largest employers by the Northeast Florida Healthy Start Coalition.

"Breastfeeding initiation and duration is an important contributor to reducing infant mortality. Having a proper workplace breastfeeding policy helps improve breastfeeding duration for working moms," said Jennifer Gornto, executive director of the coalition, which includes Baker County.

The survey was conducted on behalf of the Baker County Infant Mortality Task Force, which aims to prevent the death of babies before their first birthday, and began in January.

The task force hoped to discover what practices were already in place here related to new mothers breastfeeding in the workplace or pumping breast milk for feeding later.

Health experts say that breastfeeding is most important in the months immediately following birth, but the health benefits for both mothers and babies can continue to flow long after the babies turn one.

"The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends breastfeeding exclusively for six months and continuation of breastfeeding for one year or longer as mutually desired by mother and infant," said Sara Reiger, the coalition's special projects liaison.

She supplies staff support to the Infant Mortality Task Force and contacted local employers to inquire about their breastfeeding policies.

"The task force was formed to reduce infant mortality in Baker County," she explained. "Breastfeed babies are less likely to die from Sudden Infant Death Syndrome in addition to being sick less often. We are seeking opportunities to educate the community on the importance of breastfeeding and the benefits of workplace policies surrounding breastfeeding."

The task force and the health department are planning a presentation to Baker County Chamber of Commerce members in the near future to express the importance of having sound breastfeeding policies, and having them in writing.

So what makes for a good

breastfeeding policy?

Ms. Reiger says its providing a private, clean and comfortable area for new mothers to express milk, and sufficient break time to do it.

"Northeast Florida State Hospital and the Baker County School District have written policies that include these elements," she said.

The state hospital, with prior approval, also allows women to leave the facility to go to a child care location to breastfeed, or for the babies to be brought to the hospital for the same purpose, said Ms. Reiger.

The school district policy provides for "a private area free from intrusions" and "reasonable unpaid breaks for up to one year" for the purposes of breastfeeding.

Winn-Dixie also sets aside a dedicated area for breastfeeding or pumping during work breaks. Another large retailer, Walmart, directs mothers to dressing rooms for the activity on their lunch breaks.

Ed Fraser Hospital doesn't have a formal policy, but employees are given a private space and breaks for breastfeeding purposes upon request.

Under the Affordable Care Act of 2010, employers are required to have a place, other than a bathroom, for new mothers to breastfeed or pump and "reasonable" break time for doing so. Employers with fewer than 50 employees can seek an exemption to this provision of the law if complying with it creates a "undue hardship."

Florida, meanwhile, has made it legal for moms to breastfeed in public, and exempts the act from public indecency laws.

Neither state laws nor federal laws require employers to compensate mothers while they are breastfeeding or pumping.

"If an organization does not have a breastfeeding policy, that raises a red flag," Ms. Reiger said. "To appropriately support a breastfeeding mother, workplaces need to provide a written policy. Having women use a restroom or not providing her with a private place to express milk or not allowing her to express milk would be characteristics of a bad policy. Not having a workplace policy could also potentially deter women from initiating breastfeeding or continuing breastfeeding and that would limit the important benefits breastfeeding provides."

Health, the breastfeeding rate in Baker County in 2012, the latest year for which figures are available, was 71.8 percent. Statewide the rate was 81 percent.

Ms. Reiger said those figures are relatively high compared to the rate among clients of the Baker County WIC (Women, Infant and Children) program.

She said the WIC office in Macclenny reports just 13.6 percent of clients breastfeed at three months after birth and 17.8 percent after the six-month mark.

"The increase is due to some mothers not initially coming into WIC for the early postpartum appointments," noted Ms. Reiger.

Breastfeeding resources

There are three ways new moms can access support and information regarding breastfeeding in Baker County:

- WIC, located at 85 W. Railroad Ave., serves low to moderate income women who are pregnant and up through the postpartum period, as well as children through age 5.

WIC promotes breastfeeding and has trained professionals ready to assist mothers in mak-

ing decisions about their feeding choices and give instruction on the basics of breastfeeding. WIC has mother-to-mother breastfeeding support groups and supplies breast pumps in certain circumstances.

WIC can be reached at 259-3233.

- Baker County's Healthy Start program offers general health education for mothers, which includes the benefits of breastfeeding. The program's staff are trained by WIC lactation experts. They can be reached at 259-6291, ext. 2255, 2256 and 2257.

- Hospitals have lactation support staff as well.

Deadline for scholarships

May 30 is the deadline to apply for one of two college scholarships available to Baker County residents who did not attend college after high school graduation.

Applicants must plan to attend a college or other post-secondary training institute and have either a regular high school diploma or GED for at least three years. They must also demonstrate a financial need, complete 24 semester hours within two years.

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Sought for pulling a pistol

The sheriff's department is looking for a Glen St. Mary man who was picked out of a photo lineup as the person who ran from a Cuyler residence late on May 23, who allegedly pointed a pistol at the property owner when he gave chase.

Wesley Jordan, 23, told Deputy Daryl Mobley the next day that Phillip Bennett III, 26, is the person who shined a flashlight on him, pointed the gun and told him to step back when he confronted the suspect near Bluff Creek Rd. about midnight.

Mr. Jordan said his brother Dalton Manning, 19, came into the residence off CR 127 about 11:45 after hearing barking dogs and going outside to see a white male fleeing the premises on foot. Mr. Jordan then took off after him.

The county's K-9 Blitz was called in and tracked a scent believed to be Mr. Bennett's for some distance from the scene before it abruptly ended where police think he got into a vehicle.

Mr. Manning said the suspect confronted him several days earlier at nearby Altman's Store, attempting to talk him into giving him two pit bulldogs.

He is being sought for aggravated assault with a weapon, trespass and possession of a firearm by a convicted felon. Mr. Bennett has felony convictions for drug offenses and similar cases pending in circuit court.

He is also a possible suspect in the theft of a \$600 revolver from Gerald Andrews on Doyle Williams Rd. sometime between late March and last week.

In other recent reports, a 34-year-old male patient at Northeast Florida State Hospital was

named in a complaint for felony aggravated battery on employee Jeremy Lowery, 20, of Macclenny on May 26.

Deputy Robert Simpkins' report notes that Mr. Lowery was treated at Fraser Hospital for fractures to the nose and cheek bone. He was stuck several times in the face.

In a second NEFSH attack, this one involving two male patients, a complaint was filed May 25 naming a 27-year-old for punching a 56-year-old in the facial area. Deputy Jacob Satterwhite was told the assailant attacked his victim in a bedroom about 3 am.

- Deputy Clements Leo filed a complaint for criminal mischief and battery against Craig Widemond, 26, of Macclenny after he allegedly attacked Karlie Manning, 19, of Glen St. Mary while she sat in her car on Grissholm St. near Lowder St. on May 25.

The officer said the suspect fled in a vehicle when he arrived in the south Macclenny neighborhood about 3:45 am and the car was found abandoned and damaged a short time later.

Ms. Manning said the suspect yanked down on and broke the driver's side window before grabbing her about the head.

Complaints for domestic battery were filed by Deputy Simpkins against both parties following a confrontation late on May 26 on W. 8th St. in Macclenny that started over a cell phone.

Both Dylan Hurst, 19, of Sanderson and his estranged girlfriend, 17, of Macclenny accused each other of physical violence after the latter came to the address to claim the phone and they argued about text messages.





Looking Back



Archived snippets from 75 & 25 years ago from THE BAKER COUNTY PRESS

This week *The Press* inaugurates a feature looking back at what Baker Countians were reading 75 and 25 years ago this month. The snippets are pulled from our archives:

May, 1939-75 years ago

- The newspaper's banner back then proudly displayed these messages: "The Press — Baker's foremost newspaper — publishing all the worthwhile news," and touted itself as "The best equipped printing plant in the county — producing distinctive printing."

- Readers were informed on page one that L.A. Barnes purchased a car garage from J.R. Rowe on Monday of that week, and moved into a building on US 90 east of Dinkins Motor Company. Mr. Rowe sold the business after taking a position with the City of Macclenny.

- Three motion pictures featuring champion prize fights were scheduled for the Baker Theater that month, including the historic Joe Lewis and Max Schmelling bout. E.D. Chessman said there would be no increase in the price of admission.

- The sixth grade class at Glen St. Mary School enjoyed a tour of the Maxwell House coffee plant in Jacksonville in early May. The students also visited Southern Dairies and the Florida Glass Manufacturing Co. the same day.

- The Press reported that a "large tractor" began plowing up the surface of several streets in core Macclenny, preparing them for paving next month. All the estimated three miles of paving was expected south of U.S. 90.

- The Macclenny High School class of 1939 was set to graduate the following week at the Civic Center in Macclenny. Baccalaureate was scheduled at the First Baptist Church and Senior Night at the Community

Center. The class numbered 17.

- The Macclenny Cash Store advertised a 12 lb. bag of flour for 40 cents; t-bone steak at 35 cents a pound, spare ribs at 15 cents a pound and Irish potatoes at a dime a pound. The phone number to arrange for free delivery — 4.

- Baker County's public assistance payroll climbed to \$3258 in April, 1939. The breakdown: old age assistance \$2818 to 214 recipients; aid to the blind \$154 total to 12 recipients, and aid to dependent children \$286 to eight cases.

- A Texas company was contracted to begin test drilling for oil on the property of Howell Turpentine Co. four miles south of Olustee. Other test wells were drilled near Hilliard, Cedar Keys and Miami with no results.

- The shipment of an estimated 1800 plants of various varieties left Baker County via rail from the Glen St. Mary Nurseries Company for display at the New York World's Fair. The portion of more delicate orange trees was delayed due to weather conditions in New York.

- Teacher examinations were scheduled to begin the morning of June 1 at the county courthouse. The exams continued through June 3, according to school Supt. J.D. Burnsed.

May, 1989-25 years ago

- The BCHS Wildcat weightlifting team repeated as Class 2A state champions among 37 schools and 250 lifters competing in Arcadia. Wesley Lewis placed first in the 132 lb. class and Rex Knight and Kay Sands second in their weight class.

- Christy Cook was crowned Miss Teen Macclenny from a field of 13 contestants. Runners-up were Melissa McMahan and

Shannon Pepper.

- County deputy Red Smith credited his finger behind the trigger of his pistol as saving his life while wrestling with an escaped convict at the Sanderson rest area on Interstate 10. His assailant, a Tennessee man who escaped from an Indiana prison, was jailed here on multiple felony counts.

- The Baker County Commission approved the purchase of six new fire trucks and a tanker to be stationed at outlying stations. They replaced aging trucks, mostly castoffs acquired over the years from Jacksonville.

- Former school superintendent Alan (Pete) Harvey retired after more than 37 years as a teacher and administrator in the Baker County school system. He was replaced as the director of vocational and adult education by Galon Webb.

- School Supt. Tim Starling said he remained opposed to the idea of a school security guard hired by the district, arguing that the sheriff's department does an adequate job answering calls.

- A Baker County-laden cast lined up for the play *Brighton Beach Memoirs* at Lake City Community College. Directed by Bob Gerard, the cast included Mark Bryant, Britt Hancock, Staci Heath, Elisa Whitfield and Jennifer McGuinness.

- The county was preparing to mail nearly 5700 notices to property owners who failed to pay the unpopular landfill and fire protection special assessments approved by the county commission.

- The G&H Food Store advertised ground beef at \$1.39 a pound, fryer leg quarters at 49 cents a pound and a five-pound bag of oranges at \$1.79.

## Sloppy show at First Coast, 47-0

### Wildcats sputter in '14 Classic

The 2014 Wildcats didn't make the first impression they were hoping for as sloppy play led to a 47-0 blowout loss at First Coast on May 23 in the Spring Football Classic.

Both the first-team offense and defense struggled throughout the first half against First Coast's starting lineup. Neither side of the ball was able to execute the way they wanted to, which head coach Tom MacPherson took the blame for.

"I didn't expect us to look this bad," Coach MacPherson said. "First Coast is a very very talented football team, but we made mistakes ourselves and obviously we weren't prepared as a coaching staff. Anytime the kids play that bad, you didn't have them prepared right so that's on us."

The Cats' offense could never get rolling and commit-

ted four turnovers in the first half, including a pair of lost fumbles on the team's first two plays. The first fumble led to one of five touchdown passes from First Coast quarterback De'Andre Johnson and the second was returned for a score.

The poor execution stemmed from the offense's lack of experience as the unit has only two returning starters from last year. The team had to play young players against a talented defense with a handful of FBS-caliber athletes, including South Carolina commit Sherrod Pittman.

"We have all young kids at o-line who have never played before, and you come over and play 8-10 division 1 players with ninth and 10th graders that have never played o-line, that's kind of the result you're going to get," Coach MacPherson said. "We weren't ready up front for the speed. We weren't ready for the physicality of it. The only good thing is this will make them better."

The offensive woes meant the defense was forced back onto the field multiple times early in the game. The defense had a tough time slowing down First Coast's high-powered offense and allowed touchdown drives on six of the seven first-half possessions.

Even when the defense ap-

peared to have their opposition stopped, the Bucs still found a way to find the end zone. The Wildcats had First Coast facing a fourth-and-20 and a fourth-and-35, and each time they gave up a long touchdown pass by Johnson.

Those mistakes gave the Bucs the chance to blow the game open, coach MacPherson said.

"Stuff like that just cannot happen," he said. "If you take the two fourth down plays and the two turnovers away, maybe it's 14 to nothing at half instead of forty-something to nothing."

Despite the overall poor showing, there were still a few bright spots for the Cats.

CeCe Jefferson showed once again why he is one of the most sought-after players in the 2015 recruiting class. The defensive star had a sack and three tackles for loss.

Coach MacPherson also pointed to Blayne Merchant, who played both ways, as someone who stood out for him. The coach said ninth-grade offensive linemen Shaquan Griffin and Travion Clayton played well enough to give the team hope for the future.

"We're going to get good up front," he said. "We're going to get better. These kids have just never played."

The Wildcats returned to the film room on May 27 and held workouts the following Wednesday and Thursday. The team will get back on the practice field on June 16 as they try to correct the mistakes they made in the spring.

The head coach said he hopes the shutout loss will act as a wake up call for the team to work hard in the summer.

"Hopefully this is the shot in the face we need and the kick in the face we need to get motivated a little bit," coach MacPherson said. "I think some of our guys need to be a little bit hungrier and need to realize we have a lot of work to do. Hopefully this is what will get it done."

## Captures state title in roping

Brandon Callen of Lake City won the state junior championship in team roping for the second straight year when he and partner Aaron Barber were crowned champions on May 18 after the competition took place in Davie the previous three days.

"It feels great," Callen, a 18-year-old Macclenny native, said. "Being able to go back and win it again is a big accomplishment. We were going against the best competitors in the state of Florida."

The top 15 teams qualified for the state after receiving points throughout the season. Callen and Barber sat atop the team roping rankings entering the rodeo, which gave them the advantage of going last.

The duo had a big points lead and thought they would only have to catch the steer to win, but the second-place team pulled within eight points of the lead. The closer competition motivated Callen and Barber to post a time of 8.88 seconds in the third and final go-round, which was about a second-and-a-half faster than the second-place team.

"I'm kind of glad it came down to how it did," said the high school senior. "It made us step our game up."

The time was enough for Callen to capture his second consecutive state championship with as many partners. He called his new partner "a brother" and the two would practice as much as they could on weekends to give themselves the chance to be as successful as possible.

With the state meet behind him, Callen turns his attention to July's national rodeo in Rock Spring, Wyo. He and former partner Colton Matthews finished 14th out of 81 team roping duos last year.

This year, he expects to finish at the top of the national rodeo.

"Everybody that goes out there is competing against the best of the best," Callen said. "We just hope to catch all our cattle and make it back sitting good to have a chance to win the national title. Florida has one of the most competitive teams going out. Without a doubt we have a very good chance."

## Inspirational coach directs soccer camp

About 40 children took part in a free soccer camp at the YMCA on May 24 that was organized by the Tim Callahan Inspiration Foundation to encourage the youth by telling Mr. Callahan's story of overcoming paralysis in his legs.

Doctors gave Mr. Callahan a .01 percent chance to walk after he was left paralyzed from an injury during a flag football tournament in July 2010. He didn't allow the long odds to affect his determination to get back on his feet. He was walking again just four weeks after the diagnosis.

Within a year, he was back in the gym working out.

Although he still suffers from paralysis and tingling throughout his body, he said his recovery was incredible.

"Honestly, me and my wife never believed those odds at all," Mr. Callahan said. "We just put our faith in God and prayer and believing that I would be able to come back. It was obviously scary, but after a few weeks when I started being able to move a little bit, I put the hard work into getting back to where I am right now."

After two years of therapy and working out, Mr. Callahan decided to play in another flag football tournament as a

quarterback. His team won the tournament and his story blew up across the country and was featured on the New England Patriots' website.

He decided to use that notoriety to spread his message of hope to children and created his foundation in June 2013.

"I got emails from people I didn't know telling me how I'm their hero and how I've inspired them to do this and that," Mr. Callahan said about reaching out to others. "I would get speaking engagements. It got me to thinking, I need to do something where I can tell as many kids as I can about this great story of overcoming the odds. The best way I can think to do that is to offer free sports


