Narcotics bust at Edwards Grocery

The owner of Edwards Grocery was selling customers more than a gallon of gas.

Don Hapuarachchi, 46, of Keystone Heights is accused of trading and selling illegal drugs.

According to Bradford County Sheriff's Office Capt. Brad Smith, their drug unit arrested Hapuarachchi after several sources tipped them off to the storeowner's activities.

On the afternoon of April 24, officers caught him in the act. They moved in to close the business and execute a search warrant of the property, which is located at the crossroads of S.R. 100 and C.R. 18 in Theressa.

Hapuarachchi is charged with two counts of trafficking Hydrocodone. Smith said the proximity to the school run by Hope Baptist Church resulted in additional charges—two counts of possession with intent to distribute within 1,000 feet of a school.

While searching the store, detectives discovered more than 1,000 packs of synthetic marijuana. Smith said sources in the investigation stated these packages were also being sold under the counter for \$20 apiece.

Some took shots at the sheriff's office online for the perception that the storeowner was arrested for the synthetic pot, but the sheriff's office fired back, pointing out that Hapuarachchi was arrested on for the illegal sale of prescription narcotics. The sheriff's office also advised readers about the dangers of getting high from synthetic drugs.

The synthetic drugs are sold as potpourri, incense, bath salts etc., but users ingest them for the purpose of getting high.

Some jurisdictions have banned the sale of synthetic drugs, resulting in them being more difficult to find in convenience stores, where they were once common. They are still sold secretly under the counter, however, and can even be purchased online.

Federal and state officials have faced difficulty in banning the substances. Outlawing specific chemicals results in manufacturers adjusting their formulas. It's a never-ending cycle of catch up.

Because of psychotic episodes and other health problems, users have wound up in emergency rooms or dead from overdoses. Far from the natural substances their labels might claim, users have wound up addicted. Some have found themselves under arrest for actions taken while under the influence.

Users have hurt themselves and attacked others while high. One man in Texas was

arrested for assaulting several people, chasing a neighbor while acting like a dog, and then killing and eating an actual dog before begging cops to do something end his high.

The long-term damage from the use of these substances is unknown.

Hapuarachchi is being held at the Bradford County Jail with total bond set at \$400,000.

Starke man wins \$1 million lottery prize

According to the Florida Lottery, Andres Garcia Jimenez, 29, of Starke claimed a \$1 million top prize in the \$200 Million Spectacular scratch-off game at Florida Lottery headquarters in Tallahassee last week.

Garcia Jimenez chose the one-time, lump-sum payment option for his winnings in the amount of \$769,960.05. He purchased his winning ticket at In & Out Food Store, located at 708 N. Temple Ave. in Starke.

The \$10 scratch-off game featured more than \$220 million in prizes when it launched in 2008. The game has three \$1 million top prizes remaining, and the overall odds of winning are one-in-3.58.

As part of the Lottery's portfolio of games, scratch-off games comprise approximately 60 percent of ticket sales and generated more than \$575 million for the Educational Enhancement Trust Fund in fiscal year 2012-13.

According to the Florida Lottery, it is responsible for contributing more than \$26 billion to education and sending more than 650,000 students to college through the Bright Futures Scholarship Program.

Sex crime suspect tracked to Ga.

Horrendous crimes against a child committed years ago may have caught up with the alleged perpetrator.

Malachi Joseph Jenkins, 44, of Lawtey was arrested April 23 and charged with sexual assault of a victim under 12 and three counts of lewd and lascivious behavior.

Jenkins' accuser originally told her story to an investigator with the Bradford County Sheriff's Office in January 2013. The tale of sexual battery came to light during a pre-employment interview, and Sgt. Christopher Bennett was called in to record her sworn statement.

The victim described being molested and assaulted on multiple occasions while staying with a babysitter. She was between 6 and 7 years old at the time. Jenkins was 26, according to Bennett's report.

On April 2, 2013, investigator David Schlofman interviewed Jenkins at the sheriff's office. When told he was a suspect in a sex offense investigation, Jenkins denied the allegations against him. During a computer voice stress analyzer test, Jenkins again denied the allegations.

In examining the results of the test, Schlofman and Lt. Gail Russell both determined that Jenkins was not telling the truth. When Jenkins was told of the results, he denied the allegations a third time.

Schlofman also interviewed the only other person the victim said she confided in about the molestation. The witness confirmed that her friend had told her the story in 2012 and said that she had spoken of it again after she had reported it to the sheriff's office.

Based on the information from the victim and her friend, Schlofman felt there was enough evidence to charge Jenkins. By the time the warrant was issued, however, the sheriff's office didn't know where to find the suspect.

The sheriff's office was informed he might be staying somewhere in the Atlanta area. Russell contacted authorities there to see if they could locate him, but without more information, the trail went cold.

BCSO Sgt. Ray Shuford said he came across the Jenkins case while researching fugitives to publicize on the sheriff's office's Facebook page. The nature of the charges and the suggested bond amount—several hundred thousand dollars—made him stand out as a candidate.

Shuford didn't stop there. Continuing to research the case, he said he reached out to the sheriff's office in DeKalb County, Ga., for assistance locating the fugitive. Over the course of a couple of days, they shared any information they came across, which culminated in officers there staking out a residence where they believed Jenkins was staying and taking him into custody.

"They had no idea he was living in their county, and we had no idea exactly where he was living in their county," Shuford said, but by working together, they were able to capture Jenkins without incident.

Shuford, the sheriff's office's technology man, said he believes the kind of electronic and records tracking that was used to pinpoint Jenkins' location is the wave of the future.

"You can't outrun the long arm of the law," he said.

Bradford health statistics remain low

The most recent county health rankings continue to show Bradford County at the lower end of the list.

Published by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, the rankings are divided into two major categories—health factors and health outcomes. Factors refer to behavior, environmental and other factors that contribute to

health and well-being. Outcomes, or the results of the community's health, include the level of sickness and early death.

Bradford County improved one slot in health outcomes since last year, but that only brings it up to 59th in the state out of 67 counties. In 2012, the county was 49th before a large drop. Contributing to the low ranking is the higher than average incidence of premature death. Bradford Countians are more likely to die

before age 75, and according to the health ranking data, this trend is getting worse.

Quality of life slipped slightly, with 15 percent of adults still reporting only fair to poor health. People here also reported a higher than average number of poor mental health days—five per month compared to 3.8 for the state. Poor physical health days averaged 3.7 per month, a tie with the state average, and an improvement over 2013.

The percentage of babies born with low birth weight has also improved. It had risen above 10 percent, it is now back down to 9.9 percent, although that is still higher than the 8.7 percent state average.

When it comes to overall health factors, Bradford slipped one slot to 45th out of 67 counties. While the county continues to see a lower adult smoking rate—falling



SRWMD: Land purchase will benefit regional water resources

The Suwannee River Water Management District, in partnership with the National Guard Bureau, acquired a 344-acre tract in Bradford County from Bradford Timberlands LLC. The tract will provide a buffer for Camp Blanding and enable the district to build a flood protection and aquifer recharge project.

The district will use the property to capture floodwaters and recharge the Upper Floridan aquifer. Recharging the aquifer in this location will benefit aquifer levels in both the Suwannee River and St. Johns River water management districts.

The purchase was funded by a grant from the National Guard Bureau in cooperation with the Florida Department of Environmental Protection as



part of the Department of Defense Readiness and Environmental Protection Integration program designed to secure buffers around military installations.

"The district appreciates the opportunity to partner with the National Guard Bureau on this acquisition that will establish a necessary buffer for Camp Blanding Joint Training Center."

Blanding and allow the district to construct a multi-purpose project that will provide flood protection and benefit regional aquifer levels," said SRWMD Executive Director Ann Shortelle.

"This purchase helps to fulfill the state's continued emphasis on preserving conservation land that protects springs, water resources, and buffers military areas," said DEP Secretary Herschel Vinyard.

"This purchase will help to protect the military mission of Camp Blanding by allowing soldiers to train to the fence line without fear of affecting the quality of life for our neighbors. This is a win-win for both agencies," said Paul Catlett, installation environmental program manager, Camp Blanding Joint Training Center.

Cars can be towed beginning May 1

After years of warnings and half measures, the Starke City Commission is ready to have vehicles in violation of parking restrictions towed at their owners' expense.

Local ordinances in the past have lacked bite, and police officers were prohibited from issuing state fines unless they could be issued directly to the drivers.

The new ordinance allows the police department or its towing company to take possession of the vehicles and impound them until the towing cost and associated fees have been paid. The vehicle owner will be liable for other costs as well, including the cost of providing notice of the impoundment.

The ordinance applies to vehicles parked on public property and on private property as well when the property owner supplies written permission.

Before towing is authorized, three or more unpaid parking violations must have accumulated.

After discussion about how restrictions might affect customers of downtown businesses, commissioners decided to set the downtown parking limits to two hours on Monday through Friday, 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. Previously placed signage downtown restricted parking to two hours from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on weekdays.

The ordinance is not intended to target shoppers or diners, but apartment residents and business employees who park on the street, taking up parking places meant for customers.

There were already restrictions in the city code prohibiting parking on a sidewalk, in an intersection or on a crosswalk; on public right of way; in a manner that block traffic or emergency vehicles; in the opposite direction of the flow of traffic; within five feet of a public or private driveway; within 10 feet of a fire hydrant; etc.

The city will employ its special magistrate in the collection of penalties owed for violating the ordinance. If orders of the special magistrate are ignored, this could also lead to impoundment of a vehicle.

If an impounded vehicle hasn't been claimed and all charges paid within 30 days of being towed, then the city has the option to go to court and have the vehicle sold to recover the amount due.

Enforcement of the towing ordinance was set to begin May 1. The ordinance also allows the police department to immobilize a vehicle in lieu of having it towed by attaching a boot, but the city has no plans to acquire boots at this time.

A separate resolution set the fines for violations at \$25, but parking in a spot reserved for the disabled will earn a \$250 fine.

to 13 percent compared to the state average of 18 percent—the rate of obesity continues to climb. According to the study, 36 percent of adults in Bradford County have body mass index above 30. That's a full 10 percent higher than the state average.

Rising with obesity is the lack of physical activity. The percentage of adults 20 and older reporting no leisure time physical activity is 31 percent, compared to 24 percent state average. While 78 percent of adults in the state have adequate access to locations for physical activity, the number is just 37 percent in Bradford.

Bradford also has a higher than average rate of diabetes, with 13 percent of adults 20 and older impacted by the disease. Excessive drinking on the other hand fell 4 percent to 16 percent. That puts the county on par with the state. Excessive drinking includes binge drinking—consuming more than four or five alcoholic beverages on a single occasion in a month—or heavy drinking—which would be consuming more than one or two alcoholic beverages a day.

Sexually transmitted infections are still on the rise in Bradford County. The survey specifically looks at the incidence of chlamydia, which is much higher in Bradford than the state average. This could represent improved screening or reporting of the disease as opposed to more frequent transmission. The rate of HIV was lower than the state average.

The teen birth rate remains quite high. The rate is 73 births per 1,000 girls ages 15-19 compared to the state average of 38. Meanwhile, the child mortality rate—the rate dying younger than 18—is nearly 50 percent higher than the state average.

The health factors report also looks at other subcategories like

access to care, socioeconomic indicators and the environment. For example, 35 percent of children in Bradford County were said to be living in poverty, compared to the 26 percent state average. That rate is up 5 percent. The number of single parent households was slightly better than the state.

The violent crime rate, of course, was lower, and so was the unemployment rate, but like child poverty, these factors had grown.

Combined with the lower than average high school graduation and college attendance rates, Bradford was 44th in the state in the socioeconomic factors contributing to health, which was down from 37th.

When it came to care, one in five people over 65 and nearly one in four adults younger than 65 in Bradford County were uninsured, which was better than the state. Ten percent of children under 19 were without health insurance. There were fewer primary care physicians and dentists than elsewhere, and this was also true of mental health providers.

The number of Medicare enrollees receiving mammograms and diabetic screenings was just a bit lower than the rest of the state. However, the number of preventable hospital stays for Medicare enrollees was much higher than the state average and continued to climb. This can indicate an overuse of hospitals for primary care, according to the survey, or the ineffectiveness and unavailability of primary care in the outpatient setting.

Bradford was 52nd in the state in clinical care, down from 46th.

Finally, the county improved from 38th to 30th on environmental factors contributing to health. Air pollution tends to be slightly worse than the rest of the state, and around 15 percent of the population lives in housing with severe problems including overcrowding or lack of kitchen or plumbing facilities. also noted that 82 percent of the workforce drives to work alone, and 39 percent of those workers commute longer than 30 minutes to their job.

Rural counties continue to struggle. Union County remains at the bottom of the heap in health outcomes and dropped to 53rd in health factors. Putnam County was 65th in health outcomes and 67th in health factors. Baker was 64th in health outcomes and 43rd in health factors. By contrast, Clay County was seventh in health outcomes and 13th in health factors.

This is the fifth year the health rankings were put together by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation using information from surveys, Uniform Crime Reports and other available data. The reports have been used by the Bradford County Community Health Advisory Council to put together a Community Health Improvement Plan, the goals of which are to help the community to adopt more healthy behaviors, make the public more aware of local health services and reduce the teen pregnancy rate.

According to a release from the health department:

"The Bradford County Community Health Advisory Group has worked diligently toward establishing a Community Health Improvement Plan based

on a current local Community Health Assessment. Based on this, the advisory group has set goals based on healthy food choices, healthiest weight and physical activity. These efforts are community based, beginning in elementary school and continuing right up to senior activities. Healthiest weight and physical activity are a priority for Bradford County, and a major step toward achieving public health."

"These rankings are a snapshot of the health of counties across the country and they emphasize

BMS' Kennedy named School-Related Employee of the Year

Mary Ann Kennedy loves her job, but said there must be days where Bradford Middle School Principal Ernest Williams wishes he had a better secretary.

However, if Williams ever heard Kennedy utter such a statement, he'd probably lean over, open the door between their adjoining offices and refute it right then and there.

"She's a wonderful secretary," Williams said.

That's not just Williams' opinion as Kennedy has been named the school district's School-Related Employee of the Year. Kennedy said the honor is "awesome."

"There are a lot of caring people who work for this county who go above and beyond," Kennedy said. "I think to represent the county as that district person is a really good honor when we have so many other qualified people."

Kennedy has been in her current position since October 2006. She worked the previous four years at Bradford High School, but the position at the middle school offered her a year round job as opposed to 10 months a year.

"For me, a single mom with four children, I needed a year round position," Kennedy said.

Still, she admitted she had mixed feelings about

interviewing for the BMS position, thinking to herself, "I don't know if I can do this. I don't know if I want to leave the high school."

Working at BMS, though, has been just as enjoyable. She knew a lot of the staff anyway, so she fit right in.

"It's like a family," she said.

Williams was no stranger, having worked at BHS as an assistant principal while Kennedy worked the high school's front desk.

"We have a really good working relationship," Kennedy said.

Williams may be the principal, but he credited Kennedy with being the person who kind of holds everything together.

"She's like a glue for all of us," Williams said.

Kennedy actually wanted to be a teacher. She began college with that in mind, but she was nine months' pregnant with twins when she graduated with her AA degree in elementary education.

Though she was accepted into a College of Central Florida—University of Central Florida pilot program that would allow her to go through an additional two years of school on the College of Central Florida campus, she couldn't see how that would be possible with children.

So Kennedy put college aside and began working in daycare, which allowed her to have a job

and have her children with her without having to pay for the cost of daycare.

"I just never had any desire to go back to school after that," said Kennedy, who had another child two and a half years after she gave birth to her twin sons.

Kennedy and her family lived in the Ocala area, but moved to Bradford County in 1993. Her husband at the time worked for

CVS and was transferred to a job in Palatka.

"I remember I got a job here with Bonnie Ford at a daycare center," Kennedy said. "Back then, it was called ABC Preschool. I was extremely pregnant, and she still hired me, knowing she was going to lose me in a short time."

Her first job in the Bradford County school system was at

What can I plant in May?

There are many colorful summer annuals that will thrive in your landscape with little care. Annuals that can take the summer heat include angelonia, wax begonia, salvia and ornamental pepper.

If you like months of color in your garden, try planting low maintenance early, mid and late blooming bulbs of daylilies. Oregano, sage, basil and rosemary are heat-loving herbs to try.

Some Southern vegetable favorites that can be planted in May include Southern peas, sweet potatoes and okra. Come into the extension office and get a copy of the Florida Vegetable Gardening Guide for more ideas.

What needs to be done in the garden in May?

Harmful insects can become more active as the warm weather returns. Be a good scout! Check ornamental plants at least once a week for scale, thrips and mites.

Some yellowing of older leaves on gardenias is normal, but yellowing of new growth can indicate a nutrient deficiency.

Watch for damage from chinch bugs in St. Augustine lawns, and begin scouting for newly hatched mole crickets in Bahia lawns.

If you didn't do it in April, apply a lawn fertilizer (not a weed and feed) without phosphorous unless a soil test indicates the need for it.

Now is the time to watch for nutritional disorders, pests and disease on tomatoes.

May is an excellent time to propagate landscape



What kinds of wildlife should I expect to see in May?

Painted buntings nest through summer in northeast Florida. Bald eagles begin migrating north. Alligators begin to court and make loud resounding bellows.

If you are at the beach it is interesting to note that loggerhead sea turtles begin nesting on summer nights. Soft-shell and alligator snapping turtles complete egg laying.

Butterfly attracting velvetleaf milkweed blooms on sand hills and clay hills.

Did you know?

Velvetleaf milkweed (*Asclepias tomentosa*) is a member of the milkweed family, which occurs in a variety of well-drained upland sites throughout most of Florida. This is a native, deciduous species that dies back to the ground in the late fall after its seeds are released.

As it emerges in the spring, it can go largely unnoticed as it sends its stalk upwards. Eventually, it reaches a height of about 3 feet in summer. The individual stalks are stiff, and opposite rounded leaves occur along the length of each. The leaves are somewhat fuzzy in texture, hence the common name.

In the bathroom:

- Water on your assigned day before 10 a.m. or after 4 p.m. to reduce water evaporation.

- Water your lawn in several short cycles rather than one long cycle; this will allow the water to be better absorbed.





simply walking across your lawn; if you leave footprints, then it is time to water.

• Use sprinklers with automatic timers, and preferably equipped with rain sensors.

• Adjust sprinklers so you only water the lawn, not the street or sidewalk.

Lawn and garden planting:

• Group your plants according

to their water needs.

Mosquito-trapping volunteers needed

The Buzz Busters, a volunteer group sponsored by the Bradford County Mosquito Control and the UF/IFAS Bradford County Extension, is looking for volunteers to help trap and count mosquitoes in different zones throughout the county.

Volunteers are needed to set up adult mosquito traps once a week. The trap needs to be set up at dusk and "harvested" first thing the morning after. After harvesting, the trapped mosquitoes are frozen and then counted. These trap counts are used to track mosquito population levels in the county and are ultimately used to prioritize adult mosquito spray events in the county.

The group is currently looking for volunteers in Zone 2 (east of S.R. 100 from approximately Southeast 142nd Street to C.R. 218), Zones 3 and 4 (Hampton area), Zone 6 (between U.S. 301 and C.R. 225, south of C.R. 227), Zone 9 (Brooker area), Zone 10 (west of C.R. 235 and C.R. 231, between S.R. 100 and C.R. 18), and Zone 11 (between S.R. 100 and C.R. 229, west of C.R. 225).

If you are interested in becoming a Buzz Buster volunteer, please call The Bradford County Extension Office at 904-966-6299. Traps, supplies and support are provided.

And don't forget: It is very important to follow the 5 D's in order to avoid being bothered by these pesky critters. Avoid being outdoors during DUSK to DAWN hours. If you must go outside DRESS appropriately by covering as much skin as possible. For added protection use a repellent with DEET in it, and be sure to DRAIN any containers that hold water.



Reflect on voting rights on Law Day

Dear Editor:

Every year since President Dwight D. Eisenhower proclaimed the first Law Day in 1958, the United States has marked May 1 as a day of national recognition of our great heritage of liberty, justice, and equality under the law. The theme for Law Day, May 1, 2014, as designated by the American Bar Association, is "American Democracy and the Rule of Law: Why Every Vote Matters."

The theme of voting rights is timely with the nation preparing to commemorate the 50th anniversaries of two landmark pieces of legislation: the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Voting Rights Act of 1965. At the heart of both these statutes is a guiding principle: that equality of opportunity to participate in the Nation's civic and economic life is a fundamental right of all Americans and ought to be protected as such. While there is still much work to do, these laws have been crucial in the progress toward this goal.

Securing every American's right to vote is a central part of this struggle. As President Lyndon B. Johnson pointed out in his 1965 Message to Congress on Voting: "In our system, the

first right and most vital of all our rights is the right to vote. ... It is from the exercise of this right that the guarantee of all our other rights flows. Unless the right to vote be secure and undenied, all other rights are insecure and subject to denial for all our citizens."

However, the right to vote is far from secure. A recent report by the bipartisan Presidential Commission on Election Administration noted that voters frequently stand in long lines caused by broken voting machines, confusing ballots, and untrained or undertrained poll workers. This is completely unacceptable in a modern democracy. Local, state, and federal officials must work together to overcome these barriers to voting participation.

Participating in the political process is both our right and our duty as citizens. This Law Day, let us reflect upon what each of us can do to protect and promote the voting rights of ourselves and our fellow Americans. It is only by ensuring that everyone has an equal opportunity to vote that we can be sure, in the words of Abraham Lincoln, "that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth."

established Law Day on May 1st of every year by enacting 36 U.S.C. § 113, which states, in pertinent part, that Law Day, U.S.A., is a special day of celebration by the people of the United States—

(1) in appreciation of their liberties and the reaffirmation of their loyalty to the United States and of their rededication to the ideals of equality and justice under law in their relations with each other and with other countries; and

(2) for the cultivation of the respect for law that is so vital to the democratic way of life.

Each year, Law Day celebrates a different theme. Past years have explored First Amendment freedoms, the quest for equality, and the changing nature of law in the 21st century. Other years have commemorated milestones such as Lincoln's Bicentennial and the 50th anniversary of Brown v. Board of Education.

This year's theme is "American Democracy and the Rule of Law: Why Every Vote Matters". You may ask yourself why it matters to you. Consider this: In 1868, President Andrew Johnson avoided removal from office by one vote. In 1940, the Selective Service Act was amended by a single vote to extend the draft term from one year to two and a half years. More recently, in the 2008 election for the Alaska House of Representatives, incumbent Mike Kelly beat out challenger Karl Kassel by only four votes. And of course, who can forget the pregnant, hanging, bulging, and dimpled chads that permeated the 2000 election for President of the United States?

Many of us take voting for granted. In fact, barely more than 51% of eligible voters showed up to the polls for the 2000 presidential election. In contrast, Western Europe has averaged 77% voter turnout since 1945. As we observe the 50th anniversaries of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Voting

Rights Act of 1965, we must all reflect on the importance of our precious right to elect another human being into a position of governance. That right, as described by Theodore Hesburgh, president emeritus of the University of Notre Dame, is a "civic sacrament," and we must all strive not only to exercise it ourselves, but to ensure that our fellow citizens are free to exercise it as well.

Enjoy the outdoors, but take care in the sun

Most outdoors activities pose certain risks to their participants, including threats by animals, insects, diseases and snakes. Despite our preference of entertaining those noted threats, the most common one during the summer probably comes from the sun. Some of the best collections of work, precautions and warnings about toxic chemicals and sunscreen products come from the Environmental Working Group. It has a very informative and easily accessed website, which is the source of most the following data.

The proliferation rate of melanoma—the most deadly form of skin cancer—has tripled over the past 35 years. Despite the fact that sunscreen will protect skin against ultraviolet damage, there is little proof that the different sunscreen products prevent cancer. Consequently, three frequently quoted warnings provided by the Environmental Working Group are to cover up, seek shade and avoid the mid-day sun.

Many sunscreen products promote the presence of a wide SPF spectrum. UVB rays cause sunburn, but UVA rays penetrate deeper, causing skin damage and possibly cancer. SPF sunscreen ratings of 15-50 are recommended, but many advertise SPF ratings above 50. SPF ratings above 50 provide no additional protection and might cause additional skin damage.

Additional recommendations provided by Environmental Working Group include:

- Do not use powder products. They are not FDA approved.
- Some products contain oxybenzone, which is a synthetic estrogen that penetrates the skin deeply and can disrupt the hormone system.
- Some products are in a spray form and might contain harmful products.
- Some products contain vitamin A, which Environmental

down in celebratory fashion.

"Everything in the pockets of my jacket fell out," McCormick said.

"Lost in Limbo" was the result of a class project in which students were to incorporate toys into still-life photos. In her description accompanying the photo, McCormick wrote,





out of Santa Fe Lake. One fisherman produced a 50-pound catch that consisted of only six catfish. The fisherman was using crappie minnows for bait.

The pungent smell of fish beds was noticeable at the boat launch during the April 24 Sampson Lake Bass Tournament. The wind was blowing in a southeasterly direction, and some of the fishermen noted that the smell was very strong on the northeastern shore. The timing would suggest that shellcrackers or a combination of shellcrackers and bluegill would most likely be responsible for those bedding indicators. These fish are probably being stimulated by the forthcoming new moon, which will reach its full phase on April 29.

The saltwater front seems to have been dampened by Easter's cool weather. Most inshore reports remained centered around flounder, trout, reds and

black drum. There are reports of whiting on east coast beaches, and for those who look for fishing variety, there are reports of croakers and yellow-mouth trout in the St. Johns River around Green Cove Springs. Reports of summer cobia near the beaches are spotty at best.

Hunting season in Florida is over with the exception of hogs and rabbits, which can be hunted all year. Georgia's spring gobbler season will continue through May 15.
