Hampton born again Town's reinvention is a work in progress

In a spectacular reversal of fortune, the city of Hampton has saved itself from the gallows. The legislative delegation made up of Florida Sen. Rob Bradley and Rep. Charles Van Zant voted March 28 to rescind a local bill they passed in February calling for the city to be dissolved—the consequence for everything uncovered by a state audit of the city's finances and operations.

In the weeks since the release of that audit, Hampton has been teased, ridiculed and outright hated internationally as an example of government gone wild, led by ignorance or outright corruption with no accountability for any of its wrongdoing.

But even Van Zant and Bradley—who originally had trouble grasping why Hampton's citizens didn't share their level of outrage at the abuse of power—had to admit that the town could turn out to be a model for other communities.

It's not that Hamptonites weren't mad; they just weren't ready to give up. Tired of years of witnessing corruption they felt hopeless in opposing, they demanded an opportunity to change things for the better once all that was dark was finally brought to light.

Given a short time to show progress, Hampton citizens embraced self-governance. They attended meetings and town halls to ask questions, offer input and hold their officials responsible for the work that needed to be accomplished. One of them, Dan Williams, ascended to the council by appointment to offer precisely the kind of leadership that had been missing.

It was Williams who spent most of last Friday's delegation meeting updating legislators and the public about the steps that are being taken to repair the city.

Victory Baptist turned out to be the perfect setting for the story of rebirth. An ordained minister himself, Williams said it was no good trying to rebuild the city on an old foundation. From his perspective, the town is being rebuilt

Community mourns teen who drowned

The death of a 15-year-old Bradford High School student has saddened classmates and friends and motivated them to reach out with the rest of the community in support of the boy's family.

Steven Austin Toms of Starke passed away at UF Health Shands Hospital in Gainesville on March 27, several days after a drowning incident in a local pond.

Investigator Kevin Mueller of the Bradford County Sheriff's Office said Steven was swimming at a friend's house on C.R. 235 on March 22 when he went under. Witnesses thought he was joking around, but quickly became concerned when he did not resurface. They began searching for him in earnest. Unable to find him in the deep water, their screams alerted the homeowner and others at the residence, who responded by diving in and pulling Steven out of the pond.

He was flown by helicopter to the Gainesville hospital, where Mueller said he was breathing via life support but never recovered. The medical examiner's report was incomplete at press time, but his death was being attributed to drowning. Mueller said the drowning could have been related to a history of seizures.

As word of the accident spread, so did concern for Steven and his family. A prayer chain was even created on Facebook, and his mother, Tracy Toms, encouraged positive thoughts by asking people to share stories about her son and photos.

Sheriff's office cleans house with latest sting

The Bradford County Sheriff's Office is making a habit of catching drug users with whimsically named operations.

Similar to 2013's Operation Walking Dead, BCSO carried out Operation Spring Cleaning last

week, arresting 10 suspects on drug and other charges.

Most remained in jail as of press time, some under very high bail amounts.

According to Capt. Brad Smith, BCSO Drug Unit deputies positioned themselves at a Starke motel on March 25, working

with confidential informants and posing as drug dealers.

In addition to the 10 arrests, Capt. Smith said four vehicles were confiscated along with more than \$1,200.

Sheriff Gordon Smith said Operation Spring Cleaning was the latest proactive attack on

illegal drug activity in Bradford County.

"I want the honest citizens of this county to know we are going to continue our efforts to make Bradford County a safe place to live and prosper," Sheriff Smith

Starke police solve two robberies

Starke police believe they have solved two robberies with the arrests of five suspects on Saturday night.

According to Starke Police Department Capt. Barry Warren, the department responded to an "armed robbery" call from the Little Caesar's on Orange Street in Starke around 10 p.m. on March 29.

Dispatch informed Sgt. Paul King that a suspect armed with a handgun had run from the businesses. A block away, two suspects were seen joining another group, and all of the suspects got into a white sedan and drove away.


With that information, King was able to locate the suspect vehicle and conduct a traffic stop. When backup arrived, all five of the vehicles occupants were taken into custody.

While detained, investigators established probably cause of the suspects' involvement in the robbery, and they were arrested. During a vehicle search, they discovered an undisclosed amount of money and two weapons, both semiautomatic BB guns.


Warren said those arrested matched suspect descriptions in a similar robbery that took place in the early morning hours of March 26 at the Island Food Store located on South Temple Avenue in Starke. Additional charges are pending.

All suspects arrested were teenagers. The youngest is a 14-year-old whose identity is being withheld as investigators work to glean information about other crimes. The juvenile was the suspect who entered Little Caesars and faces charges of robbery and aggravated

from the ground up, but it took the crisis of nearly losing the town to get to this point.

"I hope everyone here tonight is genuinely and sincerely disgusted with what has been going on in this city," Williams said. He encouraged those present to stay involved, because they were taking their town back.

Williams addressed the specific goals Bradley and Van Zant had set for the city, including pulling the city limits back from U.S. 301 to prevent any future traffic enforcement by the city.

Interim city attorney John Cooper, who also prepared the ordinances extending the city's boundaries in 1993 and 1994, is now working on the ordinance to relinquish U.S. 301 and the corner gas station at 301 and C.R. 18. Everything up to 301, including the Fox Hollow Subdivision, will remain in the city limits.

Van Zant said the motive was not to prevent the city from growing in the future, but 301 is off limits because of how city police preyed on the public in the past.

Williams and recently hired City Clerk Amy Davis have been looking over the city books, including the numbers for the city water utility, and taking stock of who is current, who is behind and who is really behind in their payments. To their surprise, there are actually a number of customers with positive balances, customers who continued paying even when there was no one to send out the bills.

There are also some who haven't paid in quite some time. Those customers stand to lose their water, and anyone discovered to be stealing city water during the ongoing mapping of the water system could face even more dire consequences. Utility theft will not be tolerated, Williams said, and anyone not in good standing with the city has until May 1 to make it right.

The water has been tested, and it's safe. Although nothing is certain until the mapping work and subsequent analysis are complete, water rates are not expected to rise. Williams further said the Hampton's general government would not be funded by its business activities.

"I don't want the general fund having to depend on the water department for its survival," he said.

Water rates could even come down for utility customers outside the city limits. Those customers pay a 15 percent surcharge for water service, but they also have no voice in city government, and Van Zant said that is tantamount to taxation

without representation.

There will no longer be visits to customers' houses to collect water payments. Payments can be mailed to city hall or dropped off there—and not to the home of any city official, Williams said. Steps have been taken to assure the security of the funds paid to the city and to keep records of what is collected and spent.

Bradley's questions primarily focused on the city budget and whether the city was bringing in enough to meet its obligations. He and Van Zant were both adamant that the city not have a credit card or credit card debt.

"The quickest way for a government to get in trouble is to have a credit card," Bradley said, and Davis agreed.

The current credit card balance is at least partially based on the purchase of a computer for the police department, although the whereabouts of the computer are unknown. The city is receiving help from the sheriff's office on tracking down property from former employees.

The audit found that the city was lacking policies and procedures in many areas. Stepping up to advise the city is Robert Yehl, a Valdosta State professor of political science with a background in city management and municipal organization, who will visit the Hampton this month and examine what the city has and what it needs.

In spite of all the public shaming of Hampton, Yehl's is the latest of many offers of assistance the city has received since the release of the audit, including attorney Cooper, engineer Jerome Kelley, the Florida Department of Environmental Protection and the Florida Rural Water Association, whose water system mapping will pinpoint all of the current meters and perhaps locate leaks contributing to the large water loss.

The city has also received a grant for water tank revitalization in the amount of \$25,000 that will pay for future inspection and any needed repairs.

In addition, the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, the state attorney's office and the sheriff's office are cooperating on a criminal investigation. The sheriff's office is also in charge of day-to-day law enforcement, and that will likely remain the case as citizens are asked to delete the position of town marshal from the city charter in an upcoming referendum.

The remaining city officials have offered resignations, which will be effective in October. In September, voters will elect an entirely new council as well as a mayor. Those with the most votes will get two-year terms, and the other top candidates will serve for one year.

In addition to eliminating the town marshal position, there will

also be questions on the ballot about cleaning up the charter in other ways, such as striking positions for town treasurer and tax collector and possibly moving future elections to coincide with county, state and federal elections.

The election will take place on Tuesday, Sept. 9. Candidates will qualify between July 21 and 25, although the method is still in question. Supervisor of Elections Terry Vaughan, who will assist with the election, said the city charter does not specify the qualification method and they are researching whether the city has an ordinance on qualifying. Most likely, candidates will pay a fee equivalent to a small percentage of the annual salary for a council position, which totals around \$1,200 or \$1,500. Five percent of that would equal \$60 to \$75.

Van Zant and Bradley's tone had changed since the meeting a month ago, when their attempt to save the town from itself was met with cries for mercy and pleas for help. By the time they announced they were ready to rescind the local bill to abolish Hampton, they were also announcing a post-election barbecue as a final act of peacemaking.


Bradley said as the process of healing continues, the people will always have the support of the state in moving forward.

"Our message to you is you're not alone," he said.

"You've done well, and we commend you for the efforts that you've made here," Van Zant said.

Early in the meeting Van Zant described his and Bradley's role as digging down to make sure government at every level is serving the people. While many outsiders took pleasure in Hampton's near downfall, some closer to home were more upset with the legislators. Van Zant's character was attacked at February's hearing, and Bradley was called out for his comments about Hampton in the press. Last Friday, they acknowledged the city's rebirth.

"Tonight's a new beginning for the people of Hampton, and



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I am deeply honored and proud to represent people with the strength and desire to build a community," said Bradley. After all of the Hampton bashing, he said the city would be an example to other communities.

Van Zant compared the process to the agony of actual childbirth.

"You could not have continued the way you were. The city of Hampton would have dissolved itself eventually," he said.

Van Zant is hoping for a large number of candidates in September's election.

"I want to encourage everybody who hasn't ever served on the city council to run for office. Is that plain enough? We want to see some new blood. We want to see a genesis in the city of Hampton," he said.

That goes double for those who have been critical of the city, but uninvolved.

"If you've been complaining, now is your chance to right the wrong," said Van Zant.

Candidates who plan to run will have through the end of qualifying week in July to make that announcement for free in the newspaper. You don't have to wait until qualifying week to announce your intention to run, and all announcements must be received by Monday, July 28, at 5 p.m. in order to run for free.

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It's (nearly) settled: Teachers, district agree on pay

The months-long fight over how to distribute funds from the state earmarked for employee raises is over, pending votes by the union membership and school board.

The last remaining barrier was removed March 27 when the school district's negotiating team struck proposed language preemptively rolling back employee salaries to 2012-13 levels if this year's funding doesn't reoccur in next year's budget.

According to the Bradford Education Association, if that happens, then both sides need to return to the table and negotiate a solution. Its team would not agree to an automatic rollback, and even declared they were at an impasse in discussions, so the district gave up asking.

"We're going to go on trust—trust and a prayer—that all will work out well," said Walter Carr, the district's lead negotiator, of next year's budget.

It was a small but meaningful victory for the union after members had to accept that the

district would add nothing to the \$500,000 raise package allocated by the state, and employees would receive their portion as part of—not in addition to—their annual step raise.

While that means most teachers, including those at the top of the salary schedule, will receive \$1,400 more, BEA President Kellie Clark said in certain cases that is less than some more senior teachers would have received from their scheduled step raise.

Noninstructional education support employees were offered 55 cents more per hour. In some cases, this, too, was less than a step up the salary schedule.

Clark said it was a hard pill to swallow, but in spite of any disappointment, BEA's negotiators agreed to take the deal to its members for ratification on April 4. The school board is set to vote on the contract at its April 14 meeting.

BEA was not willing to grant the district's request for more time to notify annual employees that they may not be asked back.

The deadline for principals to deliver those letters was April 1, but Randy Whytsell, director of

human resources for the district, said evaluations were ongoing and principals wanted more time.

BEA has agreed to an extension in the past. Whytsell said the alternative was to send out warning letters putting all annual employees on notice.

The union didn't accept that. Betsy Reagor, a coordinator for BEA, pointed out that teachers were expected to stick to a deadline for notifying the district of their intent to return next year, but principals want an extension.

"The principals know who they're going to keep," Reagor said. "Most of the walkthroughs should be done by now or your administrators aren't doing their jobs."

The extension was not granted.

There are still contract issues that haven't been agreed on, including the standards for evaluating instructors who are not teaching FCAT classes. The district, working with a committee of teachers, offered a plan that links final exam grades to the FCAT performance categories.

FCAT performance falls into one of five levels, with Level 5 being the highest, but teachers

looking at the equivalent final exam score of 95 to 100 percent thought that scale was too narrow. Few students score 95 or above on a final exam, which lowers a teacher's chances of being ranked highly effective.

Teachers evaluated based on student FCAT performance aren't necessarily better off, however. Looking at the 10th-grade reading results from last year, only six of 194 students tested scored highly effective in reading, so the top scale might not be far that off.


There were also concerns about the bottom end of the scale where teachers might not be given credit for the learning gains of low-performing students.

Assistant Superintendent Lisa Prevatt didn't agree that a score of 55 could be considered growth if it is still a failing grade, but she admitted that the scale was not based on historical data comparing students' final exam and FCAT performance, so the district was asked to take a more thorough look.

These and other matters await agreement in future sessions.





School policies, finances scrutinized in audit

A state audit of the Bradford County School District for Fiscal Year 2013 has raised some financial red flags and repeated warnings about the security of the district's technology.

No material weaknesses in financial reporting and no issues of noncompliance on other matters were disclosed in the audit, but auditors did note other matters, many repeat findings related to the district's information technology department.

The financial statements also show that expenditures exceeded revenues, and this resulted in a lowering of the district's fund balance.

For the second time, School Board Member Randy Jones wanted to know what was being done to address the findings that have showed up in the audit for three years now. Beyond the responses to the findings the district has submitted to the state, Jones said he wanted the administration to develop and

stick to time lines for addressing these problems.

"Just a blanket, 'We're working on it,' doesn't work for my people anymore," Jones said. He said he wants good answers to give people when they ask questions.

"Let's start cleaning up this list," he said.

Superintendent Chad Farnsworth said the district would do that. On a positive note, he said all of the findings seem within reach.

"It is a little bit disheartening that we see some of them repeat, so we're going to do our best to set some timelines on that," Farnsworth said.

School Board Member Roman Alvarez noted that most of the findings dealt with technology, and said it's not only important that the district eliminate audit findings but that it achieve its goals where technology is concerned.

Farnsworth said the district is undergoing a big transitional period in terms of technology—including the transition to a new software system, training personnel, etc. It is one

department that will continue to grow, he said, as technology is integrated more and more into education.

"I'm excited about where we're heading, actually," Farnsworth said, but he acknowledged the need to develop policies and controls to be ready for that.

For three years the audit has found that the district IT department is running without important policies and procedures for functions such as administering accounts, resetting passwords, prohibiting access to administrative functions and deactivating privileges for former employees.

According to the audit, the district needs to put a security awareness training program in place so personnel are properly trained on handling sensitive information, including student records. Training is also needed on securely storing data, password protection, malicious software and virus threats, etc. Without spelling out specific weaknesses for security purposes, auditors told the district once again that controls are needed to logging

and monitoring system activity and user authentication.

In addition, the district needs to classify its data and maintain documentation about who is authorized access to what. And, it needs program change controls in place to ensure that untested, unauthorized or erroneous updates are not brought into the system.

The district also needs a complete disaster recovery plan in place for its IT operations, as well as a plan for responding to security incidents.

The district doesn't have tight enough control over its physical property either, according to the audit. A full inventory was performed in 2013, and in September, auditors selected 17 items to track and found that five computers came up missing. The cost of the property totaled more than \$6,000, and while they were supposed to be located at the high school, personnel couldn't explain why they were missing.

Auditors said their need to be annual reconciliations of records to physical inventories, and missing property should be investigated and reported to law enforcement. This was the second recommendation the district received about its property.

This was also the third year auditors found that the district didn't have a documented process for determining which

assault with a weapon.

said.

Jamie Renee Prevatt, 23, of Starke was lured to the motel with the promise of collecting money owed to her by a confidential source. While there, she and her two companions negotiated the purchase of six Lortab pills and one Oxycodone. The "bust signal" was given when the defendants returned to their vehicle. In addition to the trio, officers found a child strapped into a car seat who had been left in the vehicle when the defendants entered the motel.

Prevatt was charged with child neglect as well as two counts of purchasing drugs. Bail was set at \$55,000, and she was still in jail as of press time.

In addition to being charged with purchasing drugs, Edward Allen Grover, 46, of Lawtey was charged with destroying evidence after admitting to swallowing two Lortabs and an Oxycodone when officers descended up on

the vehicle. He was transported to Shands Starke and then booked at the Bradford County Jail, where he remains without bond because he violated his probation.

Billie Jean Saxon, 29, of Starke was the third defendant in the group arrested, charged with two counts of purchasing drugs. Bail was set at \$50,000, and she remains in jail as of press time.

Ahmad Rashawn Hudson, 36, of Starke stayed in his car and ordered another suspect to enter the motel and purchase 18 Oxycodone pills, which were given to him when the suspect returned to the car. Hudson was arrested and charged with purchasing drugs, but the judge set his bail amount at \$1 million because of his multiple drug-related arrests over the past year. He remains in jail as of press time.

James Stephen Belflower, 40, was arrested with 0.9 grams of hydrocodone wrapped in a cigarette wrapper. He was charged with possession with intent to sell. Bail was set at \$50,000, and he was in jail as of press time.

James Tyrone Davy, 40, of Starke told 0.4 grams of crack cocaine to a confidential source, and exchanged crack cocaine for Roxicontin. He was charged with two counts of cocaine possession, two counts of selling cocaine and one count of purchasing an opiate. Bail was set at \$125,000, and he was still in jail as of press time.

Angel Garrison, 40, of Starke was arrested for purchasing Oxycodone from a confidential source. Bail was set at \$15,000, and she was still in jail as of press time.

Vernon Richard Goodwin, 41, of Starke was arrested for purchasing Oxycodone from a confidential source. He was released on March 25.

Robert James Newman, 29, of Lawtey was arrested for purchasing Oxycodone from a confidential source. Bail was set at \$25,000, and he was released on March 26.

Alonzo Williams, 45, of Starke was arrested for selling 0.1 grams of crack cocaine to a confidential source and possessing an additional 0.1 grams. Bail was set at \$130,000, and he remains in jail as of press time.

BC teens tell Big Tobacco:

'We are not replacements'

The tobacco industry is losing customers. Not only are more smokers quitting, every day an estimated 1,315 people in the United States die because of smoking.

According to opponents, the tobacco industry targets a new generation of potential nicotine addicts, which they call "replacement smokers" in 1984 internal document from R.J. Reynolds: "Younger adult smokers are the only source of replacement smokers. ... If younger adults turn away from smoking, the industry must decline, just as a population which does not give birth will eventually dwindle."

On Kick Butts Day, Bradford County's Students Working Against Tobacco clubs spoke up and took action to let Big

Tobacco know they will be not replacements. Kick Butts Day, which this year was celebrated on March 19, is the Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids' national day of activism that empowers youth to fight back against Big Tobacco.

Bradford High SWAT youth had an informational booth set-up at the Bradford County Fair and reached thousands of residents and visitors. The SWAT club set up a fortune teller booth and told visitors of how tobacco use could impact their future.

"We wanted to inform and educate Bradford County youth and other community members on how tobacco companies market to young people," said Mackenzie Gault, BHS SWAT president. "440,000 people die each year from tobacco-related diseases. We hope by educating the youth in Bradford County they will not become tobacco users now or in the future."

For each smoking-related death, at least two youth or young adults become regular smokers each day. These young people rarely consider the long-term health consequences of smoking when they start. Because of nicotine, a highly addictive drug, three out of four youth continue smoking well into adulthood, often with serious and even deadly consequences. In fact, about half of long-term smokers will die prematurely from smoking-related causes.

"Events like Kick Butts Day help youth understand that they are the targets of the tobacco industry," said Dr. Barry Hummel of the Quit Doc Research and Education Foundation, which coordinates the Tobacco Free Partnership and SWAT in Bradford County. "Nothing is more eye-opening to a teenager than to realize that they are being manipulated into making a bad decision, a decision that will have life-long consequences. Sadly, teenagers still make up 85 percent of new

ACROSS THE GARDEN FENCE

What are those colorful shrubs with the pink, white or magenta colors? You must have seen the showy flowers of azaleas. Those blankets of flowers are one of my favorite and I look forward to them every spring. Azaleas do well in well-drained, acidic, partially shaded landscapes that experience four to eight weeks below 50 degrees. They thrive in the dappled sunlight under pine trees or under open planted oaks that allow some exposure to sunlight.

The best thing about azaleas is the amount of color they are capable of displaying. Some of the plantings are over 10 feet tall and can run for a hundred feet or more, creating vibrant walls of color that can serve as a landscape focal point or be used as border plantings for white flowered dogwoods or pink colored redbud trees.

How do I plant azaleas? The planting hole for an azalea plant should be approximately 12 inches wider than the root mass and are generally spaced 3 to 5 feet apart. Azaleas have very fibrous root systems that easily become pot bound. Before planting, gently loosen the root ball and saturate it with water. Set the plant in the hole at or above the depth at which it was growing in the container, fill the hole with native soil and water again.

Use an organic mulch 2 to 3 inches deep to cool the roots, conserve water and reduce weed problems. Make sure the mulch does not cover the top of the root ball or touch the stem. Transplanting azaleas is best in winter but containerized azaleas may be planted any time if proper care is provided.

How often is water needed? Azaleas transplanted during dry spells should be watered

two to three times a week until they are established. Generally, established plants should receive about three-quarters to one inch of water every 10 days to two weeks.

How do I fertilize my azaleas? Frequent and light fertilizer applications are often necessary in Florida's sandy soils. An acid-forming fertilizer containing iron and other micronutrients (sometimes sold as an "Azalea Special Fertilizer") should be applied as needed. Micronutrients should be applied with foliar sprays or soil-applied products when deficiencies occur.

Do I need to prune my azaleas? Flower buds form in late spring and early summer, so pruning should cease in midsummer (July 4 is an easy date to remember). Pruning lightly several times after flowering until July 4 will result in a compact, denser plant.

Shop for azaleas now! I like to shop for azaleas when they are flowering so I am sure I am getting the colors I want. Azaleas come in many colors; there are white, red, pink, coral and magenta varieties. There are also dwarf varieties although I don't know why anyone would want one because the big ones are so spectacular! There are several varieties to choose from.

Before you go shopping scout out your landscape to see if the size of mature plant, flower characteristics and bloom season will suit you. North Florida is also home to several native species, most of which are deciduous and have fragrant flowers.

Following a chicken and rice supper, Parmenter told the members of Pine Hill Lodge that Brooker Elementary School is experiencing many challenges, including growth and student testing. She told members that a mentoring program, called TALKS needed volunteers. Each Thursday afternoon an

adult male volunteer meets with three male students to exchange information outlined in the TALKS mentoring book.

The vision of this program is to share wisdom between generations with the purpose of leading young men to make personal commitments to integrity and excellence.

Another program that Parmenter mentioned is the return of Bible Club, an initiative of Brooker Baptist Church. As a special part of this before-school club, there will be a fieldtrip for club members to Melrose for the In His Wakes experience. Here students will learn to "get off the dock" by learning to ski, hydroslide and tube.

This opportunity, however, requires approximately \$150 per student. She told the lodge members that she would provide additional information to assist in making decisions as how they might help.

One question about the FCAT

testing program seemed to be of particular interest to everyone. Parmenter believed the school was ready to achieve a B or an A rating, but recent changes in grading criteria have clouded their predictions.

"Because we are a small school, the impact of each individual student is exceptionally weighty on the school grade. In fact, the performance of just six students can swing us anywhere from an A to an F," she said.

She also mentioned the new test that will replace the current FCAT next school year would add to the challenges of preparing the school.

"Brooker is an excellent school with profound teachers that is providing a first-rate education for the students of this community," she said.

Parmenter's presentation regarding the youth in the Brooker community was extremely well received and appreciated.



instructional personnel are entitled to differentiated pay based on additional responsibilities, school demographics, etc. Such a process is required by Florida law.

Auditors also noted a need to develop policies and procedures to evaluate ongoing maintenance and special construction projects to make sure the most cost-effective or efficient processes are being filed.

While there was no finding related to finances, the district has to keep a close eye on its

spending and the impact on its reserves. Revenue for Fiscal Year 2013 totaled \$29.3 million, but expenses added up to \$30.9 million. The general fund balance dropped \$1 million to \$3 million.

According to Jones, the district has already received a letter from the Florida Department of Education and must develop a financial recovery plan to address the dwindling fund balance.

Ideally, the unreserved fund balance should not fall below 3 percent of the total budget. Falling below 2 percent, means the state could intervene.

Farnsworth tied the funding problem to declining enrollment.

"There's only so much you can do to try to increase that," he said. "We're pulling out all the stops."

The superintendent said stability is being achieved with the consistency of school administration, there are quality instructors in the classroom, and they are promoting their efforts and programs to the community. The district predicts these efforts will turn enrollment around, but in the meantime, Farnsworth said the budget would have to be based on the funding that is available.

"It's going to be a difficult process," he said. "We've got some tight times ahead of us."

Bradford woman earns medals for equestrian dressage

Meridith Babnick and her horse Yoshi are a team. Whatever success they achieve in the sport of dressage cannot be attained

without one or the other.

Therefore, as proud as Babnick is of the United States Dressage Federation bronze and silver medals she has earned, she is quick to give credit where credit is due.

"I do have to give the horse most of the credit," she said. "He is just my rock. If I'm feeling nervous, he helps me out. We're a really good team."

Babnick, who is the owner of Euphoria Stables in Bradford County, has been competing in dressage events for seven years. The word "dressage" is derived from the French word for "training." Dressage tests are held in arenas that consist of different stations denoted by letters of the alphabet. At each station, the horse and rider are expected to execute pre-defined moves.

Judges are evaluating such things as the horse's flexibility, responsiveness to its rider and balance.

"It's like ballet with your horse," Babnick said.

The horse's performance should seem effortless, with little effort exerted by the rider as well. Babnick said riders use natural aids (legs, rear end) and artificial aids (whip, spurs) to get

the horse to perform.

"Essentially, you do as much as you can with your natural aids while being invisible," Babnick said. "You just increase the degree of (body) pressure to get what you want from the horse."

Dressage tests, which change after a number of years, are composed of levels. Riders can apply for medals after achieving the necessary scores within designated levels.

There is no set time frame in which one can achieve scores and apply for medals.

"You can get scores throughout your whole lifetime," Babnick said. "Usually, the sport takes until you're about 70 to master."

Babnick, who is 34, earned her bronze medal after competing for five years. Two years later, she earned her silver medal.

"I think only 800 people in the U.S. have their silver medal," Babnick said. "It's really tough to get."

As she competes at higher levels in hopes of achieving a

gold medal, Babnick will be among more international and Olympic-level riders.

"To get your silver medal, it's kind of denoting that you've made the leap from being a U.S.-level rider to riding with the big boys," Babnick said.

The sport of dressage is European in origin. Europeans

have been breeding for dressage for so long that their horses tend to be better than horses bred in the U.S., though Babnick said, "The U.S. is creating some really fantastic horses and slowly and surely getting better breeding programs, but it's a long process."

Yoshi is from Germany and

A tip of the hat to those who surveyed Bradford Co.

Patrick Welch keeps an office between the courthouse and a pizza restaurant, but much of his work is done outdoors in fields, forests, marshes, swamps, roads and homesteads all over the county.

Welch is actually the 21st century model of an important figure that has been around—or passed through here—before there was a county. Welch is a surveyor.

As early as the Continental Congress, an act called for all U.S. land to be surveyed. Secretary of State John Quincy Adams signed the Florida Purchase Treaty in 1819, which officially took Florida from Spain and gave it to the fledgling United States. Formal U.S. occupation began in 1821; Gen. Andrew Jackson, a hero of the 1812 War, was appointed Florida's military governor. Florida officially became a U.S. territory in 1822.

The Spanish, British and others had drawn maps of the peninsula for more than 200 years. Great swaths of land, fairly accurately but generally described, had been given away in land grants to political hangers-on of European potentates. But it wasn't until Florida became a U.S. territory in 1822 that Florida began to be surveyed in earnest. That would be important, since Spanish land grants were still in effect till landowners were told otherwise. The U.S. government immediately instituted a program to settle the new territory by giving away 40-acre plots to any daring pioneer who would homestead. This would require surveyors.

Florida's earliest surveyors had to have been brave men, for just as Florida became a territory, the Seminole Wars began.

Alone or in small groups of two or three, the surveyors' work took them into the deepest, most uninhabited woods, forests and swamps, where they worked alone with no particular protection other than their own guns, instruments and supplies.

A number of early surveyors were killed by marauding Indians. Several times, surveyors called off their work and retreated to the nearest forts or sizeable towns until native unrest died down.

Still, slowly but surely, the work was done. An 1844 drawing on file in the state archives shows that less than half of the state had been surveyed, and most of that was above present-day Orlando. Broad sections and ranges had been drawn in, but not necessarily numbered, including lands around what became Bradford County. A few fingers reached down as far south as Leesburg, but the area we know today as the Ocala National Forest hadn't

yet been fully described. The southwestern portion of the state, around today's Tampa and St. Petersburg, had been surveyed, but the middle and southeastern areas were open, empty maps, with fanciful drawings of flora and waters around Lake Okeechobee and the Everglades.

Welch inherited some of Bradford County's earliest survey maps, including an area map surveyed and drawn by esteemed government surveyor A.M. Randolph. That map was completed in 1853, four years before Starke was established with its own post office, and five years before the Third Seminole War ended. (By then, fighting

was centered in South Florida.) Randolph's map shows a broad overview of the general terrain and water bodies in Northeast Florida, and divides the region into townships and ranges.

Readers may recall that a globe or map has latitudinal and longitudinal lines, which intersect to form a series of squares. Surveyors refer to a selected or prime north/south meridian as a base line. The area between any two such lines includes four 24-mile vertical ranges numbered west to east.

Latitudinal lines running east to west intersect with meridian lines. Inside the squares formed by those intersections, four 6-mile townships are numbered south to north. However, finding Township 3 does you no good; there could be hundreds of Township 3s on a survey map.

If you select a line designated as a principal meridian—the base line—you can more easily

find areas like the northeast quarter of section 28, township 6, range 22 east. And that would put you right in the middle of present-day downtown Starke, between Church and Adams streets running east and west, and between Jackson and South streets running north to south.

That area, in fact, is one of the earliest survey maps of Starke Welch. The map was first surveyed and drawn by a man named Coachman in 1881, but Welch's map is apparently an exact, redrawn copy, done by H.E. Lagergren in 1892. Not much is known about Coachman.

Hjalmer Edward Lagergren, however, was a Swedish immigrant who came to Bradford County in 1872. He began to practice his craft right away and served as a principal county surveyor until his death in 1938. Lagergren had little formal education, but was a self-taught

surveyor, learning his trade from textbooks and magazines. The first instruments he used in the field he made himself. A versatile renaissance man, he also worked as a writer and business manager at the Bradford County Telegraph.

Given that Starke's streets were already laid out and named, with blocks and lots already numbered by the time Coachman did his survey, it's unlikely that


Northside Baptist pastor leaving after 17 years

Coachman's 1881 survey map was the first survey of the town, but it may be the first such survey map that still exists.

On a 1928 survey map, Lagergren wrote an extensive note on one of Bradford's boondoggles. Simon J. Temple, timber and lumber man turned housing developer, had a large tract surveyed for a subdivision for lot resale and home building.

Temple's subdivision had been planned in 1888 by William Lake, and stakes were set when land sales required them. "The initial point was set in the railway track," Lagergren wrote. "The system was good and convenient. But the fact was overlooked that already lands in the territory had been sold as fractions of 'forties,' according to the government survey."

Lagergren added, "Furthermore, about 1896, through a sheriff's sale, Truby, Sternberg and Co. acquired all the lands in the subdivision still owned by S.J. Temple...The two survey systems in the same territory has been a source of

much trouble to surveyors, tax assessors and title abstractors and deeds to lands in the territory frequently saw incongruous descriptions."

Subdivision corner stakes (usually crudely shaped "lightwood stakes") were mistaken for "forty" corners and vice versa. There were overlaps and spots called gores that could not be legally claimed by anybody. In an especially accomplished feat, Lagergren drew a survey map juxtaposing both surveys on top of each other to illustrate the difference.

Welch said recently that he knew of the problems brought up by these and other surveys—or lack of surveys—over the years, but he thought that by now, most of the errors had been corrected.

The changing nature of survey instruments required surveyors to make other adjustments. Surveyors had to have some familiarity with coordinating the positions of stars and land, since that is a basis of latitude and longitude; knowledge of a sextant was required. Other tools varied, including something as simple as a chain of 100 links, producing a land unit called, appropriately enough, a chain.

Heliotropes employed mirrors, which reflected light, sometimes across distances of 100 miles or more. In the 1800s, instruments known as alidades and transits were used, but were actually variations on earlier tools for navigation and mapping the earth's surface. Twentieth-century innovations included the Geodimeter, introduced in the early 1950s, and which used laser beams. "Total stations" combined transits and theodolites, but had to be readjusted for accuracy from time to time.

These days, Welch said, it's all done by GPS. "I can do in an hour what used to take me a day," he said. It also helps that the information can be transferred from field instruments to a computer; survey maps are now drawn with CAD or computer aided design software.

Like Lagergren, Welch was not formally trained for surveying before he took up the skill. Welch was born and raised in Madison County, but was looking for a job. Bradford resident Leroy Jackson invited him to come to Starke and work in his Suwanee Grocery on West Call Street while the young man

found his moorings.

One Sunday, Welch was minding the store and chatting with a passing survey crew that came in for sodas and supplies. One of the men suggested he talk to their supervisor about a job. The man Welch spoke with was Merrill G. McMillan, the grandson of H.E. Lagergren. Welch was hired and trained over time and has been surveying ever since.

Still fit and hardy from all that outdoor living, Welch said he's not even thinking about retiring or slowing down.

Just as Native Americans caused problems because they were wary of losing their territory, modern landowners are also defensive. Welch said that one Bradford property owner told him in dark tones there was no county road running through his property. Every map Welch had seen had a county road running through the site, and as Welch stood at the property, he could see where a county road had been laid out.

Welch said the landowner still insisted, "There isn't a county road on this property."

Dear Jan:

I want to tell you about a program I have been allowed to join. A Dog Training program called the "ROCK Hounds". As you know, Union Correctional Institution is located in Raiford, Florida and is known as "The Rock". It is the Alcatraz of Florida, housing the toughest, most violent inmates in the state. Once home of the original death-house and still the

location of the majority of death-row inmates as well as a large number of psychological status-confinement inmates, it also houses 1200 inmates over the age of 50 in an "elderly" general population. Now the "Rock" in "Rock Hounds" is an acronym for "Rehabilitation of Castaway K-9s". Dogs that were abused, neglected, or abandoned are taken from animal shelters and placed in a 12 week long program designed to help them become well-adjusted, house-broken pets with basic command training in order to succeed in their adoptive homes. The Rock Hounds is sponsored by First Coast No More Homeless Pets (FCNMHP). The training program we use was designed by Jay King's Dog Academy. A lot of hard work and dedication was required from Warden Diane Andrews, Assistant Warden over programs Mr. S.B. Rossiter, and program supervisor Officer Parrish. Without their belief in and support of this program, it wouldn't exist here. The dogs we receive have sometimes been, among other things, tied to a tree and starved, kicked, beaten cruelly, yelled at, had their bones broken, and sometimes afraid, uncertain and untrusting. Only through loving care, patience, positive-reinforcement and attention can they be reached. In my case, I have been in prison over 26 years. Others in the program have been in this long or longer, truly hard men. Yet we still have a well of love and kindness inside us and these dogs bring it out. We help to save them and in the process, we receive a form of redemption ourselves. We also reach out to the extended community that is our family and loved ones in society to help find permanent homes for these rehabilitated dogs. Please spread the word about the ROCK Hounds and if you know anyone who would like to adopt a housebroken, trained truly special dog, please have them contact officer Parrish at the prison.

Union had two second-place lifters in Darrel Crim in the 169 class and Phillip Lillie in the 199 class. Crim had a 525 total, while Lillie had a 550 total.

Keystone had three lifters place third: Matt West (183) with a 183 total, Nate Pate (199) with a 510 total and Dalton Watts (219) with a 505 total. J.J. Schofield (169) placed fourth with a 455 total.

Austin Long (129) and Alden McClellon (169) placed third for Union with 385 and 515 totals, respectively. Placing fourth for the Tigers were: Dylan Bass (129) with a 360 total, Darian Robinson (154) with a 485 total, Andrew Jones (183) with a 495 total, Peyton Powell (199) with a

480 total, Jonathan Besso (219) with a 470 total and Josh Smith (heavyweight) with a 570 total.



was quite the find for Babnick, who bought him at a farm in Virginia after seeing an advertisement online.

"I feel like the luckiest kid on the planet with him," Babnick said, adding, "He and I are just best friends."

That friendship got off to a rocky start. Babnick said the first time she met Yoshi at the Virginia farm, he bit her every time she touched his head.

She was sold, though, after riding him. Every single thing she wanted Yoshi to do, he did.

"He and I just got each other," Babnick said.

There was one excitable moment as the two were still forming their bond. They were at a show when something spooked Yoshi, causing him to run out of the arena. Babnick said she couldn't think of what to do to make him slow down and pay attention to her again. What popped into Babnick's mind was to start singing the Beatles' "Yellow Submarine."

"I couldn't think of what else to do except to get him listening," Babnick said.

Yoshi responded to the song, which is now part of his show

routine. As Babnick and Yoshi circle the arena prior to the start of competition, she hums "Yellow Submarine."

"He loves it," Babnick said. "It's just been our thing ever since."

Horses that are performing well on dressage tests usually range in age from 10 to 14, Babnick said, adding that they retire in their late teens.

Yoshi is 21 and was retired from competition when Babnick bought him. However, reentering the arena seems to have given him a new life. Babnick said you can see it in Yoshi's eyes every time he exits his trailer.

"He just marches like a 6-year-old," Babnick said. "It takes 10 years off his life every time he goes to a show."

Still, Babnick knows Yoshi's competition days are numbered. That's why she treasures every show they're at.

"Every ride's a gift," Babnick said. "I would hope we could get through another season for his sake because he enjoys it so much."

Babnick has a younger horse named Junior who could follow in Yoshi's footsteps. Junior, who is almost 12 and has participated in some shows with Babnick, has fantastic breeding and is a "super cool horse," Babnick said.

However, he still gets a little nervous entering the arena.

That's why even though Junior achieved some good scores at a show in Atlanta, Babnick is still taking it slow with him.

"He did wonderfully," Babnick said in regard to Junior's performance in Atlanta. "On paper, there wasn't a reason to say, 'Let's wait and work harder at home,' but I could feel it. He did beautifully, but I could just feel it. We rode at night. There was music. There were lights on. "You could just feel him (thinking), 'I don't know if I'm really OK.'"

Whether it's Junior or another horse, Babnick cannot earn another bronze or silver medal. Earning a particular medal is a one-time achievement, though Babnick said she will still aim medal-qualifying scores for each horse she rides just because it's fun.

Since it is fun, Babnick has no intentions of quitting dressage any time soon. She said she may be 90 and in a wheelchair one day, but someone will be pushing her up to a mounting block because she can't imagine not being on the back of a horse.

"It's so good for a person's mind," Babnick said. "For my mind, there's nothing else like it."

Fitts talks fishing at Crosshorn meeting

Jeff Fitts of Keystone Heights fishes and guides professionally and was the guest speaker at the March 27 Crosshorn Ministries meeting. Fitts talked and answered numerous questions about bass fishing issues for most of his presentation.

Much of his initial discussion was related to the different types of fishing lines available and their advantages and disadvantages. Fitts indicated that fluorocarbon line has little give, but is almost invisible under water. Fluorocarbon will also sink and, consequently, is a more effective line for underwater lures.

Conversely, monofilament line provides some stretch and will float. As such, it is a better line to use with top-water lures.

Braided line provides much more strength with no additional diameter size, and therefore is much better to use in thick cover.

Fitts also talked about flipping and pitching fishing techniques and where and when they are advantageous. Both techniques are underhanded casts that are used to pinpoint short casts that are usually into thick cover. Both of the presentations are effective in water that has a heavy growth of hydrilla such as Rowell and Sampson lakes. The thick hydrilla growth typically provides a heavy cover mat at the water surface that attracts a lot of bait, which in turn attracts bass. Fitts described the types of lures and best rigs that would allow the fisherman to punch through the surface mat and make an effective presentation to the bass that typically hover

below.

Fitts provided some tips, too, on how to hook soft plastics so that rough action will not wear and tear the plastic where the hooks enters. Since the detail is too much to address in this article, ask someone who attended the meeting how to use a swivel to prevent soft plastic wear and tear.

Outdoors outlook

When the weather dips into the high 30s during the latter part of March, the spring bass bite is going to be impacted. Unfortunately, that is exactly what happened this week. Not only was the temperature change significant, but also the wind was just as bad.

Joey Tyson called some of the regulars of the Bald Eagle tournaments and called off the weekly event, but some will usually miss the message and others will brave the elements anyway. Most of those who challenged the weather on March 26 will admit that it was a wasted effort. The effects of the front should have worn off by March 30, and the bass spawn should resume.

By the next full moon, which is on April 30, the best of the bass spawn will be over.

Jeff Fitts, at the March 27 Crosshorn Ministries meeting, told us that the post-spawn period for bass marks the beginning of the yearly calendar that will produce the hottest top-water action of the year. There probably is no more exciting fishing action than a largemouth bass crushing a top-water lure.

With the exception of last week's cold front, the trend

toward warmer weather should do nothing but encourage trout and reds to occupy the inshore flats. Both coasts are providing good reports of strong sheepshead bite. This time of the year will produce some of the largest samples of the banded fish to be caught all year. They are typically taken with jigs supplemented with shrimp and fiddler crabs.

Spring always brings a host of large fish into the inland waters. Not the least of these will be the king mackerel that will soon be lurking around the coastal waters.

What is heating up pretty good right now on the east coast is the black drum bite. These fish are caught in many of the same locations a sheepshead, but they have a tendency to occupy slightly deeper water. These are large fish and will easily top 50 pounds.

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Beulah Baptist members remember church's heritage

Members and friends of Beulah Baptist Church, located on S.R. 21 near Keystone Heights, gathered for its annual Heritage Day on March 29.

Participants met at the church, then drove to the main gate at Camp Blanding, where they were met by military police and escorted to the old cemetery, more than 5 miles away.

Beulah was founded in 1850 when Zachary Taylor was president of the United States. The land that comprises present-day Clay County was then part of Duval County. The church met in a small, log cabin on land owned by Kindred B. Drew. A creek ran nearby, and early members had to ford it to get to services.

Later, Drew deeded 2 acres to

Beulah Cemetery, which is located at Camp Blanding and maintained by the Florida National Guard, has more than 100 graves.

the church, which included space for a cemetery. The first person buried there was his 38-year-old wife, Martha Drew, who died in 1865.

The old cemetery is maintained by the National Guard, marked as a sensitive site and separated from the outside by a chain-link

fence. There are over 100 graves in the cemetery. Grave markers bear the names of families still living in the area—Boree, Harris, Hickey, Sapp, Saunders, Thomas, Weeks and Wilson, among others.

The government began using the property around Beulah's

original site as the threat of World War II loomed and the land was needed for Camp Blanding. Beulah members, "considering it [their] Christian duty to assist [their] nation in this great movement of preparedness," began holding all their meetings at a nearby school. In 1942, the

government contracted to pay the church \$800 for its property. Eventually, the church was given the plot of land it now occupies on S.R. 21, which also includes a cemetery.

Twenty-one people, including two children, braved rainy conditions and muddy roads to make the trek to the cemetery and honor their dead. Jimmy Weeks, tax collector of Clay County,

spoke briefly to those assembled, honoring his mother, Carolyn Weeks, and his sister, Louisa Weeks Padgett, who have kept the tradition going for several generations and hope to continue for many years to come.

The gathering was followed by a covered-dish dinner at Beulah Baptist Church, with an egg hunt as a special early Easter treat for the church's children.

13-1 win over Keystone is latest lopsided district win for Tornadoes

Following its performance in the Daytona Beach Softball Slam, the Bradford High School softball team won three District 5-4A games by a combined score of 48-6, including a 13-1 win over visiting Keystone Heights on March 31.

Lainie Rodgers hit a double and drove in three runs in the win over Keystone, which improved Bradford's district record to 7-2.

Bradford (13-3 overall) went up 7-0 after the first two innings, getting RBI doubles from Rodgers and Annie Luke.
