## WE ARE TORNADOES

### Tornado positivity taking over town

Starke's water tower will be sporting a new look before long — the same look already being worn by students, staff and supporters of Bradford High School.

The city commission has agreed with the school that painting the water tower would be a great way to demonstrate the community's support for the high school and its students, so once the money has been raised, the tower will read "We are Tornadoes."

You may have already seen the slogan popping up on T-shirts around town. And if you haven't, you will soon. Businesses and others have enthusiastically embraced the campaign, which is meant to restore school spirit among the students, rally the community around Bradford High and return the school to the stature it once held in local life.

"I've heard so many good things


about where Bradford was such a long time ago," said BHS Assistant Principal Anthony McCallum. "I want to get back to that. I heard the whole community would shut down on Friday nights for football games."

The campaign got underway last week with the distribution of "We are Tornadoes" T-shirts — purchased with a total of \$5,000 donated by 15 sponsors — to every student. The student body piled into the stadium for a group portrait of their Tornado pride.

The school spirit campaign was born out of the positive behavior support program. PBS refers to the approach of rewarding students for doing well and not merely reserving attention for those in need of discipline.

Assistant Principal Anthony McCallum and his PBS team — English teachers Beth Oody and Lindley Adkins — attended a seminar last spring, and that was where the

### Cummings wins school board seat

Other races TBD

The big winner in Tuesday's primary election was Sheila Fayson Cummings who was able to unseat School Board Member Archie Kittles in District 1.

It was a close race separated by 24 votes, but Cummings was able to pull 52 percent of the 518 votes cast.

The other big winner in Bradford may be new or growing businesses as voters chose give the county commission the authority to negotiate tax breaks in exchange for economic development. Nearly 63 percent were in favor of the referendum.

Other candidates still have obstacles to face, including Republican Kenny Thompson who won the right to run against Doyle Thomas in November for the District 2 county commission seat. Thompson easily won the support of his party with almost 73 percent voting for him over his opponent, Andy Norman.

There was no clear winner in the three-way race for the District 5 school board seat. Voters were nearly evenly split between candidates Billy Rehberg and Randy Starling, with just 21 votes separating them. But it was Starling who took those votes and will run against the top vote-getter, Erica Mains Reddish, in the November runoff. Reddish received almost 37 percent of the votes, but that was only 35 more than votes than Starling.

Bradford County Republicans overwhelmingly backed Gov. Rick Scott, who

### Starke budget includes money for raise, capital projects

For the first time anyone can remember, staff presented the Starke City Commission with a balanced first draft during its budget workshop Aug. 19.

In the proposed budget for 2014-15, everyone will receive a 3 percent raise, which also hasn't happened for a number of years.

Water and sewer rates are also scheduled to increase again.

The new budget — prepared by Alica McMillian and John Thieman in the finance department — totals \$16.9 million, down from \$17.2 million this year. The pay increase was made possible by the \$83,000 difference between anticipated revenue and planned expenditures.

McMillian noted this is a cost of living adjustment, not a merit raise, although the city has been working to put a more consistent evaluation program in place for employees.

The budget for utilities and roads is down, but general government costs are up in 2015, most notably for the police and fire departments.

City Clerk Ricky Thompson said everyone's wish list was included.

For the police department, that includes four more new cars at an estimated cost of \$84,000, plus the cost of outfitting them.

Commissioner Tommy Chastain questioned Police Chief Jeff Johnson about getting additional cars on top of the six recently purchased. Johnson said this purchase would eliminate his remaining 2003 and 2004 models.

The department must also pay \$64,000 on the loan for cars already purchased.

McMillian pointed out that car repair costs have been cut in half and a request for computers was eliminated.

The police budget is up from \$1.35 million to \$1.55 million, and adding the grants that pay for two employees to that brings the total to \$1.61 million, surpassing the high reached back in 2010. Johnson said the only increase would be the cost of living adjustment, but in reality, that accounts for less than \$23,000 of the budget increase.

The fire department also reached a high with its request for \$1.15 million. The budget includes \$200,000 for a fire engine. Fire Chief Tom Rowe said the new truck would feature a larger cab. The department plans to surplus two vehicles to help purchase the new engine. One is older and nearly beyond repair. The other only transports two firefighters and is obsolete

initial ideas for the “We are Tornadoes” campaign and all that surrounds it were born.

“We are Tornadoes” is the theme, and the motto, borrowed from the football program, is “I am a part of something bigger than myself.”

“To be a part of something bigger means a lot,” McCallum said.

To help get that point across, a little something has been added to the tornado image appearing on T-shirts and other promotional items — a star. It represents each student and their starring role in the school’s success.

Achieving that success means that students fulfill their three-part mission — to be respectful, responsible and productive in all that they do.

One of the diagrams created by Adkins for the program materials depicts a pyramid, and the foundation of that pyramid is the code of conduct. Resting on that are the expectations, which can change depending on what students are engaged in at the time. Regardless, students are told what is expected of them in every situation, and when they fall short, it’s a matter of revisiting those expectations.

PBS is not a program without rules. Rather it is about teaching and reteaching students what is expected of them, giving them goals to work toward and rewards for reaching those goals. It is about preventing problems before they start. It is about the individual, but also about realizing that the individual is a part of something bigger and has a role to play that contributes to the functioning of the whole.

“You’re creating a positive atmosphere where the kids want to come to school,” McCallum said, talking about the favorable reactions students had when they came to campus and saw the encouraging promotional materials posted throughout the hallways.

“At the end of the day you’ve got to show them what it is, teach them the expectations and then praise them for what they are doing,” he said.

The hope was that once the community saw the school coming together, then it too would feel a tighter bond with the school. The bond has already begun to manifest.

“We’re selling shirts like you couldn’t even imagine,” McCallum said, of the remaining We are Tornadoes tees. Proceeds from the sale of the shirts go back into supporting the positive behavior support program.

Through that funding and donations, the PBS team pays for the rewards students receive. That could be biweekly doughnut delivery for classes with no “tardies,” or the monthly class competition rewards like tailgate parties and sporting matches with faculty that take place during the final periods of the day and give kids a break in exchange for showing up the rest

of the month.

All of this is being analyzed as closely as academic data, but it’s not just feedback for teachers and administrators. The students receive daily announcements about the previous day’s attendance numbers, and there are displays that will record how many competitions each class has won.

Speaking of data, the school has been tracking data on the number of referrals written for rule breaking and the results might be surprising to those with a negative image of the school.

From the 2013 school year to 2014, the number of referrals dropped by nearly 40 percent. There were fewer incidents of skipping, class disruption, disrespect to teachers, aggression/fighting, abusive language, tardiness and technology violations. There were 57 fewer referrals for skipping, 49 fewer for disruptions and 27 fewer for fighting. In fact, aggression/fighting represented

just 5 percent of the 356 referrals written in the 2014 school year. Students are disciplined for attendance problems more than anything else.

McCallum has also been tracking what he calls positive versus negative days.

“Any day on our campus where our students’ attention isn’t distracted by something negative is a positive day,” he said. “Students are able to go to school, focus on their education and do well.”

In the two years since McCallum has been keeping score, the high school has had more than 330 positive days and fewer than 30 negative ones.

“333 to 27 is 92 percent. It’s beautiful,” he said. “That kind of stuff is really important (and) people need to know.”

McCallum and Principal Bryan Boyer were present when Oody approached the city commission last week about the project to paint the water tower.

changing our school culture and taking our school spirit to a level that it hasn’t been in many, many years,” Oody said.

Oody noted the size of the request, distributing design suggestions for the water tower. The commission was quick to take hold of the idea, however, with Mayor Carolyn Spooner saying it was an opportunity to make the tower decorative and showcase the county’s students.

“Anytime psychologically that you can impart to the students that they are important and reinforce those positive behaviors, it gives a different outlook and changes the behavior and culture at the school,” Spooner said.

The team was thrilled with

the city’s response as they are with the response of parents and businesses that have purchased shirts and committed to wearing them each Friday.

“It’s becoming really big, and we’re really excited about it,” McCallum said. Oody said the shirts have “gone viral.”

In the coming months there will be more T-shirts with other slogans as the program evolves, but the foundation will remain the same.

“We are more excited every day when we see these kids and they get more and more excited about what we’re doing,” McCallum said. “They keep just motivating us to want to do more.”

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

# Shands accredited in cardiac care

Drew Emery and the employees at Shands Starke Regional Medical Center are celebrating a recently achieved accreditation.

The hospital has been recognized by the Society of Cardiovascular Patient Care as an accredited chest pain center.

"The journey involved a very thorough evaluation of all patient care processes in our cardiac service line," said Emery, the hospital's recently appointed CEO. "I'm proud to say that because of this hard work that we can provide our patient care improvements to the citizens of Bradford County."

Emery appeared before the county commission last week with hospital board President Scott Roberts to make the announcement.

Roberts praised the partnership the hospital has with the county's emergency services, which was important in receiving the accreditation. Emery said the hospital could not have achieved success in accreditation without the commitment of Bradford

County Emergency Services and its leaders, Dr. Pete Gianas and Allen Parrish.

"Their willingness to play a critical role throughout the accreditation process is much appreciated, and without their help we would never have been able to accomplish our accreditation goal," Emery said.

The process began more than a year ago, and according to Chief Nursing Executive Andrea Waterhouse, many were apprehensive, but EMS has helped with organization and education.

"We have learned so much, we have put so many processes in place," she said. "We are so blessed to have such a good hospital to work at. ... Our mission there is to treat all people like we'd want to be treated."

Waterhouse said they never want to miss an opportunity to educate, and she introduced Annette Starling and Heather Bennett, who distributed literature on responding to chest pain. Both were integral in the hospital's accreditation, she said.

Roberts said Shands is one of the best rural hospitals. He said those who haven't checked out

the hospital would be surprised by what it offers.

"We're probably one of the smallest hospitals in the country to achieve this," he said.

According to the Society of Cardiovascular Patient Care, hospitals that receive chest pain center accreditation have achieved a higher level of expertise in dealing with patients who arrive with symptoms of a heart attack. They are able to provide more efficient and effective evaluation as well as more appropriate and rapid treatment of patients with chest pain and other heart attack symptoms.

Shands Starke Regional Medical Center has processes in place to:

- reduce the time from onset of symptoms to diagnosis and treatment.
- treat patients more quickly during the critical window of time when the integrity of the heart muscle can be preserved.
- monitor patients when it is not certain that they are having a heart attack to ensure that they are not sent home too quickly or needlessly admitted to the

hospital. "People tend to wait when they think they might be having a heart attack, and that's a mistake," according to Emery. "The average patient arrives in the emergency department more

than two hours after the onset of symptoms, but what they don't realize is that the sooner a heart attack is treated, the less damage to the heart and the better the outcome for the patient."

Shands is also involved in

promoting healthier behaviors to reduce the risk factors for heart attacks, and Waterhouse said they are happy to help educate local groups.

# County 'workshops' \$39M budget

Bradford County Commissioners made their first attempt in years at publicly discussing their budget for 2014-15, but got bogged down in a couple of details.

Rather than discuss the bulk of the \$39.4 million budget before them, they spent much of the time discussing whether or not to spend an additional \$10,000 on recreation.

Commission Chairman Danny Riddick requested \$10,000 for park equipment for Speedville, which lies in his district. Commissioner Eddie Lewis wanted to know where the money would come from, and

Commissioner Doyle Thomas said he didn't have a problem with spending money in Speedville, but there are other communities that have even less.

"If we put money in the pot, don't designate it all for Speedville," he said. "I would like for every little community to have something."

Riddick agreed, saying he had also been looking into someone writing a grant for a splash park similar to the one built in Lake Butler. It doesn't matter where it is located, he said.

"I feel like if we don't give our children something to do, then the sheriff is going to have to give them something to do," Riddick said.

Commissioner Ross Chandler

said the county needs to keep applying for grants, but as far as the money the commission spends, it has to be equitable for all parts of the county.

Chandler questioned funding a project already approved by the board to put a basketball court in Lincoln City for the same reasons. That project is in Lewis' district and is already underway. The money was committed to that purpose.

In the end, they compromised, agreeing to put \$10,000 more in the budget for general recreation purposes, but not designated for a particular project.

The recreation budget, which primarily covers the operation of the senior center is up from \$62,000 to more than \$89,000,

mostly due to added personnel costs. There is also now a \$15,000 reserve, up from \$10,000, to pay for contributions to qualifying athletic associations.

Sheriff Gordon Smith made a presentation about upgrading emergency dispatch. Smith said it's time to take the next step in public safety in Bradford County. For him that means giving dispatchers the tools to talk callers through an emergency while they are waiting on help to arrive. That means giving them guidance if someone is choking, bleeding, experiencing chest pain, not breathing, etc.

The software system will enable the county to dispatch resources more efficiently as well, sending paramedics or firefighters only where they are needed and only in the numbers

necessary.

Smith said the lifesaving technology would potentially benefit everyone who lives in, drives through or visits Bradford County. Alachua, Clay and Duval counties do it, but Bradford would be the first county of its size to provide this level of service, he said.

The company providing the system, Priority Dispatch, is a sole source for the product. The recurring cost will be the additional communications officers the sheriff intends to hire.

Commissioners agreed the plan and associated costs should be added to the budget.

At \$7.25 million, the fine and forfeiture fund was down from \$7.8 million as of the workshop. Of that amount, the jail accounts for \$2.1 million, up from \$2 million, and the sheriff's office accounts for \$3.18 million, up from \$3 million. More is budgeted for personnel in the jail as well as the sheriff's office. Operating costs were also up slightly in both budgets.

The fund also comprises the board's spending on insurance, utilities, repairs and maintenance, and other law enforcement related costs. The budget shows more than \$240,000 in set aside funds from inmate housing available for unplanned expenses.

Commissioner Lila Sellars said her only "beef" with the budget was the lack of a raise for employees.

"That's just a sore subject to me, because I feel that all of our employees are entitled to that," she said. She wants the board to focus on making that happen in the 2016 budget.

County Manager Brad Carter discussed a request from solid waste to add the cost of a garbage truck into the 2015 budget. The department's oldest truck has more than 800,000 miles on it. The estimated cost is around \$155,000.

Thomas asked about equipment in the road department. Carter said they were on the lookout

but believe they already have the needed funding included in the budget.

The solid waste budget proposed is currently down to \$1.45 million from \$1.49 million. The road department budget is up from \$4.53 million to \$5.19 million. That includes grants for Southeast 19<sup>th</sup> Avenue (\$258,000) and Southeast 144<sup>th</sup> Avenue (\$1.5 million). It also includes \$200,000 for milling material and \$400,000 for hauling that material. There is little change in the rest of the budget compared to 2014, including the \$153,000 included for new item requests.

The general fund is up from \$12.8 million to \$13.1 million. The primary areas of difference include the clerk's office, up \$150,000 in personnel and operating costs to \$795,000; the property appraiser, up nearly \$22,000 in personnel and operating costs to \$640,000; and maintenance, which is up nearly \$39,000 to \$505,000 largely due to a new service agreement for mold.

The supervisor of elections budget is down more than \$22,000 to \$401,000, and the county attorney's budget is down \$31,000 to \$94,000. The same \$305,000 is included for the fire departments. The EMS budget is down from \$3 million to \$2.87 million.

The county continues to bank "fiscally constrained" money from the state and is up to \$3.8 million. Chandler cautioned that the board has to be careful because the state could cease that support if it feels the county has too much.

"Even though we're just trying to be good stewards of the money, they'll just try and take that away from us," he said.

The library fund is up from \$1.99 million to nearly \$2.38 million, although the county's contribution remains around \$462,000.

The commission's first public hearing on the budget is set for 5:30 p.m. on Thursday, Sept. 4.

received more than 91 percent of the votes cast. His opponents were hardly considered at all, with one, receiving just 18 votes. Scott had more than 87 percent of the vote statewide as of press time.

There was also no contest in Bradford Republican's choice for Congress, with 85 percent wanting to see Ted

Yoho re-elected. Yoho had an overwhelming lead districtwide as well, with more than 79 percent of the vote.

Bradford Democrats were much more split on their choice for governor. Former Gov. Charlie Crist, took the majority with 52 percent of the vote, but Nan Rich was only 79 votes behind. Statewide, Crist had more than 74 percent of the vote as of press time.

As for their choice for attorney general, Bradford Democrats

chose George Sheldon over Perry Thurston 62 to 38 percent. Statewide Sheldon had 61 percent of the vote as of press time.

In another landslide, William Davis won the circuit judge race with nearly 78 percent of the vote in Bradford and 81 percent throughout the Eighth Judicial Circuit.

Bradford County's turnout for the primary was just below 25 percent.

## Starke

Starke voters will go to the polls Tuesday, Sept. 2, to vote on the same referendum that was just approved countywide. If the referendum passes in Starke, the city commission will have the same authority to negotiate tax breaks with new and expanding businesses.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at city hall. All registered voters in the Starke city limits are eligible to vote in the

election.

## Hampton

The Hampton election is set for Tuesday, Sept. 9, at Hampton City Hall. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m., and all registered voters residing in the city are eligible to participate.

All five of the council seats are up for election. The candidates are Michael David Armes, Frank Bryant, Bill Goodge, Freddie Johnston, Crystal Turner and

Dan Williams. Gene Brannock also qualified to run for mayor, a position that could be eliminated as voters are also being asked to vote on five amendments to the charter.

given modern firefighting standards.

The budget also includes \$82,000 in new capital outlay dollars to pay for radio equipment needed to communicate with Clay County and an exhaust system to remove diesel fumes from the fire station bay, Rowe said. Money is included for new fire hoses, as well.

General revenue from taxes, fees and other sources totals \$3.78 million, which is an 8-percent increase over 2014. Utility revenue is down, however, to \$12.3 million, a decrease of 2.3 percent, in spite of increases in the water and sewer rates.

The rate hikes include the second of a three-year increase

in base rates recommended by a rate study and the annual 5-percent increase in usage rates.

McMillian attributed declining revenue to a reduction in sales, but she said a lot of problem meters have been discovered, too, and the city has to be aggressive about getting those repaired.

Commissioner Wilbur Waters asked if the meter readers couldn't tell when a meter was stuck. Some customers were being billed the base rates for water and sewer, but not for any added consumption charges. Consumption for some other customers was estimated.

That needs to stop, Waters said.

He also said the city needs to be mindful of the need to replace aging and failing water lines around the city.

Capital outlay in utilities includes \$322,000 for the sewer department. The sewer costs are for equipment upgrades and software costs as well as a new lift station being installed on Pratt Street.

McMillian noted that the revenue transfer from utilities to support general government is down. It will go from \$494,000 this year to \$321,000 next year.

Retirement contributions have been cut throughout the budget because the city was working off of inflated numbers. The back and forth about what the city was contributing on employees' behalf was confusing. Overall, the city contributes 57 cents for each dollar it pays in salary to general employees, down from previous years.

McMillian said they worked closely with department heads

on developing the 2015 budget, making the budget more realistic in terms of current versus historic needs.

The document does need some tweaking. The amount rollover from the utility rate stabilization fund, for example, has not yet been included.

Though they ran over their allotted time, commissioners were just getting started, so a second budget workshop has been planned for Thursday, Sept. 4, at 6 p.m. at city hall.

## September in the garden

I have been waiting for some cooler weather to get my garden beds worked and my vegetable garden started, and so I am a little bit behind in my chores. If you are like me and have fallen behind, here are some ideas to get started.

Summer garden beds can look a little tired this time of year; try refreshing them with ageratum, celosia, zinnia and wax begonia to provide color into fall. You can also add color, texture and pattern to the garden with the many varieties of elephant's ear (*Alocasia*) available now. Other bulbs to plant now include calla, narcissus and zephyr lily. Plant herbs that tolerate the warm temperatures of early fall, such as Mexican tarragon, mint, rosemary and basil. We can also plant cool season vegetable crops such as radish, carrot, cabbage and lettuce.

Fall is a great time to work in the yard and garden, so here are some things to do in September. Fall armyworms, chinch bugs, mole crickets and sod webworms are still active this month, so continue to monitor the lawn for signs of insect damage. Now is a good time to divide and replant perennials and bulbs that have grown too large or need rejuvenation. Add organic matter to new planting areas and monitor water needs during establishment.

September is a good time to fertilize Bahia, Bermudagrass, Zoysia and St. Augustine lawns. Choose a fertilizer with no or very little phosphorus unless a soil test indicates a need for it. A fertilizer containing controlled-release nitrogen will give longer lasting results. Healthy grass is the

best defense against lawn weeds. Avoid "weed and feed" products; only apply herbicides to areas with weed infestations.

Firebush, firespike, russelia and other flowering perennials supply nectar for visiting hummingbirds. If you didn't do it in August, prepare the fall vegetable garden. Using transplants from your local garden center will get the garden off to a fast start, but seeds provide a wider variety from which to choose.

I really enjoy watching the wildlife! Here are some things to look for:

- Get feeders ready for returning birds.
- Hawk migration begins at St. Joseph Peninsula in Gulf County.
- Bald eagles return to nest sites and begin courtship.
- Manatees begin to concentrate in rivers, bays and near power plants.
- Start listening for spadefoot toads after heavy rains.
- Blue crabs migrate from the shallow panhandle coast to deeper water for the winter.

### Did you know?

Spadefoot toads are so named for a single, sharp-edged, black spade that occurs on each of the hind feet. This feature enables the amphibian to burrow vertically into sandy or loose soils. Unlike true toads, which have well-developed warts and horizontal pupils, spadefoot toads have vertical pupils and no warts. The Eastern spadefoot toad is the only spadefoot occurring east of the Mississippi River.

ARTICLE X, SECTION 28  
(Initiative)**

**Ballot Title:**

Water and Land Conservation - Dedicates funds to acquire and restore Florida conservation and recreation lands

**Ballot Summary:**

Funds the Land Acquisition Trust Fund to acquire, restore, improve, and manage conservation lands including wetlands and forests; fish and wildlife habitat; lands protecting water resources and drinking water sources, including the Everglades, and the water quality of rivers, lakes, and streams; beaches and shores; outdoor recreational lands; working farms and ranches; and historic or geologic sites, by dedicating 33 percent of net revenues from the existing excise tax on documents for 20 years.

**Financial Impact Statement:**

This amendment does not increase or decrease state revenues. The state revenue restricted to the purposes specified in the amendment is estimated to be \$648 million in Fiscal Year 2015-16 and grows to \$1.268 billion by the twentieth year. Whether this results in any additional state expenditures depends upon future legislative actions and cannot be determined. Similarly, the impact on local government revenues, if any, cannot be determined. No additional local government costs are expected.

ARTICLE X  
MISCELLANEOUS

SECTION 28. Land Acquisition Trust Fund.

a) Effective on July 1 of the year following passage of this amendment by the voters, and for a period of 20 years after that effective date, the Land Acquisition Trust Fund shall receive no less than 33 percent of net revenues derived from the existing excise tax on documents, as defined in the statutes in effect on January 1, 2012, as amended from time to time, or any successor or replacement tax, after the Department of Revenue first deducts a service charge to pay the costs of the collection and enforcement of the excise tax on documents.

b) Funds in the Land Acquisition Trust Fund shall be expended only for the following purposes:

1) As provided by law, to finance or refinance: the acquisition and improvement of land, water areas, and related property interests, including conservation easements, and resources for conservation lands including wetlands, forests, and fish and wildlife habitat; wildlife management areas; lands that protect water resources and drinking water sources, including lands protecting the water quality and quantity of rivers, lakes, streams, springsheds, and lands providing recharge for groundwater and aquifer systems; lands in the Everglades Agricultural Area and the Everglades Protection Area, as defined in Article II, Section 7(b); beaches and shores; outdoor recreation lands, including recreational trails, parks, and urban open space; rural landscapes; working farms and ranches; historic or geologic sites; together with management, restoration of natural systems, and the enhancement of public access or recreational enjoyment of conservation lands.

2) To pay the debt service on bonds issued pursuant to Article VII, Section 11(e).

c) The moneys deposited into the Land Acquisition Trust Fund, as defined by the statutes in effect on January 1, 2012, shall not be or become commingled with the General Revenue Fund of the state.

**Ballot Title:**

Use of Marijuana for Certain Medical Conditions

**Ballot Summary:**

Allows the medical use of marijuana for individuals with debilitating diseases as determined by a licensed Florida physician. Allows caregivers to assist patients medical use of marijuana. The Department of Health shall register and regulate centers that produce and distribute marijuana for medical purposes and shall issue identification cards to patients and caregivers. Applies only to Florida law. Does not authorize violations of federal law or any non-medical use, possession or production of marijuana.

**Financial Impact Statement:**

Increased costs from this amendment to state and local governments cannot be determined. There will be additional regulatory and enforcement activities associated with the production and sale of medical marijuana. Fees will offset at least a portion of the regulatory costs. While sales tax may apply to purchases, changes in revenue cannot reasonably be determined since the extent to which medical marijuana will be exempt from taxation is unclear without legislative or state administrative actions

**Full Text:**

ARTICLE X  
MISCELLANEOUS

SECTION 29. Medical marijuana production, possession and use.

(a) PUBLIC POLICY.

(1) The medical use of marijuana by a qualifying patient or personal caregiver is not subject to criminal or civil liability or sanctions under Florida law except as provided in this section.

(2) A physician licensed in Florida shall not be subject to criminal or civil liability or sanctions under Florida law for issuing a physician certification to a person diagnosed with a debilitating medical condition in a manner consistent with this section.

(3) Actions and conduct by a medical marijuana treatment center registered with the Department, or its employees, as permitted by this section and in compliance with Department regulations, shall not be subject to criminal or civil liability or sanctions under Florida law except as provided in this section.

(b) DEFINITIONS. For purposes of this section, the following words and terms shall have the following meanings:

(1) Debilitating Medical Condition means cancer, glaucoma, positive status for human immunodeficiency virus (HIV), acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS), hepatitis C, amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), Crohn's disease, Parkinson's disease, multiple sclerosis or other conditions for which a physician believes that the medical use of marijuana would likely outweigh the potential health risks for a patient.

(2) Department means the Department of Health or its successor agency.

(3) Identification card means a document issued by the Department that identifies a person who has a physician certification or a personal caregiver who is at least twenty-one (21) years old and has agreed to assist with a qualifying patient's medical use of marijuana.

(4) Marijuana has the meaning given cannabis in Section 893.02(3), Florida Statutes (2013).

(5) Medical Marijuana Treatment Center means an entity that acquires, cultivates, possesses, processes (including development of related products such as food, tinctures, aerosols, oils, or ointments), transfers, transports, sells, distributes, dispenses, or administers marijuana, products containing marijuana, related supplies, or educational materials to qualifying patients or their personal caregivers and is registered by the Department.

(6) Medical use means the acquisition, possession, use, delivery, transfer, or administration of marijuana or related supplies by a qualifying patient or personal caregiver for use by a qualifying patient for the treatment of a debilitating medical condition.

(7) Personal caregiver means a person who is at least twenty-one (21) years old who has agreed to assist with a qualifying patient's medical use of marijuana and has a caregiver identification card issued by the Department. A personal caregiver may assist no more than five (5) qualifying patients at one time. An employee of a hospice provider, nursing, or medical facility may serve as a personal caregiver to more than five (5) qualifying patients as permitted by the Department. Personal caregivers are prohibited from consuming marijuana obtained for the personal, medical use by the qualifying patient.

(8) Physician means a physician who is licensed in Florida.

(9) Physician certification means a written document signed by a physician, stating that in the physician's professional opinion, the patient suffers from a debilitating medical condition, that the potential benefits of the medical use of marijuana would likely outweigh the health risks for the patient, and for how long the physician recommends the medical use of marijuana for the patient. A physician certification may only be provided after the physician has conducted a physical examination of the patient and a full assessment of the patient's medical history.

(10) Qualifying patient means a person who has been diagnosed to have a debilitating medical condition, who has a physician certification and a valid qualifying patient identification card. If the Department does not begin issuing identification cards within nine (9) months after the effective date of this section, then a valid physician certification will serve as a patient identification card in order to allow a person to become a "qualifying patient" until the Department begins issuing identification cards.

(c) LIMITATIONS.

(1) Nothing in this section shall affect laws relating to non-medical use, possession, production or sale of marijuana.

continued...

(2) Nothing in this section authorizes the use of medical marijuana by anyone other than a qualifying patient.

(3) Nothing in this section allows the operation of a motor vehicle, boat, or aircraft while under the influence of marijuana.

(4) Nothing in this law section requires the violation of federal law or purports to give immunity under federal law.

(5) Nothing in this section shall require any accommodation of any on-site medical use of marijuana in any place of education or employment, or of smoking medical marijuana in any public place.

(6) Nothing in this section shall require any health insurance provider or any government agency or authority to reimburse any person for expenses related to the medical use of marijuana.

(d) DUTIES OF THE DEPARTMENT. The Department shall issue reasonable regulations necessary for the implementation and enforcement of this section. The purpose of the regulations is to ensure the availability and safe use of medical marijuana by qualifying patients. It is the duty of the Department to promulgate regulations in a timely fashion.

(1) Implementing Regulations. In order to allow the Department sufficient time after passage of this section, the following regulations shall be promulgated no later than six (6) months after the effective date of this section:

a. Procedures for the issuance of qualifying patient identification cards to people with physician certifications, and standards for the renewal of such identification cards.

b. Procedures for the issuance of personal caregiver identification cards to persons qualified to assist with a qualifying patient's medical use of marijuana, and standards for the renewal of such identification cards.

c. Procedures for the registration of Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers that include procedures for the issuance, renewal, suspension, and revocation of registration, and standards to ensure security, record keeping, testing, labeling, inspection, and safety.

d. A regulation that defines the amount of marijuana that could reasonably be presumed to be an adequate supply for qualifying patients medical use, based on the best available evidence. This presumption as to quantity may be overcome with evidence of a particular qualifying patient's appropriate medical use.

(2) Issuance of identification cards and registrations. The Department shall begin issuing qualifying patient and personal caregiver identification cards, as well as begin registering Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers no later than nine months (9) after the effective date of this section.

(3) If the Department does not issue regulations, or if the Department does not begin issuing identification cards and registering Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers within the time limits set in this section, any Florida citizen shall have standing to seek judicial relief to compel compliance with the Department's constitutional duties.

(4) The Department shall protect the confidentiality of all qualifying patients. All records containing the identity of qualifying patients shall be confidential and kept from public disclosure other than for valid medical or law enforcement purposes.

(e) LEGISLATION. Nothing in this section shall limit the legislature from enacting laws consistent with this provision.

(f) SEVERABILITY. The provisions of this section are severable and if any clause, sentence, paragraph or section of this measure, or an application thereof, is adjudged invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction other provisions shall continue to be in effect to the fullest extent possible.

ARTICLE V, SECTIONS 10, 11  
(Legislature)**

**Ballot Title:**

Prospective Appointment of Certain Judicial Vacancies

**Ballot Summary:**

Proposing an amendment to the State Constitution requiring the Governor to prospectively fill vacancies in a judicial office to which election for retention applies resulting from the justices or judges reaching the mandatory retirement age or failure to qualify for a retention election; and allowing prospective appointments if a justice or judge is not retained at an election. Currently, the Governor may not fill an expected vacancy until the current justices or judges term expires.

**Full Text:**

ARTICLE V  
JUDICIARY

SECTION 10. Retention; election and terms.

(a) Any justice or judge may qualify for retention by a vote of the electors in the general election next preceding the expiration of the justices or judges term in the manner prescribed by law. When a justice or judge is ineligible for retention or fails to qualify for retention, a prospective vacancy is deemed to occur at the conclusion of the qualifying period for retention for the purpose of appointing a successor justice or judge, and a vacancy shall exist in that office upon the expiration of the term being served by the justice or judge. When a justice or judge so qualifies, the ballot shall read substantially as follows: Shall Justice (or Judge) ... (name of justice or judge) ... of the ... (name of the court) ... be retained in office? If a majority of the qualified electors voting within the territorial jurisdiction of the court vote to retain, the justice or judge shall be retained for a term of six years. The term of the justice or judge retained shall commence on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in January following the general election. If a majority of the qualified electors voting within the territorial jurisdiction of the court vote to not retain, a prospective vacancy is deemed to occur immediately following the general election for the purpose of appointing a successor justice or judge, and a vacancy shall exist in that office upon the expiration of the term being served by the justice or judge.

(b)(1) The election of circuit judges shall be preserved notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a) unless a majority of those voting in the jurisdiction of that circuit approves a local option to select circuit judges by merit selection and retention rather than by election. The election of circuit judges shall be by a vote of the qualified electors within the territorial jurisdiction of the court.

(2) The election of county court judges shall be preserved notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a) unless a majority of those voting in the jurisdiction of that county approves a local option to select county judges by merit selection and retention rather than by election. The election of county court judges shall be by a vote of the qualified electors within the territorial jurisdiction of the court.

(3)a. A vote to exercise a local option to select circuit court judges and county court judges by merit selection and retention rather than by election shall be held in each circuit and county at the general election in the year 2000. If a vote to exercise this local option fails in a vote of the electors, such option shall not again be put to a vote of the electors of that jurisdiction until the expiration of at least two years.

b. After the year 2000, a circuit may initiate the local option for merit selection and retention or the election of circuit judges, whichever is applicable, by filing with the custodian of state records a petition signed by the number of electors equal to at least ten percent of the votes cast in the circuit in the last preceding election in which presidential electors were chosen.

c. After the year 2000, a county may initiate the local option for merit selection and retention or the election of county court judges, whichever is applicable, by filing with the supervisor of elections a petition signed by the number of electors equal to at least ten percent of the votes cast in the county in the last preceding election in which presidential electors were chosen. The terms of circuit judges and judges of county courts shall be for six years.

SECTION 11. Vacancies.

(a)(1) Whenever a vacancy occurs in a judicial office to which election for retention applies, the governor shall fill the vacancy by appointing for a term ending on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in January of the year following the next general election occurring at least one year after the date of appointment, one of not fewer than three persons nor more than six persons nominated by the appropriate judicial nominating commission.

(2) Whenever a prospective vacancy occurs in a judicial office for which election for retention applies, the governor shall fill the prospective vacancy by appointing a justice or judge from among at least three persons but not more than six persons nominated by the appropriate judicial nominating commission. The term of the appointment commences upon the expiration of the term of the office being vacated and ends on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in January of the year following the next general election.

(b) The governor shall fill each vacancy on a circuit court or on a county court, wherein the judges are elected by a majority vote of the electors, by appointing for a term ending on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in January of the year following the next primary and general election occurring at least one year after the date of appointment, one of not fewer than three persons nor more than six persons nominated by the appropriate judicial nominating commission. An election shall be held to fill that judicial office for the term of the office beginning at the end of the appointed term.

(c) The nominations shall be made within thirty days from the occurrence of a vacancy or prospective vacancy unless the period is extended by the governor for a time not to exceed thirty days. The governor shall make the appointment within sixty days after the nominations have been certified to the governor.

(d) There shall be a separate judicial nominating commission as provided by general law for the supreme court, each district court of appeal, and each judicial circuit for all trial courts within the circuit. Uniform rules of procedure shall be established by the judicial nominating commissions at each level of the court system. Such rules, or any part thereof, may be repealed by general law enacted by a majority vote of the membership of each house of the legislature, or by the supreme court, five justices concurring. Except for deliberations of the judicial nominating commissions, the proceedings of the commissions and their records shall be open to the public.

Yo, Ken Detzner, Secretario de Estado del Estado de la Florida, por el presente notifico que se llevarán a cabo elecciones en cada condado de la Florida, el 4 de noviembre del 2014, para la aprobación o el rechazo de una propuesta de modificación de la constitución del Estado de la Florida.

## No. 1 ENMIENDA CONSTITUCIONAL ARTÍCULO X, SECCIÓN 28 (Iniciativa)

### Título de la boleta:

Conservación de aguas y tierras: dedicar fondos para adquirir y restaurar tierras objeto de conservación y recreación en el Estado de Florida

### Resumen de la boleta:

Provee fondos para el Fondo Fiduciario de Adquisición de Tierras con el fin de adquirir, restaurar, mejorar y administrar tierras objeto de conservación, entre ellas pantanos y bosques; el hábitat de peces y vida silvestre; tierras que protegen los recursos hídricos y las fuentes de agua potable, incluidos los Everglades, y la calidad del agua en ríos, lagos y arroyos; playas y costas; tierras de recreación al aire libre; establecimientos agrícolas y ganaderos en actividad, y emplazamientos históricos o geológicos. Para ello se dedicará el 33% de los ingresos netos obtenidos del impuesto especial existente sobre documentos durante 20 años.

### Declaración sobre impacto financiero:

Esta enmienda no incrementa ni reduce los ingresos estatales. El ingreso estatal limitado para los propósitos especificados en la enmienda se estima en \$648 millones para el año fiscal 2015-16 y aumenta a \$1.268 mil millones hacia el vigésimo año. Si eso traerá como consecuencia gastos estatales adicionales depende de futuras acciones legislativas y no puede determinarse. De la misma manera, tampoco puede determinarse el impacto sobre los ingresos de gobiernos locales, si los hubiera. No se prevén costos de gobiernos locales.

### Texto completo:

#### ARTÍCULO X VARIOS

#### SECCIÓN 28. Fondo Fiduciario de Adquisición de Tierras.—

a) Con vigencia el 1° de julio del año posterior a la aprobación de esta enmienda por parte de los votantes y durante un período de 20 años a partir de esa fecha de entrada en vigor, el Fondo Fiduciario de Adquisición de Tierras recibirá no menos del 33% de los ingresos netos derivados del impuesto especial existente sobre documentos, tal como se define en los estatutos vigentes al 1° de enero de 2012, enmendados de tanto en tanto, o de cualquier impuesto sucesor o de reemplazo, después de que el Departamento de Hacienda deduzca primero un cargo de servicio con el fin de pagar los costos de recopilación y aplicación del impuesto especial sobre documentos.

b) El dinero del Fondo Fiduciario de Adquisición de Tierras se empleará únicamente con los siguientes propósitos:

1) Como lo establece la ley, para financiar o refinanciar: la adquisición o mejora de tierras, áreas de agua y derechos inmobiliarios relacionados, entre ellos las servidumbres de conservación y los recursos para tierras objeto de conservación, como, por ejemplo, pantanos, bosques y hábitat de peces y vida silvestre; áreas de administración de vida silvestre; tierras que protegen los recursos hídricos y las fuentes de agua potable, entre ellos las tierras que protegen la calidad y cantidad del agua en ríos, lagos, arroyos, manantiales, y tierras que brindan recarga de agua subterránea y sistemas acuíferos; tierras en el Área agrícola de los Everglades y el Área de protección de los Everglades, como están definidas en el Artículo II, Sección 7(b); playas y costas; tierras de recreación al aire libre, incluidos senderos recreativos, parques y espacios abiertos urbanos; paisajes rurales; establecimientos agrícolas y ganaderos en actividad, emplazamientos históricos o geológicos; junto con la administración, restauración de sistemas naturales y mejoramiento del acceso público o disfrute recreativo de las tierras objeto de conservación.

2) Para el pago del servicio de la deuda sobre los bonos emitidos conforme al Artículo VII, Sección 11(e).

c) El dinero depositado en el Fondo Fiduciario de Adquisición de Tierras, tal como se define en los estatutos vigentes al 1° de enero de 2012, no estará mezclado ni se mezclará con el Fondo de Ingresos Generales del Estado.

## No. 2 ENMIENDA CONSTITUCIONAL ARTÍCULO X, SECCIÓN 29 (Iniciativa)

### Título de la boleta:

Uso de marihuana para algunas enfermedades

### Resumen de la boleta:

Permite el uso médico de la marihuana a las personas con enfermedades debilitantes, según lo determine un médico autorizado por el Estado de Florida. Permite a los cuidadores asistir a los pacientes en el uso médico de marihuana. El Departamento de Salud deberá inscribir y regular los centros que producen y distribuyen marihuana con fines médicos y deberán extender tarjetas de identificación a pacientes y cuidadores. Se aplica únicamente a las leyes del Estado de Florida. No autoriza infracciones de la ley federal ni ningún uso, posesión o producción de marihuana con fines que no sean médicos.

### Declaración sobre impacto financiero:

El aumento de costos generado por esta enmienda para el gobierno estatal y los gobiernos locales no puede determinarse. Habrá actividades adicionales de regulación y aplicación asociadas a la producción y venta de marihuana con fines médicos. Las tarifas compensarán al menos en parte los costos de regulación. Si bien el impuesto sobre la venta se aplica a las compras, los cambios fiscales no pueden determinarse de manera razonable, dado que, si no existe una acción legislativa o administrativa estatal, no está claro en qué medida la marihuana con fines médicos estará exenta de impuestos.

### Texto completo:

#### ARTÍCULO X VARIOS

#### SECCIÓN 29. Producción, posesión y uso de marihuana con fines médicos.—

##### (a) POLÍTICA PÚBLICA.

(1) El uso médico de marihuana por parte de un paciente calificado o un cuidador personal no está sujeto a responsabilidad ni a sanciones penales o civiles conforme a las leyes del Estado de Florida, excepto según se indica en esta sección.

(2) Un médico autorizado por el Estado de Florida no estará sujeto a responsabilidad penal o civil ni a sanciones, conforme a las leyes del Estado de Florida, por extender un certificado médico a una persona diagnosticada con una enfermedad debilitante de conformidad con esta sección.

(3) Las acciones y el comportamiento de un centro de tratamiento de marihuana con fines médicos inscrito ante el Departamento, o sus empleados, según se contempla en esta sección y en cumplimiento de las reglamentaciones del Departamento, no estarán sujetos a responsabilidad ni a sanciones penales o civiles conforme a las leyes del Estado de Florida, excepto según se indica en esta sección.

(b) DEFINICIONES. A los fines de esta sección, las siguientes palabras y términos tendrán los siguientes significados:

(1) «Enfermedad debilitante» significa cáncer, glaucoma, estado positivo del virus de inmunodeficiencia humana (VIH), síndrome de inmunodeficiencia adquirida (SIDA), hepatitis C, esclerosis lateral amiotrófica (ELA), enfermedad de Crohn, enfermedad de Parkinson, esclerosis múltiple u otras enfermedades para las cuales, a criterio del médico, los beneficios del uso médico de la marihuana probablemente serían superiores a los riesgos potenciales para la salud de un paciente.

(2) «Departamento» significa el Departamento de Salud o su agencia sucesora.

(3) «Tarjeta de identificación» significa un documento emitido por el Departamento que identifica a una persona que tiene un certificado médico o a un cuidador personal de por lo menos veintiún (21) años de edad que ha aceptado asistir a un paciente calificado en el uso médico de marihuana.

(4) «Marihuana» tiene el significado otorgado al cannabis en la Sección 893.02(3) de los Estatutos de Florida (2013).

(5) «Centro de tratamiento de marihuana con fines médicos» significa una entidad que adquiere, cultiva, posee, procesa (incluido el desarrollo de productos relacionados tales como alimentos, tinturas, aerosoles, aceites o ungüentos), transfiere, transporta, vende, distribuye, despacha o administra marihuana, productos que contienen marihuana, suministros relacionados o material educativo a pacientes calificados o a sus cuidadores personales y que está inscrito ante el Departamento.

(6) «Uso médico» significa la adquisición, posesión, uso, entrega, transferencia o administración de marihuana o suministros relacionados por parte de un paciente calificado o un cuidador personal para ser usados por un paciente calificado para el tratamiento de una enfermedad debilitante.

(7) «Cuidador personal» significa una persona de por lo menos veintiún (21) años de edad que ha aceptado asistir a un paciente calificado en el uso médico de marihuana y tiene una tarjeta de identificación de cuidador emitida por el Departamento. Un cuidador personal no puede asistir a más de cinco (5) pacientes por vez. Un empleado de un proveedor de cuidados paliativos o de un centro médico o de un hogar de ancianos puede actuar como cuidador personal para más de cinco (5) pacientes calificados, según lo permite el Departamento. Está prohibido para los cuidadores personales consumir marihuana obtenida para el uso personal y médico del paciente calificado.

(8) «Médico» significa un médico autorizado por el Estado de Florida.

(9) «Certificado médico» significa un documento por escrito firmado por un médico, en el que se indica que, en la opinión profesional del médico, el paciente sufre de una enfermedad debilitante, que los beneficios potenciales del uso médico de la marihuana probablemente sean superiores a los riesgos para la salud del paciente, y se indica durante cuánto tiempo el médico recomienda el uso médico de marihuana para el paciente. Un certificado médico sólo puede extenderse después de que el médico haya realizado un examen físico del paciente y una evaluación completa del historial médico del paciente.

(10) «Paciente calificado» significa una persona a la que se le ha diagnosticado una enfermedad debilitante, que tiene un certificado médico y una tarjeta de identificación válida de paciente calificado. Si el Departamento no comienza a emitir tarjetas de identificación dentro de los nueve (9) meses posteriores a la fecha de entrada en vigor de esta sección, un certificado médico válido servirá como tarjeta de identificación de paciente para permitir que una persona se convierta en «paciente calificado» hasta tanto el Departamento comience a emitir tarjetas de identificación.

##### (c) LIMITACIONES.

(1) Nada de lo contenido en esta sección afectará a las leyes referidas al uso no médico, posesión, producción o venta de marihuana.

### continuado...

(2) Nada de lo contenido en esta sección autoriza el uso de marihuana con fines médicos a cualquier persona que no sea un paciente calificado.

(3) Nada de lo contenido en esta sección permite la operación de un vehículo de motor, embarcación o aeronave mientras se está bajo la influencia de la marihuana.

(4) Nada de lo contenido en esta sección requiere que se infrinjan las leyes federales o pretenda otorgar inmunidad conforme a las leyes federales.

(5) Nada de lo contenido en esta sección requerirá adaptación alguna para el uso médico de marihuana en ningún lugar de educación o trabajo, ni para fumar marihuana con fines médicos en ningún sitio público.

(6) Nada de lo contenido en esta sección requerirá que ningún proveedor de seguros de salud u organismo o autoridad del gobierno reembolse a ninguna persona por los gastos relacionados con el uso médico de marihuana.

(d) OBLIGACIONES DEL DEPARTAMENTO. El Departamento deberá emitir reglamentaciones razonables y necesarias para la implementación y aplicación de esta sección. El propósito de las reglamentaciones es garantizar la disponibilidad y el uso seguro de marihuana con fines médicos por parte de los pacientes calificados. Es obligación del Departamento promulgar reglamentaciones de manera oportuna.

(1) Implementación de reglamentaciones. Con el objeto de otorgarle al Departamento tiempo suficiente después de la aprobación de esta sección, las siguientes reglamentaciones deberán promulgarse a más tardar seis (6) meses después de la fecha de entrada en vigor de esta sección:

a. Procedimientos para la emisión de tarjetas de identificación de paciente calificado a las personas portadoras de certificados médicos, y estándares para la renovación de dichas tarjetas de identificación.

b. Procedimientos para la emisión de tarjetas de identificación de cuidador personal a personas calificadas para asistir a un paciente calificado en el uso médico de marihuana, y estándares para la renovación de dichas tarjetas de identificación.

c. Procedimientos para la inscripción de Centros de Tratamiento de Marihuana Con Fines Médicos, que incluyan procedimientos para la emisión, renovación, suspensión y revocación de inscripciones, y estándares para garantizar la seguridad informática, el mantenimiento de registros, análisis, etiquetado, inspección y seguridad.

d. Una reglamentación que defina la cantidad de marihuana que podría considerarse un suministro adecuado y razonable para el uso médico de los pacientes calificados, sobre la base de las mejores pruebas disponibles. Esta presunción referida a la cantidad puede contrarrestarse con pruebas del uso médico apropiado por parte de un paciente calificado en particular.

(2) Emisión de tarjetas de identificación e inscripciones. El Departamento comenzará a emitir tarjetas de identificación de paciente calificado y cuidador personal, y también iniciará la inscripción de Centros de Tratamiento de Marihuana Con Fines Médicos a más tardar nueve (9) meses después de la fecha de entrada en vigor de esta sección.

(3) Si el Departamento no emite las reglamentaciones, o si el Departamento no comienza a emitir tarjetas de identificación y a inscribir a Centros de Tratamiento de Marihuana Con Fines Médicos dentro de los plazos establecidos en esta sección, cualquier ciudadano del Estado de Florida tendrá derecho a valerse de recursos judiciales para obligar al cumplimiento de las obligaciones constitucionales del Departamento.

(4) El Departamento deberá proteger la confidencialidad de todos los pacientes calificados. Todos los registros que contengan la identidad de los pacientes calificados deberán ser confidenciales y estar exentos de divulgación pública excepto con fines médicos o referidos al cumplimiento de la ley válidos.

(e) LEGISLACIÓN. Nada de lo contenido en esta sección limitará a la legislación para promulgar leyes coherentes con esta disposición.

(f) DIVISIBILIDAD. Las disposiciones contenidas en esta sección son divisibles, y si cualquier tribunal competente declara la invalidez de cualquier cláusula, oración, párrafo o sección de esta medida, o su aplicación, las demás disposiciones continuarán vigentes en la mayor medida posible.

## No. 3 ENMIENDA CONSTITUCIONAL ARTÍCULO V, SECCIONES 10, 11 (Asamblea Legislativa)

### Título de la boleta:

Nombramiento Eventual para Ciertos Cargos Judiciales Vacantes

### Resumen de la boleta:

Proponer una enmienda a la Constitución del Estado en la que se establezca que el Gobernador debe cubrir las vacantes eventuales en los cargos judiciales que estén sujetos a elecciones de retención cuando los jueces o magistrados se encuentren por cumplir la edad legal para jubilarse o en el supuesto de que no califiquen para la elección de retención; y permitir los nombramientos eventuales si un juez o magistrado no se retiene en su cargo en una elección de retención. En la actualidad, el Gobernador no puede cubrir una vacante prevista hasta que termine el mandato del juez o magistrado actual.

### Texto completo:

#### ARTÍCULO V PODER JUDICIAL

#### SECCIÓN 10. Retención; elección y mandatos.—

(a) Cualquier juez o magistrado puede calificar para la retención, la cual se produce mediante el voto de los electores en la próxima elección general que sea anterior a la conclusión del mandato del juez o magistrado por las causas establecidas por ley. Cuando si un juez o magistrado no esté habilitado para ser retenido o no cumple con los requisitos para la retención, se producirá una vacante eventual al finalizar el periodo de calificación de retención a fin de nombrar un juez o magistrado sucesor, y se producirá una vacante en ese cargo judicial a la finalización del mandato cumplido por el juez o magistrado. Cuando un juez o magistrado califique como tal para la retención, en la boleta se deberá leer claramente lo siguiente: "¿Deberá el Magistrado (o Juez) ... (nombre del juez o magistrado)... de la... (nombre de la corte)... ser retenido en el cargo judicial?" Si la mayoría de los electores calificados que votan dentro de la jurisdicción territorial de la corte eligen retenerlo, entonces, el juez o magistrado continuará ejerciendo sus funciones durante un periodo de seis años. Este mandato del juez o magistrado que ha sido retenido comenzará el primer martes luego del primer lunes de enero siguiente a la elección general. Si la mayoría de los electores calificados que votan dentro de la jurisdicción territorial de la corte eligen no retenerlo, una vacante eventual se producirá inmediatamente luego de la elección general con la finalidad de nombrar a un juez o magistrado sucesor, y se producirá una vacante en ese cargo judicial a la finalización del mandato cumplido por el juez o magistrado.

(b)(1) Se deberá mantener el método de elección de jueces de circuito sin perjuicio de las disposiciones de la sub-sección (a), excepto que la mayoría de los votantes en la jurisdicción de dicho circuito aprueben la opción local de elegir a los jueces de circuito mediante el sistema de selección por mérito y elecciones de retención en lugar de mediante una elección. La elección de los jueces de circuito deberá realizarse mediante el voto de electores calificados dentro de la jurisdicción territorial de la corte.

(2) Se deberá mantener el método de elección de los jueces de la corte del condado, sin perjuicio de las disposiciones de la sub-sección (a), excepto que la mayoría de los votantes en la jurisdicción de dicho condado aprueben la opción local de elegir a los jueces del condado mediante el sistema de selección por mérito y elecciones de retención en lugar de mediante una elección. La elección de los jueces del Condado deberá realizarse mediante el voto de electores calificados dentro de la jurisdicción territorial de la corte.

(3)a. En la elección general del año 2000 se deberá votar en cada jurisdicción territorial de circuito y de condado para decidir si el modo de elegir a los jueces de circuito y a los jueces del condado será mediante el sistema de selección por mérito y elecciones de retención en lugar de mediante una elección. Si los electores votan por no ejercer esta opción local, esta opción no podrá someterse a votación de los electores en esa jurisdicción hasta que hayan transcurrido al menos dos años.

b. A partir del año 2000, cada circuito puede presentar la opción local de elección por mérito y elecciones de retención o de la elección de jueces de circuito, según corresponda, al presentar una solicitud ante el encargado de los registros estatales. Dicha solicitud deberá estar firmada por un número de electores igual a por lo menos el diez por ciento de los votos emitidos en la jurisdicción de ese circuito en la última elección presidencial efectuada.

c. A partir del año 2000, cada condado puede presentar la opción local de elección por mérito y elecciones de retención o la elección de los jueces del condado, según corresponda, al presentar una solicitud ante el supervisor de las elecciones. Dicha solicitud deberá estar firmada por un número de electores igual a por lo menos el diez por ciento de los votos emitidos en el condado en la última elección presidencial efectuada. Los mandatos de los jueces de circuito y los jueces de condado serán de seis años.

#### SECCIÓN 11. Vacantes.—

(a)(1) Siempre que se produzca una vacante en un cargo judicial sujeto a la elección de retención, el gobernador deberá cubrir la vacante mediante el nombramiento de una persona entre al menos tres y no más de seis personas nominadas por la comisión judicial de nombramientos correspondiente, por un periodo que finalizará el primer martes luego del primer lunes de enero del año siguiente a las próximas elecciones generales que se efectúen al menos un año después de la fecha del nombramiento.

(2) Siempre que se produzca una vacante eventual en un cargo judicial sujeto a la elección de retención, el gobernador deberá cubrir esa vacante eventual mediante el nombramiento de un juez o un magistrado de entre al menos tres personas y no más de seis personas nominadas por la comisión judicial de nombramientos correspondiente. El plazo del nombramiento comienza cuando finaliza el plazo del cargo que quedó vacante y concluye el primer martes luego del primer lunes de enero del año siguiente a la próxima elección general.

(b) El gobernador deberá cubrir cada vacante de una corte de circuito o de una corte de condado, en donde los jueces sean elegidos por mayoría de votos de los electores, al nombrar a una persona entre no menos de tres y no más de seis personas nominadas por la comisión judicial de nombramientos correspondiente, por un periodo que concluye el primer martes luego del primer lunes de enero del año que sigue a elección primaria y general que se efectúe por lo menos un año después de la fecha del nombramiento. Se deberá realizar una elección para cubrir ese cargo judicial por el periodo del cargo que comienza a finalizar el periodo del cargo por nombramiento.

(c) Los nombramientos se deberán realizar dentro de los treinta días desde que se ha producido la vacante o vacante eventual, excepto que el gobernador extienda el período por un lapso que no podrá exceder los treinta días. El gobernador deberá realizar el nombramiento dentro de los sesenta días desde que los nombramientos hayan sido certificados ante el gobernador.

(d) Tal como lo establece la legislación general, deberán existir diferentes comisiones judiciales de nombramientos para el Tribunal Supremo, para cada tribunal de apelación de distrito, y para cada circuito judicial en todos los juzgados de primera instancia del circuito. Las comisiones judiciales de nombramientos deberán establecer reglamentos de procedimiento uniformes en cada nivel del sistema judicial. Tales reglamentos, o cualquier parte de ellos, podrán ser derogados por las leyes generales promulgadas con la mayoría de votos de cada cámara de la Asamblea Legislativa, o por el Tribunal Supremo de Justicia con el voto concurrente de cinco magistrados. A excepción de las deliberaciones realizadas por las comisiones judiciales de nombramientos, los procedimientos de las comisiones y sus registros deberán estar abiertos al público.

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

## Mosley: lifelong BC resident has lived the life he wanted

One of the neat things about growing up in a small, mostly rural county is the fact that the friends you make while you are young often turn out to be your best friends and business associates later in life. This is true for lifelong Bradford County resident Lawrence Mosley, and he said he wouldn't have it any other way.

Mosley was born on Oct. 20, 1948 on a farm located at the northern end of Starke. Besides Mosley, parents Irvin and Doular had three girls and another boy, all of whom are still living. One sister, Judy Roundtree, still lives in the area.

Mosley was educated in Starke, where he played junior varsity football. Sports fell second to practicality in his junior year, however, when he enrolled in the DVT program in which he attended classes half a day, then worked the other half.

He may not have known it then but this first job was to set him in the path to what would become his lifelong profession. He worked at the Firestone store at the corner of U.S. 301 and S.R. 100, where CVS Pharmacy is located today. When Mosley graduated in 1966, he went to work there full time until he was drafted in 1968.

Drafted into the Army, Mosley went to Vietnam, where he was shot in the leg. This event would change his life 40 years down the road, but at the time he knew it was a bad wound, which became infected with a rare infection in Japan and therefore took over a year to heal.

"They talked about taking the leg off then," Mosley said. "I asked them not to. They said that I would lose it eventually. After 40 years I thought I might have dodged the bullet, but when I had my second knee replacement in 2008 the infection came back and they had to amputate my leg. I knew it was going to happen eventually, but it was still a shock."

Mosley has nothing but praise for the medical treatment he has received at the Veteran's

Administration Hospital in Gainesville.

"I have always received the best of care and all of my needs have been met by them," Mosley said. "Personally, I have never had a problem scheduling an appointment and have always been satisfied with the treatment

I have received."

When he had recovered from being shot, Mosley returned to Bradford County. It was 1970 and the Firestone store had closed, so he went to work for Baldwin Chevrolet and Oldsmobile as service manager. After five years there, Mosley decided to

strike out on his own and started his own tire business right next door in the old Chrysler building — renting from Mack Baldwin. The grand opening occurred on June 1, 1975, a recurring date since he had been shot on June 1, 1969.

The business, Mosley Tire

Company, eventually moved south of town to the building which had housed the B&G Truck Stop. The property had been foreclosed on and was auctioned by the Florida Bank. He credits getting the building to Jay Thompson, the loan officer at the bank, who helped him get

financing to made the purchase. Mosley married in 1966 and had one daughter, Dawn Miscally, with wife, Linda. He worked hard at building his business and in his own words

"made a good living."

As a local businessman, Mosley did his part to serve the community, serving on the Bradford County Commission from 1980-88. He chaired that body three times. Along with commission members Maxie Carter, Jr., E.W. Hodges, E.L. Norman and Wilbur Waters, he faced some difficult decisions that were not always popular with county residents.

"In 1984, we had major road issues," Mosley said. "We had 357 miles of dirt roads in the county with no money to pave them and not enough funds to maintain them as they should be. We ended up passing a local-option gasoline tax of 6 cents to pay for paving. There really wasn't much else we could do."

Mosley said he still thinks this tax is a good idea, since there are still more dirt roads in the county in need of paving and all of the roads can benefit from the funds for maintenance and improvements.

A year later, the commission was faced with another high-dollar issue — the closing of the landfill at Keystone Heights.

"The closing of the landfill was a very big process and was also pretty expensive," Mosley said. "It was one of those things which had to be done right then, not put off a year or two. We ended up passing a local-option assessment to cover the costs. I don't think anyone was very happy about it, but it had to be done."

Mosley said that, at the time, Bradford County was a very close-knit, clannish community — making it unique in the area. It has changed now, he said, mostly due to the influx of residents who

work in larger urban areas, but want to live in a quieter area.

Although he worked hard, both in his business and in the community, Mosley did occasionally take time out to play. He said he enjoyed fishing, but that his real passion was hunting ducks, geese and doves.

"My brother was on the Baltimore Police Department and a man he worked with had a large farm on the eastern shore of the Chesapeake Bay," Mosley said. "Leroy Jackson, Neil Tucker, Pat Welch, Doyle Thomas and I would go up there to shoot geese and ducks. It was always a really fun trip."

Always on the look out for fun, Mosley could often be found behind the scenes on humorous and complex practical jokes — often in the company of Lawtey sawmill owner Tom Tatum (a friend since childhood) and several other local men. Most memorable of these has to be the mock funeral given to Tatum's "political machine" after Tatum had supported about 20 losing candidates in a row.

Mosley was in business with Thomas for a while in T & M Towing. Eventually Thomas bought him out, but the name remains the same.

Mosley cites the greatest influence in his life as J.L. Andrews, a local entrepreneur.

Andrews would come to the tire store and just hang around and talk. Mosley said he gleaned a great deal of business advice and just plain good sense from chatting with Andrews and listening to his stories.

Mosley lost his wife in 1995 to pancreatic cancer. He lost his leg in 2008. He planned then to simply close Mosley Tire, but changed his mind when his son-in-law, Russell Miscally Jr., showed interest in taking over the business.

"Russell had worked for me for several years at the tire store before going to Jacksonville to do HVAC work," Mosley said.

"He said he wanted to come back to work in town and would take over the business. I was happy to see him take over."

Mosley is retired, but not inactive. While he has not hunted in about 20 years, he does enjoy spending time outside with his purebred Angus cattle.

"I've always had a few cattle," Mosley said. "I started with just my family land and have slowly built up to almost 100 acres. I now have more the 40 Angus, all purebred. I sell their offspring, usually as breeding stock. I like riding around on my four-wheeler and talking to the cattle. I always get the answer I want

from them."

Mosley also has an interest in, as he calls it, junk. His partner is Nancy Franks, who knows the antique business. Pickle Peppers Antiques and Thrift Shop is located on U.S. 301 in the building that housed the Silver Lining Indian Trading Post for many years.

"I like junk," Mosley said with a smile. "Nancy knows the business and where I see junk, she sees merchandise. I go to the auctions and look, but I usually let her decide what to buy for the store. Except for old neon automotive signs. I collect those."

Off to the side, behind his house, Mosley has a building that has both inside and outside

eating areas, as well as kitchen facilities. This building is used for entertaining of all sorts, from birthday parties to political fundraisers. Mosley admits he loves to entertain. The area also gives him a place to exhibit all his automotive memorabilia.

Mosley stays busy, often meeting friends for lunch or other activities. He also enjoys spending time with his two grandchildren. He says he is content with his life.

"I think I have done a great many things I wanted to do in my life and accomplished some things as well," Mosley said. "Best of all, I have managed to have a little fun along the way and made some good, lifelong friends as well."

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# Hilliard rallies, but Tigers win 48-42 on game's last play

Host Hilliard scored three touchdowns against Union

County High School's junior varsity players to rally and tie the score in the fourth quarter, but quarterback Ty Cook found fellow sophomore Seth

Hendricks in the back of the end zone for a 15-yard touchdown as time expired to give the Tigers a 48-42 win in an Aug. 22 kickoff classic.

Union head coach Ronny Pruitt said it was exciting to watch the young players come through in the end.

"They'll remember that," Pruitt said.

The Tigers rolled up 599 yards of offense, with its varsity starters gaining 382 of that in the first half alone. The Tigers built a 42-12 lead before junior varsity players began entering the game late in the third quarter.

As typical of a preseason game, Pruitt saw some things he liked—such as a balanced offense, especially in a first half that saw the Tigers gain 193 yards on the ground and 189 yards through the air—and some things he didn't—four turnovers.

Still, he noted that the team was playing quite a number of inexperienced players. Plus, the team met its goal of getting

everyone playing time.

"Overall, with the effort they gave, I'm proud of them," Pruitt said. "Everybody got in. I'm happy with that."

The teams exchanged turnovers to open the game, but the Tigers put together an 85-yard scoring drive following James Ford's fumble recovery. Isaiah Johnson sparked the drive with a 22-yard run, while Antwan Durn had a 17-yard carry to the Hilliard 46. Johnson, who had 141 yards rushing and receiving—as well as 105 yards on four kick returns—capped the drive when he took a short pass from Caleb Cox and turned it into a 40-yard touchdown. Tyler McDavid's PAT put Union up 7-0 at the 6:46 mark of the first quarter.

Hilliard pulled to within one with 2:33 left in the first quarter, taking advantage of a short punt. The Flashes had to drive only 28 yards, with a 10-yard scramble by quarterback Bryce Jenkins setting up Austin Turner's 5-yard touchdown run.

The PAT was no good.

Union responded by scoring on three straight possessions.

First, another 85-yard drive, that featured a 24-yard run by Durn to the Hilliard 26. Durn followed that with a 16-yard run, setting up a 10-yard touchdown run by Cox, with McDavid's PAT making it 14-6 with 58 seconds remaining in the first quarter.

On the Tigers' next drive, Cox completed 4-of-4 passes for 67 yards. A 29-yard pass play to Johnson set up first-and-goal at the 5-yard line. Johnson, who rushed for 72 yards on seven carries, scored on a run from there, with a two-point pass play from Casey Driggers to Zach Lee making it a 22-6 game.

Durn, who rushed for 87 yards on 10 carries, put the Tigers on the move on their next drive with carries of 12 and 14 yards. Darion Robinson's 34-yard run set up first-and-goal at the 6. Robinson, who finished with 47 yards on six carries, eventually scored on a 1-yard run. After McDavid's PAT, Union led 29-6 with 4:53 left in the half.

Hilliard made it a 17-point

game at the half when Jenkins completed a 19-yard touchdown pass to Josh Taylor. Jenkins was 4-of-5 on the drive and finished the game 21-of-36 for 166 yards.

Union's Josh Hedman recovered a muffed kick to start the second half. That led to a 31-yard scoring drive that was helped by a 15-yard penalty against Hilliard. Cox found Parker Hodgson across the middle of the field for a 15-yard touchdown and a 35-12 lead.

It was the final series of the game for Cox, who completed 13-of-25 passes for 210 yards.

Hodgson finished the game with four receptions for 46 yards, while teammate Franklin Williams had four receptions for 44 yards. Most of Williams' yards came on the Tigers' next scoring drive. He caught two straight passes for gains of 10 and 12 yards as Union marched from Hilliard's 42-yard line to the 13. A holding penalty nullified a touchdown run by Durn, but the Tigers would eventually find the end zone when backup

Clay County has been harmonious in the relationship between the public and governmental agencies. Unfortunately, one group of three elected officials has opted to let its power go to its head. These three school board members have decided among themselves (sunshine?) that they should have even more power. First, they oppose actions by the ELECTED Superintendent of Schools and then they attempt to have the Superintendent APPOINTED rather than elected by the voters of the county. They are so anxious to assume this new power, they insist on an immediate decision.

When the county commission voted to change the date, they initiate a law suit against the county. They are hiring an attorney from outside the county to represent their interests. Of course, the taxpayers of the

county will absorb the cost of both the school board's "hired gun" and the attorney for the county.

In my view, there are several problems relative to the school board appointing a Superintendent of Schools. First, do the board members have the expertise to make such a selection or will a high priced recruiting firm be hired to assist in the selection (again at taxpayer expense)? Next, how often do we hear of boards having to "buy out" the contract of the appointed Superintendent, usually before the end of the contract?

Finally, I am not willing to give up my right to vote for any elected official. If we the voters are wise enough to elect the School Board members, why are we not wise enough to elect the Superintendent? Maybe, some members serve for too long a period. I would like to present term limits for members of the board similar to those on county commissioners. Do I sound angry and frustrated? Only because I am.

## Inhumane to deny children compassion

Dear Editor:

In response to Mr. Young's comments about the irrelevance of compassion when dealing with children from south of the border:

First, let me start off by stating that for most of the children in question, their approximate age is surely not in question. Some of them, however, will of course be questioned. Without any proof of when someone was born or what their name is (and I do mean actual proof, not just a simple statement), it can be difficult to

quickly determine someone's exact age. I've met fourteen year olds that could pass for eighteen, and twenty-two year olds that could pass for twelve. So until a proper examination can be arranged, or proof of identity established, there will of course be questions as to someone's age.

As for the allegations of this being a "phony scenario" full of "hypocrisy" I'm afraid I don't know what exactly is phony about it. Do you question that the children are here? Because they are. Do you question the conditions in their home countries, which are far worse than we have here in America? If you do, I would recommend a visit. Things such as air conditioning, sanitary water, plentiful food, pocket change, and indoor plumbing are not always available once you leave the luxuries of America. We do have our problems yes. Did they go about things the wrong way? Of course they did. But on the other hand, what parent would not do whatever it took to help their child?

The argument about abortion is completely irrelevant to this conversation regardless of your views. This is not about those performing abortions or having them performed. This is about human children, alive and out in the world, who have found their way to our country. As for saying that the children are stealing jobs from blacks, that is an interesting statement. I was not aware that they were coming here to specifically steal jobs from any one group of people, be it by race or economic status. In fact, most illegal immigrants tend to work as migrant farm labor, filling agricultural jobs which would otherwise go unfilled by the surrounding community. The jobs only are required for parts of the year. Americans tend to stay in one place and do not generally want to move from region to region following work

in the way the immigrants who have the gumption to come here do. Many places, such as orange groves here in Florida, would go out of business if they had to rely on only local help.

As you stated, America does have many unresolved issues. Women are still not equal. Non-Christians are treated as less than equals. The LGBT community is the same way. Our political system is more focused on fighting each other than on cooperating and compromise. A good portion of the country won't let anything the government does accomplish anything because they dislike the president, rather than making the best of it. Then there's immigration. Yes, reform is needed. But to deny children even the basic aspects of simple human compassion is just inhumane. We judge other nations based on their human rights policies. Would you have us toss a bunch of children in the desert to die?

There may be no right decision to make in this case. However, there is a legal one: the William Wilberforce Trafficking Victims Protection Reauthorization Act of 2008, signed into law by George W. Bush. An excerpt from the New York Times:

"Originally pushed by a bipartisan coalition of lawmakers as well as by evangelical groups to combat sex trafficking, the bill gave substantial new protections to children entering the country alone who were not from Mexico or Canada by prohibiting them from being quickly sent back to their country of origin.

Instead, it required that they be given an opportunity to appear at an immigration hearing and consult with an advocate, and it recommended that they have access to counsel. It also required that they be turned over to the care of the Department of Health and Human Services, and the agency was directed to place the minor "in the least restrictive

setting that is in the best interest of the child" and to explore reuniting those children with family members.

"It is classic unintended consequences," said Marc R. Rosenblum, deputy director of the U.S. Immigration Policy Program at the Migration Policy Institute. "This was certainly not what was envisioned." [http://www.nytimes.com/2014/07/08/us/immigrant-surge-rooted-in-law-to-curb-child-trafficking.html?\\_r=0](http://www.nytimes.com/2014/07/08/us/immigrant-surge-rooted-in-law-to-curb-child-trafficking.html?_r=0)

As they state, this is not what was intended by the law, but it is the law. Until that law can be changed - by a squabbling Congress that refuses to cooperate with one another on the simplest of things - there is only so much the government can do without breaking the law, which Republicans have already accused the president of doing on

other issues with much glee and ire.

Do we have a responsibility to take care of the world's children? That is debatable. But these children are here, now, and whether abandoned or unaccompanied (or both, as the case may be) they are alone. If we mistreat them, how are we living up to the standard we try to set on a humanitarian basis? Do government agencies break laws? Of course, we all know they do. But to give permission to do so on this or anything is an open door to a very dark road. There are limits to compassion. Helping these children for the time being, however, will not break us. We need to work to fix the problem from progressing, but not abandon our duty to our fellow human beings by throwing them to the wolves.

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## 2013 football: Tornadoes made playoffs, struggled outside of district

Bradford was the District 4-4A runner-up, which earned the Tornadoes a postseason berth, but most of the 2013 season was a struggle as the team won just three games.

The Tornadoes went 3-1 in the district, with the lone loss coming by just one point against Keystone Heights. The non-district schedule was tough, though, with Bradford losing by an average margin of 21 points against mostly bigger schools.

Here is a recap of the 2013 season:

### Baker Co. 43 BHS 6

Baker County scored four touchdowns of 21 yards or more, including two on 68-yard pass plays, as the Tornadoes lost their first game 43-6.

The Tornadoes fell behind 21-0 before quarterback Jacob Luke hooked up with Cody Bias for a 14-yard touchdown with 7:06 to play in the second quarter.

Bradford's offense was disrupted for the most part as Baker County made 15 tackles behind the line of scrimmage.

### Fort White 37 BHS 27

A 90-yard kickoff return for a touchdown by Kenny Dinkins made it a three-point game with approximately seven minutes to play, but the Bradford defense could not slow down Fort White's rushing attack in a 37-27 loss.

Fort White rushed for approximately 400 yards and answered Dinkins' score with a 76-yard drive that was capped by

a 20-yard touchdown run.

Bradford fell behind 9-0, but scored two straight touchdowns on 54- and 30-yard receptions by Dinkins. Luke's 10-yard touchdown pass to Chris Barron helped send the Tornadoes into the half up 20-16.

The Tornadoes were held to 85 yards of offense in the second half as Dinkins' kickoff return accounted for the team's only points.

Dinkins finished with six receptions for 144 yards.

Defensively, Toddreke Reed had a fumble recovery.

### BHS 25 The Villages 8

Tra'von Thomas' 80-yard touchdown run was one of several big scoring plays that enabled Bradford to defeat the Villages 25-8 in its first district game.

Thomas' run occurred on the first play from scrimmage. The Tornadoes didn't score again in the first quarter, but went up 13-0 with Luke's 36-yard touchdown pass to Dinkins in the second quarter.

The Villages put together a time-consuming 79-yard scoring drive to open the second half and make it a five-point game, but the Tornadoes responded with a scoring drive of their own, capped by Barron's 13-yard touchdown reception.

Defensive back Holden Huggins made a key pass breakup in the end zone on a fourth-down play. Bradford then extended its lead with Luke's 69-yard touchdown pass to Dinkins.

Dinkins finished with three receptions for 118 yards, while Luke completed four passes for

131 yards.

Thomas, who rushed for 119 yards on four carries, also had an interception on defense.

### Palatka 38 BHS 12

Bradford was within four points late in the first half, but Palatka would go on to build a 38-6 lead en route to handing the Tornadoes a 38-12 loss.

Bias' 1-yard touchdown run made it a 10-6 game, but Palatka returned the ensuing kickoff 74 yards to set up a touchdown before the end of the half.

A 48-yard kickoff return to open the second half led to another Palatka touchdown, while a Bradford fumble set up another score.

Dinkins, who had six receptions for 130 yards, caught a 13-yard touchdown pass from Luke in the fourth quarter. The touchdown was set up by Don Jeffers' interception.

Keaaris Ardley also had an interception for Bradford.

### BHS 14 Interlachen 12

Interlachen gave Bradford a scare with a fumble recovery for a touchdown with approximately two minutes to play, but the Tornadoes hung on for a 14-12 district win.

The Rams went for two points after the late touchdown, but their pass attempt was incomplete.

Bradford went up 14-0 in the first half, thanks to a big-time performance from Dinkins, who turned two short passes from Luke into touchdowns of 76 and 75 yards.

Huggins and Thomas also had big defensive plays in the first

half with an interception each.

Interlachen capped an 80-yard drive with a touchdown with 15 seconds remaining in the first half. Bradford's Rodderick Broomfield, though, turned in a huge play when he blocked the extra point.

Luke completed four passes for 205 yards, with Dinkins catching every pass.

An 80-plus-yard interception return for a touchdown by Jeffers accounted for Bradford's only points in a 28-7 loss to Wakulla.

Wakulla led just 13-0 at the half, but its two touchdowns covered 50 and 74 yards on pass plays.

Jeffers' interception return made it a 21-7 game with 32 seconds remaining in the third

quarter. Wakulla answered with a seven-minute scoring drive.

Bradford was held to 38 yards in the second half, but Luke finished the game with 10 completions for 141 yards.

Ardley caught three passes for 94 yards.

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
