FSP officer arrested for contraband

A former Florida State Prison correctional officer has been arrested and charged with more than 60 counts related to the introduction of contraband into the prison.

The Florida Department of Corrections Office of Inspector General arrested Christopher Luis Reyes Rivera, 28, of Starke on 62 charges — 24 for introduction of contraband, 19 for bribery and 19 for unlawful compensation.

According to Assistant State Attorney Bruce Helling, Reyes Rivera is accused of taking controlled substances into the prisons as well as cell phones, something that has been a growing problem for the Department of Corrections, according to recent reports.

Earlier this month, DOC told an ABC television affiliate investigating the problem, WFTV, that the number of cell phones and accessories found in state prisons has been growing annually, with more than 38,000 discovered since 2014.

Inmates aren't just using the devices to reach out and touch loved ones, but to continue illegal activities, including harassing victims. As in the

Flooding recommendations include short- and long-term solutions

Pointing to lessons not learned in the past, residents flooded during Hurricane Irma are pressuring leaders to take action.

Residents can remember four times the Sampson Lake neighborhood has flooded, and the Irma flooding was by far the worst, signaling to them that not only has there been inaction but the causes of flooding have been allowed to compound.

Many of the ideas put forth during a Nov. 6 workshop with the county commission and Suwannee River Water Management District were researched and recommended by residents of Sampson and Crosby

lakes. Saying they couldn't continue to "kick the can down the road," District 5 County Commissioner Frank Durrance shared many of those ideas, including the request that the water control gates between Sampson Lake and Sampson River be left open during hurricane season, beginning June 1 through October or November.

Residents will not complain about low lake levels, and while he said he wasn't naïve enough to believe there wouldn't be complaints from recreational visitors, he said the homes are more important.

"It's more important to save their homes than it is for folks to fish," Durrance said. "There were some

homes on Sampson and Crosby lakes where they could fish in their house."

Some want the gates left open all year long. For most, the duration of the gate opening would vary each hurricane season and should be based on common sense. Another common-sense idea is keeping the channel between the lake and the river clear of debris so it can hold and move as much water as possible downstream.

Durrance said residents would also like the water management district to consider a periodic drawdown of Sampson lake. Drawing down the lake every five years could benefit the lake and allow the removal of invasive plants.

County must decide emergency management direction as Johns retires

Bradford County Commissioners will hold a workshop Monday night to examine their options and discuss the future of emergency management.

November 13 will also be the final day on the job for Emergency Management Director Brian Johns, who has announced his retirement.

Johns has held the position since he was hired in 2005. The past few months have been harrowing as he managed the response to the county's worst natural disaster while dealing with the illness of his mother, who recently passed away.

The year has been marked by conflict, too, since Sheriff Gordon Smith announced his interest in taking over emergency management, saying he could run it more efficiently and save money.

Monday's workshop will give Smith the opportunity to make his case, but county commissioners told staff they want all of the options presented at that time.

That would include options for

appointing a coordinator for the county's volunteer fire departments. Johns has also functioned as the countywide fire chief since volunteer Percy Sullivan relinquished the position in 2008.

While Johns held both positions, the sheriff has said he has no interest in running the fire departments. The county commission, which has big decisions coming down the line about firefighting services as well — including whether to establish a full-time paid fire department — may want fire and emergency management to remain a package deal.

Some are saying the county already has the man for the job on staff. Residents who have supported Johns were rallying support online for Chip Ware, the county's fire marshal, to succeed Johns as emergency management director and fire chief.

Commissioners will hold their workshop at 6:30 p.m. on Monday in the boardroom at the courthouse. The meeting is open to the public.



case of Reyes Rivera, they are being aided by officers assigned to guard them.

"The department has zero tolerance for this behavior," the Department of Corrections released in a statement. "We appreciate the continuous hard work of our Inspector General's Office in helping to ensure the safety and security of our institutions."

Putting a stop to contraband of all types remains a top priority, the department said.

"We have taken aggressive steps to combat all forms of contraband within our institutions. Per Florida Administrative Code, searches of inmates, visitors and staff are performed daily. The department has also recently acquired some new forms of technology to help combat the movement and introduction of contraband."

That includes the use of X-ray

machines at all staff and visitor entrance points. According to the release, when any inmate is found to be in possession of a cell phone or other contraband item, the department takes immediate action to hold them accountable and ensure appropriate disciplinary action is taken.

"In April of 2016, the department's Office of Intelligence was created to better integrate intelligence-led corrections and formulate data-driven analytics to aid in operations throughout our institutions. The Office of Intelligence is also taking an innovative approach at examining and improving some of our internal processes related to the introduction and control of contraband such as cell phones within our institutions."

Reyes Rivera was booked into the Bradford County Jail on Nov. 3 where he remains with bond set at \$620,000 — \$10,000 for each of the county listed in his arrest affidavit.

Commissioner Chris Dougherty spoke up for District 3 residents who were also flooded in and east of Starke, saying problems emanate further upstream and they have to be addressed as well.

"That's where the water starts. That's where it's coming from," he said. The failure to capture that water and redirect the flow is why homes and streets flooded at the golf course and in the city of Starke and why the water in the lakes continued to rise after the rain stopped, he said.

The same homes have also flooded during past storms.

"I understand leaving the gates open may help down at the lakes on that end, but we still have issues up at this end that I believe would be the headwaters of Alligator Creek, and that's where the water's coming from," Dougherty said.

Houses on the water are susceptible to damage, including flooding, during hurricanes, he said. The flooding problem extends far beyond those areas, so capturing and redirecting that water needs to be a part of any plan developed, according to Dougherty.

Tom Mirti, water resources division director for the Suwannee River Water Management District, said the district's goal is to plan and implement projects that protect life and property. According to him, the district is open to recommendations from the county on the operation of the water control gates. The problem in the past has been challenges to proposed changes in the operational plans. The drawdown idea is an interesting one, he said, but would need input from Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission.

SRWMD has funded a \$225,000 grant to clean out Sampson River up and downstream of County Road 225, and the county will be seeking quotes from contractors to perform the work. It has also purchased thousands of acres of land west of Camp Blanding with the idea to abate flooding by holding water for aquifer recharge.

The district is also recommending a watershed study be conducted on the Alligator Creek Basin and downstream water bodies, Mirti said. The district is working with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to obtain federal funding for the study as well as funds to construct the recommended alternative. The funding requires congressional approval.

"You've got to look at the whole picture to be able to get a good idea to see what steps are needed to try and control the resource," Mirti said. "In this case, our primary goal would be to minimize flooding impacts to the extent that we can with the system we've got."

This is a long-term approach that actually began more than a year before Irma hit, but Irma's impact could lend more urgency to the request. Urgency doesn't mean a quick solution. Beau Corbett from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers said it would be two and a half to three years to complete a constructed project,

following a cost-share agreement between the federal government and water management district, the study itself, and the selection of the appropriate alternative. Then they go back to Congress to request the funds to construct the project.

There was audible criticism from the audience over the time frame of the study and eventual solution. The water management district first submitted a request to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in May 2016 — but that was around four years after the prior flooding event, as Dougherty pointed out.

Jessica Norfleet from Rep. Ted Yoho's office was present to speak for the congressman's support of the project as well as their work with Florida Rep. Bobby Payne on the pursuit of funding from USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service through the Emergency Watershed Protection Program.

This would be a solution for the short term to fund 75 percent of the cost of emergency measures like clearing debris from the creek. SRWMD is willing to sponsor the project and provide the additional 25 percent of the funding. They are, however, asking for money at the end of the year, she said, and had to seek an extension of the Nov. 10 deadline to apply.

Another program that apparently hasn't been used in Florida before involves buying up properties, tearing down the structures and restoring land as floodplains. That was right in line with what Starke City Manager Bob Milner said should happen along Alligator Creek and St. Clair Street in the city.

Among other potential short-term solutions, Mirti said the water management district is looking at re-establishing a drainage-recharge well in Sampson Lake that was plugged in 2011 because of the poor condition of the well. The well would serve a dual purpose, controlling the level of the lake to a small extent and increasing groundwater levels in the Floridan Aquifer. The district is exploring adding additional recharge wells in lakes upstream from the Santa Fe River as well. The district has already approved funding for a study of minimum flows and levels on the lake, and is looking at a possible cleanout of Alligator Creek between U.S. 301 and Lake Rowell, he said.

While the leaders are still trying to figure it out, those flooded during Irma showed up to remind everyone that they are far from recovered. Those with homes — some flooded weeks after the storm — have not had an opportunity to make repairs. Some are paying money out of pocket to try. Many who were renting are finding they have no place to go.

Resident Paul Still raised concerns about the discharged water from Chemours and the extent to which it contributed to flooding.

"If you don't get that out of the system, you're always going to have this problem," he said.

Connie Henderson from Chemours said working with two water management districts, Suwannee River and St. Johns River, is an ongoing process. It is not an overnight one. Chemours will be submitting a permit

modification application by the end of the year to begin some reclamation work of the mined area near Lawtey where water would be sent instead of Alligator Creek. From permitting to the completion of the work could take more than two years.

As for the extent discharge from Chemours impacted flooding, Henderson said the amount of discharge is rainfall dependent and they received 12 inches of rain as well. The average discharge is 2-3 million gallons per day, she said. During Irma, contrary to rumor, none of Chemours retention structures failed, but there was enough water to flow over the emergency spillways, which are designed to hold water up to the 100-year flood elevation before allowing its release to prevent failure of the structure.

There is an agreement with the water management district that allows Chemours to pump water to a point where gravity then drains it to the Keystone chain of lakes. Ever since she has been at Chemours, Henderson said they have actually exceeded the amount allowed per the agreement with the leniency of the district. They have to balance that with concerns about the minimum flows and levels of the Santa Fe River, however.

She said Keystone has received more than 100 million gallons since mid-June. Before that, there was no water to release. Discharge fell below 2 million gallons a day in October, so discharge to Keystone stopped at that point.

"The only time water did not go to Keystone during the storm was when we lost power," Henderson said.

It was clear officials wanted more of that discharge out of Alligator Creek, with Dougherty saying, "It's a luxury to have water in your lakes over in Keystone. It's a tragedy to flood in Bradford County."

Starke City Commission Wilbur Waters said Chemours should be held liable and made to come up with the funding to alleviate flooding.







Tigers win Region 3-1A title, will host state semifinal

In winning the Region 3-1A championship last year, the Union County High School volleyball team swept Lafayette.

The Hornets proved to be a tougher out this year, but the Tigers rallied from behind in the fourth set, fighting off match point in the process, and won the tiebreaker set by six points to capture their second straight Region 3 title by a 3-2 (25-15, 10-25, 18-25, 27-25, 15-9) score on Nov. 2 in Mayo.

"This year was more of a fight, but it feels even better than last year," senior Taylor Beatty said.

After Kylie Stevens' match-winning kill, it was difficult for first-year head coach Jordan Windham to compose herself.

"It's insane," she said. "It is amazing. I'm emotional just thinking about it. We knew, coming into this game, it was going to be like crazy tough."

The Tigers (13-11) rolled to a rather easy win in the first set, but seemed to be on the ropes after dropping the second and third sets and trailing in the fourth. Senior Madison Adams admitted her team was a little down after losing the third set, "but that fourth game, we stepped it up at the end and came back together."

By rallying, the Tigers avoided being swept by the Hornets this season, who beat Union three times during the regular season. Beatty was proud of her teammates for not giving up when things looked dire.

"They could've easily rolled over and died," Beatty said.

"They didn't. That makes me proud because I knew they were fighting for me just as much as I was fighting for them."

Windham said, "They pulled it together. They fought. They adjusted. They worked their butts off and amazingly came out with this super-crazy win. I couldn't be more proud of them."

Union will now host a state semifinal game against Williston (21-4) on Saturday, Nov. 11, at 2 p.m. The winner will play for the 1A championship on Friday, Nov. 17, at 1 p.m. at the University of North Florida in Jacksonville.

The Tigers got off to a fast start, scoring the first eight points of the first set with Beatty

Adams helps SFC students understand principles of accounting

Do you need to take Financial Accounting, but don't relish the thought of taking a difficult course in one semester, due to time constraints or other reasons? Santa Fe College has your solution in the form of Principles of Accounting 1 and Principles of Accounting 2, both of which will be offered at the Andrews Center in the spring and taught by Daneen Adams.

"Really, it's the course Financial Accounting," Adams said. "We cover the chapters Financial Accounting covers, but we break the book into two parts: Principles 1 and Principles 2."

Adams, who has taught classes at the Andrews Center for 11 years and who has taught at Santa Fe a total of 16 years (following four years as an adjunct instructor), said the reason she began teaching the Principles of Accounting classes is because they make a challenging course in Financial Accounting a little easier for those who are dual-enrolled high school students.

The pre-requisites required still prohibit a lot of dual-enrolled students from taking the classes, Adams said. However, the Principles of Accounting classes are appealing to those who are juggling responsibilities besides school.

"It's slower-paced and more doable, especially if you're taking other classes or working," Adams said. "A lot of people, it seems like they're doing more than just going to school. They're trying to juggle a lot. For the ones who have families, the ones who are working, it is nice."

Adams said she has heard that Financial Accounting is

considered one of the hardest classes in the U.S. in terms of the number of people who either drop or fail the class. Breaking it up into the two Principles of Accounting classes may make it a little more manageable, but make no mistake — it's still difficult. Adams said for students to be successful, they have to come to class and put in the work. Showing up unprepared for exams is not going to cut it.

"I try to keep them on track," Adams said. "That's the most important thing — letting them know what they're in for and kind of keeping them on track."

Not every student will succeed. Adams knows that, but that doesn't mean she doesn't do her best in trying to make every student understand the class material.

"Of course I'd love 100 percent of the students to understand it," Adams said, "but it's accounting. It's a difficult course. Some are going to grasp it more than others. My true goal is I'd love 100 percent of the people to understand 100 percent of the material. That's my goal, so I keep trying."

Adams, who grew up in Pennsylvania, said she wasn't

sure what she wanted to do career-wise when she began attending the University of Pittsburgh. She gave a thought to possibly becoming an elementary school teacher, but she said for some reason, she began taking courses that resulted in her earning a degree in business administration.

In thinking about where she wanted to go with that degree, Adams said she decided to return to school to major in accounting. The subject was something she took a shine to.

"I had a great teacher," Adams said. "I think she just made it so exciting. I just loved the material."

Adams earned a master's degree as well, which set her up for teaching. She worked as a CPA for five or six years and enjoyed it, but that earlier desire to teach never left her. She worked as an adjunct instructor at Santa Fe for four years "to make sure it was a fit for me." She's been there ever since.

"It kind of came full circle," Adams said. "I thought I wanted to teach elementary, but I'm teaching college. I think it suits


As he witnessed last year's event, Starke Police Chief Jeff Johnson said, "You see how much this community loves the people in it. They invest in this

error by Lafayette with O'Neal serving gave the Tigers a one-point lead. Ellefson's kill forced side-out and tied the score again.

A Fulgham block led to another side-out, but the Hornets' Ellefson responded with a kill.

It was 24-24 with Ellefson serving. A Union error gave the Hornets a 25-24 lead. Lafayette needed just one more point, but a kill by Kish forced side-out.

Lafayette committed two straight attack errors with Kish serving to give the Tigers the 27-25 win.

"We came together and really played hard there," Adams said of the fourth set. "There was a lot of teamwork there."

A 4-3 advantage in the fifth set turned into a 6-3 advantage with O'Neal serving. The Tigers got two service points each from Fulgham and Kish in building a 12-5 lead. A Beatty kill forced a side-out and give the Tigers' Adams a serve with a 13-6 lead.

During a time out, Windham told her team, "Listen, we have to get two before they get nine. We can do that, but we cannot let them get nine points. It just cannot happen."

The winner between Union and Williston will face either Blountstown (21-7) or Sneads (24-4) for the state title. Sneads is attempting to win its fifth straight title.

Playoff opponents end regular seasons with wins

Tornadoes defeat Broncos 41-24 for 8th straight win

It was a shaky first-half performance for the Bradford High School football team, but the Tornadoes scored five second-half touchdowns in defeating host Middleburg 41-24 on Nov. 3.

The Tornadoes (8-1) trailed 17-7 at the half, but got an early spark in the second on an interception return for a score by lineman D.J. Mackey. The offense then added four more touchdowns — three of which covered more than 30 yards.

"They don't give up," Bradford head coach Brian Tomlinson said of his players. "That says a lot about this team. Championship teams find a way to win."

With the Florida High School Athletic Association changing its playoff format, teams in Class 1A-4A no longer play for district championships. So the first championship Bradford can try to win is the Region 2-4A title. The first step begins Friday, Nov. 10, when the Tornadoes host Keystone Heights (4-5) in a Region 2 semifinal at 7:30 p.m. Bradford earned its region's top seed based on its regular season (see related story).

"I can't wait to see where this goes," Tomlinson said.

Bradford struggled with offensive consistency in the first half against Middleburg, punting on its first four possessions. Meanwhile, the Broncos (1-9) built a 10-0 lead, with the first seven points coming at the conclusion of a 90-yard drive. A 25-yard pass from Garrett Blanchett to Kevin Littles turned a first down at 10-yard line to a first down at the 35. Blanchett then hit Andrew Thomas with a pass along the sideline that resulted in a 62-yard touchdown with 10:31 to play in the second quarter.

A 39-yard run by Tyler Bryant later in the quarter put the Broncos at the Bradford 11. Middleburg could get no closer and settled for a field goal to go up 10-0 at the 6:10 mark.

The Tornadoes began clicking on offense, picking up chunks of yardage. Jeremiah Vaughn had a 13-yard run to start Bradford's ensuing possession, followed by an 18-yard pass from Zion Barber to Chris Cummings. Tally Chandler then had a 10-yard run before Cummings took a Barber pass and turned it into a 24-yard gain to the Middleburg 6. A holding penalty and a fumble backed the Tornadoes up to the 15, but a 10-yard reception by Cummings put them back at the 5. A 4-yard run by Barber set up his own 1-yard plunge into the end zone. Barber's PAT cut the Broncos' lead to 10-7 with 2:55 remaining in the half.

Middleburg's Tanner Nobles returned the ensuing kickoff 28 yards to the Bradford 49, with a 15-yard penalty on the play setting the Broncos up at the Bradford 33. Bradford's Jaquez Mosley dropped Bryant for a 2-yard loss on second-and-10, but Bryant then took a screen pass and turned it into a 35-yard touchdown at the 1:49 mark. The

PAT put Middleburg up 17-7. Though it gave up four plays of 25 yards or more in the first half, the Bradford defense provided a spark to start the second half when Mackey batted a Blanchett pass, caught it and ran approximately 30 yards for a touchdown. Barber's PAT made it 17-14 a minute into the second half.

Mackey has shown a knack for batting passes near the line of scrimmage as his game continues to develop. The fact that he turned one of those into an interception didn't surprise Tomlinson.

"He's figured out that, 'Hey, I don't have to make sacks. I can just jump up and knock the ball down.' He has some of the best hands on the team," Tomlinson said.

The Tornadoes were close to entering the fourth quarter still trailing, but a 6-yard run by Barber on a fake punt changed that. Barber's run resulted in a first down at the Bradford 39. Vaughn broke loose for a touchdown run from there, with Barber's PAT making the score 21-17 with 59 seconds left in the third quarter.

Bradford went on to score on its next three offensive series. A 56-yard drive ended in four plays, with Vaughn and Barber running for gains of 10 and 5 yards, respectively, before Chandler carried two straight times. Chandler's second carry had him scoring from 34 yards out. Barber's PAT made it 28-17 three minutes into the final quarter.

Barber added to the lengthy touchdown runs when he broke free along the sideline for a 70-yard score at the 6:02 mark. His PAT made it 35-17. Those second-half touchdown

runs pushed Barber, Chandler and Vaughn over the 100-yard mark. Barber led the team with 126 yards on 12 carries. Vaughn had 123 yards on nine carries, while Chandler had 101 yards on 14 carries.

Mackey wasn't done making plays on defense. He hit Bryant and was in the midst of tackling him for a loss when he forced a fumble, which was recovered by teammate Taz Curry at the Middleburg 30. A 25-yard reception by Nick Channell set up Barber's 5-yard touchdown pass to Cummings with 3:44 remaining. The PAT was blocked, making the score 41-17.

Barber completed 12-of-20 passes for 135 yards. Cummings caught seven of those passes for 77 yards.

Middleburg capped the scoring, driving 65 yards for a touchdown. The Broncos found the end zone on Blanchett's 8-yard pass to Malik Ally with 1:09 on the clock.

After gaining 176 yards in the first half, the Bradford offense finished with more than 500. Plus, the defense began limiting the number of big plays by the Broncos, with Mosley recording a team-high 10 tackles. Taro Ward and Nathan Davis had nine and eight, tackles, respectively.

Tomlinson said he felt his team was failing to do the "little things" in the first half and credited the Broncos with delivering a "punch in the mouth." It was a punch in the mouth Tomlinson felt his team needed. He couldn't be happier with the response now that the postseason is beginning.

"I love these guys," Tomlinson said. "They play hard. We needed a little bit of adversity, and we overcame it."

Indians rally for 34-31 homecoming win over Taylor

It took the squad coming back from a 24-12 halftime deficit, but the Keystone Heights Indians are headed to the postseason for the first time since 2014 after defeating visiting Pierson Taylor 34-31 for homecoming on Nov. 3.

After losing five straight midseason, the Indians (4-5) will now enter the playoffs winners of two straight. The team will play at Bradford (8-1) on Friday, Nov. 10, at 7:30 p.m.

Keystone jumped both Mount Dora (5-4) and The Villages (5-5), which beat the Indians 40-14 in Keystone just a few weeks ago, to earn the fourth seed in Region 2-4A.

With things still uncertain after the game, head coach Chuck Dickinson stated, "I think we still got a chance. All we did was take care of what we could."

Their win over the Wildcats (7-3) began with a big return by Colton Crane, who actually fumbled the ball forward, but the Indians were able to fall on it. Three plays later, on third-and-4, Ty Friedlin had the home side's first first down of the game. Unfortunately, the drive stalled when Briar Smith fumbled the ball away, and Pierson Taylor took over at their own 28.

On the Wildcats' opening

possession, they kept it on the ground. They crossed midfield with a 25-yard run to the Indians' 35 before junior running back Jaden Reeves eventually punched it in from 2 yards out with 6:49 remaining in the first quarter. Neftaly Paulino's extra point made it a 7-0 ballgame.

Taylor decided to kick to Crane again, and again he made them pay for it with a big return to his own 45. Blake Sanders carried it to the 50 on the following play, and then on his very next carry went 50 more for the score. Alex Cruz's PAT attempt was blocked, and Keystone still trailed, 7-6.

The Wildcats returned the

ensuing kickoff all the way to the Indians' 30. Reeves fumbled, but fell on it with 4:43 remaining in the first. Facing third-and-7, Daniel Gemeinhardt rumbled 13 yards. Taylor kept with the ground game and got all the way to the 1-yard line, but on third-and-goal with 1:51 remaining, an illegal procedure moved them back 5 yards. They could only get 2 of them back on the next play and had to settle for a 21-yard field goal to go up 10-6 with 1:04 left in the opening quarter.

The Wildcats had seemed to learn their lesson at this point,

Clay Electric does adapt and has been doing so for 80 years

Dear Editor:
This is in response to the letter to the editor from Kate Ellison published Oct. 26.

Clay Electric Cooperative has been serving this area for decades. We have adapted and continue to adapt. In fact, we will celebrate our 80th anniversary next year. There aren't many locally-owned companies that can claim eight decades of service. We have seen tremendous change and growth in those years. We started with only a few thousand members and have grown to serve more than 170,000 accounts in 14 counties with more than 13,000 miles of line.

As a distribution-only cooperative, we do not generate any of the electricity we sell to members. We are a member of Seminole Electric Cooperative. Seminole generates the electricity, we distribute it.

Clay Electric, through Seminole, is committed to diversified fuel sources for generation. Seminole just installed a new 2.2-megawatt solar facility in Hardee County. Clay Electric is part owner of that farm. Seminole also has plans for a minimum 40-megawatt facility to come online in the next few years. But solar is just one part of Seminole's long-range plans for future generation. It recently announced plans to reduce its reliance on coal with a new 1,000-megawatt natural gas-fired plant in Palatka.

Clay Electric will be installing solar panels on its Orange Park and Palatka offices in early 2018. For many years, we have provided information to members who were interested in installing solar panels at their homes. We have featured several of them in our Kilowatt newsletter over the years.

However, the installation of solar panels would not prevent, or help in any way, with outages. No matter how utility-scale electricity is generated, it still has to travel along the distribution system to reach the end-user. Hurricanes, storms and even vehicles hitting poles all cause damage to the physical system that distributes electricity. Solar would in no way help get the power back on any faster. Even installing underground service has limitations because all generation and transmission stations are above ground and thus vulnerable to hurricanes, lightning strikes and anything else that can cause damage.

The reason our members were without power for days after Hurricane Irma was because extensive damage was done to more than 90 percent of our distribution system. No matter how the electricity is generated, we had to repair the system in order to provide it to our members. We don't want anyone to be without power for any length of time, but it takes time and manpower to get the lights back on, especially with the level of damage caused by Irma.

In closing, we are proud to say that our mission has remained the same for 80 years: to provide members with safe, reliable and affordable electricity with excellent customer service.

Officials discussing school grades don't have students' best interests at heart

The Weekly Paw Print:

Last week we talked about the importance of blood work and how it can be a useful tool for detecting early signs of disease associated with an aging pet. In fact, diabetes is one such disease. Although you or I may be familiar with diabetes, in many species diabetes can be very complex. Today we are going to give you a basic understanding of this disease. To understand diabetes better, we must first discuss how the body controls and regulates blood sugar. It begins with the pancreas, the control center for regulating blood sugar. The levels of blood sugar, also known as glucose, change throughout the day. Insulin is a hormone produced by the pancreas that regulates glucose and keeps these levels in a normal range. Diabetes occurs when the pancreas does not produce adequate quantities of insulin which in turn drastically effects the normal ups and downs of glucose. Dogs and cats with diabetes often display an increase in thirst and urination. In older pets it may also manifest as urinary incontinence. So as your pet ages, monitoring for any change or increase in thirst and urination can be a useful tool in the early detection and proper management of diabetes. If you notice these changes do not wait until your next visit, let your veterinarian know. Diabetes screening is quick and can be typically accomplished with a small blood and urine sample right in your veterinary clinic. We see both type 1 and type 2 diabetes in pets. Treatment for diabetes is very specific to each patient and ultimately this might mean your pet will be on insulin therapy. If your pet is diagnosed with diabetes, there is no need to be afraid. Insulin needles are very tiny and pets are usually very amenable to them. Your veterinary medical team will give you a good detailed instructional on how to use and give the insulin. It is important to note that pets with well managed diabetes can go on to lead relatively normal lives. Successful treatment all depends on early diagnosis. By monitoring your pets thirst and urination, you can help give your veterinarian the information they need to keep your furry family member healthier and happier longer.





Season ends for BHS, KHHS cross country runners

Nine individuals representing Bradford and Keystone Heights high schools competed at the Nov. 4 Region 2-2A cross country finals in Port Orange,

with Keystone's Camryn Williams earning the highest finish by placing 31st.

To advance to state, an individual had to place in the top 15 in his or her respective race, or a team had to place in the top

six. Keystone had its full boys team competing, but the Indians placed 14th.

In the 98-member girls field, Williams posted a time of 22:14.40. Teammate Dee Dee Taylor wasn't far behind, placing

35th with a time of 22:24.90.

Bradford's lone participant, Jaelyn Canova, placed 68th with a time of 24:55.70.

Alex Guy led the Keystone boys team with a time of 18:07.30, which was good for

36th in the 109-member field. The next highest Keystone finisher was Tyler Shaw, who was 62nd with a time of 19:12.40.

Also competing for Keystone were Jerry Payne (21:09), Jay Payne (21:09.70), Travis

Dockery (21:57.20) and Joseph Danella (22:12.20).

Earning state berths as teams on the boys side were Trinity Prep, Lake Highland Prep, Tavares, Atlantic, Nature Coast and Citrus.

of the regular season dictate how many points a team earns for a win or a loss. The number of games played will be divided by that point total.

Points are divided into four categories.

—Category 1: a win over an opponent that has won at least 80 percent of its games results in 50 points, while a loss results in 30.

—Category 2: a win over an opponent that has won 60-79 percent of its games results in 45 points, while a loss results in 25.

—Category 3: a win over an opponent that has won 40-59 percent of its games results in 40 points, while a loss results in 20.

—Category 4: a win over an opponent that has won 39 percent of its games or less results in 35 points, while a loss results in 15.

Plus, a team earns three bonus points for each team it plays that was a playoff qualifier the previous two seasons. Also, three bonus points are earned for playing teams that finished in the top 25 in MaxPreps or USA Today end-of-year rankings.

Bradford had one Category 1 opponent in West Nassau (8-1). Since the Tornadoes defeated the Warriors, they earned 50 points.

The Tornadoes played three Category 2 opponents in Taylor County (7-3), Fort White (7-3) and Crescent City (7-2). Bradford beat Fort White and Crescent City, earning 45 points from each win as well as three bonus points due to Fort White's

past in reaching the playoffs. Bradford lost to Taylor County, which resulted in 25 points as well as an additional three bonus points due to Taylor County making the playoffs in the past.

Bradford earned 40 points each from defeating Baldwin and Keystone and three bonus points from playing Baldwin. The Tornadoes earned 35 points each from defeating Kingdom Prep, Hamilton County and Middleburg, with the games against Hamilton County and Middleburg earning them three bonus points each.

The result was that Bradford edged Dunnellon for the number-one seed with an average of 40.56. Dunnellon had a 40.11 average.

Besides Bradford, Dunnellon and Trenton, only two teams in

Region 2-4A had at least five wins: Mount Dora (5-4) and The Villages (5-5). Yet Keystone had an average of 32, placing the Indians ahead of The Villages' average of 31.90 and Mount Dora's average of 31.33.

Keystone received bonus points from only one of its opponents (Bradford), but it went 1-4 against teams that finished in categories 1-2. That win came last week against Pierson Taylor, which finished as a Category 2 team.

Mount Dora was 0-3 against teams in either Category 1 or 2, while The Villages went 0-4.

The Indians earned 63 points for playing Category 1 teams (losses to Bradford and Wildwood), 95 points for playing Category 2 teams (a win against Pierson Taylor and losses to

Crescent City and Hawthorne), 60 points for playing Category 3 teams (a win against Fernandina Beach and a loss to The Villages) and 70 points for playing Category 4 teams (wins against P.K. Yonge and Interlachen).

The four Region 3-1A teams that made it to the postseason are the only ones in the region with winning records, though Union edged out two 5-5 teams to get in. The Tigers had an average of 34, while Chiefland and Branford had averages of 32.40 and 32.30, respectively.

Union, Chiefland and Branford each played four teams that wound up finishing in Category 1 or Category 2, with the Tigers defeating one (Hawthorne) and going 1-3, while Chiefland and Branford each went 0-4. The Tigers also earned 15 bonus points, while

Chiefland and Branford had nine and three, respectively.

Union earned 33 points for playing one Category 1 team (a loss to Dixie County), 101 points for playing Category 2 teams (a win against Hawthorne and losses to Fort White and Taylor County), 63 points for playing Category 3 teams (a win against Baldwin and a loss to Williston) and 143 points for playing Category 4 teams (wins against Avant Garde, North Florida Educational Institute, Interlachen and Newberry).

Madison County and Dixie County had averages of 44.20 and 43.90, respectively, to earn that region's top two seeds. Third-seed Lafayette had an average of 38.20.

and instead of kicking it to Crane again, kicked it high and short and the Tribe took over at their 28. After a three-and-out, the Indians punted the ball away, and Taylor resumed on offense in the second quarter. The Wildcats went right back to work on the ground, driving to the 15 before Williams went all 15 to pay dirt on third-and-1 with 8:57 remaining in the half to go up 17-6.

Keystone would take over at their own 35. Smith took it 15 to midfield with under four minutes to go. A 24-yard gain from Smith took it all the way down to the 20. With the drive stalling on third-and-9 from the 19, Adrien Ciena threw his second incomplete pass in a row to bring up fourth down. However, after a wide rollout, Ciena heaved the ball to the goal line, where Sawyer Maxwell came down with it. The two-point conversion failed when Ciena was unable to hook up with Sanders, and with 7:07 remaining in the half, the Wildcats were nursing a 17-12 lead.

Nearly four minutes later, after a Taylor 27-yard run down to the 5, a holding call brought it all the way back to the 37, but on the very next play, Taylor took it all the way down to the 12, but offsetting penalties made them repeat the down. Approaching the three-minute mark, senior quarterback Vicandi Ward hit Gemeinhardt on second-and-15 for 10, but on the next play, Williams took it 27 yards for the score with 2:25 in the half. The PAT Made it 24-12.

After a horsecollar call on the TD, the Wildcats were easily able to kick it through the back of the end zone. Keystone did little to try to answer before half. While there was a big run from Smith toward midfield, a flag called it back, and soon the halftime horn sounded with the home side trailing by 12.

At some point in the first half, Cruz suffered a neck injury. He came out in the second half with his shoulder pads off. That is when Dickinson decided every kickoff from here on out would be an onside kick. The one to open the second half did not work out, but the Wildcats would end up fumbling it away at the

Keystone 30. That's when, after a few more plays, Sanders took it in from over 30 yards out for his second touchdown of the night. This time, the two-point conversion was good, and the lead was cut to 24-20.

On the evening, Sanders carried 13 times for 136 yards and two scores, good enough for a 10.5 average.

This time, the onside kick was a good one, and after a facemask penalty, the Indians found themselves at the Taylor 30-yard line with 5:32 remaining in the third. Smith rumbled down to the 8 before a holding penalty brought it back to the 18. On third-and-6, Briar Smith took it in for a touchdown. On the two-point play, Ciena, despite being wrapped up at the line, fought through and managed to score. All of a sudden, after entering the locker room down by 12 at the break, the Tribe found themselves with a 28-24 lead in the third quarter.

Afterward, the Indians tried their third onside kick in a row. This time, the bounce was too high, and the Wildcats recovered at their own 45. They would go three-and-out. However, on the ensuing Keystone drive, a fumble would give Pierson Taylor the ball back. Lleyton Murphy came up with a big sack to end the third quarter and put Taylor into a second-and-20 situation to open the fourth. On fourth-and-10, with 10:57 remaining, a QB keeper by Ward was close, yet not enough.

On the next drive, Keystone faced a third-and-4, but an illegal procedure call pushed them back 5 yards, and an incomplete pass from Ciena on the next play forced the Indians to punt.

With 8:17 remaining, Ward went 59 yards for a Pierson Taylor touchdown, and after the PAT, the Wildcats were back on top with 8:17 to go.

Still refusing to kick it deep to Crane, the kickoff was fielded by Chandler Padgett at the 38. That's when Ciena hit Sanders on a 22-yard pass in stride. Two plays later, Sanders went 14 yards. Sanders then did it again on the exact same play as before. Friedlin then took it in for a to-goal situation. Sanders appeared to score a TD before having it moved back to about the 1-inch line. On third down, Friedlin punched it in to return to the lead to Keystone, 34-31. The kick was again blocked, and the Tribe

were forced to try to protect the lead down the stretch.

They did just that after another failed onside kick. A Wildcats fumble recovered by Dan Dodd at the Indians' 37 game the ball back to the home side, but they were unable to do anything with it and had to punt it away with 1:47 remaining.

With Taylor taking over at their own 28, a huge sack made their path to victory even more difficult. An attempted quarterback keeper on the next play resulted in another sack by Carter Semione with 37 seconds left, putting the Wildcats in dire straights. Finally, on fourth down, with 10 seconds to go, a pass attempt fell incomplete, giving the Indians the upset homecoming victory and the playoff birth.

"Even if this outcome didn't come out right and they would have scored, I still would have been proud of them because we played our hearts out and left it on the field," Dickinson said. "I told the seniors, 'Hey, you've got 48 minutes.'"
