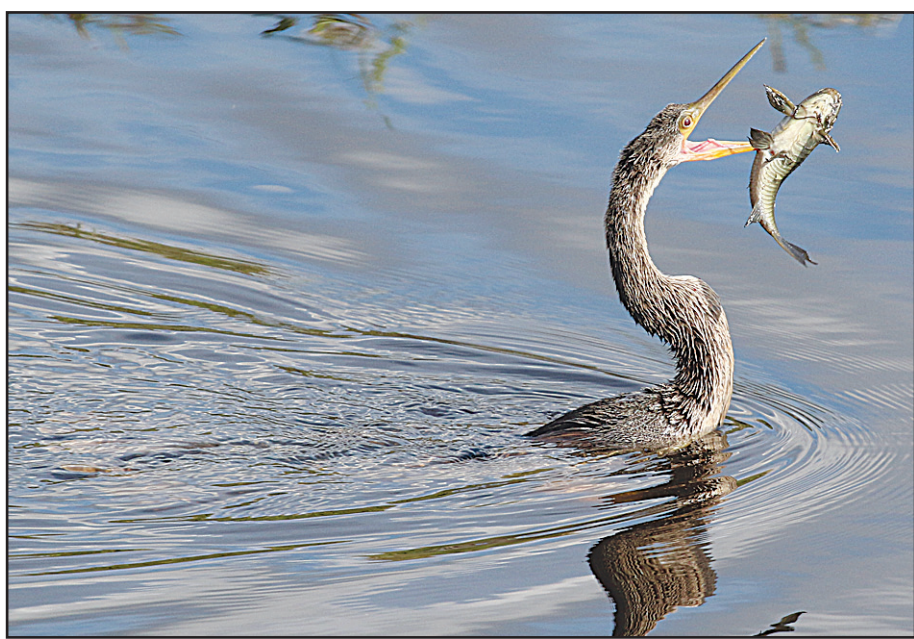

## City seeking \$4.8 million in state funds for projects

In the first meeting of 2019 on Wednesday, January 2, the City Council heard about the funding requests that Mayor Bryan Nelson plans to ask the state government to pay for in the upcoming session for the Florida Legislature.

The mayor's list includes \$4.8 million in projects ranging from a high of \$1.9 million for a permanent fire station near AdventHealth Apopka, formerly known as Florida Hospital Apopka, to \$110,000 for the city to conduct a program to inventory, mark, and evaluate

all of its stormwater system.

In addition to Mayor Nelson's list, Commissioner Alexander Smith said he and others had met with of-

icials from Florida A&M University and Valencia College about collaborating on a satellite campus

## MLK parade set for January 21 in Apopka

## City election runoff was highlight of April

Note: This is the second of a four-part series reviewing the news of Apopka in 2018 written in the pages of *The Apopka Chief*. This week covers April, May, and June.

### April

A runoff election to determine the winner of the Seat 2 race for the City Council between incumbent Diane Velazquez and Alice Nolan was held Tuesday, April 10 ... The Central Florida Expressway Authority opened the final five miles of the Orange County portion of the Wekiva Parkway (State Road 429), providing a connection to State Road 46 and communities throughout Orange, Lake, and Seminole counties.



Alice Nolan was elected to the City Council in April.

Preliminary site preparations for Apopka's new splash pad were begun at Kit Land Nelson Park, which is designed with separate zones for children of different ages ... The St. Johns River Management District opened all areas of the Lake Apopka Wildlife Drive, includ-

ing Laughlin Road and the lake-side road. It had been closed due to flooding from Hurricane Irma's hit to the area in September 2017.

The Apopka High debate team has had numerous successes this year in local events and across the nation, including at Harvard University, Cambridge, Mass. Siblings Brody and Tatiana Beauchamp placed first in every local town event they attended and qualified for the Tournament of Champions and the NSDA Nationals in Fort Lauderdale.

The AHS girls softball team posted a 17-2 overall record while still facing the last quarter of the season, earning the number one seed for the District 9A-3 championship tournament ... The Blue Darters baseball team led the district race with a 4-1 record, a game

ahead of West Orange and Olympia.

Alice Nolan won election in the Apopka City Council on April 10, defeating incumbent Diane Velazquez in a runoff election held for Seat 3. Nolan won for her first four-year term with 59.95 percent of the vote (1,702 votes) to 41.05 percent for Velazquez (1,185 votes) ... Desmon Alexander Wilkerson, 32, and Donnell Toler, 44, and Cathy Loren Toler, 53, all of Orlando, were arrested at 474 Shirley Dr., Apopka, where police discovered 48 pounds of marijuana, \$28,237 in cash, and two handguns.

Annovia Plant Nutrient of Zellwood partnered with Smithfield Foods Inc. to create sustain-

## Center and red lights are prime subjects this week

Two items, one visible and one not-so-visible, were among important issues that happened this week here in Apopka.

The one that could be easily seen is the groundbreaking for the new community center at Alonzo Williams Park. The issue that would affect more people one way or the other is the one that's not so easily seen, which is the red-light cameras.

The groundbreaking for the park's community center is a welcome event that will lead to many new things for those who live near the park, especially for students who will use its media room with computers and Wi-Fi for their school work or just seeking more knowledge and information about a particular subject of interest.

Although costing the city some funds, the bulk of the money needed to build the community center at Alonzo Williams Park came from the state government in the form of a grant for \$750,000. In addition, a grant of \$15,000 from AT&T will help fund the media room's computers.

Participating in the groundbreaking for the community center was Alonzo Williams Jr., the park's namesake. The former city commissioner, who broke the color barrier for the Apopka City Council by being the first black commissioner elected in the early 1970s, attended the groundbreaking for the community center at the park that bears his name. Also joining Williams was recently retired City Commissioner Billie Dean, as well as members of the current City Council, including Mayor Bryan Nelson.

While the community center at the park is very important, especially for the youngsters who will visit the center to take advantage of its media room and other activities, something that affects all Apopkans

and even those from out of town is the turning off of the red-light cameras in the city of Apopka.

Mayor Nelson, elected in March 2018 and sworn in the next month, ran on the promise that he would get rid of the red-light cameras. No matter whether you agree with Nelson or not on this issue, to see a politician be elected on a promise to do something and then following through to get it done was refreshing to see. We all know of politicians who have said and promised everything under the sun to get votes and then abandoned those promises a minute or two after being sworn-in to office.

The city of Apopka was the first municipality in Central Florida and one of the first in the state to install the cameras more than 10 years ago. Controversial from the beginning, the cameras were always up for debate as proponents said they reduced traffic crashes, making the roads safer for all of us. Opponents, meanwhile, said they were nothing but a money grab from the governmental entities that have them and that they violated privacy rights in addition to causing more rear-end crashes.

We're not sure who's correct on the safety issue because both sides have so-called statistics that prove that the red-light cameras cause the roads to be either safer or more dangerous, depending on your point of view.

We do know that the cameras are now not being used to write the city tickets and that the city will miss the revenue in the long-term because it did provide a consistent source of revenue for Apopka. In addition, APD will undergo reassignments as needs arise.

We hope that the safety on the roads is not adversely affected and pray that the city continues to find other sources of revenue.

## Medicare for all closer than it looks

In a recent article titled "Spending More on Debt than Defense," author Mark Hendrickson highlights the interest payments on our rapidly growing national debt in relation to defense spending. By 2023, Hendrickson points out, interest payments on the national debt will exceed the amount spent on national defense. There is one factor, however, which could hasten that day and dramatically accelerate the growth of an already large national debt – healthcare spending.

For many progressives in the U.S. Congress, "fix-

ing" the healthcare system in the United States is a major policy initiative. Their prescription? Medicare for All – a single payer, government-run healthcare scheme which uses the existing Medicare system as a template for healthcare utopia in America. Medicare for All would seek to transition everyone to a Medicare-style system over four short years, all the while promising to expand benefits, eliminate deductibles, and cut costs. But free healthcare is not free.

According to estimates by the Mercatus Institute, Medicare for All carries a price tag in the neighborhood of \$32 trillion over

10 years. For some sobering perspective, the total of all individual and corporate taxes collected by the federal government over the next 10 years is projected to be approximately \$30 trillion. Where will the money come from in order to fund the nationalization of the U.S. healthcare system?

Advocates of Medicare for All claim that it will be funded by administrative savings generated from a massive consolidation of the health-insurance industry by dramatically reducing fees for physicians, hospitals, and other providers, and through

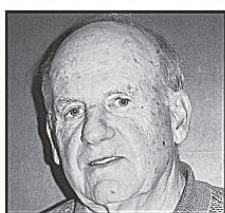

# Dollar General store gets slight revision to final development plan

The Development Review Committee reviewed a master plan/preliminary development plan for a commercial retail development, proposed for the northwest corner of Lester Road and Rock Springs Road.

The DRC met at City Hall on Wednesday, January 2. The DRC is made up of city staff representatives who go over development applications to see if they fall in line with city code before they go to the city's Planning Commission and City Council.

Gateway Plaza, formerly known as VBRO Enterprises, is designed to have four buildings. Two are intended to house office/retail space, one for an adult daycare facility on the west side, and the fourth for a restaurant.

City of Apopka staff informed the Gateway Plaza project team that since Apopka is in the middle of reforming its land development code, the team must choose between the old and the new version for the project to follow.

According to city planner David Moon, since a planned unit development associated with Gateway Plaza details the types of uses the development could have, an amendment to the PUD ordinance may be required.

Gateway Plaza civil engineer Bill Burke told the DRC the Gateway Plaza site does not meet the typical parking requirements, so the project team will give additional justifications in how it'll handle

that.

## Dollar General

The DRC took another look at development plans for the Dollar General store, proposed for the northwest corner of the intersection of Park Avenue and Michael Gladden Boulevard.

The new store would

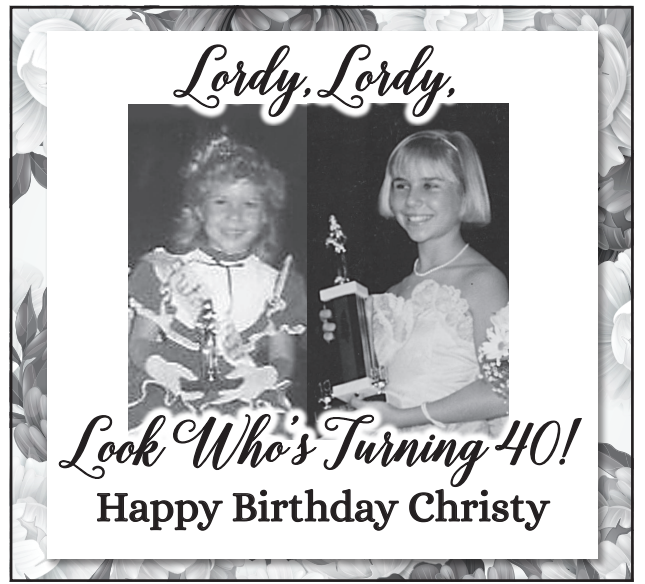
be the fourth Dollar General store in Apopka, joining those on North Rock Springs Road, East Semoran Boulevard, and West Orange Blossom Trail.

"This is just a DRC-approval item because the final development plan was previously approved," said city planner Jean San-

chez. "Because of the Orange County right-of-way permit, they had to shift, I believe, the Park Avenue driveway a little bit, and they had to reposition the utilities."

During the Dollar General plans' revision process, one of the main changes was a move of the store's entrance from Park Avenue to Michael Gladden

Boulevard. The police department had said a Park Avenue entrance would cause bigger traffic issues than one on Michael Gladden Boulevard.

## Groundbreaking ceremony held for community center at Alonzo Williams Park

The city of Apopka celebrated Alonzo Williams Park's new yet-to-be-built community center with a groundbreaking at the park on Wednesday, January 2.

The community center will be built where the park's previous center once stood. The upgraded fa-

cility will include a media room with computers for public use.

The new center construction does not include furnishings, something the city intends on seeking bids for at a later date, City Administrator Edward Bass said at the October 3, 2018, City Council meeting.

The center is one of the modernized amenities the city is installing at Alonzo Williams Park, where community members built a new playground in one day in October 2018 in collaboration with Target and the nonprofit KaBoom! The city will also remodel the park's basketball courts, address the field lighting, and bring in new picnic tables and benches.

Mayor Bryan Nelson acknowledged individuals who drove the project forward, including city recreation manager Lorena Potter, city grant writer Dr. Shakenya Harris-Jackson, and Dan Pollock, regional director of external affairs for AT&T Florida, who donated \$15,000 toward the center's media room.

"It's been a long time getting this upgraded here at Alonzo Williams Park," Nelson said. "A lot of things are going on that we'll be excited to have."

AT&T donated the \$15,000 check to the city at the Wednesday, January 2, City Council meeting.

Joining Nelson in the

groundbreaking were current and former elected officials including former commissioners Alonzo Williams and Billie Dean.

The city of Apopka is working with MIE Inc., an Apopka company, on the community center for what the city hopes will be a nine-month building schedule, Harris-Jackson said.

Once the community center is built, the city intends to expand programs to the facility such as the senior exercise class already available at the Fran Carlton Center, summer camp, afterschool programs, and tutoring for children, according to Potter. She added that the AT&T grant would go a long way for the media room, which will give Wi-Fi accessibility to those needing it.

"The AT&T grant will be very beneficial for the media room and have ac-

cessible computers for the community because a lot of children – as you know, everything now is digital," Potter said. "They give children laptops, but they don't have Wi-Fi. They go home and can't do their homework, or they need assistance because maybe they don't have somebody in their family that's tech-savvy to be able to help them."

For the Alonzo Williams Park overhaul, the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity gave Apopka a \$750,000 Florida Small Cities Community Development Block Grant, on the condition that the city match the amount with \$50,000.

The city had received \$50,000 in Florida Recreation Development Assistance Program for Alonzo Williams Park for upgrades including new playground equipment.

in the Apopka area. In response to a question from the mayor, Smith said that the college officials were on board and are interested in the proposal. Nelson, who served as a state representative for eight years in the Florida Legislature, said such a proposal would need a feasibility study before it's approved, but said that the study could be included in the city's legislative budget requests.

There was also discussion from Commissioner Kyle Becker about a partnership with Quest because Nelson's list includes a \$1-million request from the state for an inclusive playground at Camp Thunderbird, which Quest operates in Apopka. Quest works with developmentally disabled people.

Commissioner Doug Bankson brought up a need for a fence at Orlando-Apopka Airport after a small plane left the runway after landing there earlier this week. He also said the runway needs to be extended by 1,000 feet.

One of the city requests is \$650,000 for the Harmon Road extension, which would extend existing Harmon Road on the north side of AdventHealth Apopka hospital from Ocoee-Apopka Road to Marden Road to create more access to the

hospital. That request made it into the legislature's version of the state budget last year, but was vetoed by Gov. Rick Scott, who has line-item veto power.

Mayor Nelson said he would be visiting Tallahassee at least twice to try to get the city's requests in the state budget. His first visit will be during the second week of February during early committee meetings.

The former state representative said he wanted the commissioners to help him with trying to convince legislators to help get the city's requests included in the state budget.

"We're trying to at least get them in the budget to start with, then I'll need your help to make sure we can push them across the finish line," Mayor Nelson said. "The good news is that I know both the Appropriations (Committee) chair in the House and Senate pretty well. That'll help this year for sure."

## Excess water study

Because homes around Lake Cortez were flooded due to rains from Hurricane Irma in September 2017, the city has agreed to fund a feasibility study that would determine a plan to capture flooding waters from Border Lake in that area in the future and send the water to the city's reclaimed water network.

Border Lake sits along the south side of State Road 436 (Semoran Boulevard) and is bisected by the Orange-Seminole county border.

The city will pay Reiss Engineering of Winter Springs \$37,555 for the study that is expected to take a little more than two months and be completed by late February or early March.

If the feasibility study concludes that the project to send Border Lake's excess water eventually to Apopka's reclaimed water network would be feasible, then other governmental agencies have said they have interest in sharing the cost to build the improvements in order to keep the area from flooding again.

According to the City Council meeting documents, Orange County, Seminole County, Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), and St. Johns River Water Management District have shown interest in sharing costs needed for the potential improvements that would send any excess water from Border Lake to the city of Apopka's reclaimed water network.

The documents stated that the FDOT's drainage system along State Road 436 at Border Lake has been overwhelmed with excess water on several oc-

casions. Once the system becomes flooded, the water flows down the roadside gutters of Lake Cortez Drive and into Lake Cortez, the documents state. There is no water outlet for Lake Cortez.

After Hurricane Irma, there was so much water that Lake Cortez flooded into homes surrounding it, according to the documents.

## Planning Commission

Mary L. Norwood, a law enforcement officer, was appointed to the Apopka Planning Commission by a unanimous vote of the City Council.

Norwood has been with the Orange County Sheriff's Office for 27 years. Since 2009, Norwood has served as a special projects deputy with the sheriff's office Sector One, which is Northwest

a significant increase in personal and corporate tax rates. Even in a best-case scenario, these three sources of funding are not enough to cover the approximate \$32 trillion price tag.

A major portion of Medicare for All funding would have to be covered by a significant increase in deficit spending which, in turn, will generate more debt and the need to pay even more interest on the debt.

Today, the federal deficit is more than \$21 trillion. By 2023, the Con-

gressional Budget Office projects it to grow to more than \$27 trillion. Those projections, as significant as they are, do not account for the impact of Medicare for All. Assuming full implementation of Medicare for All over a four-year period, the required level of deficit spending would cause net interest payments to increase by more than \$5 trillion during that same time period; this according to data from the House Budget Committee. The same analysis predicts that fully funding Medicare for All over its first 10 years would add approximately \$38 trillion to the nation's

debt.

Even at a modest interest rate, service on that level of debt would eclipse all other areas of government spending combined.

Hendrickson accurately concludes, "We eventually will have to learn to live within our means." This entails having to say no to government spending on programs whose negative impact includes driving up our national debt.

Unfortunately, that lesson hasn't been learned yet. Let's hope our legislators learn it before socialized healthcare becomes a reality. Medicare for All, like many socialized

healthcare systems, will negatively impact patients, providers, and payers to a significant degree. Now add to that list a dramatic impact on the already high national debt.

Don't look now, but with Medicare for All, overwhelming debt, like objects in your car's side-view mirrors, may be closer than it appears.

pitals across Central Florida and the nation has done – is gone through service-standard training,” Clark

said. “What that means is having a core set of service standards that our team will abide by and commit to on a daily basis, to treat consumers and hold their hand

through the healthcare process.”

To commemorate the new name’s launch, AdventHealth donated \$100,000, plus up to \$400,000, in matching funds to Central Florida’s Housing First initiative as the hospital’s “acts of wholeness.”

The Housing First initiative “aims to end chronic homelessness by providing homes, support services and case managers to the homeless,” according to an Advent Health January 2 press release.

Housing First provides permanent housing,

case managers and support services for the chronically homeless. In 2014, AdventHealth made a \$6-million gift to bolster efforts in metro Orlando. Since then, hundreds of formerly homeless people have received permanent homes and services.

When asked if AdventHealth Apopka is doing anything similar to the Housing First initiative, Clark said that he “couldn’t comment on that one. I’m not familiar with the details on that.”

According to AdventHealth spokesman David

Breen, Housing First is the initiative of Daryl Tol, AdventHealth Central Florida region CEO.

“This is an historic and transformational time for our organization and the communities we serve. We’re building on our rich legacy and stepping into the future with a new name and renewed dedication to caring for the whole person – body, mind and spirit,” Tol said. “We are the only national health-care company based in Florida, and with our hub in Orlando, we will continue to spotlight our world-class phy-

sicians, clinical excellence, and growing commitment to research and innovation.”



## North Shore Birding Festival will include birding trips, tours and dinner

The annual North Shore Birding Festival will be held Friday, January 18, through Monday, January 21, on the North Shore of Lake Apopka. The Orange Audubon Society is sponsor of the festival.

This festival replaces the event known as Birdapalooza or the Lake Apopka Birding Festival as this event includes 23 different birding trips as well as a dinner with keynote speakers on both Friday and Saturday nights.

Each of the trips requires a fee ranging from \$20 to \$50 and most are on the North Shore of Lake

ald Canal pavilion, 24600 CR 448A, Mount Dora. Those interested in the various birding trips should visit <https://bit.ly/2s6yVQb> for more information about the festival.

The North Shore Birding Festival on Lake Apopka hosts birders visiting Florida or locals wanting to learn more from well-known, knowledgeable birding guides. Trips will search for as many as possible of the more than 360 species documented, plus recently sighted rarities.

The Friday, January 18, dinner will include speaker Frank Salmon on

"Chasing Warblers."

America's small, hyperactive wood warblers are colorful, have distinctive songs, and are among the most looked-for birds. Salmon, a Central Florida birder and photographer caught the warbler bug over the past five years at Orlando's birding hot spot Mead Botanical Garden. More recently, he learned about eBird, <https://ebird.org/home>, a citizen science effort of Cornell Lab of Ornithology, in which birders report their sightings. Salmon has visited all the warbler hotspots in North America, follow-

ing sightings by other birders listed on eBird. Some of Salmon's pictures of warblers can be seen at <https://www.flickr.com/photos/fwsalmon/>.

The Saturday, January 19, dinner will include speakers Greg Miller and Glenn Crawford on "Central American Birding."

Miller and Crawford of Wildside Nature Tours will share some of the experiences you can expect if you go birding in Central America. Miller is the well-known Ohio birder who did a "Big Year" in 1998 and

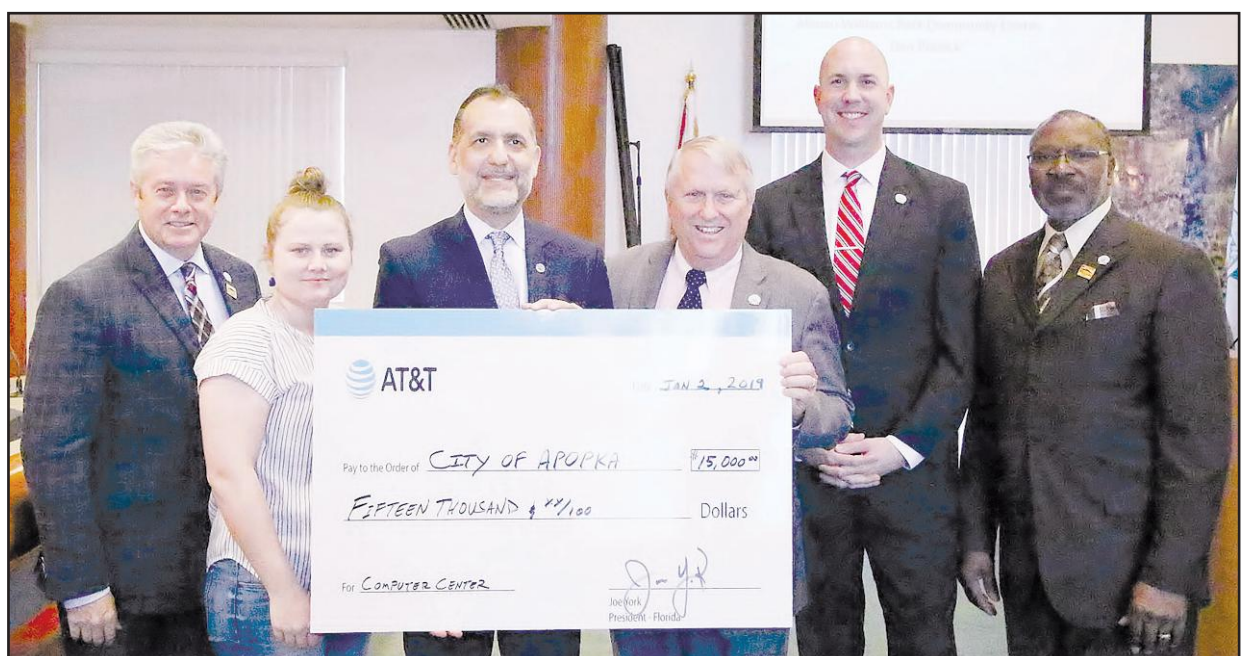
All competitions are based on several aspects of law enforcement and firefighting jobs such as the bench press, pull-ups, the tire flipping and various re-

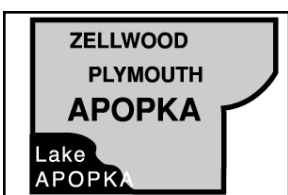

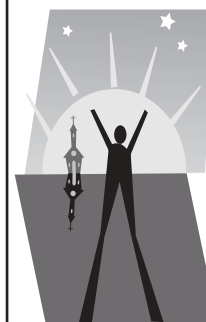

# Kick off the New Year with Brenda Crosby's Hamburger Stroganoff

New Year's Day is now over. We hope you had a delightful celebration. Take a deep breath and exhale slowly. Next, relax a little. And steel yourself for a whole new race!



**1 teaspoon salt**  
**3 tablespoons Crisco**  
**1 16-ounce can stewing tomatoes**  
**1/2 cup chopped celery**  
**1/2 cup chopped carrots**  
**2 tablespoons chopped onion**  
**1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce**  
**1/4 cup shredded cheese**

Cut meat into four portions. Combine flour and salt. Pound into meat. Reserve flour. Brown meat in hot Crisco. Transfer to shallow baking dish. Blend reserved flour mixture into pan drippings in skillet. Add vegetables and Worcestershire to drippings and cook, stirring constantly until mixture boils (making a gravy). Pour over meat. Cover and bake at 350 degrees for 2 hours or until meat and vegetables are tender. Sprinkle cheese on top and melt in oven.

We start with a Stroganoff recipe made with ground beef and cooked on the stove top. Next is Swiss steak baked at 350 degrees for two hours with complementary vegetables.

Then we have shrimp scampi and crab salad. Cheese casserole should be a simple and tasty recipe.

Italian potatoes with three different kinds of cheese follows. Next we have holiday rice which is made with wild rice and brown or white rice, sausage and vegetables, and baked at 350 degrees until bubbly. It sounds wonderful.

For dessert, we have peach pie and Indian pudding.

**Recipe from Food Favorites of Plains, Georgia Plains Pot Pourri**

**1 pound ground beef**  
**1 medium onion, chopped**  
**1 clove garlic, minced**  
**3 tablespoons flour**  
**1 teaspoon instant beef bouillon**  
**3/4 teaspoons salt**  
**1/4 teaspoon pepper**  
**1 4-ounce can mushrooms**  
**1 cup water**  
**1 cup sour cream**  
**2 cups hot, cooked rice**

Cook and stir meat, onion, garlic in large skillet until meat browns. Drain off fat. Mix flour, bouillon, salt, pepper and mushrooms. Stir in water and heat to boiling, stirring constantly. Reduce heat, cover and simmer 10 minutes. Stir in sour cream and heat. Serve over rice and garnish with parsley.

**MRS. WESLEY SMITH'S OVEN SWISS STEAK**  
**Recipe from Food Favorites of Plains, Georgia Plains Pot Pourri**  
**1-1/2 pounds round steak, 3/4-inch thick**  
**1/4 cup flour**

**SUSAN NETHERCOTE'S SHRIMP SCAMPI**

**Recipe from Reader of The Apopka Chief and The Planter newspapers**

**1 cup butter**  
**1/4 cup olive oil**  
**1 tablespoon parsley flakes**  
**3/4 teaspoon basil**  
**1/2 teaspoon oregano**  
**1 clove garlic (minced or garlic powder)**  
**3/4 teaspoon salt**  
**1 tablespoon lemon juice**  
**1 pound shrimp (medium is best, but any will do)**

Preheat oven to 450 degrees. Melt butter, add oil, parsley, basil, oregano, garlic, salt and lemon juice. Mix.

Peel and devein shrimp. Remove tails. Split shrimp down the middle lengthwise so it will lay flat. Place in shallow pan. Pour sauce over and bake for five minutes. Then place under broiler for five minutes to brown.

Makes two servings as entrée, or more if used for appetizer.

**WEST INDIES CRAB SALAD, Recipe from Florida Federation of Garden Clubs,**

**Paths of Sunshine Cookbook**  
**1 pound white lump crabmeat**  
**4 ounces chopped white onions**  
**1/4 teaspoon salt**  
**1/4 teaspoon black pepper**  
**Dash of garlic powder**  
**1/2 cup vegetable oil**  
**1/2 cup white vinegar**  
**1/2 cup ice water**

Place crabmeat in bottom of container that has a tight fitting cover. Spread onions over crabmeat. Shake seasoning over onions and crabmeat. Pour oil, vinegar and ice water over this in the order listed. DO NOT STIR.

Cover and refrigerate at least 24 hours. Stir before serving. This is a super salad. Note: Claw or flaked white meat may be used, but the taste is not as good as lump meat.

**SARA CHAMBLISS' CHEESE CASSEROLE**  
**Recipe from Food Favorites of Plains, Georgia Plains Pot Pourri**  
**8 slices bread with crust removed and cut into cubes**  
**3 eggs**  
**2-1/2 cups milk**  
**Salt and pepper to taste**  
**1/2 pound cheese, grated**

Into buttered casserole, layer bread, then cheese, more bread, more cheese, etc.

Beat three eggs with 2-1/2 cups milk. Salt and pepper to taste. Pour over casserole. Put in refrigerator overnight. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

Serve hot casserole with a green salad for lunch or supper dish.

**POTATOES ITALIAN**  
**Recipe from Apopka Historical Society Preserving the Big Potato**

**4 large baking potatoes**  
**1 teaspoon olive oil**  
**3 medium tomatoes, sliced**  
**1 large Spanish onion, sliced thin**  
**1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese**  
**1 cup provolone cheese**  
**1/2 cup shredded mozzarella cheese**  
**1/2 teaspoon oregano**  
**1/2 teaspoon pepper**  
**1-1/2 tablespoon butter**

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Peel and slice potatoes 1/4-inch thick. Oil a 9 x 13-inch casserole with the olive oil. Combine the three cheeses. Arrange potatoes, tomatoes, and onion slices in layers, sprinkling each layer with cheeses and seasonings, ending with a layer of potatoes sprinkled with the cheeses and seasonings. Dot with butter and bake uncovered for 50 minutes or until vegetables are tender and the top brown.

For the first time over the course of the last five seasons, the Wekiva Mustangs were not holding the championship trophy when the Florida Prospects Holiday Invitational Tournament ended.

DME Sports Academy of Daytona Beach was holding the trophy for the Diamond bracket after defeating Wekiva in the final.

An overall record of 10-4 now exists.

“Most importantly though, “this is a tournament/event created to assist teams in preparing for the postseason,” Mustangs coach Tommie Butts said. “Playing the level of competition allows for more than measurement against ourselves. Teams faced are capable of defeating us. Improvement only occurs when facing at least equal competition. And this field is equally matched.”

“Winning and losing during the FHSAA post-season tournament is determined by subtle mistakes and details in general and has been the same since the sport was first played. Talent and skill gets a team to the tournament. But advancing deep into the tournament isn’t the result of talent alone. When mistakes are committed against opponents with legitimate aspirations of advancing deep into the tournament or even contending for the state championship, a team will be eaten up and quickly. Those opponents don’t fail to take advantage of an opening given. For all intent and purposes, every team participating has legitimate aspirations of advancing to the state final-four. This field in itself could be an entire region of the tournament.”

## Freshman boys basketball coach is there because she’s a ‘talented coach’

After watching her son Maliek Jackson play basketball for the Blue Darters for three years and then graduate from Apopka High School in June, Maija Jackson figured she would stay on as a team mom even though her son had moved on to college life.

But, Apopka Blue Darters head basketball coach Scott Williams saw something different: He saw his next freshman basketball coach.

With former boys basketball freshman coach Desi Rotenberg changing careers and heading to medical school, Williams was looking for a new coach to lead the freshman team and he found it in Maija Jackson.

In hiring the first female head coach of any boys basketball team in Apopka High School history, Williams said he was looking strictly for the best person to lead the squad this season, not to break any kind of barriers.

“I’ve known her for over a decade,” Williams said about Jackson. “I knew she was a good basketball coach, watching her in AAU and working with kids and having relationships.”

“Let’s be very clear: This is not about me trying to be a gender-buster or me trying to make some statement. This is about me hiring the best avail-

able candidate to join our staff.

“She’s a remarkably organized, talented coach. To label her as a female coach, nah. She’s a really talented coach and we’re lucky to have her.”

Williams and Jackson have known each other for a decade and Jackson has coached high school-aged boys in AAU basketball since moving to Florida so she understands what ninth graders need to learn when playing on a high school basketball team.

“I want them to enjoy basketball. That’s the biggest thing,” Jackson

said.

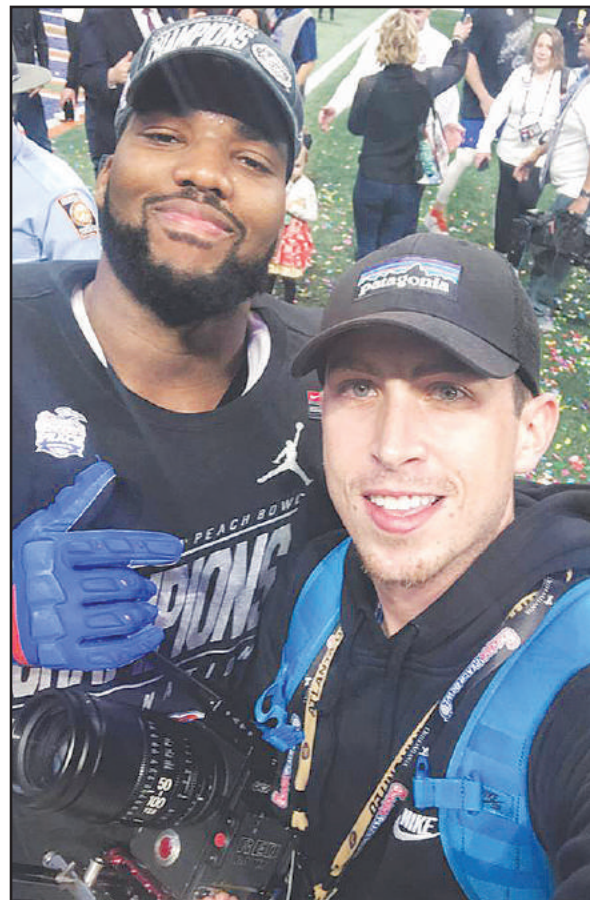
“The freshman year is a lot of learning. There is a lot of difference between middle school and high school, and I want them to learn whatever I can bring to the game. All I’m doing is preparing them for JV (junior varsity) and, eventually, to varsity.”

Coach Williams said his freshman coach does more than just lead the ninth graders; she’s involved in the entire Apopka High basketball program.

“What she does, more than any-

## Apopka High boys basketball team improving at 8-2

Sporting an 8-2 record heading into the new year, Apopka Blue Darters boys basketball coach Scott Williams says his team has improved since the season began right after Thanksgiving, but that there’s still plenty of room for improvement.

“I think we are certainly substantially better than we were at the beginning of the season,” Williams said. “We’re very encouraged from that standpoint.”

“I’m also encouraged from the standpoint that I don’t think we’re where we can get. There are still some things we can improve on and make ourselves better in.”

### Top of roster

Coach Williams has gotten what he expected from top players senior Nate Louis and junior Zach Anderson, but that sophomore John Latimer III and senior Keving Etienne are rounding into becoming the players he had expected they would be.

“What has helped us over the last month as we’ve played is – we know that we’re going to get, night-in and night-out – generally good performances from Nate and Zach, but what’s happened is we’re beginning to get consistently solid performances from John and Keving in the stat areas. They’re scoring and doing the rebounding and those kind of thing the way that we believe they

could and can,” Williams said.

But he’s also liking what he’s seeing from two other guards, senior Jacob Hall and junior Rudy

“We’re also getting really

## Ed Clark releases annual Cup Series predictions for 2019

Atlanta Motor Speedway president Ed Clark has made his annual predictions for the upcoming NASCAR season.

Last year, Clark was fairly successful as a prognosticator. He correctly predicted that William Byron would win Rookie of the Year in the Cup series and that all three Team Penske drivers (Brad Keselowski, Joey Logano and Ryan Blaney) would visit Victory Lane. He also was correct in forecasting that stage finishes would be more aggressive, which they were, as evidenced by battles between teammates like Stewart-Haas drivers Kevin Harvick and Kurt Busch that had fans on their feet at times all season.

Clark was close on his call of three first-time Cup winners. There were two — Chase Elliott and Erik Jones.

He missed in picking Chevrolet to win the Manufacturers' Championship (won by Ford), and that a major team would switch manufacturers for 2019 — none have so far, although some mid-pack teams have switched.

Clark declined to pick a series champion, after choosing Joey Logano in 2017, but, as evidenced by Logano's win in 2018, there was merit in his past selection.

Here are Clark's predictions for 2019:

### 1. Seven-time champion returns to Victory Lane

After a 2018 season that fell well short of the extremely high standards he's set in his illustrious career, Jimmie Johnson is primed for a rebound in 2019.

Don't be surprised if the No. 48 gets off to a bit of a slow start, as Johnson and new crew chief Kevin Meendering get familiar with each other. As the season rolls on, however, I believe the No. 48 will become more of a factor and be in the mix for a race win or two, with Johnson making a return to Victory Lane in 2019.

### 2. Chase, the championship contender



After breaking through for his first Cup Series victory, Chase Elliott quickly followed it up with a second and a third win during NASCAR's playoffs. Like one year prior, however, Elliott's championship pursuit stalled in the Round of 8 in 2018.

I believe that changes in 2019, with the sport's most popular driver keeping up the momentum from 2018 and winning several more races, including a win in the playoff's penultimate round to guarantee Elliott and the No. 9 a shot at the championship in the season finale.

### 3. Busch vs. Truex

Kyle Busch and Martin Truex Jr. — two of the three drivers dubbed “The Big Three” throughout the 2018 season — are now teammates at Joe Gibbs Racing. I don't see either one of these guys slowing down in 2019, and I think that's going to result in some of the fiercest competition between two highly talented drivers with equal equipment throughout the year.

I believe several late-race battles for the win will be decided by these two. I predict this pair trades numerous 1-2 finishes in 2019.



### 4. Both Ganassi drivers find Victory Lane

Former series champion Kurt Busch moves over to the No. 1 car in 2019, joining Kyle Larson and the No. 42 in the Chip Ganassi Racing stable. I'm expecting a solid season with trips to Victory Lane for both of these drivers.

Kurt brings a wealth of experience behind the wheel of a Cup car (he is making his 650th career start in the Folds of Honor QuikTrip 500, after all) and has what it takes to get

the No. 1 to the checkered flag first.

Larson's raw driving talent is well-documented, but despite having several shots at victory in 2018, he came up just short. He'll have a few more shots at the checkered flag in 2019, but this time he'll seal the deal and roll the No. 42 to Victory Lane.



### 5. More exciting racing in 2019

Starting with the 2019 Folds of Honor QuikTrip 500 (at Atlanta Motor Speedway in February), NASCAR's implementing new aero changes and horsepower reductions at its larger tracks to bring the competition closer together.

I see this change resulting in some of the most intense racing we've seen at the intermediate tracks in the last 20 years.

I expect three-wide racing on restarts, side-by-side battles around the track, and back-and-forth passing throughout a run will be more commonplace at these larger tracks. It may even create the right circumstances for one of those vintage photo finishes here at Atlanta.

### 6. More winners in 2019

In 2018, just 10 drivers earned their playoff spots via wins during the regular season, the fewest to do so since the current playoff format began in 2014. That will change in 2019, thanks in part to the aforementioned aero and horsepower changes at larger speedways bringing the competition closer together.

Thanks to this increase in parity, more drivers will win their way into the playoffs in 2019; I predict 12, including a first-time winner or two.

## Nashville group hopes to buck trend of failed track revivals

The recent announcement that Formosa Productions Inc., which now operates the 5/8-mile Fairgrounds Speedway in Nashville, Tennessee, and Bristol Motor Speedway have agreed to work together to promote racing at the Fairgrounds track could lead to a return of major-league NASCAR racing to the historic facility.

The two companies say they want to work together to combine local racing and other major motorsports events on the oval that hosted NASCAR's top division from 1958 to 1984, with an eye toward bringing back NASCAR's top divisions.

But in recent years, it's proven difficult to revive old venues, despite the number of fans who say that's something the sport needs.

Chase Elliott responded to the recent Nashville news on Twitter, saying fan and driver support is key to bringing NASCAR back to Nashville.

“We as drivers need to be trying to help this along, just as you fans need to support this deal all the way through, including supporting IN PERSON if it's pulled off. Cup needs this type of racing IMO, but we all need to support it if we want it as bad as we say we do.”

NASCAR fans have complained for years after races were moved from tracks that include North Wilkesboro Speedway and North Carolina Speedway (now known as Rockingham Speedway), two facilities that lost their race dates to newer tracks elsewhere. Efforts were made to revive both tracks, but fan support was lagging.



Rockingham hosted NASCAR events for 40 years, but has hosted just a pair of Truck Series events since 2004, and revitalization plans have fallen short.

North Wilkesboro, which hosted the Cup Series from 1949 to 1996, was reopened briefly in 2010 and 2011, hosting Late Model and other touring circuits. Chase Elliott won the first race there, but the momentum was lost and the facility has deteriorated to the point that it's unlikely it could host races without a major overhaul.

Rockingham, which was on the Cup schedule from 1965-2004, reopened in 2009 for lower division events, and hosted two Camping World Truck Series (now Gander Outdoors Series) races from 2012-2013, but closed again. Fans did not attend those races in large enough numbers for promoters to continue.

Also of concern for those seeking a return of major NASCAR racing to Nashville is the failure of Nashville Superspeedway, a 1.3-mile, state-of-the-art facility in the Nashville suburb of Lebanon.

## Corey LaJoie will drive for Go Fas

Go Fas Racing has announced that Corey LaJoie will drive its No. 32 Ford Mustang for the 2019 Monster Energy NASCAR Cup Series season.

LaJoie, the 27-year-old son of former Xfinity Series champion Randy LaJoie and grandson of New England racing legend Don LaJoie, has run most of the past two Cup seasons. Corey drove Toyotas for BK Racing in 2017 and the No. 72 Chevy for TriStar Motorsports in 2018.

LaJoie will work with veteran crew chief Randy Cox for the team owned by Archie St. Hilaire and managed by his son Mason St. Hilaire.

“I've always respected Archie, Mason and everyone at Go Fas Racing because they are constantly building their race team better every year,” LaJoie said in a team release. “I'm glad to be part of that continued growth for 2019 and look forward to getting on track and being in a position to show more of my potential.”

## Richard Childress Racing preps for a special season-long 50th anniversary celebration

As Richard Childress Racing kicks off a yearlong celebration of the 50th anniversary of the team's first start, at Talladega in 1969, its two young Cup drivers are hoping to make playoff appearances a part of the agenda.

Childress' grandson Austin Dillon will return to the No. 3 Chevrolet, and rookie Daniel Hemric will drive the No. 8, with the team that raced under the No. 31 of Ryan Newman, who's now at Roush Fenway Racing.

Childress and his drivers recently met with members of the media at the NASCAR Hall of Fame in Charlotte, which plans to have a special display in 2019 commemorating RCR's milestone.

Childress, who saw his No. 3 in the playoffs in 2018 due to Dillon's win in the season-opening Daytona 500, told reporters he'd like to see both drivers in the playoffs in 2019, though he acknowledges there will be a lot of factors in play when the season gets underway.

“The engine package has been changed for 2019, so there are a lot of unknowns, but the one known is that you want to go out and win.”

“You want to go out and race to be in the playoffs to have a shot at the championship. We've been fortunate to be in it the last several years to have a shot, and we are excited about it.”

Hemric, who got his Cup ride despite never having won either in the Xfinity or Truck Series, said the changes to the cars make it a good time for him to enter the Cup series.

“It's kind of like everybody is starting over,” he said. “We've all been thrown in situations where we are driving different race cars on different weeks, and that is no different than this, so everybody is going to have to figure it out.”

Dillon said he's looking forward to again working with crew chief Danny Stockman, who led him to championships in the Xfinity and Truck Series. Stockman is replacing Justin Alexander on the Cup team.

“I'm linking back up with a guy that I had a lot of confidence in in Danny Stockman,” Dillon said. “We won two championships together, and we are only missing the third one. Our goal is to go out there and to do what we can to get to Homestead for a chance to win a championship.”

Hemric said that while in recent years, RCR hasn't been able to win Cup races as regularly as it did in the past, he senses a change.

“It's a complete rejuvenation for the entire organization, from what I can tell,” he said. “I've been in the shop a good bit preparing for the obstacles that are going to be ahead that we are all going to have to face. To see the morale, it's unbelievable.”

On the Xfinity side of the RCR shop, defending series champion Tyler Reddick will be joining the organization for 2019.

Hemric believes that's a positive move for the team.

“He has the knack and the ability to reach out and get everything there is out of the race car,” he said. “We will be able to use that on the Xfinity side, and hopefully somewhere along the way, he can help us on the Cup side of things. Tyler is still so young and still has so far to go, but what he has done to this point is incredible.”

# Hopefully, fishin' in 2019 will be as good as it was in 2018

## Hello Folks,

I hope you and your family had a Happy New Year and you are lookin' forward to a great 2019. I hope the fishin' will be as good this year as it was last year. Please take some time this year and take the family fishin'. You will have a great time with the family catchin' lots of fish.

If you haven't heard, the specks are bitin' and most folks are catchin' their limit. They are only keepin' the good ones for the fryin' pan. Kyle at Bitters Bait and Tackle reports the specks have been bitin' real good in Lake Monroe and in Lake Jesup. Most folks are catchin' their specks on minners fished naked. That means that they aren't usin' jigs tipped with a minner.

Kyle also reports that the specks are bitin' in the St. Johns River. Lots of anglers are havin' good luck in the main river fishin' along the shoreline cover. Look for pad fields, laydowns, and deep bends in the river and you should be able

to locate some nice specks in the river. If you want to stay close to home and you have a favorite lake to fish, you should be able to catch some specks in those lakes as well. If you don't have a lot of cover in those lakes, drift open water and try and find some submerged hydrilla or eel-grass patches. The specks and a few bass will be hangin' around those areas as well.

Kyle also reports that the guides are catchin' some nice bass on wild shiners. The bass will be movin' to the shoreline to spawn, but the conditions will have to be right. We don't have a full moon until January 21. That said, you should be able to find some bass feedin' on bait-fish before they go on the beds. Look for bass to be feedin' on bait-fish throughout the lake. Always look for the birds to be divin' on the baitfish. That's always a good sign that bass are feedin' in that area of the lake.

The bass fishin' on the Harris Chain has been good as of late. I talked to my buddy Josh Davis and he re-

ported that he and his partner, John Brazzell, fished a tournament on New Year's Day on the chain. There were 67 boats in the tournament, so that's a good turnout for the first tournament of the year. The winnin' stringer was five bass that weighed 24 lbs. total.

Josh and his partner didn't make it to the weigh-in. He gave me permission to tell their story. They were fishin' in Lake Eustis and when they went to start the big motor, their batteries were dead. They fished in the same area all day and didn't start the big motor. With all

their electronics and trollin' motor bein' used, they had killed their batteries. The moral of the story is to start the big motor once in a while when you are fishin'. This will help to keep the startin' battery charged so you can make it to the weigh-in in time.

Well, that's it for this week. Let's start the new year off right and let's go fishin'.

thing, is she is my behind-the-scenes, get-everything-done do-it-exactly-right-all-the-time person," Williams said.

"We are not a basketball team; we are a basketball program. There are so many facets to what we do on the floor, off the floor — all three programs — and I trust her totally. Some of that was borne out of relationship watching her coach, then getting to know her son, then getting to coach her son. That relationship has evolved over the course of a decade. She had a great working relationship already with coach (Ian) Young and coach (Earl) Graham.

"Together, the three of them, I don't worry about anything that happens with our JV and freshman program at all. It is such a blessing to have that."

If you think that having a woman coaching the freshman boys bas-

ketball team means the youngsters on the team are getting the soft treatment, you don't know Majja Jackson.

"I run a tight ship, but I love them. It's hard when you have them for only a few weeks, but they grow on you," Jackson said.

"We're all in a text group together. We stay in contact every day, so it's very important that they know that I'm going to do whatever I need to do for them. "I keep in contact with all their teachers. If they get in trouble, they don't start. It's student-athlete and you've got to be a student first. All of those things are important."

Coach Jackson gets the academic part naturally.

A full-time middle school science teacher at West Oaks Academy, Jackson not only added the freshman basketball coaching job to her resume, but she's also a full-time master's degree student, and is raising two more children at home, while also keeping tabs

on Maliek who is at straight-A student at Florida SouthWestern State College in Fort Myers.

She's hoping to be able to secure a teaching job at Apopka High School next year after finishing up her master's degree work.

Originally from New London, Missouri, Jackson began her college academic and basketball career at Culver-Jackson College in Canton, Missouri, about 150 north of St. Louis. She transferred to Hannibal-LaGrange University in Hannibal, Missouri, which is about 35 miles closer to St. Louis.

In her final two years there, the Trojans landed a spot in the NAIA national tournament.

of 72-47 and 45-38 respectively, the Mustangs won. The outcome of the final was 59-47.

Contests were played on three consecutive days (December 27-29).

“Even with the record and the eight-contest winning streak, improvement is needed in order to beat the opponents which will be faced during the FHSAA postseason tournament is why this tournament is important and the essence of preparation,” Butts said. “Suffering a loss is the best teacher though. The overall comparison of the outcome as well as the who, what, why and when of how the score came to be is clear. We already knew more practice as well as repetition is still needed. More specifically, the lesson was reinforcement of more practice and preparation. Application or completing the last step is the problem and overcoming at the level which allows expectations to be met remains to be seen.

“Improvement and inconsistency in executing the subtleties and nuances is the same for us. All season long the coaches have focused, stressed and emphasized the result of failing to execute the subtleties and nuances is losing during the FHSAA postseason tournament. The talk was how can we win and advance

deep into the FHSAA postseason tournament when consistent execution is lacking if proof has already been demonstrated while competing in a much smaller field of eight.”

The single-elimination format was used as far as determining the overall champion. However, a consolation bracket was also used. So three contests were played by every team.

“Committing a mistake in regards to executing those subtleties and nuances a time or two does not cause a loss,” Butts said. “Points left on the table a handful of times because of execution lacking add up over the course of the contest though. We left at least a dozen points on the table in each contest.

“Results produced in this tournament by us is tangible proof of the difference between qualifying for the postseason tournament and advancing deep or even contending for the state championship. When executing subtleties and nuances of the game the result was a run which won the first two contests. Then during the final, the run against us and the difference in the outcome occurred at the same time the subtleties and nuances weren’t executed by us.”

With about three minutes left in the opener, the score was 27-20 in favor of West Oaks. And Polina Nikulochkina scored 25 points.

Man-to-man has been used almost exclusively on defense. However, the switch to the triangle and two was made during a timeout. A 19-0 run ensued and only 10 more points were scored by Nikulochkina afterwards.

Field goal percentage for two-point attempts rose from under 30 before the run to 50. Subsequently, balanced scoring also emerged. Four players totaled at least 10 points.

The outcome of the contest against Jones was determined at the start of the second half. Twelve consecutive and eighteen of the first 20 points put the Mustangs ahead for good.

Although average, the final field goal percentage of 44 was significant once again when considering the increase was from under 20 before the run.

More balanced scoring was once again the difference statistically. The count for players totaling double digits was 9-6.

Over 10 turnovers were committed by both opponents during the runs. Then points converted into during the following possession were 11 and 10, respectively.

DME surged to victory on the strength of a 14-4 run. A 20-12 lead was held by Wekiva with about 6:30 left in the first half.

The lead was never less than seven points after being taken.

Rebound and turnover ad-

vantages in favor of the Mustangs were negated by poor field goal percentage. Taking fewer attempts, the difference was held by DME at 47-29. The number of players producing at least 10 points was 3-2 in favor of DME as well. High-scorer was Isys Grady with 13 points.

“Opportunities to make plays which put teams in position to or prevent opponents from scoring were not completed,” Butts said. “The first several steps were executed but not the last.

“Most tangibly specific proof of the difference when advancing deep into the FHSAA postseason tournament is the inconsistent execution prevented a couple of productive possessions from becoming runs which cut the lead to less than seven and generating an opportunity to win in the closing minutes. Percentages in executing the last step of actually scoring were heavily in DME’s favor and translated to about 12 points, the final deficit.”

Lakewood (St. Petersburg), Oak Ridge, Robinsonwood (Tampa) and Middleburg also participated in the tournament.

“Perhaps another way of putting the lesson learned is we have become to comfortable wearing the Wekiva uniform,” Butts said. “Play is indicative of winning will happen simply because we are the Mustangs attitude. Of-

ensive rebounding was poor for example. Overall rebounds were relatively even during each contest. However, we were out-rebounded significantly in offensive rebounds and the percentage of points given up was over 90. Preventing offensive rebounds is at the very least as much about effort and desire as skill and talent. Other areas in which we executed poorly for stretches were spacing, communication and reacting to defensive rotations. All of which fall under the more general umbrella of recognizing opponents’ mistakes.

“All blame shouldn’t be placed on the players and consistency of the execution is better than at the beginning of the season needs to be noted too. The approach of coaching isn’t working as well as in the past in the sense of the pace with which improvement is occurring. So some changes are required from the coaches as well. There is an entire second half of the season to play and everyone is excited. How much improvement and to the level required for remaining alive when the FHSAA postseason tournament reaches the latter rounds is the other question as the second half of the season begins.”

Two other brackets were held at different locations. Wekiva hosted the Bronze bracket as well.

showing up on the stat line but when the six guys we knew we could count on are all, A-healthy, and B-engaged in playing well, then we are proving to be a pretty good basketball team,” Williams said.

“At the beginning of the year, I think the crucible for us is how well does our guard play continue to mature. John, Jacob, and Rudy have all taken really big strides. I think it has helped us enormously.

“We still have some efficiencies with our ball-handling but it isn’t a guard, it’s a team thing. We need to do a better job of coaching them up in some ways and that falls on me and our staff.”

## Building the bench

While things are good for the Blue Darters, they aren’t perfect and Williams said he is looking for more production off the bench beyond his top six players.

“We have such great hope and confidence in the other guards on our team, and all of them, from time to time, have shown glimpses of being able to be somebody we can throw in and play in a big game and do some things, but, by and large, the consistency and the ability to handle the rigors of who we have to play and the intensity with which we have to do it hasn’t been there,” Williams said.

The coach said he would like the Blue Darters to use their athleticism to play faster, but he is hesitant to because the bench needs to be deeper because a faster pace means more players are needed to rest the starters.

“We have to coach our less-experienced guys – all of whom are talented players, all of whom are capable of helping – to a point where they are stepping on the floor and we know every night this is what I’m going to get from them,” Williams said.

Coach Williams said inside player Earl Lombardi, a sophomore, has been a bright spot off the bench

“We are in this position with this club at least 10 games into the season there is still a substantial gap between our returnees and then from what Earl has

to do from an interior post player position to then the rest of our guys. The gap isn’t because the rest of the guys aren’t working hard in practice and aren’t doing really good things in practice. It just hasn’t translated (to games) yet,” Williams said.

“I think our team can be much, much better if we continue to find a way to be a little deeper,” he said.

“That’s one of the things I hope we can discover in the second half of the season. If we don’t, we don’t. We have the right kids. There is no drop-off in practice. All 12 of our young men in practice give remarkable effort, compete like heck, and want to get better. As long as that maintains itself we are going to continue to improve whether the game-night product has a limited number of players or a bigger number.”

## Bench time

The coach said he sees times when players get frustrated over the lack of playing time, but that as a coach, he takes players out of games for various reasons.

Williams said he’s not against AAU summer basketball as some high school coaches are, but that he sees a trend coming from AAU play.

“In the AAU culture, many programs are beholden to the players they recruit to play for them. Thus, they loathe to take them out of games when they are not playing well, not playing effectively, not playing hard. So what happens is I don’t think players have as good of a self-governing mechanism to pull themselves out of a malaise, whether that malaise is mental or physical,” Williams said.

“I’m still old school enough, I’m like, ‘Come over here. Sit down. I’m not necessarily burying you. We’re going to get you back on the floor, but doggone it, you need to figure it out. You’re not playing the way we think you can play.”

## Important stats

Coach Williams doesn’t rely on stats or even the team’s record to tell him if the Blue Darters are successful, but he does have one particular statistic that he pays close attention to.

Williams looks at of-

fensive rebounding percentage, not just the number of offensive rebounds the Blue Darters pull down. Offensive rebounding percentage is the percent of offensive boards the team gets out of the potential rebounds. In other words, out of every 10 missed shots the Blue Darters have, Williams wants to see his players grab at least four offensive rebounds, meaning his goal is for Apopka to have an offensive rebounding percentage of at least 40 percent.

He uses that statistic to gauge the players’ resolve to hit the glass on the offensive end of the floor.

“It is the prime indicator of our effort level being where it we think it needs to be,” Williams said.

“What I’ve also found for us is it has the greatest effect upon other areas of our performance. If we’re great on the offensive glass, our transition defense and overall defense is better because teams aren’t getting to run. It also means, generally, that we are getting better shots.

“It’s indicative of so many things for us and it’s been remarkably consistent for us over the last three-and-a-half years, and is really a huge barometer for us.”

Anderson leads the Blue Darters in scoring, the most visible statistic, with 13 points per game, while Louis averages 11.5 points. Latimer comes in at 11.1 points, while Etienne averages 8.9 points.

As expected, the bigger guys lead in rebounding as Anderson has 8.2 boards per game, while Louis grabs 6.2 rebounds. Etienne averages 5.2 boards and point guard Latimer is next with 4.6 rebounds per outing.

## Remainder of season

In addition to being 8-2 overall, the Blue Darters are atop the District 9A-3 standings at 2-0. Evans and West Orange are both 1-1, while Wekiva is at 0-2.

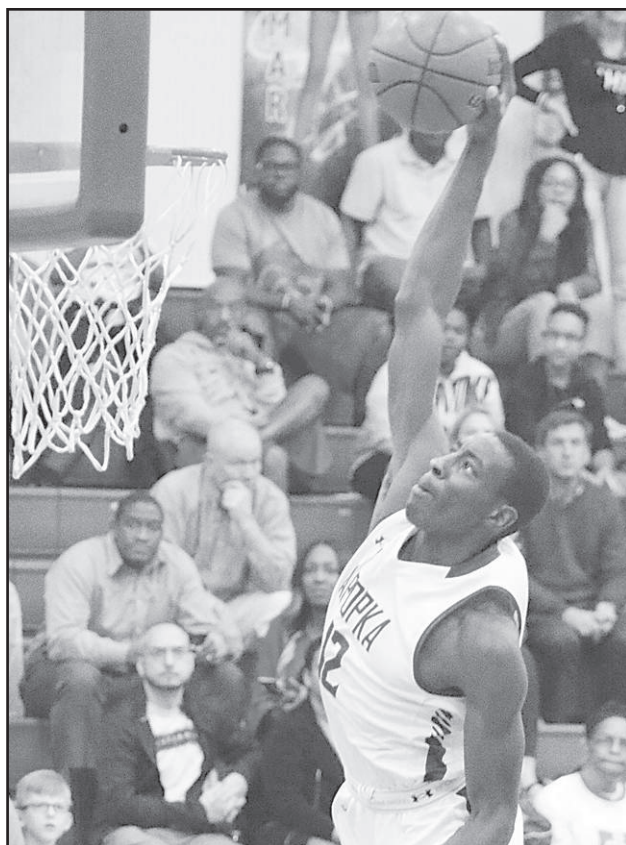
The four-team district is always one of the toughest in the state and securing the top seed ahead of the district tournament doesn’t ever secure an easy tournament semifinal contest.

Apopka handled Evans easily a month ago, winning 53-32, but the Trojans have lost just once since then and thumped two-time defending state champ Leesburg by 20.

“My thought is it doesn’t matter how good you are in the eyes of people in your district. The people in your district just don’t care. There’s no fear. They are prepared, and they know what you do,” Williams said.

“It’s really hard in our district. An Evans team, I think maybe they’ve lost one time since we played them. They’re absolutely steamrolling people, which makes me wonder what the heck did we do? Was it an aberration?”

After their first game in 13 days today, Friday, Jan-

uary 4, at 7 p.m. at Central Florida Christian Academy in Orlando, the Blue Darters will host West Orange on Tuesday, January 8, at 7:30 p.m. in a huge district contest.

“West Orange, year-in and year-out, is the most dangerous team you can play,” Williams said.

“They have depth, athleticism, aggression offensively and defensively that makes it so hard to prepare and also hard to play against.

“You have to really create a mindset of attacking their aggression to be successful. If you’re going to be successful against West Orange, you’ve got to want to attack them. If you become passive against their aggression, they’re really, really good.”

The Warriors have changed a little bit as Darrell Harding, a 6-foot-4 athletic forward, was also an outstanding wide receiver for the West Orange football team and has moved on to Duke University as an early enrollee for the Blue Devils football team coached by David Cutcliffe.

“They’ll be a little bit of a different team, but they are super athletic. They are quick and can shoot it,” Williams said about the Warriors.

Even though Apopka thoroughly handled hometown rival Wekiva 83-50 on

December 20, Williams expects a completely different Mustang squad coached by Gersino Lubin as the teams crank it back up after break over the Christmas and New Year’s holidays.

“Gersino, historically, has done a great job of galvanizing his team over the holidays, and they come back out of the break better,” Williams said.

“I wouldn’t be surprised if they’re right at the level with us and West Orange and Evans coming out of the break. There’s just nothing easy. There just isn’t a walkover (in District 9A-3).”

## Immediately ahead

Apopka jumps back into action today, Friday, January 4, with a 7 p.m. game at Central Florida Christian Academy in Orlando, and then hosts West Orange on Tuesday, January 8, at 7:30 p.m.

The tough schedule continues on Friday, January 11, at 7:30 p.m. as Apopka will play at Dr. Phillips and will face Apopka High alumnus and former basketball player Daniel Batchelor, who now coaches the Panthers.

The Blue Darters will play Saturday, January 12, at 5 p.m. in the Nathan Hayes Challenge at Mount Dora Christian Academy. Apopka will take on always-powerful Oviedo High.

### What services are offered at the Self Help Centers?

The Self Help Center offers assistance to customers in completing court forms, filing documents electronically and providing access to contracted attorneys at an affordable price. Other services available at the Self Help Center are printing, copying, notary and general consultations.

### What types of cases will the Self Help Center offer assistance with?

The Center focuses on assisting customers with Family Law (excluding injunctions), Small Claims, Landlord-Tenant and Eviction cases.

### What is Family Law?

Family Law consists of alimony, child custody/visitation, child support, contempt, divorce, name change, paternity, step-parent adoption, support unconnected with dissolution of marriage and temporary custody.

### How can I schedule an attorney consultation?

Attorney consultations are set by appointment and must be for a minimum of 15 minutes, charged at \$1.00 a minute. Consultations may not exceed more than one hour at one time within a day. You will need a credit card in order to schedule the consultation online

If you do not have access to a computer or smart device at home, you can come to the Self Help Center's two locations to schedule an appointment in person or use a customer computer in room 340.

### When is the Self Help Center open?

### Are there income restrictions to receive services?

No. Services provided at the Self Help Center are not based on your income.

# Do you remember when JFK conducted the first TV interview?

On January 1, 1776, George Washington unveiled the Grand Union Flag during the American Revolution. This flag is known as America's first national flag.

President Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation on January 1, 1863, during the third year of a bloody war, freeing the slaves in the states rebelling against the Union.

On January 1, 1892, Ellis Island in New York Harbor opened. With more than 20 million new arrivals to America processed here, Ellis Island was the nation's busiest immigrant inspection station from 1892 until 1954.

Alaska was admitted as the 49th U.S. state on January 3, 1959. Though it's the largest state in the U.S. by area with a land mass almost one-fifth the size of the lower 48 states together, it's the fourth-least populous state in the nation.

On January 4, 1809, Louis Braille was born in France. Blinded as a boy, he invented a system of reading and writing for the blind or visually impaired by using punch marks in paper. His system, simply known as braille, is still widely used today.

On January 5, 1925, Nellie Tayloe Ross of Wyoming became the first female governor inaugurated in the U.S., and she remains the only female governor of that state. President Franklin Roosevelt delivered his State of the Union address to Congress on January 6, 1941, defining four essential freedoms worth defending. They were freedom of speech, freedom

On January 7, 1714, a patent was issued for the first typewriter designed by British inventor Henry Mill, though it wouldn't be commercially sold until 1868 when three guys from Milwaukee invented a more durable model with new keyboard layout.

The American Telephone and Telegraph Company was broken up on January 8, 1982, giving up 22 local Bell system companies and opening the U.S. telephone system to more competition. AT&T is practically as old as the telephone itself.

On January 8, 1935, the King was born in Tupelo, Mississippi. Elvis Presley was a twinless twin, meaning he had a twin who died at birth.

The world's first underground railway service opened in London on January 10, 1863 -- the Metropolitan line between Paddington and Farringdon.

On January 10, 1878, Senator A.A. Sargent of California presented Congress with an amendment granting women the right to vote. 42 years later, the amendment was passed in 1920!

On January 11, 1964, the U.S. Surgeon General declared cigarettes may be hazardous to health, making it the first official government report on harm caused by smoking.

Benedict Arnold was born in Norwich, Connecticut, on January 14, 1741. He was a general during the American Revolutionary War who turned traitor when he started sending information

to the British army for money. He planned to surrender his command of West Point, New York, over to the British army, but his plans were exposed so he ran off to the British headquarters in New York before he could be caught. When the war ended, he moved to England.

On January 15, 1929, Martin Luther King, Jr. was born in Atlanta, Georgia. An African-American civil rights leader who made big strides toward change during a time of racial inequality, the United States celebrates his birthday with a legal holiday every third Monday in January. King received the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964 and was assassinated in Memphis, Tennessee, on April 4, 1968.

On January 16, 1547 Ivan the Terrible crowns himself as the first Russian Czar despite the fact that he had already been ruling Russia since 1544. Why was he so terrible? During a fit of rage he killed his own son and he had more than 3,000 people of Russian nobility killed during his reign, which lasted until 1584. He did however bring about some reforms to the country including a new legal code and cultural development.

January 16, 1991 Allied aircraft conducted a major raid against Iraqi air defenses, marking start of the first war against Iraq. Broadcast live on CNN, the air raid on Baghdad was referred to as operation Desert Storm by television correspondents.

January 17th is a big day! Not only was Benjamin Franklin born in 1706, but Muhammad Ali was also born on this day in 1942! Double the cake! Franklin was a printer, author, publisher, philosopher, scientist, diplomat, philanthropist and he discovered how electricity works. As if that wasn't enough, he

was also a Founding Father and signed both the Declaration of Independence and the new U.S. Constitution.

Ali became the world heavyweight boxing champion at the age of only 22 in 1964 and when he won he shouted, "I shook up the world!"

On January 20, 1945 Franklin Delano Roosevelt was inaugurated to an unprecedented fourth term as president of the United States. He had served since 1933.

On January 21, 1793 King Louis XVI of France was beheaded after the French Revolution on the charge of conspiring with foreign countries for the invasion of France. During the Revolution King Louis tried to flee to Austria for help but failed to do so. Only ten months after his death, his wife Queen Marie Antoinette was also beheaded via guillotine.

On January 21, 1976 the Concorde supersonic jet began passenger service with flights from London and Paris. The jet could cruise at twice the speed of sound and reach an altitude of 60,000 feet.

On January 22, 1973 the Supreme Court announced its decision in the case of Roe vs. Wade, making abortion legal in the U.S. by striking down local state laws restricting abortions in the first six months of pregnancy.

On January 23, 1849 Elizabeth Blackwell became America's first woman doctor when she was awarded her MD by the Medical Institute of Geneva, New York.

On January 24, 41 AD (we're going way back for this one) Roman Emperor Caligula, who was known for his madness and cruelty, was assassinated at the Palatine Games by his own guard after

being in charge for only four years.

On January 24, 1848 the California gold rush began with the accidental discovery of the golden nuggets near Coloma during the construction of a sawmill. A flood of "Forty-niners" hoping to get rich quick came looking for gold after President Polk made an announcement about the discovery.

On January 25, 1947 Gangster Al Capone, who once controlled organized crime in Chicago, died in Miami at age 48 from syphilis.

On January 25, 1961, President John F. Kennedy conducted the first ever live televised presidential news conference only five days after taking office. He read a prepared statement regarding famine in the Congo, the release of two American aviators from Russian custody and negotiations for an atomic test ban treaty. Afterwards he opened up the floor to questions from reporters.

The British established a settlement in Australia on January 26, 1788, as 778 convicts arrived by ship, setting up a new prison to relieve overcrowded prisons in England.

On January 26, 1998, President Bill Clinton denied the charges that he had a sexual affair with Monica Lewinsky by saying the infamous words, "I did not have sexual relations with that woman."

U.S. involvement in the Vietnam War ended on January 27, 1973, as North Vietnamese and American representatives signed an agreement in Paris. The long and costly war resulted in more than 58,000 Americans deaths.

On January 28, 1915, the U.S. Coast Guard was created

by an act of Congress to safeguard U.S. maritime interests at home, at sea and abroad.

The U.S. Space Shuttle Challenger exploded 74 seconds into its flight on January 28, 1986, killing seven people. One of the passengers on board was Christa McAuliffe, a teacher who would have been the first ordinary person in space.

On January 29, 1919, the 18th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, which upheld prohibition, was ratified. The sale of alcoholic drinks was illegal for nearly 14 years after that. Unexpectedly, prohibition gave rise to much organized crime in the U.S., which resulted in the creation of bootleg liquor.

Adolf Hitler was appointed Chancellor of Germany on January 30, 1933, and went on to become the sole leader of Nazi Germany. He was responsible for the deaths of an estimated 50 million people during the Holocaust, when the Nazis attempted to exterminate the entire Jewish population of Europe in their quest for expansion.

On January 30, 1948, Mahatma Gandhi was assassinated in New Delhi, India, by a religious fanatic. Through nonviolent resistance, Gandhi had ended British rule in India.

German troops surrendered at Stalingrad on January 31, 1943, making it the first big defeat of Hitler's armies in World War II. Few of the captured German troops ever returned to Germany after the war.

On January 31, 1919, Jackie Robinson was born in Cairo, Georgia. He was the first black man to play professional baseball from 1947 to 1956, and he later was elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1962.
